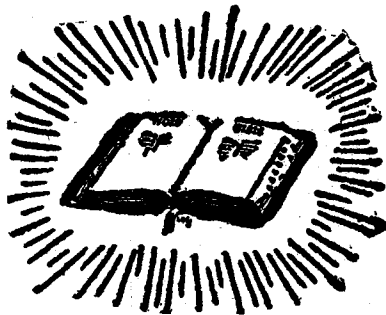

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In Memoriam

REV. ALVIN YOUNG

Once again the grim reaper has invaded our ranks and our hearts are saddened because of the vacancy left by the home going of Rev. Alvin Young.

During our last conference Bro. Young gave his personal testimony from the platform of the Victory Grove Camp.

Already death had marked him as his own and on July 16, 1957 a new note was added to the choir of the ransomed souls.

The voice that had blessed thousands as it rang in triumph has taken on eternal youth and heavenly sweetness, as Bro. Young sings before the throne of his Redeemer.

Born in the flesh Nov. 28, 1878 Alvin Young became a new creation in Christ Jesus in 1913, and during the next 44 years of his life served his God faithfully.

His itinerary covered all parts of the United States as well as parts of South America and the West Indies.

Rev. Young was pastor of Northville Holiness Mission until January 1956. For over thirty years he served as District Secretary of the New York District Conference. For over thirty-five years he was a member of the District Council and for forty years treasurer of the Victory Grove Camp.

Not only was Bro. Young an able Christian worker, but a reliable friend, counsellor and co-worker. His passing has been our loss but heaven's enrichment.

Journal of Proceedings

Opening Sitting --- July 7, 1958, 2:00 p.m.

The thirty-seventh Annual Conference of the New York District convened at 2:00 p.m., July 7, 1958, on the Victory Grove Camp Ground.

Session began as Rev. J. N. Jump led the Conference in the song, "Near the Cross," with Jean Hoffman accompanying at the organ.

Our District Superintendent welcomed the delegation and declared that this assemblage follows an unusual camp meeting. May the Spirit of the camp continue to rest on us!

Dr. R. D. Gunsalus, President of E. P. C. led in prayer.

Rev. Melvin Snyder, "our own" General Superintendent of the Eastern Area, was introduced as chairman by Bro. Fay who pledged by the help of God full cooperation from the New York District.

Bro. Snyder's personal testimony: "The Language of my soul"—my isn't it great to live and live for Jesus alone; He makes me extremely happy."

He spoke in brief as to Sister Neff's home going and urged our continued prayer for Bro. Neff.

Our General Superintendent spoke as to the program of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted by our last General Conference. Many remarked that this was the outstanding General Conference of all. We are to be motivated by our faith instead of by our fears. The three major steps taken were:

- a. Election of Three General Superintendents.
- b. Merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church.
- c. Increase in the budget.

Bro. Snyder referred to the goals set by the church for the next quadrennium under the caption "Toward Tomorrow!"

1. 5,000 gain in church membership.
2. 150 new churches in organized districts.
3. Annual pastor's conference in each district.
4. Accentuated holiness evangelism.
5. Prayer and Fasting League.

The Forward Movement has not died! Though it is not on pamphlets, it is to be found in our spirit.

At the voice of the presiding officer, the roll was called and the Conference bar cleared.

Rev. O. L. Fay, our District Superintendent, presented a comprehensive report of the year's activities which was received by motion of the conference.

Rev. M. E. Pierpoint gave an oral report of his Assistant Superintendent's assigned services. This was accepted by motion.

We received the limited report of the Auditing Committee relative to the following:

District Treasurer's Report, Ministerial Pension Fund Report, Church Extension Report, Binghamton Camp Treasurer's Report, Victory Grove Camp Treasurer's Report, Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions and the Statistician's Report.

It was authorized by the chairman that Sister Avery's entry of praise for the diligent, punctual, and accurate work of the treasurers be also recorded.

Bro. J. N. Jump gave his reports of: District Treasurer, Ministerial Pension Fund, and Church Extension. These were received by motion of the Conference.

Binghamton Camp Treasurer's Report was given by Rev. Andrew J. Whitney and accepted.

Victory Grove Camp Treasurer's Report was given by Rev. Garry Boel and accepted.

The Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions, Marjorie Stuart, gave her report and it was received with a hearty "Praise the Lord."

The District Statistician's Report was given by Rev. Arthur Shafer and received by motion.

We adjourned by expiration of time.

Second Sitting — July 7, 1958, 7:00 p.m.

The second session of the 1958 Conference convened at 7:00 p.m. with the song "Amazing Grace." Rev. Joseph Hunting prayed.

Our General Superintendent presented to us Dr. R. D. Gunsalus who needed no introduction. The President thanked the District for continued support of E. P. C. and urged our ardent prayers for the best year spiritually in the college.

The President of the Liberal Arts College at Owosso, Michigan, Dr. Otto Jennings, was introduced by Bro. Gunsalus. "He who can control the thinking of our youth will control the destinies of tomorrow." He admonished us to faithfully support the Bible School of our zone in this age of higher prices. He further emphasized the need of a liberal arts school that teaches what we believe as pilgrims. We need graduates with the Pilgrim "stamp" on them. "Our youth must be grounded in the things we believe. We stand without a pier when it comes to teaching our youth to be Pilgrims." The President informed us as to the Divine planting of the college at Owosso.

The minutes of the first sitting were approved as read.

Rev. Carl Hall, chairman of the Reception Committee, introduced the following to the Conference:

Rev. and Mrs. Walter Merritt of the Holiness Church at Harrisville, N. Y., Mr. and Mrs. Donald Myers, prospective pastors for the Fox Hill Church. Words of testimony expressed the inner work of the Spirit. The motion prevailed that these with Bro. Gunsalus and Bro. Jennings be granted a seat in the Conference bar.

Reports from our missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. Clifton Berg, Rev. and Mrs. Richard Moore, Rev. Magdalen Blann, Grace M. Robinson, were read by the secretary and a motion carried to respond to these letters.

The District Young Peoples Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Leonard Lum and accepted by motion of the Conference. This report also included the expenditures of the Central and Southern Youth Zones. Bro. Snyder

suggested that next year's report of the Youth Treasurer also include the different zone activities.

With no further business on the agenda, our chairman spoke in detail relative to the United Stewardship Fund, formerly "the budget," stating that no member of our church should be denied the privilege of participating in giving to every branch of the church. This fund is the basic giving of our church to every department.

The Conference adjourned that Council and Committees might function.

Third Sitting — July 8, 1958, 9:00 a.m.

The third session of the 1958 conference assembled promptly at 9:00 a.m., with the opening song of "What a Friend," with Bro. Jump and Sister Hoffman in charge. Prayer was offered by Bro. Lamb.

Without any comment, our General Superintendent read Philippians 2:1-16 which is a commentary in itself. Bro. Snyder rendered points of clarification concerning our schools and probationary membership, stating also as to the carefulness which should be taken in ordaining men to the ministry.

. The Minutes of the second sitting were approved as corrected.

The Vermontville Camp Treasurer's report was read by Rev. William McCulley and accepted.

The Auditor's report was reread in full and carried by motion.

While time elapsed for resketching of the District Trustee's report, songs and testimonies had the mastery. Before returning to business, Bro. Snyder gave a quotation, "There is a chasm between what we can reasonably do and what God wants done. This can only be bridged by faith."

The District Trustee's Report was accepted with the addition of the valuation of the Rochester work to be listed.

The Secretary of the Ways and Means Committee reported.

Resolution No. 1 relating to the District continuing the system of contributing to Eastern Pilgrim College was accepted.

Resolution No. 2 which amended standing resolution No. 5, page 18 in reference to our General Budget was accepted.

A motion was made, seconded and carried that the order of the day be the election of officers.

Motion was made and seconded that Donald Myers and J. Kingsley Yauger be accepted as members of this Conference, subject to approval of the Examining Committee. Carried.

The following tellers were appointed by the District Superintendent: Rev. Lindley Adams, Rev. Billie Bidwell, Rev. Kendall Straight, Rev. Bernard Barton, Rev. Joseph Hunting, Rev. Maurice Hobart.

We proceeded to elect a District Superintendent. On the first balloting Rev. O. L. Fay was reelected for two years.

Ballots were cast for Assistant Superintendent. On the third balloting, Rev. M. E. Pierpoint was reelected.

