## STANDING RULES

1. We recommend that the Ways and Means, Resolutions and Statistical Committees be appointed by the District Superintendent at the conference for the following year. Be it further resolved that any material may be presented to said committees during the year.

2. That the pastors verify the reports of their respective churches before sending them to the District Conference.

3. That all buildings such as churches, parsonages, or extensive improvements, be approved by the District Superintendent before construction.

4. That no church of our district shall call a pastor, evangelist, representative of world missions or other church institutions without first consulting the District Superintendent.

5. That the conference year close on June 30 and that all reports be in the hands of the district statistician by July 10th and that all district monies be sent to the district treasurer by the same date.

6. That we go on record as being opposed to our children having to dress, dance or do other things in the physical education department of the public schools in violation of our religious convictions and church standards.

7. Owing to the soon coming of Jesus and the great spiritual need of the world, be it resolved that each pastor be privileged to hold two revival meetings of two week duration each year with regular support paid, subject to the approval of the District Superintendent.

8. Be it resolved that we have a World Missionary Convention in the fall, time to be set by the District Council.

9. That the District Treasurer give an itemized account to the District Conference of where all the Home Missionary money was spent.

10. That all members pay their tithes into the church in which they retain their membership, according to Section 69 in the manual.

11. That the District secure and maintain all the books in the different courses of study as prescribed by the Manual in sufficient number to accommodate, if necessary, any candidate taking any one of the courses. That the Educational Committee formulate rules for the lending of such books, determine the number to be secured, and select custodian, subject to the approval of the District Council.

12. That the conference bar shall include the first seven rows of seats in the center and south sections and the platform.

13. Be it resolved that the time for Conference sittings be fixed as follows: 8:00 - 11:45 a.m., 1:45 - 5:00 p.m. and 6:30 - 9:00 p.m.

14. That the District Superintendent shall appoint all committees and fill all vacancies.

15. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be granted a two weeks' vacation with pay each year.

16. We recommend that each pastor be granted a two weeks' vacation with pay each year.

17. Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing immodest forms of dress so current today, such as sun suits, shorts or without stockings, dresses of immodest length, slacks, or similar garments. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public in shorts or without shirts.

18. Whereas the trend of worldliness is so prevalent and is making inroads in the Church, be it resolved that we strongly urge parents to dress their children according to the spirit of the Manual which sets forth a standard of modesty.

19. Be it resolved that District Minister's license shall not be granted to any person who does not have a definite call to, or who does not plan to enter the active ministry.

Be it further resolved that no licentiate be advanced in ministerial standing unless actively engaged in the ministry.

20. Be it resolved that each pastor report all seekers in the church of which he has the oversight.

21. Be it resolved that semi-annual zone Sunday School conventions be held for the purpose of encouraging the work of the Sunday School, such conventions to be arranged for, and supervised by the chairman of the District Sunday School Board if possible, or by some other member of the District Sunday School Board.

22. Whereas there is considerable work cleaning the camp ground and storing equipment. Be it resolved that each member of the conference remain one day after conference to assist the District Superintendent in doing the work.

23. We recommend that our laity be given recognition along with our ministry in the list of memorials.

24. Owing to the soon coming of Jesus and the great spiritual need of the world, Be it resolved that our District Superintendent be privileged to hold two revival meetings during the year outside of the district with regular support.

25. Whereas in accordance with the Manual be it "Resolved, that ministerial Study Course be put on a yearly basis with the requirement that three study books and three reading books be the minimum requirement," and that each licensed minister correspond with the study course agency respecting his course and test.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the seminar work be evaluated and credit be given by the study course agency.

26. Whereas it is very necessary at the time of pastoral change for the new pastor to become acquainted with his people as soon as possible and whereas the pastor leaving does not have adequate time for the preparation of a complete list of names and addresses of the members and constituency.

Therefore be it resolved that every pastor compile and keep up to date a complete file of all those attending his or her church.

