AN HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH IN THE OHIO DISTRICT

In the year of 1897 a number of consecrated Christians, believing in the doctrine of entire sanctification, met in the home of the late Rev. Martin Wells Knapp, Cincinnati, Ohio, and organized the Apostolic Holiness Union. The late Rev. Seth C. Rees was elected General Superintendent of the newly organized interdenominational work. Rev. M. W. Knapp was elected Associate Superintendent.

In a very few years it became increasingly evident that the frame work of the Union was so loosely thrown together that it would not be able to withstand the blasts of Satanic opposition that was beginning to be felt. And, with the thought of reaching out into a broader field of soul-saving evangelism, steps were taken to seek affiliation with some better established holiness work. As a help to this end the Rev. George B. Kulp of Battle Creek, Michigan, the General Superintendent of the International Apostolic Holiness Church, was invited to meet the members of the Union in the city of Cincinnati. This meeting resulted in the Union becoming a part of the church, and was later known as the Ohio District of the Apostolic Holiness Church.

The first Annual Conference, or Convention, of which there is any record, was held in Cincinnati, Ohio, in December of 1905. At this Convention Rev. M. G. Standley, of that city, was elected the first District Superintendent. The first District Secretary was Ethel Scott of Cincinnati, with Mrs. Hattie Hittle of Rossburg being elected as the first District Treasurer.

These early years of the newly organized District were remembered by the ministers and laymen as difficult, discouraging, and financially lean. The first annual report of the District Treasurer gives us the grand total of \$62.51 as the sum she received for the work on the District that first year of the infant District. The first District Council was composed of the following persons. Rev. M. G. Standley, District Superintendent; Assistant Superintendent A. J. Furstemberger; District Secretary Ethel Scott; District Treasurer Mrs. Hattie Hittle; Additional members Rev. C. D. Overly, Rev. J. F. Knapp, and Rev. F. T. Fuge.

In those early days the growth of the new District was so slow that the Annual Convention minutes of 1912 informs us that only nine ministers and laymen attended this Convention, which was held in the church at Napoleon, Ohio. Some idea may be gotten of the financial distress of some of the pastors reporting at this gathering. Rev. John V. Coleman, pastor at Cecil reported he got five dollars per month at that place. Rev. C. B. Raisch reported he received three dollars per month at Mt. Sterling as his salary. Rev. W. A. Lockwood tells us he received the sum of two dollars per month for his labors at South Webster. It seems that the ministers of the early church were well versed in the art of sacrifice. They shall not lose their reward.

By the time of the 1913 Annual Convention the District Superintendent reported some forty licensed and ordained ministers in the District. He also reported a new financial setup that he felt would be fruitful. The offering for Foreign Missions that year amounted to the sum of \$360.00, the first offering for that cause reported up until that time.

By 1914 the total membership in the Ohio District 326 in the twelve organized churches. A fraction better than 27 members per church. A property value of \$7,650.00 was reported also at the 1914 Convention. At this time it was reported that the Sunday Schools enjoyed an enrollment of 477, or an average of 39 plus in each organized church. It was at this Convention that the first Ministerial Examining Board was provided. That first Exm. Board consisted of the following men: Rev. Emerson Smith, Rev. J. F. Knapp, and Rev. Frank Simpson. The report of the District Treasurer gives the sum received from the District that last year as \$114.39.

During these years all annual reports of the pastors, Sunday School, and churches, were read to the Convention, either by the pastor of their respective charge, or by the church delegate. The reading of these annual reports took most of the time of the Convention. Some of the pastors reporting at the 1916 Convention were Rev. C. C. McNall, Rev. H. E. Uhrig, Rev. J. V. Coleman, Rev. R. P.

and, "Their works do follow them". It was about this time that the Annual Convention made a ruling that each minister pay the sum of \$2.00 per quarter toward the support of the District Superintendent, and that each layman give the sum of twenty-five cents per quarter for the same purpose. This system gave him the sum of \$412.00 as a support for that Convention year, which was the best support received by any Superintendent up until that year.

At the 1917 Convention, the time for same was set to be in August, instead of mid-winter, as in the past. The pastors year was to begin the first of August thereafter. Up until this time the pastors were coming and going throughout the year. At this Convention the pastors and churches were required to make a quarterly report; the District Superintendent doing the same. The following is a typical report of the Superintendent: "During the quarter I visited all the churches in the District. Found most of the churches in a fairly good condition, and all except McLuney with regular pastors. I preached on the District 42 times, and held three quarterly meetings. Some thirty or more sought the Lord, most of them Fitch, and Rev W. A. Lockwood. All of whom have gone on to be with their Lord, praying through. Received from the preachers in the District \$38.00. From the churches in the District \$138.59. Signed, C. C. McNall."

The annual report of the Superintendent was comparatively short in those days, often containing less than two hundred words. Quite a difference from the two thousand word reports heard in recent years.

At the time of the 1918 Annual Assembly we learn that there were sixteen churches in the District. Thirty-one ordained ministers, twenty-seven licensed ministers, and seven deaconesses. There were thirty ministerial and lay delegates in attendance at this Assembly..

Following the Assembly of 1918 the District began to show signs of going forward. As an example the annual report of 1920 show that we had thirty churches which was almost double the number reported in 1918. There were nearly one hundred ministered registered at that Assembly, whereas there were only fifty-eight in 1918. Finances were beginning to show a decided upward trend at this time also.

At the General Assembly of 1922, held in the first church at Cincinnati, the Pilgrim Church, located largely in Calif., united with the International Holiness Church. At this Assembly the name of the church was changed to the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

It had been the custom down across the years to hold an Assembly business meeting in the morning and afternoon, and have an evangelistic service in the evening. However, during the 1923 Assembly that custom was abandoned, and we held three business meetings daily as of today. This 1923 Assembly was held in Chillicothe, preceded by a splendid tent meeting, with Rev. Seth C. Rees as the evangelist. As I recall Brother Rees was with us also the first day of the Assembly.

Early in the Spring of 1924 the District Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church in Ohio, met with the official board of the Pentecostal Brethren in Christ, and steps were taken that resulted in this fine group of Holiness folk uniting with the Pilgrim Holiness Church at the Annual Assembly the following August, at Napoleon, Ohio. With this union we secured the present camp grounds at Sugar Grove Hill, near Springfield. The Pilgrims held their first camp and conference at Sugar Grove Hill the following summer, or in August of 1925. At the new location we reported 46 churches, with a membership of better than fifteen hundred. There were sixty-five ordained ministers, forty-one licensed ministers, and eleven deaconesses. This year the District Superintendent recieved the sum of \$1668.00 as a salary for the conference year.

At the Annual Conference of 1927 we have the first report of the District Treasurer for seeral years. This report shows that the District Treasurer received the sum of \$3,190.49, the largest sum repoted to this date. The succeeding yeas show a constant upward swing in the funds received from year to year. As an example the Treasurer's report three years later shows he received the sum of \$6,817.56, or more than twice the sum received in 1927. In the 1930 Conference, sixty organized churches were reported with a total membership of 1928. The salary of the District Superintendent had risen by this time to \$2,400.00 per year. And the Sunday School enrollment was 2930.

By the time of the Annual Assembly of 1931 the church began to feel the pinch of the depression. Salaries were cut to the near starvation point, and thousands were on government relief. It was under this terrible condition that the Pilgrims, both pastors and people, demonstrated their faith in God, and the ability to carry on the work of the Lord under the most trying circumstances. Not a single pastor resigned because of the bad financial condition, and the church and Sunday School attendance continued to advance. Just a single notation as to the financial condition of those dark days, the District Superintendent reported to the 1931 Assembly that his support for the year, after paying rent on a place to live, as well as taking care of his traveling expenses, he had the sum of \$611.23 on which to live for the year. This was the conditions under which the Pilgrim ministers labored in those dark days, of the depression. In spite of the distressing circumstances of that time we find that each Assembly year we were able to organize from three to five new churches. The reason was that our pastors and people gave freely of their time to Home Missionary effort.

As the depression began to wane we find that a more progressive attitude was being demonstrated by the Ohio Pilgrims. The District Treasurer reported a nice gain in District funds, with a total of \$10,630.88 sent in by the different churches for District expenses. The Superintendent reported a gain of seven newly organized churches for the Assembly year, with a considerable increase in total membership. This was in 1936.

By 1938 the number of churches in the Ohio District had risen to 70, with some Missions expecting to become Pilgrim churches in the near future. The membership by that date had risen to 2567. At this time there were 78 ordained and licensed ministers, and 18 deaconesses. The top salary to any pastor this year was \$1,573.26, at Springfield. And the smallest salary paid the pastor by any church was \$57.14, paid the pastor at Richwood. At this Assembly a house was provided for the District Superintendent for the first time, also the sum of \$400.00 was provided as traveling expenses, for the first time. At this time the District Secretary was receiving the sum of \$35.00 as a salary, and the District Treasurer received the sum of \$150.00 per year. In 1940 these salaries were raised to \$50.00 for the Secretary and \$200.00 for the Treasurer. During the next few years there was a steady increase in all departments of the church work. Several new churches were organized, and an annual increase in the total membership. As an example the Treasurer reported an income to the District fund a grand total of \$24,170.60 in 1942 against \$18,379.55 at the 1939 Assembly.

