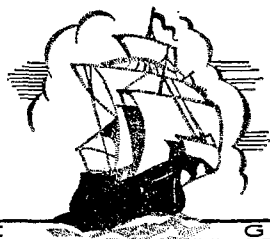

# CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

## FIRST SITTING

The first sitting of the Forty-eighth Annual Conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in Wesley Chapel on the campus of Eastern Pilgrim College, Allentown, Pennsylvania, June 20, 1961 at 10:00 a.m. at the call of the District Superintendent, Rev. E. S. Rutherford.

The annual communion service began with Rev. L. W. Drury leading the congregation in singing two songs. The Men's Quartet of Eastern Pilgrim College sang a special song.

Dr. R. D. Gunsalus led the congregation in a good season of prayer, in which the presence of God was very precious.

District Superintendent, Rev. E. S. Rutherford then presented Dr. W. H. Neff, General Superintendent to the Conference.

Dr. Neff gave a very cordial word of greeting to the Pennsylvania-New Jersey Conference; in which he commended the practice of opening the Conference with a Communion service. He then read Matt. 26:17-29 and I Cor. 11:23-32. He gave some very helpful and inspiring comments on the purpose and the message of the Communion service.

Then all members of the District Council except the District Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent knelt at the altar and were served the Communion by Dr. Wm. H. Neff.

Then four members of the General Board, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, Dr. R. D. Gunsalus, Rev. E. S. Rutherford and Rev. L. W. Drury were served the Communion by Rev. M. E. Dieter.

After this the members of the Conference and guests were served the Communion by the District Council. There were approximately 150 served Communion in the service. A subdued tenderness and blessing of the Lord was very evident throughout the service.

The bar was then cleared and the Secretary called the roll. A motion was made to meet previous to the ordination service this evening at the hour of 6:30 p.m. Motion was seconded and carried.

A motion was made to seat Rev. Earl L. Wilson, and receive him into Conference relationship as an ordained minister, upon transfer from the New York District. The motion was seconded and carried.

The meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon.

## SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the Forty-eighth Annual Conference opened with singing, "He Abides", led by Rev. Robert Tice, accompanied at the piano by Rev. Miss Deborah Hoover.

Requests were made for prayer as follows: Reverends Raymond Culp and David Gorman, and Sister Smith, all of whom are ministers of the Conference confined to their homes by sickness. Rev. L. W. Chappell led in prayer.

General Superintendent, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, was presented to the Conference by the District Superintendent, Rev. E. S. Rutherford.

Dr. Neff then addressed the Conference giving comments on the Annual Conferences of our denomination. He mentioned the fact that the two other General Superintendents were engaged, at this time, in Conferences in other parts of the nation. He pointed out that discussion is the way to discover truth. He also exhorted that it all shall be in love and proper regard for the brethren, without any name calling. He said one sign of being a grown-up Christian, is the ability to disagree without any break in fellowship.

The Secretary then read the minutes of the morning session. These minutes were approved as read.

The District Superintendent asked for a period of personal privilege. He commended Rev. James R. Long, for his fine efforts in establishing a work at Wilkes-Barre. Rev. Long was asked to stand to be recognized.

The District Superintendent then gave his report. A motion was made to accept this report by giving the District Superintendent a rising vote of thanks and appreciation; and further expressing the fact that we accept his resignation with a feeling of deep regret, on the part of the Conference. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

The Assistant Superintendent gave a verbal report of his work which was accepted by vote.

The auditors' report was given and received by motion.

The District Treasurer then gave his report to the Conference. A motion to accept the Treasurer's report was seconded and carried.

The Examining Board gave their report that the published list of ordinands be ordained in the service tonight. By motion the report was received.

The District Council also recommended these ordinands for ordination. Seconded and carried.

The list of ordinands being: William Hower, L. Emerson Twining, Arland Romberger, James R. Long, and John Croft.

The Resolutions Committee reported resolution number 3, which is to become a standing rule. The resolution was passed by motion.

The Statistician read his report. It was received by motion with thanks.

The Conference was recessed by motion for 15 minutes.

The reception committee presented Rev. H. L. Twining of the New York District. He was introduced by Dr. Neff and gave a word of testimony. By motion he was granted an honorary seat in the Conference Bar.

The Promotional Secretary of Sunday Schools gave his annual report. A motion was made to adopt the report and that the average attendance so given, is to be the official average for the year. The motion was seconded and carried.

Awards for standards of excellence was awarded to the churches by the Sunday School Promotional Secretary. The highest numerical and percentage gains were presented to the Port Matilda Church.

Dr. Neff presented the ten year decade of progress award to the Port Matilda Church.

Honorable mention for the Decade of Progress was given to Cherryville, Calvary, Stroudsburg, and Port Ann by the Sunday School Promotional Secretary. Ribbons were presented for the highest percentage of gains during the past year.

A motion was made to dispense with youth reports in the Annual Conference since they were given in the District Youth Conference, and that the entire report of the Youth Conference be printed as a part of the Conference Journal. The motion was seconded and carried.

The Resolutions Committee reported. Resolution number one was passed by motion.

Resolution number two was read. An amendment to alter the term of office on the District Building Committee was made, and it was stated that the term be left up to the discretion of the District Council. The motion was seconded and carried.

Resolution number two as amended passed by motion.

Resolution number three was passed just before the Statistician gave his report.

Resolution number four was read. A motion was made to refer number four to the committee for redrafting.

A motion to extend the time until the Resolutions Committee's report is completed. The motion was seconded and carried.

Resolution number five was read and was adopted by motion.

The session closed at 4:35 p.m. Rev. E. J. Hocking dismissed with prayer.

### THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the Forty-eighth Annual Conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District was opened with the song, "It Is Joy Unspeakable", led by Rev. Myron Campbell and accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Paul W. Washburn.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous session and they were approved as read.

The recommendations of the Examining Board for first year district licenses were as follows: Kenneth Lynn, Thomas Allison, William Couzins, William Griffin, Paul Miller, Larry Keiser, and Miss Velma Stover.



The District Council also recommended that these receive their first year license. A motion to adopt the recommendations was seconded and carried.

The Ways and Means Committee then gave their report. Resolution #1 carried; Resolution #2 carried; Resolution #3 carried; Resolution #4 carried; Resolution #5 was read, and amended to read that the budget be prepared in conjunction with the District Council. The amendment was seconded and carried. Then number five was adopted as amended.

A motion was made to recess for the ordination service and reconvene afterward. The motion was seconded and carried.

The conference was recessed at 7:20 p.m.

The ordination service was opened at 7:30 p.m. Rev. Wm. Derr led the congregation in singing, "A Charge To Keep I Have" with John Bowman accompanying at the organ. The College Men's Quartet rendered two songs. Scripture readings were given by Rev. L. W. Drury, Rev. John P. Campbell, and Rev. J. A. Byrd.

The ordination address was given by Dr. Wm. H. Neff. Jer. 8:22 "Is There No Balm In Gilead?" was the basis for his message. After giving the historical background of the text, he stated that the Balm in Gilead is nothing more nor less than the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ, and there is today:

- I. A Balm to make persons whole.
- II. A Balm to make families whole.
- III. A Balm for the wholeness of life's relationships.
- IV. A Balm in Gilead that bridges the rift between life and death. God could have fixed it so that we need not face death, but rather He chose to go with us.

This balm, he stated, is no cheap home remedy, but comes from the apothecary of the skies. Our hearts were indeed lifted to the heavenlies as he spoke.

Dr. R. D. Gunsalus then led in a most fitting prayer for this occasion.

The ordaining committee with Dr. Neff laid hands on the five ordinands as they knelt in prayer, and gave them the charge to preach the Gospel. Those ordained were: Wm. Hower, John Croft, L. Emerson Twining, Arland Romberger, James R. Long. The service closed with all joining in singing "The Doxology".

The conference reconvened at 8:45 p.m.

A motion was made to extend the time to 9:30 p.m. This was seconded and carried.

The General Conference Memorial Committee reported. Memorial #1 was read and carried. Memorials #2 and #3 were read.

A motion was made to refer all memorials back to the Secretary to be mimeographed so that the conference might better consider them. This motion was seconded and carried.

The evening session was adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

#### FOURTH SITTING

The congregation was led in singing, "I've Anchored in Jesus", by Rev. Myron Campbell. Mrs. Paul W. Washburn presided at the piano.

Rev. E. J. Hocking led in earnest prayer.

Dr. Wm. H. Neff quoted two passages of scripture and gave some very fitting comments.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous session and they were approved as read.

A motion to proceed with the election of the District officers was seconded and carried.

