CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING

The forty-fourth annual conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened in Wesley Chapel on the campus of E. P. C. at 2:00 p. m. June 4, 1957, at the call of District Superintendent Castevens.

The annual conference communion service was begun as Reverend Oliver Holden led the assemblage in the song, "In the Cross," with Reverend Edgar J. Haskins presiding at the organ. Reverend M. E. Dieter led in prayer.

In the temporary absence of the General Superintendent, District Superintendent Castevens introduced Dr. R. D. Gunsalus, Second Assistant General Superintendent, as the presiding officer.

Brother Gunsalus then presented a communion message on the "Seven Possessives of Divinity" as they relate to the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. He averred that the communion is more than a memorial; it is the meeting place of Godly people with Christ Himself. We do not have to feel like a slave coming to the Lord's table, neither do we have to feel like a beggar coming to the Lord's Supper. We gather not at the foot of Calvary with its empty cross but at the feet of our risen living Lord."

The District Council was served the Sacrament by the District Superintendent, after which the members of the Council administered the sacrament to approximately 150 ministers, delegates, and guests. A beautiful spirit of tenderness and unity prevailed in a service that was climaxed with the song, "It Shall Never Lose Its Power."

After a ten minute recess the conference reconvened upon the call of Assistant General Superintendent Gunsalus at 3:05 p. m. Reverend Walter F. Bubb led in prayer.

At the call of the Presiding Officer the Conference bar was cleared. The roll was called.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that substitute lay delegates be accepted for the official conference roll call. The following were seated for the church indicated: Mrs. Herbert W. Fisher, Summit Hill; Miss Gloria Lup, Quaker Gardens; Mrs. Robert Tice, Lebanon.

The transfers of Reverend and Mrs. Paul Washburn from the Washington-Idaho District, Robert L. Smith from the New York District, and Allen Clark and John Wiktorchik from the Eastern District were received without objection.

A motion carried that Edwin Lint, the new pastor at Millville, N. J., and Robert Tice, the new pastor at Lebanon, Pa., be granted seats within the conference bar.

By motion Reverend Lloyd Shank was received into the Conference from the Evangelical Methodist Church.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. and Mrs. George Harris, new pastors at Glassboro, N. J. A motion carried that these folk be granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

John R. Clough, Leroy Fetterolf, Daniel L. Gehman, Frederic Newton, Leonard Shiley and William Thurston were presented from last year's list of proposed ordinands (1956 Conference Journal, page 16), for second ordination. Mrs. Joseph Horwath was also presented for ordination as a deaconess. By motion these were accepted for ordination June 5, 1957 at 10:30 a. m.

Reverend G. A. Castevens then presented a comprehensive report of the year's activities with suggested goals for growth and progress. The report was accepted with a rising vote of thanks and appreciation. A love offering was taken and a motion carried that Superintendent Castevens be given an extra week of vacation with pay.

General Superintendent William H. Neff arrived and the Conference arose as he was escorted to the chair by a member of the Reception Committee. Brother Neff spoke briefly and requested that Brother Gunsalus continue to preside until the end of the immediate session.

Reverend Edward T. Houston, Assistant District Superintendent, reported his activities. A motion to accept carried with a hearty "Amen."

Reverend Lodge W. Chappell read the report of the Auditing Committee which was accepted by motion.

The District Treasurer, Reverend E. S. Rutherford read a splendid report. A motion carried that this be received with appreciation and a rising vote of thanks.

The Presiding Officer turned the chair over to General Superintendent Neff after he had announced the District Superintendent's list of tellers who were also requested to act as ushers.

After Brother Neff made some remarks of appreciation for the work of the District Superintendent and the work of the District Treasurer, the session adjourned by expiration of time.

The conference dismissed with the song, "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow," and prayer by the General Superintendent.

SECOND SITTING

The second session of the 1957 conference convened at 6:30 p. m. under the direction of Reverend G. A. Castevens.

Brother Holden led the congregation in singing "Jesus Has Lifted Me." Prayer was offered by Reverend R. W. Chatfield.

District Superintendent Castevens formally welcomed Dr. and Mrs. William Neff to the conference after which the General Superintendent spoke

briefly on the text, "My Father worketh hitherto and I work." He forcefully suggested that "we may expect a deep and inner satisfaction in the fulfillment of the work for which we have prepared. We also may expect appreciation from understanding people, but if it is not forthcoming the approval of God will be our abiding satisfaction."

The minutes of the first session were approved as read.

The transfer of Reverend George Harris from the Eastern District was recognized, and by motion he was accepted as a member of the conference.

Reverend Paul W. Braisted, Promotional Secretary of Sunday Schools, presented his report which was accepted by motion. Brother Braisted presented the conference Sunday School awards to Reverend E. S. Rutherford, pastor of the Cherryville Church for the highest numerical gain and to Reverend Lodge W. Chappell, of the Middleburg Church, for the largest percentage gain. Recognition was also given to the pastors of all schools with more than a 10% gain.

The Executive Secretary of Youth, Reverend Howard J. Frey read his report. It was moved, seconded, and carried that this be received.

The report of the District Youth Treasurer, Reverend Charles Lewis, was also received by motion.

Reverend E. E. Hostetter, Secretary of the Home Missionary Committee, read a resume of the work in that department. It was moved, seconded, and carried that this report be adopted.

Reverend E. L. Adams read the statistical totals for the Conference year. His report was received with a hearty "Amen."

It was carried that the Ways and Means Committee be instructed to bring in a resolution that will provide adequate financial remuneration for the Statistician and other Conference officers.

After a motion for the previous question carried, the proposed action carried that pastors and boards be instructed by vote of conference to put a proper appraisal on their properties (with the possible exception of places where it might work a tax hardship) and that these be included in the next annual statistical report.

Reverend Charles Lewis, Secretary of the Resolutions Committee, read the full committee report up to that time.

Resolution Number 1 carried after it was amended to read in the last section "and that this retroactive part apply only to the separation of the yearly averages of the mother church and the branch Sunday School."

It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt Resolution Number II.

Resolution Number III was adopted by a motion carried.

Resolution Number IV dealing with a Home Missionary Policy carried unanimously.

By motion the time was extended until 9:30 p. m.

After some discussion and an attempt at amendment, a motion carried to refer Resolution Number V back to the committee for restudy.

It was moved and seconded to adopt Resolution Number VI. An amendment, "And that all committees shall meet on Monday at 2:00 p. m." carried. The resolution as amended carried.

A motion carried that by unanimous consent the conference instruct the District Council to set the time for next year's conference.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to adopt Resolution Number VII.

Resolution Number VIII was amended with the substitution of the words "And we further recommend that one day each week, preferably Friday, be set aside for prayer and fasting in the interest of the soul winning and membership crusade," to replace the provision for a special prayer meeting each week. This resolution passed as amended.

The session ended by expiration of time. Prayer was offered by the District Secretary.