By 1943 there were 92 churches in the District. A membership of 3354. 233 ordained and licensed ministers. The salaries of the pastors had climbed to \$88,333.01, with a total offering in all the churches on the District of \$204,304.68. As we look back across the years to those lean days when the District was young, this seemed like a fortune. By this time the salary of the District Superintendent had been raised to \$3,000.00, with other salaries accordingly.

By 1944 the District income had risen to better than \$46,000.00, and steps were taken at that Conference to start a new tabernacle. \$5,000.00 was provided at that Conference for that purpose, and with \$5,000.00 set aside the preceeding Conference, the tabernacle was started in the Spring of 1945. The building was to be eighty feet wide and one hundred and twenty feet long, with the roof supported with steel arches. In connection with the new tabernacle the 1944 Annual Conference had instructed the District Council to construct a combination dining hall and dormitory. This building was to be thirty feet wide, and better than a hundred feet long. Consequently we have a building with a full basement in which boys and men are roomed during the camp and Conference. A ground floor dining hall that will set nearly three hundred persons at one time, a second floor with rooms for a number of married couples, and an attic where girls and women are roomed. The District Council had already been instructed to secure a house for the District Superintendent, and as suitable homes were so expensive, it was decided to build a District parsonage at this time. So during the conference year of 1945-1946 the new tabernacle, a District parsonage and the dining hall were built, with at least eighty-five per cent of the labor donated.

By the time of the Annual Conference of 1949 the District had grown to the extent it was felt advisable to divide the District into two Districts. The division was made along Federal route 23, beginning at Portsmouth on the South, and ending at Toledo at the North end. East of route 23, including the towns and cities through

which 23 ran, was to be known as the Eastern District, and West of route 23, with the exceptions mentioned, was to be the Western District, giving each District fifty-one churches at the time of the division. To care for the housing needs of the new Superintendent on the Eastern District a splendid home was purchased in the northern end of the city of Columbus. This plan has proved to be workable, with a greater spirit of aggressiveness very much in evidence. And at the 1954 Annual Conference the conference voted to request the General Board to grant Ohio the privilege of becoming two separate Conferences hereafter.

At the close of the 1954 Conference we have one hundred and twenty-two churches, a total membership of 3500, an annual income of better than a half million dollars, with good substantial buildings, both churches and parsonages, and a ministry that is consecrated to the work of God and the church, and there isn't any reason why we should not go forward in the years that lie ahead as never in the past.

At the time of the division of the District Rev. B. A. Awe was elected Superintendent of the Eastern District, and Rev. L. H. Roberts Superintendent of the Western District, Rev. Paul Lucas 1953 Western District.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Siting, Monday Morning, July 26, 1954

The 50th Annual Conference of the Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened July 26, 1954 at 8:30 A.M. Rev. B. A. Awe brought the Conference to order and we all enjoyed the wonderful Spirit of the Lord in the devotions as Rev. Melvin Stiverson led the singing with Sister John Sturk at the organ. The congregation lustily sang, "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms", and "Love Divine".

After several spoken prayer requests, Rev. J. R. Siders led in prayer. The Spirit of God was very near and we arose from our knees singing, "There's not a Friend like the Lowly Jesus".

The Conference was preceded by a glorious Camp Meeting in which we celebrated our Jubilee Year. Rev. Z. T. Johnson gave deep Bible Truths on Holiness in the day services, and Rev. J. Wesley Adcock delivered mighty messages which brought conviction to the hearts of many needy souls in the evening services. Max and Barbara Hamilton were greatly used of God in their ministry as Song Evangelist. The Altar was lined time after time. Upon request of Dr. Sturk, the third sitting was opened with prayer by Rev. Harold Osborn.

A motion was made and supported that we amend the main proposition before us as follows:

1. That we request of the General Church the privilege of dividing next year and

2. That a financial plan be instituted this year, looking forward to separating the Camps or enlarging the facilities in three years.

The proposed amendment was amended by a motion that the boundary line be fixed by the Executive Council of the General Board. This amendment to the amendment lost.

A motion to substitute the amendment by amending articles No. 10 and 11 carried.

A motion calling for the previous question was supported but was withdrawn.

A standing vote was taken, and the main motion as amended carried.

A motion to amend article No. 2 carried.

By common consent it was agreed to hear Dr. Surbrook concerning Owosso Bible College.

A motion to recess for ten minutes carried.

Returning after recess, Rev. A. L. Davis led in singing a verse of the song, "Higher Ground".

Dr. W. L. Surbrook, president of Owosso Bible College, presented the proposed plan to incorporate Owosso Bible College as a Zone School.

After a thorough presentation of the matter, and full opportunity for questions, a motion carried to defer voting on the proposition until morning because of expiration of time.

A motion setting the time for elections at 9:30 in the morning carried.

The evening sitting was dismissed by all standing and shaking hands.

Fourth Sitting Tuesday Morning

Rev. Awe called the Conference to order and Rev. Roy Ankrim led in singing, "Glory to His Name".

Rev. Paul Lucas called on Rev. James Payton to lead in prayer after which Bro. Lucas led in singing a verse of "The Haven of Rest".

Dr. L. W. Sturk took charge and admonished us to seek the mind of God in the deliberations of the day.

A motion was carried to set aside last years ruling concerning holding the Ordination Service on Tuesday morning and that it be held at 2:00 P.M.

A motion carried to rescind the action of last night, setting the time for elections at 9:30 A.M., and that the matter of the school be considered. Also that we hear the necessary committee reports which might have bearing on the election and that we proceed with the election as soon as this business is cleared.

A motion was supported to adopt the By-laws of Owosso Bible College as presented by Bro. Surbrook.

A motion was supported to defer action until next conference year and that it be brought to consideration at that time.

A motion calling for the previous question carried.

The motion to defer was lost, thus bringing the main motion before us.

A motion calling for the previous question carried.

The main motion which referred to the adopting of the By-laws of Owosso Bible College was lost.

The Resolutions Committee reported.

Resolution No. 3 relative to equalization of Council members was tabled.

A motion was supported that we reconsider the action of last night concerning the division of the Conference.

Upon being called to a point of order the Chair ruled this to be a proper motion.

A motion to appeal the decision of the chair was supported but lost.

A motion to limit debate to the thirty-six minutes remaining before the lunch hour and that the vote be taken at that time, passed.

A motion carried to limit debate for each speaker to two minutes.

At the appointed time a vote was taken on the main resolution which carried.

By expiration of time we adjourned for lunch.

Fifth Sitting Tuesday Afternoon

Dr. L. W. Sturk brought the Conference to order and Rev. Orville Awe led in singing, "What a Friend". We united in prayer with Rev. Charles Hook leading.

The secretary read the minutes of the morning sitting which were approved.

Bro. Lucas appointed the following tellers in preparation for the election of officers: W. L. Kilwy, Ralph Hitesman, Clayton Coulter and Earl Wachenschwanz.

Bro. Davis appointed the following tellers: Roy Ankrim, H. R. Cartwright, W. F. Crum and J. L. Dean.

The Conference was divided to cast ballots for the District Superintendents.

Bro. Sturk led us in prayer asking God's direction in this election.

Rev. Paul Lucas was elected Superintendent of the Western District.

Rev. B. A. Awe was elected Superintendent of the Eastern District.

Rev. Awe gave an acceptance speech in which he stressed the importance of being spiritual. He set some goals which are as follows: To preach and live Holiness; That the pastor's begin now with District and General budgets and District tithe; He urged the low ministerial salary churches to build a constructive plan to get their church in a higher bracket; and That we become more home missionary minded. It will mean sacrifice but this is the only way we will get Christ and the gospel to a dying world. He closed by saying, "Your vote of confidence is greatly appreciated and we promise to serve you to the best of our ability."

Rev. Lucas expressed to the Conference that he appreciated the splendid vote and fine co-operation that has been given him throughout the year. He too, plead for deep spirituality and that we might keep God's glory upon us.

Each district cast ballots for its Assistant Superintendent.

Rev. R. D. Brown was elected Assistant Superintendent of the Western district and accepted.

Rev. A. L. Davis was elected Assistant Superintendent of the Eastern district and accepted.

The Conference read the names of those who had been nominated by the District Council for the office of Conference Secretary which were, Harold Monroe, C. E. Jones and Virgil Lashbrook.

Rev. Harold Monroe was re-elected.

The Conference Secretary read the names of those who had been nominated by the District Council for the office of Conference Treasurer which were O. E. Rutledge, Earl McKinney and William Brown.

Rev. O. E. Rutledge was elected Conference Treasurer and accepted. He presented the plan that the churches should use in sending in their church budgets.

The vote was cast for the Councilman at Large and Rev. J. R. Siders was elected.

The Conference cast ballots for the three Advisory Council members from each respective district.

A motion was made and carried to recess for ten minutes.

One advisory member was elected from the Western District which was Rev. Earl McKinney.

A motion carried to vote on two of the next four highest names which were: W. L. Kilwy, L. R. Roberts, Virgil Caudill and Earl Wachenschwanz.

The Stone family favored the Conference with a special song. God richly blessed.

Rev. B. H. Pugh, Rev. Raymond Simpson and Rev. William Brown were elected as Advisory Council members from the Eastern District.

Rev. L. R. Roberts and Rev. W. L. Kilwy were elected as additional Advisory Council members from the Western District.

