

In Memoriam



Harold David Dieter, D.D. 1904 - 1948

Harold David Dieter was born October 26, 1904, at Fullerton, Pa. Converted at the age of 16 years and sanctified a little later, called to preach at the age of 17; instrumental in the organizing of the Cherryville Pilgrim Holiness Church and pastoring it for seven years. He was graduated from Beulah Park High School and the Bible Department, and then received his Bachelor of Theology Degree from Allentown Bible Institute and the Doctor of Divinity from Houghton College. In 1932 he became President of the Beulah Park Bible School which was reorganized and incorporated for the Eastern School Zone, renaming it the Allentown Bible Institute in 1934; serving the school for 16 years as president.

Brother Dieter served as a member of the Pennsylvania and New Jersey District Council in various capacities: council member, secretary, and assistant superintendent. He was elected District Superintendent in 1937 but resigned one day later in order to retain his position at the Allentown Bible Institute. He was a member of the General Board for sixteen years and became widely known.

Brother Dieter fought heroically to the very end, anticipating help from God that would enable him to stay here, but on September 6, 1948 he took his departure. "Know ye not that a great prince in Israel (the Church) has fallen." We have lost a big hearted, wholesouled brother, intensely interested in the youth of our church. His family has lost a kind-hearted husband and a loving father. Our loss is his gain. Let us labor, watch and pray, to meet him in the morning.

MRS. HARRY A. GREENAWALT

We deeply regret the home going of Mrs. Harry A. Greenawalt, a member of our Milton Church, an ordained Deaconess in our District. She left us August 26, 1948. A godly Christian, a very sincere and earnest worker in our church.

MINUTES

Monday Morning, June 20, 1949-9:00 A. M., A. B. I. Auditorium

The thirty-sixth Annual Conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was opened by the District Superintendent, Brother Lint, who called on Brother Campbell to lead the conference in singing. "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" and "Love Divine" were the hymns. After Brother Reiff led the conference in prayer, the District Superintendent presented Dr. L. W. Sturk, the General Superintendent, as the presiding officer for the conference.

Brother Sturk brought greetings from the General Executive officers. He spoke briefly from Ephesians 5 concerning Christ and His church, and then reported on the progress of the General Church in its publishing interests, acquisition of a parsonage in Indianapolis for the General Superintendent, Foreign and Home Missions, and the cooperation among the General executives and Board. He suggested a membership goal of 40,000 by next General Conference by all-out revival efforts throughout the church during the coming year. He spoke of the need for a General Church College and Seminary. He reiterated the pattern which his administration seeks, i.e., a spiritual church, a united church, an unworldly church, and a true and loyal church. He then asked the conference to join him in singing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

The Secretary called the roll and the chairman asked that all present be seated on the proper side of the conference bar.

The reception committee presented Rev. L. L. Lupton, Evangelist of the Free Methodist Church; Rev. Jason Felter and Brother and Sister Chatfield, our district camp workers; and Brother Oscar Seifken of the Rocky Mountain District. Each gave a short greeting and by motion carried were granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The District Superintendent read his report which was accepted by motion carried.

By request the Chatfields were asked to sing. Their song, "I've Been Lifted", found a wholesome response in the conference.

The Reception Committee presented Sister Sturk, who greeted the conference and by motion carried was invited to sit within the bar.

Brother Stetser, the District Sunday School Secretary, reported the good progress of the committee's work in regional Sunday School conventions and by motion carried his report was accepted.

The Resolutions Committee reported. A motion carried to adopt Resolution #1.

Time was extended until noon by motion carried.

By motion carried Resolution #1 was amended and was adopted as amended.

The sitting adjourned by expiration of time, with prayer by Brother Lupton.

Monday Afternoon, June 20, 1949

The two o'clock sitting of the conference convened with the singing of the hymns, "The Cleansing Wave", and "Jesus Will Walk with Me", led by Brother Holden. The District Superintendent expressed for Brother and Sister Ferguson their regret that they could not be with us at the conference because of Sister Ferguson's health, and in the prayer led by Brother Kresge, the conference remembered Sister Ferguson particularly.

A brief exhortation by the General Superintendent emphasized our privilege of divine guidance as God's children, and the conference joined him in singing, "God Leads Us Along". The minutes of the first sitting were read and approved.

The conference heard the Resolution Committee report.

By motion carried, Resolution #2 was adopted.

A motion to adopt Resolution #3 was tabled, and Resolution #4 received the same action.

