STANDING RULES

1. We recommend that the Ways and Means Resolution and Statistical Committee be appointed by the District Superintendent at the conference for the following year. Be it further resolved that any material may be presented to said committees during the year.

2. That the pastors verify the reports of their respective churches before sending them to the District Conference.

3. That all buildings such as churches, parsonages, or extensive improvements, be approved by the District Superintendent before construction.

4. That no church of our district shall call a pastor, evangelist, representative of foreign missions or other church institutions without first consulting the District Superintendent.

5. That the conference year close on June 30 and that all the reports be in the hands of the district statistician by July 10th and that all district monies be sent to the District Treasurer by the same date.

6. That we go on record as being opposed to our children having to dress, dance or do other things in the physical education department of the public schools in violation of our religious convictions and our church standards.

7. Owing to the soon coming of Jesus and the great spiritual need of the world, be it resolved that each pastor be privileged to hold two revival meetings of two weeks duration each year with regular support paid, subject to the approval of the District Superintendent.

8. Be it resolved that we have a Foreign Missionary Convention in the fall, time to be set by the District Council.

9. That the District Treasurer give an itemized account to the District Conference of where all the Home Missionary money was spent.

10. That all members pay their tithes into the church in which they retain their membership, according to Section 69 in the Manual.

11. That the District secure and maintain all the books in the different courses of study as prescribed by the Manual in sufficient number to accommodate, if necessary, any candidate taking any one of the courses. That the Educational Committee formulate rules for the loaning of such books, determine the number to be secured, and select custodian, subject to the approval of the District Council.

12. That the conference bar shall include the first seven rows of seats in the center and south sections and the platform.

13. Be it resolved that the time for Conference sittings be fixed as follows: 8:00—11:45 a.m., 1:45—5:00 p.m. and 6:30—9:00 p.m.

14. That the District Superintendent shall appoint all committees and fill all vacancies.

15. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be granted a two weeks' vacation with pay each year.

16. We recommend that each pastor be granted a two weeks' vacation with pay each year.

17. Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the word of God, girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing immodest forms of dress so current today, such as sun suits, shorts or without stockings, dresses of immodest lengths, slacks, or similar garments. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public in shorts or without shirts.

18. Whereas the trend of worldliness is so prevalent and in making inroads in the Church, be it resolved that we strongly urge parents to dress their children according to the spirit of the Manual which sets forth a standard of modesty.

19. Be it resolved that District Minister's license shall not be granted to any person who does not have a definite call to, or who does not plan to enter the active ministry.

Be it further resolved that no licentiate be advanced in ministerial standing unless actively engaged in the ministry.

20. Be it resolved that each pastor report all seekers in the church of which he has the oversight.

21. Be it resolved that semi-annual zone Sunday School conventions be held for the purpose of encouraging the work of the Sunday School, such conventions to be arranged for, and supervised by the chairman of the District Sunday School Board if possible, or by some other member of the District Sunday School Board.

22. Whereas there is considerable work clearing the camp ground and storing equipment. Be it resolved that each member of the conference remain one day after conference to assist the District Superintendent in doing the work.

23. We recommend that our laity be given recognition along with our ministry in the list of memorials.

24. Owing to the soon coming of Jesus and the great spiritual need of the world. Be it resolved that our District Superintendent be privileged to hold two revival meetings during the year outside of the district with regular support.

25. Whereas in accordance with the Manual Page 55, Section 156, Paragraph 1, "All licensed ministers failing to complete and report on at least two subjects a year in their required course of study for two consecutive years, will automatically forfeit their licenses—" and;

Whereas some of our licensed ministers have failed to comply with the above provisions.

Be it therefore resolved that we ask each member of the Educational Board to be responsible for contacting each licentiate under his jurisdiction, urging him to follow the prescribed course of study as outlined in the Manual, before the beginning of next conference.

Be it further resolved that we urge each licentiate to co-operate with the Educational Board in the above matter.

26. Whereas the Central Pilgrim College is now offering a Preacher's Seminar, and Whereas the work given in the Seminar is much more thorough and exhaustive than our regularly prescribed study course.