Nominations were read by the secretary for the office of District Secretary

—Rev. Francis Richmond and Rev. Andrew J. Whitney. Bro. Whitney retained his office.

Nominations were read for District Treasurer—Rev. Lloyd Stuart and Rev. J. N. Jump. Bro. Jump was officially reinstated.

Ballots were cast for the Advisory Members of the Council. The motion was made, seconded and passed that we recess till the afternoon sitting and at that time hear the report of the tellers.

Fourth Sitting — July 8, 1958, 2:00 p.m.

The fourth session of the 1958 Conference convened at 2:00 p.m. with Rev. J. N. Jump leading the congregation in singing, "I Will Praise Him." Prayer was offered by Rev. Fred McCulley.

Minutes of the morning sitting were read and approved with suggested corrections.

Rev. Carl Hall introduced to the Conference the Rev. Donald Babcock of the Bellemonte Methodist Church, Richmond, Virginia, who gave word of personal victory.

Report was given by the secretary as to the result of balloting for three Advisory Members of the Council. The following were elected: Rev. Lloyd Stuart, Rev. H. L. Twining, Rev. O. W. Lawrence.

Motion was made, seconded and carried that the members of the Examining Board and the Board of Education, which were to function as a unit, be elected by majority vote. The following names were submitted as nominees by the Council:

Three-year term: Rev. James Payne, Rev. J. Franklin Lint.

Two-year term: Rev. Lloyd Stuart, Rev. R. C. Dettmer.

One-year term: Rev. Joseph Hunting, Rev. Billie Bidwell.

The result of election by the conference was Rev. James Payne, Rev. Lloyd Stuart and Rev. Joseph Hunting respectively.

Ballots were cast for a member to the Board of Trustees for three years. Rev. Andrew J. Whitney was elected.

The motion was made and seconded that we suspend the rules and vote by acclamation for Marjorie Stuart as Secretary-Treasurer for Foreign Missions. Carried unanimously.

Bro. Lloyd Stuart, Sunday School Promotional Secretary, gave his report and awarded certificates to the church with the highest percentage gain and the highest numerical gain. Gloversville Pilgrim Holiness Church was presented with both certificates.

In the face of a District loss in our yearly Sunday School Average, perhaps due to the snow storms and flu, Bro. Stuart admonished us to revive our efforts in this branch of our church with full cooperation from each church and pastor. This report was received by motion of the Conference.

The Resolution Committee reported with the following resolutions:

Resolution No. 1 in regards to a Sunday School hour at our camps was adopted.

Resolution No. 2 requesting the District Superintendent to notify pastors of any deaths of our New York District ministers was amended to include

General officials of our church. This was adopted.

Resolution No. 3 in reference to a guardian over our Young People at our camps was referred to the committee for redrafting.

Resolution No. 4 concerning the report of youth activities in each zone was carried by motion.

The Ways and Means Committee reported through its Secretary, Rev. Francis Richmond.

Resolution No. 3 as to the erection of a two car garage for the District Superintendent was amended to read, as soon as the churches of the New York District provide adequate funds for completion of the structure. Carried as amended.

Resolution No. 4 relating to the raising salaries of some District officials was carried.

Resolution No. 5 instructing the District Treasurer to reimburse the Victory Grove Camp Treasurer for Conference expense was adopted.

The motion was carried that the District Council approve the minutes of this sitting and be authorized to take care of any unfinished business.

In response to the goals set by the General Conference for the next quadrennium, presenting our District with a goal of one new church annually and seven percent gain in our Sunday Schools, the New York District Council recommended that this district do all it can to employ itself in the task of winning souls and that in this endeavor, each pastor give cooperative attention to the following matters:

1. New churches
2. Branch Sunday Schools
3. Prayer and fasting league
4. Conserving our gains by receiving into membership those qualified to join our church.

This recommendation was received wholeheartedly by the conference.

Invitations for the Ministerial Convention were given by the churches of Northville, Albany, Oneonta. The Conference accepted by plurality vote the Albany church as place for the Ministerial.

The Committees for the ensuing year were read by the District Secretary.

Resolution No. 3 concerning supervision at our camps was redrafted and again presented. It was adopted.

A Memoir of Rev. Alvin Young was read by the District Secretary.