A ballot was cast for District Superintendent. There was no election on this ballot. Rev. L. W. Drury withdrew his name from the list.

A second ballot was cast with no election.

A third ballot was cast with no election.

A fourth ballot was cast with no election.

A fifth ballot was cast. Rev. J. R. Mitchell was elected with 87 out of 121 votes.

A ballot was cast for the Assistant Superintendent with no election.

A second Ballot was cast. Rev. L. W. Drury was elected with 100 votes out of 123.

The Secretary then read the names of John P. Campbell, R. D. Addington, and C. E. Wert as nominees for Secretary.

A ballot was cast for Secretary with no election.

A second ballot was cast. Rev. J. P. Campbell was elected with 92 votes out of 124.

The Secretary then read the names of J. A. Byrd, J. A. Gangaware and E. L. Adams as nominee for Treasurer.

A ballot was cast for Treasurer. Rev. J. A. Byrd was elected with 109 votes out of 123.

A ballot was cast for the five advisory members of the Council. A recess of 15 minutes was declared by the chair. The conference recessed at 10:35 a.m. and reconvened at 11:00 a.m.

As a result of the previous ballot Rev. Howard Frey (59), Rev. M. E. Dieter (68), and Rev. George Harris (67) were elected as Advisory Members on the District Council.

A motion carried to vote on the five highest to elect the remaining two Council Members. Rev. R. D. Gunsalus withdrew his name, leaving Rev.

P. R. Doyle, Rev. E. S. Rutherford, Rev. C. E. Wert, and Rev. R. D. Addington. A motion carried to add Rev. W. F. Bubbs to the list.

A ballot was cast resulting in the election of Rev. E. S. Rutherford.

Another ballot was cast to elect the last advisory member to the Council resulting in no election.

A motion was carried to vote on the two highest, being Rev. P. R. Doyle and Rev. C. E. Wert.

Another ballot was cast and Rev. P. R. Doyle was elected thus completing the Council.

The Council presented the names of Rev. C. E. Wert and Rev. A. L. Jackson as candidates for electing one member to the Examining Board. The Conference proceeded to cast a ballot and Rev. C. E. Wert was elected.

A motion was presented that the Secretary send greetings and the assurance of our prayers to Rev. David Gorman. This motion was seconded and carried.

A motion carried to extend the time long enough to elect the Home Missionary Zones Chairmen.

The conference was adjourned by prayer at 11:35 with Rev. Frey giving the closing prayer.

## FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting convened at 1:45 p.m. Dr. Neff led in singing the chorus, "Fix Your Eyes Upon Jesus." Several scripture quotations were given from the floor. Rev. W. E. Honeycutt from Ohio was invited to the front of the auditorium and led in prayer. By motion he was granted a seat in the conference bar.

The reception committee presented Mr. Brown, a Wesleyan Methodist layman, and Reverends Morris and Adams of the Eastern District, and they were granted seats in the conference bar.

By motion the minutes of the fourth, fifth, and sixth sittings were referred to the Council for reading and approval.

The chairmen for the Home Missionary Zones were elected and ratified as follows: Lehigh — L. W. Chappell, Susquehanna — A. L. Jackson, Garden State — C. F. Kresge, Bald Eagle — E. R. Crosser.

A motion was made that the ministerial delegates to the General Conference be elected by a majority ballot. This motion was seconded and carried.

It was determined that we are entitled to eleven ministerial delegates.

A ballot was cast and while they were being counted the Eastern Pilgrim College quartet sang, which was enjoyed by all in the Conference.

The Conference voted to accept the nominees from the Council for Lay Delegates to the General Conference. The list being C. E. Doll, Carl R. Kresge, Fred Oplinger, Edward Harper, Max Hile, Howard Thurston, Arthur Kleppinger, Martin Hill, John Meckley, and Gaylord Wilson.

A ballot was then cast for lay delegates.

Dr. Gunsalus was invited to speak to the Conference about Eastern Pilgrim College. He spoke feelingly of his leaving the office of President.

Dr. Gunsalus then presented the President-elect, Rev. M. E. Dieter, to say whatever was upon his heart in reference to Eastern Pilgrim College. He pledged his best in service and expressed his confidence in the continued support of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District.

The Committee on Memoirs reported and this report was properly responded to by the congregation standing in a moment of silent tribute.

The complete report of the Examining Board and recommendations of the Council was received. The report stated that the following be the list of ordinands and listed for Ordination in the Conference of 1962. They are James C. Mervine, Arthur Merrill, William Merrill, I. Daniel Price, John P. Ragsdale, Miss Claire Ulmer, and Mrs. Edwin Mayes. Miss Marian Stroble is to be ordained as a Deaconess.

The following were recommended to receive the renewal of their District Licenses: Ronald Max Adams, Clifford R. Chew, Mrs. Pearl Clouser, Walter Dill, Earl Eyster, Mrs. Milton E. Frantz, John E. Garver, Leon R. Lutz, Mrs. D. I. McCracken, Donald G. Moyer, Kermit Shrawder, Raymond Wagner, Emerson C. Walker, Harry F. Walls, Jr., Richard Williams, Leroy F. Wion, and Mrs. L. W. Zehner.

The following two were recommended to be added to the list receiving new District Licenses or First Ordination, Earl Eck and Charles Chamberlain.

Charles Armentrout was recommended to receive Song Evangelist credentials.

The result of the lay ballot was as follows: Doll, Kresge, Hile, Klepinger, Hill, and Meckley were elected. Harper, Thurston, Wilson and Opfinger were accepted as alternates in this order.

The result of the ministerial ballot was as follows: Robert D. Addington, P. R. Doyle, and Howard J. Frey were elected.

A substitute motion was made that the eight highest be elected by a plurality vote and the next six be alternates. This motion was carried.

These were elected as ministerial delegates: George R. Harris, Wm. B. Derr, A. L. Jackson, E. L. Adams, Edward R. Crosser, L. W. Chappell, W. F. Bubb, and E. J. Hocking. The alternates were C. E. Wert, Paul W. Braisted, John F. Wiktorchik, Leroy Fetterolf, R. W. Lutz, and Robert N. Campbell.

The Resolutions Committee reported and read #6, which was adopted by motion.

Resolution #4 was re-read and a substitute motion was made that the District Superintendent appoint a committee to consist of the executive officers of Eastern Pilgrim College. This committee shall prepare a proper paper on Parochial School Aid, and it in turn is to be sent by the District Secretary to the pastors. The Pastors shall take the initiative in getting our people to protest through proper channels. This said paper is to be

reviewed and approved by the District Council for this Conference. This motion was seconded and passed.

The conference was adjourned at 5:40 p.m. as Rev. John F. Wiktorchik led in prayer.

### SIXTH SITTING

The sixth sitting opened with the congregation singing, "In The Light of His Face." Rev. Herbert W. Fisher led in prayer.

The Ways and Means Committee gave their final report by reading Resolution #6, which was adopted by motion.

The committee on General Conference Memorials finished their report.

An amendment was made to #2 Memorial, dealing with section 29, "To add these words after the number 29, 'Having been counseled in the special rules.' " The amendment was carried. Resolution #2 was adopted by motion as amended.

Resolution #3 was then read. After some discussion it was moved to ask the Polity Committee of the General Board to reconsider the entire section on "Special Rules." This was seconded and was lost.

Then Memorial #3 was taken up one section at a time. The section dealing with section sixty-four in the Manual was tabled by motion. The section dealing with section seventy-five in the Manual was adopted by motion. The part dealing with section seventy-seven was read and a motion to table it was lost. A motion to adopt was carried.

Memorial #4 was read. A motion to table numbers four and five was carried.

Memorial #6 was read and was adopted by motion.

Memorial #7 was read and a motion to table number seven carried.

Memorial #8 was read and adopted by motion.

A motion carried to extend the time until the business of the Conference is finished.

The Resolutions Committee finished their report, reading Resolutions #7, #8, #9, #10, and #11 all of which were adopted according to instructions in these resolutions.

Dr. Wm. H. Neff expressed his appreciation of and hopes for the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District.

The newly-elected District Superintendent, Rev. J. R. Mitchell, then addressed the Conference setting forth some ideals and plans for the District during this year.

The Forty-eighth Annual Conference came to an end at 9:40 p.m. with everybody joining in singing, "I Need Thee Every Hour" and Dr. Neff praying the closing prayer.

## CONFERENCE REPORTS

To Dr. William H. Neff, General Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Members of the District Council, Delegates and friends of the Forty-eighth Annual District Conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District now in session, Greetings.

"Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord." Ours is a spiritual work. It is true that our work may be relative in that it touches the whole man and we are interested in all the affairs of the human family but our ultimate goal is the bringing of sinful men to redemption's point. We work for that day when the last of earth's sorrow shall be over. Not a hospital, for there are no wounds; not an orphanage, there are no orphans; not a county home, none are aged and poor; not a prison, there are no criminals; no handkerchiefs, no more tears. We want to be there when the last foot sore and weary pilgrim reaches the gates of the celestial city, is received by Jesus and joins with all the redeemed in the long and harmonious strains of the Hallelujahs which is the song of the redeemed. ### OUR LOSS

God has been good in sparing so many of us and permitting a degree of health sufficient for us to gather for this holy convocation. To him we are deeply grateful.

Death entered our midst this year and took from us an old soldier of the cross, Rev. Bessie F. Hatcher. Hers was a unique ministry in many ways. She will be missed at the District gatherings where her keen insight often led her to make some humorous remark that could carry with it a sharp rebuke. No doubt her most lasting contributions to the church will be the many beautiful songs that she wrote and set to music. Sister Hatcher not only wrote songs, she wrote good songs, a number of which are frequently used. May God bless her memory.

### HOME MISSIONARY ACTIVITY

A more complete report will be given by the proper one regarding this phase of the work. I would like however, to make an observation here concerning the united effort by the various departments in the September Rallies. The District Sunday School Committee deferred their plans, the Youth gave us their rally time for the month, Eastern Pilgrim College gave their musical director and public relations man, the District Youth President gave the human leadership, the Home Missionary Board offered prayerful

support, the churches opened their doors and the people gave. In fact, they are still giving and the work at Wilkes-Barre is growing. Could we hope to continue the small but systematic way of giving — the Penny-a-Meal plan?

While we have no new church to present this year we can report a very healthy vine at Wilkes-Barre and we anticipate the day when it becomes a full fledged church.

The cash financial picture of the District is not bright but we have a growing property equity and a large part of our financial picture can be laid to emergencies in two of our local churches where unplanned aid was necessary in order to maintain the work. Our proposed Home Missionary Budget is much less for the coming year than it has been the past two years.

### PROPERTY IMPROVEMENTS

This has been another good year of promotion and building. A number of churches have improved their properties and I shall name those with major projects.

ASHLAND—Extensive remodeling of parsonage.

AUGUSTAVILLE—Dedicated Sunday School annex.

BETHLEHEM, FIRST—Completed major remodeling of church.

BRIDGETON—Plans completed for the enlarging of the sanctuary and other major alterations.

BUSH HOLLOW—Extensive repairs on parsonage. Hope to build new church this year.

HIGHLAND—Addition of much needed Sunday School rooms.

HYDE—New ceiling installed in sanctuary.

LOCK HAVEN—Now engaged in building spacious new church.

MT. UNION—Burned mortgage on parsonage.

MUNCY—Now using basement auditorium as work progresses on new church.

NORTH ROME—Dedicated enlarged sanctuary, new pews, etc.

POCONO LAKE—Purchased new organ.

PT. PHILLIPS—Completed new Sunday School annex.

REBUCK—Two car garage built, parking area blacktopped.

SALEM—New Sunday School rooms in basement.

STONINGTON—Nursery and rest rooms added.

STROUDSBURG—Beautiful and spacious parsonage built.

WILLIAMSPORT—Plans being laid for the remodeling of the front of the church.

### MEMBERSHIP GAINS

It has been a real delight on my part to see some of our churches come up with substantial gains in this department. We must have gains or we perish. Many good revivals have been reported and the work of personal evangelism has had a rebirth. It has indeed been a joy to have a prince among men, Mr. Leonard Whipple, work with many of the churches in this area of service. It seems that the stigma upon us is the fact that we needed someone to lead us in this important field. A church is well on its way to obscurity when it fails to heed the oft repeated commands in Holy Writ "to go forth".

Our net gain this year totals 137. This compares favorably with last year's gain of 70 and with the previous ten years when the District netted 87 during which time a number of new churches were received. God is blessing the efforts of many good consecrated laymen and Pastors.

I am praying with you concerning the choice of a man who shall be my Superintendent as well as yours as I desire to labor in this fine District as long as the Lord wills and leads.

## REPORT OF PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

To the Forty-eighth Annual Conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Sunday School Greetings:

It seems that this has been a busy but profitable year in the Sunday School Department.

In September it was my privilege, once again, to attend the National Sunday School and Youth Leaders Conference at Indianapolis. Needless to say, the information and inspiration received there, under the capable leadership of Rev. John Abbott and Rev. Joseph Brown, gave added impetus to the work on the District level. At this meeting the Sunday School Standard of Excellence was revived and implemented. Certificates will be awarded to 32 of our churches, who have been graded by this standard, indicating their rating as a 1, 2, 3, 4, or 5 Star school. The Decade of progress program, introduced at Indianapolis, was enthusiastically received by the promotional secretaries and is proving to be a real blessing as we strive together to build better Sunday Schools. Thus far 19 of our District schools are participating in this program. Port Matilda will receive the District Trophy with a score of 22,320. Honorable mention ought to be given to: Cherryville, Bethlehem Calvary, Stroudsburg, and Port Ann for good Scores in the Decade of Progress Program. Their Schools carry out a well rounded program, as revealed by the score sheet.

The encouragement and co-operation of the Sunday School Committee in carrying out the District Sunday School Program has been a real source of joy.

The response to the 6 Zone Sunday School Worker's Conferences, held during March, was indeed gratifying. Approximately 75% of our Sunday School Workers were in attendance.

In April it was our privilege to have Rev. John Abbott and Rev. Joseph Brown with us for two district conventions. The panel discussions were profitable and Brother Abbott's evening message was a real challenge. I personally appreciate the theme, "Win the lost at any cost," which indicates the true purpose of the Sunday School.

The Spring Sunday School Crusade featured the Town and Country competition of other years, with the Town Churches coming out on top.

Our record attendance this year was 5,358 on Rally Day, with Easter and Mother's Day following with over 4,800 each. With 61 churches reporting an average attendance of 4,284, we show a gain of 169 over last year's, 4,115. Along with the good gains, I am happy to report that many of our schools have improved in efficiency this year. We welcome our new Sunday School at Wilkes-Barre.

The Honor Sunday School of the year is Port Matilda with a numerical gain of 29, and a % gain of 120%. Congratulations to you Brother Croft and to your good people.

The Second Highest Numerical award goes to our new church at Hanover with a gain of 21. Brother Sorrells, we commend you and your fine people for the good work being done. The Second Highest % gain was made by our State College Sunday School. Brother Merrill, your 90% gain is greatly appreciated.

## DISTRICT HOME MISSIONARY REPORT

To General Superintendent, Dr. Wm. Neff, and members of the Forty-eighth Annual Conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District, greetings.

This has been a good year in the Home Missionary work of the District. The forward step that was planned a year ago has been realized at Wilkes-Barre. This was made possible by the response of the churches to the Home Missionary Rallies held throughout the District last September. At that time the penny a meal calendars were introduced and the response to this appeal has provided most of the funds for the work at Wilkes-Barre. The progress, though slow at first, has been accelerated in the past six months by the renting of a church building, which was formerly used by the Methodists. Recently this church has been purchased and the work continues to grow. The average attendance is around fifty. The local cash receipts for April was \$850.35. The pastor, Rev. James Long, is much encouraged and is looking forward to a good year.

The Levittown and Hanover churches, which have been receiving help from the District Home Mission Funds, have grown in numbers and financially so that their allotment is being reduced for the coming year. Calvary Church in Bethlehem will receive the same as last year.

For the achievements during the past year we should recognize the Gracious Providences of God, the untiring efforts of our Superintendent, Rev. E. S. Rutherford; the faithful workers who have pastored these churches, and the sacrificial giving of the Pilgrims throughout the District. Praise God from whom all blessing flow.

For the future, this committee has made no long term commitments, as the term of office for most of the committee members expires at this time, but we would recommend that the present commitments be maintained until these churches have grown so that they can assume their full financial responsibility. Further, that a more adequate plan of progress for the entire District be adopted so that all our churches would surge forward in a natural, steady, spiritual and numerical growth.



The Home Missionary Committee met twice during the year. In September at Wilkes-Barre, in March at the District parsonage in Allentown. These were times of blessed fellowship.

## RESOLUTIONS

### I

BE IT RESOLVED, that Resolution No. 16, pages 63 and 64 of the District Minutes be amended to read as follows:

Following the last statement of the first paragraph of No. 3, add these words: "However, in the event there is no Home Missionary project in the Zone, upon the request of the Zone Committee, and with the approval of the District Home Missionary Board and the District Council, the zone may assume the obligation of helping a struggling, organized church within its boundaries."

