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In Memoriam

REV. GEORGE E. LAMB

George E. Lamb was born August 9, 1906 at Meco, N. Y., the son of James and Nellie Pedrick Lamb. On August 18, 1926 he married Miss Cora E. Walter, and in the course of years there were added to that home three sons: George W., Everett Paul, James M., and one daughter, Marian.

There was another more beautiful sense, and equally true, in which it might be said that George E. Lamb was born on June 19, 1924. At the Victory Grove camp meeting of 1927 he completed his preparations, in entire sanctification, to become what the New Testament speaks of as "the bride of Christ." And through the life and labors of this transformed soul (and the equally faithful efforts of his wife) there have been added to the kingdom of grace, across 35 years of consecrated years, a multitude of sons and daughters.

New York District has been the scene of all Bro. Lamb's pastoral endeavors: Wells, 1934-35; Bloomingdale, 1935-38; Madrid, 1938-39; Rockwood, 1944-55; East Worcester, 1957—Feb. 1959. The serving of these appointments did not provide a living wage for a family of six. Uncomplainingly, though, these charges were accepted and secular work found, that the call of God and the home obligations might be simultaneously served. With Paul, he could have said (though he probably didn't, since he was little given to focussing attention upon his own efforts) "I have coveted no man's silver, or gold, or apparel. Yea, ye yourselves know, that these hands have ministered unto my necessities, and to them that were with me."

It was characteristic of Bro. Lamb that, when it became clear that he could not recover, he should have made the principal arrangements for his own funeral. This service was held on Feb. 18, 1959 in the newly enlarged Gloversville Church. The sermon was preached by his friend of many years, Rev. Milton E. Pierpoint. The songs which Rev. Joseph Hunting sang were those chosen, "I Was The Sheep That Was Lost," and "Some Golden Daybreak." Rev. O. L. Fay read the scripture, and Rev. O. W. Lawrence (one of the then—laymen who sponsored the Meco revival in which Bro. Lamb was saved) traced the story of his conversion and of his subsequent life. The pastors of the district, in a body, served as honorary pall bearers. Acting bearers were three board members from East Worcester, and three salesmen with whom he had worked in the course of secular employment. Interment was made in the Ferndale Cemetery in Gloversville.

Surviving, besides the four children earlier mentioned, are the widow, three grandchildren, two brothers, and several nieces and nephews.

This is not death—It is life! It is stepping on shore, and finding it Heaven.

Journal of Proceedings

Opening Sitting — July 6, 1959, 2:00 P.M. "Lord, we are able, Our spirits are Thine, Remold them, make us like Thee, divine: Thy guiding radiance above us shall be A beacon to God, To love and loyalty."

Thus the strains from "Are Ye Able, Said the Master," led so capably by Rev. Joseph Hunting and accompanied at the console by Jean Hoffman, opened the Thirty-eighth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the New York District held at the Victory Grove Camp Ground, July 6, 1959 at 2:00 p.m., at the call of the District Superintendent, Rev. O. L. Fay.

Our Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. M. E. Pierpoint, led in prayer.

Rev. O. L. Fay spoke of the manifested presence of the Spirit in our recent camp, the goodly number of seekers and the wonderful Home and Foreign Missionary services. He desired that God would find a way to fill the hearts of all with the same kind of spirit which prevailed for the past ten days.

Our General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin H. Snyder, was introduced to the Conference. His introductory remark, "We are here today primarily because we love Jesus Christ. We are not the only church but God has given us a place to fill." He brought greetings from our missionaries— the Blanns and the Hobarts, and gave a brief resume of his 27,000 mile itinerary travels in behalf of the foreign missionary field, pin-pointing with several illustrations of services high lighted in Africa. "True revivals are characterized by heart confessions." "The doctrine of divine response is still essential." "Fire fell in the Old Testament as a witness, but the Spirit witnessed in the New Testament." His devotional theme, directed primarily to the preachers, was taken from Revelation 3:7-13. The greatest promise to any of the seven churches was to the Laodicean Church— "He that overcometh, will I grant to sit with me in my throne." There were similarities in the messages to the seven churches in three ways:

- a. "Unto the angel of the church write."
- b. "I know thy works."
- c. The same exhortation "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit sayeth."

What is the most important thing in any Conference? We want to hear the voice of God. May that be our paramount prayer. We should examine the depth and motive of our work. God has ordained pastors and we should deliver the divine message without tampering. We have a grave responsibility.

After this anointed, inspired and forceful delivery, the assembly went to prayer.

Business became the order of the day and a motion was made to amend Miscellaneous Resolution No. 15 to read that the rule of sitting include the three center sections. Carried.

The roll was called by the District Secretary.

