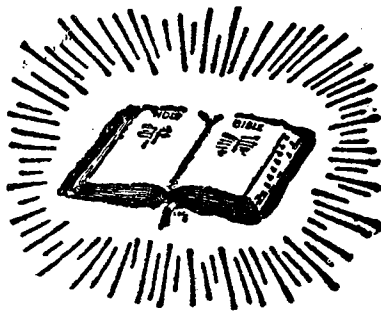

NEW YORK DISTRICT CAMP REGULATIONS

(Victory Grove, Binghamton, Vermontville)

1. Each person residing on the camp ground one night or more will be required to register.
2. All young people shall be required to attend the YOUTH and EVENING SERVICES, and one other preaching service of the day.
3. If it is necessary to leave the grounds at any time, young people must obtain permission from the Camp Supervisor.
Walking from the camp grounds at night is prohibited.
Those who must leave grounds by car, may do so in groups of three or more. Each member of these groups must report to the Camp Supervisor upon their return.
4. All persons shall observe a curfew of ten-thirty o'clock and lights shall be out by eleven p. m. with due exceptions to be made for any person engaged in legitimate camp meeting activities.
(All campers shall be on grounds at ten-thirty o'clock and all non-campers be off grounds at the same hour.)
5. All young people are required to stay in their own rooms or cottage unless a change of rooms should be granted by the Camp Supervisor.
6. Camp equipment shall not be removed from dormitory room or camp cottages unless approved by Camp Supervisor.
7. All recreational activities shall be prohibited on our camp grounds.
8. All radios and televisions are prohibited.
9. The wearing of shorts and slacks shall be prohibited.
10. When coming to the dining room to work, the female help shall be required to wear hose and hair nets, and their hair shall be properly combed.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

Opening Sitting — July 9, 1962, 7:00 P.M.

The Forty-first Annual Conference of the New York District met on the Victory Grove Camp Grounds July 9, 1962. The evening session opened with the song, "Faith Is The Victory," directed by Rev. Joseph Hunting and accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Jean Hoffman. A verse of "My Faith Looks Up To Thee" ensued. Rev. Donald Myers led the delegation in prayer.

Our newly elected General Superintendent, Rev. P. W. Thomas, was introduced by Brother Fay and as he stepped forward, he broke out in singing "Showers of Blessings," the congregation joining in. Psalm 40 was read and Conference was called to order.

Roll was called of the ordained and licensed ministers, and lay delegates.

Attention was given to the seating arrangement. A motion was made, seconded and carried that the two center sections and the first five rows on the wings in the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

Rev. Roy Dorsett, receptionist, introduced the following to the Conference: Mrs. P. W. Thomas, Rev. J. R. Mitchell, Rev. Melvin Dieter, Rev. P. R. Doyle, Rev. and Mrs. E. Palm, Rev. E. Wheatley, Rev. Robert Finch, Rev. and Mrs. Maurice Schenck and Rev. and Mrs. Haskell Burch. By motion these were granted an honorary seat in the Conference bar.

The District Superintendent's report was read and adopted. Brother Thomas commented that prayers and tears can never be reported as the miles, etc.

The Assistant District Superintendent's report was given orally and accepted.

The Auditor's report, prepared by Mrs. Marcia Wilson, was read by the secretary and received.

Rev. J. N. Jump read the auditor's report, the District Treasurer's report, the Ministerial Pension Fund report, and report on Church Extension. These were accepted separately by the Conference.

The Binghamton Camp Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Joseph Hunting and accepted.

The Victory Grove Camp Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Garry Boel and accepted.

The Vemontville Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Wm. Fred McCulley and accepted.

The Foreign Missionary report compiled by Mrs. Jean Hoffman, was read by the District Secretary. It was accepted as given.

Rev. Arthur Shafer read the Statistical report which was accepted by motion.

Letters from our missionaries, Grace M. Robinson, Rev. and Mrs. Maurice Hobart, and Rev. and Mrs. Paul Phillippe, were read by the secretary. The latter was then instructed by the chairman to make mention of these in the minutes and respond to the missionaries, sending greetings from the Conference.

Brother Thomas spoke briefly as to the new work in London, England, whose nine million souls need God. He enlightened us further from the contents of a letter written by Rev. Wm. Pratt, God's diplomat and servant, in holding conventions and organizing a work among the West Indian people who moved to London and took their Salvation with them.

Our General Superintendent read various items as to the action from General Conference relative to provision for District Missionary Society President; and as to the Foreign Missionary assessments being removed from the United Stewardship Fund.

Brother and Sister Berg were called to the platform. Each witnessed briefly in testimony as to labors in British Guiana, the land of six nations. After sitting in our camp meeting here, Brother Berg had high aspirations for a camp meeting in South America.

The refrain of "I'll Live For Him," filled the tabernacle.

The motion for adjournment was made and Rev. J. R. Mitchell District Superintendent, of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District, dismissed the company by prayer.