The Secretary read the names of those who had been nominated by the

District Council for the Examining Board which were: E. G. Marsh, Helena Sanholt and John Sturk. Ballots were cast for the above office and Rev. E. G. Marsh was re-elected.

A motion prevailed to elect Bro. McKinney as Conference Sunday School Promotional Secretary by acclamation, which was heartily done.

The following Committees were appointed by the District Superintendents: Memorial, Reception, Ways and Means and Resolutions.

Rev. O. M. Awe was appointed as Statistician.

The names of the nominees for the board of trustees of Owosso Bible College was read to the Conference. They were Rev. R. D. Brown and Rev. A. L. Davis. The Conference ratified these nominations.

A motion to have the Ordination Service at 6:00 P.M. passed.

The Resolutions Committee reported.

Resolution No. 2 Lost.

Resolution No. 4 was read and a motion to adopt was supported.

The sitting was adjourned by expiration of time.

Sixth Sitting Tuesday Evening

Bro. Sturk brought the Conference to order and asked the following brethren to come to the platform to form the Ordination Committee: Rev. B. A. Awe, Rev. Paul Lucas, Rev. O. E. Rutledge, Rev. L. R. Roberts and Rev. A. L. Davis.

The Secretary read the names of those the Examining Board and the District Council recommended for Ordination, which were, Harry Russell, Edward Beard, Ogle Yates, John Minsker for ordained ministers and Opal Ives for ordained Deaconess.

Rev. Norval Rickner of the Reception Committee presented Rev. and Mrs. John Minsker and Rev. and Mrs. Harold Osborn Jr. to the Conference. Bro. Sturk gave then the right hand of fellowship inviting them to give their testimony. After hearing them Bro. Sturk asked that they have an honorary seat in the Conference Bar.

The Ordination Service was opened with Rev. A. L. Davis leading in singing, "A Charge To Keep I Have" with Sister Richard Powell at the piona. Rev. L. R. Roberts read scripture taken from I Tim. 3:1-13 and Rev. B. A. Awe read II Tim. 4:1-8.

Rev. Paul Lucas prayed, asking God's blessings upon this service.

Dr. L. W. Sturk gave the ordination address, using as a text, "Thoroughly furnished unto all good work." His subject was, "The Qualifications of Pilgrim Preachers." He said, "If you would succeed, you must be well established in a second definite work of grace and clear in your thinking. You must have a right heart, a clear conception of God's word, and settled convictions, and That you be yourself in the Holy Ghost. Be clean spiritually, morally and physically. Beware of little sins, namely, jealousy, criticism and indolence. Be a friend, love the children and young people; be humble, there is no room for exaltation and pride. Carry a burden for souls. Have some feed for your sheep. Be a student of the Word of God. He said also we are ordaining you to be true to the trust God has given you. Love, serve, preach and pray so that you may be able to reach the Great Beyond."

At the close of Dr. Sturk's message the candidates knelt at the altar while the Ordination Committee gathered around and laid hands upon them, praying that they would be true to the trust placed in them as they labor in God's great Harvest Field. God's presence was very near as the loved ones and Conference friends gathered about to wish them God's speed. We enjoyed sweet fellowship as the service closed singing, "Blest Be The Tie That Binds."

The Secretary of the Resolutions Committee re-read resolution No. 4 concerning the Youth Camp which was before the Conference at the previous sitting.

A motion to amend the proposition before us by extending the time of the regular youth Convention to begin on Tuesday, carried.

The resolution as amended carried.

Resolution No. 5. Carried.

The Evangelists attending the Conference were presented and the names of those absent were read.

A motion to recommend our evangelists by special listing in our minutes. Carried.

The Ways and Means Committee reported.

No. 1. The motion to adopt was supported.

A motion was made and supported to substitute the figures and system of last year for the new proposal.

The motion to substitute carried.

The substitute motion carried.

No. 2. Carried.

No. 3. was amended and carried.

No. 4. Lost.

No. 5. Carried.

No. 6. Carried.

No. 7. Motion was supported to adopt.

A substitute motion was supported, that a time be set by Council for a special offering for this need and that the Conference Secretary write each church informing them of this date.

The motion to substitute carried.

The substitute motion carried.

The report of the Memorial Committee was accepted by the Conference standing in silent prayer.

The pastoral appointments were read.

The Resolutions Committee reported.

Resolution No. 12 Carried.

Motion to write station manager WIZE a letter of appreciation carried.

It was suggested that the Conference send greetings to Bro. Fields and Bro. Skillings.

Motion carried to leave any and all unfinished business in the hands of the Council.

Motion for adjournment followed with special prayer for the sick led by Rev. B. A. Awe.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

No 1 Conference Division

Be it resolved that this Conference approve the division of the Ohio Conference into two separate districts, and

(In accordance with General Board Memorial No. 8 of the mimeographed supplement to the printed memorials to the 1954 General Conference and passed by said Conference), that our District Council prepare and adopt for presentation to the Executive Council of the General Church a resolution stating our desire to separate and setting forth the following plan of separation:

- A. That the names of the proposed new districts shall be Western Ohio District and Eastern Ohio District;
- B. That the boundary line between such districts shall be the present U. S. Highway No. 23, running North and South from Toledo to Portsmouth, and that all cities, towns and villages on said boundary line, to the extent of their present corporation limits, shall be a part of the Eastern Ohio District;
- C. That all property now held by the Ohio Conference, by its Trustees, or otherwise, which is located within the boundaries of the proposed new Eastern Ohio District, shall be conveyed to and become the property of the Eastern Ohio District in the manner set forth in above mentioned General Board Memorial;
- D. That all property now held by the Ohio Conference, by its Trustees, or otherwise, which is located within the boundaries of the proposed new Western Ohio District, shall be conveyed to and become the property of the Western Ohio District in the manner set forth in the above mentioned General Board Memorial, with the exception of the Ohio Conference Camp Ground, known as the Sugar Grove Camp Ground, located at Springfield, Ohio;
- E. That such property, both real and personal, shall be duly conveyed to a Camp Ground Board of Trustees, and to their successors in office, in trust for the use and benefit of the ministry and membership of the Pilgrim Holiness Church in the United States of America, subject to the Manual of said church as from

time to time revised and authorized; further that such property, both real and personal, shall be jointly and equally owned and controlled by the Western Ohio District and the Eastern Ohio District;

- F. That said Board of Trustees shall consist of eight members which shall be the Executive Council of the Western Ohio District and the Eastern Ohio District and their successors in office;
- G. That the Chairmanship of this Board of Trustees shall rotate annually between the District Superintendents of these districts;
- H. That a three-fourths vote of the members be required in decisions made by this Camp Ground Board of Trustees;
- I. That the Camp Ground Committee shall be subject to this Board of Trustees;
- J. That said Board of Trustees shall not have the power to divert this property from its intended ownership, control, or use as stated in this resolution without the authorization of the District Conference of both the Western Ohio District and the Eastern Ohio District; except if and when the Eastern District should desire a separate Camp; then an equitable division of the property shall be made.
- K. That the Pilgrim Holiness Churches of Ohio may continue to conduct union camp meeting annually on this camp ground, the details of such camp to be worked out by the Board of Trustees; until such time as other plans may become necessary.
- L. That the Western Ohio District and the Eastern Ohio District shall hold their Annual Conferences on this camp ground, the Western Ohio District Conference to precede the Annual Camp Meeting, and the Eastern Ohio District Conference to follow the Annual Camp Meeting;
- M. That the present budget provisions for this camp ground shall be maintained by each district.

Be it further resolved that the present budget provisions for the indebtedness on the Eastern District parsonage shall be maintained by both districts until such indebtedness is liquidated.

Be it further resolved that if such division is approved by the Executive Council of our General Church that the District Council shall proceed with all matters legal and otherwise which pertain to such separation;

Be it further resolved that all transfers of property and other matters which pertain to said separation shall be so timed that the election of officers of the new districts and the first annual conferences of said districts shall be held preceding and following our next Annual Camp Meeting in the manner stated above, i. e., the Western Ohio District Conference preceding the camp and the Eastern Ohio District Conference following the camp;

Be it further resolved that the monies in the District Treasury at the time of separation as districts shall be divided between the two new districts in such a manner as is deemed equitable by the District Council;

Be it further resolved that the election of District Youth Officials of the two districts shall be held at separate business meetings during the Annual Youth Convention.

No. 2 Conference Division (Old resolutions still in effect until above plan can be approved and completed).

- A. Be it resolved that the Ohio District become the Ohio Conference with the Eastern and Western Districts of same, having one cam and one conference to be held at Springfield. Each District to have their respective Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent, each Superintendent to be paid an equal salary.
- B. In as much as we have one council representing two districts, in order to have equal representation on our council: Be it resolved, that we elect the council as follows—Each district shall elect its respective superintendent and assistant. The entire conference will then elect the secretary and treasurer and one advisory member at large. Each district will then elect three additional advisory members, making a total of thirteen persons on the Advisory Council.