Brother Snyder introduced the following to the Conference:

Rev. E. E. Phillippe, thirty year veteran missionary; Rev. Thomas Weir,

Representative of General Church Extension; Rev. Arnold Brown, Roxbury, Mass.; William Clive, Utica, N. Y.; Rev. Melvin Dieter, Acting President of E. P. C.; Rev. Paul Pierpoint, former pastor at Crisfield, Md.; Rev. Beatrice Dodge and Rev. and Mrs. C. F. Berg, our missionaries to South America; Rev. W. F. Brown, Foreign Missionary Representative; Rev. H. E. Grimes, pastor at Albany; Rev. Roy Dorsett, pastor at Grand Gorge; and Daniel Shumway, pastor at East Worcester.

The District Superintendent's excellent, unique and picturesque report with its four points: the backward look, and our debt to the past, the inward look—honesty, the forward look—vision and the upward look—faith, was received with hearty "Amens."

The Assistant District Superintendent's oral report was received by motion.

The Auditor's report was given by Sister Blanche Avery and received by motion.

The District Treasurer's report, Church Extension report and the Ministerial Pension Fund report was read by Rev. J. N. Jump and received by motion.

Sister Marjorie Stuart read the Foreign Missionary report and it was received by motion.

The Victory Grove Camp Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Garry Boel and received by motion.

The motion was made and seconded that those who were previously introduced to the Conference and were not already members be granted honorary seats within the Conference bar. Motion carried.

We adjourned by expiration of time.

Second Sitting -- July 6, 1959, 7:00 p.m.

The second session of the 1959 Conference convened at 7:00 p.m. with devotional preliminarics. Following the singing of "The Old Rugged Cross," led by Bro. Hunting, prayer was offered by Rev. Bernard Barton. We then sang, "Amazing Grace" and Sister MacFadgen was called upon to testify. The glory was attended with other testimonies and jubilant singing of "Satisfied."

Rev. Melvin Dieter, Acting President of E. P. C., was introduced by the chairman. His report on Bro. Gunsalus' improved condition proceeded a heart to heart talk in which he briefly sketched the school's beginnings at Beulah Park to its present attainment. It was interesting to know the school has 850 Alumni actively engaged in the "vineyard". Bro. Dieter further stated that "we stand at one of the great crises of our educational program; we need a good holiness school in the East." He expressed his desire for our continued support and injected the proposed plans for the liquidation of the expense of the Wilson-Young Dormitory.

Brother Snyder spoke of the importance and necessity of teaching, then called for the minutes of the first sitting. The motion was made, seconded and carried that they be received with corrections.

Rev. Roger Bassett of the Michigan District, a returned missionary from Northern Rhodesia was introduced to the Conference. He gave a word of testimony and brought greetings from the John Blanns. Motion made and seconded that Bro. Bassett be granted an honorary seat in the Conference bar. Carried.

Rev. Leonard Lum gave the Binghamton Camp Treasurer's report. It was received by motion of the Conference.

The Vermontville Camp Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Wm. Fred McCulley and received with "Amens."

The District Young People Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Leonard Lum and motion made to accept the report. Carried.

The chairman expressed his appreciation for the modesty of these treasurers' reports but requested that each sign his report and it appear that way in the minutes.

The District Statistician, Rev. Arthur Shafer, gave his report and the motion prevailed that it be received with appreciation. Hearty "Amens" carried the motion.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Fred McCulley, reported and enthusiastically suggested some helpful ways to advance our Sunday Schools.

The following recommendation was presented: "In as much as all pastors and churches of the New York Conference have evidently done what they could toward raising the United Stewardship Fund, it is therefore recommended by the District Council that they be granted a seat in the Conference. This was received by motion and carried.

The motion was made to proceed with the election of officers. Carried. Action was immediately rescinded.

Letters from our missionaries were read by the District Secretary: Rev. and Mrs. Maurice Hobart; Rev. and Mrs. John Blann; Rev. and Mrs. Paul Phillippe and Grace M. Robinson. We received the reports by standing and acclaiming, "Praise the Lord."

It was a joy to have within our midst Rev. Beatrice Dodge and Rev. and Mrs. Clifton Borg who conveyed their reports personally in a splendid and refreshing manner.

Brother Snyder strongly urged the pastors to become more familiar with the Church Manual.

Motion was made to adjourn but the time was extended for prayer requests. Before our Father's throne in behalf of Sister Georgianna Whitney and Brother Kendall Straight, the voice of Rev. Clifton Berg was heard as the evening sitting came to a close.

Third Sitting — July 7, 1959, 9:00 a.m.