Be it resolved that our district give one-half year's credit to each licentiate for each such Seminar successfully completed.

Be it further resolved that our District Education Board be authorized to determine which books of study course need not be studied or read in lieu of the completion of the above Seminar work.

27. Whereas it is very necessary at the time of pastoral change for the new pastor to become acquainted with his people as soon as is possible and whereas the pastor leaving does not have adequate time for the preparation of a complete list of names and addresses of the members and constituency.

Therefore be it resolved that every pastor compile and keep up to date a complete file of all those attending his or her church.

28. Be it resolved that a printed statement be given each person registering at the Pikes Peak Holiness Camp showing the registration requirements.

29. Whereas the District has purchased a suitable safe for all abstracts and legal papers, be it resolved all abstracts and other legal papers be placed in same.

30. Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches, under such conditions as required active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions sets out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

31. Whereas the District Conference desires the continuation of the Rocky Mountain Pilgrim, with 10 issues per year.

We recommend the offices of Editor of the Rocky Mountain Pilgrim and the District Sunday School Secretary be combined.

32. Be it resolved that in case of the death of a minister or a member of the family, that the District Superintendent be responsible for notifying the pastors of the District, and the Conference to stand expense of same.

33. Whereas many times there are close friends and relatives of licensed ministers who want to attend the ordination service, but are unable to do so because necessary announcement has not been made, be it resolved that the ordination service be announced prior to conference.

34. Whereas the majority of television programs are a definite hindrance to the spirituality of our people, bring evil influence into the home: Be it resolved we go on record as opposing television.

35. Be it resolved that all Sunday Schools in the Rocky Mountain District stop counting scholars present ten minutes before the close of the Sunday School period.

36. We recommend the price of Conference Minutes be set at 50c each and that each pastor be responsible to collect and bring to conference the money for the number of minutes that his church desires.

37. Be it resolved that the time of the district camp meeting be set as follows: To begin the Friday nearest of July 15, the same to become effective in 1961.

Standing Recommendations of Ways and Means Committee

1. We recommend that the District Superintendent be given a salary of \$300.00 per month with district parsonage and utilities, together with six (6) cents per mile for traveling expense while driving his own car, and actual traveling expense while traveling otherwise.

We further recommend, that whereas, the mileage incurred by the District Superintendent in the work of the District is that beyond the average driven, thus making mechanical repair and trade-in more often than the recommended time of driving a car: We therefore recommend that the District Treasurer be instructed to set aside each year as a supplement to the depreciation and trade-in of the District Superintendent's car.

2. Be it resolved that if the District Superintendent prefers not to live in the district parsonage, the rent from same be returned to the district treasurer.

3. We recommend that the assistant District Superintendent, or any member of the Council acting in the District Superintendent's place receive \$5.00 per day, plus (4) cents per mile traveling expense while driving his own car, and actual traveling expense while traveling otherwise.

4. Be it resolved that the District pastors and unstationed ministers not participating in the Pension Plan pay three-fourths of their ministerial tithe into the district treasury to be applied on District administrative expense and the remainder to be paid into the treasury of the local church to which they belong.

Be it further resolved that all District evangelists, teachers and other unstationed ministers, participating in the Pension Plan, pay their entire tithe into the District treasury. On the basis of the tithe paid to the District, the District Treasurer shall pay the 4 percent as required by the Pension Plan.

5. That each local church furnish its parsonage with at least a cook stove, a heater, a kitchen cabinet, six chairs, a dining room table and a dresser.

6. We recommend that the annual remuneration of the District Secretary and the District Treasurer be \$100 and \$250 respectively. Be it further resolved that the District Statisticians be given \$15 per year and that the salary for the combined offices of District Sunday School Secretary and Editor of the Rocky Mountain Pilgrim be set at \$50 per year.