No. 3 Budgets

- A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the Conference and General Interests, and said cards be forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local church for District or General Budget be sent by the local treasurer direct to the Conference Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The Conference Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their budgets, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

No. 4 Camp

- A. Be it resolved that if a room is furnished and rent paid by the pastor, he shall have full authority of that room. If he does not intend to occupy the room during camp it shall be turned over to the camp secretary, unless he has authorized other campers to occupy the room.
- B. Further, that all who rent a room or cot at camp furnish their own linen.
- C. Be it resolved that any person who is transferred from our district to another district, or otherwise becomes disqualified, shall be automatically dispossessed of his room. These persons whose claims have been relinquished shall be immediately notified by the camp secretary.
- D. Inasmuch as there is so much disturbance on the camp ground during camp, be it resolved that some one who is acquainted with our people be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep the peace, and that he be paid for his services. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Committee.
- E. Be it resolved that monitors be provided for each building for the Young People's Convention, camp and conference with fair remuneration; also, that adult supervision be provided for the Young People's Convention as well as the camp.

No. 5 Camp Ground Addition

Be it resolved that the District Council be authorized to purchase the adjoining plot of ground, approximately 2½ acres in size, located N. W. of the present grounds, and if necessary pay the stated purchase price of \$7,000..

No. 6 Conference

Be it resolved that we provide services for the children during Conference.

No. 7 Conference Year

- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare his report for Conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 10th.
- B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's book close July 5th.

No. 8 Daily Vacation Bible School

Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School in their churches.

No. 9 Decease of Minister or Wife

Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister or minister's wife of the Conference, that the Conference Secretary be given the information immediately; and that he notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairmen and that they immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District for expense incurred.

No. 10 Ministers

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of the local Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Whereas the 1950 General Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study; therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under the supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study, also that pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend their District Conference. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend this District Conference.
- C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers, in so far as possible, take the correspondence course leading to ordination from Owosso, or some other school approved by the Educational Committee.
- D. Be it resolved that our unstationed licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.
- E. Be it resolved that all ministers holding first year license, who fail to attend conference and report to the Examining Board for two years in succession, unless giving a legitimate reason in writing, their names will be dropped from the minutes.

No. 11 Ministerial Benefit Association

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendents and their wives be enrolled in

the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 12 Ministerial Convention

Be it resolved that the Ohio Conference have a Ministerial Convention this conference year. The time and place is to be determined by the Council.

No. 13 Missions

- A. Whereas the present provision for Conference Home Missionary work has not proved workable, be it resolved that the council call upon some qualified pastors to carry on the Home Missionary work.
- B. In consideration of the need of District Home Missionary work, be it resolved that each pastor in the Ohio Conference be subject to a call by the Home Missionary Committee for a two weeks revival.

No. 14 Name of Church

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 15 Ordination Service

Be it resolved that the ordination service be held on Tuesday Morning.

No. 16 Owosso Bible College

- A. Whereas Owosso Bible College is the Bible School for our zone and in order that we may better acquaint our people with our Bible School, and that we might give due recognition to it: Be it resolved that the 2:30 P.M. service on the Second Friday of the camp be given over to the president of the Bible School, during which time he shall present the work and the needs of the School.
- B. Be it resolved that we elect two additional members to the board of trustees of Owosso Bible College, by request of the school.

No. 17 Pastors

- A. Be it resolved that our Ohio churches in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Ohio Conference.
- B. Since it requires a two-thirds majority vote at the election to call a pastor, when two or more names are voted on at the same time, the vote is divided so that no one has the necessary two-thirds vote; Be it resolved that no church vote on more than one pastor at a time.
- C. Inasmuch as our two districts form only one conference, be it resolved that the superintendents recommend to the churches changing pastors, all available Ohio ministers without differentiation as to the district to which they belong.
- D. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salary to meet the high cost of living; Be it resolved that the district superintendents take more interest in the support of the pastors, when the superintendents meet with the local church boards.
- E. In order that the churches may receive credit for the full amount they contribute toward pastoral support; Be it resolved that the question of whether or not the pastor's utilities are supplied be made a part of the pastor's annual report.
- F. Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the second Sunday after Camp.

No. 18 Report Blanks

- A. Be it resolved that our annual report blanks be revised taking into consideration any change in our District and General Budget set-up and part E. of Resolution No. 22 as passed by our last annual conference, and any other items deemed wise;
- B. Be it further resolved that this revision shall be made by a person or persons authorized by the District Council and such revised report blank shall be approved by them.

No. 19 Salaries

We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss said matters after election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

No. 20 Standards

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.
- C. Inasmuch as there is a tendency in the religious realm to lean toward the social rather than the spiritual; Be it resolved that the Ohio Conference go on record as supporting the Manual stand on the matter mentioned on page 47, Par. 13,

namely: "The local church board shall not permit fairs, festivals, dramatic exercises, so called sociables, nor any thing of like nature to be held in connection with the Church or any department of its work." And be it further resolved that the District Council encourage and enforce strict adherence to this in the Ohio Conference.

- D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television: Be it resolved that this resolution be placed in our Minutes urging our ministers and laity to recognize the fact that television is systematically and very subtly undermining some of the standards that our church has held for years.

No. 21 Sunday School Promotion

- A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our conference with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School Committee recommends the state conference provide for a Conference Sunday School Committee or Board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to co-operate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee or board be appointed by the council, and that the superintendents be members of said board.
- B. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Convention be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the Conference Sunday School Committee shall appoint committees in the various zones of the conference to work under the supervision of the superintendent.
- C. Inasmuch as our District Camp is a united and cooperative effort of all of our Ohio churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools

No. 22 Superintendents

- A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting the churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- B. Be it resolved that the district shall enroll the superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.
- C. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.

No. 23 Tithe

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership—therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 24 Voting

- A. Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.
- B. Be it resolved that the council nominate two or more candidates for the office of the conference treasurer.

No. 25 Youth Camp

- A. Inasmuch as the Executive Youth Committee petitioned the District Council to make provision for a youth Camp, and whereas the District Council has unanimously approved this petition, and whereas the Youth Convention has this year voted to petition this Conference to authorize the District Council and the Executive Youth Committee to proceed with the proposed Youth Camp Program; Be it resolved that this Conference authorize such a Youth Camp Program; and that this proposed Youth Camp shall be primarily of a devotional, instructive, and evangelistic nature and shall be adequately supervised by District Pastors and their wives. This Youth Camp shall precede the District Youth Convention, beginning on Tuesday evening of the same week.

No. 26 Youth Council

Inasmuch as the establishing of a Youth Camp is certain to place a heavier burden upon the Executive Youth Committee; Be it resolved that we have a District Youth Council, composed of the Executive Youth Committee and two advisory members to be appointed this Conference year by the District Council; thereafter to be elected the same as the Executive Youth Committee from the nominations made by the District Council.

No. 27 Youth Convention

- A. Be it resolved that young people attending the Young People's State Convention must be approved by their local church board and a statement be issued

- and signed by the church secretary and pastor, and a meal ticket be issued by the Y. P. Executive Secretary, otherwise they pay full fare for their entertainment.
- B. Only active and associate members of local Youth Societies and young people in our churches shall be invited to attend our State Youth Convention with free entertainment. Only active members are permitted to vote in the business meeting.
- C. Whereas many of our churches have no knowledge of our youth work; Be it resolved that space be provided in our Conference Minutes for the financial and statistical reports of zone and district youth activities, including the business transacted in the Youth Convention. This report should be turned in to the district statistician.
- No. 28 Appreciation**
Be it resolved:
- A. That we extend to our General Superintendent a vote of thanks for his Christ-like spirit and efficient manner in which he labored as he conducted this conference.
- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendents, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, members of the District Council, the Camp Ground committee, and the Educational Committee, the cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the camp and conference the success and blessing they have been.
- C. That we express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun and Rev. E. R. Overman for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this camp meeting and conference, and that a letter of appreciation be mailed to them by our Conference Secretary.
- D. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for his blessings upon us during the camp and conference.
This year's changes: 1, 5, 6, 9, 20 C. and D., 25 and 26.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

SALARIES

No. 1 District Superintendents

- A. In as much as we recognize the high cost of living and the increase of traveling expenses, we recommend the following: District Superintendents salaries \$3,500 each; 6c per mile traveling expenses; parsonage; all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.
- B. We recommend that the Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the district work, be authorized to secure the services of his assistant. Further, we recommend that the assistant be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 6c per mile traveling expense.

No. 2 District Council

We recommend that 6c per mile be given each member of the District Council when traveling to and from Council meetings.

No. 3 Conference Treasurer and Secretary

Be it resolved that the Conference Treasurer's salary be 600.00 and the Conference Secretary's salary be \$200.00.

No. 4 Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary

Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$75.00 per year.

No. 5 Educational and Examining Committee

Be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Committee be given \$65.00

BUDGETS

No. 6 General Budget

- A. We recommend that the Manual provision for the General Budget be adopted by our conference.

Total — 6.00 per member per year

35% or \$2.10 for Foreign Missions

25% or \$1.50 for General Administration

20% or \$1.20 for General Church Extension

10% or .60 for Senior College Fund

6% or .36 for Church Extension Loan Fund

4% or .24 for General Sunday School Extension and Youth Work

"If the local church does not properly divide the money, the conference treasurer is authorized to do so." Sec. 127, Par. 12.

"No church is permitted to specify funds until its monthly quota for general interests is paid."

- B. We recommend that the general budget be raised monthly in the Sunday School or church, taking any Sunday thought best for the offering.
- C. Be it resolved that we request the General Board to send a deputational worker to visit our local churches and assist the pastors in raising the Conference Home Missionary and General Budget funds.