Rev. Carl Hall presented the final resolution to the Conference which was accepted in deep appreciation by a standing vote of the delegation. "Be it resolved that we now express our appreciation to our General Superintendent, the Rev. Melvin Snyder, for his magnanimous spirit and kindly chairmanship and for his splendid admonition; to the District Council, Committees and officers for their faithful labors; the kitchen and ground help for all their services, by a rising vote of thanks."

By request of the Conference, the Rev. Donald Babcock favored the assembly by a melody of songs on the console.

Rev. Orrin L. Fay, District Superintendent, closed the 1958 District Conference in a triumphant prayer.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

FINANCE

No. 1 Resolved that each church sending a delegate or delegates to the District Conference, pay the traveling expenses of said delegates and pastor.

No. 2 Resolved, that when the District Council deems any licensed minister unable to meet the expense of taking the study course as directed in Education Resolution No. 2, they may pay all or part of the cost of such course. The Licensee in such case shall agree to finish a year of such course in the Conference year.

No. 3. Resolved, that when money is sent direct to any fund, the church treasurer shall obtain a receipt for same and forward this to each District Representative.

No. 4. Resolved, that all departments of our church shall, upon receipt of monies, immediately forward receipts for same to sender.

No. 5. Resolved, that the District Treasurer shall maintain two funds, to be known as the District Expense Fund and The Church Extension Fund.

The ministers and workers of the District shall pay all their tithe into the church where they hold membership.

Each month the local church shall forward to the District Treasurer, the pastor's tithe and 50 per cent of other ministerial member's tithe. These amounts shall be specified for the District Expense Fund.

The District Church Extension Fund shall be provided for by an assessment of \$1.50 per member. This money shall be forwarded by the local treasurer to the District Treasurer, specified for the Church Extension Fund.

Resolved, that we insert in our minutes the Memorial on the United Stewardship Fund, adopted by the General Conference of 1958 as follows:

There shall a United Stewardship Fund of \$8.00 per member annually: Foreign Missions 20 per cent; Church Extension 14 per cent; Administration 36 per cent; Sunday School and youth 2.6 per cent; Senior College 21.4 per cent; Church Extension Loan Fund 3 per cent; contingent 3 per cent. This United Stewardship Fund to be raised monthly.

It shall be the responsibility of the pastor and the church board to see that their church raises its portion of the "United Stewardship Fund." This offering shall be raised monthly. The Treasurer of Foreign Missions shall be instructed to forward to the District Treasurer an amount equal to \$1.60 per member commensurate with the Memorial on the "United Stewardship Fund."

No. 6. Resolved, that in order to receive due credit in the current year, any church must have all money in the mail on or before June 5. The District Treasurer shall keep his books open until June 10, so that proper credit may be given for monies mailed on or before June 5. All monies mailed after June 5, shall be entered in the following year.

No. 7. Resolved, that we as a district, continue the system of contributing to the Eastern Pilgrim College the equivalent of 25 cents a month per member; said funds to be paid through the District Treasurer, and that we

request the co-operation of the School in sending each year a representative to each church to assist in raising our financial quota.

No. 8. Resolved, that the District Superintendent's support shall be as follows:

Salary, \$350.00 per month; Travel expenses, Six cents per mile by automobile, and actual expense by train or bus; In addition, the District shall provide a parsonage furnished with telephone, electricity, gas, heat and water.

No. 9. Resolved, that the District Superintendent push the Pilgrim Pension Plan and encourage every pastor to join. In cases where it is determined by the District Council that payment of such dues would cause undue hardship for the pastor and church, said dues shall be paid by the District out of the District Expense Fund.

No. 10. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be granted an annual vacation of two weeks each year with pay.

No. 11. In order to create a sustained interest in and support for District Home Missions and Church Extension, we recommend and urge each church to set apart one prayer meeting night each month at which time earnest prayer shall be made for District Home Missions and an offering to be taken for the same and forwarded to our District Treasurer. This is to be in addition to our regular yearly assessment of \$1.50 per member.

No. 12. Resolved, that those driving to work on our Camp Grounds or otherwise using their cars in the interests of the District shall receive six cents per mile for the use of their car.

No. 13. Be it resolved that when deemed advisable by both Pastor and the District Superintendent that an offering be received by the District Superintendent at the time of his regular visit for the purpose of assisting the local church in meeting its budget or for the purpose of District Church Extension.