The third sitting assembled promptly at 9:00 a.m. with the opening song, "I Love To Tell The Story." Rev. Billie Bidwell prayed. An opportunity was given to all to participate in the devotions with Scripture quotations. Some were intermingled with experiences. Bro. Hardy took this convenient time to thank the representative body for their benevolent expressions during his family's past bereavement.

Minutes of the previous sitting were read and accepted with corrections.

The Examining Board and the Council recommended to the Conference the following:

Harry E. Grimes as an ordained minister.

Roy Dorsett and Paul Pierpoint as Licensed Ministers.

Daniel Shumway and William Clive for District License.

Roy Dorsett, Paul Pierpoint, Earle Wilson and J. Kingsley Yauger for ordination.

The motion prevailed that these recommendations be ratified.

The motion was made, seconded and carried that we proceed with the election of officers. The bar was properly cleared and the following tellers appointed: Joseph Hunting, Fred McCulley, Roy Dorsett, Harry Grimes, Donald Myers and V. G. Gattone.

Rev. Francis Richmond was asked by the Secretary to assist him in tallying the votes.

We proceeded to elect the Assistant District Superintendent: Rev. M. E. Pierpoint was re-elected on the first ballot.

Nominations were read by the secretary for the office of District Secretary. — Rev. Lloyd Stuart and Rev. A. J. Whitney. Brother Whitney retained his office.

Nominations were read for the office of District Treasurer — Rev. O. W. Lawrence and Rev. J. N. Jump. Brother Jump was officially reinstated.

Ballots were cast for the three Advisory Members of the Council. The tellers withdrew to count the votes and we proceeded balloting for the three year term member of the Examining Board. Nominations were read by the Secretary: Rev. W. K. George and Rev. Joseph Hunting. Brother Hunting was elected.

Nominations were read for the unexpired term of Bro. Lamb on the Board of Trustees — Rev. A. M. Eads and Rev. R. C. Dettmer. Brother Dettmer was elected.

Nominations were read to supply the three year term of the Board of Trustees — Rev. J. N. Jump and Rev. O. W. Lawrence. Brother Lawrence was elected.

Motion was made that we vote by acclamation for the office of Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions.

Nominations were made for Marjorie Stuart and Jean Hoffman. The latter declined. Vote was then taken for those in favor of the nominee. Sister Stuart was unanimously installed again.

Invitations for Ministerial Convention were extended from the pastors of Gloversville, Grand Gorge, Oneonta and Binghamton. The motion to vote on these invitations by secret ballot was made and passed. The motion that the majority vote rule was lost. It was moved, seconded and carried that we accept the invitation by plurality vote. 72 votes were cast and Binghamton was selected.

The tellers were ready to report on the result of voting for the Advisory Board. Rev. H. L. Twining, Rev. O. W. Lawrence and Rev. Lloyd Stuart were reelected.

Our District Superintendent spoke relative to the conditions of the tabernacle at Victory Grove and stated the necessity of either repair or replacement. Time was allotted to Rev. Lloyd Stuart for more detailed account of the plans of the appointed committee, consisting of Rev. Lloyd Stuart, Rev. Roy Dorsett and Rev. Harry Grimes. Bro. Stuart read names of 19 churches which would be included in this zone and urged full cooperation in raising finances for this endeavor.

Much discussion ensued.

Miscellaneous Resolution number 27 regarding pastors securing Advocate Subscriptions was rescinded.

The motion was made and seconded that the roll be called and each pastor state how many subscriptions he would try to secure during the year. Motion carried.

The motion to rescind the former action was carried by a standing vote. We adjourned by expiration of time.

Fourth Sitting - July 7, 1959, 2:00 p.m.

As the congregation entered and the ordination committee was taking their place on the platform, Bro. Hunting led in singing "A Charge To Keep I Have." Four candidates, Roy Dorsett, Earle Wilson, Paul Pierpoint and J. Kingsley Yauger were seated before the altar waiting their time of ordination. The ritual and form, section 203, of our manual was inaugurated.

Rev. Harry L. Twining prayed.

The song, "Rock of Ages" was sung by the assemblage.

Rev. M. E. Pierpoint read I Timothy 3.

Rev. O. W. Lawrence read 2 Timothy 4:1-8.

Rev. A. J. Whitney read Titus 3:1-11.

Brother Snyder's sermon was from II Chronicles 16:7. The theme: "The Preacher That God Wants."

Scripture affirms God is looking for men to operate His business. Because the qualifications for a successful ministry is a perfect heart, this is positive proof that man can have a perfect heart. There are three basic things for success in one's ministry."

- a. God is looking for men who will become quiet enough to hear His voice. True, we have a completed revelation, but there are certain times we need that peculiar illumination.
- b. God wants a man courageous enough to deliver His message. You must have a message from God for the people. You must know your people; God will open your eyes so you will know them.
 - c. You must be honest enough to live it.

