Elected on the second ballot to the Home Missionary Board, D. F. Price and L. R. Neff.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the 18th Annual Assembly of the Pennsylvania and New Jersey District:

Greetings:

Another conference year mile-stone is being passed by, and we are gathered to review our work of the past year.

To many of our people it has been a very trying year in many ways, yet we have reasons to praise Him who hath redeemed us and washed us in His own precious blood.

God has visited us with some revivals over the district, during the past year. A few people have united with our various churches, and a few Sunday Schools have grown considerably. To those Churches and Sunday Schools who have not been able to reach the desired goal we extend our sympathy and prayers, and hope for better days.

Our district needs have been graciously met this year. Surely God has answered prayer and has often come to our help. Praise His Name.

We have organized five new churches this year. They are small but we hope they will enlarge their borders: One at State College, one at Linden Hall, one at Grampian, among mountain folk; one at Josephine, which is promising, and one at Bell Bridge, near McKeesport. These are all small yet prospective. Three of these are in new territories and may be the means of opening other new doors of opportunity for our denomination.

The Home Missionary Board has been active, though not flushed with finances. They tried to follow the wish of our last Assembly, but found obstacles which hindered us from doing all they had planned.

I believe a stronger, more concentrated effort should be put forth; we should open a mission in a city and concentrate our efforts there until a church is established. This would be better in our judgment, than to scatter our efforts over so large a range as we have been doing, however, some good has been accomplished last year.

We have had more special calls for help from various churches this year than heretofore, thus causing more travel and unpleasant experiences also developed that needed much prayer and careful dealing. Some such things have given us many a heartache, but God has seen us through.

We appreciate the general kindness shown us during the past year. We have a hospitable people in our district, and we are not unmindful of our own infirmities and the patience shown us while we ministered to them.

It has been the busiest year of our life. Several times we were on the verge of a nervous breakdown but the Lord has undertaken. Praise His Name!

Brethren! Let us unite our forces against the enemy; love each other more and pray for the success and enlargement of our borders. I believe Pentecost is aggressive.

Let us press forward.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE DISTRICT ASSEMBLY

No. 1. Whereas the expenses of the District Organizations have been met by the pursuance of the financial plan in effect during the last year—

BE IT RESOLVED, That we adopt the same plan for the coming year, namely that each ordained and licensed preacher send in one-half of his tithes to the District Secretary for the Superintendent, and that each Church send as liberal an offering as possible each month for District expenses;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That each Church send an offering once a month to the Home Missionary Treasurer for District Home Missions.

No. 2. Whereas there is no plan in effect where by a systematic and substantial reduction in the indebtedness on the District Real Estate can be made, said Real Estate consisting in the Camp Meeting grounds, the Auditorium, the District Superintendent's home, the Camp Dormitory and Bible School buildings.

BE IT RESOLVED that each Church raise in whatever manner may be best suited to their ability to give, the equivalent of One Dollar per member per year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that payments be sent regularly each month to the District Secretary, checks to be made payable to the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Pennsylvania and New Jersey District.

No. 3. INASMUCH as the report blanks used this year for the reports of Church work on the District were somewhat complicated, we recommend that blanks be formulated and printed to better suit our needs.

No. 4. BE IT RESOLVED, That no local preacher be allowed to entertain a pastoral call from any Church, unless sanctioned by the District Superintendent.

No. 5. BE IT RESOLVED that Camp and Assembly be combined as this year for 1932.

No. 6. WHEREAS many of our Churches remain without a Pastor for too long a time, causing injury to the Church—

BE IT RESOLVED that after two months vacancy, the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, and District Secretary be empowered to station a Pastor who shall fill this vacancy until the following Assembly, when he may be called or dismissed by the local congregation.

No. 7. WHEREAS there has been some confusion concerning reporting probationary members,—

BE IT RESOLVED that we omit the item "Probationary Membership" from our report blanks.

No. 8. WHEREAS there has been some confusion regarding probationary members,—

BE IT RESOLVED that we do not count them as members in our report.

No. 9. BE IT RESOLVED, That each preacher, licensed or ordained, shall pay 50% of his tithe to the District Superintendent's support, whether his earnings come from secular or ministerial work, and all preachers failing to do so, shall not together with his family, be entertained free at our District Camp Meeting.

