# In Memoriam

The 46th Annual Conference of the Ohio conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church wishes to honor the memory of those whose death occurred during the past year.

#### Rev. A. B. Wallace

Rev. A. B. Wallace, born in Perry Co., April 8, 1877, departed this life on April 8, 1950 at the age of 73 years.

Having found Christ as his personal Saviour in early life, Bro. Wallace was a devout, consistent Christian.

Later he felt God's call to the ministry which the church recognized by licensing him in 1920 and afterward giving him the honor of ordination in 1930.

For many years he labored faithfully with our McCluney Church of which he was a member. He served that church both as assistant and as pastor.

He was buried in the Tateman M. E. Church Cemetery.

#### Rev. Walker Moore

Rev. Walker Moore was born Oct. 25, 1896, to John and Nancy Ann Moore of Jackson Co., Ky. He died Sunday, Dec. 11, 1949.

Dec. 10, 1915 he was united in marriage with Helen Marie Morgan which union was blessed with four sons and three daughters.

At the age of 26 he was converted and only a few days later was gloriously sanctified at which time  ${\tt God}$  miraculously healed him of tuberculosis.

Early in his Christian experience it became very evident that he was anointed of God for a special work. He immediately began to assist his pastor both in the local work and in the organization of new churches.

In 1937 he united with the Pilgrim Holiness Church and pastored what is now known as the Dayton Westwood Church. The basement of this new church was built under his supervision. After this he entered the evangelistic field then later felt the call to Mansfield, Ohio, where again under his able leadership a beautiful basement church was built.

Bro. Moore was an ardent worshiper of his Lord and Saviour and one of the outstanding memories will be his faithful watch in daily, audible prayer and communion with God. He was a loving Father, constantly urging his children to accept the way of God. He knew he was soon going home to Heaven, and talked freely of it with his family and friends.

#### Rev. Mary L. Cameron

Mary Lottie, daughter of John and Florinda Anderson, born near Ironton, Lawrence County, Ohio, Dec. 21 1878; was called to heaven Oct. 21, 1949 at Baltimore, Ohio.

At sixteen, in a Methodist Church while going down the aisle toward the altar she was definitely converted to Christ. Later under the influence of G. C. Bevington she was led into the experience of holiness.

In the year 1913 she joined the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Wellston, Ohio. She lived a godly life, was a great prayer warrior having her family altar morning and night, reading the Word and praying herself into tears daily.

She loved the Pilgrim Holiness Church and its standards to which she was loyal in attendance and support.

Funeral services were conducted in Wellston by Rev. H. E. Osborn. Her frail body was laid to rest in Zion's Hill Cemetery, near Wellston, from whence she will arise in the morning.

### **JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS**

#### First Sitting Monday Morning

The Forty-sixth Conference of the Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened Monday morning, August 14, 1950, at 9:00 A. M. The ministerial and lay delegates with the visitors met in the tabernacle on the Sugar Grove Camp Grounds, Springfield, Ohio.

The Conference was preceded by a most gracious Camp Meeting in which we were blessed under the anointed ministry of Rev. Jason Felter, Rev. Lloyd Montgomery and Rev. Mel Rothwell. God also blessed the good song services and special songs under the direction of Mark Waddell, assisted by his wife, Mrs. Waddell.

The Conference opened by greetings extended to the Conference by Rev. B. A. Awe. This was followed by a few moments of silent prayer, after which Rev. K. C. Vance led in audible prayer. Rev. Wingrove Ives led the Conference with the singing of "I Am Thine O Lord" in a good spirit of worship. We were led to the throne of grace in prayer by Rev. H. C. Walker.

Rev. B. A. Awe then introduced to the Conference our second assistant general superintendent, Rev. A. H. Wilson, who presided during the Conference. Rev. Wilson addressed the Conference stressing evangelism in the Pilgrim Holiness Church, the subject of which had been emphasized at our General Conference, after reading with carefulness Phil. 2:1-15. In this message he expressed the importance of:

1. Spirituality.

2. Consistent Sunday School growth into a spiritual Church.

3. Loyalty to our whole Church program.

We appreciate this godly man who has the Pilgrims at heart. The roll was called, corrected and substitutions were accepted.

