The motion carried that the Conference time be set from 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon, and to continue again at 1:30 P.N.

The Welcoming Committee presented Dr. M. L. Surorook, President of the Owosso Bible College, and Rev. and Mrs. Silvers, field representatives of the Owosso Bible College. They in roturn greated the Conference with their testimonies.

present Rev. and Mrs. Harold Hobbs who both expressed appreciation of being received back into the Pilgrim Church.

The report of the District Superintendent was then read and accepted by the Conference.

The Assistant Superintendent gave an oral report which was accepted by a motion.

The Auditing Committee reported that the Dis-Trict Treasurer's books were audited and found to be correct.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted. The District Statistician was not present. It was moved that we accept the report sent and refer it to the Editing Committee for completion and publishing. Carried.

The Resolutions Committee gave their report. It was decided that the resolutions be considered individually, as follows:

1. Be it resolved that the Camp Meeting Committee act as a planning board to draft a complete plan of the Camp Ground as to roads, landscaping, location of buildings, and that they provide a building code to prevent the erection of buildings of an inferior appearance.

2. Be it resolved that the Unterio District Council not act on the retro-active principle relative to the General Conference decision with respect to inactive ministers of the District, but that the District Council inform its ministers of the ruling of the General Conference and request a written expression in order to guide them in fixing the active and inactive roll of the District Conference. This was adopted.

3. This Resolution was recommended by the District Council. Be it resolved that this Conference accept the proposed plan of reorganization offered by the Directors of Owosso Bible College and that we elect a representative from this District to that Board. Moved and adopted.

There was an adjournment due to expiration of time.

The following additional members were elected to the District Council: Rev. J. W. Bray, Rev. J. W. Lashbrook, and Rev. L. B. Reese.

Rev. Harold Hobbs was elected to represent our District at the Board of Directors of Gwosso Bible College.

The Conference approved the appointment of the various committees by the Superintendent.

The District Council brought forth the nominstions for the vacancies on the Educational and Examining Board: J. W. Bray and A. L. Jackson. They were accepted for terms of three years.

The Chairman, Rev. Paul Thomas, spoke by challenging us as a District to go into populated centres. He also expressed his appreciation of the high caliber of the District ministry and spiritual devotion of its people. Rev. Thomas said that organization was only the scaffold on which we stand to build the spiritual house. We must give ourselves to the work.

THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Twenty-ninth Annual Conference of the Ontario District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings!

Another year has gone into history-- wear to give an account not only to you, but also to the great Judge of all the earth. It has been r year of much activity throughout the District. Most of the objectives which we had in mind for this year have been realized. The church at Oshewe has been built and sufficiently finished inside so that the basement has been used by the congregation for a place of worship since March of this year. The Toronto church has been greatly strengthened both as to an increase in attendance and finances. They have been able to proceed with a new church building and parsonage in a way that was not thought possible a year ago. The Dyer's Bay people have succeeded in obtaining the material for a new building and are now Enxious to proceed.

The project that wes of special interest to the District has been realized, --namely, the building of the tabernacle. This is just one big step in the development of the camp grounds here at Proton. I hope that more needed improvements will be made during the coming year.

The membership report this year will show a slight loss due to the fact of some moving away from the area of our influence, and that our replacements have not kept up with our losses. The decline is not usfficient to indicate that the churches are on the decline. In fact, I personally know that a number of churches have had an increase in sould saved during this year. This will not be reflected in the statistical report until next year.

The Sunday School attendance has shown a steady increase throughout the year. This is the result of the constant and persistent efforts on the part of the pastors, Sunday School superintendents and teachers. For all that has been accomplished during the year let us give the glory to Jesus and all who have been faithful to work, pray, and believe God.

Now what of the future? This is a question that only God can fully answer. But we as His workmen must plan and work along the lines we know He can bless. The one great project for the

coming year is to help the church stabult Ste. marie to grow into a strong healthy spiritual The opportunity and need is there. Bro. centre. Fred Wagner felt his work was accomplished there and has moved on to another place of service for the Mester. Bro. Lashbrook volunteered to go fill this vacancy. The church there is able to pay only ten dollars a week toward the pastor's selary. This fect makes it evident that we as a District should give assistance so that he will be able to devote his time to pastoral work in this needy field. The amount of ssistance proposed will not give him a sumptuous salary, but only enough to get by with for the time. There sill still be plenty of things for which it will be necessary to exercise the power of faith. I trust we shall all rally around this project with our proyers, love and gifts until we shall see m definite increase in souls saved and brought into the fellowship of the Pilgrim Church.

Further we should not forget to pray for the other werker churches. The problems are often very difficult to solve in them. But let us pray that the very help they need to enable them to go forward will be realized this year. Also, all our churches should seek to continue to extend the field of their usefulness. Each Pilgrim should be a forceful witness for the Lord. Each one of us should lead at least one soul to Jesus and into membership in the church. Would it not be a scriptural motto for us to adopt for the coming year, "Let each Christian win another"? May God grant that we shall.

In my labours as District Superintendent I have travelled 8520 miles; visited all the churches twice, some three times, besides conducting six annual meetings; attended the Superintendents' meeting at Indianapolis, the General Conference at Winona Lake, and a Bible School meeting at Owosso; held two District Council meetings in the interest of church extension; preached 10 times; received as salary #690.00; travelling expenses #321.19.

10. In the light of a laxity which appears to be growing a mong our people relative to standands of attire, be it resolved that our preachers call attention of our people to this danger by giving clear exposition of the Scripture pertaining to this matter.

11. We recommend that all our people co-operate with the General Program of Evengelism as adopted by the General Conference. We urge our pastors and people to fasting and prayer on Friday of each week for the promotion of revivals in each church, and the opening of a new church during the year.

12. Insamuch as several of our schools have correspondence courses to meet the Manual requirements for ministerial candidates, be it resolved that we urge our licensed ministers to use the same in pursuing the study course.

13. Be it resolved that the Executive members of the Council be the District Church Extension Committee, and that the committee have full suthority to appoint home missionary pastors and build and select new locations.