Add to the following paragraph, immediately following the words, "all home missionary projects," the words, "and/or assistance for a struggling, organized church," and following the words, "Conference Home Missionary Board," the words "and the District Council."

Thus, the amended paragraph would read as follows:

"Each zone committee shall present through its chairman any and all home missionary projects, and/or assistance for a struggling, organized church, to the Conference Home Missionary Board and the District Council for approval."

Delete in the next paragraph the words that immediately follow the words, "District Council." These two (2) words, "last year," are considered unnecessary.

This Resolution, No. 1, was passed.

### II

A substitute resolution for No. 8 on page 61, as follows:

WHEREAS, much difficulty arises with Pastors and lay leaders in various types of building programs, BE IT RESOLVED, that a committee shall be appointed by the District Council to be known as the District Building Committee. This Committee shall consist of three (3) members, not more than one to be a member of the District Council. The duty of this committee shall be to assemble data and general information relative to church building, and shall make the same available to any church or Pastor. They shall also give initial approval to any major building program. The term of office for each committeeman shall be at the pleasure of the Council.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that any congregation considering the erection of a church building and/or parsonage, or the making of extensive improvements, and remodeling of church property costing more than \$2,000.00

submit their tentative plans for the same to the District Building Committee for approval, before final action by the local church board and the beginning of said construction.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all actions of the District Building Committee shall be subject to ratification by the District Council.

This resolution, No. 2, passed, as amended.

### III

Under Standing Rules, page 72, No. 18.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Statistical Report be posted in the entrance foyer of Wesley Chapel after the reading of the totals.

This Resolution, No. 3, passed.

### IV

WHEREAS, there has been considerable pressure upon the Government of the United States, and WHEREAS members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church believe in the separation of Church and State; and WHEREAS General Aid to Parochial Schools may precipitate Government control;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church go on record as opposed to the extension of Federal support to Parochial schools, unless there are first safe-guards against State control of religious bodies or church groups either by constitutional amendment or by income tax deduction grants tuition wise.

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Congressmen of the Districts comprising our District, and the United States Secretary of Education, and the members of the Department of Education be informed of this action.

Referred to the District Council.

### V

WHEREAS, laymen share largely the support of the church and its various departments, be it resolved that two (2) laymen be appointed to the Ways and Means Committee.

This resolution, No. 5, was passed.

### VI

WHEREAS the present size of the Pilgrim Action prohibits the monthly treasurers' report, we resolve that reference to this report be deleted from General Resolutions Number 21, page 65 of the District Minutes.

With necessary deletion it would read as follows:

"BE IT RESOLVED, that the Pilgrim Action be published monthly and that the Sunday School and Youth News be incorporated therein. Reports to be due by the tenth (10th) of each month."

This resolution, No. 6, was passed.

## VII

WHEREAS, we have been honored in the midst of our deliberations by the presence of OUR General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff, who has so efficiently directed us by his Christian example and pungent messages, BE IT RESOLVED, that we show our deep and lasting appreciation, by a rising vote of thanks, and a sincere, "God bless you!"

This resolution, Number 7, passed.

## VIII

WHEREAS, we have been devoutly led, and have made encouraging progress under the dedicated and able leadership of our good District Superintendent, Rev. Earl S. Rutherford, and the District Council, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that we signify our appreciation by standing and in unison, declaring a hearty, "Praise the Lord!"

This resolution, Number 8, passed.

## IX

WHEREAS, we have been so graciously and wonderfully entertained on the campus of our beloved Eastern Pilgrim College, and whereas all of us are conscious of the tremendous dividends that we have reaped as a District, because her campus is within the boundaries of our Zion, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we testify to our ever renewed interest in and concern for Eastern Pilgrim College and its consecrated staff, by rising and earnestly declaring, "I'm praying for you!"

This resolution, Number 9, passed.

## X

WHEREAS, we have been made more comfortable and Conference more pleasant because of the wonderful meals of the good cook, and the labors of the kitchen and dining room staff, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED, that we express our deep appreciation by standing and graciously declaring, "We are grateful!"

This resolution, Number ten, passed.

## XI

WHEREAS, in all our deliberations we have been conscious of the help of our God, and being confident that the grace that has led us safe thus far, shall lead us safely home,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we rise and give thanks to God, by rising, and singing the doxology.

This resolution, Number eleven, passed.

BE IT RESOLVED that RESOLUTION NO. 4, page 66, be amended to read:

District Sunday School Expense -----	2.5%
District Youth Expense -----	2.5%

### RESOLUTION NO. 3

WHEREAS the travel expense of the District Superintendent is not being adequately met by the pastors' 60% tithe,

BE IT RESOLVED that each church endeavor to give an offering of no less than ten dollars (\$10.00) for each visit by him.

### RESOLUTION NO. 4

WHEREAS the penny-a-meal calendars have helped tremendously in alleviating much of the expense of District Home Missions, and in particular, the Wilkes-Barre project,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the calendars be prepared for another year.

### RESOLUTION NO. 5

WHEREAS our finance on the District level is growing larger and more complex,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the District Superintendent be asked to prepare an annual budget for the District, in conjunction with the District Council, to be presented to the Conference for approval, beginning with the 1962 Conference.

### RESOLUTION NO. 6

WHEREAS an emergency has arisen in the superintendent's fund;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the ministerial tithe paid to the district be increased temporarily for the coming conference year to 75%.

### I. Educational Memorial

Whereas the concern for the adequate preparation of a future ministry for the church supersedes all others in importance

And whereas our Bible Colleges are constantly faced with growing problems of student recruitment, finances, accreditation, etc.

And whereas these pressures threaten the future ability of our colleges to maintain strong, well-staffed, denominationally orientated training programs

Therefore be it resolved:

1. That this Conference instruct the General Board to reorient our present policy to provide for the creation of a single ministerial training center for the church with proper provision for adequate staff and support.

2. Be it further resolved that provision be made for a system of subsidy for our ministerial candidates after due study by the Board.

This memorial was adopted.

### II. Change in Church Covenant

Be it resolved that the basis of church membership in the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall be: (Section 28 revised to read as follows)

Any person giving satisfactory evidence of regeneration, by having forsaken and renounced the world, the flesh, and the devil and living a consistent Christian life, and who desires to be recognized as a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, shall first be accepted by the local church board. The basis of the church boards' acceptance or rejection of any candidate for membership shall be the answers given to the questions in section 29; and counsel in the special rules of the church manual.

Section 29. (Revised to read):

#1. The candidates for membership at a time designated shall appear before the church board for examination as follows:

1. Dearly Beloved, since you are to be recognized as a member of this church, it is proper that you should confess your faith and declare your purpose in the presence of God and these witnesses. Have you forsaken and renounced the devil and all his works; the vain pomp and glory of the world, with all the covetous desires of the same; and carnal desires of the flesh; and do you refuse to be led by them?
2. Have you received the witness of God's Spirit to your regeneration?
3. Do you believe in the doctrine of entire sanctification as a second definite, instantaneous work of grace, subsequent to regeneration, and that it is the privilege and duty of every believer to seek and find the experience as soon as he receives light concerning it?

4. Are you willing that all your faith and practice shall be governed by the Word of God?
5. Will you contribute of your means toward the support of the Lord's cause as you are taught by the Word of God?
6. Are you willing by your life and testimony to actively engage in the work of winning others to Christ and the church and to endeavor to build them up in the life of Christian holiness.

#2. The candidates for membership having been counseled in the special rules and satisfactorily answered these questions shall at the call of the pastor in the earliest possible public service be received into the church according to the form of service prescribed in Section 30.

#### **Section 30. (Revised.) Pastor's Introduction**

Having been led to repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, we now, in the presence of God, angels, and this assembly most solemnly and joyfully enter into this covenant with one another as one body in Christ.

(The candidates for membership shall repeat after the pastor the following covenant.)

I, we (the given name of the individual may be used in the case of a single candidate, the group using "We" in the case of multiple candidates) having received the Lord Jesus as my (or OUR) personal Saviour and being willing that all my (or OUR) faith and practice shall be governed by the Word of God, do promise and covenant before God and these witnesses to be faithful in my (or OUR) attendance and support of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, to shun the paths of sin and walk in the way of true Holiness, in the spirit and manner becoming those who profess Godliness.

#### **Section 31 sub head (1) revised.**

Brethren, these persons, having been accepted by the church board and having entered into this covenant relationship with Christ and the church are hereby recognized as members of this church. We therefore extend to them the right hand of fellowship, promising that we shall do all that we can to make it easy for these new members to do right and hard to do wrong. (The remainder of the present covenant is to be placed in the manual as a section of the special rules.)

