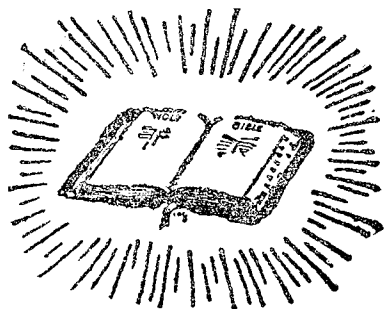

# NEW YORK DISTRICT CAMP REGULATIONS

(Victory Grove, Binghamton, Vermontville)

1. Each person residing on the camp ground one night or more will be required to register.
2. All young people shall be required to attend the youth and EVENING SERVICES, and one other preaching service of the day.
3. If it is necessary to leave the grounds at any time, young people must obtain permission from the Camp Supervisor.  
Walking from the camp grounds at night is prohibited.  
Those who must leave grounds by car, may do so in groups of three or more. Each member of these groups must report to the Camp Supervisor upon their return.
4. All persons shall observe a curfew of ten-thirty o'clock and lights shall be out by eleven p. m. with due exceptions to be made for any person engaged in legitimate camp meeting activities.  
(All campers shall be on grounds at ten-thirty o'clock and all non-campers be off grounds at the same hour.)
5. All young people are required to stay in their own rooms or cottage unless a change of rooms should be granted by the Camp Supervisor.
6. Camp equipment shall not be removed from dormitory room or camp cottages unless approved by Camp Supervisor.
7. All recreational activities shall be prohibited on our camp grounds.
8. All radios and televisions are prohibited.
9. The wearing of shorts and slacks shall be prohibited.
10. Smocks shall be provided for our dining room and kitchen help. When coming to the dining room to work, the female help shall be required to wear hose and hair nets, and their hair shall be properly combed.

## JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

Opening Sitting — July 10, 1961, 9:00 a. m.

The Fortieth Annual Conference of the New York District met on the Victory Grove Camp Grounds July 10, 1961. The nine o'clock session was opened by singing the songs "Blessed Be The Name" and "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus," led by Rev. Joseph Hunting and accompanied at the organ by Rev. Beatrice Dodge.

Our District Superintendent imparted a triumphant description of the camp just closed. "God, the Holy Ghost, honored us this year with more seekers and larger crowds than ever before. May we enter this Conference with a feeling of faith so every pastor can go back to their charge to push the battle with no depressed spirit." Following these preliminary remarks, we were directed in prayer by Rev. Pearl Knowlton.

The General Superintendent of the Eastern Area, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, was introduced to the Conference. Preaching was dispensed with and a resume of what is involved as Conferences are meeting throughout the land was the focal point. "We meet to refresh our fellowship with each other, to take stock and set directions, and to talk about the richness of God's power and not the problems which face us." His further remarks hinged around such statements as "May we be a part of the power and not a part of the problem. We must not tear the ancient fabric of the church any more than is already torn. Programs are not the substitute for great power; neither are they the enemies. Unless the Pilgrim Holiness Church has a vision of a large world in its sinfulness, we will not move ahead. We must find God's plan. Our giving would be less and our accomplishments the least when we fail to plan. A Holy Ghost program can be a means of grace. Let us dedicate our ransomed powers."

Following this exposition, the Conference settled down to organizational matters. The roll was called of the ordained and licensed ministers, the ordained deaconesses and lay delegates. We took notice of the seating arrangement and the hour of sitting which by motion was retained as the previous year.

Rev. Roy Dorsett introduced the following to the Conference: Mrs. R. G. Flexon, Mrs. Iris Mann, missionary from British Guiana, Rev. Melvin Dieter, Rev. Edward LeCates from the Texas District, and Rev. Bobbie Bidwell of the Penna-New Jersey District, now the new pastor at Sayre. By motion these were granted an honorary seat in the Conference bar.

The Conference moved along to the second division of business which consisted of reports.

The District Superintendent's report was read and adopted by motion.

The Assistant District Superintendent's report was given orally and received.

The Auditor's report was read by Rev. J. N. Jump and adopted by the Conference. The Treasurer then proceeded to read the District Treasurer's report, Ministerial Pension Fund report and the Church Extension report. These were adopted separately by the Conference.

Mrs. Marcia Wilson, auditor, gave her report.

The Binghamton Camp Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Joseph Hunting and accepted.

