- No. 1—The center tier of seats and platform constitute the Conference Bar.
- No. 2—The first night session of the Annual Conference shall be a service of Ordination of eligible candidates.
- No. 3—The Fiscal Year shall run from June first to June the first.
- No. 4—All Annual Reports shall be sent to the District Statistician postmarked not later than the tenth of the month immediately following the closing of the Fiscal Year.
- No. 5—The District Superintendent shall appoint all committees.

- No. 8—WHEREAS, the Gospel Minister should be provided for at the age of retirement, BE IT RESOLVED, that we finance the Pension Fund of the General Church by each minister and evangelist sending two per cent of his cash salary received for the month through the local church treasurer to the District Treasurer, and that each local church pay four per cent of each minister's and evangelist's cash salary to the District Treasurer.
- No. 9—BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent's four per cent toward the pension fund be paid by the District.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the THIRTEENTH Annual Conference of the Pittsburgh District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church—GREETINGS:

It is with gratitude to God that we gather here at Mt. Pleasant for this our thirteenth Conference of the Pittsburgh District. The great camp meeting just closed was like a cool breeze on a hot day. We shall not soon forget the ministry of Dr. Surbrook, Dr. Rothwell, Rev. Byrd, and Mark and Lois Waddell. May the same tender spirit which characterized our camp this year carry on into all the churches of the Pittsburgh District.

Most of our churches on the District conduct at least two revival meetings a year and these meetings have been used of God to win many people to the Lord and to the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Some churches have reported the best meetings they have ever had and this resulted in some new members being added. Our church must advance and one of the best ways to go forward is through revival efforts.

This year in our Home Missionary work we have tried to make the Portable Tabernacle a reality and the churches have responded remarkably well. We have on hand \$733.27 and it is hoped that the new Home Missionary Board will take steps soon after Conference to have this tabernacle built and placed in some town where a Pilgrim Holiness Church is needed.

A meeting was held in North Charleroi, Pa. this spring which resulted in establishing a preaching point. Brother Saccani, a local preacher from Elizabeth, is in charge.

Prayer meetings were started in DuBois by Rev. Rutherford and Rev. Clark this spring. They were held in the homes of folk who are interested in establishing a Pilgrim Holiness Church. The Board placed Dale Bair, a recent graduate of Allentown Bible College, in charge of the work. They have rented a house and services have been held.

The preaching point established in Linesville by Rev. Fehr of Geneva church may eventually become an established church. The Home Missionary Board feels that there are great opportunities for the Pittsburgh District in these and other new fields. We have tried to spend the finances wisely so as to receive the best returns for money invested.

The pastors have worked hard in their respective fields and

much could be said about the progress of each church. This has been their work and the statistical report will reveal what has been accomplished. I hesitate to mention any particular church lest I overlook some outstanding work of some pastor. However, it is worthy to note here, that the Donora church after worshiping in their basement church for many years have completed their main auditorium. This building is a credit to the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Rev. Byers is the faithful pastor at Donora.

The Armbrust church, where Rev. McClure is pastor, have installed a Hammond Electric Organ.

At Rimersburg the main auditorium has been finished and at a recent dedication service an offering was received to cover the balance of indebtedness.

The brick work on the Bentleyville church is almost completed and it is hoped that they will soon be worshiping in the main auditorium.

Rev. Carder is working hard erecting a church building at Franklin.

It has been a pleasure and a privilege to work with the donse-crated, godly pastors of the Pittsburgh District. Their co-operation with the District program and their help in preparing for the camp meeting has been outstanding. We have been able to add six new cabin rooms at a minimum cost, through their hard work.

The Pittsburgh District lost one of its most faithful and hard-working ministers this year in the Home-going of Rev. Guy McIntyre. He, his faithful wife, and son John were on their way to spend Thanksgiving Holiday with their daughter at Allentown Bible College when a tractor-trailor demolished their car and instantly killed all occupants of the car. Although their departure is a keen loss to the church, their blessed memory will continue to inspire many of us to carry on the great work left behind.