Second Sitting — July 10, 1962, 9:00 A.M.

The District Superintendent called on Rev. Joseph Hunting to lead the assembly in song as the second session opened. Joyce Dilenbeck accompanied at the piano as the people lifted the sacred notes of "There Is A Fountain."

Rev. Francis L. Richmond prayed.

Rev. C. F. Berg was asked by the chair to read the Scripture. His selection was Ephesians 6:10-19. We joined in singing "Take the Name of Jesus With You."

The minutes of the previous sitting were called for. It was brought to the attention of the secretary that he had omitted reading the list of Ordained Deaconesses when calling the roll. Minutes were then approved as read and he continued the completion of the roll.

Rev. James Payne, chairman of the Examining Board and Board of Education, gave his report. Richard K. Cole and Floyd Smith were recommended for first year district license, and Edward C. Palm for a two-year district license. It was further recommended that Rev. Haskell Burch be accepted into our Conference as licensed minister from the Kentucky District — Carried.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report was read by Rev. Fred McCulley, having served in that capacity for four years. He emphasized larger Sunday Schools through better Sunday Schools. He spoke of a 10% gain and expressed appreciation to the pastors who were responsible for numerical and percentage gains. The chairman requested Bro. McCulley to present a written report to the secretary for publication in the minutes. This report was received by motion.

The secretary of the Resolution's Committee, Rev. Paul Pierpoint, presented the following resolutions:

No. 1. Regarding the formulating of a yearly calendar of the District's activities was carried.

No. 2. Referred to the meeting of the District Council quarterly — Carried.

No. 3. Had reference to the Pilgrim News and was referred back to the committee for rewording.

No. 4. Provided for a seven minute pastoral report at the annual district conference — Carried.

No. 5. Referred to the time and place of our Conference and preaching services nightly. A substitute motion was passed upon: Be it resolved that the District Council, in planning for the District Conference, make provisions for evening preaching services. Discussion followed and a motion was made, supported and carried to end debate. The motion to accept the substitute motion prevailed and carried.

No. 6. Regarding bi-monthly prayer and fasting services on a district-wide basis was carried.

No. 7. Had reference to our District Superintendent's supervision of those rendering service from the platform. The chairman ruled this resolution unnecessary, since covered sufficiently by manual.

No. 8. Referred to the conduct of the clergy and was ruled out of order, being blanketed by manual.

No. 9. Regarding a minister enrolled in the Study Course making a semi-annual report was carried.

As Brother Dorsett took his seat, our chairman led out in singing. "The Sweet By and By."

Motion was made, seconded and carried that we recess for five minutes.

The song "Blessed Assurance" brought the assembly back to order.

Report of Ways and Means Committee was given by Rev. Roy Dorsett.

Res. No. 1, regarding Finance Resolution No. 5, page 15, was carried.

Brother Jump desired the Church Treasurers would understand the report blanks would thus be changed to read \$8.00 instead of \$6.40.

Res. No. 2, regarding a raise in the District Superintendent's travel expenses was carried.

Res. No. 3, regarding the Pilgrim Pension Plan resulted in deleting all but the first sentence of standing resolution No. 9, page 16.

Res. No. 4, which called for the deletion of standing resolution No. 13, page 16 was carried.

Res. No. 5, was carried, thus deleting matter of repairing District Parsonage and building of a garage, page 16, standing resolution No. 17.

Res. No. 6, which referred to standing resolution No. 21, page 17, desiring it to be deleted was left pending due to adjournment by expiration of time.

Rev. O. W. Lawrence was requested to pray.

Third Sitting — July 10, 1962, 2:00 P.M.

The third sitting of the Forty-first Annual Conference promptly assembled at 2:00 P. M. The delegation stood to sing "I Need Thee Every Hour" and Rev. Newland John led in prayer. By special request, Bro. and Sis. Maurice Schenck sang, "He Took Away My Heart of Stone" which brought blessing and glory on singers and people.

Business was assumed as the secretary read the minutes of the morning sitting. They were approved after corrections were made.

The pending motion was again brought to the floor relative to standing resolution 21, page 17.

A substitute motion was made: resolved a District Church Extension Fund be established (monies of which to be secured by assessment of 15c per week per member.

An amendment to the substitute prevailed which placed the sum of 15c on monthly basis.

However, the proposition to refer the original motion with the amendment was so moved seconded and carried.

Res. No. 7, to delete standing resolution No. 22, page 17, regarding the amount of \$5.00 be assessed towards promoting Sunday School Convention was carried.

Res. No. 8, in reference to using the report blanks issued by the General Church was carried.

Res. No. 9, involving standing resolution 20, page 17 which would assess 1% of the pastor's salary on a district parsonage was lost even though amending was attempted.

The District Trustee's report was read by Rev. O. W. Lawrence. It was accepted after discussion was heard relative to Pittsfield's mortgage.