THIRD SITTING

Brother Holden served as chorister to open the third session of the Forty-fourth Annual Conference. While Sister Shank and Brother Haskins presided at the piano and the organ, respectively, the congregation sang, "Saviour, Like a Shepherd." Robert Smith led in prayer. The General Superintendent based his devotional remarks on Philippians 4. Truth about the spiritual family and the soul winners crown was interspersed with admonitions to practice moderation, more literally "sweet reasonableness." The promise that God shall garrison or fortify our hearts with truth was emphasized.

By motion standing rule number 2 was changed to include the first twelve rows of seats in the conference bar.

The minutes of the last session were approved as read.

The Ways and Means Committee reported through its Secretary, Reverend Edgar J. Haskins.

Ways and Means Number I was adopted by common consent.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to adopt Ways and Means Number II.

Ways and Means Number III was amended to set the District Treasurer's salary at \$300.000 and provide for the remuneration of the Promotional Secretary of Sunday Schools and the Executive Secretary of Youth out of the appropriate funds. The motion as amended carried.

It was moved and seconded to adopt Ways and Means Number IV. An amendment substituting the previous method of procedure for handling the offerings given for the Superintendent's travel expense, carried. Ways and Means Number IV as amended carried.

The proposed General Conference Memorials were read by the District Secretary.

Memorial Number I was adopted.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to adopt Memorial Number II.

Memorial Number III was carried by motion.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt Memorial Number IV. By common agreement the proposal to mimeograph this memorial carried.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to recess for the annual ordination service and reconvene for business at 1:30 p. m.

ORDINATION SERVICE

The annual ordination service began with the old hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have." The invocation was offered by Harold R. Crosser. Brothers E. S. Rutherford, Edward T. Houston, and R. D. Gunsalus read appropriate portions of scripture from the New Testament books of Timothy and Titus.

The charge to the candidates was based on a text found in Galatians 2:20. Our esteemed General Superintendent based his remarks on the words, "I Live." He pointed out that the finest of the fine arts is to live effectively. This he indicated was the main task of the Gospel minister. If we muster all of our moral strength and spiritual insight, they will point to the possibility of seeing beyond into the undreamed beauties of the spiritual universe. He urged upon the ordinands that they exercise a spirit of reverence, a spirit of humility, a high sense of responsibility, and make purposefulness a strong element in their living. The Ordination Council made up of the General Superintendent, Second Assistant General Superintendent Gunsalus and the executive officers of the district laid hands on the candidates as they were ordained. District Superintendent Castevens prayed the prayer of consecration after which certificates were presented and the ordinands were congratulated by friends and relatives.

The ordination service concluded with wholehearted and spontaneous singing of hymns of dedication and a prayer of dismissal by Brother Castevens.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the conference convened promptly at 1:30 p. m. Brother Holden led in singing, "We'll Work 'Til Jesus Comes." Reverend Clarence Kresge petitioned Divine guidance.

Minutes of the last sitting were approved as read.

Mimeographed copies of Memorial IV were distributed and the legislation was re-read by the secretary. With the assent of the Memorials Committee, the matter of permitting the pastor access to meetings of the Pastoral Relations Committee, was incorporated without formal action. Memorial IV was adopted.

After an attempt to amend Memorial V was lost, a motion for the previous question carried and the motion to adopt the memorial was lost.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to adopt Memorial VI.

A motion to adopt a substitute for Memorial VII carried. The substitute motion, that this memorial be referred to the Memorials Committee of the General Board for a clarification of policy concerning labor unions, carried.

Memorials VIII, IX, X were adopted by motion.

It was moved and seconded to reconsider the previous Conference action concerning branch Sunday Schools. The motion to reconsider was lost after it was pointed out that this action conforms to the policy as set up by the General Sunday School Department.

Ways and Means Number V was presented by Committee Secretary Edgar J. Haskins. A motion carried that the matter be tabled for one year until we discover how the new Home Missionary Policy works out.

The Resolutions Committee reported through its Secretary, Charles Lewis. Resolution Numbers IX and X were passed by motion carried.

The chair ruled Resolution Number XI a matter of editing.

Resolution Number V, which had been referred back to the committee for redrafting, was presented. A motion carried that this matter be sent to the District Council for action.

After a motion for the previous question carried, Resolution Number XII was adopted by motion. Brother Harold Crosser thanked the conference for their kindness and spoke of the many past ties that had been so great a blessing to him personally.

It was announced to the Conference that Reverend C. E. Wert, Dean of Eastern Pilgrim College and a member of the District Council, had accepted the presidency of the Colorado Springs Bible College. It was also announced that Reverend Harold Crosser, able secretary of the District, had accepted a call to the Arizona District. A motion calling for a rising vote of thanks to our highly esteemed brethren, for services rendered to the school and the district, carried. Brother Wert responded in a feeling way. A personal tribute was given Brother Wert by President Gunsalus of Eastern Pilgrim College. "Blest Be the Tie that Binds" and "In the Sweet Bye and Bye" were sung by the conference group.

(Above paragraph revised by Albert Massey.)

Resolution Number XIII carried unanimously with a hearty "Amen."

A motion carried that the order of the day be the election of officers.

The list of renewals for District license, as presented by the Examining and Education Board, was accepted by the Conference with a motion, carried.

The list of new licentiates was approved by motion: Daniel Conrad, W. Franklin Michael, John Croft, G. Edwin Lint, Leon Lutz, Robert J. Tice, Earl Eyster, Kermit Shrawder, Arland Romberger.

Additional tellers were appointed by the District Superintendent.

On the first ballot cast for Assistant District Superintendent, Reverend Edward T. Houston was elected with 102 out of 127 votes.

Albert Massey, Howard J. Frey and Elmer Hocking were presented as the Council nominees for District Secretary. Reverend Albert Massey was elected on the second ballot with 99 out of 127 votes.

The Secretary read the names of E. S. Rutherford, E. L. Adams, and P. W. Braisted as District Treasurer nominees from the Council. Reverend E. S. Rutherford was elected on the first ballot with 105 out of 128 votes.

A ballot with five names was cast for the Advisory members of the District Council.

Reports from the zone meetings to elect home missionary chairmen resulted in the election of Reverend W. F. Bubb, Bald Eagle zone; Reverend Alvin Jackson, Susquehanna Zone; Reverend William Derr, Lehigh Zone; and Reverend Clarence Kresge, Garden State Zone. A motion carried that these elections by zones be ratified by Conference.

Dr. R. D. Gunsalus, President of E. P. C., reported on the City Wide Campaign for new dormitories. The conference rejoiced that over \$108,000.00 in cash, pledges, and gifts in kind, had been raised for the new expansion program.

The sitting was adjourned by expiration of time.

FIFTH SITTING

The last sitting of the 1957 conference convened with prayer by Reverend Bobbie Bidwell.

A motion that the minutes of the afternoon and evening sittings be approved by the District Council carried.

The report of the first ballot for advisory council members showed the election of Reverends M. E. Dieter, R. D. Gunsalus, and John P. Campbell.

A motion carried that the remaining two advisory members be elected out of the next four highest on the first ballot, these being: Howard J. Frey, E. E. Hostetter, Frank H. Schweitzer, and Walter F. Bubb.