Beirnes that Brother Rothwell is writing in the September and October issues of the Midnight Cry and that each pastor in Ohio will receive a year's subscription of the same.

Rev. B. A. Awe named three new churches who came into the Ohio Conference: the McConnellsville Church, Green's Run Church and Angel Ridge Church. Mrs. Fay Davis, delegate of the McConnellsville Church, Rev. Virgil Lanning, pastor and Gaylord Brooks, delegate of the Green's Run Church and N. L. Russel, pastor of the Angel Ridge Church were then introduced to the Conference and were seated in the Conference Bar.

The Conference adjourned by expiration of time with dismissal prayer by

Brother Roberts.

Rev. Bertha Keinbaum announced to the Conference that Rev. Joseph Stauffer will be teaching the subjects of "Homiletics" and "Holiness" (one hour credit courses) at Owosso Bible College, December 4-9, given especially for preachers.

A motion prevailed that we adjourn.

A dismissal prayer was made by Rev. B. A. Awe.

#### Third Sitting Monday Evening

Rev. Orville M. Awe led the Conference in a good song service while all joined in singing "I Need Thee Every Hour." Rev. Raymond Simpson led in a season of crayer.

The minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

An announcement was made in addition to the Stationing Ministers' report, that Rev. Earl Appleman will have the New Marshfield Church in addition to the Logan Church which he now pastors. Rev. Wayne Hill will have the church at Liberty Center.

Rev. Wayne Hill was accepted and seated within the Conference Bar.

The following tellers were appointed in preparation for the election of officers: J. W. Hancock, Harold Monroe, Harold Osborn, Russell Enlow, Earl McKinney, Melroy Ward, Ray Pidcock and Harley Cartwright.

The conference was divided and ballots were cast for the superintendents

of both Districts and their assistants.

Rev. B. A. Awe was elected as superintendent for the Eastern District with Rev. Raymond Simpson his assistant.

Rev. L. R. Roberts was elected as superintendent of the Western District with Rev. Paul Lucas his assistant. Rev. Roberts and Rev. Awe made brief remarks in accepting their offices.

Wilson addressed the candidates from the subject: "Take heed to thyslf." He explained the importance of taking heed to our devotion, taking time to be holy, being an example of the believer. He also showed the importance of taking heed to the words we utter and to our behavior.

# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

#### Western District

To the forty-sixth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Churches, Ohio Conference, now assembled: greetings in the tender name of the Lord Jesus.

Fully conscious of our unworthiness we wish to acknowledge the indescribable goodness of our God, so graciously manifested in our behalf throughout the entire year. No good thing has he withheld as we have endeavoured to walk before him in a manner acceptable in his sight. His grace, as always, has proven sufficient in every time of need.

I am most happy to report that, as in other years, our Pilgrim people have been most gracious in that they have sought to co-operate in every way humanly possible. So that we can truthfully say that it has been a pleasure indeed

to labor as your unworthy servant.

The state of the District: Reports from several of our pastors would indicate that the Lord has been pleased to bless with revivals that were more productive of good than usually experienced in these churches. Two or three of the smaller groups report a gain in membership of from fifty to one hundred per cent. We rejoice with them, and give the Lord all the praise. However a number of our churches have reported losses in either church membership or Sunday School attendance, with some reports of losses in both departments. There has been a small gain in church membership, for which we do thank the Lord. But the smallness of this gain should stir our hearts to a greater effort for God and souls in the months that are just ahead. It seems that the District has suffered a small loss in Sunday School attendance during the past year, which is regrettable indeed. We trust that the pasters of these churches and Sunday Schools, where a loss has been experienced, will take immediate steps to stop the leaks, and will launch a program for a progressive, forward movement at once.

