CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING:

July 9, 1965

The Twenty-seventh Annual Conference of the Pittsburgh District convened on July 9, 1965 at 10:30 a.m. with Rev. Willis Clock, District Superintendent extending greetings to the ministerial and lay delegates. Rev. Elmer Drury, pastor at Weedville, led the Conference in singing "Amazing Grace". Rev. H. James McClure, pastor at Armbrust, led in prayer.

Dr. Snyder was presented and subsequently read and spoke from the Word of God as recorded in the twelfth chapter of Romans.

Motion prevailed to dispense with the roll call.

The minutes of the third sitting were read and approved.

The District Sunday School Treasurer, Rev. William Lauffer, read the annual report of that office. This report was duly received with appreciation.

Motion carried to extend the time so as to entertain a motion which carried petitioning Rev. Clock to reconsider his statement of withdrawal.

Adjournment by Bro. Snyder leading in prayer.

FIFTH SITTING:

July 10, 1965

The fifth sitting was opened with the singing of "We'll Work 'Til Jesus Comes", at 1:30 p.m. Prayer was offered by Mrs. Barbara Burgess, an ordained deaconess of the District.

Minutes of the fourth sitting were read and approved.

Dr. Snyder reported that Rev. Clock had authorized him to convey to the Conference that inasmuch as the Conference had petitioned him to reconsider, he would comply with the request.

Election of officers was resumed.

There was no election on the fifth ballot for District Superintendent.

Following a time of prayer the sixth ballot was lifted. Rev. Willis Clock was elected.

The Chair ruled that Rev. Newell Reed, who was recently appointed by the Council, to the Examining and Educational Board shall complete the unexpired term of Rev. M. E. Gray.

Nominations for Educational and Examining Board were read by the Secretary. They were: Paul Braisted, G. H. Shull, and J. L. Clark.

No election was effected upon which motion prevailed to limit voting to those two receiving the highest vote on the first ballot.

Motion carried that the election of lay delegates shall be decided by plurality vote.

Elected on the first ballot were Harry Ellison and Roy Humphries.

Inasmuch as two were tied as the third lay delegate, motion carried to cast a ballot to elect from these two. Howard Harrison was elected.

Alternates in order are: Walter Lynch, Joseph Jeffers, Wm. Kunkle.

Motion that the first ballot for the ministerial delegates to the International Conference will be a nominating ballot and that those three receiving the highest vote shall be declared the ministerial delegates, and that the three next highest shall be the alternates.

The Secretary read the names of those ordained ministers in active service.

Elected as ministerial delegates were H. J. McClure and J. L. Clark.

Inasmuch as the ballot was inconclusive for the election of the third delegate, motion prevailed to vote for the next four highest.

Rev. Willis Clock addressed the Conference at this point, and indicated that he would accept the call of the Conference to serve as District Superintendent.

The tellers reported that Andrew Slozat was elected as the third ministerial delegate to the International Conference. The three alternates elected in order are Elmer Drury, Jack Pease, Lindy Adams.

The ballot was cast for election of Assistant District Superintendent. The Rev. H. J. McClure was elected.

The resolution calling for the transfer of the Mt. Pleasant Real Estate Fund to the Ministerial Scholarship Fund was presented.

Pleasant Real Estate Fund shall be channeled into the Ministerial Scholarship Fund, and further that this matter of transfer of the Mount Pleasant Real Estate Fund to the Ministerial Scholarship Fund be placed in the hands of the Council for consideration and later presentation.

Motion prevailed authorizing the use of either of the titles "Home Missions" or "Church Extension" in the promotion of that work.

Nominations for District Secretary were read. They were William Schaffner, J. L. Clark. Rev. J. L. Clark was elected.

Motion prevailed that the District Secretary send a letter of thanks to Melvin Lehman for his part in securing paper for the District.

Motion prevailed extending the time of the sitting until completion or five o'clock.

The nominations for District Treasurer were read. They were Paul Braisted and Newell Reed. Paul Braisted was elected.

Motion prevailed authorizing the Council to take care of any unfinished business and approving of the minutes of the last sitting.

The tellers reported on the balloting for advisory members of the Council. Elected was Andrew Slozat.

Motion carried limiting voting on those four receiving the highest number of votes on the previous ballot.

