#### BROTHER REES' OPENING MESSAGE TO THE ASSEMBLY

We have been together for the last ten days under gracious conditions. God has been kind and merciful to pour out His Spirit upon us again. He has given us the chief desires of our hearts in the salvation of souls. This is something for which to be most thankful, and I trust this morning we are praising the Lord, every one of us, for His matchless goodness. But we are called together in the capacity of an Assembly with a responsibility of hundreds who are not here. We are here under a responsibility for the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the State of Ohio, and for thousands who are not Pilgrims who ought to be found and led to Christ. We are not here as an army behind a wall; we are not here behind breastworks. We are not called to simply maintain a defense; we are an army called to the open. Ours is an open field, and we are not to wait for an attack. We are to precipitate war. We are to make trouble in the enemy's land. We are here as pilgrims and strangers. This is not our country. We are citizens of another country. But we are here with a commission to do all the damage possible to the devil's kingdom and to rescue as many as possible from his satanic clutches. We are not here to think of ourselves or to labor for our own personal interests, but we are here for war, for the enlargement of our coasts, the lengthening of our cords, the strengthening of our stakes. There are thousands of people lying just outside our lines, who are precious, world

I trust that we come together this morning with the feeling of great responsibility and that in the transaction of business, which should be simple and as brief as may be, we may have in mind all the time the "other man—others." You remember that when the great General William Booth wanted to cable an inexpensive message to all the Salvation Army on all the broad fields of the round world, and at that time they had 600 officers in jail in nineteen countries, the word he chose was "others." If you are any kind of preacher, you can take this one word and preach a sermon.

The tendency is to concentrate at home, to settle down, to take it easy. That has been the tendency of humanity in all the roll of time. And as we attempt to take it easy we begin to bury God's rugged Truth and handle lightweight matters. I pray God that we may never drift, but that with the war whoop in our souls we may go forth to victory.

There are some things important, both negative and positive: Negatively, it is exceedingly important that we, as a people, shall steer clear of worldliness. World-

liness is the snare of the evening of this age. It will put any people on the rocks who indulge in it. It is negatively important that we shall stay humble, simple, little in our own eyes, with no self-aggrandizement, no disposition for show, no attempt to appear big or to add to our numbers without quality. A leader in a Holiness Church recently said to a great congregation in your own State, "Make members, no difference where you get them; no difference who they are, make members." It is not numbers we want; it is quality, it is character, it is a clean people. God has always used the minority. The majority is bound for hell, and God has often had to reduce His army that He might get somebody whom He could consistently use.

We want to steer clear of all proselyting. We want to get out and hew out a kingdom, get raw material. We would rather have it than anything that has been fostered in any ecclesiasticism. Some good people might come to us, as some have. But we will get our material from the rough, and we will train it and put our own stamp on it; and it won't be so stamped that people won't know to whom it belongs.

We want to steer clear of all politics. Politics are out of order in a Pilgrim Holiness Assembly. If anybody buttonholes you into any political scheme, send him to me. And, whatever we do, let us live on our faces and march on our knees, and God will put the positive side upon us.

Positively, we must have the fire-holy fire, heavenly fire, glowing, blazing, burning, boiling hot. We must have the fire. When people cool off they often become very officious in church matters and on committees, and have much to do with wheels, belts, bands, and regulations. But the more spiritual people are, the less machinery they can get along with. The more spiritual people are, the more they seek the guidance of the Holy Ghost. And if we are able in this Assembly, as I trust we will be, to dispense with all the gas that won't burn, if we can get on without excessive attempt to swallow Robert's Rules of Order, if we can get hold of the order of the Holy Ghost, our fortune is made. The Holy Ghost takes care of finances, of the details of Christian life and work. He bands us together and makes us one, and we see sufficiently nearly eye to eye as to live together in beautiful peace. I sincerely pray that God will keep us ablaze. I wrote a line this morning; I said, "The camp closed in a blaze." If we can keep things in a blaze, we will get on. Heresy is afraid of fire; all uncleanness is afraid of fire. All unhappy approach toward the opposite sex, and all that is irregular in Christian life will be overcome if we stay hot, roaring hot, blistering hot. Fire, fire, holy fire! What is a railroad engine worth without a mighty moving power? It may be painted until it is beautiful, but until it can go it has no attraction for me. What is a dreadnaught at sea worth without fire? Until it can move and go, it gets no admiration from me. I take off my hat to anything and anybody that gets there with credit. To do a thing and do it so that it is done-that is our calling.

We are to stay humble and clean and we are not to countenance uncleanness. Ours is the highest calling this side of the Great White Throne. Archangels would leave their appointment to come down and do the work assigned to us. But we cannot do it unless we are clean. And I take the stand fearlessly against all that is shadowy, all that is inconsistent. When a man betrays the trust of his people, and goes into forbidden territory, he goes down to stay. God is calling us to lift the standard high, and do something that we will not need to be chagrined over, or ashamed of, when the Judgment Day comes. Keep clean, shun the appearance of evil. Keep a broad margin between yourselves and everything that might cast a shadow. Take no chances, stand upright for everything that you are sure is right. The blessing of the Lord is upon us. I hope that fresh oil may be upon us, and the

dew of Heaven, and that we may live under the power of the mighty God, and do business that will remain, something lasting, for Jesus' sake.

#### JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

#### FIRST SESSION

#### Monday Morning, August 26, 1929, 9:00 A. M.

The first business session of the Ohio District Assembly opened at nine o'clock in the Camp Meeting Tabernacle at Springfield, Ohio. The Rev. Harry Hays, District Superintendent, led in the devotions. The Session was opened by the singing of "Blessed Assurance," which was followed by prayer.

Rev. Seth C. Rees, General Superintendent, took the Chair and gave a very inspiring and timely message concerning our responsibility as representative members.

Moved and carried that this message be spread on the minutes:

The proceedings of the business were as follows:

Moved and carried that Miss Helena Saneholtz and Miss Margaret Jones be elected as Assistant Secretaries.

The roll was called by the Secretary.

Moved and carried that the Assembly Bar be the same as the previous year—consisting of the first seven rows of seats in front of the pulpit, and the first three rows on each side of the pulpit.

Moved and carried that the hours of the Assembly be from 8:30 to 11:30 A. M., from 1:30 to 4:30 P. M. and from 7:00 to 9:00 P. M.

Registration of Delegates.

Moved and carried that Brother Fields from Athens be given a place in the Conference Bar.

Moved and carried that the following visiting ministers be given Honorary Seats in the Conference Bar: Rev. H. H. Cash from M. E. Church South at Richwood, Sister Harry Hays from Indiana, Rev. E. C. Boyles from Indiana, Rev. and Mrs. Eugene Freelan from Indiana, Rev. Kelly from the Free Methodist Church at Athens, Ohio, Rev. Mehiel Lew Chanin (Austrian) from New York, and Rev. Felsburg from Kansas.

The following committees were appointed by Rev. Harry Hays: Resolutions—Revs. J. S. Hayton, C. P. Pridgen, H. E. Uhrig, James Siders; Ways and means—Revs. C. M. Brown, J. L. Kennett, Joel Harmon, J. A. Fields; Reception—Revs. J. J. Snider, Mrs. F. C. Saneholtz, Celia Bradshaw, Mrs. L. R. Roberts; Statistical—Revs. A. A. Haines, H. E. Osborne.

The report of the District Superintendent was read. Moved and carried that we accept this report and that the same be spread on the Minutes:

Cincinnati, Ohio. August 27, 1929

To the Twenty-fifth Annual Assembly of the Ohio District Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Dear Brethren:

We are grateful to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon the work and workers of the District during the past year. My time has been taken up largely in traveling over the District and getting acquainted with both pastors and people. It has been a great pleasure to be so kindly received into the churches and homes of our people. I can gladly say that I have found many of our pastors self-sacrific-

ing and faithful in their respective fields of service, and in many places the churches give evidence of a love and loyalty to the interest of our work. However, there is a need of a larger vision and a better spirit of co-operation with the general work committed to us as a Church.

Revivals have been held in most of our churches and a goodly number have united in church fellowship with us, for which we are glad and take courage to press on in the battle for God and Holiness. We should exercise greater care in the choosing of our help in meetings if we are to build with permanency and make the progress which will do honor to God and credit to us as a Church.

Four churches have been organized the past year and we have prospects of several more within the near future. Funds are greatly needed with which to reach out and extend our borders; and unless our people awaken to their responsibility in helping to meet these needs our progress will be defeated. We believe the language of the prophet is still applicable to our condition, "Enlarge the place of thy tent and let them stretch forth the curtains of thine habitation; spare not, lengthen thy cords and strengthen thy stakes."

I preached one hundred twenty-six times, assisted in four funerals, and otherwise engaged in the work of the District.

First Annual Report of the District Superintendent.

Pastors and delegates read reports for the following churches: Athens, Ansonia and Rossburg, Bevis, Bowersville, Chillicothe.

Moved and carried that the time of the election of officers be Tucsday, 2:00 P. M. Announcements were made, after which there was a motion for adjournment. Closing prayer by Brother Rees.

#### MONDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Congregational Song, "Oh, How I Love Jesus." Prayer by Brother H. H. Cash from Richwood.

Moved and carried that we dispense with the reading of reports.

The following ministers were introduced to the Assembly and given Honorary Seats: Rev. and Mrs. Seth C. Rees from California, Rev. and Mrs. F. H. Tormohlen from Virginia, Rev. Calbert Holstein from Michigan, Rev. and Mrs. Edwin Brown from Findlay, Ohio, Rev. Ditmar, pastor Mennonite Church at Springfield, Ohio.

Owing to the fact that the Columbus delegate was not present, it was moved and carried that A. H. Cauliflower serve in that capacity.