Following the sermon and the answering of the necessary questions, the candidates knelt and hands were laid severally on their heads as Rev. O. W. Lawrence prayed for Bro. Dorsett, Rev. O. L. Fay prayed for Bro. Wilson, Rev. M. E. Pierpoint prayed for his own son, Paul, and Rev. H. L. Twining prayed for Bro. Yauger.

Ordination certificates were presented by our General Superintendent. The conference delegation and friends shook hands with the four brethren. One word could be used to describe this entire ceremony—"Sacred."

The motion that the council be authorized to hear and approve the minutes of the third and final sittings was carried.

The Resolution Committee reported with the following resolutions:

Resolution No. 1 — In regards to Conference committees convening on Monday after camp at 1:00 p.m. and Conference starting Tuesday at 9:00 a.m. Carried.

Resolution No. 2 — Deleting Resolution No. 2, page 19 under the subject of Education. Carried.

Resolution No. 3 — Requested that camp boards be appointed by the District Superintendent for the purpose of operating our three zone camps. A motion to refer this to the committee for redrafting was lost and a substitute motion, stating that the District Council be authorized to appoint a committee of three for each camp whose duties will be to function in keeping with duties outlined for them by the District Council. This motion to substitute was approved. Motion was made to amend the substitute by adding the following: "The three camp boards shall meet together with the District Council to formulate basic social and disciplinary regulations for the three zone camps. These rules to be published in the District Minutes. The camp boards shall be responsible for the enforcement of these regulations in their respective zones. The motion to amend was carried. The substitute motion with its amendment was approved.

Resolution No. 4 — In reference to deleting standing resolution No. 42, page 22, regarding a Sunday School hour at our camps was carried.

The Ways and Means Committee reported through its secretary the following:

Resolution No. 1 — That each church be assessed the equivalent of 5% of the pastor's salary to be sent to District Expense Fund. This was amended to read 1%. The amendment carried. The main motion with the amendment was adopted.

A motion to extend the time until we complete all business was made, seconded and carried.

A memoir of Rev. George Lamb was read by the District Superintendent. This was received by motion.

Conference Committee Appointments were read by the District Super-intendent.

Motion was passed to authorized the District Council to take care of a matter regarding the licensing of a brother who had not as yet been interviewed.

The District Trustee's report was read by Rev. O. W. Lawrence and accepted by motion.

Bro. Melvin H. Snyder expressed his appreciation to the Conference for the privilege of presiding and for all kindnesses shown him over the past two years in which he has been presiding officer for our area.

Our District Superintendent responded and the assembly in appreciation gave a rising vote of thanks.

The Doxology was sung after which Bro. Snyder closed the Conference in prayer.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

FINANCE

- No. 1. Resolved that each church sending a delegate or delegates to the District Conference, pay the traveling expenses of said delegates and pastor.
- No. 2. Resolved, that when the District Council deems any licensed minister unable to meet the expense of taking the study course as directed in Education Resolution No. 2, they may pay all or part of the cost of such course. The Licensee in such case shall agree to finish a year of such course in the Conference year.
- No. 3. Resolved, that when money is sent direct to any fund, the church treasurer shall obtain a receipt for same and forward this to each District Representative.
- No. 4. Resolved, that all departments of our church shall, upon receipt of monies, immediately forward receipts for same to sender.
- No. 5. Resolved, that the District Treasurer shall maintain two funds, to be known as the District Expense Fund and The Church Extension Fund.

The ministers and workers of the District shall pay all their tithe into the church where they hold membership.

Each month the local church shall forward to the District Treasurer, the pastor's tithe and 50 per cent of other ministerial member's tithe. These amounts shall be specified for the District Expense Fund.

The District Church Extension Fund shall be provided for by an assessment of \$1.50 per member. This money shall be forwarded by the local treasurer to the District Treasurer, specified for the Church Extension Fund.

Resolved, that we insert in our minutes the Memorial on the United Stewardship Fund, adopted by the General Conference of 1958 as follows:

There shall be a United Stewardship Fund of \$8.00 per member annually: Foreign Missions 20 per cent; Church Extension 14 per cent; Administration 36 per cent; Sunday School and youth 2.6 per cent; Senior College 21.4 per cent; Church Extension Loan Fund 3 per cent; contingent 3 per cent. This United Stewardship Fund to be raised monthly.

It shall be the responsibility of the pastor and the church board to see that their church raises its portion of the "United Stewardship Fund." This offering shall be raised monthly. The Treasurer of Foreign Missions shall be instructed to forward to the District Treasurer an amount equal to \$1.60 per member commensurate with the Memorial on the "United Stewardship Fund."