Improvements: There hasn't been much done in the way of erecting new buildings, or remodeling old ones this year on the Western District. However some progress has been made in this field. On October the 30th the beautiful new church at Leesburg was dedicated by our beloved General Superintendent. This fine new building is a credit to our District. The small group of loyal Pilgrims at New Miami purchased an unfinished building, which has been converted into a splendid place of worship. This new church was dedicated on Sunday afternoon, the 9th of July. The Second Church in Springfield has nearly completed a splendid new basement church, into which they expect to move in the very near future. This will be a beautiful place of worship when completed, and a credit to our movement. The church at St. Marys has purchased a house, which, when the remodeling now under way is completed, will make a very nice parsonage. The good Pilgrims at Napoleon have spent a thousand dollars in putting in a good basement, a modern heating plant, as well as other needed improvements. Other groups have made minor changes or improvements which have added to the beauty and attractiveness of the buildings.

Suggestions for the future: During the Conference year we have traveled more miles in visiting our churches than necessary because we have tried to be with our people at their regular service time. This expense can be considerably reduced by disregarding the night of the regular service in the various churches, and taking them as they come. We would appreciate the opinion of the

Conference in regard to this matter.

Also, in this period of financial adjustment, with a considerable increase in the General Budget, as provided for by the recent General Conference, our pastors and their churches will find it still more difficult to meet their District Obligations. And, as the District Home Missionary program is usually the first to suffer because of financial shortages, I wish to suggest that this Conference make a ruling whereby each pastor in the Conference be made available for at least two full weeks of Home Missionary work, at such a time when it will least interfere with their home program. And that such pastors work under the direction of the Home Missionary Committee.

I wish to further suggest; or, may I say, strongly urge; that all our Pilgrim Churches, that are conveniently situated, put forth a real, honest effort to start a Sunday School somewhere in their city or community, with the thought of another Pilgrim Church in the near future. I am confident that this can be accomplished wherever we put forth a real, honest effort. This will also provide a way whereby our young folk may labor for the Lord, and thus grow in

grace.

During the Conference year we were authorized by the Council members on the Western District to visit each of our churches, and bring a message on District Home Missions, and to take an offering with which to purchase a new tent and the necessary equipment, to be used in this needy field. The results of these visits made it possible to purchase a new 30 x 50 tent, a sufficient number of steel folding chairs to seat the same, with all other equipment needed to put the outfit into the field. This has all been paid for. However, we are very sorry to report that, though we have been able to secure such good equipment, we haven't been able to organize a single new church in the District the past conference year.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

#### Eastern District

To the Pastors, Evangelists and Lay Delegates of the forty-sixth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Heliness Churches of the Ohio District, Greetings in the tender name of Jesus:

First, we want to thank God for the great plan of Salvation, and the gift of His dear Son for our redemption, His mercy, love and grace, that He has so graciously extended to us. This is our first experience of giving a report of this kind. It was with a sense of fear and trembling we entered into this work of supervision of the Eastern Ohio District one year ago. It was with some reluctance we gave up the pastorate of one of the finest and best churches in the District, but we had earnestly prayed that the mantle of this position would not fall upon us unless it was His will. But, we can truthfully say we had not gone far until we found we were in God's divine will through the providential leadings of the Holy Spirit. He enables us to go forward, and His promise was verified "That all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." The Lord revealed Himself in many ways. Our experiences have been varied and numerous, but the Lord has been very near and gracious to us. This in many respects has been the greatest year in our life.

Then too, we do not have words to express our appreciation for the kind reception the Pastors and the Churches have given us. We have enjoyed the Christian fellowship with saints everywhere and we are praying the Lord will

reward everyone for their kind words and deeds.

Second, we feel confident that the District has gone forward in every department of the work of the church. This, of course speaks for itself. A number of the Sunday Schools have increased in their attendance, members have been added to the Church. We believe we have as spiritual a people as you will find anywhere. They hold to the old fashioned Bible lines and say Amen to the truth. It has thrilled our hearts many times and caused us to weep with joy to hear the saints pray and bembard the skies and receive answers to their prayers.

Then too, the Zone Leaders of our Districts have been faithful and enthusiastic. The Young People's Zone Rallies have enjoyed this year the largest attendance to the Rallies than they ever have before. We have some of the finest youth can find anywhere. I only wish time and space would permit

me to tell in detail the activities of our youth.