Elected to the Council were Wilbur Burgess and William Schaffner.

The Resolutions Committee presented its resolution of courtesy. This was adopted by a standing vote.

Dr. Snyder acknowledged the resolution, extended his appreciation for each of the delegates and their faithfulness.

Adjournment with prayer by Dr. Snyder.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our much appreciated General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, co-ministers and faithful lay delegates of this twenty-seventh Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, held this 9th day of July 1965, at the Cherry Run Camp Ground, Rimersburg, Pa.

GREETINGS:

Mr. John Newton, author of 'Amazing Grace', expresses our deepest heart felt feeling in these words, "Thro' many dangers, toils and snares, I have already come: 'Tis grace hath bro't me safe this far, and grace will lead me home." It is with deep appreciation unto God for His wonderful grace that has saved and kept us these many years and has brought us to this present moment. It has been a pleasure to be your servant in the capacity of district superintendent for nearly six years. We have had our battles, many of them, but we have also had our many victories, to Him be the glory. I feel some of the victories of this past year are reflected in the following: For the first time in many years the district has become financially solvent. Because of the faithfulness of the good Pilgrims in their giving we have closed the conference year in the black. To God be the glory!

Many of our churches have experienced revivals this past year. One church in particular is the Franklin church where the Rev. and Mrs. Slozat are the fine pastors. There have been many converted with a number of them joining the church. The morale of the district is the best I have known since I have been your district superintendent. The caliber of the ministers working on the district is commendable which will result in many more victories both spiritually and numerically. It is noteworthy to consider the extensive building program on the district the past six years: new parsonage at Donora, educational unit at McKeesport, basement church at Andover and the new church at Weedville (none better or nicer in our connection). At present the new church at Bellebridge and the new church being constructed at Clinton; and the new churches to be constructed in the near future at Washington and Armbrust. Also the assets have been greatly increased with our new district office and parsonage. The Pittsburgh district is looking up and I feel that with God's help we are willing to walk with Him and make the adjustments necessary to win the lost to the Lord.

APPRECIATION

I appreciate the wonderful team we have had the privilege of working with this past year. The Rev. H. James McClure has been very faithful in assisting with wise counsel and helping whenever I have called upon him. The Rev. J. L. Clark has been most helpful in many ways, his dedication to God and his work is very commendable. With sincere appreciation we thank the Rev. Dale Bair for his faithfulness as district treasurer prior to his illness last fall. We found the treasurer's books and account in good order. The Rev. P. W. Braisted took over the district treasurer's work with great efficiency and has done a very com-

mendable job. The Rev. Mrs. Annie Carlson is to be commended for her excellent work as Sunday School Promotional Secretary. And the Rev. W. E. Burgess has worked very faithfully and untiring for the district youth program. It has been a pleasure to work with the district council, youth council and each of the district committees this past year.

NEW PASTORS

God has favored the Pittsburgh District in the past by giving to us some very good ministers who have pastored our churches very well. This year isn't without exception, therefore we welcome the Rev. and Mrs. Elmer Drury who are pastoring the Weedville church. Their vision and faith and the cooperation of the members of the church has resulted in an increase of 25% in practically every department of the church during the past year. Also we welcome to our district the new pastor of the McKeesport church, the Rev. and Mrs. Mark Waddel and family. They will be moving to their new field of labor next week.

DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION

The district church extension committee has worked very faithfully to carry out the legislation of our last conference. However, we were not able to start a new church because of many hindering circumstances. It would not have been right to start a new church just for the sake of starting a new church. I feel we have laid a good foundation that is giving us direction as to where to begin the new endeavor. An extensive survey has been completed of 12 large cities in our area. The committee prepared and printed a very nice district church extension brochure which was given to the proper authorities of these cities. New penny-a-meal calendar banks have been prepared and printed which has been well received in most of our churches. It is the thought of the committee that when a new church is launched that information could be printed on the penny-a-meal banks that would keep our people informed and result in better giving. Much prayer, work and time must be given to the starting of a new church. The committee must have the leadership of the Spirit, who alone gives assurance that a new church can be started successfully in the area chosen. Many factors must be considered because of the cost of such an endeavor. A new church will be started as soon as possible. We must continue to pray and work to this end, because we are responsible for many hundreds of souls in the geographical area of our district.