- No. 6. Resolved, that in order to receive due credit in the current year, any church must have all money in the mail on or before June 5. The District Treasurer shall keep his books open until June 10, so that proper credit may be given for monies mailed on or before June 5. All monies mailed after June 5, shall be entered in the following year.
- No. 7. Resolved, that we as a district, continue the system of contributing to the Eastern Pilgrim College the equivalent of 25 cents a month per member; said funds to be paid through the District Treasurer, and that we

request the co-operation of the School in sending each year a representative to each church to assist in raising our financial quota.

No. 8. Resolved, that the District Superintendent's support shall be as follows:

Salary, \$350.00 per month; Travel expenses, Six cents per mile by automobile, and actual expense by train or bus; in addition, the District shall provide a parsonage furnished with telephone, electricity, gas, heat and water.

- No. 9. Resolved, that the District Superintendent push the Pilgrim Pension Plan and encourage every pastor to join. In cases where it is determined by the District Council that payment of such dues would cause undue hardship for the pastor and church, said dues shall be paid by the District out of the District Expense Fund.
- No. 10. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be granted an annual vacation of two weeks each year with pay.
- No. 11. In order to create a sustained interest in and support for District Home Missions and Church Extension, we recommend and urge each church to set apart one prayer meeting night each month at which time earnest prayer shall be made for District Home Missions and an offering to be taken for the same and forwarded to our District Treasurer. This is to be in addition to our regular yearly assessment of \$1.50 per member.
- No. 12. Resolved, that those driving to work on our Camp Grounds or otherwise using their cars in the interests of the District shall receive six cents per mile for the use of their car.
- No. 13. Be it resolved that when deemed advisable by both Pastor and the District Superintendent that an offering be received by the District Superintendent at the time of his regular visit for the purpose of assisting the local church in meeting its budget or for the purpose of District Church Extension.
- No. 14. Be it resolved that adequate liability insurance be secured for the protection of the public and personnel involved in all activities on our camp grounds.
- No. 15. Be it resolved that each church be required to send an offering each year to help defray the expense of Conference.
- No. 16. Inasmuch as we are encouraged and admonished to move forward in the New York District; Be it resolved that each Zone Camp set apart one service of their respective camp for a special Home Missionary Rally at which time an offering be taken for the support of present and future Home Missionary projects.
- No. 17. Be it resolved that immediate action be taken by the District Council to provide for the construction of a two car garage for the District parsonage, this construction to begin as soon as the churches of the $N \in W$ York District provide adequate funds for the completion of said construction.
- No. 18. Be it resolved that the following persons receive annually that amount stipulated for services rendered: The District Treasurer \$200.00; District Foreign Missionary Secretary and Treasurer, \$150.00; Pilgrim News Editor, \$150.00; District Secretary, \$50.00; District Statistician \$25.00.
- No. 19. Be is resolved that the District Treasurer reimburse the Treasurer of the Victory Grove Camp for actual conference expense incurred.

This amount to be determined by the Camp Treasurer and the District Treasurer.

No. 20. Resolved, that each church of the New York District be assessed the equivalent of 1% of the pastor's salary to be added to the District Expense Fund.

EDUCATION

No. 1. Resolved that all of our local churches shall open their doors annually to the representatives of the Eastern Pilgrim College, and be it further resolved that at such times an offering shall be taken for the maintenance of the School, liquidation of debt, and new facilities. In arranging for such visits the administration shall co-operate with both district and local officers.

MISCELLANEOUS

- No. 1. Resolved, that no properties such as churches, parsonages, or other buildings or land shall be sold of any of our incorporate churches without first conferring with the trustees of the district corporation.
- No. 2. Resolved, that section 16 of article 2 of the religious corporation law be enforced in our district in regard to churches who have discontinued holding services and where there are less than 7 resident attending members.

That such temporalities and property be managed by the District Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Inc., our ecclesiastical governing body, or may, in pursuance of the provisions of law relating to the disposition of real property by religious corporations, sell or dispose of the same, and apply the proceeds thereof to any of the purposes to which the property of such governing religious body is devoted, and shall not divert such property to any other object.

In no case shall property be sold or disposed of; and money used for the support of the preacher who may claim this as an out appointment.

Due notice shall be given by the District Secretary, regarding the action of the District Assembly in declaring a church extinct, within thirty days to the remaining members, if any.

