



Minutes of the 1938 Assembly of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District

The twenty-fifth Annual Session of the Pennsylvania and New Jersey District Assembly opened July 25, 1938, at 9:00 A. M., in the Tabernacle on the camp grounds at Beulah Park.

The service was in charge of the District Superintendent, Rev. Robert H. Heckart, and was opened by the Assembly joining in singing "My Jesus I Love Thee" after which Rev. Frank Schweitzer and Rev. J. E. Guill led in prayer. The Assembly then feelingly sang "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross."

Rev. W. L. Surbrook, the General Superintendent, was introduced to the Assembly and read a Scripture lesson from the fourth chapter of II Corinthians and delivered a very helpful address to those present, after which he presided over the business as follows:

The roll of ministers and licensed workers was called, also the roll of delegates from the various churches.

By motion Ocelia Sypolt was seated as a delegate from the McKeesport Church.

By motion the following hours were set for the Assembly meetings: 9:00 to 11:30 A. M., 2:00 to 4:30 P. M., and 7:00 to 9:00 P. M.

By motion Rev. P. F. Elliott, Jr., was accepted as a member of the Assembly.

By motion Harry Miller, Walter Fisher, and E. A. Patmore, local licensed ministers, who are acting as pastors, were granted seats in the Assembly.

By motion the newly organized church at Mt. Union was received into the District.

The Reception Committee then presented the following to the Assembly: Rev. and Mrs. G. H. Shull of the Ohio District, Rev. E. H. Hocking of the Primitive Methodist Church, Rev. B. F. Sheckels of East Bangor, Pennsylvania, and Mr. O. L. Driskell representative from the Foreign Missionary department.

The Committee on Memorials to the General Assembly presented Memorials one to ten.

Upon a second reading Memorial 1 was tabled.

Upon a second reading Memorial 2 was adopted.

By motion Memorial 2 was rescinded.

Upon a second reading Memorial 3 was tabled.

An amendment was offered to Memorial 4 and adopted by motion.

By motion the time was extended until 11:55 A. M.

By motion Memorial 4 was adopted as amended.

Upon a second reading Memorial 5 was referred for redrafting.

Upon a second reading Memorial 6 was adopted.

By motion the time was extended until the dinner bell should ring.

Memorial 7 was read a second time, whereupon an amendment substituting "Educational Board" for Examining Board was offered but lost.

By motion Memorial 7 as originally presented was adopted.

Upon a second reading Memorial 8 was lost.

Adjourned by expiration of time. Prayer by Rev. H. Felter.

Monday Meeting July 25, 2:00 P. M.

The afternoon session was opened with singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" followed by the Assembly being led in prayer by Rev. R. W. Ives.

The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

The roll of ministers was then called, and each pledged to bring in a certain number of subscriptions to the Advocate during the coming year.

By motion the names of Harry Miller, Walter Fisher and E. A. Patmore were added to the roll of ministers.

Memorial 9 was presented to the Assembly. A substitute memorial was offered and adopted by motion.

Memorials 10 and 11 were presented to the Assembly. A substitute motion was offered in their place and adopted.

The Auditing Committee reported having audited the following books and found them to be correct: District Treasurer, General Assembly Sinking Fund, and Home Missionary Department.

The report of the District Treasurer was then read and accepted by motion. The report of the Home Missionary Treasurer was also read. By motion the report was accepted.

The report of the District Superintendent was read and accepted with appreciation.

The Committee on Resolutions presented Resolutions 1 and 2. Resolution 1 was amended and then adopted as amended. Resolution 2 was adopted.

The Ways and Means Committee presented Resolutions 1, 2, 3, and 4. Resolution 1 was adopted. By motion it was decided to form a substitute motion for Resolution 2. The substitute was then offered and after being discussed was tabled. The original motion was again presented and referred back to the Committee. Resolution 3 was tabled.

By motion the time was extended to hear Resolution 4. The Resolution was lost.

Adjourned by motion. Prayer by Rev. Robert H. Heckart.

Monday Meeting July 25, 7:00 P. M.

The evening session was opened by the Assembly joining in singing "Faith of Our Fathers." Prayer was offered by Rev. H. A. Saneholtz.

A brief, but stirring address was brought by the Chairman, Rev. W. L. Surbrook, after which the Assembly proceeded to business.

By motion the roll call was dispensed with for the balance of the Assembly. The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

By motion the District Council's recommendation, for renewal of District License for the following, was accepted: Liden Adams, G. Lindley Adams, Mrs. Mark Bowman, William Bloom, S. A. Byers, Mrs. Walter F. Bubb, Robert C. Dettmer, Leon Edmiston, Russell Henry, Oliver Holden, J. L. Johnson, Edna Kunkle, J. H. Mease, Mrs. Walter Schaltenbrand, Catherine Palsgrove, Walter Schaltenbrand, Edwin Stetser, William Welch, Clarence Wert, J. E. Wolf, Emma Yoder, Ivan Watts, Elizabeth Zufall, and also G. H. Shull of the Ohio District.