This memorial was adopted.

### **III. Special Rules and Duties of Church Board**

#### **Section 60 part 3 revised.**

The Board shall not permit in connection with the work of the church that which violates the New Testament principle, "Whatsoever ye do, whether ye eat or drink, do all to the glory of God." This section was adopted.

Be it resolved that section 64 be deleted from the Manual. This was tabled.

Be it resolved that section 75 be deleted from the Manual. This section was adopted.

Be it resolved that section 77, paragraph 4 be revised to read: #4. Therefore be it resolved that this General Conference go on record as opposed to the wearing of all rings except the wedding band. This section was adopted.

This memorial was adopted with above noted exceptions.

#### **IV. Church Name**

Be it resolved that the name of the Church be changed to "THE PILGRIM CHURCH."

This memorial was tabled.

#### **V. Merger with Wesleyan Methodist Church**

Whereas our last General Conference voted overwhelmingly to amalgamate with the Wesleyan Methodist Church and whereas the last General Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church gave consideration to this matter,

Be it resolved that we further pursue this merger by assuring our Wesleyan brethren of our continued interest.

This memorial was tabled.

#### **VI. Federal Aid to Parochial Schools**

Whereas there has been considerable pressure on leaders of the Government of the United States, and Whereas members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church believe in the separation of Church and State; And whereas Federal aid to Parochial Schools may precipitate Government Control,

"Therefore be it resolved that the General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church go on record as opposed to the extension of Federal support to Parochial Schools; and be it further resolved that the United States Secretary of Education and the members of the Department of Education be informed of this action."

This memorial was adopted.

#### **VII. Church Board Personnel**

Be it resolved that no former pastor can serve on a Church Board of any church where he has pastored.

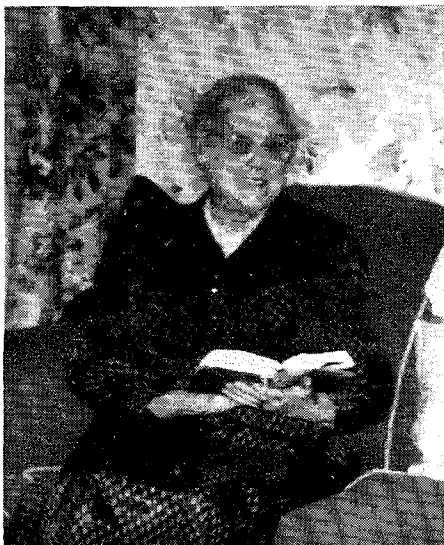
This memorial was tabled.

## GENERAL RESOLUTIONS

### Close of Conference Year

1. BE IT RESOLVED, that our Conference Year end on April 30.

### Deadline for Statistical and Financial Reports

2. BE IT RESOLVED, that all reports to the District Statistician and remittances to the District Treasurer be postmarked not later than May 10.

### Questionnaire for Ministers Entering Pa.-N. J. Conference

3. WHEREAS, the District Council generally lacks the proper and necessary information relative to ministers of other districts and denominations desiring membership in our district;

BE IT RESOLVED, that the same be required to answer a questionnaire supplied by the District Council.

### Church Call to Ministers Outside District

4. BE IT RESOLVED, that no church shall extend a call to a minister outside of the District without having first obtained the approval of the District Council.

### Council Permission for Ministerial Membership in Local Church

5. BE IT RESOLVED, that no one, having held or holding ministerial credentials, making application for membership in any of our churches, shall be accepted without the approval of the District Council.

### Council and Delinquent Ministers

6. BE IT RESOLVED, that this Conference require the District Council to deal with those holding Credentials from our District who do not support the Conference with their personal assessments, nor send in their statistical and financial reports, regardless of their field of labor.

### Recommendations for First District Ministers' Licenses

7. INASMUCH, as the responsibility for the execution of all Conference action rests primarily on its entire ministry,

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Conference instruct its Examining Board to recommend for their first district licenses, only those who give evidence of intention to take a permanent place in our ministry.

### District Building Committee

8. WHEREAS, much difficulty arises with pastors and lay leaders in various types of building programs, BE IT RESOLVED, that a committee shall be appointed by the District Council to be known as the District Building Committee. This Committee shall consist of three (3) members, not more than one to be a member of the District Council. The duty of this committee shall be to assemble data and general information relative to church building, and shall make the same available to any church or pastor. They shall

also give initial approval to any major building program. The term of office on the Committee shall be up to the discretion of the District Council.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that any congregation considering the erection of a church building and/or parsonage, or the making of extensive improvements, and remodeling of church property costing more than \$2,000.00, submit their tentative plans for the same to the District Building Committee for approval, before final action by the local church board and the beginning of said construction.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all actions of the District Building Committee shall be subject to ratification by the District Council.

### **Tabulation of Branch Sunday Schools and Mother Churches**

9. WHEREAS, there has been no official method of tabulation of attendance of branch Sunday Schools and the mother churches;

BE IT RESOLVED, that this method be adopted:

1. The attendance at the mother church should be recorded in the usual manner.
2. All persons present, including members of the mother church, shall be counted as attendants at the branch Sunday School.
3. These figures of attendance shall be reported separately.

### **District Superintendent's Revival Schedule**

10. BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent be permitted to conduct only two revivals a year outside of the bounds of the Conference.

### **District Charter Nullification**

11. WHEREAS, the development and progress of the International Holiness Church has outmoded the District Charter of 1914, and

WHEREAS, for many years the District has been operating under the Charter of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the United States,

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Pennsylvania-New Jersey Conference go on record officially as operating under the Charter of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the United States of America.

### **Local Church Deeds**

12. WHEREAS, the District Records indicate that several of our Church properties are not deeded according to the Manual.

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Conference request the local church boards of the District to check the wording of their property deed and urge those whose deeds are faulty to have them recorded according to the requirements of the 1958 Manual.

### **Candidates for Ordination**

13. BE IT RESOLVED, that all candidates for ordination be examined a year in advance of their ordination.

Said candidates shall be passed upon by the Examining Board and the District Council.

The final approval of the Conference shall be reserved until the first session of the Conference, where they are to be ordained. Said Conference approval shall be the order of the day immediately after the roll call of the first sitting.

A list of said candidates shall be announced in the final sitting of the Conference preceding their ordination and such list shall be published in the Conference Journal.

Any default in spirit or practice during the intervening year or failure to carry out any prescribed program of Council or Examining Board shall cancel out the possibility of the final approval of the Conference.

### **Time of Call Pastor Meeting**

14. INASMUCH, as the dates for Annual Meetings, at which time pastors are called, cover such a long period of weeks,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that to facilitate matters the calling of the pastor be separated from the Annual Meeting and that all of our churches have a call pastor meeting some time during the period from the first Sunday in April through the second Sunday in April. (As amended by the 1956 Conference).

### **Procedures for Calling a Pastor**

15. INASMUCH, as there seems to be considerable confusion in the placing and calling of pastors due to the diversity of methods and procedures being used and insisted upon by the churches,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that a form of procedure for the calling of pastors be established as follows to serve as a guide for the future:

(1). Let all of the call pastor meetings be held during the period involving the first Sunday in April through the second Sunday in April.

(2). If the pastor is not recalled, resigns or does not submit his name for a vote, the result of the meeting should immediately be forwarded to the Superintendent by the Church Secretary.

(3). If the pastor is recalled he can have the legal time established by the manual to accept or reject the call. If he does or does not accept the call he shall immediately inform the Superintendent of his decision.

(4). In the event of the pastor's leaving, whatever the circumstances, the Superintendent shall present either in person, writing, or through an authorized representative the list of available ministers, with recommendations that naturally fall within his jurisdiction.

(5). It shall be the privilege of the local board and the church to immediately call a man on the basis of recommendation, without having a trial message.

(6). In the event a board and church desire a trial message, the board shall make a choice of a candidate. If two or three candidates are chosen they should be designated as first, second, and third choice.

(7). After the trial message of the first candidate there shall be a vote on the candidate within a reasonable length of time, preferably immediately.

(8). If the first candidate is not called, or refuses to accept the call, the same procedure shall be followed with the second candidate or third.

(9). In no case however shall a second candidate be called to preach a trial message until a vote has been taken by the board and the church on the first candidate.

(10). Let all retiring ministers consider their ministry to a church as as ending, according to manual, the Sunday following Conference, and all moving take place the following week. (As amended by the 1956 Conference).