7. We recommend that all attending the Pikes Peak Holiness Camp Meeting be properly registered. Each registrant twelve years of age and above, except active ministers and their families, will be required to pay a fee of \$2.00. Registration cards will be so made that each registrant be assigned specific duties in one of the work departments of the camp, the foreman of that detail to punch each card each day when duty has been performed. These duties will be assigned by a Camp Meeting Committee of three persons to be appointed by the District Superintendent.

We further recommend that an attendant be in charge at each meal to check registration cards and receive free-will offerings.

8. We recommend that the local church pay the expenses of its delegates to and from District Conference.

9. We recommend that each church pay their pastor's offerings or salary during Camp and Conference.

10. Be it resolved that each Sunday School pay 10c per enrolled Sunday School member per year, for promotion of District Sunday School work.

11. Be it resolved that each local church send to the District Treasurer each month an amount equivalent to 10 percent of all regular offerings. From this amount the District Treasurer shall take a proper percent for District administration and District Home Missions. The remainder of the 10 percent shall apply on General administration. General Church extension loan fund, General Sunday School and youth work and Senior college.

Be it further resolved that each church be assessed \$1.50 per member to supplement the General Budget fund and 50 cents per member for General Conference expense fund.

12. We recommend that the Foreign Missionary budget be raised separately and that the minimum amount be in accord with the General Church recommendation of \$1.60 per senior member, to be raised in any way the local church may desire.

13. We recommend that, in compliance with the request of our zone school board, each senior member of our district be assessed \$5.00 per year for Bible School budget, 25 cents of which will go for the Rocky Mountain District's portion of the school boards travel expense, this budget to be raised in any way the local church may desire.

14. We recommend that the district treasurer set aside amount equal to 20 percent of the general budget, from the unspecified missionary funds, the same to be included in the general budget.

We further recommend the district treasurer set aside the amount equal to 14 percent from unspecified general church extension funds, the same to be included in the general budget.

15. Be it resolved that the members of the District Sunday School and Young People's Boards be given five (5) cents per mile for traveling expense to be paid from the funds of their respective boards.

16. We recommend that each Church take up a free will offering to help defray the expenses of the Ministerial meeting in March.

17. Be it resolved that a fee of one dollar each be made for the use of the District study books and that a fee of 50 cents each made for the use of District Reading Books.

18. Due to the conference decision to purchase a District Camp Grounds:

We recommend that the District Superintendent be authorized to take three special offerings in each church each year, 90 percent of said offerings to be applied to the District Camp ground debt and interest, and 10 percent to be set aside for maintenance and repair on the Camp Ground.

We further recommend that the goal for these offerings be set at \$10.00 per year per senior member for the District.

We further recommend that the District Superintendent be authorized to take a special offering each year at District Camp to be applied to the District Camp ground debt and interest.

19. We recommend that the District Superintendent meet with each local Advisory Board at least once each year to review the Church's financial welfare and endeavor, wherever possible, to obtain yearly raises in pastors support.

20. We recommend that our conference accept the proposal of Central Pilgrim College in granting each year a one-half tuition scholarship to Central Pilgrim College to a student on our district. The college will then grant the same to another student.

We further recommend that these students be chosen by the District Council from Pilgrim Holiness ranks on the basis of the two students with the best scholastic and church records.

Pension Plan

Whereas the General Church has adopted and recommended the Pilgrim Pension Plan as a sound method of providing retirement benefits for aged Pilgrim ministers, and Whereas the Rocky Mountain Conference has declared its endorsement of the plan, and Whereas action taken at the 1954 General Conference makes it mandatory for each local church to participate in the plan, we therefore recommend that every church, no less than once each quarter, send to the District Treasurer an amount equivalent to four percent of the pastor's salary as the conference contribution to the Pension Plan.

FORTIETH ANNUAL DISTRICT CONFERENCE

First Sitting July 24, 1961 — 8:00 a. m.

The Fortieth annual assembly of the Rocky Mountain District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was called to order by District Superintendent L. E. Schendel at 8:00 a. m., July 24, 1961.

Brother Hughes led the Conference in singing "The Beauty of Jesus."

The Superintendent called the Conference to Prayer. Brother Rummel led in Prayer.