By motion the recommendations for new District License for the following were accepted: Edwin A. Patmore, Armand Doll, Hugh Barton, Harold Longenour and B. F. Sheckels.

By motion the recommendations for new District Deaconesses License for the following were accepted: Mrs. Armand Doll and Mrs. Robert Finch.

By motion the recommendations for renewal of District Deaconess License

for the following were accepted: Mrs. Grant Bertolet, Harriet Brucklacher, Mrs. Harry Felter, Maria Frost, Ruby Garner, Twila Hellberg, Miss Hilda Kessler, Eleanora B. Key, and Mrs. Dennison Snyder.

By motion the recommendation for the ordination of the following was approved: Edward Crosser, Alexander Passmore and Dennison Snyder.

By motion the Assembly proceeded to the election of officers for the coming year, and also to the election of ministerial and lay delegates to the General Assembly.

By motion the District Superintendent was asked to appoint six tellers to assist in the election. He appointed the following: J. Franklin Lint, Mark Bowman, Raymond Hoffman, Marlin Crissinger, J. A. Byrd, and Walter Schaltenbrand.

The Assembly engaged in earnest prayer for Divine guidance before proceeding with the election.

The first ballot was cast for the District Superintendent, resulting in 117 votes being cast, Rev. Robert H. Heckart receiving 69, electing him as District Superintendent.

A ballot was then cast for the election of an Assistant District Superintendent, resulting in 119 votes being cast, but no election.

By motion the Assembly then voted on one of the two highest, H. D. Dieter having received 59 votes, and R. W. Ives 21 votes. The second ballot resulted in H. D. Dieter receiving 83 votes, electing him as Assistant District Superintendent.

A ballot was cast for the election of a District Secretary, resulting in 118 votes being cast; H. J. Felter receiving 87 votes, electing him as District Secretary.

The Assembly cast a ballot for District Treasurer. Of the 118 votes cast W. R. Fitch received 91 electing him as District Treasurer.

By request Brother and Sister Walter Fisher sang a special song which was greatly appreciated.

By motion the District Secretary was asked to send greetings to Sister Hatcher from the Assembly. By motion the Secretary was instructed to send greetings to Brother Kulp by telegram.

By motion the time was extended to 10:00 P. M.

A ballot was cast for the three advisory members of the District Council resulting in 113 votes being cast; S. Lewis Adams receiving 74 votes and Frank H. Schweitzer receiving 60 votes, electing them to the District Council.

A ballot was then cast for one of the two highest with the result that 113 votes were cast, H. E. Uhrig received 57 votes electing him to the District Council.

By motion it was decided that an offering should be taken for the District Statistician in the Tuesday morning session.

By request Brother C. R. Maas of Woodbury, presented a musical selection on the accordion which was enjoyed by all.

By motion the District Superintendent was asked to appoint a committee to prepare a memorial to the memory of Rev. E. A. Miller for publication in the District Minutes. The District Superintendent appointed the following: H. D. Dieter, R. W. Ives, and H. E. Uhrig.

Brother Brown was re-elected by acclamation to the Examining Board.

F. H. Schweitzer was re-elected by acclamation to the Home Missionary Board.

Thomas Ferguson was re-elected to the Board of Trustees by acclamation.

By motion the Secretary was instructed to write on the blackboard the names of all the ordained ministers who are eligible to serve as delegates to the General Assembly.

By motion each pastor was requested to nominate one layman from his church who would be eligible to serve as lay delegate to the General Assembly, said names to be written on the blackboard; the Assembly to elect from this number the delegates to the General Assembly.

Adjourned by motion.

The session was brought to a close by singing the Doxology.

Tuesday Meeting July 26, 9:00 A. M.

The meeting was opened by Rev. Mark Bowman leading the Assembly in singing "I Love to Tell the Story" after which Rev. W. F. Bubb led in prayer.

Rev. R. W. Ives read a Scripture lesson from I Thessalonians the fifth chapter and spoke briefly, encouraging those present to live earnest, holy, Christian lives.

The chairman, Rev. W. L. Surbrook gave a very timely address on the duty of the laity in supporting their pastors, and the duty of pastors of churches in caring financially for the evangelists who conduct their revivals.

In compliance with a motion passed at a previous session an offering was received for the District Statistician.

Rev. Dale Zeits, evangelist of the Indiana District was introduced to the Assembly.

The Assembly proceeded to cast a ballot for the election of seven ministerial delegates to the General Assembly.

By motion the Assembly proceeded to cast a ballot for the election of six lay delegates to the General Assembly.