SHORTAGE OF MINISTERS

In the June 8th issue of the Wall Street Journal an article appeared on the front page stating that there were 69,000 churches in the United States without a full time minister. This is the equivalent of 69 denominations the size of the Pilgrim Holiness Church without full time pastors. The astounding fact of the shortage of ministers truly reflects the spiritual condition of our country. And our beloved denomination isn't without exception when it comes to the shortage of ministers. Only twice in six years have all of our churches on the Pittsburgh district been without supply ministers and this only lasted 30 days each time. It appears that the only answer to the shortage of pastors is to put two or more

churches on a circuit. I feel that it would be better to have a qualified minister pastoring two or three churches than an unqualified minister pastoring one church. This philosophy is without contradiction because a church is no stronger than its pastor. The Richeyville church has been placed on a circuit with the Bentleyville church by mutual agreement. The Rev. Miller desired not to pastor this year because of his health, and Rev. Pease, because of financial necessity, would have to be engaged in secular labor. By combining these two churches on a circuit, the Rev. Pease is able to give full time to the ministry. Because of the shortage of ministers other churches may have to follow this same plan.

CYC PROGRAM

The Armbrust and Clinton churches have pioneered the CYC program in our district. The Clinton church had 21 children and the Armbrust church had 62 children enrolled in their CYC programs this year. One half of the population of the United States will be less than 26 years of age by 1970. In view of this prediction and the realization that most fruitful age for gospel work is among our children, we need to implement the CYC program in every one of our churches. I am convinced that this program will do more to build the kingdom than many of our people realize. I suggest that you talk to the Revs. Braisted and McClure for their evaluation of this program.

SALE OF CHURCHES

The Homestead Park and the Pittsburgh churches have been sold. This isn't to be considered a backward step but a forward step facing up to reality. The assets of these two churches will be used in the starting of a new church.

RECOMMENDATIONS

That this conference do everything possible to help our ministers to be better equipped both spiritually and materially to do a better job this coming year. That each church give special attention to their United Stewardship Fund. I recommend that every church do their best to pay in full the \$8.00 per member per year and that no church pay less than \$5.00 per member this conference year. For better organization and coordination of our district program we recommend that you adopt the Christian Education Council Program that will be presented by the Resolutions Committee.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS

The Armbrust church continues to go forward under the capable leadership of the Rev. H. J. McClure. The church purchased a 19.5 acre plot of ground for their new church and they have been very successful in a fund raising campaign in the amount of over \$32,000.00.

The Bellebridge church has come through the storms of adversities since their church was destroyed by a tornado. After worshiping for the last two years in the township school house, fire hall and parsonage, they are now enjoying their new church. The Rev. and Mrs. W. E. Burgess are to be commended for

their faithfulness as good shepherds of this congregation.

The Clinton church is now in the process of constructing their new building. For many years the church has been hindered for the lack of adequate facilities. Now, a new day has arrived for the fine Pilgrims of our Clinton church. The Rev. Braisted is giving excellent leadership to this building program. His love and labors for the kingdom are very commendable.

The Donora church has redecorated their building and installed a new hot air heating system with an electronic air filter. The rev. Schaffner is doing a find job leading the Donora Pilgrims to greater victories in kingdom building.

The DuBois church auditorium has been redecoṛated and an outside bulletin board erected. The Rev. Mrs. Carlson and her husband continue to faithfully labor in this ripened harvest field.

The Josephine parsonage has been greatly improved with repairs and painting. The Rev. Houseman has labored faithfully in this needy field.

The Linesville church has added a room on the back of their church building. The Rev. Thompson is to be commended for driving over 100 miles each Sunday to pastor this church. He and his wife have been faithful laborers in this field.

The Titusville church has a new roof on their church building. The Rev. Mrs. Shull is faithfully laboring in this needy field.

The Twin Rocks church is enjoying beautiful new carpeting. The Rev. and Mrs. Gehman are leading their people on to greater victories.

Washington Church - The Rev. Lindy Adams, with strength and courage from the Lord, is leading the Washington church out of a building dilemma that has existed for years. A new day is dawning for kingdom building for these fine people. A new lot consisting of 1.7 acres of ground has been purchased in a very good location and construction of the new building is expected to begin in a very few weeks.