The second ballot produced the election of Reverend Howard J. Frey. A motion carried to vote for one of the next two highest which were Frank H. Schweitzer and Walter F. Bubb. Reverend Frank H. Schweitzer was elected the last advisory council member on the third ballot.

With the election of Brother Schweitzer to the Council, the conference requested his resignation from the Examining and Education Board. The District Council withdrew momentarily to provide additional nominees for this board.

The nominees for the Examining and Educational Board were Edward Crosser, Alvin Jackson, and Edgar J. Haskins with the Council suggesting that the one with the highest vote receive the three year term and the second highest the unexpired one year term of Brother Schweitzer. Reverend Edward Crosser was elected to the three-year term, and Reverend Edgar Haskins to the one-year term.

A motion carried to use the plurality system for the election of General Conference ministerial delegates, with the first 12 elected being delegates and the next 12 alternates. The ballot for General Conference delegates was cast.

Nominations for the lay delegation to General Conference were received from the floor as follows: C. E. Doll, H. A. Garrison, Richard Stokes, Walter Linderman, Irvin Crissinger, Edward Harper, Roy Spotts, Harry Yeager, Martin Hill, Max Hile, Roy Trostle, Carl Kresge, and John Argot. By motion the nominations were closed, after which five of the above names were put on the ballot for lay delegates. Additional tellers were appointed to count this ballot.

The roll call of churches for Conference Journal orders was taken.

The proposed ordinands for next year, Edwin Mayes and David Wooten, were accepted by unanimous consent.

The ballot for ministerial delegates to the General Conference produced the election of the following: M. E. Dieter, Bobbie Bidwell, John P. Campbell, Walter F. Bubb, E. E. Hostetter, Howard J. Frey, P. W. Braisted, Elmer J. Hocking, Frank H. Schweitzer, Edgar J. Haskins, E. L. Adams, and Edward Crosser. The alternate delegates in the order of their election were: Alvin E. Jackson, L. W. Chappell, C. F. Kresge, Charles Lewis, George E. Culver, Robert Smith, Oliver G. Holden, William Derr, P. R. Doyle, Harry J. Daniels, Irvin Kratzer, Russell Lutz.

The tellers reported the election of H. A. Garrison, Carl Kresge, Roy Spotts, C. E. Doll, and Irvin Crissinger as lay delegates to the General Conference. Alternate delegates were elected in the following order: Edward Harper, Martin Hill, John Argot, Max Hile, and John Linderman.

Sister Deborah Hoover reported for the Committee on Memoirs. The conference stood in a season of silent tribute to the faithful Pilgrims who had gone on to their heavenly reward.

A letter of appreciation from the Levittown Church to the conference was read.

Mrs. William H. Neff, wife of the General Superintendent, was presented by the Reception Committee. She spoke feelingly concerning a district women's organization.

The Presiding Officer presented matters concerning the Forward Movement.

Resolution Number XIV carried unanimously. Following the instruction of this action, District Superintendent Castevens expressed appreciation to General Superintendent Neff and all others who had helped to make the conference a success. A rising vote of thanks was given to all of these.

The conference adjourned at 9:05 p. m. with prayer by Dr. William H. Neff.

CONFERENCE REPORTS

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

Our wonderful Lord has been pleased to grant us the privilege to meet in the capacity of another Annual Conference. We are most grateful, I am sure, that the fine facilities of Eastern Pilgrim College are made available to us for this occasion. It affords me great pleasure to extend greetings and a warm welcome to our highly esteemed General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff, Mrs. Neff, the delegates and friends to the forty-fourth Annual Conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District. It is my sincere prayer we shall have the Divine Presence and Guidance throughout this great gathering. May God give us understanding hearts, so that in this Conference, policies will be adopted that will advance the cause of Christ in these parts.

THE SOUL SAVING CRUSADE

Without any reservation whatsoever, I am moved to state again that the Holy Spirit gave birth to the Forward Advance and Soul Saving Crusade at the National Headquarters of our Church in January 1956. With deep concern, let me further assert that just to the extent that we as leaders and pastors have cooperated with this Spirit approved movement in our midst; to that extent has and will the work of God progress among us.

It should be pointed out that the inceptive act on the part of the Holy Spirit is not sufficient in the application of this movement in our Zion. It must be followed through with re-anointings of the Holy Spirit coupled with hard work. And without fear of successful contradiction, much of the anointing we need will only come as we go. Our Lord did not say, "Pray them in from the highways and byways." He commanded, "Go ye therefore into the highways, and as many as ye shall find, bid to the marriage." Note Christ said, "GO, FIND, BID." Then, fellow-workers, to comply with this command of the Master, we will have to become more active than heretofore in our own Conference.

PROGRESS

In my humble judgment, this has been a good year spiritually throughout the District. Many have been the reports of special visitations from the presence of the Lord in our Churches. I do not share the fatalistic pessimism of a very small minority that the Pilgrim Holiness Church is retreating spiritually. I have implicit confidence in the General and District Leaders of our Church. Also, I have unbounding faith in the thousands of our faithful and devout laymen. This is no time to play in the minor scale of our imperfections, but contrariwise we should play loudly on the major scale of our integrity. To speak a good word about your fellow-pilgrim minister or brother is surely commendable.

Both statistically and financially, progress has been made, with the exception of District Home Missions. Giving to District Home Missions was

cut about 50% over last year. This resulted from the change made in the sources of revenue for this department. This will account in a great measure for the inability of the Home Missionary Board in the opening of new churches. With curtailed finance, we were only able to keep previous projects floating. The Ways and Means Committee should give serious study to this particular matter.

Goals set for Branch Sunday Schools were reached in the early part of the Conference. Seven or eight were started. Because of a number of reports not reaching my office, it was impossible to tabulate a full report in membership gain. However, from the reports received our net gain was about 30 or 40. The report of the District Statistician will no doubt give a more complete report in this respect.

Giving to the General Church will exceed that of last Conference. The Department showing the greatest gain is General Church Extension, with an increase of over \$4,000.00. Eastern Pilgrim College was supported encouragingly again with a total giving of over \$11,000.00.

HIGHLIGHTS

During this Conference, Memorials to the General Conference will be presented for discussion and decision. The District Memorials Committee has developed some worthwhile proposals. I sincerely trust that these Memorials will receive your best consideration. Then, too, delegates to the General Conference will be elected. This matter should be a concern of our most earnest praying.

A very fine policy for District Home Missions has been drawn up by the Board of Home Missions and the District Council. In my judgment, it will be a forward step to adopt the same.

A letter from Rev. Melvin H. Snyder, Director of the Soul Saving Crusade brought information that the General Forward Movement Committee is setting our goals as the same as last Conference year. Before receiving his letter, the District Forward Movement Committee had authorized the District Superintendent to set the goals for our Conference. If the new policy for District Home Missions is adopted, the following goals will be presented:

1. That each Church have a weekly prayer meeting in the interest of a spiritual awakening throughout the Conference, and the winning of souls to Christ.
2. That each pastor organize visitation groups in his Church, with the view of doing personal evangelism.
3. That the winning of souls and the membership goals remain the same as last Conference year.
4. That each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent strive for at least a ten percent gain in Sunday School attendance.
5. That the Home Missionary Board in conjunction with the Zone Committees be responsible for one new Church in each Zone.