The Committee on Memorials presented Memorials Nos. 11, 12, and 13. An amendment to Memorial 11 was lost, after which the main motion was adopted.

Memorial 12 was adopted. Memorial 13 was adopted. By motion the time was extended until the dinner bell should ring.

Memorial 14 was adopted.

By motion the memorial, to the memory of Rev. E. A. Miller, Allentown, Pennsylvania, presented by the Committee, was adopted.

The Resolution Committee presented Resolutions 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7. Resolution 3 was referred back to the committee. A substitute was offered for Resolution 4. It was lost. The main motion was adopted.

Resolution 5 was adopted.

Resolution 6 was adopted.

Resolution 7 was amended to include "An offering be received for the General Superintendent." It was adopted and the offering received.

The tellers reported the results of the ballot cast for the election of Ministerial delegates to the General Assembly. 109 votes were cast, Rev. R. W. Ives receiving 67, R. G. Flexon 67, and S. L. Adams 55 votes, electing them as delegates to the General Assembly.

By motion the Assembly proceeded to vote on the four of the ten highest for the remaining ministerial delegates to the General Assembly.

By motion it was decided to elect the alternate ministerial delegates from the six names remaining, after the above four delegates are elected.

The tellers reported the results of the ballot cast for six lay delegates to the General Assembly. 101 votes were cast; Grant Bertolet receiving 80, Irvin Crissinger 74, H. D. Wolf 54, D. W. Dieter 64, and Ed. Curry 52 votes; electing them as lay delegates to the General Assembly.

By motion the matter of compiling Resolutions as requested in Resolution 5 by the Resolution Committee was left in the hands of the District Council.

Adjourned by motion. Prayer by Rev. Mark Bowman.

Tuesday Meeting July 26, 2:00 P. M.

The afternoon session was opened by the Assembly singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." The Assembly was led in Prayer by Rev. H. J. Felter, after which the chairman, W. L. Surbrook gave a very interesting talk on church advertising.

Minutes of the previous session approved.

By motion the Assembly proceeded to vote on four out of the remaining six candidates, the four receiving the highest number of votes to be declared elected as delegates to the General Assembly.

The tellers reported on the ballot cast for the remaining lay delegate to the General Assembly. Miss Lucille Trumpe received 39 votes electing her as delegate.

The alternate lay delegates received votes as follows: W. D. Wolf, 21 votes; Arthur Kleppinger, 14 votes; B. M. Stover, 12 votes; and Mrs. Philip Doyle, 11 votes.

The Committee on Memorials presented Memorial 15, later requesting more time to consider the same.

The District Superintendent appointed the various committees namely: Resolutions Committee, Chas. A. Brown, Chairman, J. E. Guill, P. F. Elliott, Jr., Thomas Ferguson, R. G. Flexon, Raymond Hoffman, and Irvin Crissinger; Ways and Means Committee, H. A. Saneholtz, Chairman, C. J. Reiff, Franklin Lint, R. W. Ives, D. I. McCracken, Given Kutz, and Grant Bertolet; Auditing Committee, Leonard Drury, Chairman, H. D. Wolfe, and Clarence Wert; Equalization of Carfare, Paul R. Sawdy, Chairman, Harley Hoffman, and Clarence Kresge; Publicity, Harold D. Dieter, and George Duell; Reception Committee, Walter F. Bubb, Edward Crosser, and J. H. Sherwood; Editing Committee, Harold D. Dieter and Harry J. Felter; Picture Committee, Irvin Kratzer and Ralph Davie; District Statistician Mark Bowman.

The Committee on Memorials again presented Memorial 15 and it was adopted.

The Ways and Means Committee presented Resolution 5 which was adopted.

The teller's report of the ballot cast for alternate ministerial delegates for the General Assembly was as follows: J. E. Guill received 91 votes, P. F. Elliott, Jr., 77 votes, Mark Bowman 76 votes, and H. A. Saneholtz 73 votes.

The roll of the churches was called and each pastor indicated how many copies of the District Minutes were wanted by his church.

By motion the matter of how many copies of the District Minutes should be printed was left in the hands of the District Council.

The Resolution Committee presented Resolution 3 as redrafted. A substitute motion was offered and adopted.

The Resolution Committee presented Resolution 8 which was adopted by motion.

The Resolution Committee presented Resolution 9 which was also adopted by motion.

By motion the financial report of the Allentown Bible Institute, which was given by Rev. H. D. Dieter, was accepted with a rising vote of appreciation.

The Committee on Ways and Means presented Resolutions 6 and 7. Resolution 6 was adopted by motion. Resolution 7 was also adopted by motion.

By motion the Assembly granted the District Superintendent permission to hold the same number of revivals as last year.

Adjourned by motion. Prayer by Rev. H. D. Dieter.

MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

No. 1—RESOLVED that we amend Sec. 41, Par. 2 by adding "No member of the Board shall hold more than one office on said Board if competent persons are otherwise available."

No. 2—RESOLVED that there be a further reduction in the District delegation to the General Assembly.

No. 3—WHEREAS the sections of the Manual (Pages 58-60) under the caption of "Examining Board" and "Educational Board" are very similar, dealing with practically the same matters,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that they be united, their prescribed duties correlated, and placed under the head of: "Examining Board."

No. 4—RESOLVED that churches send only those as delegates to the District Assembly who are eighteen years old or more, established in Christian experience, and conforming to the standards of our Church Covenant.

No. 5—RESOLVED that Sec. 52, Par. 3 be amended to read as follows: "The minister's term of office as pastor of a church shall continue until the following District Assembly. He may be recalled from year to year by a two-thirds vote of the Annual Church meeting; no action by the Board being necessary to recall."

No. 6—BE IT RESOLVED that the District Superintendents be elected for a term of two years, and that the pastor also be elected for a term of two years.

No. 7—BE IT RESOLVED that when members of a church wilfully neglect and fail to attend the means of grace and financially support the church as they are able, for a year, their membership shall automatically cease upon the basis of a breach of covenant.

No. 8—BE IT RESOLVED that if in the judgment of any church board, there is in their membership a more competent leader of the Y. P. S. than within the age limit of active members, they be privileged to submit their names to be elected as the President of the Y. P. S.

No. 9—BE IT RESOLVED that our Missionary Funds both for Home and Foreign be raised under a unified budget, namely Missions.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the General Officers be paid from the above mentioned budget, except the General Treasurer, who shall draw 50% of his salary from the Publication department as business manager.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this unified Budget shall be apportioned by the General Board to our Districts according to their financial strength, the Districts in turn will apportion to their local churches on the same basis.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the said Budget be divided between the home and foreign missionary work at the ratio of two-thirds for foreign missions and one-third for home missions.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that when people outside of our church wish to stipulate funds for certain interests that the same shall be received and applied as stipulated.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that our Foreign and Home Missionary representatives represent their respective departments and all funds raised shall be pro-rated as above mentioned.

No. 10—BE IT RESOLVED that the action of the Manual relative to the District Secretary signing Ordained Minister's credentials annually be rescinded and deleted and that we return to the former method.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED

No. 1—WHEREAS our preachers are sometimes called upon to preach at churches in view of the possibility of being called by such churches as pastors, and

WHEREAS, it is not always convenient for preachers to pay their own transportation costs,

BE IT RESOLVED that said churches pay the minister's transportation costs involved in visiting the church together with a free-will offering for his services.

No. 2—WHEREAS there is an evident difficulty in making annual reports, and,

WHEREAS this seems to arise from the fact that some churches do not have cash books of entry that correspond with the present report blank;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Superintendent appoint a committee of three, of which the District Superintendent shall be the chairman, to arrange a model book of cash entry and corresponding report blank as the standard for this district.

No. 3—Moved that we authorize the District Council to make plans with the Allentown Bible Institute Board of Directors to improve the buildings for camp meeting use and/or to renovate or build new buildings, provide equipment, etc., and furthermore, that the Council be authorized to finance the cost of such improvements from the district as the needs may require.

BE IT RESOLVED that we require our ministers actively engaged to pay 60% of their tithes received from ministerial work, through the local treasurer, to the District Treasurer.

our heavenly Father, who has blessed us, as individuals and as a district, so graciously throughout this past year. Also to our churches and my brethren in the ministry, who have cooperated so splendidly with me in spite of my inexperience and short comings. Blessings upon all of you.

The reports show a gain in membership of 117. The offerings for General Budget and Foreign Missions have exceeded those of any previous year in the history of this District. A new church has been organized at Mt. Union and is doing well. Several church properties have been purchased, and improvements made on a number of others. God has blessed us with some very good revivals.

The Lord has been pleased to spare the lives of all our District ministers, but one, Bro. E. A. Miller who has preceded us to his reward.

Throughout the year I have traveled approximately 30,000 miles, preached 235 times, conducted 117 business meetings, annointed 18 for healing, 223 seekers for regeneration or sanctification, conducted 5 revivals, sent in 80 subscriptions to the Advocate, and received for support pastor's tithe \$1779.73, church offerings \$433.13, revivals and week end conventions \$169.94, pastoral work at Rebuck \$194.80, gifts and donations \$48.45, total \$2626.05. Paid for traveling expense \$410.45, postage, telephone and telegrams \$78.85, total \$489.30. Net support \$2136.75. Visited each church (excepting one) twice, some of them three times, a few four, and one five times.

May we enter this new year with a stronger determination to be all that God would have us be and to do all we can for Him and the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
