STANDING RULES

1. We recommend that the Ways and Means Resolutions and Statistical Committees be appointed by the District Superintendent at the conference for the following year. Be it further resolved that any material may be presented to said committees during the year.

2. That the pastors verify the reports of their respective churches before sending them to the District Conference.

3. That all buildings such as churches, parsonages, or extensive improvements, be approved by the District Superintendent before construction.

4. That no church of our district shall call a pastor, evangelist, representative of foreign missions or other church institutions without first consulting the District Superintendent.

5. That the Conference year close on May 31 and that all the reports be in the hands of the District Secretary by June 10, and that all District monies be sent in to the District Treasurer by the same date.

6. That we go on record as being opposed to our children having to dress, dance or do other things in the physical education department of the public schools in violation of our religious convictions and our church standards.

7. Owing to the soon coming of Jesus and the great spiritual need of the world, be it resolved that each pastor be privileged to hold two revival meetings of two weeks duration each year with regular support paid, subject to the approval of the District Superintendent.

8. Be it resolved that we have a Foreign Missionary Convention in the fall, time to be set by the District Council.

9. That the District Treasurer give an itemized account to the District Conference of where all the Home Missionary money was spent.

10. That all members pay their tithes into the church in which they retain their memberships, according to Section 68 in the Manual.

11. That the District secure and maintain all the books in the different courses of study as prescribed by the Manual in sufficient number to accommodate, if necessary, any candidate taking any one of the courses. That the Educational Committee formulate rules for the loaning of such books, determine the number to be secured, and select custodian, subject to the approval of the District Council.

12. That the conference bar shall include the first seven rows of seats in the center and south sections and the platform.

13. Be it resolved that the time for Conference sittings be fixed as follows: 8:00-11:45 a. m., 1:45-5:00 p. m. and 6:30-9:00 p.m.

14. That the District Superintendent shall appoint all committees and fill all vacancies.

15. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be granted a two weeks' vacation with pay.

16. We recommend that each pastor be granted a two weeks' vacation with pay.

17. Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, the girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing the immodest forms of dress so current today; such as sun suits, shorts, anklets and no stockings, dresses of immodest length, slacks, or similar garments. Men and boys of the church should not appear in public in shorts or without shirts. And further, parents are strongly urged to dress their children in accordance with this standard. (Manual, page 49, section 65.)

18. Be it resolved, that District Minister's license shall not be granted to any person who does not have a definite call to, or who does not plan to enter the active ministry.

Be it further resolved, That no licentiate be advanced in ministerial standing unless actively engaged in the ministry.

19. Be it resolved that each pastor report all seekers in the church of which he has the oversight.

20. Be it resolved that semi-annual zone Sunday School conventions be held for the purpose of encouraging the work of the Sunday School, such conventions to be arranged for, and supervised by the chairman of the District Sunday School Board if possible, or by some other member of the District Sunday School Board.

21. Whereas there is considerable work clearing the camp ground and storing equipment, Be it resolved that each member of the conference remain one day after conference to assist the District Superintendent in doing the work.

22. We recommend that our laity be given recognition along with our ministry in the list of memorials.

23. Owing to the soon coming of Jesus and the great spiritual need of the world, Be it resolved that our District Superintendent be privileged to hold two revival meetings during the year outside of the district with regular support.

24. Whereas in accordance with the Manual, Page 109, Section 149,

Paragraph I, "All licensed ministers failing to complete and report on at least two subjects a year in their required course of study for two consecutive years, will automatically forfeit their licenses . . ." and

Whereas some of our licensed ministers have failed to comply with the above provisions.

Be it therefore resolved that we ask each member of the Educational Board to be responsible for contacting each licentiate under his jurisdiction, urging him to follow the prescribed course of study as outlined in the Manual, before the beginning of next conference.

Be it further resolved that we urge each licentiate to co-operate with the Educational Board in the above matter.

25. Whereas the Colorado Springs Bible College is now offering a Preacher's Seminar, and Whereas the work given in the Seminar is much more thorough and exhaustive than our regularly prescribed study course.

Be it resolved that our district give one-half year's credit to each licentiate for each such Seminar successfully completed.