27. Be it resolved that a printed statement be given each person registering at the Pikes Peak Holiness Camp showing registration requirements.

28. Whereas the District has purchased a suitable safe for all abstracts and legal papers, be it resolved all abstracts and other legal papers be placed in same.

29. Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches, under such conditions as required active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

30. Whereas the District Conference desires the continuation of the Rocky Mountain Pilgrim, with 10 issues per year,

We recommend the offices of Editor of the Rocky Mountain Pilgrim and the District Sunday School Secretary be combined.

31. Be it resolved that in case of the death of a minister or a member of the family, that the District Superintendent be responsible for notifying the pastors of the District, and the Conference to stand expense of same.

32. Whereas many times there are close friends and relatives of licensed ministers who want to attend the ordination service but are unable to do so because necessary announcement has not been made, be it resolved that the ordination service be announced prior to conference.

33. Whereas the majority of television programs are a definite hindrance to the spirituality of our people, bringing evil influence into the home: Be it resolved we go on record as opposing television.

34. In order to bring our Sunday Schools in line with General Policy:

BE IT RESOLVED that no Sunday School Scholars be counted after the half way mark in the class period.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the yearly Sunday School average be based on the 50 best Sundays.

35. We recommend the price of Conference Minutes be set at 50c each and that each pastor be responsible to collect and bring to conference the money for the number of minutes that his church desires.

36. Be it resolved that the time of district camp meeting be set as follows: To begin the Friday nearest to July 15.

37. A copy of the Rocky Mountain District by laws can be found on page 10 in the 1961 District Conference Minutes.

38. Inasmuch as ordination is to a young preacher something as important, or more so, than graduation from college and whereas he would feel badly having to wait until the following year to graduate, be it resolved that the ordination be held on conference day until a better solution of passing on the candidates by district conference before the Camp Meeting can be devised.

39. Be it resolved that recommendations for the Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees be sent to the chairmen of said committees not later than June 1st preceding the annual district conference. Be it further resolved that mimeographed copies of these recommendations be sent to each local church by July 1.

## STANDING RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. Be it resolved that the district superintendent be given a salary of \$350.00 per month, with district parsonage and utilities supplied. And further that he receive 6 cents per mile for mileage driven in his car for district work. When traveling otherwise, actual expense paid.

2. Be it resolved that if the District Superintendent prefers not to live in the district parsonage, the rent from same be returned to the district treasurer, and a reasonable housing allotment be paid the District Superintendent. Said allotment to be determined by the District Council according to the amount of rent received and necessary upkeep on the parsonage.

3. Be it resolved that the assistant district superintendent or any member of the council acting in the superintendent's place, or any member of the council traveling to council meetings be paid 5 cents per mile for mileage when driving their own car, or actual traveling expense when traveling otherwise. Be it further resolved that district youth, and district Sunday School Board members when traveling on their department business be given 5 cents per mile traveling expense when driving their own car, but that this expense be paid from their respective departments.

4. Be it resolved that the annual remuneration of the District Secretary be \$100.00 and that the District Treasurer be paid \$25.00 per month. Be it further resolved that the District Statisticians each be given \$15 per year, and that the salary for the combined offices of District Sunday School Secretary and Editor of the Rocky Mountain Pilgrim be set at \$50 per year.

5. We recommend that the local church pay the expenses of its delegates to and from District Conference.

6. Be it resolved that all attending the Pikes Peak Holiness Camp Meeting be properly registered. Each registrant twelve years of age and above, except active ministers and their families, will be required to pay a fee of \$2.00. Each registrant 12 years of age and above including active ministers and their families, will be required to pay a fee of 50c for insurance purposes.

Registration cards will be made so that each registrant be assigned specific duties in one of the work departments of the camp, the foreman of that detail to punch each card each day when duty has been performed. These duties will be assigned by a Camp Meeting Committee of three persons to be appointed by the District Superintendent.

We further recommend that an attendant be in charge at each meal to check registration cards and receive free-will offerings.

7. "Whereas the Rocky Mountain Conference has accepted the proposal of one half tuition scholarship for two students of our district to Central Pilgrim College, be it resolved that the youth council and youth Conference be granted the privilege of exercising the responsibility of this scholarship.

We further recommend that these students be chosen from the Pilgrim Holiness Ranks on the basis of the best scholastic and church records.

8. Be it resolved that each youth society, organized and unorganized, send 10 per cent of all its regular offerings to the district youth treasurer—5 per cent to be sent to the general youth treasurer, and the other 5 per cent to be kept for district youth operating expenses.

9. Be it resolved that each local church furnish its parsonage with at

least a cook stove, a heater, kitchen cabinet, six chairs, dining room table, and a dresser.

10. Be it resolved that each Sunday School pay 10c per enrolled Sunday School member per year for promotion of District Sunday School work.

11. Be it resolved that each local church send to the District Treasurer each month an amount equivalent to 12 per cent of all regular offerings. From this amount 43 percent shall be for United Stewardship fund, 45 per cent shall be for District Budget and 12 per cent shall be for District Church Extension.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each church be assessed 50c per senior member for International Conference expense fund.

12. Be it resolved that, in compliance with the request of our zone school board, each senior member of our district be assessed \$5.00 per year for Bible School budget, 25c of which will go for the Rocky Mountain Districts portion of the school boards travel expense, this budget to be raised in any way the local church may desire.

13. We recommend that each church take up a free will offering to help defray the expenses of the Ministerial Convention in March and that the offering be sent to the district treasurer two weeks prior to convention.

14. Due to the conference decision to build a new dining room and dormitory: Be it resolved that the district superintendent be authorized to take three special offerings in each church each year, 90% of said offerings to be applied to the dining room and dormitory debt and interest, and 10% to be set aside for maintenance and repair on the district camp ground.

We further recommend that the goal for these offerings be set at \$5.00 per year per member for this cause.

We further recommend that the district superintendent be authorized to take a special offering each year at District Camp to be applied to the dining room and dormitory debt and interest.

15. We recommend the district treasurer set aside the amount equal to 32 per cent of the United Stewardship fund from unspecified general church extension funds, the same to be included in the United Stewardship fund.

16. We recommend that the district superintendent meet with each local advisory board at least once each year to review the church's financial welfare and endeavor, wherever possible, to obtain yearly raises in pastor's support.

17. Be it resolved that the district pastors and unstationed ministers participating or non-participating in the Pension Plan, pay all their ministerial tithe into the district treasury to be applied to district administrative expense.

Be it further resolved that all district evangelists and teachers participating in the Pension Plan, pay their entire tithe into the district treasury. On the basis of the tithe paid to the district, the district treasurer shall pay the 8 per cent as required by the Pension Plan.

## PENSION PLAN

Whereas the General Church has adopted and recommended the Pilgrim Pension Plan as a sound method of providing retirement benefits for aged Pilgrim ministers, and Whereas the Rocky Mountain Conference has declared its endorsement of the plan, and whereas action taken at the 1954 General Conference makes it mandatory for each local church to participate in the plan, we therefore recommend that every church, no less than once each quarter, send to the district treasurer an amount equivalent to 8 per cent of the pastor's salary as the conference contribution to the Pension Plan.

# FORTY-FIFTH ANNUAL DISTRICT CONFERENCE

First Sitting July 25, 1966 — 8:00 a.m.

The Forty-Fifth Annual Assembly of the Rocky Mountain District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was called to order by District Superintendent W. J. Brown at 8:00 a.m. July 25, 1966, at the Camp Ground at 540 W. Monument, Colorado Springs, Colo.

Rev. Loren Rovenstine led the Conference in singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name."

The district superintendent then called the Conference to prayer asking Rev. D. E. Moller to pray.

After expressing appreciation to those making needed preparation for Conference, District Supt. W. J. Brown introduced General Supt. J. D. Abbott as the presiding officer of the Conference.