No. 7 District budget

- A. Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interests of the church by their tithes and offerings, and that all gross receipts of the local church, excepting General Church Budget, Conference, Home Missionary funds, evangelistic support, and building funds, be tithed, the same to be forwarded to the conference treasurer.
- B. Be it resolved that we raise 15c per member per year to take care of the General Conference expense.
- C. Be it resolved that each church raise at least 25c per member per year for our zone school.
- D. Be it resolved that one dollar and a quarter (\$1.25) per member, per year, in addition to all birthday offerings, be raised annually to constitute our Conference Home Missionary Fund.
- E. In as much as the provision to date is inadequate to care for the financial obligations of the camp grounds, be it resolved that we ask the local churches to raise the equivalent of one dollar (\$1.00) per member, per year, to be forwarded to Conference Treasurer, the same to be applied on the upkeep of the camp grounds.
- F. Be it resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 50c per member per year to liquidate the district parsonage indebtedness.
- G. In as much as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and then investigate and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be omitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay the tithe.

No. 8 Newly Organized Churches

- A. Be it resolved that, with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization; one-half for the second year; and three-fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.
- B. Be it further resolved that the district budget be paid monthly.

YOUTH . . .

No. 9 Young People

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe in their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent the District Y.P.S. treasurer must be over and above their tithe.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the State Youth Convention.
- C. That our State Pilgrim Youth News Bulletin be placed on a subscription basis. Single copies at 50c per year, 10 copies sent to one address 35c per copy per year. All subscriptions are to expire at the end of the conference year.

No. 10 Monitors and police

We recommend that young people who receive free entertainment at our State Convention be required to pay a registration fee of 50c, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Furthermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

No. 11 Executive Secretary

In as much as the Executive Youth Secretary receives only a mileage fund, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks..

No. 12 Camp and conference

- A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to alleviate the financial obligation of the Camp Meeting.
- B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly remunerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.

- C. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.
- D. That our active minister's children under the age of 14 be entertained here. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.
- E. We recommend that all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives. Each church and youth society should take a good libertl offering to provide the expense of the delegate when attending the conference.

No. 13 Sinking Fund

In order that funds may be available when it becomes necessary to either add facilities on the present grounds or establish new grounds located in the Eastern Ohio District: Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church of the conference for this fund. The time of said offering shall be set by the Council.

TREASURER

No. 14 Auditing of Treasurer's Books

Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the Conference Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the Annual Conference.

No. 15 Insuring the Treasurer

We recommend that the Council be requested to have the Conference Treasurer insured.

MINUTES

No. 16 Cost of Minutes

In as much as this year's Minutes will include added features which will increase the cost. Be it resolved that the price of the Minutes shall be \$1.00 per copy.

No. 17 Preparing Minutes for Publication

Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$25.00 for his services.

DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

No. 18 District Home Missions

The Eastern District Home Missionary Committee recommends the following plan for raising funds to help support our district home missionary activities; Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church annually on the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions. This special offering will be promoted by each District according to their individual plans and needs. The money received will be sent immediately to the District Treasurer and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the District in which the money is collected. This offering will not apply on the annual budget but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report.

MINISTER'S DUTIES

No. 19 Mnister's Duties

- A. Resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local churches.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENT

No. 20 Loan Fund

In as much as many of our churches are struggling to enlarge and improve their buildings, be it resolved that our Church Boards loan from their funds at 5% interest, such loans not to exceed five years.
This Year's Changes: 1 A., 8, 11, 13 and 16.

IN MEMORIAM

The members of the Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church give honorable mention, in remembrance of those deceased during the past year.

Anna Sherman Kilwy went to be with Jesus, November 20th, 1953 in Greenville, Ohio. She was born April 2, 1915, in Sharondale, Ky., eldest child of Parasciva Yancur Sherman and the late Nicholas Sherman, Sr. It was at an early age Anna found Christ and felt called to work for Christ. She attended and graduated from Owosso Bible College, Owosso, Michigan. On September 25th, 1938 at Liberty Center, Ohio, she was married to W. L. Kilwy of Cedar, Michigan. To this union was born a baby girl, Bonnie. In 1939 Mr. and Mrs. Kilwy were ordained to the ministry by Rev. Surbrook at Springfield, Ohio. Mrs. Kilwy's ministry included several years of Home Missionary work and she served as assistant pastor, until her marriage to Rev. Kilwy, where together they pastored several churches in the Ohio District, lastly at Greenville where her labors ceased. Mrs. Kilwy stood as a sentinel against the setting sun and when she was gone there was left an empty place. She shall remain in our thoughts and hearts as one of God's true saints.

Rev. Clement E. Marion Brown, son of Hiram L. and Elizabeth Brown was born October 15, 1863 in Morgan County Ohio and passed to his heavenly home from Marion, Ohio, January 3, 1954. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

WESTERN DISTRICT

To our General Superintendent, our ministerial brethren and the lay delegates, representing the hundreds of our faithful Pilgrim co-workers in this great state of Ohio; Greetings in Jesus name.

It is with a feeling of smallness and humility that I stand before you today on this Fiftieth Anniversary of the founding of the Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Years before I was born, holy men and women of God were traveling the dirt roads, over hills and through the valleys, laying the foundation of our Church in prayers, sweat and tears. We are reaping the benefit of their labors today! Many of these pioneers have gone on to Glory, but some of you are still with us. We count it a privilege to express our deepest thanks to God and to you, now. But for those who have gone on: I think we should stand for about a minute of silent prayer in thanks to God for their lives of sacrifice and service and ask God to make their memories an inspiration to us to continue an uncompromising fight against sin.

(Prayer)

God has been good to us in the Western District this year. We have seen our established churches and parsonages improved and we have seen churches spring up where before there were none. I feel that I can conscientiously say that I have worked harder this year than in any other year of my ministry, but thank God, I can also say that this has been one of the most fruitful years of my Christian experience.

Improvements

Alger has purchased a lovely lot on Route 69 north of Alger; the basement walls are up. They will soon be in their new church. Rev. Max O'Dell is the fine pastor.

Arcanum has converted to gas heating and added one new Sunday School room.

Celina Pilgrims under their fine pastor Rev. Wayne Hill have painted the church throughout. They removed 2 walls, put sliding panels to enlarge their seating 8½ ft. by 24 ft., enlarged the platform, and purchased a new Sunday School Bus.

Cincinnati 1st Has sold their old church at 15th and Elm streets, also sold their parsonage and purchased a beautiful corner lot 135' by 120' and parsonage at Highland and McGregor Avenues. They are now in the process of building a beautiful brick church 40 x 70 with full size basement on this corner. Rev. Melroy Ward is their aggressive pastor.

Dayton 1st Has rented a parsonage and redecorated for their fine pastor Rev. and Mrs. George Poole.

Defiance has remodeled the parsonage kitchen. They also redecorated three Sunday School rooms at a cost of \$600. Rev. W. T. Stone is their fine pastor.

Delphos Has painted the church and put in new Sunday School rooms and painted them. They also have covered the front of the church with asbestos siding; at a cost of \$900.00. Rev. Charles Retroff is their fine pastor. They have purchased a nice 6 room, modern parsonage, which was badly needed.

Deshler with a small group has installed a floor furnace and paid for it. This little group has paid their budget, also all interest on their note and fifty dollars on the principal. God bless this loyal group of Pilgrims. Rev. Edward Beard is their sacrificing pastor.

Liberty A new double sink has been added to the kitchen in the parsonage, along with ten feet of cabinet base built out of Marine Plywood at a cost of \$195.00. Rev. Robert C. Ferguson is their fine pastor.

Lima 1st has made a parking lot around their church. The blue prints are in the hands of contractors to plan to go on up with their much needed enlargement of their church. Rev. J. B. Ziets is their fine pastor.

Miamisburg The basement has been completely finished by decorating the walls and floors and the partitions were made movable. The ceiling was finished with white Insulite. Also the coal heat was converted to gas with a total cost

of \$730.00. Rev. M. L. Bogard is their fine pastor.

New Miami Has decorated their church inside and outside. Rev. Boyd Schell is their fine Pastor.

Piqua Has refinished the hardwood floors, of the church. They constructed 11 new pews to match the other pews of their church. Rev. G. F. Sheridan is their fine pastor.

Rosburg Has painted their fine church and replaced some siding at a cost of \$470.00. Rev. Orus Moore is their splendid pastor.

West Carrollton has redecorated the church basement painting the walls and floor, putting in new cupboard, new steel windows, and also a parking lot at the back of the church. Rev. A. O. Skillings is their hard working pastor.

Greenville with their pastor as Rev. W. L. Kilwy has purchased a nice Sunday School Bus.

St. Marys are purchasing a new parsonage, relocated and constructed new cement steps to the church entrance, and also new steps for the rear of the church, finished cement work and painted Sunday School rooms, also purchased chairs for same, also purchased a forty eight passenger Sunday School Bus. This work is being accomplished under the capable leadership of Rev. R. D. Brown.

Troy With their hard working pastor, Rev. F. H. Belden has put a new basement under their church, free of debt, which was a great need for their growing Sunday School.