Be it further resolved that our District Educational Board be authorized to determine which books of study course need not to be studied or read in lieu of the completion of the above Seminar work.

26. Resolved that each pastor let the District Secretary know how many copies of the Minutes his church will need.

27. Be it resolved that a printed statement be given each person registering at the Pikes Peak Holiness Camp showing the registration requirements.

28. Resolved that the District rent a safety box in some bank, or purchase a suitable safe and that all abstracts and other legal papers of the Church be placed in the same.

Be it further resolved that if any Church does not wish to send its legal papers to the headquarters that the same be placed in a safe box in some local bank or other suitable place, and that a record be sent to the District Superintendent that can be filed in the District box.

29. Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc. to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches, under such conditions as require active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

30. Whereas the District Conference desires the continuation of the "Rocky Mountain Pilgrim", Be it resolved that the District Council appoint an Editor for the publishing of at least 10 issues a year.

31. Be it resolved that in case of the death of a minister or a member of the family, that the District Superintendent be responsible for notifying the pastors of the District, and the Conference to stand expense of same.

32. Whereas many times there are close friends and relatives of licensed ministers who want to attend the ordination service, but are unable to do so because necessary announcement has not been made, be it resolved that the ordination service be announced prior to conference.

33. Whereas the majority of television programs are a definite hinderance to the spirituality of our people, bringing evil influence into the home: Be it resolved we go on record as opposing television. Furthermore be it resolved that no Pilgrim Holiness Church pastor of the Rocky Mountain District have television in his or her home.

Standing Recommendations of Ways and Means Committee

1. We recommend that the District Superintendent be given a salary of \$250.00 per month with district parsonage and utilities, together with six (6) cents per mile for traveling expense while driving his own car, and actual traveling expense while traveling otherwise.

We further recommend, that whereas, the mileage incurred by the District Superintendent in the work of the District is that beyond the average driven, thus making mechanical repair and trade-in more often than the recommended time of driving a car: We therefor recommend that the District Treasurer be instructed to set aside each year the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00), the same to be applied as a supplement to the depreciation and trade-in of the District Superintendent's car.

2. Be it resolved that if the District Superintendent prefers not to live in the district parsonage, the rent from same be returned to the district treasurer.

3. We recommend that the assistant District Superintendent, or any member of the Council acting in the District Superintendent's place receive \$5.00 per day, plus (4) cents per mile traveling expense while driving his own car, and actual traveling expense while traveling otherwise.

4. Be it resolved that the District pastors and unstationed ministers not participating in the Pension Plan pay three fourths of their ministerial tithe into the district treasury to be applied on District administrative expense and the remainder to be paid into the treasury of the local church to which they belong.

Be it further resolved that all District evangelists, teachers and other unstationed ministers, participating in the Pension Plan, pay their entire tithe into the District treasury. On the basis of the tithe paid to the District, the District treasurer shall pay the 4% as required by the Pension Plan.

5. That each local church furnish its parsonage with at least a cook stove, a heater, a kitchen cabinet, six chairs, a dining room table and a dresser.

6. We recommend that the annual remuneration of the District Secretary and the District Treasurer be \$100. and \$250., respectively. Be it further resolved that District Statisticians and the District Sunday School Secretary each be given \$15. per year from their respective department.

7. We recommend that all attending the Pikes Peak Holiness Camp Meeting be properly registered. Each registrant twelve years of age and above, except active ministers and their families, will be required to pay a fee of \$2.00. Furthermore, all registering will be expected to work at least 30 minutes per day when called upon.

8. We recommend that the local church pay the expenses of its delegates to and from the District Conference.

9. We recommend that each church pay their pastor's offerings or salary during Camp and Conference.

10. We recommend each Sunday school pay 10¢ per enrolled Sunday School member per year for the promotion of District Sunday School work.

11. We recommend that each church send to the District Treasurer each month an amount equivalent to ten per cent of all offerings taken for regular expense to cover the following items of our District and General Budgets, namely: General administration, General Church Extension Loan Fund, Senior College, General Sunday School and Youth Work, General Conference expense, District Home Missions, and District administrations.