Reverend L. E. Schendel introduced Reverend R. G. Flexon, General Superintendent, who took the chair.

Dr. Flexon challenged our hearts with a stirring message from Haggai 1:8 on the subject "When God Is Glorified in the Church". Eight different things were presented.

The Secretary called the roll.

The Chair set the Conference Bar according to the minutes.

The Examining and Educational Boards gave their joint report. (See Ministerial Directory).

Motion prevailed to receive the report.

Reverend Larry Kelley was presented to the Conference and received into the Conference as an Ordained Minister.

The Reception Committee presented Reverend and Mrs. Deal and Reverend Smalley to the Conference.

Motion prevailed to grant them an honorary seat in the Conference Bar.

Reverend L. E. Schendel read the following telegram from the Mason Twins: "Missing Camp. Blessings on Conference. Look up, He is coming." —Mason Twins.

Reverend L. E. Schendel read his splendid Superintendent's report. The report was graciously received by a rising vote.

The Assistant District Superintendent read his report.

Motion prevailed to accept the report.

The Auditor's Report was read. A word of appreciation for Brother Fortner's fine work was included.

Motion prevailed to accept the report.
The Treasurer's report was read.
Motion prevailed to accept the report.
The Statistical Committee gave their report.
Motion prevailed to accept the report.
The Sunday School Promotional Secretary reported.
Motion prevailed to accept the report.
The Secretary of Youth reported.
Motion prevailed to accept this splendid report.
The Committee on Resolutions reported.

RESOLUTION NO. 1

We recommend that the following be accepted by the conference, and printed in our District Minutes as by-laws of the Rocky Mountain District:

- (1) The name of this Corporation shall be "The Pilgrim Holiness Church of The Rocky Mountain District."
- (2) The chief place of business, or headquarters, of this Corporation shall be Colorado Springs, Colorado, U. S. A.
- (3) This Corporation shall have an Annual Assembly, that shall elect all District Boards, and transact all business necessary to carry out the object and purpose of said Corporation. They shall elect a District Council of not less than seven members which shall be the ruling board. All boards and workers shall work under their jurisdiction. The Council shall have power to settle all matters of dispute that might arise in a local church or any matter pertaining to the ministers or workers. All officers of corporation shall be elected by two thirds majority vote of said annual assembly.
- (4) The said Corporation shall have charge and supervision of all local Pilgrim Holiness Churches, other institutions and properties; also supervision of all ministers and deaconesses throughout the States of Colorado, Nebraska, and Wyoming.
- (5) The District Council shall be the Board of Trustees of this Corporation; they shall be the custodians of all church property held in this District; they shall sign all deeds and contracts and notes pertaining to the business of this corporation; they shall keep a record of all business transacted by them in order to give a correct report of their business transactions at the Annual Assembly of said Corporation.
- (6) All local organized Churches and other District institutions of this Corporation shall work in harmony with the Rules and By-Laws adopted by this Corporation, and in harmony with the Rules and Regulations of our General Church organization. The District Council shall see that they do so, and if at any time a local Church is disbanded according to the judgment of the District Council, its property, both real and personal, shall become the property of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Rocky Mountain District, and the District Council shall have power to sell or use property any place in the District.
- (7) It shall be the duty of the District Council to establish local Churches throughout the said States, and to aid all the local Churches in this District by assisting them in obtaining spirit-filled pastors; and in every other way possible.
- (8) The District Superintendent by virtue of this office shall be the Chairman of the Council, examining board, ordination committee, and all other important boards.
- (9) The object of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Rocky Mountain District is and must ever be the conversion of sinners and the sanctification of believers; we shall also however, place proper emphasis on divine healing and the premillennial coming of our Lord.