During the year I have preacher 127 times, visited all the churches three times excepting a few, conducted all the Annual meetings except one, attended three Bible School Board meetings at Allentown, conducted six Council meetings, four Home Missionary Board meetings, and one District Sunday School Board meeting, dedicated one parsonage (Richeyville), dedicated one church (Rimersburg). I have also spent about 30 days working on the camp ground.

I have received salary in full \$3,760.00, for revivals \$210.00,

making a total of \$3,970.00.

I have traveled in District work 12,778 miles in the interest of District work for which I have been paid 5 cents per mile. My offerings from the churches amounted to \$416.73 which I have turned over to the District Treasurer. My postage amounted to \$43.64 which was paid by the District Treasurer as well as \$28.35 for parsonage repairs, telephone calls, etc.

We are grateful for God's help during the year and appreciate the co-operation of the pastors and churches.

"Verily, verily, I say unto you, the hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God: and they that hear shall live." John 5:25





The Pittsburgh District suffered an irreparable loss on Nov. 22, 1950, when the chariot of the Lord swung low and took the spirits of the Rev. Guy McIntyre, his wife Edna, and their son John to Glory. The family were on their way to Allentown to visit their daughter Mrs. Edward Wheatley, when the tragedy occurred about twelve miles east of Harrisburg. Miss Shirley Carpenter, a member of the Richeyville Sunday School, who was traveling with the McIntyres, was also a victim.

Rev. McIntyre was born in Pittsfield Township, August 9, 1900, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles McIntyre. He at one time pastored the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Blue Eye. In 1945 he accepted a call from the Pilgrim Holiness

Churches at Princedale and Richeyville, the latter of which he was serving at the time of his death. He had pastored at Richeyville for three years, during which time he built a fine brick parsonage, which stands as a lasting memorial of his devotion and industry. Under his faithful leadership the local church had prospered materially and spiritually, and his death was a stunning blow to those for whom he labored so earnestly.

As a minister, Rev. McIntyre was a Biblical and forceful preacher, a man of faith and consecration. As was said of Barnabas he was "a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost." The night previous to his death he attended a revival service in one of our District churches and witnessed of spiritual victory and forcefully exclaimed, "I am going to Heaven and would like to take all of you folk with me."

Surviving are two daughters and a son, Mrs. Frank Chiricuzio, Corry; Mrs. Edward Wheatley, Allentown; Duane McIntyre, Spring Creek; and five grandchildren.

The McIntyres are gone from our midst, but the eye of faith can

see them where "the Lamb on the throne shall feed them, and lead them to fountains of living water, and God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes." While we mourn their going, we pledge our coming to join their shining spirits in the Father's many-mansioned home.

#### PITTSBURGH DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

To the Thirteenth Conference of the Pittsburgh District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

#### GREETINGS:

Since God in His providence has seen fit to allow us to assemble in this session of this District Conference, it is with praise and gratitude to God that we present this Sunday School Report.

The Pittsburgh District, since its inception, has ever been very keenly aware of the importance of the work of the Sunday School in the work of the Church to bring souls to God. During the past year the work of the Sunday School in the District has been carried on in the face of unprecedented obstacles and weather conditions. Some Sunday Schools have surged forward in their average attendance. Outstanding among these are:

Rimersburg with a gain of 25, Armbrust with a gain of 21, and Belle Bridge with a gain of 20. Quite a number of the churches showed a decrease in their Sunday School attendance so that the District attendance showed a slight decrease of 82 in average attendance for the year. However, it is well to call to the attention of this Conference some figures released by the office of the General Secretary of Sunday Schools which shows that over a ten year period from 1940-1950 the Pittsburgh District shows a gain of 128 per cent in average attendance. This is the highest percentage gain in the entire Pilgrim Holiness Church. The attendance in 1940 was 848 in 1950, 1939. Therefore, it is with a deep sense of thanks to God and a determination to reach the goal as set forth by the General Church in the program of evangelism that we "forget those things that are behind" and set forth to the goal expecting to reach it through the aid of the Holy Spirit.