Reports from Resolution Committee:

Resolution No. 1. In order to systematize our District efforts on the financial lines, be it resolved that all churches be urged to send all general church and district monies to the District Treasurer. Adopted.

Besolution No. 2. The Macedonian call is coming in from so many places; therefore, be it resolved that we elect a Church Extension evangelist to work under the direction of the Church Extension Board, and who shall receive \$35.00

per week including his expenses when actually engaged in the work. Also, all money received when in meetings shall be turned into the treasurer. Adopted.

Report of District Superintendent with reference to Committees: Auditing Committee-Brothers A. H. Cauliflower, R. D. McNall and E. E. Connin.

Brother and Sister Harris from the Friends Church at Urbana were introduced and given Honorary Seats in the Conference.

The following persons were appointed to serve on the Publishing Committee: Brothers F. H. Tormohlen, G. M. Smith and Mrs. Edwin Brown.

The District Superintendent appointed Brother Haines to take the place of Brother Roberts on the Statistical Committee.

Resolution No. 3. We are a Missionary Church and no doubt many of our blessings have come because of our interest in the heathen; therefore, be it resolved that each pastor, with the delegate, make a minimum pledge for their church for foreign missions for the ensuing year.

Resolution No. 4. Inasmuch as the District Camp and Assembly are institutions of the District, and whereas the offerings of these institutions were a great relief to the Camp, be it resolved that all our Churches be urged to take an offering for the same and that this money be sent to the District Treasurer not later than the last day of July. Moved and supported that this action be adopted.

Resolution No. 5. Moved and supported that each Church donate comforts, sheets, pillows and pillow cases for the District Camp. Motion carried.

Resolution No. 6. Resolved that we authorize the Treasurer to pay our District Secretary, Treasurer, and Home Missionary Secretary and Treasurer for the postage, stationery and books required in the execution of their offices. Moved and supported that this action be adopted. Motion carried.

The Home Missionary Treasurer's Report was read and accepted.

Resolution No. 7. At the last Assembly provision was made for the purchasing of one and one-half acres of land adjoining our Camp Ground. Inasmuch as no provision was made for paying for the same, be it resolved that this matter be provided for immediately. The above resolution was adopted.

Moved and supported that we adjourn to convene at 7 o'clock.

#### MONDAY EVENING SERVICE

Devotions were conducted by Rev. Harry Hays.

Song, "I'm Pressing."

Prayer by Rev. E. C. Boyles,

Minutes of the previous session of the day were read and approved.

Moved and supported that we dispense with the roll call for the evening. Carried. Rev. and Mrs. A. M. Ewing of Frankfort, Ind., and Rev. and Mrs. R. W. Chatfield from Lafayette, Ind., were introduced to the Assembly and given Honorary Seats in the Conference.

At this time Brother Rees gave a stirring exhortation concerning the support of the "Pilgrim Holiness Advocate," after which the roll call was made, at which time each minister and deaconess of the District was urged to pledge himself to make a vigorous attempt to get one or more subscribers to the paper within three months. To this appeal five hundred and seventy-five subscriptions were pledged.

Resolution No. 8. Inasmuch as this Assembly has been delayed on account of not having sufficient material on which to work, be it resolved that a Standing Resolution Committee be appointed to prepare material for the next Assembly. Adopted.

Resolution No. 9. Resolved that the District Treasurer be authorized to pay interest due on borrowed money from funds now in his possession. Money pledged to be used to replace the same. Adopted.

Resolution No. 10. Resolved that the District Superintendent, as he visits the various churches throughout the District, secure funds towards the liquidation of the indebtedness on the grounds purchased. Adopted.

Moved and carried that the Assembly adjourn.

#### TUESDAY MORNING SESSION

Devotional Services were opened by the singing of "I Will Trust Jesus," fellowed by prayer by Rev. R. W. Chatfield.

Brother Rees addressed the Assembly on the subject: "The Bond of Holy Fellowship." A few of the passing remarks were as follows: "The bond of holy fellowship is capable of cultivation and increase; as we live in meckness and labor for others, this bond that binds grows; seek the good of another rather than our own."

Minutes of the last session were read and approved.

At this time thirty-seven more subscriptions to the "Advocate" were taken, after which was the roll call.

Resolution No. 11. Inasmuch as the Ministerial Convention, which was held at Nelsonville in February, was such a great blessing to all who attended, we believe that a greater meeting could be held. Therefore, be it resolved that this Assembly appoint a time and place for such a meeting and that we empower the District Superintendent to select speakers and their subjects. Carried.

Resolution No. 12. August being a favorable month for our Camp Meeting, be it resolved that our next Camp Meeting be held August 8 to 17, 1930 and that the Assembly be August 18-20, 1930.

Owing to the fact that this date conflicts with the dates of other camps, the Assembly voted to amend this resolution.

The Amendment was as follows: Moved and carried that the District Camp be held August 1-11, and that the Assembly convene the three following days—August 12-14. Motion carried.