No. 10. BE IT RESOLVED, That the names of elected delegates from each Church be sent to District Secretary not later than June 20th, and that the District Secretary formulate a roll of the District by combining names of elected delegates to other regular members of the Assembly and the roll be called by the District Secretary at the convening of Assembly, thus eliminating the old plan of registration at the beginning of the Assembly, thus saving much valuable time as well as making it more convenient.

No. 11. Whereas much time is needed to complete the general statistical report for the District,

AND WHEREAS so many of the Churches and those having reports were late in getting them to the statistician.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that all reports shall be mailed by June the 10th.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all Churches or individuals whose reports bear a postmark later than June 10th shall be charged a fee of One Dollar, said money to be used for printing of Assembly Minutes.

No. 12. RECOGNIZING THE NEED of enlarging our home work,

BE IT RESOLVED that we urge our Home Missionary Board to put on an aggressive effort to open up new fields.

No. 13. WHEREAS at the Superintendent's request the Church at Pine Grove has sent to our Assembly a Fraternal Delegation with greetings and good will;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Secretary be instructed to send them a letter of Assembly greetings and appreciation, and an invitation to come again.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Assembly also send greetings to the Camden, N. J., Church through L. C. Hiles, their pastor.

No. 14. WHEREAS the wet element of our Country is doing all it possibly can to remove the 18th Amendment from our Constitution and to restore the legalized rum traffic with all the murder, crime, poverty, and suffering that goes with it,—

AND WHEREAS we as a Nation are facing a serious crisis in this particular at this time,—

BE IT RESOLVED, That we as an Assembly of God's people put ourselves on record as being in favor of the 18th Amendment and against any attempt to legalize the sale of intoxicating liquor.

No. 15. RESOLVED that we express our sincere appreciation to those who labored so faithfully before the Camp and Assembly to get the buildings and grounds ready for our comfort; to the kitchen and dining room force for so excellently providing for and serving us in feeding our physical bodies; to Bro. June 23, 1931

Dear Friends in the Homeland:

Greetings in the precious Name of our Saviour, from far away Jamaica. May the blessings of God rest upon all of you as you read this brief report of the Lord's work in this part of His vineyard.

If you could only be with us for a few of our meetings, you would feel well repaid for all the sacrifice that you have made to get us back to this island of the sea.

We have held two lengthy Revival Meetings since we have returned, with very good results in both series of meetings. Many precious souls have sought the Lord for salvation. Twenty-three have been baptised and united with the Church since our return. The next Baptismal service is already planned for two weeks from now, at which time the most of all are planning to be baptised and to be received into fellowship into the Church.

On one occasion while I was away in the Blue Mountains visiting our most distant Station, Sister Ford and Sister Brown held an Open Air Meeting with one of the native workers. At this service, along with two others, an East Indian was thoroughly saved from his sins. This resulted in his marriage to the woman he was living with in sin. He and his wife have followed every step of the way, and they are now living happy in the Lord. We have also married two other couples who were likewise living together in sin, but at the hearing of God's Word, they repented and are now living a Christian life. One more couple is to be married next Sunday.

Twelve little babies have been dedicated to the Lord. Many of the native homes have been visited on the plains as well as in the mountain districts.

You will no doubt remember our telling you about how the natives built a Church and begged us to come and preach for them. Well they are getting on very nicely. They have had to enlarge the building to seat the crowds that come to the services. Last Sunday we held the Communion service for them. It would have blessed your souls to hear their clear testimonies of Salvation. At one of our Special Services at the Headquarter's Church two weeks ago, some of these people started at 4 a. m. and walked all the way. They arrived at the service in time. They came singing along the way.

There is far more work to be done here than we can ever do. We will do our best to do as much as we can before the coming of our Lord. We know that times are very hard all over the world. But this is no reason for Christians to sit idle. Let us together labour while it is yet day, for the night soon cometh when we can labour no more. Then we can rest in Heaven with Jesus, and with the redeemed from this isle of the sea, for all Eternity.

Continue to pray for us.