The Vermontville Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Wm. Fred McCulley and received.

The Young People Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Garry Boel and accepted.

The Foreign Mission's Department report, compiled by Jean Hoffman, was read by the District Secretary.

The Statistical report was read by Rev. Arthur Shafer and accepted. Bro. Fay spoke particularly to the delegates that they should make a study of this report and see if their pastor is receiving less in salary while apparently money is being added to other departments.

New Business was the order of the day.

The Secretary of the Resolution Committee, Rev. Joseph Hunting, read three resolutions.

Number one — in regards to the Assistant Superintendent automatically filling the office of Superintendent in the event it is vacated, was carried. The second resolution granted representation of young people on the Youth Zone Committees. Carried. The third resolution relative to the place of the District Conference was referred.

Motion made and seconded that we adjourn at 11:45. Carried. The chairmen of various committees made announcements and Rev. M. E. Pierpoint dismissed us by prayer.

#### Second Sitting — July 10, 1961, 2:00 P.M.

The second sitting of the 1961 Conference convened at 2:00 p.m. with singing "Constantly Abiding" led by Rev. J. N. Jump and accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Lum.

This treasure I have in a temple of clay, while here on His footstool I roam; but He's coming . . ." thus a repetition of the words as Dr. Neff took his place behind the pulpit and made inspirational remarks as he told of meeting the author, Mrs. Will L. Murphy. "It is this constant Presence who puts a light in the grave and rays in our hopes."

Rev. O. W. Lawrence led the group in prayer.

The minutes of the previous sitting were read and accepted with corrections.

We advanced to conventional business. The chairman of the Examining Board and Board of Education, Rev. James Payne, read recommendations of the committee for Edward LeCates, licensed minister, and Rev. Bobbie Bidwell, ordained minister. The motion was made and carried that these two brethren be received into the Conference and be granted a seat within the bar.

Further reports were read. The Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Fred McCulley, spoke relative to the Convention Theme, "Larger Sunday Schools Through Better Sunday Schools." He cited about the increase and acknowledged that the highest percentage gain, 58%, was acquired by the Rochester Church and the Syracuse church had the highest numerical gain of 19. Bro. McCulley's report was accepted.

Bro. James Payne was requested to speak as to the "how" this goal was reached. He listed the ensuing reasons: Organized systematic calling campaign, Absentee Card System, and a Holy Ghost Program — all spelling one word — WORK.

The Secretary of the Resolution Committee reported the following resolutions:

Resolution No. 3 which was previously referred in the first sitting was tabled because of manual provision.

There was a motion made and seconded that we hear the resolution presented by the Syracuse Church. Carried. After the reading, the chairman ruled discussion of the resolution out of order because of previous agreement between the New York District and the General Board.

The Secretary of the Ways and Means Committee, Sister Dodge, reported.

Resolution No. 1, regarding resolution 17, page 18, relative to the construction of a two car garage for the District parsonage was deleted by motion.

Resolution No. 2 involved the deleting of Standing Resolution under Finance No. 7, page 17, relative to the continued system of contributing to Eastern Pilgrim College and substituting 25c per month per member for repairs on the District Parsonage.

After hearing several brethren speak, a motion was made to refer this resolution back to the Ways and Means Committee. Motion lost. A motion to go into a committee of the whole to discuss this matter was also lost. As the main motion was again presented, an amendment to the motion was made that we vote by secret ballot on the issue. The result of the count made void secret balloting. The chairman entertained the action to divide the main motion and vote separately on each issue. This was carried.

An incidental motion prevailed granting Bro. Dieter permission to once again speak for the school.

We adjourned by expiration of time.

### Third Sitting — July 10, 1961, 7:00 P.M.

The third and final sitting of the Fortieth Annual Conference promptly assembled at 7:00 p.m. The song "This Is My Story" was utilized as the means of expressing our worship in prayer and praise.

To resume again the order of business, the secretary was asked to read the substitute motion which the District Council had composed, continuing the subsidy to Eastern Pilgrim College for a year and directing the present members of the College Board from our district to meet the Executive Council of the College Board. The substitute motion was read and carried.

Business came to a cessation and time was given to hear the words of farewell from Dr. Flexon who had to leave to make transportation connections.