A motion to adopt Resolution #5 was lost.

Resolution #6 was referred by motion carried to the committee on General Conference Memorials for presentation to this conference.

By motion carried, action of Resolution #7 was deferred until the Conference could hear the treasurer's report.

A motion prevailed to extend the time to 4:55 P. M.

The Ways and Means Committee reported and Resolution #1 was adopted by motion carried.

By motion carried action was deferred on Resolution #2 until the conference heard the treasurer's report.

The sitting adjourned with smiles and singing "This is Like Heaven to Me."

Monday Evening, June 20, 1949

At 7 o'clock the conference joined in singing, "He's a Wonderful Savior to Me", and "Arise My Soul Arise", led by Brother Houston. Brother Welsh led the prayer and at the call of the chairman a number of the members of the conference responded with their quotations of favorite scripture texts. Brother Holden sang a beautiful song centered on the thought, "Grace Enough for Me."

A motion carried to dispense with the roll call.

By motion carried the reading of the minutes was deferred until the Tuesday morning sitting.

The report of the Auditing Committee declared the treasurer's report to be correct. It was accepted by motion carried.

The treasurer's report was read and accepted likewise.

Ways and Means Resolution #2 was considered according to the action of the previous sitting, and the motion to adopt was lost.

Likewise Resolution #3 was lost.

The statistical report was read and accepted by motion carried.

At the call of the chairman, the conference joined in singing "When We All Get to Heaven".

The Committee on General Conference Memorials reported.

Memorial #1 was referred back to the committee by a motion carried.

A motion to adopt Memorial #2 carried.

By motion carried, Memorial #3 was adopted.

A motion prevailed to refer Memorial #4 back to the committee for redrafting and presentation to this conference.

Memorial #5 was adopted by motion carried.

A motion to extend time thirty minutes carried.

By motion carried Memorial #6 was adopted as amended.

The Secretary read a card from Brother Gorman to the conference expressing his disappointment that because of his illness he would not be able to attend the conference this year, and that it was the first time he had missed since 1916.

A motion carried that the Secretary send appropriate greetings from this conference to Brother Gorman, the Fergusons, Brother Sawdy, and Brother Marlin Hain.

The Secretary read the names of candidates for renewal of district ministers license as follows: Paul Bauer, Mrs. Grant Bertolet, Mrs. Walter F. Bubb, William Derr, Mrs. Robert C. Dettmer, Herbert W. Fisher, Howard J. Frey, Mrs. F. W. Greenley, Charles T. Jester, Louis Phiffer, Ellis F. Phillips, William H. Schaffner, George Smith, Mrs. J. Harry Smith, Albert Snader, Mrs. L. W. Zehner, J. E. Wolfe, Bruce Hall.

The licenses were granted by motion carried.

The Secretary read the names of candidates for renewal of Song Evangelist license as follows: Ward F. Printz, Harold Tallman.

The licenses were granted by motion carried.

The Secretary read the names of candidates for the renewal of Deaconess' license as follows: Mrs. Joseph Horwath, Alice Spatz, Mrs. E. L. Zerby.

By motion carried the conference granted new licenses to the following: Melvin Dieter, Joseph Uhrig.

By motion carried the conference approved the ordination of the following: William C. Bloom, Lodge W. Chappell, Deborah Hoover, Edward Houston, E. L. Zerby.

At 9:27 the conference adjourned with the singing of the Doxology and prayer by Brother Saneholtz.

Tuesday Morning, June 21, 1949

The nine o'clock sitting opened with the Conference singing "I Need Thee Every Hour" led by Brother Castevens. Brother Mark Bowman led the prayer after which the conference joined in the spontaneous singing of "Amazing Grace".

Minutes of the previous afternoon and evening sittings were approved.

The Committee on Memorials presented Memorial #7. A motion for its adoption was lost.

By common consent the first paragraph in the preamble of General Conference Memorial #8 was deleted, and by motion carried the memorial was adopted.

By motion carried Memorial #9 was adopted.

At 10:16 the conference recessed until 10:30 to allow an intermission before the Ordination Service.

At the Ordination Service, the Secretary read the names of the Candidates, and General Superintendent L. W. Sturk called them forward to front seats.

The conference joined in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have" and members of the Ordination Council read three passages from St. Paul's Epistles. After prayer by Brother Raymond Hoffman, Brother Sturk used the experience of St. Paul as the background for a very pointed message which emphasized the Minister's Responsibility, the Minister's Resource, and the Minister's Reward.

After prayer and laying on of hands by the Ordination Council the General Superintendent commissioned to the Christian Ministry each of the candidates, William C. Bloom, Edward Houston, Lodge W. Chappell, Deborah Hoover, and E. L. Zerby.

God's special seal of favor seemed to be upon the service, and the service closed with shouts and tears of joy and praise to God as the members of the conference marched to the front singing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" and extended their best wishes to each of the candidates. Brother Bubb prayed the closing prayer amid continuing praise.

Tuesday Afternoon, June 21, 1949

The conference convened at 1:35, and Brother Campbell led the opening song service. Brother Kratzer led the conference in prayer.

Resolution #7 of the Resolution Committee, deferred by the Monday afternoon sitting, was amended by substitute and the motion carried to adopt it.

Resolution #8 was carried by a unanimous standing vote.

General Conference Memorial #10 was read, discussed, and tabled.

In preparation for the election of officers, the District Superintendent ap-

pointed the following tellers: E. Liden Adams, Melvin Dieter, Clifford Berry, Herbert Fisher, and Paul Bauer.

The General Superintendent led the conference in prayer for divine guidance.

The following officers were elected by ballot: District Superintendent—J. Franklin Lint; Assistant Superintendent—Walter F. Bubb; Secretary—R. Lewis Adams.

NOTE:-Because of the objection of our Presiding Officer, our customary printing of full election details is omitted. However, the complete secretary's record is available on request.

At this point in the election, the Council was excused to consider nominations for District Treasurer.

In their absence, the Conference voted to grant each church the privilege of nominating one lay delegate to the Genral Conference.

The Secretary read the following Council nominations for District Treasurer: Arthur Kleppinger, Mark Bowman, H. A. Saneholtz, and Otho Jennings.

Brother Saneholtz withdrew his nomination.

Brother Bowman was elected treasurer.

A ballot was taken for the four ministerial advisory members of the Council.

For the rest of the election, the District Superintendent appointed additional tellers, i.e., Otho Jennings, Edward Shemelia, Edward Houston, and Russell Gunsalus.

The Secretary read the following Council nominations for the Examining Board: Edward Crosser, E. E. Hostetter, and C. F. Kresge. Brother Crosser was elected.

A motion carried to elect the District Trustee by acclamation. Brother O. F. Brown was elected to the office.

From the floor nominations for a layman to serve on the District Council were made as follows: Brothers Martz, Roan, Michael, Harper, Crissinger, Kleppinger, and Oplinger. Brother Crissinger was elected.

The Secretary read the tellers' report on the first ballot for advisory councilmen which showed Brother Campbell and Brother Holden elected.

By motion the time was extended until the council election was completed.

The Council was completed by the election of Brothers Raymond Hoffman and Russell Gunsalus.

The sitting adjourned by the shaking of hands and mutual greetings.

Tuesday Evening, June 21, 1949

The sitting opened at 6:48 by the spontaneous singing of "Rock of Ages" led

by Brother Sturk. Brother Munson led in prayer. Brother Sturk spoke briefly of the need for a continued spiritual emphasis throughout the church.

The minutes of the previous two sittings were read and approved.

A ballot was taken for seven ministerial delegates to the General Conference.

The Secretary read the District Council's recommendation that equalization of carfare be discontinued by the conference. A motion to adopt the recommendation carried.

The lay delegates to the General Conference were nominated and the ballot taken.

The District Superintendent made the following committee appointments:

Resolutions: E. J. Shemelia, Harry J. Daniels, Robert F. Finch, Harley Hoffman, William Whitmore.

Ways and Means: L. W. Chappell, G. A. Castevens, Edward Houston, Robert C. Dettmer, William C. Bloom.

Auditing: Clifford Berry, Franklin W. Greenley, Paul Bauer.

Sunday School: J. Franklin Lint, Edwin Stetser, Edward Crosser, William Derr, Marlin Hain.

Publicity: Otho Jennings.

Reception: C. Jay Reiff, D. I. McCracken.

Editing: R. Lewis Adams.

Statistics: E. Liden Adams.

Brother Saneholtz read the Committee Memorial to the memory of Brother Dieter, and the Conference adopted it by motion carried.

The Memorial for Sister Greenawalt received the same action.

The balloting for Ministerial delegates to the General Confrence resulted in the election of John P. Campbell, G. A. Castevens, Raymond Hoffman, Oliver Holden, C. Jay Reiff, Otho Jennings, and W. C. Bloom, and alternate delegates in the following order: Verino G. Gattone, E. E. Hostetter, H. A. Saneholtz, Lodge W. Chappell, Frank H. Schweitzer, and Robert C. Dettmer.

The balloting for Lay Delegates to the General Conference resulted in the following elections: Leon Dieter, Roy Spotts, Arthur Roan, Howard Thurston, and Charles Martz, and alternate delegates as follows: Charles Maas, Walter Linderman, Eugene Michaels, Edward Harper, and Arthur Kleppinger.

Motion carried requesting the Council to fill any vacancies created by a short supply of lay alternate delegates.

Resolution #9 was adopted by a unanimous standing vote and a wholehearted "Amen".

General Superintendent L. W. Sturk, at the request of the conference, sang "I'd Rather Have Jesus".

A motion carried authorizing the District Council to iron out the conflict between the General Conference date and our next year's District Camp and Conference date.

After urging the members of the conference to be much in prayer for the forth-coming General Conference he adjourned the conference by prayer at 9:45 p. m.

STANDING RULES

- 1. The District Superintendent shall appoint all Committees.
- 2. Thursday afternoon of our District Camp Meeting shall be devoted to the interest of Foreign Missions.
- 3. The first nine rows of seats and forward shall constitute the Conference Bar.
- 4. At the close of the Conference, the District Council shall attend to any business that may have been overlooked, and approve the minutes of the closing sitting.
- 5. The District Superintendent shall have a two weeks vacation annually, with pay.
- 6. The District Conference recommends that each church in the Conference give its pastor a two weeks vacation with pay each year.

GENERAL RESOLUTIONS

(NOTE:-1949 Resolutions begin at No. 10)

1. *BE IT RESOLVED*, That the Saturday afternoon and evening of the Camp Meeting be declared a District Young People's Rally and that the Executive Secretary of the Young People together with the District Council make further plans and announcements for the same.

2. BE IT RESOLVED, That our District Camp Meeting shall begin on Tuesday and continue over the following Sunday; and that the District Conference shall convene on Monday at 9:00 A. M., following the close of the District Camp and continue until Business has been concluded.

3. BE IT RESOLVED, That our District Superintendent be allowed to keep the remuneration from two revivals a year, unless holding the meeting for the Home Missionary Board.

4. *BE IT RESOLVED*, That our ordination service be held during Conference on Tuesday, at 10:30 A. M.

5. INASMUCH, as some members of this Conference do not send in annual reports,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we urge all Conference members, Foreign Missionaries excepted, to send in annual reports.

6. INASMUCH, as the Church Manual does not state an age requirement for Delegates to the District Conference,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we require Delegates to the District Conference to be 18 years of age or over.

7. BE IT RESOLVED, That any congregation considering the erection of a church building and/or parsonage, or the making of extensive improvements and remodeling of church property, submit their tentative plans for same to the District Council for approval before final action by the local board and the beginning of said construction.

8. *BE IT RESOLVED*, That no one, having held or is holding ministerial credentials, making application for membership in any of our churches, shall be accepted without the approval of the District Council.

9.....WHEREAS, the District Council generally lacks the proper and necessary information relative to ministers of other Districts and denominations desiring membership in our district;

BE IT RESOLVED, That the same be required to answer a questionnaire supplied by the District Council.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That no church shall extend a call to the said minister without having first obtained the approval of the District Council.

10. (1949 No. 1) BE IT RESOLVED, That the first part of the first session of our Annual Conference be devoted to observing the sacrament of the Lord's Supper with the presiding officer in charge.

11. (1949 No. 2) WHEREAS, during the past year our beloved Brother Harold D. Dieter has passed to his eternal reward,

BE IT RESOLVED, That our District Superintendent appoint a committee on memorials to draft a suitable memorial to the memory of our former Brother in the ministry, Bible School president, and General Officer, Rev. Harold Dieter and that a full page memorial including a picture of Brother Dieter be given in the minutes.

12. (1949 No. 7). *BE IT RESOLVED*, That the Executive Officers of the District Council constitute the Home Missionary Committee with authority to employ a Home Missionary and that said Committee report their activities to the District Council.

13. (1949 No. 8). WHEREAS, Brother W. R. Fitch has so faithfully and efficiently served the District in the capacity of District Treasurer for the past 12 years,

BE IT RESOLVED, That by a standing vote, we express our appreciation to him and bid him God's blessing as he takes up his work in the Oriental Missionary Society.

14. (1949 No. 9). WHEREAS, Our General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk has so efficiently presided over the Conference,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we express our appreciation by a rising vote of thanks and a hearty Amen.

2. INASMUCH, as the income from the pastors' tithe, has so rapidly increased, due to the development of the District; be it

RESOLVED, That we amend Resolution Number 9, page 16, to read as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED, That we require all our ministers, who are actively engaged, to pay 50% of their tithe received from ministerial work, through the local treasurer to the district treasurer.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we pay our District Superintendent a salary of \$3,200 per year and that the balance received from said pastors' tithe, be placed in the Home Missionary Fund, and that each pastor shall raise an offering upon the visit of the Superintendent for his expenses and that the telephone, postage, and telegrams shall be paid from the District Treasury.

3. WHEREAS, There has been no fund provided to maintain the Superintendent's Retiring and Emergency Fund,

B EIT RESOLVED, That all of our actively engaged ministers be required to pay 2% of their tithe to the said fund.

No. 1, 1944, Amended 1945 4. *RESOLVED*, That the Council be authorized to make a special appeal to the churches for funds to meet deficits which might develop in the District Expense Fund at any time.

No. 4, 1943, Amended 1944 5. WHEREAS, A generous gift of \$500.00 has been received by the District Council with which to establish a fund from which loans may be made to new and needy churches,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we maintain a Church Building Loan Fund. The fund is to be held in trust by the District Council, and

That 5% of the total Home Missionary Offerings be appropriated by the District Treasurer to the increase of said Church Building Loan Fund.

Loans can be made from said fund by the Council to congregations endeavoring to erect new church buildings, but only after a thorough investigation of the financial status of the congregation by the Council.

When a loan is granted, the congregation to which the loan is made shall give a note to the District Treasurer signed by the local trustees.

The principal shall be paid back in installments, with interest at 5% in advance, monthly, except that the minimum charge for interest shall not be less than 50ϕ per month. The amount of the monthly installments shall be determined by the District Council.

The District Treasurer shall mail a statement of the amount due on the 20th of each month to each church that has a loan from said Fund.

In the event that a congregation which has made a loan according to this plan, fails to meet its installments for a period of three months, its financial standing shall be investigated by the District Council.

No. 9, 1943, Amended 1944 6. INASMUCH, as the prayers of God's people have been so definitely answered down through the years in the Allentown Bible Institute, and

INASMUCH, as generous gifts have been inspired largely by the Zone-wide participation in the Penny-a-Day plan during the past three years, and

INASMUCH, as the School Board now proposes to raise sufficient funds during the next five years to meet maintenance costs and taxes on the school property and to accumulate enough money during the same period to build a much needed dormitory and library building without going into debt,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we as a District continue the use of the Pennya-Day plan, and that we put forth a wholehearted effort to raise our quota for five years on said basis in support of the School.

No. 4, 1944, Edited 1945 7. INASMUCH, as there is no provision to raise the funds for the delegates' expense to the General Conference,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we deduct 10% from the District Expense Fund for this purpose.

No. 5, 1944

8. *RESOLVED*, That each church provide the District Conference with no less than \$4.00 each for the pastor and delegate, or delegates who attend the District Conference, and

RESOLVED, That all other members of the District Conference be requested to pay at the rate of \$1.00 for each day, or for any portion thereof during the Conference sessions.

No. 5, 1943, Amended 1944 9. In accordance with the regulation of the Manual, page 77, section 109, paragraph 2, and, page 91, section 133, paragraphs 12 and 13,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we hereby apply the same ratio of payment to the District Budget and the Penny-a-Day School financial plan in the newly organized churches of this District.

No. 4, 1942

10. RESOLVED, That 7% of the total church receipts, excepting General Budget, money for indebtedness, building fund, Sunday School, young people's society funds, and special funds raised for the departments covered by the District Budget, be paid monthly to the District Treasurer to be apportioned by him as follows: 50% Bible School, 25% Home Missions, and 25% District Expense.

No. 8, 1941, Amended 1945

11. WHEREAS, The General Budget of \$3.00 per member falls far short of meeting the Foreign Missionary, Home Missionary budgets and General Administrative expense, and WHEREAS, The General Conference failed to make any provision for same, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED, That the churches of the District provide for the increase of the Missionary Budget to \$3.00 per member, same to be divided \$2.00 for Foreign Missions, and \$1.00 for Home Missions, and that an additional \$1.00 per member be raised separate from Missions for General Administrative expense of the Church. If for any reason a local church does not divide its apportionments according to the above specifications the District Treasurer is hereby authorized to divide the same.