Then too, our pastors are self-sacrificing men and women as they observe their flocks, and feed the sheep and the lambs. Many of them labor with their hands to keep in the ministry, for a number of our churches are small and are not self supporting. But most of our larger churches had but a small beginning, so there are bright prospects of our smaller churches to become large through the sacrificing labors of our Godly men and women.

Third: Dedication Services. On September 18, 1949 we dedicated a fine new church building in Radcliff, a small village 11 miles southeast of McArthur on State Route 160. This church was built by a sacrificing people under the

leadership of Rev. L. F. Knight.

On December 4, we assisted in dedicating the fine parsonage in Jackson, free from debt, where Rev. H. E. Osborn resides.

On April 16 we had the privilege of dedicating a beautiful church in Perrysburg where Rev. Dale Jones is pastor. This beautiful church adds grace and beauty to the city and community in which it is built. It was made possible by the Pastor, Rev. Jones and Rev. Ray Richards and the sacrificing people and friends of the church.

On July 2 we dedicated an addition built to the Port Clinton Church where Rev. Lercy Stewart is pastor. This addition includes Sunday School rooms, a portion of which can be used to enlarge the auditorium, also a church office. The church was also redecorated inside and out. This fine addition adds much to the church.

On July 16 we had the privilege of meeting with the fine Pilgrims at Bremen where Rev. Herbert Taylor is pastor. This good group of Pilgrims have re-

modeled and enlarged their church until it is a very beautiful and attractive place to worship. The thing that adds the greatest beauty to it is the fine spirit that prevails there. The house was literally packed at this dedication and it was a regular camp meeting.

Fourth: New Churches. By the help of the Lord and the aid of our good

pastors we have organized three new churches.

On May 28 we organized a new church at Green's Run with ten members. This church was made possible through the efforts and labors of Rev. Virgil Lanning. God is blessing this new church and they are making progress.

On July 9 we organized a new church in McConnelsville. A beautiful city along the Muskingum River, with 14 members. It was at this place where our new tent was first pitched. This tent was made possible by one of our Christian brethren and evangelist, Rev. K. C. Vance. The new organization was effected by the labours of Rev. Mrs. Cleona Wright who preached faithfully in the tent and saw some old fashioned conversions. Much of the ground work can be attributed to Sister Frank Davis, a former Pilgrim who would not rest until she saw a Pilgrim Church in McConnelsville. Pray for them for they are somewhat handicapped at this present time for a building to worship in. The ex-mayor of the city is in sympathy with this new work and is giving his assistance to help them obtain a building to worship in. On July 30 we organized a new church with 7 members on Angel Ridge about 7 miles southeast of Athens. This entirely new project was launched by our Nelsonville Youth Zone leader and pastor at New Marshfield and East Caanan, Novel E. Russell. For some time the Lord had laid this place on his heart and he investigated and found the people were hungry for the gospel and a church, so the new tent was pitched there and through the faithful labours and preaching of Rev. Russell and a number of the Nelsonville Zone Youth and ministers who stood loyally by Brother Russell a new organization was effected. Land has been donated for a new church and a cemetery. Plans are being made for a new church building.

A new Sunday School and a preaching point was made possible by the prayers and labors of Rev. Wm. Maffin, in Kimberly, a small coal mining village where the Lord laid it upon someone's heart last winter to call for Bro. Maffin and open a Sunday School. Bro. Maffin responded to the call, and immediately the School Board opened one of their large rooms in the school and furnished heat and light for the same, and a fine Sunday School has been in operation ever since on Sunday afternoons and preaching service on Friday

night.

New Church Buildings: After several attempts of a permanent church building in Sandusky, a beautiful new church is now in the process of being built of Art Rock Block. This building when completed will grace the community in which it stands. Rev. Stanley Dean is the pastor.

Also our good Pilgrims in Portsmouth 2nd have outgrown their present building and are building a new church on a fine corner lot not far from their

present location. Rev. Otto Smith is the Pastor.