As the Examining Board and Board of Education prepared to give further recommendations for licenses, a point of General Privilege was raised as to the questionnaire. The chairman ruled Brother Payne to proceed.

Larry Eugene Slavens was recommended for a one year license; Rev. Robert F. Finch was recommended as an ordained minister by transfer from the Penna-New Jersey district. Rev. Edward M. Wheatley was recommended, having transferred from the Eastern District. The names were passed on separately.

A motion was made and seconded, requesting a ruling by the Board of General Superintendents on No. 10 of the questionnaire used by the Examining Board. It was lost.

We proceeded with further business from the Resolution Committee.

Res. No. 3, regarding the Pilgrim News was brought back for discussion and passed. It involved the time basis for news reports and securing a printer near Binghamton.

Res. No. 10, was carried which would place a subscription rate of 25c on our district paper, other than regular distribution.

Motion to recess for 10 minutes was carried.

We sang the song "The Sweet Bye and Bye" as we assembled again.

We entered into the voting and the chairman rearranged the seating which included the first two centers and first five rows on the two left wings of the chairman.

Tellers were read: Rev. Paul Pierpoint, Rev. Leonard Lum, Rev. Fred McCulley, Rev. Francis Richmond, Rev. Donald Hardy, Rev. Daniel Shumway, Rev. Kendall Straight, and Rev. Billy Bidwell.

We stood for prayer. Rev. Paul Pierpoint was appointed to take charge of the tellers and Francis Olsen was stationed at the blackboard.

We proceeded to elect a District Superintendent. After the second balloting Brother Fay withdrew his name. After the fifth balloting, a motion to extend time was made and carried. Following the sixth balloting, Rev. C. F. Berg withdrew his name and on the eighth balloting, with 92 votes cast, Rev. Andrew J. Whitney was the recipient of 63 votes. The number needed was 62.

We adjourned by expiration of time.

Fourth Sitting — July 10, 1962, 7:00 P.M.

Brother Maurice Schenck led the assembly in song, "Blessed Assurance." Rev. E. Wheatley and Rev. Garry Boel prayed. Following the spontaneous quoting of promises and the singing of "Where Jesus Is, 'Tis Heaven There," the Conference settled down to organizational matters.

The secretary read the minutes of the last sitting and they were approved.

Voting proceeded. The chairman read the changes by memorials which would affect the offices of District Superintendent and Assistant.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent.

After balloting eight times, 85 ballots cast, 57 the required amount, Rev. O. L. Fay was declared elected.

We proceeded to vote for District Secretary. The secretary read two nominations as presented by the Council: Rev. Francis L. Richmond and Rev. Lloyd Stuart. On the second balloting, with 88 ballots cast, Brother Stuart received 60 votes and was declared elected.

Three names were presented by the District Secretary as nominations for District Treasurer: Joseph Hunting, Billy Bidwell and J. N. Jump. There were 87 ballots cast, Rev. J. N. Jump received 58, the requirement, and was declared elected.

As we continued our election of the District Council, a motion was made to for one Advisory member at a time — carried.

On the first balloting, 81 votes were cast, 41 majority, but no election. A motion was made and carried to vote on the five highest. This included: Rev. M. E. Pierpoint, Rev. Harry L. Twining, Rev. B. B. Bidwell, Rev. C. F. Berg, and Rev. O. W. Lawrence. Rev. M. E. Pierpoint was declared elected as the first advisory member.

Motion was made to recess for five minutes—carried. Upon return to the bar, ballots were cast again. But no election. The motion was made to select the five highest—Carried. The names were: H. L. Twining, O. W. Lawrence, Billie Bidwell, C. F. Berg, and Fred McCully. Eighty

ballots cast but no election. We balloted again and out of 89 ballots cast, Rev. H. L. Twining received 57 and was declared elected as the second advisory member to the Council.

Ballots were prepared for third and last advisory member. There was no election on the first ballot. Motion was made and seconded that we vote for the three highest: Rev. Billie Bidwell, Rev. Fred McCulley, and Rev. C. F. Berg. No election. Rev. Fred McCulley requested his name to be withdrawn and ballots were again cast. There were 88 ballots cast, Rev. Billie Bidwell received 54 and was declared elected as third advisory member.

Brother Fay took the floor to render complimentary remarks in behalf of Rev. O. W. Lawrence, who was no longer serving on the Council. Our chairman asked the Conference to give Brother Lawrence a rising vote of thanks for his 33 years of service. It was acclaimed with a hearty "God Bless You."

The Secretary read the nomination for the Sunday School Board. Rev. Edward LeCates and Rev. Fred McCulley. Out of 80 votes cast, Rev. McCulley received 43 and was declared elected.

The Secretary read the nominations for the third member on the Board of Trustees. Rev. O. W. Lawrence and Rev. H. L. Twining. Rev. O. W. Lawrence received 75 votes out of the 88 ballots cast and was declared elected.