No. 14. Be it resolved that adequate liability insurance be secured for the protection of the public and personnel involved in all activities on our camp grounds.

No. 15. Be it resolved that each church be required to send an offering each year to help defray the expense of Conference.

No. 16. Inasmuch as we are encouraged and admonished to move forward in the New York District; Be it resolved that each Zone Camp set apart one service of their respective camp for a special Home Missionary Rally at which time an offering be taken for the support of present and future Home Missionary projects.

No. 17. Be it resolved that immediate action be taken by the District Council to provide for the construction of a two car garage for the District parsonage, this construction to begin as soon as the churches of the New York District provide adequate funds for the completion of said construction.

No. 18. Be it resolved that the following persons receive annually that amount stipulated, for services rendered: The District Treasurer \$200.00; District Foreign Missionary Secretary and Treasurer, \$150.00; Pilgrim News Editor, \$150.00; District Secretary, \$50.00; District Statistician \$25.00.

No. 19. Be it resolved that the District Treasurer reimburse the Treasurer of the Victory Grove Camp for actual conference expense incurred.

This amount to be determined by the Camp Treasurer and the District Treasurer.

EDUCATION

No. 1. Resolved that all of our local churches shall open their doors annually to the representatives of the Eastern Pilgrim College, and be it further resolved that at such times an offering shall be taken for the maintenance of the School, liquidation of debt, and new facilities. In arranging for such visits the administration shall co-operate with both district and local officers.

No. 2. Inasmuch as Eastern Pilgrim College provides correspondence courses for ministerial students, be it resolved that all our workers desiring license to preach or ordination be required to take such course, and that the Board of Education be governed in its recommendations for license to preach or ordination by a report from the Bible College upon the work done by the applicant; provided, however, that due credit, may be given by the Board, at its discretion, to said applicants, for any equivalent work done in any other school acceptable to it.

MISCELLANEOUS

No. 1. Resolved, that no properties such as churches, parsonages, or other buildings or land shall be sold of any of our incorporate churches without first conferring with the trustees of the district corporation.

No. 2. Resolved, that section 16 of article 2 of the religious corporation law be enforced in our district in regard to churches who have discontinued holding services and where there are less than 7 resident attending members.

That such temporalities and property be managed by the District Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Inc., our ecclesiastical governing body, or may, in pursuance of the provisions of law relating to the disposition of real property by religious corporations, sell or dispose of the same, and apply the proceeds thereof to any of the purposes to which the property of such governing religious body is devoted, and shall not divert such property to any other object.

In no case shall property be sold or disposed of to the support the preacher who may claim this as an out appointment.

Due notice shall be given by the District Secretary, regarding the action of the District Assembly in declaring a church extinct, within thirty days to the remaining members, if any.

No. 3. Resolved, that inasmuch as the resolutions contain matters of vital importance to our lay members and inasmuch as not everyone reads the resolutions, we recommend that our pastors read the resolutions before the church as soon as possible after the distribution of the minutes.

No. 4. Resolved, that we, the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, place ourselves on record as being unalterably opposed to, and deplore the present sale and use of intoxicating beverages throughout the nation, and furthermore we advise and strongly urge our people not to encourage the sale and use of said liquors by patronizing such places where these intoxicating liquors are sold.

No. 5. Inasmuch as our Manual declares itself against the wearing of jewelry; be it resolved, that none of our preachers shall use the ring ceremony in marriages, or in any way encourage the use of it. Any minister who uses such ceremony shall be dealt with by the District Council.

No. 6. Resolved, that all reports regularly sent to the District Statistician be in his hands by June 15 and that all books and records that are to be audited shall be sent to the chairman of the Auditing Committee by June 15.

No. 7. Resolved, that each Pastor be required to attend his or her Zone Camp and to remain over at least one Sunday.

No. 8. In view of tendencies detrimental to the spiritual effort of our camp meetings, we recommend that the following rule be adopted for all our camps. All persons resident on the grounds shall respect a curfew hour of ten-thirty o'clock and lights shall be out by eleven p.m. with due exceptions to be made for any person engaged in legitimate camp meeting activities.

No. 9. Resolved, that the telephone numbers of the ministers be published annually in the Minutes and that the address of the church also be published.

No. 10. Resolved, that following the election of officers, the District Superintendent shall appoint the committees which are to function under the District Council for the ensuing year.