The church in Danville is building new Sunday School rooms which also can be used to enlarge their auditorium. Rev. and Mrs. Howard Williams are the pastors.

A number of churches have made some extensive repair, also some interior and exterior painting has been done.

#### REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

SALARIES . . . . .

#### No. 1. District Superintendents

- A. Be it resolved that each District Superintendent be paid the salary of \$3,000.00 plus 5 cents per mile traveling expenses together with a parsonage and telephone.
- B. We recommend that the Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the District work, be authorized to secure the services of his assistant. Further, we recommend that the Assistant be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 5 cents per mile traveling expense for his services.
- C. Be it resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 50c per member per year to liquidate the district parsonage indebtedness.

#### No. 2. Conference Treasurer's and Secretary's Salary

Be it resolved that the Conference Treasurer's salary be \$600.00, and the Conference Secretary's salary be \$200.00.

#### No. 3. Statistician's Salary

Be it resolved that the Statistician's salary be \$50.00.

#### No. 4. Education Committee Expense

Be it resolved that the Education Committee be given the amount of \$50.00 per member per year.

#### No. 5. Young People's Financial

- A. Be it resolved that all the Young People be urged to place all their tithe in their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent the District Y.P.S. treasurer must be over and above their tithe.
- B. That each one contribute the equivalent of \$10.00 per church or society annually, to be applied on the expense of the State Y. P. Rally.
- That our State Pilgrim Youth News Bulletin be placed on a subscription basis. Single copies at 50c per year, 10 copies to one address 35c per copy per year. All subscriptions are to expire at the end of the Conference year.

#### No. 6. Camp and Conference

- A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to alleviate the financial obligations of the Camp Meeting.
- We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly remunerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.

#### No. 7. Ways and Means Committee

- A. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.
- That our active ministers' children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.
- C. We recommend that all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge.

This does not apply to ministers or their wives.

Each Church and Y. P. Society should take a good liberal offering to provide the expense of the delegate while attending the Conference.

#### No. 8. Pastoral Duties

- A. Resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this District until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the District in the program of his local Church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local churches.

#### No. 9. General Budget

A. We recommend that the Manual provision for the division of the General Budget be adopted by our conference.

\$2.00 for Foreign Missions

1.00 for General Church Extension

1.00 for General Administration Expense

.25 for General Sunday School Extension

.75 for Senior College

.50 for General Church Extension Loan Fund

"If the local church does not properly divide the money, the Conference treasurer is authorized to do so." Sec. 127, Peragraph 12.

"No church is permitted to specify funds until its monthly quota for general interest is paid."

- B. Be it resolved that we raise 15 cents per member per year to take care of the General Conference Expense.
- C. Be it resolved that each church raise at least 25c per member per year for our zone school.
- D. We recommend that the General budget be raised monthly in the Sunday School or church, taking any Sunday thought best for the offering.
- E. Be it resolved that we request the General Board to send a deputational worker to visit our local churches and assist the pastors in raising Conference Home Missionary and General Budget funds.

#### No. 10 District Budget

- A. Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interests of the church by their tithes and offerings, and that all gross receipts of the local church, excepting General Church Budget, Conference, Home Missionary funds, evangelistic support, and building funds, be tithed, the same to be forwarded to the Conference treasurer.
- B. Be it resolved that one dollar and a quarter (\$1.25) per member, per year, in addition to all birthday offerings, be raised annually to constitute our Conference Home Missionary Fund.
- C. Inasmuch as the provision to date is inadequate to care for the financial obligations of the Camp Grounds, be it resolved that we ask the local churches to raise the equivalent of one dollar (\$1.00) per member, per year, to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, the same to be applied on the upkeep of the Camp Grounds.

#### No. 11. Auditing of Treasurer's Books

Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the Conference Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 20, and prior to the convening of the Annual Conference.

#### No. 12 Insuring the Treasurer.

We recommend that the Council be requested to have the Conference Treasurer insured.