### **District Conference Home Missionary Policy**

16. Since the Pennsylvania-New Jersey Conference covers such a vast area, and inasmuch as the present policy is inadequate to properly supervise and promote the Home Missionary interest of the conference,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the following outlined policy for the home missionary work in the conference be adopted:

1. That the Conference be divided into four home missionary zones, namely: The Bald Eagle Valley Zone, the Susquehanna Valley Zone, the Lehigh Valley Zone, and the Garden State Zone.

2. That a zone chairman shall be elected by the delegates in attendance at the Annual Conference. The zone elections shall be presided over by the executive officers of the District Council. And the zone chairmen elections shall be ratified by the Annual Conference.

3. That there shall be home missionary committees composed of the zone chairman and two other members appointed by the Conference home missionary board. The zone committees shall promote the interest of home missions in their respective zone; however, in the event there is no Home Missionary project in the zone, upon the request of the Zone Committee, and with the approval of the District Home Missionary Board and the District Council, the zone may assume the obligation of helping a struggling, organized church within its boundaries.

Each zone committee shall present through its chairman any and all home missionary projects, and/or assistance for a struggling, organized church, to the Conference Home Missionary Board and the District Council for approval.

The Zone Committees shall be authorized to raise their funds for special projects over and above budget apportionment in the zone churches through the plan authorized by the District Council, and further, that a record of these zone apportionments to the churches be placed in the Conference Journal. All funds shall be sent to the District Treasurer by the local treasurer, specified for said zone.

Should additional funds be necessary in establishing home missionary projects, that said funds be paid out of the District budget home missionary fund. This supplemental financial assistance shall require District Council action and approval.

4. That the election of zone chairmen and the appointment of zone committee members shall be for two years. If for any reason vacancies should occur in zone chairmanship or committeemen, that the vacancy of zone chair-



men shall be filled by the District Council, and the vacancy of zone committeemen shall be filled by the conference Home Missionary Board.

5. That each zone chairman shall submit a quarterly report of the zone committee's activities to the District Superintendent.

6. That the District Council shall review any home missionary endeavor of the conference Home Missionary Board and the zone committees. The District Council shall have the right to issue directives to the conference Home Missionary Board, when in their judgment such directives are needed relative to home missionary work within the conference.

### **Church and Pastoral Directory**

17. BE IT RESOLVED, that the pastor's name and address be listed in the church directory of our Conference minutes with the church.

### **Local Church Directory for Conference Officials**

18. BE IT RESOLVED, that it shall be a procedure under the direction of the District Secretary, that blanks shall be supplied to each pastor for an official directory of his church, and that this information be passed on to the various official personnel of the Conference.

### **Preference to District Ministers**

19. BE IT RESOLVED, that the Conference go on record as requesting that the Local Church Boards give due consideration to all District Ministers, desiring pastorates, presented to them by the District Superintendent.

### **Personnel for the Pilgrim Action**

20. An Editor for the Pilgrim Action shall be appointed by the District Council, at an annual salary of \$75. The paper is to carry both Sunday School and Youth, news and material. And the paper shall continue to be printed monthly. (As amended by 1960 Conference.)

### **Reports for Pilgrim Action**

21. BE IT RESOLVED, that the Pilgrim Action be published monthly and that the Sunday School and Youth News be incorporated therein. Reports to be due by the tenth of each month.

### **Laymen on Ways and Means Committee**

22. WHEREAS, laymen share largely the support of the church and its various departments, BE IT RESOLVED that two (2) laymen be appointed to the Ways and Means Committee.

## **WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTIONS**

### **Ministerial Tithes to District**

1. BE IT RESOLVED, that we require all our pastors to pay 60% of their tithe received from ministerial work, through the local treasurer to the district treasurer; and all other licensed and ordained ministers send 60% of the tithe they receive from Christian service direct to the District Treasurer.

## Division of Ministerial Tithes

2. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the division of ministerial tithes be as follows: That all the Superintendent's salary, travel, pension and parsonage expense be paid from the 60% tithe; and that 4% be placed in the District Expense Fund; and that 4% be placed in the General Conference Fund, the remaining 2% be placed in the Retiring and Emergency Fund, and that any surplus be placed in the Home Missionary Fund.

## District Expense Deficits

3. RESOLVED, that the Council be authorized to make a special appeal to the churches for the funds to meet deficits which might develop in the District Expense Fund at any time.

## District Budget

4. RESOLVED, that 8½% of the total church receipts, excepting United Stewardship Funds, money for indebtedness, building funds, revival offerings, Sunday School, Youth Society funds, and special funds raised for the departments covered by the District Budget, be paid monthly to the District Treasurer to be apportioned by him as follows:

Eastern Pilgrim College .....	40.0%
District Home Missions .....	30.0%
District Expense .....	25.0%
District Sunday School Expense .....	2.5%
District Youth Expense .....	2.5%

(As amended by 1956 Conference)

## Salaries of Treasurer, Secretary, Statistician, Sunday School Secretary, and Executive Secretary of Youth

5. RESOLVED, that the following officers be remunerated annually for their services from the District Expense Fund as follows (with the Youth and Sunday School Leaders being paid out of their own funds):

District Treasurer .....	\$400.00
District Secretary .....	\$150.00
District Statistician .....	\$ 35.00
Promotional Secretary of Sunday Schools .....	\$ 75.00
Executive Secretary of Youth .....	\$ 75.00

(As amended by the conference of 1960)

## Eastern Pilgrim College Special Apportionment

6. BE IT RESOLVED, that each church raise a minimum equivalent to 25¢ per member, per month, for the Eastern Pilgrim College.

## Conference Remembrances for Bereaved Ministers' Families

7. SINCE, there are times when death enters the immediate family of our ministers,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the District send a floral tribute and a love offering of \$50.00 to such bereaved families, payment to be made from the Retiring and Emergency Fund.

### **United Stewardship Fund**

8. We recommend that the United Stewardship of \$8.00 per member per year: Foreign Missions 20%, Church Extension 14%, Administration 36%, Sunday School and Youth 2.6%, Senior College 21.4%, Church Extension Loan Fund 3%, Contingent 3%, this fund to be raised monthly.

It shall be the responsibility of the pastor and the church board to see that their church raises its portion of the United Stewardship Fund. It shall be raised as one item under the term "United Stewardship," and shall be raised monthly.

### **Cash Balance to Be Retained by Youth Leaders**

9. WHEREAS, there is a financial inconvenience placed upon Young People's Zone Leaders having insufficient funds to engage a speaker and for advertising purpose,

BE IT RESOLVED, that each Youth Zone Leader be permitted to retain a working balance of \$35.00 throughout the conference year and that all money in excess of \$35.00 shall be forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer. (As amended by the 1957 Conference).

### **District Conference Expense Assessment**

10. RESOLVED, that each church provide the District Conference with no less than \$4.00 each for the pastor and delegate, or delegates, who attend the District Conference, and that all other members of the District Conference be required to pay \$3.00. (As amended by the 1955 Conference).

### **Parsonage Utilities**

11. WHEREAS, some of our churches provide the utilities for their parsonages, and

WHEREAS, there is a growing interest among the District churches to provide the same,

BE IT RESOLVED, that, as far as possible, each church provide its parsonage with a cooking range, electricity, fuel for heating and cooking, water, and telephone service.

### **District Superintendent's Salary and Allowances**

12. BE IT RESOLVED, that we pay our District Superintendent a salary of \$4,680.00 per year, supply his utilities and fuels, pay his telephone, postage, and telegraph expenses, and that the Superintendent shall be paid at the rate of eight cents per mile, for all travel in the interest of the District directly from the Superintendent's fund, and that the offerings taken at the time of the Superintendent's visits be given to him to be applied toward travel expense. The District Superintendent shall submit his mileage report to the District Treasurer at least once per month for payment. (As amended by the 1959 Conference).

### **Emergency Moving Provisions for Pastors**

13. In the event a pastor is forced to vacate the parsonage, not having received a pastoral call to another church:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the District shall pay up to one hundred dollars (\$100.00) toward his moving expenses, all such payments to be made from the Retirement and Emergency Fund.

### **A Weekly Payment to Unappointed Pastors**

14. WHEREAS, a hardship is generally worked upon the pastor who terminates his pastoral relationship without another call or appointment, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that said pastor shall be paid twenty-five (\$25.00) a week for each week of unappointment. These payments shall terminate after the fourth week, and shall be paid from the Retirement and Emergency Fund, provided said pastor's obligations and relations to the District meet the approval of the Council.

### **Church Building Loan Fund**

15. WHEREAS, a generous gift of \$500.00 has been received by the District Council with which to establish a fund from which loans may be made to new and needy churches,

BE IT RESOLVED, that we maintain a Church Building Loan Fund. The fund is to be held in trust by the District Council, and

That 5% of the total Home Missionary Offerings be appropriated by the District Treasurer to the increase of said Church Building Loan Fund.