We also wish to say that the General Department of Sunday Schools has provided a Conference Certificate to be awarded to the Sunday School showing the highest average gain in attendance. We are happy to present this certificate to the Rimersburg Church, Rev. Chas. Ferringer, Pastor, and Joseph Anthony Sunday School Superintendent.

#### **PROCEEDINGS**

The Thirteenth Annual Conference of the Pittsburgh District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church met at 9:05 A. M., July 5th, 1951, at the District Camp Grounds in Mt. Pleasant, Pa.

The Conference opened by singing, "Faith of our Fathers" and "Near the Cross" led by the Rev. Andrew Jalosky.

The Rev. L. W. Drury, Dist. Sup't., asked the delegates for quotations of Scripture after which we were led in prayer by Rev. E. E. Finley.

The Secretary called the roll.

The following were seated as substitute delegates: Mrs. H. L. Fuller and Mrs. Andrew Jalosky.

The District Secretary read the transfers and recommendations for the Rev. J. I. Heise from the W. Va. District, and Rev. John McCoy from the Oil City Conference of the Free Methodist denomination. These brethren were received and given a seat in the Conference.

The District Sup't. introduced our General Superintendent, the Rev. L. W. Sturk, who had just arrived. He addressed the Conference concerning the program of evangelism in the Church. He revealed how the program originated, its aims, methods, and goals. He also stressed our need of adhering to the truths of our early church leaders, emphasizing especially their zeal for the doctrine and experience of holiness.

The Conference stood and sang, "Blest be the Tie that Binds." Motion prevailed that the center and first three rows of seats on each side of the chapel be designated as the Conference bar.

The following hours were set for the Conference sittings: 9:00 to 11:30 A. M.; 1:30 to 5:00 P. M. and 7:30 in the evening.

The District Sup't. read the names of the various Committees. The Rev. L. W. Drury read his report as District Sup't. which was readily accepted.

Rev. Elmer D. Joy gave a brief verbal report as to his activities as Ass't. Sup't. His report was accepted.

Rev. C. L. Duncan read the report of the Auditing Committee, which was received.

The Rev. Samuel A. Byers read the District Treasurer's report. This report was accepted.

The Reception Committee presented Miss Bertha Joy, a missionary of our church, to the Conference. After giving her testimony she was given a seat in the Conference bar.

The Rev. E. S. Rutherford read the report of the Resolutions Committee. The action was as follows:

Resolution II.....read and discussed.

We adjourned until the afternoon sitting by expiration of time.

#### AFTERNOON SITTING

The Conference convened at 1:30 P. M. The Rev. C. L. Duncan led in singing, "Blessed Assurance" and Rev. John McCoy led in prayer.

The Rev. L. W. Sturk read from the gospel of John chapter 17, verses 21 and 22. He emphasized the "glory" that should characterize the redeemed. Rev. Sturk mentioned that the things that hinder the "glory" are silent services, unbended knees, indefinite ministration, and worldly niceties.

The minutes of the morning sitting were read by the District Secretary. They stood approved as corrected.

Rev. L. W. Drury introduced to the Conference two of the new pastors of the District, Revs. George Watson and Dale Bair.

Rev. E. S. Rutherford read a further report of the Resolutions Committee.

The District Secretary read the recommendations of the District Council for the licensees and for those to be ordained.

It was moved and seconded that the time be extended until 5:30 P. M. Carried.

The Rev. Leon L. Adams read the Statistical report which was accepted. He next presented the District S. S. Activities report which was received.

The following District evangelists gave their reports. Rev. Huey Gillispie gave his report to the Conference. Motion prevailed that the report be accepted and published in the District Minutes.

Rev. Donald Cole gave a verbal report of his evangelistic activities which was accepted.

The Dist. Secretary read a letter from the Rev. and Mrs. Gray, missionaries in Africa. It was moved and seconded that the letter be published in the minutes and that the Secretary send greetings from the Conference to them. The delegates all knelt in prayer for the Grays, being led by Rev. Elmer Joy.

Motion prevailed that the election of District officers be the next order of business.

A love offering was received for the Rev. and Mrs. F. B. Gray. It was moved and seconded that we cable this offering to them.