#### No. 13. Cost of Minutes

Because the printing expense has increased, be it resolved that the price of the Conference Minutes be 35c per copy.

#### No. 14. Bible School Trustee Expense

Be it resolved that the Treasurer shall pay from conference funds, the fare of the Owosso Bible College Trustees from Ohio, to and from the Trustee meetings.

#### No. 15. Church Extension Loans

Inasmuch as many of our churches are struggling to enlarge and improve their buildings, be it resolved that our Church Extension Board loan from their funds at 6 per cent interest, such loans not to exceed five years.

#### No. 16. Additional Land

Be it resolved that the District Council be authorized to investigate and if arrangements can be made, to acquire additional land to be added to our present camp grounds. Further, that this additional land project be financed on the same plan as the District parsonage was.

# REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

#### No. 1

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.

#### No. 2

Be it resolved that the Council nominate two or more candidates for the office of Conference Treasurer.

#### No. 3

We recommend that all matters of salaries of Conference officers be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss said matters after election.

Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office, when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of his own pocket.

#### No. 4

We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers, in so far as possible, take the correspondence course leading to ordination from Owosso, or some other school approved by the Educational Committee.

#### No. 5

Inasmuch as there is so much disturbance on the Camp Ground during camp, be it resolved that some one who is acquainted with our people be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep the peace, and that he be paid for his services. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Committee.

#### No. 6

The Council shall appoint two or more ladies to act as matrons in the girls' dormitory, during the Young People's Convention and Camp Meeting.

#### No. 7

A. Be it resolved that if a room is furnished and rent paid by the pastor, he shall have full authority of that room. If he does not intend to occupy the room during the camp it shall be turned over to the Camp Secretary, unless he has authorized other campers to occupy the room.

B. Further, that all who rent a room or cot at camp furnish their own

linen.

#### No. 8

Be it resolved that the Conference Council and the Camp Ground Board meet in joint session and the duties of the Camp Ground Committee be outlined to them and they be subject to the Council.

#### No. 9

- A. Be it resolved that young people attending the Young People's State Convention must be approved by their local church board and a statement be issued and signed by the church secretary and pastor, and a meal ticket be issued by the Y. P. Executive Secretary, otherwise they pay full fare for their entertainment.
- B. Only active and associate members of local Y. P. Societies and young people in our churches shall be invited to attend with free entertainment our State Y. P. Convention. Only active members are permitted to vote in the business meeting.
- C. Be it resolved that Conference Superintendents, the Y. P. Executive Secretary, the Y. P. Executive Treasurer and the Editor of Pilgrim Youth constitute a Conference Young People's Committee.

#### No. 10

- A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our Conference with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School Committee recommends the state conference provide for a Conference Sunday School Committee or Board to promote Sunday School interests in the District, and to coperate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee or board be appointed by the council, and that the superintendents be members of said board.
- B. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Convention be held in each Zone the same to be under the supervision of the Superintendent. Furthermore, that the Conference Sunday School Committee shall appoint committees in the various zones of the Conference to work under the supervision of the superintendent.

#### No. 11

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership—therefore we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

#### No. 12-A.

Be it resolved that each pastor or charge in the Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local Churches of the above action and send application blanks.

#### B.

Resolved that every church in the Ohio Conference grant its pastor a two weeks' vacation with pay, if pastor so desires.

Be it resolved that no pastor shall hold more than two revivals outside of his local church during the church year.

#### No. 13

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

#### No. 14

- A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the Conference and General Interests, and said cards be forwarded to pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local church for District or General Budget be sent by the local treasurer directly to the Conference Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The Conference Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their budgets, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

#### No. 15

Resolved that the conference year end July 15th, that the Conference Treasurer's books close July 20th, and all churches in order to get their credit, must have their monies in by that date.

#### No. 16

Report blanks shall be sent to all licensed and ordained ministers and deaconesses by July 15. That all reports of same be sent to the Statistician by July 25. If any fail to send this report by August 1, he must answer to the Council and give the reasons why he failed to do so.

#### No. 17

Be it resolved that when the District Superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting the church, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.