12. We recommend that the Foreign Missionary and Bible School budgets be raised separately and that the minimum amount be in accord with the General Church recommendation of \$2.10 per member for Foreign Missions, and one cent a day per member for Bible School to be raised in any way the local church may desire.

13. We recommend that the district treasurer set aside amount equal to 35% of the general budget, from the unspecified missionary funds, the same to be included in the general budget.

We further recommend the district treasurer set aside the amount equal to 20% from unspecified General Church Extension funds, the same to be included in the general budget.

14. Be it resolved that the members of the District Sunday School and Young People's Boards be given five (5) cents per mile for traveling expense to be paid from the funds of their respective boards.

15. We recommend that each Church take up a free will offering to help defray the expenses of the Ministerial meeting in March.

16. Be it resolved that a fee of one dollar each be made for the use of the District study books and that a fee of 50¢ each made for the use of District Reading Books.

Pension Plan

Whereas the General Church has adopted and recommended the Pilgrim Pension Plan as a sound method of providing retirement benefits for aged Pilgrim ministers, and Whereas the Rocky Mountain Conference has declared its endorsement of the plan, and Whereas

action taken at the last General Conference makes it mandatory for each local church to participate in the plan, we therefore recommend that every church, no less often than once each quarter, send to the District Treasurer an amount equivalent to four per cent of the pastor's salary as the conference contribution to the Pension Plan.

THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL DISTRICT CONFERENCE

First Sitting July 1, 1957, 8:00 a.m.

The thirty-sixth annual assembly of the Rocky Mountain Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was called to order by District Superintendent L. E. Schendel at 8:00 a.m. July 1, 1957.

Rev. Hubert Hughes led the Conference in singing "Love Devine."

District Superintendent L. E. Schendel called the Conference to prayer. W. R. Cole led in prayer.

Rev. L. E. Schendel introduced Rev. R. G. Flexon, General Secretary of Foreign Missions, who took over the chair.

Rev. Flexon brought an inspiring message on spiritual forward movement based on the text Acts 2:1. "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come they were all with one accord in one place." The one necessity is the baptism with the Holy Ghost. We must go forward in a spiritual deepening in God. We must have preachers of Holiness who are holy men. The call of God must take priority over everything else.

The secretary called the roll.

The following were presented by the reception committee: Paul Hires, John Doll, Mrs. Helen Doll, Bob Sander, and C. E. Wert.

Moved and seconded to receive the following into the Conference: Wm. Reading, Mrs. Wm. Reading, C. E. Wert, Bob Sander, John Doll, Mrs. Helen Doll, and Paul C. Hires. Carried.

The District Superintendent L. E. Schendel gave his report. The report was received with a rising vote of appreciation.

The auditors report was given and heartily received.

District Treasurer F. L. Freed gave a well prepared report. The report was well received.

The joint report of the Educational and Examining committees was read and received. (see Licensed Ministers Directory).

The statistical report was read and gratefully received.

The committee on Ways and Means reported.

Recommendation No. 1. — Whereas, General Conference Expenses will amount to more than the 3% taken from the District Budget each year. We recommend that each church send in the amount equal to 50¢ per member to the District Treasurer.

We further recommend that this General Conference monies be sent in by the 1st of May, 1958.

Recommendation No. 2. — Be it resolved that the District pastors pay three fourths of their ministerial tithe into the District Treasury to be applied on District administrative expense and the remainder to be paid into the treasury of the local church to which they belong.

Be it further resolved that all District evangelists, teachers and other unstationed ministers, participating in the Pension Plan, pay their entire tithe into the District Treasury. On the basis of the tithe paid to the District, the District Treasury shall pay the 4% as required by the Pension Plan. (This resolution to be substituted for Standing Recommendation of Ways and Means No. 4).

The following visitors were introduced: Rev. and Mrs. Dick Close and Rev. Granville Carroll. Each gave a personal testimony of God's grace. Motion prevailed to give them an honorary seat in the conference bar.

Motion prevailed to recess for thirty minutes.

Further report of Ways and Means Committee.

Recommendation No. 3 lost.