The result of the election was as follows:

Moved and seconded that the evening sitting convene at 7:00 P. M.

Adjourned by expiration of time.

#### EVENING SITTING

The Conference convened at 7:00 P. M. The Rev. C. L. Duncan led the Conference in singing "Faith of our Fathers" and "A Charge to Keep I Have."

The Conference then proceeded to ordain to the ministry Revs.

Grace Wolford, Charles Heckman, Louis Patmore, and Donald Cole. Rev. L. W. Sturk delivered the charge to the candidates after which we proceeded to the ordination by prayer and the laying on of hands.

The District Secretary read the minutes of the afternoon sitting which were approved.

Next order of business was the continuation of the election of District officers which resulted as follows:

Rev. Charles Heckman read the report from the Committee on Memoirs which was accepted.

The Resolutions Committee gave its final report.

Resolution IX.....carried.

Motion prevailed that the District Council take care of any unfinished business. Carried.

The District Sup't. appointed the Committees for the Coming year.

The minutes were read and approved.

It was moved and seconded that the 1951 District Conference adjourn.

The Conference adjourned by standing and singing, "When We all Get to Heaven.

#### STANDING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. WHEREAS, there has been considerable difficulty in operating the kitchen and dining room with help supplied by the present plan, BE IT RESOLVED, that the camp committee secure the requisite help irrespective of age and that their remuneration be stipulated by said committee.
- 2. RESOLVED, that no pastor shall be permitted to plan or hold a tent meeting, vacation Bible School, or revival during the dates set for the Annual District Camp and Conference within the bounds of the District without the consent of the District Council, provided these dates are announced a year in advance.
- 3. RESOLVED, that the District Council be authorized to appoint Trustees to receive the title to property in missions where property will be involved before the organization of a church.
- 4. RESOLVED, that all applicants for District credentials be required to complete the questionaire as provided by the District Council.
- 5. BE IT RESOLVED, that all pastors be required to attend our Ministerial Convention. Upon failure to be present a written reason must be given.
- 6. RESOLVED, that the District Council be empowered to erect and maintain suitable buildings on our District Camp grounds.
- 7. Inasmuch as it is the pastor's duty to raise church finances, and WHEREAS it usually works great hardship on a pastor to raise salary in arrears for a former pastor in a church, wherein former pastor was unable to raise his own, therfore, BE IT RESOLVED, that no pastor, after leaving a charge, press that church beyond that which is expedient to the financial stability of that former charge.
- 8. BE IT RESOLVED, that our District Treasurer be bonded and that the matter of bonding be left in the hands of the District Council.
- 9. BE IT RESOLVED, that our licentiates be directed to take the specified course of study through the Allentown Bible College and that they secure the transcript of credits at the end of each school year and present it to the Board of Exam-

iners.

10. BE IT RESOLVED, that we have a Home Missionary Board composed of the District Superintendent as Chairman, the District Treasurer and three (3) other members elected by the Conference. Their duties shall be as follows:

To promote extensive Home Missionary activities in our District.

To investigate the prospects of new fields.

To place workers where they deem it advisable and as far as the District Home Missionary funds will permit.

- 11. BE IT RESOLVED, that the camp committee select song books to be used at least three consecutive years, same to be announced in camp advertising.
- 12. INASMUCH as many people pray through at our Camp Meeting who do not live in a community where we have a Pilgrim Holiness Church: AND WHEREAS, these people were saved under the ministry of our Church,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that in so far as possible such people be contacted by the District Council and passed upon for membership in the Church in the same manner as by a local church board, and that they be received into the Pilgrim Holiness Church at some service near the close of Camp. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Missionary Board retain a list of these members with their proper addresses, and that they be held as a nucleus for a church in their community.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in the meantime they be turned over to the nearest Pilgrim Holiness Church for pastoral care.

- 13. RESOLVED, that all ministers be required to attend the District Camp, and that the Superintendent be requested to instruct our people that the pastor's salary should continue during this time.
- 14. BE IT RESOLVED, that each pastor shall come to Camp two
  (2) days early to clean up and prepare the Camp and remain
  until the work is completed.
- 15. BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Treasurer be directed to send to all ministers and local church treasurers a mimeographed copy of our Conference rules regarding finances.
- 16. INASMUCH as the views of the ministers' wives are largely

ministerial views, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that our churches be discouraged from electing minister's wives as delegates to the District Conference.