The Secretary of the Ways and Means Committee read the last half of the resolution embodying repairs of the District Parsonage. An amendment was phrased which would assess each member 10c per week. This amendment was lost. Whereas, the matter before the house related to capital instead of just repair, a substitute motion was made to refer the subject to the District Council suggesting that they assemble the needs and inform the local churches when necessary. Carried.

The following was presented to the Conference by the committee:

Resolution No. 4, in regards to appointing a committee to study the matter and findings concerning merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church. This was tabled.

The Committee on Memorials reported:

Resolution No. 1, as to the term of the District Superintendent was carried.

Resolution No. 2, refers to the Assistant Superintendent automatically filling the Superintendent's office if vacated and if that be impossible, then the District Council will appoint. Carried.

Resolution No. 3, relates to eliminating the budget to churches receiving a gross income of less than \$4000. Resolution lost.

The Trustee's report, read by Rev. O. W. Lawrence was received by motion of the Conference.

A motion to proceed with the election of officers was made and carried. The following tellers were appointed:

Rev. James Payne, Rev. Donald Hardy, Donald Myers, Rev. Francis Richmond, Rev. Benjamin Rickenbach, Rev. Joseph Hunting, Rev. William McCulley and Rev. Billie Bidwell.

It was unnecessary to vote for the office of District Superintendent since last year's balloting placed him in a two year term.

Ballots were distributed and the office of Assistant District Superintendent was voted upon. Rev. M. E. Pierpoint was elected on the first ballot.

The Secretary read nominations for the office of District Secretary: Rev. Joseph Hunting and Rev. Andrew J. Whitney. Rev. Whitney was officially re-instated.

The Secretary read nominations for District Treasurer's office: Rev. J. N. Jump and Rev. Bernard Barton. Rev. J. N. Jump was declared elected on the first ballot.

Ballots were prepared for the Advisory Members of the Board. Rev. Lloyd Stuart and Rev. H. L. Twining were elected on the first ballot. Motion was made to vote for the four highest to determine the third member for the Board. Carried. The result affirmed Rev. O. W. Lawrence elected.

Nominations were read by the District Secretary for candidates on the Examining Board: Rev. Benjamin Rickenbach and Rev. Donald Hardy. Rev. Rickenbach received the highest number of votes and was elected.

Nominations were read by the Secretary to fill the expired term of a member of the Sunday School Board: Donald Myers and Rev. Fred McCulley. Rev. Myers was elected.

The motion prevailed that we vote for delegates to General Conference by simple plurality vote. Carried.

Names of the Ordained Ministers were read by the District Secretary.

The following Ministerial delegates were elected:

Rev. Billie Bidwell, Rev. Donald Hardy, Rev. Benjamin Rickenbach, Rev. Joseph Hunting, Rev. Fred McCulley, Jr., Rev. Francis Richmond,

and Rev. Paul Pierpoint.

The alternates in order are:

Rev. Lloyd Stuart, Rev. O. W. Lawrence, Rev. James Payne, Rev. Wm. McCulley, Rev. Bobbie Bidwell, Rev. Lindley Adams, Rev. Ethel MacFadgen and Rev. Virginia Miller.

Nominations were read for the lay delegates and the following were duly elected: Albert H. Green, Delbert Hallenbeck, and Sever Fay.

Those chosen as alternates respectively are:

Paul Stuart, Clair Bubb and Herman Westurn.

The Conference elected Rev. Andrew J. Whitney as District Trustee.

The office of Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions was elected by acclamation. This allegated Mrs. E. Jean Hoffman to the position.

A motion to adjourn was made, seconded and carried and Rev. Lloyd Stuart dismissed the assembly by prayer.

## STANDING RESOLUTIONS

### FINANCE

No. 1. Resolved that each church sending a delegate or delegates to the District Conference, pay the traveling expenses of said delegates and pastor.

No. 2. Resolved, that when the District Council deems any licensed minister unable to meet the expense of taking the study course as directed in Education Resolution No. 2, they may pay all or part of the cost of such course. The Licensee in such case shall agree to finish a year of such course in the Conference year.

No. 3. Resolved, that when money is sent direct to any fund, the church treasurer shall obtain a receipt for same and forward this to each District Representative.

No. 4. Resolved, that all departments of our church shall, upon receipt of monies, immediately forward receipts for same to sender.

No. 5. Resolved, that the District Treasurer shall maintain two funds, to be known as the District Expense Fund and The Church Extension Fund.