Resolutions Committee report. Motion prevailed to adopt the following:

Resolution No. 1. - Whereas the District Conference desires the continuation of the Rocky Mountain Pilgrim:-Be it resolved that the District Council appoint an Editor for the publishing of at least 10 issues a year.

Resolution No. 2. - Whereas the majority of television programs are a definite hinderance to the spirituality of our people, bringing evil influence into the home:-Be it resolved we go on record as opposing television. Furthermore be it resolved that no Pilgrim Holiness Church pastor of the Rocky Mountain District have television in his or her home.

The Committee on Memorials to General Conference gave a report.

Memorials No. 1, No. 2, No. 3, lost. Motion prevailed to accept the following:

Memorial No. 4. - The Polity Committee shall be composed of 25 persons, 5 persons being elected by the delegates from each of the 5 zones of the church.

Motion prevailed that the Ordination service be held at 1:45 p.m. with E. A. Glendenning, George Lingo and Don Speicher as candidates.

Motion prevailed that the District Superintendent appoint tellers. The following were appointed: Paul Gafford at the board, W. J. Brown

and Dale Rummel to read, Duane Knierim, and Bob Sander to pass out ballots.

The chairman called the conference to prayer. Rev. E. G. Flexon led in prayer.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent. L. E. Schendel was elected.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent. R. W. Wooten was elected.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary. W. R. Cole was elected.

Ballots were cast for District Treasurer. F. L. Freed was elected.

Recess by expiration of time.

Afternoon Sitting

The chair called the Conference to order. A very impressive Ordination service was held with Bro. Flexon in charge, George Lingo, E. A. Glendenning and Don Speicher receiving the charge.

Minutes of previous sitting were read and approved.

Motion prevailed to dispense with calling of roll.

Ballots were cast for additional members of the council. R. L. Gilbert, D. E. Moller, and W. J. Brown were elected on the first ballot.

Ballots were cast for examining board. R. W. Wooten elected.

Ballots were cast for educational board. C. E. Wert was elected.

Rev. Roy Nible was presented to the conference. He gave his personal testimony. Motion prevailed to give Rev. Nible an honorary seat in the bar.

Ballots were cast for Bible College board. W. R. Cole was elected. on the first ballot. A second ballot was cast. Duane Knierim was elected.

The following were ratified as Sunday School Board: R. L. Gilbert, Promotional Secretary, D. E. Moller, Treasurer, Duane Knierim, C. C. Darr, additional members.

Motion prevailed that the 8 receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected delegates to General Conference, and four next highest shall be alternates.

Motion withdrawn by permission of the conference.

Motion prevailed to recess for 10 minutes to give the Council time to nominate ministerial delegates to the General Conference.

The chair called the conference to order.

Ballots were cast for ministerial delegates to General Conference.

Motion prevailed to proceed with business while the vote is counted.

Further report from Resolutions Committee. Following resolution adopted:

Resolution No. 3. - Whereas many times there are close friends and relatives of licensed ministers who want to attend the ordination service, but are unable to do so because necessary announcement has not been made, be it resolved that the ordination service be announced prior to conference.

Further report of Ways and Means Committee. Following recommendation adopted.

Recommendation No. 4. — We recommend that the printing of the Rocky Mountain Pilgrim be paid for out of the District Budget and we further recommend that the Editor be paid \$25.00 per year from said fund.

Motion prevailed Recommendation No. 4 be amended as follows: that the printing cost be shared equally by the Sunday School and District Budget.

Motion prevailed to adjourn until 6:30 p.m.

Evening Sitting

The evening sitting began by R. W. Wooten leading the conference in singing "The Solid Rock".

The vote on delegates (ministerial) to General Conference was reported. The following were elected: R. L. Gilbert, W. J. Brown, D. E. Moller, L. C. Felsburg, W. F. Drown, Paul Gafford, Duane Knierim, and Evelee Mason.

Motion prevailed that the next four highest be alternates.

Motion prevailed that the chairman should rule the order in which they should serve which is as follows: C. C. Coleman—first, George Lingo—second, C. C. Darr—third, J. H. Fortner—fourth.

Motion prevailed that if any delegate move out of geographical bounds of District they shall disqualify themselves as a delegate.

Motion prevailed that the District Secretary report the camp and conference to the Advocate.