No. 11. Resolved, that a District Ministerial Convention be held each year on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the second week in April except when the second week in April is Holy Week, in which case the date of the Convention shall be set by the District Council. The place of the convention shall always be determined by the District Conference.

No. 12. Resolved, that the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church is opposed to divorce and remarriage and that all persons who are divorced and remarried, except to be remarried to the one from whom they have been divorced, providing, they have not taken another, be denied membership in said church.

No. 13. Resolved, that each pastor be given freedom to hold at least two revivals each conference year.

No. 14. Inasmuch as the heavy burden of cleaning up our Camp grounds often falls upon only a few individuals, be it resolved that the preachers in each Camp Zone shall be notified in advance of cleanup day by one of the officials of the camp, and that each one thus notified shall be expected to give assistance to the task if at all possible. This applies to Vermontville Camp in the North; Victory Grove in the Central Zone; and Binghamton Camp in the South.

No. 15. Resolved, that the two center sections of seats together with the first five seats of each side in the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

No. 16. Resolved, that the time of the business sessions of our District Conference be fixed as follows: From 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon, From 2:00 P. M. to 5:00 P.M.; From 7:00 P.M. to 10:00 P.M.

No. 17. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be given freedom to conduct two revivals outside the District each Conference year, and that he be permitted to keep all proceeds from the same.

No. 18. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be required to meet with each local church board at least once each Conference year.

No. 19. We recommend that each local church in as far as possible, give their pastor two weeks vacation over one Sunday with pay.

No. 20. Resolved, that in each of our churches a pastoral recall meeting shall be held each year not later than the third week in April.

No. 21. Resolved, that the monthly Sunday School report in THE PILGRIM NEWS follow the General Secretary's form, tabulating (1) The average attendance of last Conference year as reported in the Conference Minutes; (2) The average attendance to date this Conference year; (3) The average attendance this month; (4) The average attendance for the same month last year.

The monthly report shall be submitted to the Editor of THE PILGRIM NEWS by the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

No. 22. Inasmuch as the time at which our annual Conference begins necessitates that many of our preachers and delegates drive on Sunday in order to be present for the opening session, Be It Resolved, that the opening session of Conference be held at 2:00 P. M. on the Monday following Victory Grove Camp, and that it continue until the following Wednesday.

No. 23. Inasmuch as there is a marked disregard for the Lord's Day, and the Scripture admonishes us to keep it holy by doing no worldly business in it, Be It Resolved that a contribution box be left for a free will offering at the exit of the dining halls of our camps and let said free-will offering box be properly marked and left unattended.

No. 24. Resolved, that the Labor Day Youth Rally at Victory Grove be a district youth rally at which time the district youth leaders will be elected, for the coming year.

No. 25. Resolved, that each dormitory on our Camp grounds shall have at least one resident responsible person in charge to maintain order during Camp and Conference.

No. 26. Be It Resolved that a zone treasurer and secretary be appointed along with the zone leader which will constitute a committee responsible for the youth activity of each zone.

Be it further resolved that the District Young People's Executive Secretary be requested to urge the organization of local societies.

No. 27. Be It Resolved that a drive be made in each of our churches to make the number of Advocate subscriptions equal to the church membership, and that each pastor shall report to the next Conference concerning his progress in the Advocate campaign.

No. 28. Be It Resolved that the District Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions be made an honorary member of the Conference with voice and vote in the same.

No. 29. Be It Resolved that the Editing Committee have the power to delete from the Minutes all obsolete resolutions subject to the approval of the District Council.

No. 30. Resolved that the treasurers of the respective camp meetings shall, within a month of the closing date of each camp, forward to the pastor (or treasurer, if known) of the churches concerning either the pledge

cards themselves, or a list showing: name of pledger, amount pledged, and project for which pledged.

No. 31. Resolved, that each zone conduct a Sunday School Convention within the Conference year, and be it further resolved that the District Sunday School Board be responsible for arranging such conventions.

No. 32. Resolved, that no delegate shall be seated by the Conference to represent any church if that church has failed to duly elect a delegate.

No. 33. Resolved, that a speed limit of eight miles per hour be enforced on all our camp grounds, and that signs to this effect be placed at all entrances, and be it further resolved that bicycle riding on the camp grounds be prohibited during camp.