The ministers and workers of the District shall pay all their tithe into the church where they hold membership.

Each month the local church shall forward to the District Treasurer, the pastor's tithe and 50 per cent of other ministerial member's tithe. These amounts shall be specified for the District Expense Fund.

The District Church Extension Fund shall be provided for by an assessment of \$1.50 per member. This money shall be forwarded by the local treasurer to the District Treasurer, specified for the Church Extension Fund.

Resolved, that we insert in our minutes the Memorial on the United Stewardship Fund, adopted by the General Conference of 1958 as follows:

There shall be a United Stewardship Fund of \$8.00 per member annually: Foreign Missions 20 per cent; Church Extension 14 per cent; Administration 36 per cent; Sunday School and youth 2.6 per cent; Senior College 21.4 per cent; Church Extension Loan Fund 3 per cent; contingent 3 per cent. This United Stewardship Fund to be raised monthly.

It shall be the responsibility of the pastor and the church board to see that their church raises its portion of the "United Stewardship Fund." This offering shall be raised monthly. The Treasurer of Foreign Missions shall be instructed to forward to the District Treasurer an amount equal to \$1.60 per member commensurate with the Memorial on the "United Stewardship Fund."

No. 6. Resolved, that in order to receive due credit in the current year, any church must have all money in the mail on or before June 5. The District Treasurer shall keep his books open until June 10, so that proper credit may be given for monies mailed on or before June 5. All monies mailed after June 5, shall be entered in the following year.

No. 7. Resolved, that the subsidy of 25c a month per member be contributed to the Eastern Pilgrim College for this next year and that this Conference direct the present members of the College Board from this district to meet the Executive Council of the College Board and lay



before them such matters as have given it concern.

No. 8. Resolved, that the District Superintendent's support shall be as follows:

Salary, \$375.00 per month; Travel expenses, seven cents per mile by automobile, and actual expense by train or bus; in addition, the District shall provide a parsonage furnished with telephone, electricity, gas, heat and water.

No. 9. Resolved, that the District Superintendent push the Pilgrim Pension Plan and encourage every pastor to join. In cases where it is determined by the District Council that payment of such dues would cause undue hardship for the pastor and church, said dues shall be paid by the District out of the District Expense Fund.

No. 10. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be granted an annual vacation of two weeks each year with pay.

No. 11. In order to create a sustained interest in and support for District Home Missions and Church Extension, we recommend and urge each church to set apart one prayer meeting night each month at which time earnest prayer shall be made for District Home Missions and an offering to be taken for the same and forwarded to our District Treasurer. This is to be in addition to our regular yearly assessment of \$1.50 per member.

No. 12. Resolved, that those driving to work on our Camp Grounds or otherwise using their cars in the interest of the District shall receive six cents per mile for the use of their car.

No. 13. Be it resolved that when deemed advisable by both Pastor and the District Superintendent that an offering be received by the District Superintendent at the time of his regular visit for the purpose of District Church Extension.

No. 14. Be it resolved that adequate liability insurance be secured for the protection of the public and personnel involved in all activities on our camp grounds.

No. 15. Be it resolved that each church be required to send an offering each year to help defray the expense of Conference.

No. 16. Inasmuch as we are encouraged and admonished to move forward in the New York District; Be it resolved that each Zone Camp set apart one service of their respective camp for a special Home Missionary Rally at which time an offering be taken for the support of present and future Home Missionary projects.

No. 17. Be it resolved that the District Council be authorized to take such steps and proceedings, necessary in repairing of District Parsonage and building of a new, car garage—or take appropriate steps in purchasing a new district parsonage, after which, the financial need be presented to the churches of the district.

No. 18. Be it resolved that the following persons receive annually that amount stipulated for services rendered: The District Treasurer \$200.00; District Foreign Missionary Secretary and Treasurer, \$150.00; Pilgrim News Editor, \$150.00; District Secretary, \$50.00; District Statistician, \$25.00.

No. 19. Be it resolved that the District Treasurer reimburse the Treasurer of the Victory Grove Camp for actual conference expense in-

current.

This amount to be determined by the Camp Treasurer and the District Treasurer.

No. 20. Resolved, that each church of the New York District be assessed the equivalent of 1% of the pastor's salary, said fund to be used for repairs on the district parsonage.