Rev. Abbott spoke words of greeting to the Conference, and mentioned his fond memories of one year ago when he labored as an evangelist in the Rocky Mountain Camp. He also mentioned his sorrow in the loss of Rev. Philpot who had been his co-worker in that camp. He then gave an inspiring, challenging exhortation from the writings of the Apostle Paul found in II Thes. 3. He stated that "there will always be a frontier for the Church, where there are open eyes, willing hands and prayerful hearts. He enlarged on several thoughts from this passage of scripture.

1. The concern of Paul's heart — Others (v.1)
2. The Holy Merchandise — God's Word "The Word of the Lord." We are not handling books or groceries but the living Word of God.
3. The unfettered Gospel — that it "may have free course." It must be presented with great wisdom and tact and not misrepresented.
4. The Redemptive triumph — "And be glorified."
5. The earnest solicitation — "Pray for us." Let our society be a praying society that the gospel may have free course.

The secretary read the roll: ordained ministers, licensed ministers, ordained deaconesses, and lay delegates.

The Conference bar was set according to standing rule 12 in Minutes.

The following were seated in the Conference bar to replace absent delegates. Alice Fisher for Fort Collins; Ina Martin for Imperial; Anita Swan for Lewellen and Josephine Howard for Superior.

The time for the conference sittings were mentioned by the chairman.

The secretary was asked to read the names of those ministers transferring to the Rocky Mountain District. One name was read, Phillip Nettleton, licensed minister, transferring from the Texas District. A motion prevailed that he be accepted into the conference.

District Supt. W. J. Brown read the report of the work of the conference the past year and then read his personal report. The report was received with great appreciation and a motion prevailed to accept it.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read by chairman Rev. Hubert Hughes. A motion prevailed to accept it.

The treasurer's report was read by District Treasurer V. G. Story. A motion prevailed to accept it.

Rev. Abbott expressed appreciation for the faithfulness of our district in paying the United Stewardship Fund. He mentioned that the Rocky Mountain District has been near the top and encouraged our continued support.

The District Statistical report was called for. However a motion prevailed to post report rather than read it in conference.

The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Hubert Hughes, then gave his report. In the report he mentioned Sunday Schools having highest percentage gains, as follows: Kiowa with 23% gain, Sutherland with 8% gain, Knob Hill with 5.7% gain and McCook with 3% gain. Colorado Springs First Church was again award the "Decade of Progress" Ship. A motion prevailed to receive his report.

The District Missionary Society President, Mrs. V. G. Story, gave a fine report on the activities of the Society for the past year. A motion prevailed to receive it.

Report on Memoirs by the chairman, Rev. Verneeda Brown, was received with reverence and a sense of loss. Members of the conference stood for silent prayer after which J. D. Abbott led in prayer.

The recommendations of the combined Educational and Examining Boards were read by Rev. Robert Cheney. A motion prevailed to accept it.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. Phillip Nettleton to the Conference. Bro. Abbott extended words of welcome and mentioned that he had already been accepted into the conference. Bro. Nettleton then gave a word of testimony.

Dorothy Bersley, by action of the conference, was seated in the conference bar.

A motion was made and seconded that the first order of business in the afternoon sitting be the Ordination Service. It was carried.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was called for but they were not ready to report. Likewise other committees.

Elections were the next order of business.

While preparation was being made, General Supt. J. D. Abbott reported on further development in merging with the Wesleyan Methodist Church. He mentioned that most of the Wesleyan Conference voting thus far were favorable to the merger. He also pointed out that an organizational plan had been adopted at the International Conference promoting a world wide program which will greatly help us whether we merge or not.

District Supt. W. J. Brown appointed tellers: Hubert Hughes at the board; D. E. Moller and Robert Sander to read and Marvin Jenkins, Jim Koons, Loren Rovenstine and Melvin Brown to hand out and receive ballots.