No. 34. Resolved, that the starting date of the Binghamton Camp shall be the first Thursday of August.

No. 35. Resolved, that each zone sponsor a youth camp to be held on the zone camp grounds, at a time convenient to the respective zone, to be under jurisdiction of the zone youth leader and committee, in conjunction with the District Youth Executive and the District Superintendent.

No. 36. Resolved, that each church shall upon the election of its delegate to the District Conference, forward a written notice of the same to the District Secretary.

No. 37. The Resolution Committee recommends that in the appointing of officers for the four zones into which our District is divided relative to our Young People's Societies, that the chairman of each zone be selected from our pastors and the other officers of each organization be from the lay members.

No. 38. Resolved, that a new District Young People's Zone be established to be known as the Western Zone, which shall be composed of the following churches, Utica, Syracuse and Chittenango.

No. 39. Resolved, that each Sunday school in the district close the Sunday school attendance records one half hour after the beginning of the said school.

No. 40. Be It Resolved that the editor of THE PILGRIM NEWS receive from the District Secretary a calendar of District events to be published at least one month in advance of dates set for each event.

No. 41. Resolved, that this District go on record as being opposed to the presence of television in the homes of our members and that we urge every preacher to not only warn his people against its evils, but also to set an example by not allowing it in his home. Any preacher permitting a set in his home shall be subject to action by the District Council.

No. 42. Be it resolved that a Sunday School hour be conducted on both Sundays of each of the District Camps in the hour immediately preceding the morning service, under the direction of the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary; and be it further resolved that all those present at the camp meeting Sunday Schools shall be counted present for that Sunday at their local church Sunday School.

No. 43. Whereas in the past some pastors have not known nor heard of the death of some ministers of the district and of the General officials, be it resolved that the death of any district minister or any general official shall

be reported to each pastor by the District Superintendent, and that he work out his own plan of notifying each pastor.

No. 44. Whereas our young people of our camps should be guarded as to their social life, and whereas there is a greater need of sharing in the responsibilities of our camps, be it resolved that we have a supervisor for the girls, and one for the boys at each of our camps; and that the District Superintendent with the council shall appoint more men to help with the responsibilities of the camps.

No. 45. Since it was requested by our General Officer that we have a Young People's report at the District Conference, be it resolved that the zone leaders send a report of their meetings and activities to the Executive Secretary, and that he report same to the District Conference.

District Superintendent's Report

To the thirty-seventh annual conference of the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings in Jesus' wonderful name.

All thoughtful Christians are so conscious that even in these days there is much for which to be thankful. The tensions which have been so much a part of life since the opening of World War II and the problems thus created for all people, have filled so much of our horizons that, at times, it has been difficult to see the hills of promise. However, this age is characterized by these conditions it must never be forgotten that when Jesus was lifted to His cross He looked beyond Jerusalem and that present hour to our day and to our need. We must, if for nothing more, out of pure necessity extend the borders of our faith beyond the hindering tides and the threatening armies of the devil and go up and possess the land. I appeal to you, ladies and gentlemen, that somehow God must find a voice that will be heard above the roar of this world's confusion. Oh that somehow the mighty message of Calvary might echo back and forth across the smoking ruins of a perishing race till three worlds bow in awe to the victory.

Great souls are not necessarily born so; if they are thus born they are apt to die in obscurity. Rather, they become so because when they solve their problems in the flickering light of a fireside, they thus develop that stuff which enables a lad, when he becomes a man, to solve the problems of life. Ten thousand faces there are to look down upon the lonely soldier who pits himself against the odds of all the world. But faith was made especially for impossible things, and when a man dare use it, even alone, if he waits till God's time the world will be shaken. So these times not only are filled with many things of bad origin and wicked design, yet to the brave in faith and to those devoted to truth there will always be a triumph of victory.

God give us men, sun crowned who have strong hearts, true faith and ready hands.

OUR HERITAGE

I here call attention to what some or all of us have inherited through the labors and sacrifices of those who pioneered the way before us. History may bring new light to what has gone before; however years serve also to cover more deeply that record of heroic deeds which made up the fabric of the Church in the past. We owe a debt of eternal gratitude to the warriors of the Cross of other days. Some now living and others having passed on to their reward, gave what they had to the cause, and we have been the recipients. When we once fully realize how true this is, we no doubt will make a better attempt to repay this debt to them by better devoting ourselves to the task they began but left unfinished.