- 17. BE IT RESOLVED, that an annual Camp Meeting be held and that the District Council be empowered to set the date. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Camp be supervised by a Camp Committee composed of the following personnel: the District Superintendent, Camp Clerk, Purchasing Agent, Superintendent of Buildings, Commissary, Custodian or Superintendent of Grounds, and Receptionist or Room Clerk. The District Superintendent shall appoint these persons. This Committee shall meet during the Ministerial Convention and make plans for the Camp. This Committee shall be responsible for the prosecution of Resolution No. 30 under Standing Resolutions.
- 18. BE IT RESOLVED, that each church give its pastor two weeks vacation with pay each year. In his absence the pastor shall secure a supply speaker, and an agreeable remuneration be made by the local Church Board.
- 19. BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Young People's Officer's and Zone Representatives plan for an Annual Youth Convention to be conducted over the weekend of Labor-Day. (See Resolution No. 1 of the 1951 Resolutions Committee Report).
  - BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that our efforts for the promotion of Youth Work throughout the District be doubled.
- 20. BE IT RESOLVED, that three meals per day be served at our District Camp and at all District Gatherings.
- 21. BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Council secure a man to be deputized to act as policeman on the Camp grounds during all District Gatherings.
- 22. INASMUCH as many local Sunday Schools are affected in their monthly attendance report during the month in which our District Camp is held, BE IT RESOLVED, that there be Sunday School Sessions with classes for adult, young people, intermediate, junior and primary departments each Sunday during Camp and District Gatherings, and those who attend be considered present in their home school.
- 23. We recommend that pastors of deceased members of our Dis-

- trict bring to the Memorial Committee a copy of the obituary of the deceased and any other information that is available, the Memorial Committee report to be printed in our Conference Journal.
- 24. BE IT RESOLVED, that minister's children receiving entertainment at our District Gatherings be assigned work when necessary.
- 25. RESOLVED, each church erect at its place of worship the name of the church, and name, address, and phone number of the pastor.
- 26. BE IT RESOLVED, that each pastor be permitted to engage in two revival meetings each year off his charge. It shall be his responsibility to secure and pay a supply speaker in his absence.
- 27. WHEREAS, cases of illness and injury which require treatment frequently occur on the camp grounds, and WHEREAS, adequate facilities for such treatment are not now available, therefore BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Council provide a room, equip it with the requisite facilities for emergency treatment and secure the services of a competent attendant therefore.
- 28. BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Council have printed on good bond paper or light cardboard-whichever is cheaper-the Church Covenant and preceding questions, together with such other questions as the District Council may deem advisable; providing at the end of the form a place for signature and addresses; and that these forms be distributed to the churches free of charge.
- 29. BE IT RESOLVED, that we print in our District Minutes the program of evangelism as adopted by our General Conference.
  - BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Conference go on record as being one hundred per cent in favor of said program. BE IT ALSO RESOLVED, that in pursuance of this project we set the following objectives for the quadrennium:
    - (a). Eight new churches.
    - (b). An increase in membership of 250.
  - (c). An increase of 700 in Sunday School attendance. BE IT ALSO RESOLVED, that our ministers do their ut-

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED, that our ministers do their utmost to increase the number of subscriptions to the Advocate. BE IT RESOLVED, that special emphasis be laid on the Young People's work of the District and local churches; and that we endeavor to build a more spiritual Y. P. organization. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that youth meetings in our District gatherings be made more fruitful in soul-saving and in outreach.

- 30. BE IT RESOLVED, that Camp Meeting Rules be formulated and printed; and that copies be posted conspicuously about the camp grounds; and also that copies be mailed to all pastors before the time of camp meeting.
- 31. BE IT RESOLVED, that we ask our District evangelists to bring a written report of their work to the District Conference.

