FIRST SESSION:

July 12, 1963

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our much appreciated General Superintendent, the Rev. Dr. P. W. Thomas, co-ministers, faithful lay delegates of this twenty-fifth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, held this 12th of July 1963, at the Cherry Run Camp Grounds, Rimersburg, Pa.

GREETINGS:

Words cannot express the heart felt appreciation that we sincerely feel for our General Superintendent, the Rev. Dr. Thomas. He has been a great inspiration to us as a district, and personally he is a brother indeed who has stood by so faithfully during this past conference year. Our worthy assistant has served well in his capacity and his counsel and understanding have been greatly appreciated.

The problems of the district have been many and have caused us to weep and groan throughout the day and night. However, we have not carried these burdens alone, for our Heavenly Father has been there to lift the burdens and grant victory along the way.

(1) The troubled world situation is just as critical and even more so than ever which is hastening the coming of our Lord. In view of this, I believe we ministers and lay delegates of this conference must face reality. WE NEED HELP—HELP that can only come from God. I say this because of the loss of ministers from our ranks. However, we deeply appreciate the help of God in securing the Reverends Gollihue, Poole, Braisted, Adams, and Pease for our ranks. We welcome you brethren with your families to labor with us in one of the neediest mission fields in the states. We are still in need of eight pastors to fill our churches. It appears that at least six must come from off the district. I have already contacted some twenty-five ministers in other districts for our churches.

(2) The lack of finances on the local and district level: Many times this is indicative of the need of revival. Many of our people give very sacrificially of their time and money for the work of the Kingdom. However, there are other people who are \$1.00 and \$2.00 Christians. They give token support and marginal time to the work of the church but drive madly to save themselves with the latest of material gadgets, as some one said, "we spend money we do not have to buy things we do not need to impress people we do not know." God broke into history and entrusted us to the church the stewardship of the Gospel. We have inherited a faith. It is a way of life that provides the answers to a million questions and the supply to a million needs. To get the answer to the people is the church's responsibility that will cost time and money. Is it worth the price?

"Two men were talking in a bus depot. Both men were church members who respected their church. One said, "I love the church but why are they always asking for our money?" The other fellow heartily agreed.

A third man, seated nearby, overheard the conversation. He excused himself for speaking, but said: "I know what you mean about the many demands upon your money. Let me tell you a story."

"My son was a tremendous expense to me. When he was small, there was no end to his necessities. The older he grew, the more he cost. Then I really complained when he went to college."

"Suddenly one day, without warning he became ill with a rare disease. After a year of expensive doctoring HE DIED. He hasn't cost me one cent since." Then he went on to say, "I'm a churchman too. The church, like my son, makes many requests upon my time and my pocketbook. BUT I MUCH PREFER TO HAVE A CHURCH ALIVE AND ASKING, THAN DEAD AND SILENT."

Dear ones, if the Spirit of giving dies, and the doors of the church are bolted, the windows boarded up, AS THEY ARE IN RUSSIA, the church will no longer ask for your money, or your time, or your talent. It won't need them. It will be out of business for both God and man.

The only way we will ever have any more time, energy and money for Kingdom work is to use up what little we now have. "Give and it shall be given unto you" is no idle promise. Save your strength and it will wane. Spare your muscles and they will wither. Withhold your faith and it will die. Protect your people and coddle them into complacency and you have something less than "the Church of the living God." If the Church has narrow concepts and narrower practices it is surely going to undercut its glorious message. People looking on — if they look at all — will think the Church isn't worth much because it doesn't undertake much. Every Church's worth depends upon how much it is engaged in trying to reach and save the souls of men.

(3) For the last two years our church membership and Sunday School attendance hasn't shown a gain. —Again I say we need HELP—HELP that can only come from God. However, I believe God is ready to help us if we will let him!! The word states: If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land. If we will be realistic about our district, I am sure there will be no place for self justification only a humbling before God seeking for His help and guidance.