The Secretary read the nominations for members on the Examining Board. Rev. James Payne, Rev. Francis Richmond, Rev. Bobby Bidwell and Rev. Paul Pierpoint. The chairman authorized the assembly to place two names on their ballot. Out of 89 ballots cast, Rev. James Payne and Francis Richmond were declared elected by majority vote.

The office for Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions was next to be filled. Only one nomination was presented by the Council: Mrs. Jean Hoffman. The motion was made, seconded and carried that the secretary cast a ballot for Sister Hoffman, electing her to the position.

Invitations were open for entertaining the Ministerial Convention in April. The pastors from Brushton, Syracuse, and Oneonta responded. The motion was made and carried that we decide by plurality vote. Brushton, with her fried chicken and biscuits, received the highest response.

We reached adjournment time, and a motion was thus made. The secretary asked for telephone and address changes and announcements were made by various committee chairmen.

Rev. Wm. Fred McCulley dismissed.

Fifth Sitting — July 11, 1962 9:00 A.M.

The beautiful strains of that sacred hymn "Rock of Ages" opened the fifth sitting of the Conference, led by Rev. Billie Bidwell and accompanied at the organ by Mary Conklin. Rev. J. N. Jump prayed and Brother Thomas read Psalm 91.

The minutes were approved with corrections.

We were then ready to hear from the Resolution Committee.

Res. No. 11, referring to regular reports of the District Superintendent

to the Council at quarterly meetings was passed.

Res. No. 12, in regards to the New York District's relationship with the General Church was ruled out of order by the presiding officer. Brother Thomas read the results of action taken at the meeting of the New York District Council with the Executive Council, September of 1960, Schenectady, New York.

Our District Secretary read the reply of the General Board's decision at their November meeting, 1960.

Brother Thomas gave his reasons for ruling this resolution out of order.

(1) The Conference does not have the right to take action as indicated in the resolution.

(2) The New York Conference is a part of the Pilgrim Holiness Church denomination.

a. It was accepted as such.

b. Has been duly recognized as a Conference of the church through the years.

(3) Many members of the church who will be affected by this action are not present.

(4) This action if taken, can well open pandora's box of distress and trouble.

However, as Brother Thomas continued, he said this Conference could appeal the ruling. Consequently, an appeal was made and a vote was taken as to the sustaining of the chair's rule. The result — affirmative vote, 27; negative vote, 50. Therefore, the ruling of the chair was not sustained and the matter was opened for discussion.

The motion was made that we defer action on this matter until duplicates of this resolution could be presented to the Conference.

An amendment to the resolution was made and carried that we recess until these copies could be prepared. The main motion was then voted on and passed.

When the sound of typewriters ceased, the bell rang, and the delegation resumed their seats.

A motion was made to vote on this issue at 12:00 o'clock, but was withdrawn.

A motion for a closed conference was lost after a standing vote was called for: 35 pro, 45 con.

The resolution again was before the assembly and the chairman limited debate to 10 minutes.

We adjourned by expiration of time.

Sixth Sitting — July 11, 1962, 2:00 P.M.

The New York District Conference convened for its sixth and final sitting Wednesday afternoon, making use of the songs, "Near The Cross," and "The Old Rugged Cross," led by Rev. Joseph Hunting. Rev. O. W. Lawrence prayed.

The minutes were read and approved with corrections.

A resuming of discussion on Resolution No. 12 was the order of the

day. A motion was made that we adopt this resolution by a two-thirds vote. Motion lost.

The main motion was before the Conference, voted upon and carried.

The Ways and Means Committee presented Resolution No. 10. This involved standing resolutions No. 11, page 16, No. 21, page 16 be deleted and resolution No. 5, page 15, paragraph 4, be changed to read \$2.25. Carried.

Res. No. 11, affecting resolution No. 18, page 16, which included pay-

Res. No. 12, requested each church lift a love offering for our retiring District Superintendent. Carried.

Res. No. 13, regarding a revision of Finance Resolution No. 6, page 15. Carried.

The Resolution Committee presented two more resolutions which were passed unanimously:

"Whereas, for 14 years, Rev. O. L. Fay has served the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church in the capacity of District Superintendent, Be It Resolved that this Conference extend to him, in genuine appreciation, this expression of thanks for his labors and sacrifice, for the fervency of his devotion to the work of God, for his zeal to safeguard vital piety and the cause of scriptural holiness throughout his tenure of this, our highest district office. May God be pleased to pour upon him heaven's richest blessings, and multiply to him reward for his every holy exertion among us."

"Be it resolved that this Conference extend to our presiding General Superintendent, Rev. Paul W. Thomas, a rising vote of appreciation and thankfulness for his chairmanship of the Conference, for the Christ-likeness of his spirit, for the unfailing charity and the consistent concern to rule in fairness on varied matters before us in these sessions."