- No. 3. Resolved, that inasmuch as the resolutions contain matters of vital importance to our lay members and inasmuch as not everyone reads the resolutions, we recommend that our pastors read the resolutions before the church as soon as possible after the distribution of the minutes.
- No. 4. Resolved, that we, the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, place ourselves on record as being unalterably opposed to, and deplore the present sale and use of intoxicating beverages throughout the nation, and furthermore we advise and strongly urge our people not to encourage the sale and use of said liquors by patronizing such places where these intoxicating liquors are sold.
- No. 5. Inasmuch as our Manual declares itself against the wearing of jewelry; be it resolved, that none of our preachers shall use the ring ceremony in marriages, or in any way encourage the use of it. Any minister who uses such ceremony shall be dealt with by the District Council.
 - No. 6. Resolved, that all reports regularly sent to the District Statistician

be in his hands by June 15 and that all books and records that are to be audited shall be sent to the chairman of the Auditing Committee by June 15.

- No. 7. Resolved, that each Pastor be required to attend his or her Zone Camp and to remain over at least one Sunday.
- No. 8. In view of tendencies detrimental to the spiritual effort of our camp meetings, we recommend that the following rule be adopted for all our camps. All persons resident on the grounds shall respect a curfew hour of ten-thirty oclock and lights shall be out by eleven p.m. with due exceptions to be made for any person engaged in legitimate camp meeting activities.
- No. 9. Resolved, that the telephone numbers of the ministers be published annually in the Minutes and that the address of the church also be published.
- No. 10. Resolved, that following the election of officers the District Superintendent shall appoint the committees which are to function under the District Council for the ensuing year.
- No. 11. Resolved, that a District Ministerial Convention be held each year on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the second week in April except when the second week in April is Holy Week, in which case the date of the Convention shall be set by the District Council. The place of the convention shall always be determined by the District Conference.
- No. 12. Resolved, that the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church is opposed to divorce and remarriage and that all persons who are divorced and remarried, except to be remarried to the one from whom they have been divorced, providing they have not taken another, be denied membership in said church.
- No. 13. Resolved, that each pastor be given freedom to hold at least two revivals each conference year.
- No. 14. Inasmuch as the heavy burden of cleaning up our Camp grounds often falls upon only a few individuals, be it resolved that the preachers in each Camp Zone shall be notified in advance of cleanup day by one of the officials of the camp, and that each one thus notified shall be expected to give assistance to the task if at all possible. This applies to Vermontville Camp in the North; Victory Grove in the Central Zone; and Binghamton Camp in the South
- No. 15. Resolved, that the three center sections of seats together with the first five seats of each side in the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.
- No. 16. Resolved, that the time of the business sessions of our District Conference be fixed as follows: From 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon, From 2:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M.; From 7:00 P.M. to 10:00 P.M.
- No. 17. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be given freedom to conduct two revivals outside the District each Conference year, and that he be permitted to keep all proceeds from the same.
- No. 18. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be required to meet with each local church board at least once each Conference year.
- No. 19. We recommend that each local church in as fas as possible, give their pastor two weeks vacation over one Sunday with pay.
- No. 20. Resolved, that in each of our churches a pastoral recall meeting shall be held each year not later than the third week in April.

No. 21. Resolved, that the monthly Sunday School report in THE PILGRIM NEWS follow the General Secretary's form, tabulating (1) The average attendance of last Conference year as reported in the Conference Minutes; (2) The average attendance to date this Conference year; (3) The average attendance this month; (4) The average attendance for the same month last year.

The monthly report shall be submitted to the Editor of THE PILGRIM NEWS by the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

- No. 22. Inasmuch as it is difficult to have all material ready when Conference convenes, Be It Resolved that all committees convene on the Camp Ground at 1:00 p.m. Monday following Victory Grove Camp and that the first session of Conference begin at 9:00 a.m. Tuesday morning, and Be It Further Resolved that resolutions be forwarded to the chairmen of the committees not later than July 1st.
- No. 23. Inasmuch as there is a marked disregard for the Lord's Day, and the Scripture admonishes us to keep it holy by doing no worldly business in it, Be It Resolved that a contribution box be left for a free will offering at the exit of the dining halls of our camps and let said free-will offering box be properly marked and left unattended.
- No. 24. Resolved, that the Labor Day Youth Rally at Victory Grove be a district youth rally at which time the district youth leaders will be elected, for the coming year.
- No. 25. Resolved, that each dormitory on our Camp grounds shall have at least one resident responsible person in charge to maintain order during Camp and Conference.
- No. 26. Be It Resolved that the District Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions be made an honorary member of the Conference with voice and vote in the same.
- No. 27. Be It Resolved that the Editing Committee have the power to delete from the Minutes all obsolete resolutions subject to the approval of the District Council.
- No. 28. Resolved that the treasurers of the respective camp meetings shall, within a month of the closing date of each camp, forward to the pastor (or treasurer, if known) of the churches concerning either the pledge cards themselves, or a list showing: name of pledger, amount pledged, and project for which pledged.
- No. 29. Resolved, that each zone conduct a Sunday School Convention within the Conference year, and be it further resolved that the District Sunday School Board be responsible for arranging such conventions.
- No. 30. Resolved, that no delegate shall be seated by the Conference to represent any church if that church has failed to duly elect a delegate.
- No. 31. Resolved, that a speed limit of eight miles per hour be enforced on all our camp grounds, and that signs to this effect be placed at all entrances, and be it further resolved that bicycle riding on the camp grounds be prohibited during camp.
- No. 32. Resolved, that the starting date of the Binghamton Camp shall be the first Thursday of August.
 - No. 33. Resolved, that each zone sponsor a youth camp to be held on