The Weedville church has completed and dedicated their new church building. The Rev. and Mrs. Elmer Drury have accepted the great challenge of this needy community and their labors have resulted in many victories.

The Waynesburg congregation under the direction of Rev. and Mrs. Hildreth. redecoṛated the sanctuary, installed other pews and a new gas furnace.

PERSONAL REPORT

I have visited our churches 100 times, preached 78 sermons, visited our pastors 107 times, conducted 27 annual meetings. 8 district council meetings conducted one youth conference, 2 district Pelt and CYC meetings, attended the Harold Dieter Lectures Series, 2 Eastern Pilgrim College Board meetings, attended the General Board and Church Leaders Conference at Indianapolis, one youth

convention, one youth camp, one ministerial meeting, attended the EPC day program, made 22 business calls, 20 or more calls on laymen while supplying churches without pastors, conducted a very extensive church extension survey of 12 large cities on our district, attended the district superintendent's meeting at Mt. Vernon with General Superintendent Snyder, gave considerable time to the EPC scholarship program with the other District Superintendents of the Eastern Area of our church. Attended the Eastern Area General Sunday School and Youth meeting at Harrisburg. Held two ground breaking services at Bellebridge and Clinton, assisted in one church dedication, assisted in one funeral, conducted a mortgage burning service at New Castle, and dedicated two babies.

I prepared a packet of useful material and gave to all our pastors at our district ministerial meeting which included material from the American Management Association. I also prepared and printed a useful record keeping and promotional calendar for all our ministers for the 1965 calendar year. This material was provided without cost to our district. I have edited and printed 9 issues of the Pilgrim Messenger at the average cost of \$17.21 per issue including postage and mailing. I traveled approximately 25,000 miles in the interest of the church.

Mrs. Clock and I wish to express our appreciation for the comfortable home you have provided for us, and the many enjoyable meetings we have had together during our district travels. It has been a real pleasure to serve you and to labor with the fine council you have elected. Our real purpose is to serve the One who died for us, and has called us into His service.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

DISTRICT CONFERENCE

1. RESOLVED, That the fiscal year of the District shall run from June first to May thirty-first.
2. RESOLVED, That all annual reports shall be sent to the District Statistician postmarked no later than June 20.
3. RESOLVED, That the Educational and Examining Board shall consist of 3 members, serving in a rotating basis with the term of one member expiring each year and a full term to be a period of 3 years.
4. RESOLVED, That a minimum of one ministerial gathering shall be conducted annually in each of the northern and southern areas of the district under the supervision of the District Superintendent.
5. RESOLVED, That a district ministerial convention be held the first Monday and Tuesday of November and that the said convention shall consist of five services, concluding with the afternoon service on Tuesday. The convention shall begin with a communion service at 11 a.m. on Monday, and further the emphasis of the convention shall be the spiritual life of the minister; and be it further
RESOLVED, That papers shall be assigned by the District Council for reading and discussion at said ministerial convention.
6. RESOLVED, That a district news media, hereafter known as Pilgrim Messenger, shall be published monthly (except July and August) and distributed to the churches by the District Superintendent or his delegate.
7. RESOLVED, That no resolution be entertained from the floor to the conference unless that motion be submitted at the same time in writing to the secretary of the conference.

DISTRICT COUNCIL

8. RESOLVED, That the District Council shall constitute the District Board of Trustees.
9. RESOLVED, That a Certified Public Accountant be engaged by the District Council to audit the District Treasurer's records each year before the Annual Conference, and
RESOLVED, That the District Auditing Committee be eliminated.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

10. RESOLVED, That all committees appointed by the District Superintendent shall be approved by the District Council before said committee may act; and
RESOLVED, That the District Secretary shall notify the committee members of their appointment.

11. RESOLVED, That no Ordination Service be held at the District Conference unless the Candidate requests Ordination at that time; and further be it RESOLVED, That if possible the Ordination Service be held in one of the District churches with at least (1) one month advance notice to the candidate and the District Superintendent.

DISTRICT TREASURER

12. RESOLVED, That the District Treasurer shall send to each minister and local church treasurer a copy of the Standing Ways and Means resolutions within fifteen days following the district conference.