A motion prevailed to give a standing vote of thanks to our retiring Assistant District Superintendent. Motion carried.

The delegation, and visiting friends, present stood in silence in memory of our departed brother, Rev. Benjamin Rickenbach, Jr. Our District Superintendent prayed.

Brother Fay expressed his appreciation of every kindness rendered from the District and Conference. With deep emotion we sang, "Blest

A motion was made, seconded and carried that the Council affix and approve the minutes of this sitting.

Brother Thomas made the following statement:

"Notwithstanding the adoption of Resolution No. 12, the chairman wishes it to be known that we consider the New York Conference to be a functioning unit of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and that we reserve all the rights and privileges of the church under the provisions of the manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church."

We adjourned by prayer led by our presiding General Superintendent.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

FINANCE

No. 1 Resolved that each church sending a delegate or delegates to the District Conference, pay the traveling expenses of said delegates and pastor.

No. 2 Resolved, that when the District Council deems any licensed minister unable to meet the expense of taking the study course as directed in Education Resolution No. 2, they may pay all or part of the cost of such course. The Licensee in such case shall agree to finish a year of such course in the Conference year.

No. 3. Resolved, that when money is sent direct to any fund, the church treasurer shall obtain a receipt for same and forward this to each District Representative.

No. 4. Resolved, that all departments of our church shall, upon receipt of monies, immediately forward receipts for same to sender.

No. 5. Resolved, that the District Treasurer shall maintain two funds, to be known as the District Expense Fund and The Church Extension Fund.

The ministers and workers of the District shall pay all their tithe into the church where they hold membership.

Each month the local church shall forward to the District Treasurer, the pastor's tithe and 50 per cent of other ministerial member's tithe. These amounts shall be specified for the District Expense Fund.

The District Church Extension Fund shall be provided for by an assessment of \$2.25 per member. This money shall be forwarded by the local treasurer to the District Treasurer, specified for the Church Extension Fund.

Resolved, that we insert in our minutes the Memorial on the United Stewardship Fund, adopted by the General Conference of 1958 as follows:

There shall be a United Stewardship Fund of \$8.00 per member annually: Church Extension 30 per cent; Administration 38 per cent; Sunday School and youth 6 per cent; Senior College 22 per cent; Church Extension Loan Fund 2 per cent; contingent 2 per cent. This United Stewardship Fund to be raised monthly.

No. 6. Resolved, that in order to receive due credit in the current year, any church must have all money in the mail on or before June 10. The District Treasurer shall keep his books open until June 15 so that proper credit may be given for monies mailed on or before June 10. All monies mailed after June 10 shall be entered in the following year.

No. 8. Resolved, that the District Superintendent's support shall be as follows:

Salary, \$375.00 per month; Travel expenses, eight cents per mile by automobile, and actual expense by train or bus; in addition, the District

shall provide a parsonage furnished with telephone, electricity, gas, heat and water.

No. 9. Resolved, that the District Superintendent push the Pilgrim Pension Plan and encourage every pastor to join.

No. 10. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be granted an annual vacation of two weeks each year with pay.

No. 11. Resolved, that those driving to work on our Camp Grounds or otherwise using their cars in the interest of the District shall receive six cents per mile for the use of their car.

No. 12. Be it resolved that adequate liability insurance be secured for the protection of the public and personnel involved in all activities on our camp grounds.

No. 13. Be it resolved that each church be required to send an offering each year to help defray the expense of Conference.

No. 14. Inasmuch as we are encouraged and admonished to move forward in the New York District; Be it resolved that each Zone Camp set apart one service of their respective camp for a special Home Missionary Rally at which time an offering be taken for the support of present and future Home Missionary projects.

No. 15. Be it resolved that the following persons receive annually from the District Expense Fund, the amount stipulated for services rendered: District Treasurer, \$200.00; Foreign Missionary Treasurer, \$150.00; Pilgrim News Editor, \$150.00; District Secretary, \$50.00; District Statistician, \$25.00; District Auditor, \$25.00.

No. 16. Be it resolved that the District Treasurer reimburse the Treasurer of the Victory Grove Camp for actual conference expense incurred.

This amount to be determined by the Camp Treasurer and the District Treasurer.

No. 17. Resolved, that each church of the New York District be assessed the equivalent of 1% of the pastor's salary, said fund to be used for repairs on the district parsonage.

No. 18. Whereas, no subscription rate for our PILGRIM NEWS now exists, Be it resolved, that such rate be established at 25c per year (plus postage), it being understood that this applies only to distribution outside the regular church channels.

MISCELLANEOUS

No. 1. Resolved, that no properties such as churches, parsonages, or other buildings or land shall be sold of any of our incorporate churches without first conferring with the trustees of the district corporation.

No. 2. Resolved, that section 16 of article 2 of the religious corporation law be enforced in our district in regard to churches who have discontinued holding services and where there are less than 7 attending members.