No. 21. Whereas, the present funds are insufficient to carry on the District Church Extension Program in promoting the interests of Home Missions.

Be it resolved that the financial plan (15c per week per member) be endorsed by this Conference and Be It Further Resolved that since this plan is strictly voluntary, no church is to be considered delinquent that neither participates nor comes short of the requested goal.

No 22. Inasmuch, as each zone is to conduct a Sunday School Convention annually, Be It Resolved that each Sunday School be assessed the amount of \$5.00 per year with an enrollment up to 50 and \$5.00 per 50 or major fraction thereof above the first 50.

### MISCELLANEOUS

No. 1. Resolved, that no properties such as churches, parsonages, or other buildings or land shall be sold of any of our incorporate churches without first conferring with the trustees of the district corporation.

No. 2. Resolved, that section 16 of article 2 of the religious corporation law be enforced in our district in regard to churches who have discontinued holding services and where there are less than 7 attending members.

That such temporalities and property be managed by the District Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Inc., our ecclesiastical governing body, or may, in pursuance of the provisions of law relating to the disposition of real property by religious corporations, sell or dispose of the same, and apply the proceeds thereof to any of the purposes to which the property of such governing religious body is devoted, and shall not divert such property to any other object.

In no case shall property be sold or disposed of; and money used for the support of the preacher who may claim this as an out appointment.

Due notice shall be given by the District Secretary, regarding the action of the District Assembly in declaring a church extinct, within 30 days to the remaining members, if any.

No. 3. Resolved, that inasmuch as the resolutions contain matters of vital importance to our lay members and inasmuch as not everyone reads the resolutions, we recommend that our pastors read the resolutions before the church as soon as possible after the distribution of the minutes.

No. 4. Resolved, that we, the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, place ourselves on record as being unalterably opposed to, and deplore the present sale and use of intoxicating beverages throughout the nation, and furthermore we advise and strongly urge our people not to encourage the sale and use of said liquors by patronizing such places where these intoxicating liquors are sold.

No. 5. Inasmuch as our Manual declares itself against the wearing of jewelry; be it resolved, that none of our preachers shall use the ring

ceremony in marriages, or in any way encourage the use of it. Any minister who use such ceremony shall be dealt with by the District Council.

No. 6. Resolved, that all reports regularly sent to the District Statistician be in his hands by June 15 and that all books and records that are to be audited shall be sent to the chairman of the Auditing Committee by June 15.

No. 7. Resolved, that each Pastor be required to attend his or her Zone Camp and to remain at least one Sunday.

No. 8. In view of tendencies detrimental to the spiritual effort of our camp meetings, we recommend that the following rule be adopted for all our camps. All persons resident on the grounds shall respect a curfew hour of 10:30 o'clock and lights shall be out by 11 p.m. with due exceptions to be made for any person engaged in legitimate camp meeting activities.

No. 9. Resolved, that the telephone numbers of the ministers be published annually in the Minutes and that the address of the church also be published.

No. 10. Resolved, that following the election of officers the District Superintendent shall appoint the committees which are to function under the District Council for the ensuing year.

No. 11. Resolved, that a District Ministerial Convention be held each year on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the second week in April except when the second week in April is Holy Week, in which case the date of the Convention shall be set by the District Council. The place of the convention shall always be determined by the District Conference.

No. 12. Resolved, that the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church is opposed to divorce and remarriage and that all persons who are divorced and remarried, except to be remarried to the one from whom they have been divorced, providing they have not taken another, be denied membership in said church.

No. 13. Resolved, that each pastor be given freedom to hold at least two revivals each conference year.

No. 14. Inasmuch as the heavy burden of cleaning up our Camp grounds often falls upon only a few individuals, be it resolved that the preachers in each Camp Zone shall be notified in advance of cleanup day by one of the officials of the camp, and that each one thus notified shall be expected to give assistance to the task if at all possible. This applies to Vermontville Camp in the North; Victory Grove in the Central Zone; and Binghamton Camp in the South

No. 15. Resolved, that the three center sections of seats together with the first five seats of each side in the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

No. 16. Resolved, that the time of the business sessions of our District Conference be fixed as follows: From 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon, from 2:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M.; from 7:00 to 10:00 P.M.

No. 17. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be given freedom to conduct two revivals outside the District each Conference year, and that he be permitted to keep all proceeds from the same.