Ballots were cast for two Lay Delegates to General Conference.

Motion prevailed to proceed with business while tellers count.

C. E. Wert, the new Bible College President spoke to the conference in behalf of the school.

Ballot on Lay Delegates was reported. Eldon Drown was elected on first ballot. Motion prevailed to vote on the next three highest. Motion prevailed that the two not elected serve as alternates. Arthur Law was elected. Everett Bland and Lowell Bohl were elected as alternates.

Motion prevailed that we adopt the recommendation of the General Board concerning the Forward Movement in the Rocky Mountain District, which is: One new church, one branch Sunday School, and 37 new members.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

July 1, 1957

To the Pastors, evangelists, and delegates of the thirty-sixth session of the Rocky Mountain District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church—Greetings in the name of our Lord. You have had many testing places to go through in the year just past, but each testing time has had a silver lining, and each victory has given you greater faith to meet the issues of the future. The promises of God have never failed, nor will they fail us as we approach the end time.

We believe that every praying and thinking Pilgrim realizes that we are fast approaching the time of the end. Quoting again what I have said in many of your churches — a prominent man of the world said, "The next war will be an atomic war, and the next one after that will be fought with sticks and stones". Perhaps all of us feel that God has different arrangements as far as the last part of this quote is concerned. We believe Jesus is coming soon. Quoting again from an article by Rev. E. K. Purcell in the Foreign Missions Bulletin, in 1860 this statement was made by a prominent French scientist, "Inside of 100 years of physical and chemical science, man will know what the atom is. It is my belief when man reached this stage, God will come down to earth with His big ring of keys and will say to humanity 'Gentlemen it is closing time'".

The Pilgrims Place

Just before God turns the key we believe He has some tasks for His children to perform and we sincerely believe we Pilgrims have a place in performing those tasks. We believe by Prayer, Vision and and work we Pilgrims of the Rocky Mountain District can be used of God to bring many more into the Kingdom before the final turning of the key.

Pilgrim Workers

Our pastors have been faithful in their many duties. In many in-

stances the pastor has been ably assisted by an understanding wife and exemplary children. Many of our pastors have labored under adverse circumstances. Living costs have continued upward, but in too few places was the pastor's salary kept in line with living costs, but as faithful men of God have always done, they have carried on to the final rewards of their labors. Hand in hand with our pastors have been the evangelists, both from our own District and from other Districts, who have labored faithfully for the lost. God bless these who have borne the heat of the day, the measure of success we have enjoyed has been due largely to them.

Our Spirituality

Contrary to the fact that some feel the church is going backward spiritually we feel there is a tide of spirituality that is coming our way that if we are faithful will carry us over any problems and difficulties that may arise. True, some have stepped aside, but the larger part of our people are desirous of deeper spirituality and are seeking to know the very best for their lives. Revivals and outpourings of His Spirit are the answer to all the problems of the District.

Properties and Improvements

God has helped wonderfully on our District this past year in regard to our material gains.

The church at Albuquerque under the leadership of Bro. Reading has erected a lovely new parsonage. This was built on lots already owned by the church. It is a 3 bedroom home and modern throughout.

The frame and brick church building that was begun more than a year ago at Boulder has moved much further along toward completion. There is a lovely apartment built into the church for the pastor, which can easily be converted into S.S. rooms later on. The church has been worshiping in the new building most of this conference year. Bro. Brown has done much hard and commendable work on this building.

The Bethel congregation (3rd church in Colo. Sprgs.) have purchased a nice building in the south end of this city. Likely this will not be the final location of this fine church, but God has blessed them as they have gotten settled and working in this community.

First Church in Colorado Sprgs. has put in stained glass windows into the church building.

The Knob Hill church here in the city has done extensive work in the basements of both the church and parsonage.

The Denver people have built a lovely new church building. It is block and brick structure and a credit to our District. It was our happy privilege to dedicate this church May 26, 1957.

A part of the basement of the church at Grand Junction has been remodeled into a very lovely apartment for the pastor. Most of the credit for this improvement goes to the ingenuity and hard work of Bro. Coleman.

The church building from Upland, Nebraska has been moved into

the city of Holdridge, Nebraska and regular services are being held in it once more.