6. That the District Sunday School Board be responsible for one new branch Sunday School in each Home Missionary Zone.

The foregoing goals are a bit higher than that set by the General Committee. I have informed Director Snyder of these goals.

Another new project has been set up, namely, the District Youth Camp. This project was authorized by the District Council. Our very efficient Youth Promotional Secretary, Rev. Howard J. Frey, and the seven capable Zone Leaders have done a superb job in setting up this very worthwhile project. Pastors, you will be the key men in directing your youth to this first Youth Camp. Don't fail at this point. Let all of us give the Youth Leaders our wholehearted support.

Rev. Paul W. Braisted, our capable Sunday School Promotional Secretary, is to be highly commended for his very efficient work in promoting the work in this department of the District. The Sunday Schools this year are showing a gain of approximately ten percent.

Leaders in membership gain, gleaned from the reports received in my office are as follows: Calvary Church, gain of 15; Milton Church, gain of 9; Allenwood and Delaware Run Churches, a gain of 8, respectively.

Many thousands of dollars have gone into property improvements. These have been reported through the Pilgrim Action. However, the two new units at Levittown and Calvary, Bethlehem, were completed during the year. Harrisburg, First Church has sold their property and plans are under way for a complete new plant in one of the new developments in the Capitol city. A parsonage has been completed at the Summit Hill Church. Last word from Lock Haven Church is that they will begin an expansion program to take care of the growing congregation. Allenwood Church is also planning an expansion program to accommodate their growing congregation. Bethany Chapel, Point Phillips, Pa., sponsored by the Cherryville Church, is near completion.

PERSONAL REPORT

Sermons and addresses 147; Church visits 114; Church Board meetings 36; annual meetings 30; pastoral call meetings 3; District Council meetings 9; committee meetings 13; revival meetings on and off the District 2; week-end meetings 1; youth rallies 2; dedicatory services 3; mortgage burning services 1; communion services 3; prayed with for healing 13; children dedicated 4; Sunday School rallies 3; Camp Board meetings 6; marriages 1; ministerial zone meetings 5; General Board meetings 2; Forward Movement Committee meetings 2; Lehigh Valley Wesleyan Fellowship meetings 7; E. P. C. Board meetings 2. I also attended the Church Leader's Conference. It was my privilege to preach the first week-end at Bethany Camp Meeting. Also presided at the District Ministerial Convention. It was my pleasure to be the guest speaker at the Illinois District Ministerial Convention.

I have traveled approximately 27,005 miles in the interest of God's work. My salary from the District is paid in full. Offerings from revivals, week-end meetings, and conventions have amounted to \$682.50. To date I have received \$975.95 for travel expense.

GRATITUDE

In concluding this report we should express thanks to our Heavenly Father, that our ministerial family has come through the year without the invasion of death. At this time, however, Brother Ferguson is failing, and he will appreciate our prayers.

I am personally grateful to an understanding and faithful District Council, to a very godly group of ministers and wives, and to nearly two thousand laymen for their personal kindness shown.

Again let me reiterate, it is no time to be quibbling over incidentals while the world about us is perishing for the Bread of Life. I appeal to you, my fellow-laborers, let us rise and meet the tremendous challenge of making Christ known to every soul possible. If this passion can grip us as it should, there will be little or no room for extended debate over the extraneous and mundane things. But, our hearts will be burning to bring some wanderer to the fold. God grant that it may be so.

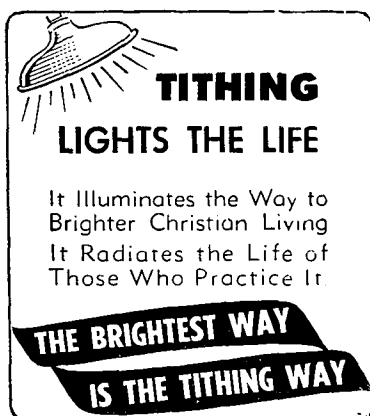

REPORT OF THE PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

To the Forty-fourth Annual Conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Sunday School Greetings:

Another year has been recorded by the Pennsylvania-New Jersey Sunday School Department. It has been an eventful year marking the eighth successive year of Sunday School growth for our District. Our average attendance of 4,273 this year, over an average attendance of 3,913 last year, gives us a numerical gain of 360, or approximately 10%. In comparing this with our average of 2,820, eight years ago, we have had a numerical gain of 1,453, or a 51½% gain for the eight year period.

Our sincere congratulations for outstanding achievement go to our Sunday Schools at Cherryville and Middleburg. The Cherryville Pilgrims have captured the award for the highest numerical gain with an increase of 33 over last year. We salute you Brother Rutherford and your good people who have labored so faithfully to bring this about. The Conference award for the largest percentage gain goes to Middleburg, with a 49% gain. Congratulations to you Brother Chappell and to your Sunday School staff.

It has been a good year, but it is now history. Ahead of us lies another year. Let us arise to the challenge, "The Harvest Truly Is Great."

We are greatly encouraged that God has signally blessed the Penn-Jersey Pilgrims with a wonderful group of Christian young people. Youth who are interested in honoring Christ, serving God and taking their place in the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Our youth endeavours have been blessed of God with souls won to the Master. Three new societies were organized during the year, namely, Delaware Run, North Rome, and Highland, Pa. Blessings upon these new societies and their leaders.

Appreciable gains have been made in two of our zones throughout the year. The New Jersey Zone under the capable leadership of Rev. Raymond F. Culp has made a gain of 91% over the rally attendance of the previous year. Also the Western Zone has made numerical gain under the able direction of their Zone Leader Rev. Bobbie Bidwell.

HOME MISSIONARY COMMITTEE REPORT

To the Forty-fourth Conference of the
Pennsylvania-New Jersey District, Greetings:

During the year financial help has been given to the Levittown Church. They are continuing to make gradual progress and are getting on well. But the church will need some care and help from the District for another year. A little help from the District often affords a lot of encouragement for those who have done well.

The Home Missionary Department had an interest in the new Calvary Church in Bethlehem. Some aid was given in securing a parsonage. Some financial help also was given to Pen Argyl Church for the rental of their parsonage.

In order for the Pastor of the Lebanon Church to devote his time to minister to spiritual needs financial assistance was given to supplement his salary. This effort met with gratifying results.

The crowning work of the Home Missionary Department was to formulate a new policy for Home Missionary Evangelism. It consists in zoning the leadership, raising funds, reaching the unsaved, and establishing new churches, with definite aims and goals set for the year. This policy is approved by the District Council and is ready for ratification by this Confer-

ence. We believe this will mark a new era in our Home Missionary endeavor.

As a committee we thank the Lord for His blessing during the year.