Lima, Market St. Last fall added a Sunday School Annex 12 x 40, which provides room for three classes and serves, in part, as a Junior Auditorium. This annex is heated with a new Lennox stow-away furnace. With the two existing class rooms, this annex provides a total of five class rooms. In addition the interior of the church was finished (walls covered with plaster board on 2 x 2 studding; windows framed) and redecorated. Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz is their hard working pastor.

Elmwood: The aggressive Pilgrims at Elmwood, who had been renting an apartment for their pastor, purchased a fine six room parsonage near the church. This building is equipped with a gas furnace, built-in cupboards, and is tongue and groove weather-stripped throughout. It fills a long standing need of the Elmwood congregation. Rev. E. E. Wells is the pastor.

Mortgage Burning Services: Good Hope, where Rev. Robert Newberry is pastor, burned their mortgage on their church. One of our fine laymen loaned them some money to keep them from losing their church. This has been paid, and enough taken up on the day of dedication to put a new roof on the building.

Youth Work: On March 8-13, 1954 Rev. P. F. Elliott, Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz, Rev. Earl McKinney, Rev. Virgil Lashbrook and myself, started a tour of our six zones. We were delighted at the crowds and interest shown in this tour. There were 62 Mininisters who attended, 40 Young Peoples Pres., 45 Sunday School Supt., and 97 Sunday School Teachers. We spoke to around a thousand different people. We had several seekers at the altar, and took several subscriptions to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate. We had a Panel Discussion in the interest of the Sunday School, then Rev. Elliott preached an evangelistic message each evening. The Zone Chairmen and Ministers cooperated 100%.

Under the capable leadership of our Executive Secretary Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz, Ohio Pilgrim Youth are marching on. The "Pilgrim Youth News" this past year has been very interesting and full of news of our District Youth Work. Rev. Virgil Lashbrook has done a splendid job as editor.

As long as we have the leadership of spiritual men like our Executive Secretary Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz, Treasurer Rev. O. M. Awe, and new Rev. C. E. Jones, who succeeds Rev. Awe, and Editor Rev. Virgil Lashbrook, we have no fear of our Young People becoming worldly or modern. Our Youth want a Spiritual, aggressive church and program.

Sunday School: Our Sunday School Promotional Secretary Rev. Earl McKinney has done an outstanding job in the promotion of our Sunday School. He has worked hard and faithfully. Through his efforts of promotion, our people have been inspired to build bigger and better Sunday Schools. We appreciate Brother McKinney's work, also the way the pastors have cooperated in sending him their attendance reports.

Radio Programs: We thank God for our Radio Ministry. We have three of our churches broadcasting the Glorious Gospel each week.

New Church Buildings

Mulberry: The Pilgrims at Mulberry have risen to meet the challenge of a growing church in a growing community by erecting a 22 x 60 addition with full basement at a cost of approximately \$25,000. The remodeled and enlarged auditorium is more than doubled in capacity as well as the Sunday School facilities in the five new class rooms, including a large room used for a Junior Auditorium. Included are also two rest rooms, a new heating unit, complete new wiring, entire redecoration and additional pews. The cost has been more than half met. To God be all the Glory. Rev. Harold Monroe has worked hard, and faithful to see this great improvement completed. He also was assisted by many friends and faithful members of the Mulberry, P.H.C. This wonderful structure was dedicated June 27, 1954. I wish to express my appreciation to the young people of Mulberry for the beautiful sign they made and placed on the Camp Tabernacle.

Washington C. H. The Pilgrims at Washington C. H. have a new church construction, with a cement block basement, size over all 31 x 56, on a 60 foot lot. A 185,000 B.T.U. natural gas furnace was installed by Rev. N. L. Russell at cost. There will be three Sunday School rooms in the basement, also two well equipped rest rooms. The auditorium floor is of beautiful clear oak, and the plaster is tinted a mild green which is very restful to the eyes. The windows are amber and are florentine glass.

The over all job meets the state specification in every detail. This beautiful church was built by Rev. L. R. Roberts and Mr. Stookey. Rev. Roberts dedicated the basement Oct. 4, 1953. I wish to say Brother and Sister Roberts have been offered better churches with a larger salary but they felt led of the Lord to stay in Washington C. H. I do not know of anyone who loves God and the Pilgrim Holiness Church more than Brother and Sister Roberts. Sister Roberts has been the hard working pastor this past year, they will co-pastor this conference year.

New Madison: The fine Pilgrims at New Madison have built a beautiful block church, 32 x 48, with full basement, four spacious Sunday School rooms, two nice rest rooms, and a gas furnace. The auditorium is finished with elf green walls and white ceiling with red wood trim and has beautiful hardwood floors and amber glass windows. This church is a credit to the town and community in which it is located. Rev. F. H. Baker is the hard working pastor. This fine church was dedicated May 23, 1954.

Westboro built a nice cement block church which was dedicated Aug. 25, 1953 by our Asst. Supt. Rev. L. R. Roberts. The fiery group of Pilgrims have already out-grown their building. Rev. Frank Marietta is their successful pastor.

New Churches

Forest: The last part of September, Sister Dunbar called me from Forest, asking me to come and organize their Independent Church into a Pilgrim Holiness Church I went to Forest, October 1, 1953. We found a loyal group of old fashion Christians that believed in Second Blessing Holiness. We organized with nineteen members. They have a beautiful church, well kept and decorated. Thank God for the Pilgrims at Forest. The folk called Rev. Ivan Loveless as their pastor.

California: We were called to California for a week-end meeting October 29-November 1. There was a small group of people there who were interested in a Pilgrim Holiness Church. The Chairman of the Hamilton Zone, Rev. Ed. Wells, who is a pastor of our growing church at Elmwood, has worked hard in painting, cleaning, and passing out bills, making many calls with the pastor, Rev. Sharp. I preached four nights, had twelve seekers at the altar and organized a Pilgrim Holiness Church with twelve members.

Sidney: Right after Conference Rev. R. D. Brown moved one of our District tents into the beautiful city of Sidney. After four weeks of blasting, God honored the faithful preaching of Brother Brown. We were able to rent a church owned by a Lodge. The Greenville Zone with Rev. Smack as Zone Chairman, had several Zone Rallies here, also paid rent for this church for this Conference year. We were able to secure Rev. W. C. Miller, a Veteran of Home Missionary work. On November 8, 1953 we organized with ten charter members. They now have over

twenty-six members. This church is a live wire. They seldom have a service that someone doesn't pray through. They pray them through, in church, in their home, and some have prayed through in the back seats of automobiles. I am sure Sidney has a great future. We do appreciate the hard work Rev. W. C. Miller, their pastor, is doing.

Montpelier: On November 15, 1953 we started a revival in Montpelier, Ohio, in the Northwest corner of our State. Twenty-two people prayed through in the old fashion way. We organized with nineteen charter members November 25. Rev. Rudolph Moore was placed there as pastor. The building was sold and we had no place to move. Rev. James Payton came to me and asked me to let the folk of Montpelier come to Hicksville. He said Hicksville would buy a bus for the people. We thought this would be for the best of both churches, so we united Hicksville and Montpelier together. Rev. James Payton is their fine pastor. They plan to build a new church this fall. We now have a strong church at Hicksville paying \$50.00 per week and furnishing parsonage.

Kenton: Rev. and Mrs. Ogle Yates moved into Kenton after Conference last year. They started a tent meeting which lasted for over four weeks. God honored their efforts. We organized at Kenton April 25, 1954 with seven charter members with more to follow. They are now in the process of building a new church and parsonage. One man gave them one thousand dollars and loaned them another thousand at a very low interest. Brother and Sister Yates have sacrificed but God has blessed their work in a wonderful way. Brother Yates' mother has assisted them in their work at Kenton.

Dayton Greenwich Pilgrim Holiness Chapel: Through the untiring efforts of Rev. Earl McKinney and his Westwood Pilgrims, along with the ministers of the Dayton Zone and ministers from other Zones with their laymen, we were able to finish building a beautiful 28 x 40 church in the heart of the Greenwich Village. I have never seen such co-operation from ministers and laymen in donating their labor to finish this beautiful church. There were eight laymen who came all the way from Leesburg with their pastor to help for two days. We were able to organize the Greenwich Pilgrim Holiness Chapel on March 21, 1954 with seven charter members. More have joined since its organization. Rev. Ralph Shope is their hard working pastor. God is blessing his efforts there. Too much credit could not be given to Rev. Earl McKinney and his fine people.

Greenfield: I went to Greenfield the first of March with our pastor at Leesburg, Rev. Virgil Lashbrook, and met with a fine group of people interested in a Pilgrim Holiness Church. They were busy converting a block building into a place of worship. Rev. Leon Cook was leading this fine group. They called me for a week-end meeting March 25-28. We started the meeting and God blessed us. The altars were lined and the fire fell. We organized March 28th with nine charter members. Others have joined since they organized. Their Sunday School is running in the forty and fifties. God is blessing Brother Cook and this wonderful group of Second Blessing Holiness people. Brother Lashbrook and the Washington C. H. Zone assisted us in every way possible. We wish to express our appreciation to our Home Missionary Committee. They have assisted us in every way humanly possible. Rev. L. R. Roberts, Rev. O. E. Rutledge and myself make up this Committee.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

EASTERN DISTRICT

Brother Chairman:

To the General Superintendent, the pastors, evangelists, delegates and friends of the Jubilee Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the Ohio District on Sugar Grove Hill, Springfield, Ohio.