- (10) Be it further resolved that this Corporation care for the SOUL, MIND and BODY of everyone possible, and that it shall have the power to buy, sell, lease and transact any and all business to carry out these duties.
- (11) This corporation shall be, and is, a non-profit organization, and no part of the net earnings of which inures to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual.
- (12) In the event any local church of the Rocky Mountain District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be discontinued, the real property of said church, along with any other assets shall revert to the District. Further, if the Rocky Mountain District should be dissolved, the real property, along with all other assets shall become the property of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Corporation, with headquarters at Indianapolis, Indiana.
3. Be it resolved that the foregoing Articles of Incorporation of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Rocky Mountain District be amended to read,

I

This corporation shall be, and is, a non-profit organization, and no part of the net earnings of which inures to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual.

II

In the event any local church of the Rocky Mountain District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be discontinued, the real property of said church, along with any other assets shall revert to the District. Further, if the Rocky Mountain District should be dissolved, the real property, along with all other assets shall become the property of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Corporation, with headquarters at Indianapolis, Indiana.

Resolution No. 2—Because of vandalism, deterioration, wind and other elements, we recommend the district tabernacle be enclosed. Carried

The Committee on Ways and Means reported.

Recommendation No. 1—We recommend that lumber, used if possible, for the enclosing of our tabernacle be purchased with funds from our District treasury. We further recommend that, under the direction of the District Superintendent, each church on the District try to furnish two days on the tabernacle before next camp. Carried.

Recommendation No. 2—We recommend that each Rocky Mountain District delegate to the General Conference be responsible for his own lodging while at the Conference. Carried.

Recommendation No. 3—We recommend that for the year 1961-1962 the General Conference assessment be \$1.00 per member rather than 50c. Carried.

The Conference was called to prayer for Brother Gilbert's father, who is reported seriously ill. Brother Drown led in prayer.

Further report of the Resolutions Committee on Memorials to General Conference.

Memorial No. 1—In order that the General Board be more representative of the entire constituency of the church, be it resolved that not more than one zone representative be elected to the General Board from any district. Be it further resolved that if any zone representative shall move his membership to another district of his zone or move his residence to another district of his zone that already has a zone representative on the General Board, he shall immediately disqualify himself as a zone representative. Carried.

Memorial No. 2—Be it resolved that section 42, paragraph 3, of the manual be changed to read: "Prior to the annual church meeting the local church board shall nominate two or more qualified persons for the office of church secretary, two or more qualified persons for the office of local treasurer, and two or more qualified persons for delegates to the annual district conference. They shall also nominate two or more persons for the president of the missionary society (Section 89.) and two or more qualified persons for the office of Sunday School Secretary and two or

more qualified persons for the office of Sunday School Treasurer. Carried.

Memorial No. 3—Whereas it would tend to give better chairmanship, be it resolved no General Superintendent shall serve as a member of the policy committee. Carried.

Memorial No. 4—Inasmuch as our ministers have fifteen days, after a pastoral call, to pray over the matter as to accepting or rejecting the call and inasmuch as our churches do not know who the available pastors are until annual meeting, be it resolved that our District Superintendent, as soon as he has a list or partial list of available pastors, send a list of same to secretaries of church changing pastors, thereby giving more people time to pray over the changing of a pastor. Lost.

Memorial No. 5—Be it resolved that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, instead of being appointed by the District Council, be elected by two-thirds majority vote of the annual Conference. The District Council shall nominate two or more qualified persons for this office. Ignored.

The Committee on Memoirs reported.

The report was received by the Conference standing in silent prayer. Brother Flexon then led in prayer.

The election of officers was the order of business.

The District Superintendent appointed the following for tellers; Hubert Hughes at the board; Marvin Moberly, Floyd Kelley and Jimmy Koons to hand out ballots: Bob Sander and Jerry Kelley to read.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent. Brother Schendel was elected.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent. Brother Gilbert was elected.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary. Brother W. J. Brown was elected.

Ballots were cast for District Treasurer. Brother J. H. Fortner was elected.

Ballots were cast for three additional members to the District Council. Motion prevailed to set the ordination service for 1:45.

The conference was adjourned by expiration of time.

Afternoon Sitting

The Roll call was dispensed with.

The report of the ballots cast for the three additional members of the Council was given as follows: D. E. Moller, Marion B. Hill and Knierim elected.