the zone camp grounds, at a time convenient to the respective zone, to be under jurisdiction of the zone youth leader and committee, in conjunction with the District Youth Executive and the District Superintendent.

- No. 34. Resolved, that each church shall upon the election of its delegate to the District Conference, forward a written notice of the same to the District Secretary.
- No. 35. The Resolution Committee recommends that in the appointing of officers for the four zones into which our District is divided relative to our Young People's Societies, that the chairman of each zone be selected from our pastors and the other officers of each organization be from the lay members.

District Superintendent's Report

To the thirty-eighth annual conference of the New York District of th Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings in Jesus' precious name.

In submitting this my eleventh annual report to the District Conference I call attention by way of introduction to four things, namely: The back ward look and our debt to the past; The inward look and honesty; The forwar look and missions; The upward look and faith.

While it is at times condemned as wron First, the backward look. philosophy, sober consideration and reflection could be helpful, or eve These days are quite filled with challenge, and without th Holy Ghost we find ourselves equally void of direction. If we ignore ou past because of our self-sufficient pride, or maliciously cast it aside becaus of a lost faith, we will be adrift with the rest of the world to be finall washed to some desolate shore. To illustrate my point, allow me to sa that if this great nation of ours is ever defeated in war or peace, the blow will not be dealt by men whose ancestors lined up at Lexington Green t face the most powerful nation in the world, or dug the trenches at Bunke Hill, or whose bloodstained footprints made crimson the snows of Valle Forge, or who forgot personal welfare by placing their names on the "Decla ration of Independence." This nation of ours which has been the hop of the world for so long can become the victim of a malicious intent born i the hearts of those who know nothing of its past, or knowing don't care and whose only interest in it is that it can be made to serve the selfishnes of total depravity.

So is it in this our beloved Zion. We have an inheritance. God forgive anything that would heedlessly waste this fortune of ours in riotous religious living. If we ignore our past or change our purpose, or inject human processes where only God has the right to live, we may enlarge our future but we shall damn our destiny.

"The Inward Look and Honesty"

I well know the dangers in a man exhausting his time beholding him self, but that time spent in one trying to discover what he is within is we spent if afterward he is courageous enough to admit what he finds.

The threads woven into the pattern of destiny for this church of our are no more secure to our fortune than the purity of the design. The on indispensible necessity in the maintenance and development of the worldl aspect is that the hearts of the people, both leaders and followers, reflect that holiness which meets Divine approval. I don't believe any greater thin could happen to the Pilgrim Holiness Church than for us to have an awakening, be it ever so rude, to just what the motive is that determines our presenway of life. Time spent at such an altar might be painful, but it would be less disastrous than trying to build a spiritual skyscraper on the rubbis of our hearts. No person lives so long or becomes so holy, or succeeds a fully that he can afford to remove the flaming sword that guards the citidel of the heart.

"The Forward Look and Vision"

In consideration of this point I am reminded of those of a far off day who called attention to ripening grain and bountiful harvest. The Master replied to the conversation by saying that if they would but look just beyond the waving grain they would see what was even then ready for harvest. Failure to reap now meant a wasted harvest, and so here was an hour of crisis and from that day to this, and from this day to the end of time our labors are those dedicated in crisis. Every day of lost time leaves over onehundred and fifty thousand stacks of grain to fall and rise no more for all They did see this, and this seeing changed the whole course of their lives. In the new light of pentecostal cleansing, fishboats faded and they turned their love, their energies, and their passions toward the fields of the world. And men became the ripened grain of harvest and conquest. The eyes of the people of the Pilgrim Holiness Church need a new anointing to exchange mirages and halucinations of time for the realities of eternity. Either we have failed to sense true values, or we have sunk to the lukewarm level of unconcern. We could disgrace ourselves with large professions and little deeds.

When Christ sent men into all the world, He did not send them on a pleasure trip. In that far off day the great stratocruiser did not put its impudent nose into the sky to carry the gospel to far horizons. Streamlined trains did not follow a web of steel rails which today bring the world to our door.