GENERAL CONFERENCE MEMORIALS

I. BE IT RESOLVED that the Manual Page 18, section 25, paragraph 1, be revised so that the number of members necessary for the organization of a local church be increased from seven to twelve.

II. BE IT RESOLVED that \$2,000.00 be appropriated for the preparation of a fully documented history of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and that the General Board select a qualified individual or individuals to work on this documented official history to be prepared and published within the next quadrennium.

III. BE IT RESOLVED that the General Conference authorize the General Board to establish a permanent planning commission of eleven members composed of two General Board members (excluding members of the Executive Council), two district superintendents, two pastors, one evangelist, and four laymen.

The commission personnel shall be elected at the General Board meeting immediately following the General Conference.

The General Superintendent shall act as temporary chairman in an organizational meeting to be called within one month after the close of the General Board meeting which elects the commission.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the duties and functions of the Permanent Planning Commission shall be as follows:

1. To survey the total program of the church quadrennially with at least one phase of the denomination's activities and policies being reviewed each year. These phases or areas shall include, (1) Administration, (2) Polity, (3) Business enterprises, (4) All established departments of the denomination.

2. To present annually a written report of survey or surveys together with recommendations directly to the regular Fall meeting of the General Board.

3. To further make a quadrennial report of its activities and recommendations to the General Conference.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Permanent Planning Commission shall have powers and right to act as follows:

1. The Commission shall be empowered to review the methods and practices of the various areas of the denomination in order to make recommendations for the rendering of the most effective service by each department.

2. The Commission shall have the right to discuss with various department heads not only matters of procedure but also fiscal and financial policy.

3. The Commission shall have the right to request access to official records in each department.

4. The Commission shall work without salary but all expenses of their activities shall be paid by being prorated to the various departments of the denomination.

5. The chairman shall be empowered to call further meetings.

6. Other duties and powers as well as tenure of office shall be fixed by the General Board.

IV. In the light of current difficulties that more and more frequently arise during the calling of a pastor,

BE IT RESOLVED that a more detailed pattern of procedure be given in our Manual for the placing of pastors, the same to be as follows:

1. Let an eight day period be set aside by each annual conference, this period of time to be from Sunday to Sunday and at least two months preceding the conference sessions, for the purpose of holding all call pastor meetings.

2. Reports of these meetings shall be immediately forwarded to the District Superintendent who shall then begin to work with the churches that will be calling a new pastor.

3. Each District shall hereafter have what shall be called a Pastoral Relations Committee of seven members to be made up of the executive officers of the District plus three ordained ministers who shall be elected for three year terms on a staggered basis.

4. At the end of the period required for the tentative call of new pastors by the churches, the District Superintendent shall call together the Pastoral Relations Committee to review all of the new pastoral assignments and approve or disapprove the calls on that list.

5. In the event that there is disapproval of any call on the list, the church shall be advised by the District Superintendent of this fact and shall be given a list of approved candidates from the Pastoral Relations Committee. The church board in question shall then list these approved candidates in order of their preference and send this list to Conference with the delegates to be presented to the Pastoral Relations Committee.

6. Should a local church fail to call a pastor by the time conference convenes or fail to make a choice from the preferential list of candidates given to it by the Pastoral Relations Committee it will then be the duty of the Committee to appoint a pastor.

7. In those instances where a Church has satisfactorily completed a recall or a new call it shall still be the duty of the conference delegate to appear before the Pastoral Relations Committee and present a written statement from the church board with regard to the call pastor meeting and matters that concern the welfare of the pastor and the church. The pastor shall also have access to the meetings of the Pastoral Relations Committee.

8. It shall be the last order of conference business for the presiding officer to read the list of pastoral appointments for the coming year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all sections of the Manual that appertain to the calling of a pastor under the old system shall be deleted, be revised, or be made to conform to this new pattern of procedure for the calling of a pastor.

V. LOST.

VI. WHEREAS the number of District Council members required to be present to constitute a quorum is much higher than is often practical (page 59, Section III, Pars. 2 and 3) and could easily hinder district work;

BE IT RESOLVED that the numbers necessary for a quorum be changed in paragraphs 2 and 3 to read 6 and 8 instead of 7 and 9.

VII. Referred to the General Board Memorials Committee.

VIII. BE IT RESOLVED that the Manual Page 29, Section 53, Paragraph 1, the first sentence, shall be revised to read, "An ordained or licensed minister may be called to the pastorate of a local church, or circuit, by a two-thirds vote of all the church members of voting age with no provision for absentee ballots."

IX. The following memorial involves the deletion of page 73, section 140, adding to the duties of the Executive Council Page 77, section 144, paragraph 24 (New Paragraph).

BE IT RESOLVED that the General Board shall elect by ballot in its first meeting following the General Conference a manager of the Pilgrim Publishing House and printing establishment. Such election shall be made from three nominees by the Executive Council.

The duties and salary of the Publishing House manager shall be defined by the General Board.

The term of office shall be for two years, subject to re-election, if so desired by the General Board.

The work of the Publishing House manager periodically shall come under review of the Executive Council and the Publishing House manager shall be directly amenable to the General Superintendent.

X. The following memorial has to do with revising the Manual provision for a Polity Committee, Page 66, sections 120, 121, 122.

BE IT RESOLVED that the following be substituted for page 66, section 120 of the Manual:

"The Polity Committee shall be composed of 25 persons. They shall be elected by the delegates from the five zones of the church, each zone electing 5 members of the committee who are members of a district in their zone. The Polity Committee shall organize by the election of a Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary.

Section 122, Paragraphs 1 and 2 shall remain the same.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following be substituted for page 26, section 122, paragraph 3:

For the work of preparing Memorials for presentation to the General Conference, the Polity Committee shall be divided into five sub-committees, composed of one member from each zone, which committees shall give intensive study to matters relating to the following fields: government, doctrine, judiciary, ministry, ritual and miscellany. After separate study of the sub-committees in each of these fields, the same sub-committees shall bring recommendations to the whole committee for approval and final arrangement.

REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

Resolution Number I (As amended by the Conference)

WHEREAS there has been no official method of tabulation of attendance of branch Sunday Schools and the mother churches;

BE IT RESOLVED that this method be adopted:

1. The attendance at the mother church should be recorded in the usual manner.
2. All persons present, including members of the mother church, shall be counted as attendants at the branch Sunday School.
3. These figures of attendance shall be reported separately.
4. That the records of conference year 1956-'57 be adjusted to conform with this ruling, the retroactive part applying only to the separation of the yearly averages of the branch Sunday School and the mother church.

Resolution Number II

RESOLVED that an installation service shall be conducted by some district official for each incoming pastor to the local church.

Resolution Number III

RESOLVED that standing rule Nos. 17 and 18 be deleted from the conference minutes.

Resolution Number IV

DISTRICT CONFERENCE HOME MISSIONARY POLICY

Since the Pennsylvania-New Jersey Conference covers such a vast area, and inasmuch as the present policy is inadequate to properly supervise and promote the Home Missionary interest of the conference,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the following outlined policy for the home missionary work in the conference be adopted:

1. That the conference be divided into four home missionary zones, namely: The Bald Eagle Valley Zone, the Susquehanna Valley Zone, the Lehigh Valley Zone, and the Garden State Zone.