We need to re-kindle the fires of the spirit within our own souls. How does the fire exist? By burning! How does the Church exist? By a sense of its glorious mission. No barrier was too great for those who had a burning passion to make Christ known. They went everywhere preaching the Gospel." By the help of God the Pittsburgh District can overcome every barrier of defeat. By the strong hand of God and His great prevailing grace the district will work with even a greater sense of urgency because the time is short and souls are too valuable.

The past is gone forever, we cannot call it back nor do we want to if we could. We all have made our own records, we cannot deny this, no one can alter nor change them, they stand as they are. From this point on we must have God's will for our district and proceed with faith and confidence.

For the success of the work of God in our district we must proceed as a conference to do the following this coming year::

1. We must pray and work for a spiritual Revival that will produce individuals who are filled with the spirit of love for God and his work. (We must be brought to the place where we give, work and pray, not because we have to but because we want to.)
2. A greater sense of co-operation from the ministry and each church for a world-wide gospel work at home and abroad.
3. A ministry that is loyal to God and the church where in they labor for Him.

Let us all remember "It is not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts." The challenge to each of us is to be yoked with Christ for His great work. I believe this is the answer to local, district and general indifference.

Franklin — Redecorated the church, the altar changed and platform remodeled and paneled, new wall literature table installed, also many improvements on the parsonage.

McKeesport — Refurnished parsonage bathroom, new "Open Bible" outside bulletin board, new doors for the sanctuary. Total cost of improvements \$1,148.00.

Waynesburg — Remodeled their parsonage.

I have visited our churches 134 times, preached 120 sermons, visited 31 pastors, attended 26 business meetings, eight council meetings, three executive council meetings, one youth conference, three youth zone meetings, two youth council meetings, three district Sunday School Institutes, one district Sunday School committee meeting, attended the Harold Deiter Lecture Series, two board of directors meetings at Allentown, attended the general board and church leaders conference at Indianapolis, attended the general conference as a delegate, promoted six area meetings with the general superintendent, officiated in one wedding, dedicated two churches, and preached in three revivals.

I traveled approximately 22,000 miles in the interest of the work of the district.

3. **Resolved**, That the Educational and Examining Board shall consist of five members, serving in a rotating basis with the term of one member expiring each year and a full term to be a period of five years.
4. **Resolved**, That a minimum of two ministerial gatherings shall be conducted annually in each of the northern and southern areas of the district under the supervision of the District Superintendent.
5. **Resolved**, That a District Ministerial Convention, consisting of three services, shall be held the second Monday of November in a central area of the district.
6. **Resolved**, That a district news media, hereafter known as Pilgrim Messenger, shall be published monthly in mimeographed form, and distributed to the churches by the District Superintendent or his delegate.
7. **Resolved**, That no resolution be entertained from the floor to the conference unless that motion be submitted at the same time, in writing, to the secretary of the conference.

DISTRICT COUNCIL

8. **Resolved**, That the District Council shall constitute the District Board of Trustees.
9. **Resolved**, That a Certified Public Accountant be appointed by the District Council to audit the District Treasurer's records each year before the Annual Conference.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

10. **Resolved**, That the District Superintendent shall appoint all committees.
11. **Resolved**, That no Ordination Service be held at the District Conference unless the Candidate requests Ordination at that time; and further be it.
Resolved, That if possible the Ordination Service be held in one of the District churches with at least (1) one month advance notice to the candidate, the final agreement to be made between the Candidate and the District Superintendent.
12. **Resolved**, That the District Superintendent and/or the District Treasurer or others of the Superintendent's choosing shall visit each local church for the purpose of explaining and promoting the financial program of the district and churches.

DISTRICT TREASURER

13. **Resolved**, That the District Treasurer shall send to each minister and local church treasurer a copy of the Standing Ways and Means resolutions within fifteen days following the district conference.

DISTRICT CAMP

14. **Resolved**, That an annual District Camp Meeting be conducted; and further be it.
Resolved, That the supervision of the Camp be under the direction of the District Council.
15. **Resolved**, That the Camp Committee shall give every consideration to the matter of reducing the camp meeting room and meal rates; and
Resolved, That special attention be given the matter of family rates.

DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

16. **Resolved**, That the District Sunday School Board shall elect from its constituency one who shall serve as District Sunday School Treasurer; and
Resolved, That all local monthly Sunday School remittances shall be forwarded by the local Sunday School treasurer to the District Sunday School Treasurer in a provided envelope.

PASTOR

17. **Resolved**, That each pastor be granted a minimum of two weeks vacation with pay; and further be it.
Resolved, That the pastor select a supply preacher who shall be remunerated by the church.
18. **Resolved**, That the pastor be called by the Promotional Secretary in the event of a delinquent Sunday School attendance report.
Resolved, That no pastor shall be permitted to conduct any kind of special service during the District Camp, Conference, and Ministerial Convention without the consent of the District Council.

LOCAL CHURCH

19. **Resolved**, That each church be encouraged to give an offering to the lay delegate towards his expenses to the District Conference.
20. **Resolved**, That each local church shall enroll and pay the membership calls in the Ministerial Benefit Association for the pastor and his wife.
21. **Resolved**, That in computing the monthly Sunday School report the attendance for for the two Sundays during camp meeting shall be, or shall not be counted at the discretion of the local Sunday School board.
22. **Resolved**, That the membership record system adopted by the 1961 District Conference shall be enlarged to include the listing of affiliate non-members; and
Resolved, That each pastor shall be responsible for having this system in operation by the 1964 conference.

HOME MISSIONS

23. **Resolved**, That we have a Home Missionary Board composed of the District Superintendent as Chairman, the District Treasurer, and three other members elected by the conference.

WAYS AND MEANS STANDING RESOLUTIONS

UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND

1. **Resolved**, There shall be a United Stewardship Fund of \$8.00 per member to be divided as follows: administration 38%, church extension 30%, church extension loan fund 2%, liberal arts college 22%, Sunday Schools and youth 6%, contingent fund 2%.

Resolved, It shall be the responsibility of the pastor and the church board to see that their church raises its portion of the United Stewardship Fund. It shall be raised as one item under the term United Stewardship Fund, and shall be raised monthly. (Section 138, par. 1 and 2).

EASTERN PILGRIM COLLEGE

2. **Resolved**, That each member of the District shall faithfully contribute a minimum of twenty-five (25) cents per month to Eastern Pilgrim College through the local treasurer and district treasurer.

DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION

3. **Resolved**, That each local church shall contribute the equivalent of ten (10) per cent of the pastor's salary monthly to aid in underwriting the district budget; and
Resolved, That this money shall be apportioned by the District Treasurer accordingly: District expense 85%, General Conference sinking fund 7½%, and District Conference Journals 7½%.
4. **Resolved**, That each pastor shall be required to pay ninety (90) per cent of the tithe of his regular wages, both ministerial and secular, to the district through the local treasurer; and
Resolved, That said receipts shall be primarily allocated for salary and travel expense of the District Superintendent.
5. **Resolved**, That all District Ministers not pastoring shall pay 50% of their tithe from secular work through the local church treasurer to the District Treasurer.
6. **Resolved**, That on each scheduled visit of the District Superintendent to the churches the pastor shall receive an offering to help defray the traveling expenses.
7. **Resolved**, That the District Superintendent shall be compensated accordingly: Salary @ \$80.00 per week — \$4,160.00; travel expense at the rate of six (6) cents per mile; enrollment in and payment of membership calls in the Ministerial Benefit Association for both him and his wife; payment of conference portion of Pilgrim Pension Plan; parsonage and utilities supplied; and three weeks paid vacation.
8. **Resolved**, That the following district officers shall be compensated accordingly: Treasurer — \$120.00; Secretary — \$25.00; and Statistician — \$15.00.
9. **Resolved**, That the cost of publishing the Pilgrim Messenger shall be underwritten as prescribed: District Youth — \$5.00, District Sunday School — \$5.00, and the balance of cost from the District Budget.
10. **Resolved**, That the cost of publishing the Conference Journal shall be underwritten from the two following sources: Allocation of 7½% of District Budget, and distribution of Journal, as per ordered by the churches, at 50c per copy.
11. **Resolved**, That all persons engaged in authorized district travel shall be compensated at the rate of six cents per mile; and
Resolved, That any other expense incurred incidental to the district work also be paid.

DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL

12. **Resolved**, That each Sunday School shall contribute each month to the District Sunday School work, payable to the District Sunday School Treasurer, accordingly:

Sunday Schools with average of less than 50* — \$1.00

Sunday Schools with average of 50-75 — \$1.50

Sunday Schools with average over 75 — \$2.00

*Based on previous year's average.

DISTRICT CAMP MEETING

13. **Resolved**, That each church shall contribute a minimum of \$18.00 for the Camp and Conference; and
Resolved, That each minister shall be asked to contribute five dollars annually toward the expense of the District Camp; and
Resolved, That a fee of \$1.00 shall be paid by the ministers for each child six years of age and under being entertained in the dining room, and \$2.00 for each child over six years of age.

DISTRICT TREASURER

14. **Resolved**, That the District Treasurer be authorized to make necessary temporary transfer of funds from any account except the Camp Fund.
15. **Resolved**, That no funds from the Mount Pleasant Real Estate Fund be transferred for financing the District Budget.

DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

16. **Resolved**, That the enrollment in and membership calls of the Ministerial Benefit Association for any district employed home missionary pastor and his wife shall be paid from the Home Missionary Fund.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

To the Fifth Annual Youth Conference of the Pittsburgh District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Greetings:

We thank God, who in His wise providence has permitted us to assemble in this conference and present a report for the year 1962-1963.

The activities for the year began with a very successful Youth Camp conducted at the Cherry Run Camp Ground under the leadership of Rev. Melvin Lockard. A total of 133 youth were in attendance with nearly everyone seeking spiritual help at an altar of prayer.

There were nineteen Zone Rallies conducted on the four zones with an aggregate attendance of approximately three-thousand.

Under the leadership of Reverend's Zerby and Bair, there were five rallies conducted on Zone I with the Twin Rock's church having the most accumulated points of 281. The Warren church came in second with 243 points. (Note: These figures are based on only two rallies for lack of a report on the other three).

Zone II under the leadership of Rev. Wayne Chapman a very good year followed with seven zone rallies and a Labor Day rally. The Emlenton and Rimersburg churches were represented in every rally. The Rimersburg church had the most accumulated points with a total of six hundred and sixty-three points. Franklin came in second with four hundred and fifty-three points. The Franklin church captured the banner twice; New Castle once; Oil City once; Rimersburg three times.

Five rallies were conducted on Zone III under the leadership of Rev. Wilbur Burgess. These rallies were all conducted after Rev. Burgess was appointed as Zone leader in November. The average attendance for each rally was 168. Armbrust; Belle Bridge; Elizabeth; McKeesport and West Newton were represented at all the rallies. Armbrust captured the banner once and the West Newton church the other four times. West Newton had the most accumulated points for a total of 784. Belle Bridge came in second with a total of 451.

This zone paid \$25.71 into the District Youth Treasury along with \$20.00 for the District Office Project.

Under the direction of Rev. Wayne Clark there were 7 rallies and a Zone Youth Weekend meeting conducted on Zone IV. The average attendance for each Rally was 204.

Bentleyville, Donora, Richeyville and Washington were represented in every rally. Richeyville captured the banner twice, and Donora the other 5 times. Donora had the most accumulated points, a total of 1,477. Richeyville came in second with 982 points.

This zone paid \$29.85 into the District Youth Treasury along with \$20.00 for the District Office Project.

We wish to commend each of the churches, pastors and zone leaders for the fine job done on your respective zones. Our sincere congratulations to the following churches, youth presidents and pastors of the following churches for the most accumulated points on your respective zones, thus giving the following standing on the District level:
