### STANDING RULES

1. We recommend that the Ways and Means Resolutions and Statistical Committee be appointed by the District Superintendent at the conference for the following year. Be it further resolved that any material may be presented to said committees during the year.

2. That the pastors verify the reports of their respective churches before sending them to the District Conference.

3. That all buildings such as churches, parsonages, or extensive improvements, be approved by the District Superintendent before construction.

4. That no church of our district shall call a pastor, evangelist, representative of foreign missions or other church institutions without first consulting the District Superintendent.

5. That the conference year close on June 30 and that all reports be in the hands of the district statistician by July 10th and that all district monies be sent to the District Treasurer by the same date.

6. That we go on record as being opposed to our children having to dress, dance or do other things in the physical education department of the public schools in violation of our religious convictions and our church standards.

7. Owing to the soon coming of Jesus and the great spiritual need of the world, be it resolved that each pastor be privileged to hold two revival meetings of two weeks duration each year with regular support paid, subject to the approval of the District Superintendent.

8. Be it resolved that we have a Foreign Missionary Convention in the fall, time to be set by the District Council.

9. That the District Treasurer give an itemized account to the District Conference of where all the Home Missionary money was spent.

10. That all members pay their tithes into the church in which they retain their membership, according to Section 69 in the Manual

11. That the District secure and maintain all the books in the different courses of study as prescribed by the Manual in sufficient number to accommodate, if necessary, any candidate taking any one of the courses. That the Educational Committee formulate rules for the loaning of such books, determine the number to be secured, and select custodian, subject to the approval of the District Council.

12. That the conference bar shall include the first seven rows of seats in the center and south sections and the platform.

13. Be it resolved that the time for Conference sittings be fixed as follows: 8:00-11:45 a.m., 1:45-5:00 p.m. and 6:30-9:00 p.m.

14. That the District Superintendent shall appoint all committees and fill all vacancies.

15. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be granted a two weeks' vacation with pay each year.

16. We recommend that each pastor be granted a two weeks' vacation with pay each year.

17. Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing immodest forms of dress so current today, such as sun suits, shorts or without stockings, dresses of immodest length, slacks, or similar garments. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public in shorts or without shirts.

18. Whereas the trend of worldliness is so prevalent and is making inroads in the Church, be it resolved that we strongly urge parents to dress their children according to the spirit of the Manual which sets forth a standard of modesty.

19. Be it resolved that District Minister's license shall not be granted to any person who does not have a definite call to, or who does not plan to enter the active ministry.

Be it further resolved that no licentiate be advanced in ministerial standing unless actively engaged in the ministry.

20. Be it resolved that each pastor report all seekers in the church of which he has the oversight.

21. Be it resolved that semi-annual zone Sunday School conventions be held for the purpose of encouraging the work of the Sunday School, such conventions to be arranged for, and supervised by the chairman of the District Sunday School Board if possible, or by some other member of the District Sunday School Board.

22. Whereas there is considerable work cleaning the camp ground and storing equipment. Be it resolved that each member of the conference remain one day after conference to assist the District Superintendent in doing the work.

23. We recommend that our laity be given recognition along with our ministry in the list of memorials.

24. Owing to the soon coming of Jesus and the great spiritual need of the world. Be it resolved that our District Superintendent be privileged to hold two revival meetings during the year outside of the district with regular support.

25. Whereas in accordance with the Manual be it "Resolved, that ministerial Study Course be put on a yearly basis with the requirement that three study books and three reading books be the minimum requirement," and that each licensed minister correspond with the study course agency, respecting his course and tests.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the seminar work be evaluated and credit be given by the study course agency.

26. Whereas it is very necessary at the time of pastoral change for the new pastor to become acquainted with his people as soon as is possible and whereas the pastor leaving does not have adequate time for the preparation of a complete list of names and addresses of the members and constituency.

Therefore be it resolved that every pastor compile and keep up to date a complete file of all those attending his or her church.

27. Be it resolved that a printed statement be given each person registering at the Pikes Peak Holiness Camp showing the registration requirements.

28. Whereas the District has purchased a suitable safe for all abstracts and legal papers, be it resolved all abstracts and other legal papers be placed in same.

29. Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches, under such conditions as required active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

30. Whereas the District Conference desires the continuation of the Rocky Mountain Pilgrim, with 10 issues per year.

We recommend the offices of Editor of the Rocky Mountain Pilgrim and the District Sunday School Secretary be combined.