2. That a zone chairman shall be elected by the delegates in attendance at the Annual Conference. The zone elections shall be presided over by the executive officers of the District Council. And the zone chairmen elections shall be ratified by the Annual Conference.

3. That there shall be zone home missionary committees composed of the zone chairman and two other members appointed by the Conference home missionary board. The zone committees shall promote the interest of home missions in their respective zone.

Each zone committee shall present through its chairman any and all home missionary projects to the conference home missionary board for approval.

The zone committees shall be authorized to raise funds for special projects over and above budget apportionment in the zone churches by personal representation. All funds shall be sent to the District Treasurer by the local treasurer specified for said zone.

Should additional funds be necessary in establishing home missionary projects, that said funds be paid out of the District budget home missionary funds. This supplemental financial assistance shall require District Council action and approval.

4. That the election of zone chairmen and the appointment of zone committee members shall be for two years. If for any reason vacancies should occur in zone chairmanship or committeemen, that the vacancy of zone chairman shall be filled by the District Council, and the vacancy of zone committeemen shall be filled by the conference Home Missionary Board.

5. That each zone chairman shall submit a quarterly report of the zone committee's activities to the District Superintendent.

6. That the District Council shall review any home missionary endeavor of the conference Home Missionary Board and the zone committees. The District Council shall have the right to issue directives to the conference Home Missionary Board, when in their judgment such directives are needed relative to home missionary work within the conference.

Resolution Number V (As amended by the Conference)

BE IT RESOLVED that standing rule Number 1, page 67, be amended to read, "the district conference shall convene annually in the auditorium of Eastern Pilgrim College at 10:00 a. m. on Tuesday following the commencement and that all committees shall meet on Monday at 2:00 p. m.

Resolution Number VI

BE IT RESOLVED that we shall have a two-day annual Ministerial Convention to be held in Wesley Chapel beginning 10:00 a. m. the first Tuesday after Easter.

Resolution Number VII (As amended by the Conference)

Soul Winning Crusade Legislation (See Forward Movement Section).

Resolution Number VIII

BE IT RESOLVED that the Sunday School and Youth Zones be re-named to conform with the Home Missionary Policy in the following manner:

Western to be known as Bald Eagle Valley Zone.

North Central and Central to be Upper Susquehanna.

South Central to be Lower Susquehanna Zone.

South Eastern to be the Western Lehigh Zone.

North Eastern to be Eastern Lehigh Zone.

New Jersey to be the Garden State Zone.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a Zone Directory of these be made a part of the Conference Journal.

Resolution Number IX

BE IT RESOLVED that Resolution Number 9, page 62, be changed to read "zone leaders" in place of "officers."

Resolution Number X (The Chairman ruled this a matter of editing)**Resolution Number XI**

INASMUCH as the present district secretary wore out his personal typewriter in the interest of district work, BE IT RESOLVED that this conference shall replace it with a new portable.

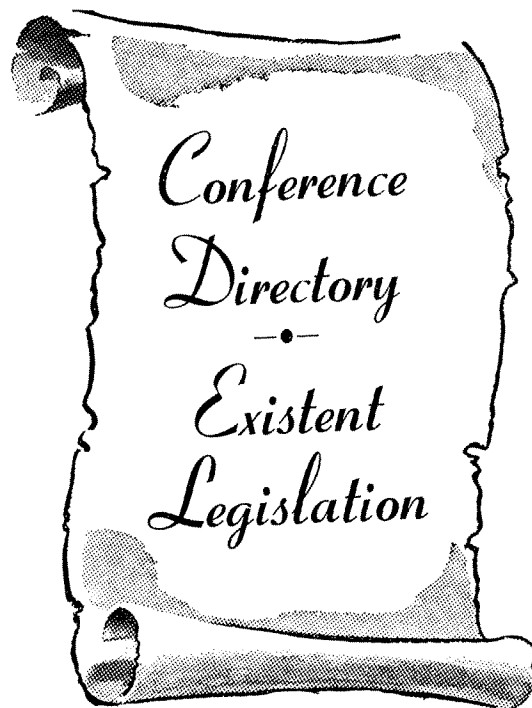

GENERAL RESOLUTIONS

Close of Conference Year

1. BE IT RESOLVED, that our Conference Year end on April 30.

Deadline for Statistical and Financial Reports

2. BE IT RESOLVED, that all reports to the District Statistician and remittances to the District Treasurer be postmarked not later than May 15.

Questionnaire for Ministers Entering Pa.-N. J. Conference

3. WHEREAS, the District Council generally lacks the proper and necessary information relative to ministers of other districts and denominations desiring membership in our district;

BE IT RESOLVED, that the same be required to answer a questionnaire supplied by the District Council.

Church Call to Ministers Outside District

4. BE IT RESOLVED, that no church shall extend a call to a minister outside of the District without having first obtained the approval of the District Council.

Council Permission for Ministerial Membership in Local Church

5. BE IT RESOLVED, that no one, having held or holding ministerial credentials, making application for membership in any of our churches, shall be accepted without the approval of the District Council.

Council and Delinquent Ministers

6. BE IT RESOLVED, that this Conference require the District Council to deal with those holding Credentials from our District who do not support the Conference with their personal assessments, nor send in their statistical and financial reports, regardless of their field of labor.

Recommendations for First District Ministers' Licenses

7. INASMUCH, as the responsibility for the execution of all Conference action rests primarily on its entire ministry,

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Conference instruct its Examining Board to recommend for their first district licenses, only those who give evidence of intention to take a permanent place in our ministry.

Council Permission for Building and Repair

8. BE IT RESOLVED, that any congregation considering the erection of a church building and/or parsonage, or the making of extensive improvements and remodeling of church property costing more than \$2,000.00, submit their tentative plans for the same to the District Council for approval before final action by the local board and the beginning of said construction.

Appointment and Notification of Youth Officers

9. BE IT RESOLVED, that the newly elected District Council appoint the Youth Zone Leaders and notify them of their appointment within one week after the annual conference adjourns.

District Superintendent's Revival Schedule

10. BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent be permitted to conduct only two revivals a year outside of the bounds of the Conference.

District Charter Nullification

11. WHEREAS, the development and progress of the International Holiness Church has outmoded the District Charter of 1914, and

WHEREAS, for many years the District has been operating under the Charter of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the United States,

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Pennsylvania-New Jersey Conference go on record officially as operating under the Charter of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the United States of America.

Local Church Deeds

12. WHEREAS, the District Records indicate that several of our Church properties are not deeded according to the Manual,

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Conference request the local church board of the District to check the wording of their property deed and urge those whose deeds are faulty to have them recorded according to the requirements of the 1954 Manual.

Candidates for Ordination

13. BE IT RESOLVED, that all candidates for ordination be examined a year in advance of their ordination.

Said candidates shall be passed upon by the Examining Board and the District Council.