That such temporalities and property be managed by the District Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Inc., our ecclesiastical governing body, or may, in pursuance of the provisions of law relating to the disposition of real property by religious corporations, sell or dispose of the

same, and apply the proceeds thereof to any of the purposes to which the property of such governing religious body is devoted, and shall not divert such property to any other object.

In no case shall property be sold or disposed of; and money used for the support of the preacher who may claim this an an out appointment.

Due notice shall be given by the District Secretary, regarding the action of the District Assembly in declaring a church extinct, within 30 days to the remaining members, if any.

No. 3. Resolved, that inasmuch as the resolutions contain matters of vital importance to our lay members and in asmuch as not everyone reads the resolutions, we recommend that our pastors read the resolutions before the church as soon as possible after the distribution of the minutes.

No. 4. Resolved, that we, the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, place ourselves on record as being unalterably opposed to, and deplore the present sale and use of intoxicating beverages throughout the nation, and furthermore we advise and strongly urge our people not to encourage the sale and use of said liquors by patronizing such places where these intoxicating liquors are sold.

No. 5. Inasmuch as our Manual declares itself against the wearing of jewelry; be it resolved, that none of our preachers shall use the ring ceremony in marriages, or in any way encourage the use of it. Any minister who uses such ceremony shall be dealt with by the District Council.

No. 6. Resolved, that all reports regularly sent to the District Statistician be in his hands by June 10 and that all books and records that are to be audited shall be sent to the chairman of the Auditing Committee by June 10.

No. 7. Resolved, that each Pastor be required to attend his or her Zone Camp and to remain at least one Sunday.

No. 8. In view of tendencies detrimental to the spiritual effort of our camp meetings, we recommend that the following rule be adopted for all our camps. All persons resident on the grounds shall respect a curfew hour of 10:30 o'clock and lights shall be out by 11 p.m. with due exceptions to be made for any person engaged in legitimate camp meeting activities.

No. 9. Resolved, that the telephone numbers of the ministers be published annually in the Minutes and that the address of the church also be published.

No. 10. Resolved, that following the election of officers the District Superintendent shall appoint the committees which are to function under the District Council for the ensuing year.

No. 11. Resolved, that a District Ministerial Convention be held each year on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the second week in April except when the second week in April is Holy Week, in which case the date of the Convention shall be set by the District Council. The place of the convention shall always be determined by the District Conference.

No. 12. Resolved, that the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church is opposed to divorce and remarriage and that all persons who are divorced and remarried, except to be remarried to the one from whom they have been divorced, providing the have not taken another, be denied membership in said church.

No. 13. Resolved, that each pastor be given freedom to hold at least two revivals each conference year.

No. 14. Inasmuch as the heavy burden of cleaning up our Camp grounds often falls upon only a few individuals be it resolved that the preachers in each Camp Zone shall be notified in advance of cleanup day by one of the officials of the camp, and that each one thus notified shall be expected to give assistance to the task if at all possible. This applies to Vermontville Camp in the North; Victory Grove in the Central Zone; and Binghamton Camp in the South.

No. 15. Resolved, that the three center sections of seats together with the first five seats of each side in the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

No. 16. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be given freedom to conduct two revivals outside the District each Conference year, and that he be permitted to keep all proceeds from the same.

No. 17. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be required to meet with each local church board at least once each Conference year.

No. 18. We recommend that each local church in as far as possible, give their pastor two weeks vacation over one Sunday with pay.

No. 19. Resolved, that in each of our churches a pastoral recall meeting shall be held each year not later than the third week in April.

No. 20. Resolved that the monthly Sunday School report in **THE PILGRIM NEWS** follow the General Secretary's form, tabulating (1) The average attendance of last Conference year as reported in the Conference Minutes; (2) The average attendance to date this Conference year; (3) The average attendance this month; (4) The average attendance for the same month last year.

The monthly report shall be submitted to the Editor of **THE PILGRIM NEWS** by the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

No. 21. Inasmuch as there is a marked disregard for the Lord's Day, and the Scripture admonishes us to keep it holy by doing no worldly business in it, Be It Resolved that a contribution box be left for a free will offering at the exit of the dining halls of our camps and let said free will offering box be properly marked and left unattended.

No. 22. Resolved, that the Labor Day Youth Rally at Victory Grove be a distinct youth rally at which time the district youth leaders will be elected, for the coming year.

No. 23. Resolved, that each dormitory on our camp grounds shall have at least one resident responsible person in charge to maintain order during Camp and Conference.

No. 24. Be It Resolved that the District Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions be made an honorary member of the Conference with voice and vote in the same.

No. 25. Be It Resolved that the Editing Committee have the power to delete from the Minutes all obsolete resolutions subject to the approval of the District Council.