OUR FUTURE

No one can predict the future, but history has a way of revealing that tomorrow's achievements or failures are well determined by today's devotion to yesterday's dream. This age is characterized by its uncertainties. In fact where the human touch is too prominent it is an unequivocal guar-

antee of eventual disaster. But God is eternal, and where men or things, plans and hopes, prayer and labors have God at their center we have the guarantee of their being eternal. On this premise our beloved Zion is obligated to keep Christ at its center, and thus have the right to hope that we shall accomplish our mission. I would add that we need a sanctified caution lest our mission become stained by wanting all the world for the church, rather than a portion for Christ. This could happen, and if it should we become victims of our ambitions rather than heroes of a cause.

OUR LOSS

We deeply regret the loss of Brother Alvin Young from our ranks in the year now past. Some of us will long remember his stainless life, his sterling character, and his singing talent. His works do follow him. I live in the hope that some day I shall yet hear again that wonderful voice lifted in song, not as we knew it here, but with that increase of beauty that lifts heaven above this our native sphere. Brother Young was a great and good man. Heaven is now fast being occupied by those immortal spirits who in time blessed the world and in eternity will bless us forever.

PROPERTIES

It is gratifying to witness from time to time that our church properties are being improved or replaced with more adequate buildings. Among those thus engaged are the following:

Albany, Church; Bloomingdale, Church; Brookdale, Parsonage; Brushton, Church; East Windsor, Church; East Worcester, Church; Fultonville, Parsonage; Grand Gorge, Church; Gloversville, Church; Green Grove, Church; New York, Church; Rockwood, Church; Russell, Church; Sayre, Parsonage.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Our total giving to Foreign Missions this year reached an all time high of \$37,233.49.

Our numerical gain this year was about 40. In the past four years, according to the figures released at General Conference, the General Church in organized districts gained 108. In this same period we had a gain of 83. Personagewise this means that we gained 277 per cent above the average. We in the New York District gained in one year 13 1/3 times as many as the average gain in the whole church in four years. The largest percentage gain in the general church was made in the department of Foreign Missions. Since we gave more per capita to this department, I think we can say we will, if given for Jesus' sake, share in the rewards. It might be possible then to say that we have accomplished something for God and the Church. However, we have not reached anything like a maximum in this business of reaching men.

OUR HOME MISSIONARY EFFORT

I desire to call attention to our newest Home Missionary work at Rochester, N. Y. I predict that if we will give Bro. Jump proper support in prayer and finance, that in time we will have a strong church in that city. However, this will not happen in one year, or two. It will take time, money,

patience and sacrifice, and I trust all of us will be willing to do what we can to support this worthy cause.

YOUR DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

In submitting my personal report I may be best understood by stating that in the discharge of duties commensurate with this office, I have tried desperately to be just to all. The work of a District Superintendent, in my humble judgment, is a matter of importance second only to one's being a Christian. In respect to my own soul I find at times certain situations to be most difficult in that I owe a debt to my past, and before God I must discharge the duties of this office in such a manner as will enable us to have some measure of progress. In this endeavor I know no friend nor foe, but I oppose compromise on the one hand, and encourage progress on the other. I personally question my success. I trust no one questions my sincerity. This procedure is not simply a policy. It is part of my religion, and this being so, I can, in no way change my position on standards or principles which I believe to be Christian. On the other hand, I am a constant seeker after the enlightening of my heart, the purifying of my desires and motives. I am trying to say that I trust, no matter where I might have failed as an administrator, that I have not failed as a Christian. However, a leader must be both a Christian and a man who can be followed and respected. It is your obligation to God and the Church to consider these things in your selection of a District Superintendent.

Statistically my report is approximately as follows:

I have traveled 8,000 miles, officiated at three camps, attended the Board of Directors meeting at Eastern Pilgrim College and one zone Ministerial at Eastern Pilgrim College. I attended the General Conference at Winona Lake. I have done some writing. I have conducted twenty annual business meetings and discharged such other duties, pleasant and otherwise, connected with this office.

Spiritually, I hope I have a right to report a new depth, in faith a new height, and in vision new horizons.