The final approval of the Conference shall be reserved until the first session of the Conference, where they are to be ordained. Said Conference approval shall be the order of the day immediately after the roll call of the first sitting.

A list of said candidates shall be announced in the final sitting of the Conference preceding their ordination and such list shall be published in the Conference Journal.

Any default in spirit or practice during the intervening year or failure to carry out any prescribed program of the Council or Examining Board shall cancel out the possibility of the final approval of the Conference.

Time of Call Pastor Meeting

14. INASMUCH, as the dates for Annual Meetings, at which time pastors are called, cover such a long period of weeks,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that to facilitate matters the calling of the pastor be separated from the Annual Meeting and that all of our churches have a call pastor meeting some time during the period from the first Sunday in April through the second Sunday in April. (As amended by the 1956 Conference).

Procedures for Calling a Pastor

15. INASMUCH, as there seems to be considerable confusion in the placing and calling of pastors due to the diversity of methods and procedures being used and insisted upon by the churches,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that a form of procedure for the calling of pastors be established as follows to serve as a guide for the future:

(1). Let all of the call pastor meetings be held during the period involving the first Sunday in April through the second Sunday in April.

(2). If the pastor is not recalled, resigns or does not submit his name for a vote, the result of the meeting should immediately be forwarded to the Superintendent by the church secretary.

(3). If the pastor is recalled he can have the legal time established by the manual to accept or reject the call. If he does or does not accept the call he shall immediately inform the superintendent of his decision.

(4). In the event of the pastor's leaving, whatever the circumstances, the superintendent shall present either in person, writing, or through an authorized representative the list of available ministers, with recommendations that naturally fall within his jurisdiction.

(5). It shall be the privilege of the local board and the church to immediately call a man on the basis of recommendation, without having a trial message.

(6). In the event a board and church desire a trial message, the board shall make a choice of a candidate. If two or three candidates are chosen they should be designated as first, second, and third choice.

(7). After the trial message of the first candidate there shall be a vote on the candidate within a reasonable length of time, preferably immediately.

(8). If the first candidate is not called, or refuses to accept the call, the same procedure shall be followed with the second candidate or third.

(9). In no case however shall a second candidate be called to preach a trial message until a vote has been taken by the board and the church on the first candidate.

(10). Let all retiring ministers consider their ministry to a church as ending, according to manual, the Sunday following Conference, and all moving take place the following week. (As amended by the 1956 Conference).

Church and Pastoral Directory

16. BE IT RESOLVED that the pastor's name and address be listed in the church directory of our Conference minutes with the church. (Carried)

Local Church Directory for Conference Officials

17. BE IT RESOLVED that it shall be a procedure, under the direction of the District Secretary, that blanks shall be supplied to each pastor for an official directory of his church, and that this information be passed on to the various official personnel of the Conference.

Preference to District Ministers

18. BE IT RESOLVED that the Conference go on record as requesting that the Local Church Boards give due consideration to all District Ministers, desiring pastorates, presented to them by the District Superintendent. (Carried)

WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTIONS

Ministerial Tithes to District

1. BE IT RESOLVED, That we require all our pastors to pay 50% of their tithe received from ministerial work, through the local treasurer to the district treasurer; and all other licensed and ordained ministers send 50% of the tithe they receive from Christian service direct to the District Treasurer.

Division of Ministerial Tithes

2. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That 40% of the surplus of ministerial tithes over the amount required for the District Superintendent's salary and the Pilgrim Pension Plan allotment be placed in a District Parsonage Fund, and the remaining 60% surplus in the Home Missionary Fund.

Ministerial Assessment for Superintendent's Retiring And Emergency Fund

3. WHEREAS, There has been no fund provided to maintain the Superintendent's Retiring and Emergency Fund,

BE IT RESOLVED, That all of our actively engaged ministers be required to pay 2% of their tithe to the said fund.

District Expense Deficits

4. RESOLVED, That the Council be authorized to make a special appeal to the churches for the funds to meet deficits which might develop in the District Expense Fund at any time.

General Conference Expense Fund

5. INASMUCH, As there is no provision to raise the funds for the delegates' expense to the General Conference,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we deduct ten percent from the District Expense Fund for this purpose.

District Budget

6. RESOLVED, That 8½% of the total church receipts, excepting General Budget, money for indebtedness, building fund, revival offerings, Sunday School, Youth Society funds, and special funds raised for the departments covered by the District Budget, be paid monthly to the District Treasurer to be apportioned by him as follows:

Eastern Pilgrim College -----	40%
District Home Missions -----	30%
District Expense -----	25%
District Sunday School Expense -----	3%
District Youth Expense -----	2%

(As amended by the 1956 Conference)

Salaries of Treasurer, Secretary, Statistician, Sunday School Secretary, and Executive Secretary of Youth

7. RESOLVED, That the following officers be remunerated annually for their services from the District Expense Fund as follows (with the Youth and Sunday School Leaders being paid out of their own funds):

District Treasurer -----	\$300.00
District Secretary -----	125.00
District Statistician -----	35.00
Promotional Secretary of Sunday Schools -----	50.00
Executive Secretary of Youth -----	50.00

(As amended by the 1957 Conference)

Eastern Pilgrim College Special Apportionment

8. BE IT RESOLVED, That each church raise a minimum equivalent to 25¢ per member, per month, for the Eastern Pilgrim College.

Conference Remembrances for Bereaved Ministers' Families

9. SINCE, There are times when death enters the immediate family of our ministers,

BE IT RESOLVED, That the District send a floral tribute and a love offering of \$50.00 to such bereaved families, payment to be made from the Retiring and Emergency Fund.

General Budget

10. There shall be an annual General Budget of \$6.00 per member per year: Foreign Missions 35%, Administration 25%, Church Extension 20%, Church Extension Loan Fund 6%, Senior College 10%, Sunday School and Youth 4%, this budget to be raised monthly.

It shall be the responsibility of the pastor and the church board to see that their church raises its portion of the General Budget. It shall be raised as one item under the term "General Budget," and shall be raised monthly

Cash Balance to Be Retained by Youth Leaders

11. WHEREAS, There is a financial inconvenience placed upon Young People's Zone Leaders having insufficient funds to engage a speaker and for advertising purpose,

BE IT RESOLVED, That each Youth Zone Leader be permitted to retain a working balance of \$35.00 throughout the conference year and that all money in excess of \$35.00 shall be forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer.

(As amended by the 1957 Conference)

District Conference Expense Assessment

12. RESOLVED, That each church provide the District Conference with no less than \$4.00 each for the pastor and delegate, or delegates, who attend the District Conference, and that all other members of the District Conference be required to pay \$3.00. (As revised by the 1955 Conference).

Church Building Loan Fund

13. WHEREAS, A generous gift of \$500.00 has been received by the District Council with which to establish a fund from which loans may be made to new and needy churches,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we maintain a Church Building Loan Fund. The fund is to be held in trust by the District Council, and

That 5% of the total Home Missionary Offerings be appropriated by the District Treasurer to the increase of said Church Building Loan Fund.