Greetings in the precious name of Jesus!

It is with a deep sense of heart-felt gratitude and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father that enables us to bring this report to you. We have been conscious throughout this conference year of the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit. It is in Him we live and move and have our being. He who has blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ, according as He hath chosen us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love.

We deeply feel our churches are on the upward trend in our District. Our older churches have taken advanced steps, and we have spent considerable time and money strengthening some of our younger churches. Our burden is to see them strong and established churches.

We wish to thank every pastor and church for their fine spirit of cooperation. Through this combined effort we feel every department of the work of the church has gone forward. We believe we have a spiritual people and are living according to the standards of holiness.

We do not have words to express our appreciation for the kind reception the pastors and the churches have given us. We have enjoyed the Christian fellowship with the saints everywhere, and we are praying the Lord will reward everyone for their kind words and deeds.

We have endeavored to do our duties as a superintendent and to serve the churches in our capacity to the best of our ability. Our duties have been numerous, but the Lord has enabled us with strength for it all, and for His protection in travel we are indeed grateful.

In the light of this, we present this report to you in humility and gratitude to our Lord Jesus for His abounding grace and the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

New Churches Organized: We have organized three new substantial churches this past conference year. This is a total of fifteen new churches organized since we were elected to this office. The names of the new churches in order as they were organized this year are as follows: First, Cleveland. For many years we have desired a church in Cleveland. At last this desire was realized and we organized November 22, 1953, with thirteen members. This work was the results of the faithful labors of W. F. Childs, who is now laboring among the Spanish speaking people in Phoenix, Arizona. This church recently enjoyed a gracious revival. Each evening service was preceded by a street meeting with a public address system and a portable organ. This helped to bring the people to a fine hall located 6510 Yexington Ave., where they worship. This church is under the direction of Rev. Earl Black of Cleveland, assisted by Rev. Lloyd Dean formerly of Olive Hill, Ky., Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Second, South Webster. This church was organized in the home of Sister Hattie Raynard on April 21, 1954 with twenty-one members, then came the task of getting a place to worship. It is marvelous how God led in this work. We went to a total stranger and asked him for an abandoned restaurant building one quarter mile west of South Webster on State Route 140. He looked at us very strangely, until we mentioned two Christians from South Webster. This changed his attitude and he quickly said that we could have the building and he would pay the first four months rent if we would take the building as it was. The saints went to work, tore out partitions, sanded and varnished the floors, built a new platform with an altar, and painted the inside and out. Song books and a piano were given to the church by Sis. Raynard and church seats were furnished by the Danville church. The State leveled off more parking space. It was dedicated to the service of the Lord, May 23, with a splendid attendance and a most tender spirit prevailing. A gracious revival has been enjoyed there since, and souls have found God, believers sanctified and a number have been added to the church. Rev. Frank Williams of Wheelersburg is the pastor.

Third, Navarre. On May 30 we had the privilege of organizing a fine group in this village located 5 miles south of Massillon or about 25 miles south of Akron. This church now has 13 members and more are looking their way. This church was operated independently for a number of years, however, they nearly always engaged Pilgrim Holiness evangelists. We visited this place about four years ago when they were worshipping in a tent. Since then they have built a basement church and have been offered a splendid sum by our sister churches, but they said, "No, we want to be Pilgrims". In dealing with them, we said, "We have no large sum to offer, will you still be organized into a Pilgrim Holiness Church?" The reply was "Yes, we want to be Pilgrim's". This is a fine Holiness group, and by helping some of their indebtedness, plans are being made to get a clear title for the Pilgrim Holiness Church. We need a pastor there that will more or less need to work for a livelihood and at the same time shepherd the flock.

Dedication Services: Danville: On March 7 a dedication service was enjoyed and a splendid spirit prevailed. This church is going forward in many ways, under the leadership of Rev. Wm. Gilkerson.

Barberton: On April 25, the new basement church was dedicated at Barberton. This was the results of the splendid work of the Rev. Roy Ankrum and his fine group of willing workers and intensely good givers. The Barberton church has made great strides both numerically and spiritually, and for their faithfulness God has given them this splendid new building. On the day of their dedication, the remaining amount of indebtedness was raised in cash and pledges.

Cambridge: On May 16, we were privileged to dedicate a church for the Pilgrims in Cambridge. This church was organized three years ago under the leadership of Rev. and Mrs. Paul Harris, and the Lord made it possible for them to buy a used church building. They redecored the inside and beautified the front with shrubs, paint and a new church sign. The church is of fair size and was filled on dedication day. A good spirit prevailed and the service was enjoyed by all. A few years ago we had no church in Cambridge at all, now we have a fine work there. God has blessed the faithful labors of Rev. and Mrs. Paul Harris.

Ironton: On June 27 it was a privilege and blessing to dedicate the Ironton church. They have one of the most complete beautiful basement churches in our connection in a splendid location in the city of Ironton. This church came into existence by prayer and faithful labors a little over three years ago. The Home Missionary Committee stood on the streets of Ironton on a cold day and were praying, "O Lord direct us." The Holy Ghost gave us a lead that day, a cloud about the size of a man's hand, but today there stands a beautiful place of worship. The enemy did not want a church there, on one occasion the city officials sent the police to arrest the pastor, (this was while they were in a tent before the church was built.) The pastor, Rev. Alvin Douglas said to the police, "Here I am, take me." But the presence of the Lord was so great, the police did not take him. A great victory is won in the city of Ironton for the Lord and His cause through the efforts and faithfulness of these new loyal Pilgrims.

East Toledo: On June 6th, we had a corner stone laying service in East Toledo where Rev. Edwin Brown is the pastor. He and his fine people are building a beautiful new church there. This service was very impressive when the corner stone was erected with the name, "Pilgrim Holiness Church", engraved on the face of the same. This stone was a symbol of "Christ the Chief corner stone disallowed indeed of men, but chosen of God."

Mortgage Burning Services: On September 20th, shortly after the camp last year, we had a mortgage burning service at Toledo First where J. H. Sherwood is pastor. This church had quite a large indebtedness, however, through their labors and sacrifices and careful management they cleared this indebtedness long before schedule. A copy of the cancelled mortgage was burned in a public service which brought great joy to the people. Immediately they pledged again for certain amounts to be paid each month in order that they may build the new auditorium on their present basement structure.

On July 4th we had a mortgage burning service at Portsmouth First. This church bought a fine parsonage in 1946 and the Lord has graciously helped them to liquidate the indebtedness. There was a splendid attendance at this service, and a good spirit prevailed. Rev. Roy Bellomy is the pastor.

The third mortgage burning service was held at Columbus Second Church July 11th, where Rev. C. O. Watters is the pastor. This church was built a few years ago by Rev. Jacob Swisher and the people looked forward to the time that the indebtedness would be liquidated. This was realized and while that

mortgage was disappearing by fire, tears of joy were flowing down the cheeks of those that had carried the load. The two former pastors, Rev. Jacob Swisher and Rev. Music had a part in the service. God is blessing the work at Columbus Second.

Church and Parsonage Improvements: The church at Akron where Harold Buchman is pastor has installed a new gas furnace, put in a new stairway and new Sunday School rooms where the old coal furnace and coal bin were located. They painted the church inside and outside, put on new spouting and planted shrubs and sowed the lawn.

The church on Angel Ridge, where Harry Russell is pastor, installed all new seats and are now in the process of a complete re-decoration on the inside and the outside. This church is in the rural district and is doing fine.

Baltimore, where Charles King is pastor, has re-papered their church, put new drapes at all the windows, and made other improvements.

Chauncey church, where Ray Pidcock is pastor is planning an entirely new ceiling and complete re-decorations in their church.

Chillicothe, where F. W. Crum is pastor, has made a number of improvements, made a new entrance, the vestibule was repaired, re-decorated and beautiful shrubs planted.

Columbus First, where A. L. Davis is pastor, has purchased a beautiful new parsonage at the corner of Eakin Rd, and Chestershire. This is a restful place in a fine residential section.

Columbus Second, where C. O. Waters is pastor, has installed new pews, rearranged the basement and built new Sunday School rooms.

Columbus Oakwood, where Jacob Swisher is pastor, is planning to re-decorate and in the near future plan to build a new church or purchase the one they are renting.

Crown City, where Merrill Layne is pastor, has completed new Sunday School rooms and a new addition to the church. This is a great asset.

Danville church, where Wm. Gilkerson is pastor, has put in hardwood floors, beautiful new pews, a carpet on the platform and a new \$700.00 piano. Landscaping enhances the beauty of the church lawn.

Delaware church, where Kenneth Beckley is pastor, has put in better seating, beautified the front lawn with flowers and built a retaining wall at the side of the church for flower beds.

The church at Four Corners, where H. J. Kelly is pastor, has put in a basement and installed a fine new furnace. This is a great asset to said church. Also other minor improvements have been made.

The Galion church, where John Goon is pastor, are looking forward and making plans to build a new church. This fine group of new Pilgrims are to be commended for their splendid progress.

The Ironton church, where Alvin Douglas is pastor, broke ground to build just one year ago. Today they have a beautiful basement church in a pleasant location of the city. We have previously referred to this church in this report under the head of "Church Dedication."

The Jackson church, where C. E. Jones is pastor, is painting their church and making other improvements.