General Superintendent R. G. Flexon in charge of the service called the candidates, Floyd Kelley and Thomas Korb to the chairs of the altar. The candidates wives were ask to come with their husbands if they were present. Mrs. Korb was present and came.

The council had appointed L. E. Schendel, J. H. Fortner, Marion Hill, W. F. Drown and W. J. Brown to be the Ordination Council.

Brother Flexon delivered a heart searching message and read the questions to the candidates. The presence of the Lord was very precious during the entire service. We pray God's blessing upon these young men as they have been set apart for the work of the ministry.

Ballots were cast for the Examining Board member. W. F. Drown was elected.

Ballots were cast for the Educational Board member. Marvin Moberly was elected.

Motion prevailed for a plurality vote to elect the ministerial delegates to General Conference.

Ballots were cast for Ministerial delegates to General Conference.

Motion prevailed to recess while the ballots were counted.

The following were elected; Floyd Kelley, Marion Hill, D. E. Moller, Duane Knierim, Marvin Moberly and Lloyd Smith.

The Alternates are; Dale Rummel, James Flick, W. F. Drown, R. G. Hamilton, George Lingo and Ed Reiff.

Nominations were read for lay-delegates to General Conference.

Ballots were cast for lay-delegates to General Conference. There was no election.

Motion prevailed to vote on the six highest; the first two highest to be delegates and the next four alternates according to the votes received.

Ballots cast for lay-delegates to General Conference, Keith Kelley and Arthur Law were elected: Everette Bland, L. Summers, W. F. Drown, Mr. Carlson as alternates.

Further report of the Ways and Means Committee.

Recommendation No. 4—We recommend that our conference accept the proposal of Central Pilgrim College in granting each year a one-half tuition scholarship to Central Pilgrim College to a student on our district. The College will then grant the same to another student. We further recommend that these students be chosen by the District Council from Pilgrim Holiness ranks on the basis of the two students with the best scholastic and church records. Carried.

Further report of Resolutions Committee.

Memorial No. 6—Be it resolved that section 45 of the Manual be changed to read: "The annual church meeting shall elect one delegate for each 50 members of less, and an additional delegate for every additional 25 members of major fraction thereof, to the annual meeting of the District Conference. An alternate also shall be named, who shall fill the regular delegate's place, provided he is unable to be present at the conference. A pastor's spouse may not serve as a lay delegate to the district conference. Each delegate shall be provided with a certificate of his appointment, signed by the pastor and secretary (Section 92)." Carried.

Presentation of the ship for the Decade of Progress was ask for by the Chair.

Brother Rummel presented the ship to Brother Dove for the Knob Hill church in the absence of Brother Gilbert.

The secretary read the council appointments. (See Official Directory).

The District Superintendent read his appointments of Committees. (See Official Directory).

Brother Flexon instructed the Conference to come prepared to stay longer at Conference next year. The ministers will read their personal reports before the Conference.

The Secretary read the Pastoral Appointments. (See Pastoral Appointments).

Further report of the Resolutions Committee.

The following Special Resolutions were read and approved by a standing vote:

We, the members of the Fortieth Annual Conference of the Rocky Mountain District of the Pilgrim Holiness church resolve that there be given our chairman Dr. R. G. Flexon, a rising vote of thanks to express our appreciation of his labor and love.

We the members of the Fortieth Annual Conference of the Rocky Mountain District resolve that there be given our District Superintendent, Rev. L. E. Schendel; our secretary Rev. W. J. Brown; and our Treasurer Rev. J. H. Fortner a rising vote of thanks to express our appreciation of their faithfulness to us. Be it further resolved that there be given our cook Mrs. Woolard, and all the kitchen and dining room help a rising vote of thanks to express our appreciation of their faithful service.

Motion prevailed for the Council to take care of all unfinished business.

Brother Schendel made several announcements.

The Board of Generals is enforcing the manual which requires all the Licentiates to appear before the Examining Board or send a letter of explanation for not appearing. Failure to do so will cause forfeiture of their District License.

Motion prevailed to adjourn.