#### No. 18

Whereas Bible Holiness Seminary of Owosso, Michigan, is the Bible School for our zone and in order that we may better acquaint our people with our Bible School, and that we give due recognition to it:

Be it resolved that the 2:30 P. M. service on the second Friday of the Camp be given over to the president of the Bible Holiness Seminary, during which he shall present the work and the needs of the Bible School.

#### No. 19

Be it resolved that our Conference go on record as favoring the Pilgrim Pension Plan as presented. We leave it optional with each church as to whether they wish to participate or not, and for further study.

#### No. 20

Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School in their churches.

#### No. 21

Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister of the Conference, that the Conference Secretary be given the information immediately, and that he notify the other pastors of the District.

#### No. 22

Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church.

#### No. 23

Be it resolved that the District shall enroll the Superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.

#### No. 24

Whereas the present provision for Conference Home Missionary work has not proved workable, be it resolved that the Council call upon some qualified pastors to carry on the Home Missionary work.

#### No. 25

Be it resolved that the Ohio District become the Ohio Conference with the Eastern and Western Districts of same, having one camp and one conference to

be held at Springfield. Each District to have their respective Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent, each Superintendent to be paid an equal salary.

#### No. 26

Be it resolved that the Eastern and the Western District shall elect their own Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent.

#### No. 27

Inasmuch as there is Manual provision, be it resolved that our council consist of the elected officers and seven advisory members, to be elected at each conference.

#### No. 28

Be it resolved that the Ohio Conference have a Ministerial Convention this conference year. The time and place to be determined by the Council.

#### No. 29

Be it resolved that our Ohio Churches in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Ohio Conference.

#### No. 30

Inasmuch as this present system of voting on a pastor the second prayer meeting night in May has caused so much confusion, be it resolved that this system be discontinued.

#### No. 31

Since it requires a two-thirds majority vote at the election to call a pastor, when two or more names are voted on at the same time, the vote is divided so that no one has the necessary two-thirds vote, Be it resolved that no church vote on more than one pastor at a time.

#### No. 32

Inasmuch as some of our Pastors do not receive adequate salary to meet the high cost of living, be it resolved that the District Superintendents take more interest in the support of the pastors, when the Superintendents meet with the local church boards.

#### No. 33

Be it resolved that a place on our report blanks to the District Conference be given for District Home Missions, for District parsonage, and Owosso Bible College.

#### No. 34

Whereas many of our Churches have no knowledge of our youth work, Be it resolved that space be provided in our District Minutes for the Financial and Statistical reports of zone and District Youth Activities. Same reports to be turned in to District Statistician.

#### No. 35

Whereas there has been much dissatisfaction in the delay in printing of our minutes, be it resolved that the District Council appoint one or more, if necessary, to work with District Secretary as publishing committee to assure prompt service in the printing of our minutes. The said minutes are to reach our churches not later than 60 days after Conference.

#### No. 36

In consideration of the need of District Home Missionary work, be it resolved that each pastor in the Ohio Conference be subject to a call by the Home Missionary Committee for a two weeks' Revival.

#### No. 37

Since there is need to be a closer co-operation between pastor and Superintendents in the District, be it resolved, that the District Superintendents have one or more special called meetings in each zone with all pastors and zone chairmen present. We recommend it to be a time of fellowship, instruction and council, relative to any pastoral or zone problems. Furthermore we recom-

mend that when the young people's zone is partly in the Eastern District and the Western District the details of such meetings to be worked out by the District Superintendents.

#### No. 38

Resolved that our unstationed licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the district examining board before or during the annual conference.

#### No. 39

#### Be it resolved:

- A. That we extend to our Assistant General Superintendent a vote of thanks for his Christ-like spirit and the efficient manner in which he labored as he conducted this conference.
- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendents, the District Secretary, the District Treasurer, members of the District Council, the Statistician, the Camp Ground committee, the Educational Committee, the cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the camp and conference the success and blessing they have been.
- C. That we wish to express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun and Rev. E. R. Overman for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this camp meeting and conference.
- D. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during this Camp and Conference.