13. *RESOLVED*, That the following officers be remunerated for their services from the District Expense Fund as follows:

14. (1949 No. 1). *BE IT RESOLVED*, That each of our churches take a special offering some time during the month of October, 1949, to be applied to paying for the lots adjoining the District Parsonage and the building of a garage on the same, and that the District Secretary notify each Pastor.

MEMORIALS TO THE 1950 GENERAL CONFERENCE

1. (Committee Memorial No. 2). *INASMUCH*, as Section 54, paragraph 8, page 43, of our Manual states that the pastor, is to see that the care of the church records is placed in the care of competent persons, and

INASMUCH, as provisions are made for the appointment of the officers of the church, by popular ballot of the entire church, thus taking it out of the hands of the pastor, and

WHEREAS, We do not want anything like politics in our church elections, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, That paragraph 8 be deleted from the Manual.

2. (Committee Memorial No. 3). *BE IT RESOLVED*, That no Licensed or Ordained Minister of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, shall accept the pastorate of any group outside of our church, without the consent of the District Council of the District in which he or she holds credentials.

3. (Committee Memorial No. 5). *BE IT RESOLVED*, That section 61, paragraph 2, on page 48, of our Manual be amended to read: "No special meetings of the board shall be called in the absence of the pastor except when calling a pastor."

4. (Committee Memorial No. 6). BE IT RESOLVED, That section 1, paragraph 1, be delected from the Manual and paragraph 2 be amended to read: "may be read and exponded, etc."

5. (Committee Memorial No. 7). "INASMUCH, as our church is traditionally against the wedding ring, and

WHEREAS, We deem it for the best interests of the Church and all concerned, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, That all our members shall refrain from wearing the wedding ring.

6. (Committee Memorial No. 9). *INASMUCH*, as several years ago our Manual was greatly improved by providing a more detailed index, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, That the index be further improved by completly classifying all related material under proper subjects.

REPORTS

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To this Thirty-Sixth Annual Conference, Greetings! "Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ: According as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love."

It has pleased God to grant us the privilege of assemblying in another conference, and for this privilege we return thanks. Since the last such meeting, two of our members have exchanged earth's toil for heaven's triumph. Mrs. Harry Greenwalt, an ordained deaconess in the district for twenty years and a member of the Milton Church for thirty-four years, left us on August 27th. Just a few days later on September 6th, Rev. Harold D. Dieter, president of the Allentown Bible Institute and for many years an official in the District, said good-bye to earth to explore the glories of the better world. The Dieter Memorial Dormitory, under construction now here on the campus at Allentown Bible Institute bespeaks the honor with which this great man served the church.

Some of the churches have enjoyed good revivals this year, and a fine spiritual atmosphere prevails in the district.

The Sunday School Committee sponsored four zone conventions that have proven to be a definite blessing to this important department of our work.

There continues to be a splendid interest in the Young People's work in the district. Rallies have been well attended and often churches crowded. The council has re-zoned the district and increased the number of zones from four to five.

I have appreciated the cooperation of the council and truly the brethren have worked together.

The many acts of kindness shown me by both laymen and ministers while visiting on the district will be long remembered.

I have visited all of the churches twice, and some of them several times.

There have been twenty-four pastoral changes during the past year. These changes took place from Conference to December and from April until the present.

In the Home Missionary Department a well located lot for a church, has been secured at York; a meeting at Laddsburg; a tent meeting at Mt. Holly and the work at Quakertown has been re-opened. Brother Kresge, our pastor at Trenton has the district tent pitched at Jamesburg, N. J., now and the evangelists and workers are carrying on in his absence. Brother Kresge reports favorably on the meeting.

The council realizing the lot on which the District Parsonage is located was too small, (20 feet frontage) took steps to purchase the adjoining lot. Finding it impossible to buy but one lot, the entire plot (80 feet) was purchased.

Two fine new parsonages were built in the district this year, one at Mt. Union and the other at Muncy. Many of our churches have improved their property and increased their facilities by constructing Sunday School rooms,

installing new heating equipment, etc. Plans are underway for a new church building at North Rome.

The Stroudsburg Church installed their new pews a few weeks ago, thus bringing their new church to completion. The church, valued at \$25,000.00 will be dedicated free of debt on Sunday afternoon, June 26, 1949.