#### RESOLUTIONS OF THE 1951 CONFERENCE

- 1. WHEREAS, the Eastern Regional Youth Convention is to be held over Labor Day week-end, therefore BE IT RESOLVED, that Resolution No. 19 under Standing Resolutions be suspended for the current year.
- 2. - FURTHERMORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that all ordained Deacenesses pay \$1.00 per month through their local church treasurer to the District Treasurer, and that the District Council be empowered to make adjustments when necessary.
- 5. BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Council be empowered to provide financial assistance to our needy pastors as they may deem it advisable, the same to be taken from the District Budget.
- 6. WHEREAS, there is much labor and time involved in carrying out the duties of the offices of District Secretary, District Treasurer, and District Statistician, BE IT RESOLVED, that we pay \$60.00 to the District Secretary, \$240. to the District Treasurer, and \$40.00 to the District Statistician as a yearly salary.
- 7. WHEREAS, the General Board sets the salaries of all the General Officers, and WHEREAS, church boards set the salaries of the pastors, and WHEREAS, the District Council is in a position to better know the financial status of the District and handles District funds, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent's salary be set by the District Council before the election.
- 8. BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Treasurer be empowered to pay the District Superintendent five cents per mile for traveling expenses while serving on the District and that the District Treasurer pay for his telegrams, telephone, postage and stationery.
- 9. BE IT RESOLVED, that we ask our churches to give an amount equal to ten (10) per cent of the pastor's salary and expense account, same to be paid monthly through the local church treasurer to be apportioned as follows:
  - $25~{\rm per}$  cent for Home Missions.
  - $70~{\rm per}$  cent for District Expense.
  - 5 per cent for General Conference Sinking Fund.
- 10. BE IT RESOLVED, that we as a District contribute to the Allentown Bible College the equivalent of twenty-five (25) cents a month per member, said funds to be paid through the District Treasurer and that we put forth a whole-hearted effort to raise our quota for the College.
- 11. BE IT RESOLVED, that the District pay any minister whose travel is authorized in the interest and work of the District at the rate of five (5) cents per mile.
- 12. BE IT RESOLVED, that the remuneration of those preachers employed by the District include their 4 per cent contribution

to the Pension Plan.

- 13. Because of the high cost of printing THEREFORE, BE IT RE-SOLVED, that we charge 25 cents per copy for our District Minutes.
- 14. WHEREAS, according to the action of the General Conference of June 13, 1950 a General Budget was set as follows:

# RESOLUTION REGARDING CHURCH-WIDE PROGRAM OF EVANGELISM AS PASSED BY

# THE GENERAL CONFERENCE IN JUNE 1950 (See Standing Resolution 29, Page 32)

32. WHEREAS, the great objective of our church is the salvation of souls as clearly stated in our Manual, and WHEREAS we fully understand that the work of God must be carried on and propagated by men and women who are soundly converted and Spirit-filled, and WHEREAS, this transformation which brings them into right relationship with the Lord is usually brought about by an intensive evangelistic effort, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that as a church we launch, with the beginning of this quadrennium, an intensive four-year campaign of evangelism, said campaign to be carried out to the following plan:

Expect the leader of each department of our church to emphasize soul-winning.

Encourage our local churches to exercise every possible effort for the salvation of souls in their special revival campaigns by employing evangelists who carry a burden for souls and whose great objective is soul winning.

To encourage revivals in our Sunday schools by setting times when children shall be invited to seek salvation.

To ask our young people's leaders to give altar calls fre-

quently in youth services of all kinds, in an effort to bring our young people to Christ.

To emphasize the spirit of evangelism in our schools and seek to impress our students with the fact that soul-winning is the greatest work in which one can be engaged.

To emphasize in all our work the doctrine of entire sanctification in an effort to lead the people into this blessed experience.

To encourage the maintenance of the family altar in every Pilgrim home as a means of bringing our people to a better spiritual state, and our families to Christ.

To encourage personal evangelism as a means of soul-saving in keeping with the scriptural command to go into the highways and hedges and compel the people to come in.

To emphasize the importance of fasting and prayer as a means of bringing about a mighty revival of religion among our people everywhere.