Loans can be made from said fund by the Council to congregations endeavoring to erect or buy a church or parsonage, but only after a thorough investigation of the financial status of the congregation by the Council. (§4 as amended by 1953 No. 2.)

When a loan is granted, the congregation to which the loan is made shall give a note to the District Treasurer signed by the local trustees.

The principal shall be paid back in installments, with interest at 5% in advance, monthly, except that the minimum charge for interest shall not be less than 50¢ per month. The amount of the monthly installments shall be determined by the District Council.

The District Treasurer shall mail a statement of the amount due on the 20th of each month to each church that has a loan from said Fund.

In the event that a congregation which has made a loan according to this plan, fails to meet its installments for a period of three months, its financial standing shall be investigated by the District Council.

Parsonage Utilities

14. WHEREAS, Some of our churches provide the utilities for their parsonages, and

WHEREAS, There is a growing interest among the District churches to provide the same,

BE IT RESOLVED, That, as far as possible, each church provide its parsonage with a cooking range, electricity, fuel for heating and cooking, water, and telephone service.

District Superintendent's Salary and Allowances

15. BE IT RESOLVED, That we pay our District Superintendent a salary of \$4,680.00 per year, supply his utilities and fuels, pay his telephone, postage, and telegraph expenses, and that the Superintendent shall be paid at the rate of six cents per mile, for all travel in the interest of the District directly from the Superintendent's fund, and that the offerings taken at the time of the Superintendent's visits be given to him to be applied toward travel expense. The District Superintendent shall submit his mileage report to the District Treasurer at least once per month for payment. (As amended by the 1957 Conference).

Emergency Moving Provisions for Pastors

16. In the event a pastor is forced to vacate the parsonage, not having received a pastoral call to another church:

BE IT RESOLVED that the District shall pay up to one hundred dollars (\$100.00) toward his moving expenses, all such payments to be made from the retirement and emergency fund.

STANDING RULES

Time of Conference

1. The District Conference shall convene annually in the auditorium of the E. P. C. at 10:00 a. m. Tuesday morning following the commencement and all Committees shall meet on Monday at 2:00 p. m.

Conference Bar

2. The first twelve rows of seats and forward shall constitute the Conference Bar.

Time of Sitzings

3. Sitzings of the District Conference shall be from 8:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m.; 1:30 p. m. to 4:30 p. m.; and 6:30 p. m. to 9:00 p. m.

Conference Communion Service

4. The first part of the first session of our Annual Conference shall be devoted to observing the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper with the presiding officer in charge.

Time of Ordination Service

5. The Ordination Service shall be held at 10:30 a. m. the second day of Conference.

Minimum Age for District Conference Delegates

6. Delegates to the District Conference must be 18 years of age or over.

Unfinished Conference Business

7. At the close of the Conference, the District Council shall attend to any business that may have been overlooked, and approve the minutes of the closing sitting.

Committee Appointments

8. The District Superintendent with Council consultation shall appoint all Committees.

Permanent Committees

9. The following committees: Resolutions, Ways and Means, Publicity and Reporting, Editing, Auditing, Memoirs, Reception, Statistical, and Ministerial Convention shall be permanent.

District Trustees

10. The members elected each year to the District Council shall simultaneously be elected to the District Board of Trustees.

Ministerial In Memoriam

11. A picture and a brief sketch of the labors of deceased ministers shall be placed in the Conference Journal.

Superintendent's Vacation

12. The District Superintendent shall have a three weeks vacation annually, with pay.

Pastors' Vacations

13. The District Conference recommends that each church in the Conference give its pastor a two weeks vacation with pay each year.

Procurement of Loans

14. The District Council is authorized to work with any local church in procuring loans using the financial standing of the Conference, as reflected in the property statement and the District Treasurer's balance sheet, as the basis of negotiation for such loans.

Transfer of General Resolutions to Standing Rules

15. The District Secretary is authorized to transfer items that are in reality rules of procedure and orders of the day to standing rules.



DISTRICT YOUTH CONFERENCE

The second annual youth conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the Hughesville Holiness Association Camp Grounds, Hughesville, Pa., on August 3, 1957, at 10:30 A. M.

The Executive Youth Secretary, Reverend Howard J. Frey, had charge of the devotions. Brother Frey read a scripture lesson from Psalm 71:1-5, 9-24.

Reverend Daniel Conrad led the conference in singing "The Lily of the Valley". Miss Carolyn Garrison presided at the piano.

Prayer was offered by Leroy Wion, after which Carolyn Garrison and Judy Strohecker sang a duet, "Come and Dine."

The Executive Youth Secretary presented the "Tug of War" award, consisting of two volumes of the Biblical Illustrator, to Reverend Alvin Jackson, Zone Leader of the North Central Zone. He was commended for his labors. Brother Jackson thanked the conference for this gesture.

Reverend Frey expressed words of his appreciation to the District Superintendent, Zone Leaders, Pastors, Society Presidents and all Pilgrim Youth for their loyalty and cooperation to him in the past four years, and admonished them to remain spiritual.

District Superintendent, Reverend G. A. Castevens expressed a personal tribute for the untiring labors of Brother Frey, also his inaugurating the First District Youth Camp. The business session followed with Reverend Castevens presiding.

The Executive Youth Secretary read the minutes which were approved as read.

The roll was called and the conference bar was established. The first four rows of the left front section of the tabernacle constituted the conference bar.

Mrs. Frederic Newton and Mrs. Paul Washburn were invited within the bar inasmuch as they are licensed ministers serving with their husbands in the active ministry.

Miss Becky Robbins from Harrisburg First Church was appointed as delegate by the Presiding Officer and seated within the conference bar.

The Chairman called for the report of the combined Resolutions and Ways and Means Committee. The Secretary, Miss Elenore Johnson read the resolutions.

It was moved, seconded and carried that we adopt Resolution Number I. (See report of Committee) carried.

Resolution Number II carried, after it was amended to read "since the Executive Youth Secretary is chairman of the Board of Youth Camp Directors."

Resolution Number III was read and put before the conference by motion. An amendment "the Annual Youth Conference be held Friday afternoon at 3:00 P. M. at the Youth Camp." The amended resolution carried.

Resolution Number IV was moved, supported and carried.

Resolution Number V was adopted by motion and carried.

The next order of the day was the election of Executive Youth Officers as provided by the Manual. Leroy Wion and Kenneth Lynn were appointed as tellers.

Reverend Castevens read the nominations from the District Council for the office of Executive Youth Secretary as follows: Reverend Charles Lewis and Reverend Raymond F. Culp.

The first ballot produced the election of Reverend Charles Lewis as Executive Youth Secretary. Brother Lewis was requested to make a speech to which he complied.

The nominations for District Youth Treasurer were read by Brother Castevens as follows: Reverend Raymond F. Culp and Reverend John Wiktorchik.

The first ballot declared Reverend John Wiktorchik as the District Youth Treasurer. Upon request Brother Wiktorchik made a speech.

A motion to adjourn was seconded by all standing.

The conference was dismissed with prayer by the District Superintendent Reverend G. A. Castevens.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Resolution Number I