DISTRICT CAMP

13. RESOLVED, That an annual District Camp Meeting be conducted; and further be it
RESOLVED, That the supervision of the camp be under the direction of the District Council.
14. RESOLVED, That no concession be opened during service, nor until the close of the altar invitation.
15. RESOLVED, That the District Council shall determine the program for the District Camp; and
RESOLVED, That the District Council shall give particular consideration for healing and ring services.

DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

16. RESOLVED, That the District Sunday School Board shall elect from its constituency one who shall serve as District Sunday School Treasurer; and
RESOLVED, That all local monthly Sunday School remittances shall be forwarded by the local Sunday School treasurer to the District Sunday School Treasurer in a provided envelope.

PASTOR

17. RESOLVED, That each pastor be granted a minimum of three weeks vacation with pay after the first year. Two weeks with pay shall be granted the first year; and
RESOLVED, That the pastor select a supply preacher who shall be remunerated by the church.
18. RESOLVED, That the pastor shall be called by the Promotional Secretary in the event of a delinquent Sunday School attendance report, and said charges shall be reversed.
19. RESOLVED, That no pastor shall be permitted to conduct any kind of special service during the District Camp, Conference, and Ministerial Convention without the consent of the District Council.

LOCAL CHURCH

20. RESOLVED, That each church be encouraged to give an offering to the lay delegate towards his expenses to the District Conference.
21. RESOLVED, That each local church shall enroll and pay the membership calls in the Ministerial Benefit Association for the pastor and his wife.
22. RESOLVED, That whereas most of our lay members have provided for them Hospital, Medical and Surgical benefits by their employer; and WHEREAS, the majority of our pastors are on a sub-standard salary, RESOLVED, That each local church shall be encouraged to assume the cost of the quarterly premium of Hospital, Medical and Surgical benefits for the pastor and his family.

CHURCH EXTENSION

23. RESOLVED, That the Executive members of the District Council shall constitute the District Church Extension Board; and
RESOLVED, That the committee have the following authority:
1. The selection of workers.
 2. The general location to start the new churches.
 3. Type of buildings to be used.
 4. The raising and spending of funds; and
- RESOLVED, That the District Church Extension Worker requirements be as follows:
1. Written contract between the committee and the worker.
 2. Monthly reports from the worker to the committee.
 3. Full time ministry with the responsibility for the worker's salary to be gradually assumed by the new work with a diminishing responsibility on the part of the committee; and
- RESOLVED, That the matter of raising funds for any Church Extension project shall be the responsibility of the Church Extension Committee subject to the approval of the District Council.
24. RESOLVED, That the District Church Extension Board shall annually provide Penny-a-Meal Calendars for distribution to local churches for the purpose of implementing the District Church Extension Project.

26. RESOLVED, That we express our appreciation by a rising vote of thanks to our General Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, who so ably presided over our conference; to our beloved District Superintendent, Rev. Willis Clock; to our dining room staff, to the lunch room staff, and to all others who have labored for our comfort and the success of this 1965 District Conference.

WAYS AND MEANS STANDING RESOLUTIONS

UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND

1. RESOLVED, There shall be a United Stewardship Fund of \$8.00 per member to be divided as follows: Administration 38%, church extension 30%, church extension load fund 2%, liberal arts college 22%, Sunday schools and youth 6%, contingent fund 2%.

RESOLVED, It shall be the responsibility of the pastor and the church board to see that their church raises its portion of the United Stewardship Fund. It shall be raised as one item under the term United Stewardship Fund, and shall be raised monthly. (Section 138, par. 1 and 2).

EASTERN PILGRIM COLLEGE

2. RESOLVED, That each member of the District shall faithfully contribute a minimum of twenty-five (25) cents per month to Eastern Pilgrim College through the local treasurer and district treasurer.

DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION

3. RESOLVED, That each local church shall contribute the equivalent of ten (10) per cent of the pastor's salary monthly to aid in underwriting the district budget; and
RESOLVED, That this money shall be apportioned by the District Treasurer accordingly: District expense 85%, General Conference sinking fund 10% and District Conference Journals 5%.
4. RESOLVED, That each pastor shall be required to pay ninety (90) per cent of the tithe of his regular wages, both ministerial and secular, to the district through the local treasurer; and
RESOLVED, That said receipts shall be primarily allocated for salary and travel expense of the District Superintendent.
5. RESOLVED, That all District ministers not pastoring shall pay 50% of their tithe from secular work through the local church treasurer to the District Treasurer.
6. RESOLVED, That on each of two regularly scheduled visits (the annual meeting and one other) of the District Superintendent or his designate, those churches with a membership of twenty-five or more shall remit to the District the sum of \$7.50, and that those churches with a membership of less than twenty-five shall remit the sum of \$5.00
7. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent shall be compensated accordingly: Salary @ \$80.00 per week -- \$4,160.00; travel expense at the rate of six (6) cents per mile; enrollment in and payment of membership calls in the Ministerial Benefit Association for both him and his wife; payment of conference portion of Pilgrim Pension Plan; parsonage and utilities supplies; three weeks paid vacation; and payment of quarterly premium for family hospital, and medical-surgical insurance.

8. RESOLVED, That the following district officers shall be compensated accordingly: Treasurer - \$240.00; Secretary - \$25.00; and Statistician - \$15.00.
9. RESOLVED, That the cost of publishing the Pilgrim Messenger shall be underwritten as prescribed: District Youth - \$6.50 a month, District Sunday School - \$6.50 a month, and the balance of cost from the District Budget.
10. RESOLVED, That the cost of publishing the Conference Journal shall be underwritten from the two following sources: Allocation of 5% of District Budget, and distribution of Journal, as per ordered by the churches, at 50¢ per copy.
11. RESOLVED, That all persons engaged in authorized district travel shall be compensated at the rate of six cents per mile; and
RESOLVED, That any other expense incurred incidental to the district work also be paid.
12. RESOLVED, That the receipts derived from the Penny-a-Meal banks shall be distributed accordingly: 75% to the District Church Extension Fund, and 25% to the Ministerial Scholarship Fund.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

To our conference speaker, Rev. O. D. Emery, Rev. Willis Clock, District Superintendent, Ministerial brethren, delegates and friends of this Seventh Annual Youth Conference.

Greetings:

I bring you this my second annual report of my work as your District Youth President.

Of course, there are the local presidents and pastors across the district. Without them we could do nothing. A million thanks to all of you and may the Lord richly bless your hearts.

It seems to me that it's only fitting and proper that I should express a word of thanks to my church for the wonderful spirit of cooperation. They have stood behind me and encouraged me and have prayed for me, and their support is appreciated. Last, but not least, my wife has always been my constructive critic and dependable helper. I am grateful to her today also.

Our district youth project for the year was \$25.00 from each zone. Two have paid in full and two have paid in part. This money was to be used to help purchase the district typewriter.

The year began with our district youth camp held at Cherry Run Camp, and since then we have seen a very busy year.

My personal report:

God is calling our young people, let us encourage them, pray for them, and boost them in every possible way. May our borders be enlarged with the spirit of evangelism.

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MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

Because of the lack of Biblical evangelism, such as lay visitation, personal evangelism, and personal soul-winning coordinated with revivals and mass evangelism among our constituency, and whereas this has limited the effectiveness of our revivals and outreach to the world, and whereas the other departments of our church are limited in their field of labor; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, That the International Conference establish a Department of Evangelism and elect a General Secretary of the same to organize and implement the program under the supervision of the General Board and the Executive Council. The Secretary of this Department shall be a member of the Executive Council and the General Board. The salary and maintenance of this department shall be fixed by the General Board.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Ministerial Scholarship Program of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be submitted in its entirety to the 1966 International Conference for adoption.

In view of the fact that many young people of our local churches are engaged in formal education until age 18 or older, and thus are not wage earners; furthermore child labor laws in many states forbid employment of children under age 16, and thus are not wage earners; the provision of section 138 paragraph 8 of the Manual relating to non-assessable members under age 14 are no longer realistic and applicable to the present situation of the church.

BE IT RESOLVED, That section 138 paragraph 8 be amended to read: All members under the age of 18 years, probationers and junior members shall be listed as non-assessable members.

Inasmuch as there is much misunderstanding as to the meaning of section 62 of the Manual,

BE IT RESOLVED, That section 62 shall be deleted from the Manual.

BE IT RESOLVED, That it shall be the responsibility of the Executive Council of the General Board to supply the names of two or more persons on the district and two or more persons from off the district as nominees for the office of district superintendent and that the incumbent shall be one of those persons nominated.