The Lancaster South Broad Street church, where Clyde Goss is pastor, has the blue prints and are now building new Sunday School rooms in addition to their present new church building which will be dedicated free from debt, August 8th. This new church has made splendid progress.

The Marion Second church, where N. L. Rickner is pastor, is in the midst of digging a basement for Sunday School rooms. This is a great asset to this church and a great blessing. Bro. Rickner has made many improvements on the parsonage, installing a furnace in the basement, a complete revamping of the kitchen, new cupboards, etc. and many other improvements.

The Murray City church, where Clifford Jolly is pastor, has redecorated the interior and exterior of their building. This has greatly improved and beautified their church and it now stands in said village as a very attractive structure.

The Newark church, which we reported a year ago, stating that the walls on said church were going up but due to unavoidable circumstances the work ceased for many months. However, the Lord answered prayer and laid it on the heart of Rev. J. R. Walters who volunteered to go on with the work of the building. Through his efficiency and labor of love, working night and day, he has enclosed the building and they are now having Sunday School and some preaching

services. The church is not wired for electric and they worship on a cinder floor with no ceiling or rest rooms. Will you volunteer to pray and give, that this church can be fully completed?

The New Marshfield church, where John McNutt is pastor, has redecorated the interior of the church and placed new carpet on the platform and main aisle, also did much hidden work so that they could remove the steel post that was an obstruction in the center of the auditorium.

The Oak Hill church, where J. R. Siders is pastor, are now in the midst of building a new basement church. They have out grown their old building, however, for the present they are going to use the new basement which will be divided into rooms for their fast growing Sunday School. They have redecorated the old church and painted the floors and put in some very good used seats. They were all refinished and are equally as good as new. Other improvements have been made.

The Portsmouth First, where Rev. Roy Bellomy is pastor, has made some fine improvement on both the church and parsonage. They have purchased a new Hammond electric organ, a large window fan, a timer light in the bulletin board and constructed a new Sunday School room in the basement. They also painted and re-wired the parsonage and installed a gas furnace.

The Salt Creek Valley church, where Norman Vandegriff is pastor, has put new sills and joists and floor in the west half of their church and other minor improvements.

The Stewart church, where Helen Tatman is pastor, re-decorated the interior of their church and refinished the floors and seats. It now looks like a new church.

The Toledo church, where J. H. Sherwood is pastor, made some improvements on church and parsonage and purchased a fine Sunday School bus.

The East Toledo church, where Edwin Brown is pastor, is in the process of building a beautiful new concrete brick church. This work has been given to you in more detail in a previous account in this report.

The Union Furnace church, where Ronald Travis is the pastor, has re-decorated and installed new seats and made other improvements.

The Wellston church, where Harry Branscomb is pastor, has put in new seats and refinished the floors and other improvements, plus platform furniture.

The Zanesville church, where H. R. Cartwright is pastor, has been in the building process of a new church, and have been in their building since last fall, however the building is not quite completed. They have been using the method, pay as you go. They have a splendid church building in a fine residential section and on one of the main streets known as Pine Street. This new church building has been needed for several years and under the leadership of their present pastor and with much sacrifice and labor of both pastor and people they are now enjoying this much needed church with little or no indebtedness.

Bremen church, where J. D. Webb is pastor has installed a new gas furnace in their church, also new seats. They have also purchased a fine parsonage in the village of Bremen which has been a long needed necessity.

Other repairs and improvements have been made on churches and parsonages that we do not have an account of. This has been an outstanding year for improvements and repairs on both churches and parsonages and in the building of new churches. We deeply appreciate the interest our people have shown in the upkeep of their buildings.

The Committee would like to call your attention to resolution No. 8, Page 29 in the 1953 Minutes. The Conference adopted the same and it reads as follows: "Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church annually on the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions." This special offering will be promoted by each District according to their individual plans and needs. The money received will be sent immediately to the District Treasurer and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the district in which the money was collected. This offering will not apply on the annual budget but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report."

The Committee wishes to thank all the pastors and their churches for their splendid cooperation in this matter last year, and they desire to stir up your minds by the way of remembrance that this special Home Missionary Offering Day this year is September 26.

Our pastors are self-sacrificing men and women as they observe their flocks, and feed the sheep and the lambs. Sixty per cent of them labor with their hands to keep in the ministry, but through the sincerity and earnestness of their hearts God has enabled them to be a success. Our fellowship with all the pastors has been blessed and seasoned with Grace as we talked over the many problems and in trying to reach the best conclusion for the advancement of the church, also the saints have expressed words of kindness for which we give God the praise. We have enjoyed our labors with pastors and people more than we have words to express.

Our Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Earl McKinney, has done a fine piece of work in compiling our Sunday School Attendance reports. This method is valuable and strengthens our Sunday School and how much more efficient it would be if every pastor would see that their report was sent in each month. The marked increase in our Sunday School attendance is greatly appreciated and will strengthen our churches.

The good work our editor, Rev. Virgil Lashbrook, has done in editing the Ohio Pilgrim Youth is very commendable. Every youth should be a subscriber to this splendid paper—a good project for our youth presidents and zone leaders to work.

Good revivals in our churches have been reported and new members to the churches have been added.

Our fellowship with the District Council has been helpful and uplifting as we had the privilege of sitting together and counseling with these Godly men.

Also our fellowship and labors with our co-laborer, Rev. Paul Lucas, District Superintendent of the Western Ohio District, have been gratifying. We feel God has used him and blessed him in the leadership of his district.

Also, the executive and Zone leaders of our districts have been faithful and enthusiastic, and have done their best to lead our youth. We love our youth and will do all, humanly possible, we can for them. We have some of the finest youth you can find anywhere and we do appreciate them. They are not only the church of tomorrow, they are the church of today.

In closing, the greatest need of the church is motivation. We need a power within us to make us want to promote revivals and get lost men to God. Such cannot come through entertainment. It can only come when the Holy Spirit possesses the entire personality, including the affections. One then will have perfect love and perfect obedience, Jesus said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments."

I now quote the Apostle Paul as he exhorted the Ephesian Church, "We beseech you that ye walk worthy of the vocation where with ye are called, with all lowliness and meekness, with longsuffering, forbearing one another in love, endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." With this in mind and heart, we can look forward to greater accomplishments for the Lord and the church.

REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE ADOPTED PREVIOUS TO THIS YEAR

Resolution No. 1

In as much as we feel the visits of our executive secretary to our zones during the past year have been a great blessing, be it resolved that this visit be a part of our permanent program.

Resolution No. 2

In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved that each zone chairman arrange a meeting with the district superintendent, or superintendents, and the pastors of his zone as soon after conference as possible to plan the program for his zone for the year.

Resolution No. 3

We recommend that the Executive Committee and zone chairmen be kept in the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

Resolution No. 4

Be it resolved that the Resolutions Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the Annual Business Meeting as possible.

Resolution No. 5

Be it resolved that the Ohio Pilgrim Youth be published monthly, ten months out of the year, the two months excepted be determined by the editor.

Resolution No. 6

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as the choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church;

Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the young people's Executive Committee to enforce this during the Young People's Convention.

Resolution No. 7

Be it resolved that the council be asked to set the Owosso Bible College Service to be held during the Young People's Convention inasmuch as more young people could be reached at that time.

REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE ADOPTED PREVIOUS TO THIS YEAR

Resolution No. 1

Be it resolved that a special project fund be maintained to finance the special projects approved by the Young People's Conference; this fund to be maintained by an assessment of \$2.50 to be paid by each church.

Resolution No. 3

Be it resolved that a fund of \$50.00 be set up from which the editor of Pilgrim Youth may pay incidental expenses.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

Brother Chairman,

To the Pastors, Evangelists, Delegates and Friends of the Fiftieth Annual Ohio Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

After assuming the responsibility as Promotional Sunday School Secretary for the Conference year 1953-1954, I endeavored to execute this obligation to the best of my ability.

Our chief concern has been to arouse every Pastor, and Local Sunday School Worker to see the important roll a spiritual, aggressive Sunday School Program, plays in the future growth of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Personally I am convinced that the Sunday School is the gathering arm for the Church. To this end, four Sunday School Conventions were sponsored during the conference year. These conventions were held at Logan, Columbus 1st, Defiance and Springfield 1st. The Former District Superintendent of the Michigan Conference, Rev. Richard Hawkins, was the main Convention Speaker. His Messages challenged us to do greater service

in all departments of the church. The interest and attendance was very commendable.

In late Spring, a Special Youth and Sunday School Week proved to be a great blessing to the Western Ohio district. One Night Rallies were held in the most centrally located church in each Young People's Zone. A Panel discussion was conducted by Rev. Paul Lucas, Rev. Virgil Lashbrook and Rev. Earl McKinney. The Topic of discussion was "The Three Essential P's for a Growing Sunday School". The General Sunday School Secretary and Youth Leader, Rev. P. F. Elliott brought a very timely message on the Subject, "Youth on the March." A fine spirit of

cooperation in attendance by ministers and laity was most encouraging. The Divine Presence of the Lord characterized every rally. Many received a definite Experience of Grace.

There were twelve monthly reports, one annual report and several hundred Convention Hand Bills, published in the interest of Sunday School Promotion. These were sent to all of our Pilgrim Holiness Churches in Ohio. In order to care for the needs of Sunday School Promotion, some three thousand letters and cards were sent by mail to each Church.