31. Be it resolved that in case of the death of a minister or a member of the family, that the District Superintendent be responsible for notifying the pastors of the District, and the Conference to stand expense of same.

32. Whereas many times there are close friends and relatives of licensed ministers who want to attend the ordination service, but are unable to do so because necessary announcement has not been made, be it resolved that the ordination service be announced prior to conference.

33. Whereas the majority of television programs are a definite hindrance to the spirituality of our people, bring evil influence into the home: Be it resolved we go on record as opposing television.

34. In order to bring our Sunday Schools in line with the General Policy:

BE IT RESOLVED that no Sunday School Scholars be counted after the half way mark in the class period.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the yearly Sunday School average be based on the 50 best Sundays.

35. We recommend the price of Conference Minutes be set at 50c each and that each pastor be responsible to collect and bring to conference the money for the number of minutes that his church desires.

36. Be it resolved that the time of the district camp meeting be set as follows: To begin the Friday nearest to July 15.

37. A copy of the Rocky Mountain District by laws can be found on page 10 in the 1961 District Conference Minutes.

38. We recommend that there be a called session of District conference to meet on the last Saturday of Camp at 9:00 a. m. to pass upon candidates for Ordination.

39. Whereas the Word of God places much emphasis upon those called to the Ministry of the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

WHEREAS the Pilgrim Holiness Church makes provision for a special service to ordain these, to such an important work, and such a service is a high light in the life of the ministry.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Ordination Service be on the last Sunday evening of the District Camp at the hour of 6:00 p.m.

#### **Standing Recommendations of Ways and Means Committee**

1. We recommend that the District Superintendent be given a Salary of \$300.00 per month with district parsonage and utilities, together with six (6) cents per mile for traveling expense while driving his own car, and actual traveling expense while traveling otherwise.

We further recommend, that whereas, the mileage incurred by the District Superintendent in the work of the District is that beyond the average driven, thus making mechanical repair and trade-in more often than the recommended time of driving a car: We therefore recommend that the District Treasurer be instructed to set aside each year the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00), the same to be applied as a supplement to the depreciation and trade-in of the District Superintendent's car.

2. Be it resolved that if the District Superintendent prefers not to live in the district parsonage the rent from same be returned to the district treasurer, and a reasonable housing allotment be paid the District Superintendent. Said allotment to be determined by the District Council according to the amount of rent received and necessary up-keep on the parsonage.



3. We recommend that the assistant District Superintendent, or any member of the Council acting in the District Superintendent's place receive \$5.00 per day, plus (4) cents per mile traveling expense while driving his own car, and actual traveling expense while traveling otherwise. The District Council when traveling to Council meetings, shall be paid (4) cents per mile traveling expense while driving his own car, and actual traveling expense while traveling otherwise.

4. Be it resolved that the District pastors and unstationed ministers not participating in the Pension Plan pay three-fourths of their ministerial tithe into the district treasury to be applied on District administrative expense and the remainder to be paid into the treasury of the local church to which they belong.

Be it further resolved that all District evangelists, teachers and other unstationed ministers, participating in the Pension Plan, pay their entire tithe into the District Treasury. On the basis of the tithe paid to the District, the District Treasurer shall pay the 4 percent as required by the Pension Plan.

5. That each local church furnish its parsonage with at least a cook stove, a heater, a kitchen cabinet, six chairs, a dining room table and a dresser.

6. We recommend that the annual remuneration of the District Secretary be \$100.00 and that the District Treasurer be paid \$25.00 per month. Be it further resolved that the District Statisticians each, be given \$15 per year, and that the salary for the combined offices of District Sunday School Secretary and Editor of the Rocky Mountain Pilgrim be set at \$50 per year.

7. We recommend that all attending the Pikes Peak Holiness Camp Meeting be properly registered. Each registrant twelve years of age and above, except active ministers and their families, will be required to pay a fee of \$2.00. Each registrant 12 years of age and above including active ministers and their families, will be required to pay a fee of 50c for insurance purposes.

Registration cards will be made so that each registrant be assigned specific duties in one of the work departments of the camp, the foreman of that detail to punch each card each day when duty has been performed. These duties will be assigned by a Camp Meeting Committee of three persons to be appointed by the District Superintendent.

We further recommend that an attendant be in charge at each meal to check registration cards and receive free-will offerings.

8. We recommend that the local church pay the expenses of its delegates to and from District Conference.

9. We recommend that each Sunday School pay 10c per enrolled Sunday School member per year, for promotion of District Sunday School work.

11. Be it resolved that each local church send to the District Treasurer each month an amount equivalent to 12 percent of all regular offerings. From this amount 43 percent shall be for United Stewardship fund, 45 percent shall be for District Budget and 12 percent shall be for District Church Extension.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each church be assessed 50c per senior member for International Conference expense fund.

12. We recommend that, in compliance with the request of our zone school board, each senior member of our district be assessed \$5.00 per year for Bible School budget, 25c of which will go for the Rocky Mountain District's portion of the school boards travel expense, this budget to be raised in any way the local church may desire.

13. We recommend the District Treasurer set aside the amount equal to 32 percent of the United Stewardship fund from unspecified general church extension funds, the same to be included in the United Stewardship fund.

14. Be it resolved that the members of the District Sunday School and Young People's Boards be given five (5) cents per mile for traveling expense to be paid from the funds of their respective boards.

15. We recommend that each Church take up a free will offering to help defray the expenses of the Ministerial meeting in March.

16. Be it resolved that a fee of one dollar each be made for the use of the District study books and that a fee of 50c each made for the use of District Reading books.

17. Due to the conference decision to purchase a District Camp Ground:

We recommend that the District Superintendent be authorized to take three special offerings in each church each year, 90 percent of said offerings to be applied to the District Camp ground debt and interest, and 10 percent to be set aside for maintenance and repair on the Camp Ground.

We further recommend that the goal for these offerings be set at \$10.00 per year per senior member for the District.

We further recommend that the District Superintendent be authorized to take a special offering each year at District Camp to be applied to the District Camp ground debt and interest.

18. We recommend that the District Superintendent meet with each local Advisory Board at least once each year to review the Church's financial welfare and endeavor, wherever possible, to obtain yearly raises in pastor's support.

19. We recommend that our conference accept the proposal of Central Pilgrim College in granting each year a one-half tuition scholarship to Central Pilgrim College to a student on our district. The college will then grant the same to another student.

We further recommend that these students be chosen by the District Council from Pilgrim Holiness ranks on the basis of the two students with the best scholastic and church records.

20. BE IT RESOLVED, that each local youth society, organized or unorganized, send five per cent (5%) of the regular youth offering to the District Youth Treasury.

### **Pension Plan**

Whereas the General Church has adopted and recommended the Pilgrim Pension Plan as a sound method of providing retirement benefits for aged Pilgrim ministers, and Whereas the Rocky Mountain Conference has declared its endorsement of the plan, and whereas action taken at the 1954 General Conference makes it mandatory for each local church to participate in the plan, we therefore recommend that every church, no less than once each quarter, send to the District Treasurer an amount equivalent to 4 percent of the pastor's salary as the conference contribution to the Pension Plan.

## **FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL DISTRICT CONFERENCE**

**First Sitting July 22, 1963 — 8:00 A.M.**

The Forty-Second Annual Assembly of the Rocky Mountain District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was called to order by the District Superintendent, L. E. Schendel at 8:00 a.m. July 22, 1963 at the Camp Grounds in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Brother Butler led the conference in singing "Under the Atoning Blood."

The Superintendent called the Conference to prayer with Brother W. F. Drown praying.

Superintendent L. E. Schendel spoke of his appreciation for the good camp that just closed. He then presented Dr. Melvin Snyder, General Superintendent as presiding officer, who then took the chair.

The Conference was challenged by a message that was both timely and stirring, which was brought us by General Superintendent Snyder. He used as his text Rev. 3:7. He spoke of four statements that were addressed to all seven churches mentioned in Revelation. They were as follows:

I. Spiritual Perceptibility. Scripture.

II. Spiritual Conflict. "He that overcometh."

III. Spiritual Accountability. "I know thy work."

IV Ministerial Responsibility. "Unto the angel of the church."

This message was greatly appreciated by the Conference.

The Secretary called the roll. Kenneth Brown was seated in the Conference, as a delegate for Fort Collins.

The Conference bar was set according to the Minutes.

The Secretary read the report of the council to accept the transfers of credentials for James Butler, R. E. Nible, V. G. Story, Mrs. V. G. Story, Gerald Kahre, Granville Carroll, as Ordained Ministers, and Mrs. Elverda Carroll as Ordained Deaconess.

The District Superintendent read his most encouraging report.

It was accepted with appreciation and a motion prevailed to accept it.

District Superintendent L. E. Schendel presented the Thornton, Colo. church to the conference as our newly organized church.

Motion prevailed to accept this church

The Assistant District Superintendent read his report.

Motion prevailed to receive this report.

The Auditors report was read.

Motion prevailed to accept this report.

The District Treasurers report was read by the Secretary, in the absence of the treasurer. The chair commended the district for its giving.

Motion prevailed to accept this report.

The Statistical report was read by the committee.

Motion prevailed to accept the report.

District Sunday school promotional secretary read his report.

Motion prevailed to accept his report.

District Missionary Society president read her report.

Motion prevailed to accept the report.

Dr. Snyder exhorted the conference to pray in behalf of the need for food in British Guiana.

Dr. Snyder explained about the reports that were to be read by each pastor. He then called for the Secretary to call the names of the pastors in alphabetical order, in groups of five.

Pastors read their individual reports.

The reception committee presented Dr. G. Fredrick Owens and Virgil Hogarth to the conference. They were granted honorary seats in the conference bar.

The conference recessed by expiration of time.

Dr. Owens dismissed in prayer.

### Afternoon Sitting

The afternoon sitting opened by District Superintendent L. E. Schendel. Brother Butler led the Conference in singing "The New Jerusalem." Brother Reiff led the Conference in prayer.

The minutes of the morning sitting were read and approved.

Dr. Snyder commented on the pastor's reports in the previous sitting. He pointed out some of our strengths, namely sacrifice, accomplishments and the goodly number of youth that we have in college. He pointed out some of our weaknesses, these being visitation evangelism and pension plan.

The committee on Resolutions reported.

RESOLUTION NO. 1 was read. Motion prevailed to refer it back to the committee for a more suitable time.

RESOLUTION NO. 2 was read. Motion prevailed to refer it back to the committee to bring into alignment with General Church.

The Committee of Ways and Means reported

Recommendation No. 1 was read. Motion prevailed to refer it back to the Committee.

The Committee on Memoirs reported.

The report was received by a standing vote and a time of silent prayer. General Superintendent Dr. Snyder then led in prayer.

The District Superintendent appointed the following tellers:

At the board, Hubert Hughes;

To read, James Butler, Elgin Glendenning;

To hand out ballots, Melvin Brown, Marvin Moberly, Tommy Korb.

Dr. Snyder mentioned the seriousness of balloting and encouraged all voting to have right motives and to vote in the will of God. He again led in prayer that God's will might be done.

Ballots were cast for the District Superintendent.

The conference recessed for 10 minutes while ballots were being counted.

Results of balloting was reported. Brother L. E. Schendel was reelected.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent.

While ballots were being counted, the reception committee presented Sr. T. E. Aslin to the conference. She was granted an honorary seat in the conference bar.

Tellers reported on the vote. Brother W. J. Brown was elected.

The secretary read the council's nomination for District Secretary. They were as follows: Duane Knierim, Floyd Hadsell and James Flick.

Duane Knierim was elected.

The secretary read the council's nominations for District Treasurer. They were as follows: Paul Gafford, Floyd Kelley, V. G. Story and Ed Reiff.

Ballots were cast for District Treasurer. V. G. Story was selected.

Ballots were cast for three advisory members to the council. While ballots were being counted Brother Rummel, our Promotion Sunday School Secretary, presented Sunday School Awards. The Numerical and Percentage awards went to the Arthur Church. Denver Villa Park Church won the Decade of Progress Ship for the year.

The secretary read the nominations for Examining Board member. They were James Flick and James Butler.

Ballots were cast for Examining Board member. While ballots were being counted the chair called for nominations for Education Board member. Secretary read nominations of the council. Bob Cheney and V. G. Story being the nominations read.

Ballots were cast for Educational Board Member.

The secretary read the nominations for District Missionary Society President, Sr. Floyd Hadsell and Sr. E. K. Purcell.

Tellers reported on the results of the voting for advisory members to the council. Brother Moller was elected.

Ballots were cast for the remaining two advisory members.

Tellers reported on Examining Board. Brother James Flick was elected.

Tellers reported on District Missionary President. Sr. Purcell was elected.

The Committee on Resolutions reported.

RESOLUTION NO. 1 — We recommend a called session of District Conference to meet on the last Saturday of Camp at 9:00 a.m. to pass upon Candidates for Ordination.

Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2 — WHEREAS the Word of God places much emphasis upon those called to the Ministry of the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ,

WHEREAS the Pilgrim Holiness Church makes provisions for a special service to ordain these, to such an important work, and such a service is a highlight in the life of the minister,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the ordination service be on the last Sunday evening of the District Camp, at the hour of 6:00 o'clock.

Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 3 — Be it resolved the last three paragraphs of standing rule 25, page 6, be replaced, that each licensed minister correspond with the study course agency, respecting his course and tests.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the seminar work be evaluated and credit be given by the study course agency.

Carried.

Tellers reported on Advisory Members to the council. Paul Gafford was elected.

Motion prevailed to vote on the two highest for the one more additional member. Ballots were cast. Brother W. F. Drown was elected.

The conference was recessed by expiration of time.

#### Evening Sitting

District Superintendent called the conference to order. Brother Moller led the conference in singing "In the Sweet By and By."

Brother Conard led in prayer.

Dr. Snyder asked for some promises from the Word of God. They were a source of encouragement.

Committee on Resolutions reported.

RESOLUTION NO. 4 — BE IT RESOLVED that standing rule No. 34 be deleted and the following resolution accepted in its place: In order to bring our Sunday Schools in line with the General Church policy,

BE IT RESOLVED that no Sunday School scholars be counted after the half way mark in the class period.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the yearly Sunday School average be based on the 50 best Sundays.

Carried.

Committee of Ways and Means reported.

Recommendation No. 1 — We recommend that standing recommendation No. 11, Page 8 be changed to read: "Be it resolved that each local church send to the District Treasurer each month an amount equivalent to 12% of all regular offerings. From this amount shall be taken 43% for United Stewardship fund, 45% be taken for District Budget and 12% for District Church Extension.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each church be assessed 50c per Senior member for International Conference expense fund.

Carried.

Recommendation No. 2 — Whereas there is the possibility of our District obtaining without cost the Colorado Springs First Church building for use on our camp ground as a dining hall,

BE IT RESOLVED that the council be authorized to negotiate with First Church on this matter.

Carried.

Rev. L. E. Schendel announced the names of committee members. — (See Directory)

The joint report of the Examining and Educational Board were read. (See Ministerial Directory) Motion prevailed to accept this report.

The secretary read the pastoral appointments.

The following Special Resolutions were read and approved by a standing vote:

We, the members of the Forty-second Annual Conference of the Rocky Mountain District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, resolve that there be given our chairman, Dr. Melvin Snyder, a rising vote of thanks to express our appreciation of his labor and love.

We, the members of the Forty-second Annual Conference of the Rocky Mountain District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, resolve that there be given to our District Superintendent, L. E. Schendel; our Secretary, D. L. Knierim; and our Treasurer, J. H. Fortner, a rising vote of thanks to express our appreciation of their faithfulness to us. Be it further resolved that there be given our cook, Mrs. Woolard, and all the kitchen and dining room help a rising vote of thanks to express our appreciation of their faithful service.

Motion prevailed to authorize the council to approve the minutes.

Dr. Snyder gave some closing remarks and expressed his regret that this would be the last conference he would be with us, because of the change of the Generals over the zones.

Brother Schendel spoke words of appreciation of J. H. Fortner, Marion B. Hill, Harold Bland and Dale Rummel, who are leaving our District.

Motion prevailed for adjournment.

The Conference joined their hearts in singing the "Doxology."

### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our presiding General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin Snyder, Pastors, Evangelists, and Lay Delegates of the 42nd Annual Conference of the Rocky Mountain District. We greet you with joy because of the unchanging promises of God in a changing world. We are living in fast and perilous times, and we need to guard ourselves lest we be swallowed up in the hurry of events and fail to take time to be Holy.

Again we find ourselves with the tasks of the church ever mounting. It seems that no matter what has been accomplished there ever remains a, "Pikes Peak" of tasks to be tackled and climbed above. The challenge of souls is ever before us, and we must push onward and upward.

We rejoice again this year over the mercies of God. In His good providence He has seen fit to spare the lives of all our ministers and the members of their households. He did see fit to call Sister Freed to follow home her late and beloved husband, Rev. F. L. Freed.

### **The "Feel" of the District**

I want to insert this paragraph this year to give a report of what I feel God is doing for us in a Spiritual way over the district. I am persuaded that with few, if any exceptions, there has been a Spiritual development among our people that is indeed heartwarming. I believe that the sincere desire of our pastors and our people is to be Spiritual first of all. This must ever be our goal, and this, coupled with a passion for souls will be a combination that God can and will bless.