Loans can be made from said fund by the Council to congregations endeavoring to erect or buy a church or parsonage, but only after a thorough investigation of the financial status of the congregation by the Council.

When a loan is granted, the congregation to which the loan is made shall give a note to the District Treasurer signed by the local trustees.

The principal shall be paid back in installments, with interest at 5% in advance, monthly, except that the minimum charge for interest shall not be less than 50¢ per month. The amount of the monthly installments shall be determined by the District Council.

A semi-annual statement of the amount due shall be mailed on the dates of November 1st and May 1st to each church that has a loan from said fund. Statement to be mailed by the District Treasurer. (AS AMENDED BY 1959 CONFERENCE.)

In the event that a congregation which has made a loan according to this plan, fails to meet its installments for a period of three months, its financial standing shall be investigated by the District Council.

16. BE IT RESOLVED that all ministerial members of the District Conference pay a Conference fee of \$4.00 and further that all retired ministers be exempt from payment of this fee. (Passed by 1958 Conference.)

17. BE IT RESOLVED that all those authorized to travel in interest of the district business be compensated at the rate of 7¢ per mile. (As passed by 1958 Conference and amended by 1959 Conference.)

18. BE IT RESOLVED, that a stenographer be secured by the District Council, to assist our Conference Secretary in recording minutes during the Conference sessions and that the stenographer be remunerated for said service; amount to be determined by District Council. (Passed 1959 Conference.)

19. BE IT RESOLVED, the Pennsylvania and New Jersey District shall commit to the Eastern Pilgrim College Board of Directors a minimum of \$1000 per year over a period of twenty (20) years for the purpose of financing one of the Student Resident Halls. This commitment shall be above the annual Eastern Pilgrim College budget.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the method of securing funds to meet this commitment to the Eastern Pilgrim College shall be as follows:

1. The College shall set up one Sunday each year to be known as "Educational Sunday." This Sunday shall be designated by the District Council.
2. On "Educational Sunday" morning the pastor will receive an offering for Eastern Pilgrim College which shall be placed toward the yearly commitment of \$1,000.
3. The Eastern Pilgrim College shall promote "Educational Sunday" by supplying the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District churches with bulletins, posters, and platform workers when available. (Passed 1959 Conference.)

### **Travel Expense Offering**

20. WHEREAS, the travel expense of the District Superintendent is not being adequately met by the pastors' 60% tithe,

BE IT RESOLVED, that each church endeavor to give an offering of no less than ten dollars (\$10.00) for each visit by him.

### **Home Missionary Calendars**

21. WHEREAS, the penny-a-meal calendars have helped tremendously in alleviating much of the expense of District Home Missions, and in particular, the Wilkes-Barre project,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the calendars be prepared for another year.

### **Annual District Budget**

22. WHEREAS, our finance on the District level is growing larger and more complex,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent be asked to prepare an annual budget for the District, in conjunction with the District Council, to be presented to the Conference for approval, beginning with the 1962 Conference.

### **Emergency Increase of Ministerial Tithe**

23. WHEREAS, an emergency has arisen in the superintendent's fund,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the ministerial tithe paid to the District be increased temporarily for the coming conference year to 75%.

## STANDING RULES

### Conference Bar

1. The first twelve rows of seats and forward shall constitute the Conference Bar.

### Time of Sitzings

2. Sitzings of the District Conference shall be from 8:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m.; 1:30 p. m. to 4:30 p. m.; and 6:30 p. m. to 9:00 p. m.

### Conference Communion Service

3. The first part of the first session of our District Conference shall be devoted to observing the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper with the presiding officer in charge.

### Time of Ordination Service

4. The Ordination Service shall be held at 7:30 p. m. the first day of Conference. (As amended by 1960 Conference.)

### Minimum Age for District Conference Delegates

5. Delegates to the District Conference must be 18 years of age or over.

### Unfinished Conference Business

6. At the close of the Conference, the District Council shall attend to any business that may have been overlooked, and approve the minutes of the closing sitting.

### Committee Appointments

7. The District Superintendent with Council consultation shall appoint all committees.

### Permanent Committees

8. The following committees: Resolutions, Ways and Means, Publicity and Reporting, Editing, Auditing, Memoirs, Reception, Statistical and Ministerial Convention shall be permanent.

### District Trustees

9. The members elected each year to the District Council shall simultaneously be elected to the Board of Trustees.

### Ministerial in Memoriam

10. A picture and a brief sketch of the labors of deceased ministers shall be placed in the Conference Journal.

### Superintendent's Vacation

11. The District Superintendent shall have a three weeks vacation annually, with pay.



### **Christmas Offering for Superintendent**

12. The District Secretary shall write to all ordained ministers, deaconesses, and all licensed ministers in regards to a Christmas love offering to be sent to the District Treasurer and forwarded to the District Superintendent and family by December 15th.

### **Ministerial Convention**

13. A two-day Annual Ministerial Convention shall be held in Wesley Chapel beginning 10:00 a. m. the first Tuesday after Easter.

### **Installation Service**

14. An Installation Service shall be conducted by some district official for each incoming pastor to the local church within three (3) weeks after he has come to the church. (As amended by 1959 Conference.)

### **Pastors' Vacations**

15. The District Conference recommends that each church in the Conference give its pastor a two week vacation with pay each year.

### **Procurement of Loans**

16. The District Council is authorized to work with any local church in procuring loans using the financial standing of the Conference, as reflected in the property statement and the District Treasurer's balance sheet, as the basis of negotiations for such loans.

### **Transfer of General Resolutions to Standing Rules**

17. The District Secretary is authorized to transfer items that are in reality rules of procedure and orders of the day to standing rules.

### **Posting of Statistical Report**

18. BE IT RESOLVED, that the Statistical Report be posted in the entrance foyer of Wesley Chapel after the reading of the totals.

## SIXTH ANNUAL DISTRICT YOUTH CONFERENCE

The sixth Annual District Youth Conference of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened in Wesley Chapel, on the Eastern Pilgrim College Campus, Allentown, Pa., on June 10, 1961, at 10:00 a.m., at the call of the District Youth President, the Rev. Carl N. Hall.

He introduced Rev. Melvin Dieter, president-elect of Eastern Pilgrim College, who in turn spoke briefly of the work of the College and welcomed the District Youth Conference to the College and its facilities.

Rev. John Wiktorchik led the congregation in singing "Sound The Battle Cry." Mrs. John Wiktorchik accompanied at the piano.

At the request of the District Youth President, the congregation stood, as they were led in prayer by Mr. Max Hile.

The President then presented Rev. J. D. Abbott, General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth in the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Following a few words of warm greetings, Rev. Abbott read a scripture lesson from Philipians 2:1-16, and brought a heart-stirring message. He emphasized the following:

1. The work that is ours, as it relates to the need among young people in America today.

- A. The shocking statistics available to us, point us to the seriousness of our work.
- B. Many youth are searching for answers rather than going out to champion a worthwhile cause.
- C. They feel their need of security. This can be found through the church.
- D. The Youth Department is not just a side line in our denomination. The youth of today truly are the church of tomorrow.
- E. We must come to understand and guide the youth. They are the most analyzed and least understood.
- F. Part of this needy group lives in our own community.
- G. The insecurity of our youth indicates that our task is not completed.
- H. We must tie the youth into the church.

2. There are some important qualifications if a youth program is to be vital.

- A. Both spiritual and social activities must be included — morale must be high — give them sufficient opportunity to be together — maintain a happy balance. This includes study, worship, action, projects and participation. Planning is a must.
- B. Youth need to learn, belong, grow, and know.

The General Secretary stated that this work must be promoted on the local, zone, and district level. He concluded his address with a prayer "that we commit ourselves more to the job than we have in the past."

Rev. J. D. Abbott then requested the roll call. Upon its completion, the conference bar was established by carried motion. It was comprised of the first five rows of seats across the front of the auditorium.

The chair then called for the report of the District Youth President. During Rev. Hall's report, he paused to present Mr. Edwin Lindsey, Zone Chairman of the Upper Susquehanna Zone, with a check for being the winner of the Tug-O-War Contest. The Youth President's report was accepted with a rising vote of thanks.

The minutes of July 29, 1960, were read and approved.

The District Youth Treasurer's report was read and received by a rising vote of thanks.

The chair then called for the Zone Leaders to come to the platform and give their reports. It was moved, seconded and carried that their reports be accepted.

By carried motion the morning sitting was adjourned at 11:55 a.m. The Rev. George Harris dismissed with prayer.

