STANDING RULES OF THE DISTRICT ASSEMBLY

Rule No. 1

Rule No. 4

A Bible School service shall be conducted the last Sunday afternoon of our District Camp-meeting.

Rule No. 5

The first seven seats and forward shall constitute the conference bar.

MINUTES OF THE 1935 ASSEMBLY OF THE PENNSYLVANIA-NEW JERSEY DISTRICT

Friday Meeting

The members of the Twenty-second Annual Assembly convened at 9:00 A. M., July 19, 1935, in the Tabernacle on the Beulah Park Camp Ground.

The song service was led by Rev. R. G. Flexon, District Superintendent, singing "Rock of Ages," and "He Leadeth Me."

A scripture lesson was read by Rev. R. G. Flexon from John the fourth chapter, after which he spoke briefly on the necessity of co-operation among brethren in the work of the Lord.

Brother Baker, the Assistant Superintendent, led in prayer.

Brother Flexon spoke very feelingly of our District Secretary, Rev. Harold Dieter, and his good work of the past. (Because of prolonged illness Brother Dieter was unable to attend the Assembly.)

Brother H. J. Felter was appointed secretary pro tem for the morning session.

Brother Flexon, the District Superintendent, introduced Rev. A. H. Wilson, Second Assistant General Superintendent, and asked him to act as Chairman.

The roll of ministers and delegates was called.

Motion was made and supported that Brother Price and Brother McCracken be marked present since they are busy about the Camp Ground. Carried.

The District Superintendent presented the following names of ministers in charge of churches in the District who recently came from other districts: Rev. H. A. Saneholtz, Rev. W. R. Fitch, Rev. R. L. Hertzog, and Rev. Stimson Smalley. Motion was made and supported that these brethren be accepted as members of the District. Carried.

Rev. Flexon presented the names of the following new churches to be received by the District: Bealsville, Connellsville, Homestead Park, Greensburg, Harrisburg, and Williamsport. Motion was made and supported that they be received into the District. Carried.

Brother Flexon then brought several recommendations to the attention of the Assembly which were designed to make the District work more progressive.

Brother Wilson, the chairman, suggested that the proper committees take up the work presented in these recommendations.

The District Superintendent then called attention to the record of progress made by the District, which he had posted in the Tabernacle, and urged all to study it.

The Statistical report was called for, and motion was made and supported that the pastors or delegates give a brief oral report of their labors, and that the report of the statisticians be posted in the Tabernacle.

The reception committee introduced the following: Rev. Melvin Pratt, Terre Haute, Indiana, and Brother and Sister Underwood, of the Rocky Mountain District, and Brother Neal Horton of Tennessee. By motion they were granted seats within the Conference bar. Carried.

Upon motion a rising vote of appreciation was given the District Superintendent for his efficient work in the interest of Home Missions.

The following were recommended for renewal of deaconess' license: Mrs. Floyd Baker, Mrs. Harry Felter, Mrs. Eleanor B. Key, Mrs. Harry Rote. By motion this recommendation was accepted.

The following were recommended for acceptance for District license: Stimson R. Smalley, Robert Hertzog, Edwin Young, Fred Metzger, Leon Edmiston, Nils Kristiansen, and Clarence Wert. By motion this recommendation was accepted.

The assembly now proceeded to the order of the day.

By motion the District Superintendent was instructed to appoint five tellers. Appointees: A. S. Joppie, Lawrence Neff, Walter Bubb, Robert Heckert, and Mark Bowman.

First ballot cast for District Superintendent. Total ballots cast 129. 112 for Rev. R. G. Flexon, electing him to the office of District Superintendent, whereupon he, for reasons stated, declined the office. By motion the assembly rejected his wishes.

By motion the assembly went to earnest prayer for Divine guidance in the matter.

The second ballot was cast for District Superintendent. A total of 125 votes were cast. No election on the second ballot.

Moved and supported that we suspend the rules and vote for one of the five highest. Lost.

A third ballot was cast for one of the two highest. The total number of ballots cast was 124. Rev. R. G. Flexon receiving 108, electing him to the office of District Superintendent.

By motion resolution No. 16 was rescinded and the matter left with the District Council.

First ballot cast for Assistant Superintendent. A total of 126 votes was cast. No election on the first ballot.

Because of a tie a second ballot was cast for one of the four highest. No election on the second ballot.

A third ballot was then cast for one of the two highest. Total number

votes cast 128. Rev. H. A. Saneholtz received 67 votes, electing him to the office of Assistant Superintendent.

Rev. and Mrs. Lorin Wilson of the New York District were introduced to the assembly.

First ballot cast for District Secretary. Total ballots cast 126. No election.

A second ballot was cast for one of the two highest. Total number ballots was 125. Rev. Harold Dieter receiving 90.

In the good providence of God our lives have been spared to assemble again in our Annual Assembly without the loss of one of the Ministerial members through death. While many of us have suffered physically, most of us have been able to carry on under God and take new territory.

As a district we have gained some ground. The Statistical charts will show an increase in members and churches.

Being a new man in your midst, but by no means a stranger, I assure you that it has largely been a pleasure to work with you and for you. I received throughout the year a cordial welcome by both the pastors and the laity. Of course not being acquainted with your ways of procedure, it took me quite some time to become adjusted. I shall not soon forget the kindness shown me by most everyone during that period.

During the year I have traveled 26,000 miles in the interest of the district, 6,000 of which was in the interest of Home Missionary work, 232 sermons, 89 calls to pray in homes were made, 136 business meetings were held, assistance was given in one funeral service, 35 anointed for healing, 39 subscriptions were taken for the Advocate and what was doubtless best of all 1,481 souls seeking God.