No. 18. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be required to meet with each local church board at least once each Conference year.

No. 19. We recommend that each local church in as far as possible, give their pastor two weeks vacation over one Sunday with pay.

No. 20. Resolved, that in each of our churches a pastoral recall meeting shall be held each year not later than the third week in April.

No. 21. Resolved that the monthly Sunday School report in **THE PILGRIM NEWS** follow the General Secretary's form, tabulating (1) The average attendance of last Conference year as reported in the Conference Minutes; (2) The average attendance to date this Conference year; (3) The average attendance this month; (4) The average attendance for the same month last year.

The monthly report shall be submitted to the Editor of **THE PILGRIM NEWS** by the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

No. 23. Inasmuch as there is a marked disregard for the Lord's Day, and the Scripture admonishes us to keep it holy by doing no worldly business in it, Be It Resolved that a contribution box be left for a free will offering at the exit of the dining halls of our camps and let said free-will offering box be properly marked and left unattended.

No. 24. Resolved, that the Labor Day Youth Rally at Victory Grove be a district youth rally at which time the district youth leaders will be elected, for the coming year.

No. 25. Resolved, that each dormitory on our Camp grounds shall have at least one resident responsible person in charge to maintain order during Camp and Conference.

No. 26. Be It Resolved that the District Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions be made an honorary member of the Conference with voice and vote in the same.

No. 27. Be It Resolved that the Editing Committee have the power to delete from the Minutes all obsolete resolutions subject to the approval of the District Council.

No. 28. Resolved that the treasurers of the respective camp meetings shall, within a month of the closing date of each camp, forward to the pastor (or treasurer, if known) of the churches concerning either the pledge cards themselves, or a list showing: name of pledger, amount pledged, and project for which pledged.

No. 29. Resolved, that each zone conduct a Sunday School Convention within the Conference year, and be it further resolved that the District Sunday School Board be responsible for arranging such conventions.

No. 30. Resolved, that no delegate shall be seated by the Conference to represent any church if that church has failed to duly elect a delegate.

No. 31. Resolved, that a speed limit of eight miles per hour be enforced on all our camp grounds, and that signs to this effect be placed at all entrances, and be it further resolved that bicycle riding on the camp grounds be prohibited during camp.

No. 32. Resolved, that the starting date of the Binghamton Camp shall be the first Thursday of August.

No. 33. Resolved, that each zone sponsor a youth camp to be held on the zone camp grounds, at a time convenient to the respective zone, to be under jurisdiction of the zone youth leader and committee, in conjunction with the District Youth Executive and the District Superintendent.

No. 34. Resolved, that each church shall upon the election of its delegate to the District Conference, forward a written notice of the same to the District Secretary.

No. 35. The Resolution Committee recommends that in the appointing of officers for the four zones into which our District is divided relative to our Young People's Societies, that the chairman of each zone be selected from our pastors and the other officers of each organization be from the lay members.

No. 36. Resolved, that new District Young People's Zone be established to be known as the Western Zone, which shall be composed of the following churches, Utica, Rochester, Syracuse and Chittenango.

No. 37. Resolved, that each Sunday school in the district close the Sunday school attendance records one-half hour after the beginning of the said school.

No. 38. Be It Resolved that the editor of **THE PILGRIM NEWS** receive from the District Secretary a calendar of District events to be published at least one month in advance of dates set for each event.

No. 39. Resolved, that this District go on record as being opposed to the presence of television in the homes of our members and that we urge every preacher to not only warn his people against its evils, but also to set an example by not allowing it in his home. Any preacher permitting a set in his home shall be subject to action by the District Council.

No. 40. Whereas in the past some pastors have not known nor heard of the death of some ministers of the District and of the General officials, be it resolved that the death of any District minister or any General official shall be reported to each pastor by the District Superintendent, and that he work out his own plan of notifying each pastor.

No. 41. Since it was requested by our General Officer that we have a Young People's report at the District Conference, be it resolved that the zone leaders send a report of their meetings and activities to the Executive Secretary, and that he report same to the District Conference.

No. 42. Be It Resolved that this Conference go on record as being opposed to television being in the homes of the members of the faculty of Eastern Pilgrim College.

No. 43. Be It Resolved that the District Council be authorized to appoint a Committee of three for each camp whose duties will be to function in keeping with duties outlined for them by the District Council.