No. 26. Resolved, that the treasurers of the respective camp meetings shall, within a month of the closing date of each camp, forward to the pastor (or treasurer, if known) of the churches concerning either the

pledge cards themselves, or a list showing: name of pledges, amount pledged, and project for which pledged.

No. 28. Resolved, that no delegate shall be seated by the Conference to represent any church if that church has failed to duly elect a delegate.

No. 29. Resolved, that a speed limit of eight miles per hour be enforced on all our camp grounds, and that signs to this effect be placed at all entrances, and be it further resolved that bicycle riding on the camp grounds be prohibited during camp.

No. 30. Resolved, that the starting date of the Binghamton Camp shall be the first Thursday of August.

No. 31. Resolved, that each zone sponsor a youth camp to be held on the zone camp grounds, at a time convenient to the respective zone, to be under jurisdiction of the zone youth leader and committee, in conjunction with the District Youth Executive and the District Superintendent.

No. 32. Resolved, that each church shall upon the election of its delegate to the District Conference, forward a written notice of the same to the District Secretary.

No. 33. The Resolution Committee recommends that in the appointing of officers for the four zones into which our District is divided relative to our Young People's Societies, that the chairman of each zone be selected from our pastors and the other officers of each organization be from the lay members.

No. 34. Resolved, that new District Young People's Zone be established to be known as the Western Zone, which shall be composed of the following churches, Utica, Rochester, Syracuse, Chittenango and Rome.

No. 34. Resolved, that each Sunday school in the district close the Sunday school attendance records one-half hour after the beginning of the said school.

No. 36. Be It Resolved that the editor of **THE PILGRIM NEWS** receive from the District Secretary a calendar of District events to be published at least one month in advance of dates set for each event.

No. 37. Resolved, that this District go on record as being opposed to presence of television in the homes of our members and that we urge every preacher to not only warn his people against its evils, but also to set an example by not allowing it in his home. Any preacher permitting a set in his home shall be subject to action by the District Council.

No. 38. Whereas in the past some pastors have not known nor heard of the death of some ministers of the District and of the General officials, be it resolved that the death of any District minister or any General official shall be reported to each pastor by the District Superintendent, and that he work out his own plan of notifying each pastor.

No. 39. Since it was requested by our General Officer that we have a Young People's report at the District Conference, be it resolved that the zone leaders send a report of their meetings and activities to the Executive Secretary, and that he report same to the District Conference.

No. 40. Be It Resolved that this Conference go on record as being opposed to television being in the homes of the members of the faculty of Eastern Pilgrim College.

No. 41. Be It Resolved that the District Council be authorized to appoint a Committee of three for each camp whose duties will be to function in keeping with duties outlined for them by the District Council.

The three camp boards shall meet together with the District Superintendent and Council to formulate basic social and disciplinarian regulations for the three zone camps. These rules to be published in the District minutes. The camp boards shall be responsible for the enforcement of these regulations in their respective Zones.

No. 42. Whereas, many conflicting schedules result from the pastors lack of knowledge of the yearly district program, Be It Resolved that the District Secretary formulate a yearly calendar including all the scheduled district and zone events and activities, and that this Calendar be spread in the annual conference minutes.

And Be It Further Resolved, that these minutes be published and sent to the local churches within 50 days after the close of conference.

No. 43. We recommend that each enrollee in the Ministers Study Course, holding a pastorate be required to present a written progress report, Semi-Annually. January 1 and July 1. Said report to be submitted to the Committee Chairman.

No. 44. Whereas, the statistical report presented by the district statistician is a general report and fails to reflect the progress of the local church and the activities of the individual pastor, Be It Resolved, that each active pastor be required to report to the annual conference: (1) His personal relationship to God; (2) the spiritual progress of his church; (3) the statistics included in the annual journal report; (4) his personal participation in district affairs which shall include: a, Zone Home Missionary Rallies; b, Zone Youth Rallies; c, District Ministerial Meetings; d, Hours devoted to work week and cleanup day; e, Days in attendance at Zone Camp Meeting. Be It Further Resolved that a maximum of seven minutes be allotted for each report.

No. 45. Whereas the content of the **PILGRIM NEWS** is not always as fresh as might be ideal, Be It Resolved that two procedures toward speed-up be instituted: (1) That all news reports, commencing with September 1962, shall hereafter cover only events of that respective calendar month, to be mailed to the editor on **THE LAST DAY OF SUCH MONTH**; (2) That the Editor be empowered to canvass printing establishments adjacent to the Binghamton area, with an eye to eliminating time lost in transit of copy and printed issues, with authority to make such choice of printer as shall yield maximum gain a minimum cost to the District.

No. 46. Whereas, the International Conference of 1962, has changed the financial setup over the General Church, Be It Resolved, that the New York Conference use the General Church report blanks for all reports, financial and statistical.

No. 47. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent shall arrange for and promote bi-monthly prayer and fasting services to be participated in on a district-wide basis; the purpose of which will be to promote revival and the unity in the Holy Spirit, in these last days.