Brethren, we will either keep in step with the Divine economy, or be victimized by the age. The choice is ours. The world, the devil, the American way of life, concern for security, worldly religious philosophies, conflict of concepts, war or the daily fear of it, loss of confidence in men which effects our faith in God,—all of this and more will throw a veil across our vision.

The course of history seems to prove that the cross has always been brought to men by brave souls with marching, though weary, feet. Apostacy finds its beginning when the instruments of progress absorb the glory belonging solely to the results. We will never find a better way to win men to God than by the Divine urge of Pentecost. Mahogany desks, leather upholstered chairs and florescent lighting are a hypocritical substitute for knees that bend and feet that march. The curse of any church is when leather meant for shoes for marching feet goes into making chairs for those at ease in Zion.

"The Upward Look and Faith"

I here speak not of this subject in the sense of present victory only as truth waits with erect confidence that yet a new day will dawn without the conflicting shadows of evening—a day in which God will gather all the past of centuries gone to light—a day when truth stripped of human shrowds brings men, and things, and spirits, and motives to judgment.

I spoke in this article of crisis, and to be sure, our day for work will soon be over. But it hardly seems possible to grip the opportunities of today without consideration of tomorrow. Something in Abraham must have looked beyond as he submerged even the fulfillment of promise under an

unbending obedience. Here was a faith that submitted to the loss of what faith had brought in the confidence that such yielding would bring a greater victory. And it did. There is a faith that waits on God till God's time, and in its waiting if there be impatience it comes only from the postponement—not from a loss of confidence in the final outcome.

If in any sense we are laboring for present reward we may be disappointed. But if we are fully persuaded in the just and lasting consummation of righteousness, we will in this faith be able to remain dedicated to the eternal principles involved in building His kingdom. God grant that we will so do.

OUR LOSS

On February 15 of this year Brother George E. Lamb departed this life. It is encouraging to note that Brother Lamb's testimony held firm in those weeks of sickness which brought him to his journey's end on the above date. Since a Memorial will appear elsewhere in the Minutes, I will not say more, except that it is interesting to note that Victory Grove Camp played an important part in Brother Lamb's spiritual life. God bless him for his contribution to the work of the Lord.

IN APPRECIATION

I think it fitting for me to give a word of appreciation to Brother and Sister Jump for the sacrifices for and contribution to the Home Missionary work at Rochester. Let's stand by them with our prayers and gifts.

To those of you who have assisted in building the church at Rochester I also desire to express my appreciation. There is yet much to be done which warrants your continual cooperation.

Many thanks to the preachers and laymen who assisted so nobly in the building of the tabernacle at Vermontville. I trust that when the time comes for us to build at Victory Grove and Binghamton we will receive the same kind of cooperative assistance.

I also want to include in this report an appreciation for the preachers who did as they should in coming to the various camps for work week and clean-up day. This testimony of your interest in the work of God is more convincing than a good sermon well preached. Those who failed in this respect should search their hearts. I would repeat here what I have said many times, Don't any preacher find fault with the people who absent themselves from prayer meetings and revival meetings if you have absented yourself from the work week of the camp or the camp meeting services. It such a preacher who has done this has people who do this, just take your medicine like a man and keep smiling just like you expect the D. S. to do So much for my word of appreciation.

PERSONAL REPORT

I herewith make a bold request by asking that you accept my word that I have tried to discharge my duties as God led and strength allowed I have no ability for keeping statistics, and I have less taste for them, which of course is just another mark of poor administration. I have clobbered my way through another year, tried to be a blessing, and labored with hand and feet, they being ill assisted by a judgment in no sense equal to my ab-

bitions. I, of course, am to blame for the blunders I made, and you are to blame for placing me where all my blunders are on display. So, God forgive all of us. In so many ways this has been the greatest year of my life. I have traveled more miles, worked more hours, repeated sermons more times, made more mistakes than one is ordinarilly capable of in such a short period. The great difficulty of administrative work is that one's heart gets in the way of the head, and the head in the way of the heart. I would not have it otherwise, for this conflict gives some balance. Without this one could easily be a sissy, on the one hand, or a tyrant on the other—and both are without value or benefit, and extremely distasteful.

I solicit your prayers for the year ahead. The whole world is in a conflict, and the Church is sorely affected. At times even the compass seems to be thrown off of its magnetic pole. There is no way out unless we follow the One who was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, and who emerged from the wilderness in the power of the Spirit. To the best of my judgment or ability I remain dedicated to Christ, the Church and the New York Conference. I could call attention to several other matters in this report, such as finances, youth work, properties, etc. For this time let me simply request that we make the coming year the best in our hearts and in every department of the church.