The second sitting of the Annual District Youth Conference opened at 2:00 p.m., with Rev. J. D. Abbott leading us in singing, "Higher Ground." Rev. P. W. Braisted led in prayer.

Carl N. Hall presented a financial need to the Conference Body and requested that Rev. Robert Tice and Mr. Edwin Lindsey serve as ushers to receive an offering to meet that need.

The Chair called for the Local Youth Presidents to come to the platform and give their reports. He pointed out that this is a sharing of ideas which should benefit us all. There were twelve society presidents present.

The Reception Committee presented Dr. R. D. Gunsalus, president of Eastern Pilgrim College. It was moved, seconded, and carried that Dr. Gunsalus be granted an honorary seat on the platform.

The local presidents' reports were accepted.

The next report was from the Resolutions Committee. The Chair suggested that we hear all of the resolutions before returning to resolution number one for action.

Resolution number one was re-read and a motion to adopt it was carried.

Resolution number two was re-read and a motion to adopt it was carried.

The Chair then called for a report of the Ways and Means Committee. All of the resolutions were read. Resolution number one was re-read. It was moved, seconded, and carried that it be amended to read, "BE IT RESOLVED that the local youth groups (organized and unorganized) include in their financial program, a budget of ten percent (10%) of all regular offerings, with all special offerings excluded, to be sent monthly to the District Youth Treasurer, to help supplement the present income in the Department, consisting of a small percentage of the regular District Budget, which

has already proven to be inadequate. This money is to be used for general operating expenses." The amended resolution was then moved, seconded, and carried.

Resolution number two was re-read. It was changed by the Chair to read, "BE IT RESOLVED that this Conference recommend to the District Conference, that the Budget apportionment for the District Youth be increased to the extent of  $\frac{1}{2}$  of one percent." It was moved, seconded, and carried.

Resolution number three was re-read and a motion to adopt it was carried.

The Chair then brought us to the election of officers. Ushers were appointed in the persons of Revs. James Long and Robert Tice. Tellers were appointed in the persons of Mr. Edwin Lindsey and Rev. Earl R. Heckman.

The nominees were then read for the office of District Youth President. Rev. John Wiktorchik was elected on the first ballot with 36 out of 64 votes.

The Conference proceeded to vote for the District Youth Vice President. Rev. Robert Addington was re-elected on the first ballot with 53 out of 64 votes.

The nominees were then read for the office of District Youth Treasurer. Rev. Robert Campbell was elected on the first ballot with 43 out of 64 votes.

We then proceeded to vote for the District Youth Secretary. The first ballot re-elected Rev. David J. Wooten with 54 out of 63 votes.

The Chair then brought us to the election of District Zone Leaders. The results were as follows: BALD EAGLE — Rev. Leroy Fetterolf; UPPER SUSQUEHANNA — Mr. Edwin Lindsey; CENTRAL SUSQUEHANNA — Rev. Earl R. Heckman; LOWER SUSQUEHANNA — Mr. Marvin Bubb; LEHIGH — Rev. John P. Ragsdale; GARDEN STATE — Rev. Arthur Merrill.

The General Secretary of Youth then called the following individuals to the platform: Rev. John Wiktorchik, Rev. Robert Addington, Rev. David Wooten, Rev. Robert Campbell, Rev. Earl Heckman, and Mr. Edwin Lindsey. Rev. J. D. Abbott introduced and congratulated the aforesaid individuals as the new District officers and leaders.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the District Youth Conference give the Executive Youth Council authority to approve the minutes of this June 10, 1961 meeting.

Resolution number three was then read and carried by a rising vote.

Resolution number four was then read and carried by a rising vote.

The Rev. Robert D. Addington, in behalf of our District Youth, presented Rev. Carl N. Hall, our outgoing District Youth President, with a twenty five dollar (\$25.00) check, which was a token of our appreciation for his labors among us.

The Conference was adjourned by carried motion. Rev. John Wiktorchik offered the closing prayer.

## WAYS AND MEANS

### Resolution No. 1

INASMUCH as the scope of service of the Youth Department of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District is ever broadening and farther reaching in its efforts to serve the present generation, and INASMUCH with its program is the ever increasing need of finances and WHEREAS Pilgrim Youth desire to be good followers as well as good examples BE IT RESOLVED that the local youth groups (organized and unorganized) include in their local financial program a budget of ten percent (10%) of all regular offerings, excluding all special offerings, to be sent monthly to the District Youth Treasurer to help supplement the present income in the Department consisting of a small percentage of the regular District Budget which has already proven to be inadequate. This money is to be used for general operating expenses.

### Resolution No. 2

WHEREAS the activities of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey Youth are ever expanding and accordingly a greater financial need is recognized therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that this conference recommend to the District Conference, that the Budget apportionment for the District Youth be increased to the extent of  $\frac{1}{2}$  of one percent.

### Resolution No. 3

WHEREAS necessary expense is involved in transportation and meals for the District Youth Conference, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that the Youth Conference recommend that each local society take into consideration such expense and remunerate those representatives who are duly authorized to attend the District Youth Conference. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Zone Leaders not covered by the above mentioned be remunerated by the Zone Treasury.

## RESOLUTIONS

### Resolution No. 1

WHEREAS the necessary activities of our District Youth Conference has better been served by the setting aside of a day for that occasion, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that we perpetuate this practice.

### Resolution No. 2

INASMUCH as all youth societies appreciate news releases relative to each other, and WHEREAS the District Youth President is in a good posi-

INASMUCH as we have been favored and honored with the very efficient leadership of our esteemed District Youth President, Rev. Carl Hall, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that we show our appreciation by a rising vote of thanks.

## **STANDING RULES**

### **Resolution No. 1 — 1957**

“BE IT RESOLVED that since the District Youth President is Chairman of the Board of Youth Camp Directors, that the District Youth Treasurer shall be the Business Director of the Youth Camp, by virtue of office. All other directors shall be elected by the Executive Youth Committee and the Zone Leaders.”

### **Resolution No. 2 — 1958**

“BE IT RESOLVED that the Executive Youth Council set the date for the succeeding Youth Camp.”

### **Resolution No. 3 — 1959**

“WHEREAS there is need for a closer working relationship between the local youth presidents and the District youth work;

“BE IT RESOLVED that there be an annual meeting of the local youth presidents with the respective Zone Leader and nearest District Youth Officer, with said meeting to be held as soon after the District Youth Leaders' Meeting as is feasible.”

### **Resolution No. 4 — 1960**

“BE IT RESOLVED that the District Youth Vice-President and Secretary serve on the Youth Camp Board by virtue of their office.”

### **Resolution No. 5 — 1960**

“BE IT RESOLVED that the District Youth President set up a “Youth Programs Exchange Plan” wherein each local Youth President shall submit one good program by youth week each year and the District Youth President

shall select and publish the best of these programs to be sent to each youth society."

### **Resolution No. 6 — 1960**

"BE IT RESOLVED that we observe Youth Camp Sunday annually, the first Sunday of July. Promotional material to be distributed and an offering to be received to assist the Young People of the local church who desire to attend the Youth Camp and if there are no youth attending camp, the offering shall be sent to the District Youth Treasurer."

### **Resolution No. 7 — 1961**

"INASMUCH as the scope of service of the Youth Department of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District is ever broadening and farther reaching in its efforts to serve the present generation, and INASMUCH with its program is the ever increasing need of finance, and WHEREAS Pilgrim Youth desire to be good followers as well as good examples,

"BE IT RESOLVED that the local youth groups (organized and unorganized) include in their local financial program a budget of ten percent (10%) of all regular offerings, excluding all special offerings, to be sent monthly to the District Youth Treasurer to help supplement the present income in the Department, consisting of a small percentage of the regular District Budget, which has already proven to be inadequate. This money is to be used for general operating expenses."

### **Resolution No. 8 — 1961**

"WHEREAS necessary expense is involved in transportation and meals for the District Youth Conference, therefore,

"BE IT RESOLVED that the Youth Conference recommend that each local society take into consideration such expense and remunerate those representatives who are duly authorized to attend the District Youth Conference. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Zone Leaders not covered by the above mentioned, be remunerated by the Zone Treasury.

### **Resolution No. 9 — 1961**

"WHEREAS the necessary activities of our District Youth Conference has better been served by the setting aside of a day for that occasion, therefore,

"BE IT RESOLVED that we perpetuate this practice."

### **Resolution No. 10 — 1961**

"INASMUCH as all youth societies appreciate news releases relative to each other and WHEREAS the District Youth President is in a good position to collect such news, and prepare such for the youth page of the Pilgrim Action, therefore,

"BE IT RESOLVED that this become one of his official duties."