No. 48. Whereas there is an ever-widening breach between the general organization of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the New York Conference which has produced a state of spiritual unrest, confusion, and misunderstanding;

And whereas we have ignored for so long the existing differences in the existing differences in the hope that time would serve to improve and correct what has grown steadily worse;

And whereas the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has responded to our concern in this matter with what is, in effect, an ultimatum to us, demanding the surrender of traditional and legally-held legislative and administrative prerogatives at the time of the 1962 General Conference;

And whereas, acquiescence in this demand would have far-reaching effects producing a tacit surrender of District convictions not only for the present but for all future occasions;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT, in view of our responsibility to God to our past, our present and our future, that this conference express its firm refusal to accept the terms of the ultimatum from the General Board referred to above, with full persuasion and resolute determination to continue holding those standards and taking those positions and following those policies it deems necessary and advisable to receive and maintain the blessing of God.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the vote on this matter in this conference become the authoritative expression of the direction the New York District wants to take.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS REPORT

To the forty-first annual conference of the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings in Jesus' name.

I deem it unnecessary to call attention to any matters which are not, properly speaking, a part of my annual report. Furthermore, the press, the radio, the current conditions of the political and religious world make too obvious the character of our day. It would be superfluous for me to add words to what has been said and written by hundreds and thousands of others.

I would briefly call attention to a growing concern which I would to God could be multiplied in all our hearts. I believe both the ministry and the laity stand in need of a Holy Ghost revival that will give us a clearer focus of the Divine will, uncontaminated by cultured and acceptable carnality. Such a revival is our only hope, and this kind so few really desire because of its cost that, should it come to us, it will be a greater miracle than the raising of Lazarus from the tomb. Unless we have it, it is as clear as day where the present trends will take us.

Not all the work which is done for God is recorded in the church ledgers. In fact, I suppose what is more important such as prayer and tears, burden and faith, cannot be measured with any mathematical device; consequently the best work receives its best notice by the Eye that never slumbers, and for this we must wait in dedication till God reads the reports in eternity.

I am thankful to God that I can report something of revival which

is most encouraging. Monticello has witnessed a most encouraging revival, and it is my opinion that this field was naturally one of the most difficult. I am thus led to believe that prayer and faith and an uncompromising presentation of the truth can have, under God, a greater effect, if genuine spiritual elements become the foundation of a sanctified effort to enlarge Christ's Kingdom.

The Syracuse church has witnessed a gracious ingathering in the Sunday School, which is in most aspects the result of a pastor being successful in getting his people to work.

On the whole, I believe a good and united spirit prevails in our Conference, and if we can find the right path and the holy one with courage to take it, I am safe in predicting a better future than our past has been.

On June 21 we were stunned and grieved by the news that our Brother Benjamin Rickenbach had unexpectedly been called to his Eternal Home. The evidence of faithful service to God will stand for years to come in the monument of progress which he left at Tunkhannock, Pa. Properties consisting of a new church and new parsonage, as well as an enlarged and spiritual congregation, are the results of Brother Rickenbach's heroic service. He will long be remembered in the community where he served for his untiring labors and by all who knew him as a man of God, and by his friends for the warmth of a spiritual brotherhood.

There are some things concerning our camps that need our best attention and consideration. There is something of a lack of interest on the part of some of the older people. We do appreciate the host of young people who attend all three of our camps, and their number has been constantly increasing. However, the loss of interest on the part of adults along with ever increasing costs of operation make it increasingly more difficult to meet adequately the needs as they arise. I refer here particularly to the upkeep of three camp meeting properties. On the brighter side we know that these camps could hardly be estimated in the good camps ought to be as a revival to any church within a 75 mile radius. With a proper concept of their worthwhileness they could be even a greater blessing. Relative to all three of them we need more rigid enforcement of the rules if we are to have the proper and necessary smile of God upon them. Children should be accompanied by their parents and the youth need more supervision by parents or other responsible persons. Our recent camp was a time of much blessing with many seekers at the altar. I think more new and interested adults attended Victory Grove than in several years.

The District Home Missionary Rally on July 4th was blessed of God, and the people responded by pledging \$1,695.00 for this worthy cause.

I am sorry we have not won more, but (and I am not saying this for refuge for any failure) I trust we shall not succumb to the idea that numerical gains are any absolute indication of the blessing of God. If they are, then the Catholics, the Baptists, the Russellites have more God than we have. The fact still remains that the way to Heaven is still a narrow way and few there be that find it. If we are interested in building a denomination the task could be made easy; but if we insist on building the Church of Christ we must remain true to the Word while so many, like the rich young ruler, turn empty away. We need a revival so badly, but I rather think—yea, I am fully persuaded—that our great need

is a revival that will cleanse our ambitions rather than wrapping them in the garb of religious enterprise, feeling that since we can fool the people we might fool God.