Lewellen Pilgrims have moved out the chairs from their church building and put in pews. These pews are not new, but good and comfortable, and improve the appearance of the interior of the church greatly.

The McCook congregation has plans underway for the purchase of a parsonage.

The good people at Rocky Ford have purchased a lot in a very desirable location and plans are underway for a new church building there this coming year.

At Superior some much needed painting has been done.

Our pastors and people have taken commendable interest in the properties of the church, These are God's houses and deserve the best care we can give them.

Forward Movement and District Church Extension

This District has been endeavoring to keep in step with the Forward Movement of our church. We believe that the primary aim of the Forward Movement is the objective of every true christian—The Deepening of our Spiritual and Devotional life. Branch Sunday Schools have not materialized as yet, but we trust that we shall soon be able to launch out along this line.

This year it has been our happy privilege to organize the third Pilgrim Holiness church here in the city. The church was organized with 16 charter members and God has blessed Bro. C. C. Darr and his people. Their S. S. is growing since moving into the new location in the south part of the city. There is a fine spirit of Christian fellowship in their midst and a desire to win souls for Christ.

This year too has seen the launching of a new effort in Aurora, Colorado, a suburb of Denver. Bro. Smalley has been working faithfully at the job.

A word more about the new work in Holdridge, Nebraska. God has helped Bro. Bob Sander and his wife in their efforts there. If God continues to bless we trust that this church shall be ready to organize sometime this year. This work is largely the child of the Holiness Convention of Nebraska.

At Tecumseh, Nebraska the work is coming along rather slowly, but we feel God is helping there. Bro. & Sr. Hickman have done a commendable work there. We shall look for fruit.

Lincoln, Nebraska and Grand Junction, Colo. are both receiving some help from the District. Lincoln is fully organized and should be able to be on its own in another year. Because of circumstances Grand Junction had to be dis-organized during the past year. However, under the leadership of the Holy Spirit and the untiring efforts of Bro. & Sr. Coleman it looks like this church should be organized again this coming year.

Brethern, let us pray earnestly for these works for they represent our Forward Movement as far as new churches are concerned. Many

of the local churches have received new converts into their midst. It has been my happy privilege to receive some into the church as I have made my visits. I trust the Forward Movement shall not only be something we think of as being for the General or District church, but that each of us shall truly get this on hearts and put it into operation first in our own hearts and then in our local church.

Under Divine providence and the careful direction of Dr. Heckart our College has made splendid progress in the past 9 years. We feel Dr. Heckart has been a Christian gentleman, as well as a capable administrator. I have appreciated his council and advice and count him as a personal friend. God bless him as he goes into other fields of service.

We are happy indeed to have Bro. Wert to take up the work where Dr. Heckart has left off. We believe that after much prayer God has divinely led Bro. Wert to head our school, and trust this coming year will be the very best the school has known. Bro. Wert, we welcome you into our midst. Pastors may I urge you again to direct your young people this way for their christian education.

Finances and Membership

In checking over the report blanks from the Statistical committee I find that gains have been made in membership, Sunday School average attendance and finances. A substantial overall gain has been made in finances due to several building programs on the District. The regular channels for giving have kept about level in spite of the severe drought for the past year.

Campmeeting

For most of us little need be said about the campmeeting just past. Those who ministered to us in message and song did so in the fear of God. God honored His Word, and the results at the altar as well as in inspiration and practical usefulness was very gratifying. We thank God for old fashioned campmeetings, and for faithful people who support them.

Personal Report

I have preached 103 times, have held 15 church meetings and 27 church Board meetings. I have also conducted all the church annual meetings this past year. Beside the above services I have dedicated two churches and one parsonage, helped in four communion services, and dedicated one baby, and received several members into the church. I have visited all the churches at least 3 times this past year, and some of them more often. I attended the Superintendents meeting in Indianapolis and attended the Bible College Board meetings. I have travelled in my car for the District 19,086 miles, besides travelling several thousand miles by train and District pickup in the

interests of the District. What little I have done seems small indeed compared to the great task. That which I have done has been a great pleasure for it has been for Christ and the Church.