Brother Flexon dismissed the conference in prayer.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the presiding General Superintendent Rev. R. G. Flexon, Pastors, Evangelists and delegates of the Fortieth Annual Conference of the Rocky Mountain District: It is with a keen sense of the sure foundation of our salvation that we greet you. World conditions remind us that much around us is insecure, but the promises of our God fail not. I have found no little comfort in the words Jeremiah, "It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because His compassions fail not. They are new every morning: Great is thy faithfulness." Lamentations 3:21, 22.

Year by year I am reminded of the unfinished tasks that lie before us, but I am encouraged with the thought that God has given us a devoted group of ministers and laymen who are determined that the task that is ours will be carried out and we will be found at our post of duty when Jesus comes.

We want to express our gratitude to God again this year that He has seen fit to spare all of our ministers.

Church Improvements

The courage with which our local churches push forward in maintaining, improving and adding to their property is gratifying indeed. The Ft. Collins church has made wonderful progress in improving their property. They have the parsonage in good shape and have been worshipping in it. The difficulty of securing a loan has slowed them up considerably, but we fell in the good providence of God, and under the human leadership of Rev. The First Church in Denver has purchased some lots and are in the process of negotiating a loan for the building of a parsonage. Denver Bethel church has moved its location and in the move has changed its name to Bethany. The move seems definitely to be for the better.

Canon City has purchased a parsonage across the street from the church, which is adequate in every way. This change leaves them with the old parsonage to use as Sunday School annex, and is being put to excellent use. Much improvement has been put on the new church at Pueblo West Park. It is a very desirable place in this growing community.

The good people at Rocky Ford have been faithfully improving their new church, as well as having begun work on a parsonage which has added greatly to its livability. Some of the other churches have taken care of interior and exterior decorating. As a whole our property is in good condition.

District Church Extension

The work of District church extension has been progressing nicely this year. Special help has been given to the work at Tecumseh, and Holdrege, Nebraska; and Grand Junction and Pueblo West Park in Colo. Tecumseh is showing gains under the leadership of Sr. Stewart.

Holdrege is making very satisfactory progress under the leadership of Brother and Sister Bob Sander. Their work has been a sacrificial work for sure, but the results are justifying the efforts.

Grand Junction has made splendid progress under the able leadership of Rev. R. G. Hamilton the past three years, and the prospects for the future are bright as Bro. Flick goes over to pastor the church.

The church in West Pueblo not only has made improvements on the building but is filling a real need in the community under the leadership of Rev. Roscoe Sanders. With hard work and the help of God this should be a strong church in the years to come.

Bible College

Our Bible College, under the direction of Brother Bonner, and the good providence of God, is making wonderful progress. In a couple of years there should be coming from this institution young workers which shall fill in the need of this great western area.

Camp Ground

I wish I could give a glowing report about our Camp Ground finances. So far it has been a close race at the date of each payment. I am afraid some of our pastors are not keeping this property before their people. Instead of reaching our quota of \$10.00 per member this year I am afraid we have reached very little past the half way mark. This Conference should discuss this matter as well as other phases of our financial obligations. It is going to take the complete co-operation of every church and its membership to see this project successfully completed but I believe we will, in the good providence of God, come out victors.

Camp Meeting

We have greatly appreciated the ministry of our camp meeting workers this year. We deeply regretted that Rev. Roland Mitchell was not able to fill his call because of duties as newly elected District Superintendent of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey district. However we appreciate the good providence of God in sending our way Rev. Rollie Schell. The preaching of Bro. Schell and Busby was the very best, and the Spirit honored his Word as these faithful men preached. The Spirit directed singing and leadership of Jim and Aletha Sheets was greatly appreciated by all, and their ministry was a real blessing in the camp.

Personal Report

This past conference year I have preached 93 times, held 33 local church board meetings, 28 church meetings and all of the annual meetings. I have endeavored to visit all of the churches at least 3 times this past year. While visiting the churches I have assisted in communion services and special services as the occasion demanded. I have driven many miles to be at all of the board meetings of the college, and have driven 19,035 miles for the District.