The three camp boards shall meet together with the District Superintendent and Council to formulate basic social and disciplinarian regulations for the three zone camps. These rules to be published in the District minutes. The camp boards shall be responsible for the enforcement of these regulations in their respective Zones.

## MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

### Memorial No. 1

Be It Resolved that (Sec. 112 paragraph 16) be amended to read, "If for any reason an office is vacated the council by a majority vote may fill the vacancy with the exception of the office of the District Superintendent.

### Memorial No. 2

Be It Resolved that (Sec. 96, under District Superintendent, be amended to read, "The first term of the District Superintendent shall be for one year. There after, he shall be elected for a term of two years.

He shall hold office until his successor is elected.

In the event the office of the District Superintendent is vacated for any reason, the Assistant Superintendent shall thereby become the District Superintendent for the un-expired term.

If for any reason the Assistant Superintendent is not able to accept the office of District Superintendent, the Council has the right to fill the vacancy by majority vote.

## DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the 40th annual Conference of the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings in the name of Jesus.

My activities as District Superintendent for the year just past have consisted largely of those things which are always a part of this office. On the other hand, I must say that my service has been more than routine inasmuch as I have had a growing concern for our beloved Zion. I will not enlarge upon this but I mention it that you may know that my service to you as a District Superintendent has been more than driving around the country and preaching sermons and meeting boards. This I have done to the limit of my strength, but this by no means is the limit of my service. I will take the privilege of saying here that we need a Holy Ghost revival desperately. The longer we go on without it, the farther from it we are, and if the patterns of history could serve as a warning, then the words of Jesus are most applicable. "If thou hadst known, even thou, in this thy day the things which belong to thy peace, but now they are hid from thine eyes." Blinded eyes and moral insanity within, are the purchasing power for the rewards of iniquity.

This is no time to preach, but since I have said that we need a Holy Ghost revival I herewith submit a list of detailed persuasions relative to the need.

1. We need the Holy Ghost to give us a Divine direction that will eliminate human gullibleness.

2. We need a Holy Ghost revival that will create a condition of honor and character that will eliminate the wicked and carnal desire to exalt self at the expense of others.

3. We need a Holy Ghost revival that will create a sense of truth within that will eliminate the false concept we have of ourselves.

4. We need a Holy Ghost revival that will make Divine Cause as

our burning passion and thus eliminate our habit of placing religious interests somewhere and anywhere on the list of life's activities.

### PROPERTIES

The District parsonage was reroofed and partially redecorated inside. The church living quarters have been redecorated at Amsterdam.

East Windsor has constructed a new parsonage.

Fox Hill is in the process of adding to the parsonage.

The Green Grove Church building has been enlarged and a new furnace installed.

Haverhill has a beautiful new church which is to be dedicated shortly after Conference.

At North Troy a new room has been finished upstairs in the parsonage.

At Port Jervis the church has been redecorated both inside and out.

The church at Ravena has been redecorated, and new pulpit furniture has been placed on the platform.

The Schenectady parsonage received a partial remodeling, which gives the pastor a nice study.

The church at Wells was substantially improved by changing the front of the church.

### ENCOURAGEMENT

I have two reasons for believing that God is desirous of reaching us with his mercy and grace.

First, we have just closed a most gracious camp here at Victory Grove when wave after wave of Holy Ghost power swept us out of routine and lined our altars with many seeking souls. The manifestations of God were reassuringly encouraging.

I have never tried to build a reputation by tearing down that of any other man.

I never sought office.

I have to the best of my knowledge been true to the New York Conference and the Pilgrim Holiness Church. In being true I oppose sin and wrong whether in or out of the church.

I don't expect to die happy because of what I have done for God or the church, but I expect to die happy.

Not all people have confidence in me, but I have a wife and two children who do, and that is sufficient.

I am anxious to be a Holy Ghost man.

This year I have preached approximately 133 sermons.

I have conducted approximately 30 board meetings.

I have conducted approximately 24 annual meetings.

I have held four revivals and two weekend meetings.

I have attended two meetings at Allentown.

I have made several calls on people interested in the New York Conference.

I conducted three camps.

I worked one week at Binghamton Camp, one week at Vermontville Camp and one week at Haverhill.

I have driven approximately 25,000 miles in the discharge of my duties