Inasmuch as people are generally encouraged to greater efforts by the setting of objectives, be it further resolved that dur districts and local churches be encouraged to set some definite objectives, particularly to increase attendance in our services and the membership of our churches; this, of course, with the understanding that the increase of membership means the salvation of souls inasmuch as we do not receive into membership any who do not give evidence of having been born again.

Be it further resolved that in the carrying out of the above program that the following objectives be set for the quarrennium:

- (a). To gain 200 new churches in the homeland.
- (b). To bring our total membership to 50,000.
- (c). To increase our annual average Sunday school attendance in the homeland to 65,000 by 1953.
- (d). To increase our average Advocate subscription list to 15,000 per year.
- (e). To support our great foreign missionary and church extension work by every church paying its general budget in full and participating each year in the Easter offering for church extension and the self-denial offering for foreign missions; these two special offerings to be over and above the budget.

Inasmuch as the budget and these two special offerings are yet insufficient to finance this work (and should be considered a minimum and not a maximum amount) we urge our people wherever possible, to give liberally as God prospers them ever bearing in mind that we are obligated to carry out the Great Commission to get the gospel to as many people as possible.

# A LETTER TO THE CONFERENCE FROM THE REV. AND MRS. F. B. GRAY AND FAMILY

To the Thirteenth Annual Session of the Pittsburgh Conference

### GREETINGS:

The Psalmist said, "Therefore will I give thanks unto thee, O Lord, among the heathen, and sing praises unto thy name." We certainly count it a privilege to sing the praises of God out here among the heathen. The natives are not theologians, but they do expect to see in practice what little they do understand about the Scriptures, therefore we get opportunities to give that other coat and walk that extra mile. But did not our Saviour do that and even more for us?

We have had a gracious year serving God here at Siachitema Mission. God has been good to us and supplied our needs. We are still trusting Him for the healing of our daughter, Florence, who has been stricken with rheumatic fever. "All things work together for good." We have completed and moved into our new home here at the Mission. Rev. H. S. Bennett was with us at the time of completion and helped us to get moved in. We had some good services here with Bro. Bennett and much good was done. We also closed a good year in May in our Boarding School. Most all the students had been to the altar at times during the year and some got definitely saved.

On April 29th we attended our first Missionary Conference since coming to Africa. We traveled a thousand miles to get there, and rode most of the way in the back of a Jeep. We left the mission on Wednesday morning, and arrived in Brakpan on Thursday night about 10:00 p.m. There were three of us that could drive, so we drove steady. The return trip was accomplished the same way. We were very glad that we went, but do not desire to travel that way again. The Conference was certainly a time of blessing, until we came to the place where we began to ask Bro. Flexon for permission to open new fields and requested more Missionary couples from the States. To all of our requests, Bro. Flexon just shook his head in the negative. Even when the breithren stood up with tears streaming down their faces and plead for help, Bro. Flexon stood firm. We know that our Secretary of Foreign Missions could see and feel the need even as we, but he also knew

the limits of the Missionary Department. Well, there is nothing left for us to do but to put the heathen off for another couple years. When the Conference closed we took leave of one and another with Bro. Flexon's last stirring message ringing in our souls, determined to do more for God and the heathen.

We have noticed some definite advances in spiritual progress among our teachers and preachers this year. They are taking a firm stand against some of the old customs that jeopardize the spiritual experiences of our young people. Of course in doing this they invoke upon themselves the wrath of the old people, but they have declared that they are going to hold up the standards of our church. This is very heart warming to us for we know what it means for these teachers and preachers to stand out against the witch-craft and old customs of the people. Pray with us that God will give them strength to continue in this way.

At the Conference we were given permission to start a Bible School here at the Mission for Northern Rhodesia, so again we beg your prayers as we undertake this great step. We have always felt that this was the great need of our Rhodesian field.

We thank you all for your prayers and letters and cards and gifts, your faithfulness to us is appreciated beyond words of utterance. We have prayed for a spiritual advancement in our District and trust that this Conference will prove that God has answered prayer. May God's richest blessing be upon all of you.