### **Ministerial Improvements**

Pastors and people are doing a fine job in maintaining the local church properties. Other than the ordinary decoration and painting of the properties, the following improvements have been made:

The Arthur church people have purchased a very desirable residence for a parsonage, this is a much needed addition to the church property in Arthur. It was my pleasure to dedicate this building on the last Sunday of June. At this point the building is half paid for.

Colorado Springs Bethel church is now in the process of now completing negotiations for another church building. They will be having their first service in the new location in the northwest part of the city next Sunday, July 21. We feel this fine growing church will now be in a position for even greater growth.

Perhaps this should appear in next year's report, however, since it has already taken place I will report now that just one Sunday before camp meeting it was my pleasure to preside at a mortgage burning service at the Knob Hill church. This is a real mile stone in the history of the Knob Hill Church. I trust that the Lord will bless them until soon they will have to go into a program of expansion.

It was my pleasure to dedicate the new parsonage at Denver First church on May 26.

The folks at Fort Collins, under the capable leadership of Brother Hughes have made wonderful progress with their church parsonage and church building. The Hughes will soon be moving out of the trailer house into the parsonage and on August 25th they hope to have the dedication service for the church.

### **District Church Extension**

The conference has adopted the work at Thornton as its church extension project. This will have to be our project for a few years to come. The district has obligated itself to purchase the land for the new venture. We were able to get a very desirable location, however we had to pay a premium for it, \$10,000.00. This property, however, is adequate for church and parsonage and plenty of parking space. It was my privilege to organize this church on June 16 with 15 adult members and 4 junior members. It should be stated that First Church in Denver has "mothered" this work. Several of those who make up this new membership have come from the First Church. I feel that God will bless them, and any other group that has this kind of a vision. Under the leadership of Brother and Sister Butler we feel the prospects for a fine work in Thornton are bright indeed. This church with its pastor and delegate are to be presented to this conference.

### **Bible College**

Under the leadership of Brother Flexon our college has been pressing forward. Each of us were encouraged with his report to the camp meeting on the first Sunday of the camp. I urge every pastor and all of our people to pray earnestly for this necessary arm of our zone. Let us do our best to meet our financial obligation to the college.

### **Camp Ground**

There have been several of our churches which have met their camp ground quota in full, for this we are indeed grateful, however there are a number, including some of our larger churches, which are woefully behind in their obligation. This is causing a real problem. Either every church is going to have to meet its quota or we are going to have to re-finance our loan and prolong our payments over several more years of time. I feel that some pastors have not been behind this program as enthusiastically as they were when it was voted in. This is a project the ministers and lay delegates of this conference voted upon this district, and it is the responsibility of every minister and layman of this district to meet this obligation.

### **Camp Meeting**

The camp meeting, just closed, has been a real blessing to everyone privileged to attend. Brothers Stauffer and Jennings proved to be the men for the hour. They were faithful in proclaiming the truth and the Spirit was faithful in applying the same truth to the hearts of the hearers. The ministry in music of the Wagners was greatly appreciated. The fine cooperation of both laymen and ministers in the tabernacle, on the grounds, in the dormitories and the kitchen added to the success of the camp.

### **The New Parsonage**

In the good providence of God we have a new district parsonage. When all of the bills are paid to the present time there will still be some money left from the selling price of the old parsonage. This is only possible because of the hundreds of hours of donated labor. There is considerable work, however to be done and we may not be able to complete it without either incurring a small debt or selling off part of the original lot, which is a desirable thing to do. Since the building is not complete at this time, the financial report of the parsonage will not be given this year, however, if anyone wishes to look over the books they are available. Careful records of receipts and disbursements have been kept. This parsonage should prove adequate for the district superintendent for years to come.

### **Personal Report**

This past conference year I have preached 82 times, held 27 local church board meetings, 19 church meetings, and all of the annual meeting, and I have tried to visit all of the churches at least three times. As occasion presented itself I have assisted in communion services and other special services. It was my privilege to dedicate 2 parsonages, organize 1 church, dedicate babies and assist in other duties relative to my work. I have driven 17,794 miles for the district. Also I have travelled many miles to be at all of the college board and committee meetings, as well as being at the annual meeting of the church leaders at Indianapolis.