Ballots were cast for district superintendent. W. J. Brown was elected with a fine majority. He expressed appreciation for the confidence of the conference and stated that he felt God wanted to help our district to make progress in the coming year.

Ballots were cast for assistant district superintendent. D. E. Moller was elected.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. and Mrs. R. A. Kerby, Mr. and Mrs. John Goodwin and Dr. F. Owen and they were introduced to the conference. W. J. Brown was asked to say a few words concerning the Paonia work which the Goodwins were representing. After this, R. A. Kerby, John Goodwin and Dr. Owen gave words of testimony. They were granted honorary seats in the conference bar.

The Reception Committee then brought forward Mrs. J. D. Abbott and she was introduced to the conference. After a word of testimony, she was granted a seat in the conference bar.

Elections continued and ballots were cast for district secretary. D. L. Knierim was elected.

Ballots were cast for district treasurer and V. G. Story was elected.

A motion prevailed to adjourn the morning sitting after ballots had been cast for the three additional council members. Ballots were cast for three additional council members.

Announcements were made and D. E. Moller dismissed the morning session with prayer.

#### Afternoon Sitting

General Superintendent J. D. Abbott called the Conference to order for the afternoon sitting. An additional report was heard from the Educational Board and Examining Board, recommending J. C. Beckner for ordination. This was ratified by the conference.

The order of the day was an Ordination Service.

Hubert Hughes led the conference in singing two songs: "A Charge to Keep" and "Rock of Ages."

W. F. Drown led in prayer. D. L. Knierim read a portion of scripture found in II Tim. 4:1-8, followed by the reading of Titus 3:1-11 by V. G. Story. The candidates for ordination, J. C. Beckner and Dwight L. Kahre, were presented to the general superintendent, J. D. Abbott, by our district superintendent, W. J. Brown. Brother Abbott then addressed the candidates, reading a portion of God's Word, and speaking on the subject, "The Responsibility of Preaching." He stated that the duties of the ministry are many, preaching the word, visitation, soul winning, counseling, overseeing the educational program of the church, denominational activities and programs, pointing out, however, that the primary function of the ministry was preaching the Word of God. He stated, "The task of the ministry is too staggering for the indolent person." He then mentioned areas that would suffer unless we are on our guard. Bible study, disciplined devotional life, preparation, organization, visitation, time and that of daydreaming rather than really getting the job done. He mentioned an old saying, "It is better to build mud huts where you are than to build marble castles where you aren't."

The Ordination Charge was then presented and they were invited to the altar where the Ordination Committee laid hands upon them and prayed for them. They were greeted by the Ordination Committee and then members of the conference greeted them while Lloyd Smith played, "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow" on the piano.

Again the election of Conference officers was the order of the day.

Report was heard from the tellers as to the results of the balloting for three additional council members. There was one election: Floyd Hadsell.

A motion prevailed to vote on the four highest for two additional council members. Ballots were cast and W. F. Drown was elected.

Ballots were cast for one more additional council member. A motion prevailed to proceed with elections while ballots were being counted.

Ballots were cast for Educational Board Member. The secretary read the nominations from the Council: Clifford Conard and Floyd Kelley. Floyd Kelley was elected.

Ballots were cast for Examining Board member. Secretary read the nominations of council, as follows: James Flick and Roy Berkley. James Flick was elected.

Ballots were cast for District Missionary Society president. Mrs. V. G. Story was elected.

Ballots were cast again for one more member to the council. Hubert Hughes was elected, thus completing the new council.

The Resolutions Committee presented one resolution.

No. 1. Inasmuch as the work of promoting the district work of the Pilgrim Youth Society is a large enough job for one man; Be it resolved that the offices of District Youth President and CYC Director be separated and a district CYC director appointed. Carried.

The Committee on Camp Ground Improvement reported.

Recommendation 1. In investigating camp facilities we have found that there are several improvements that need to be made on the camp dormitory. The district missionary society has taken the responsibility of buying paint for the same. The building is in great need of repair, such as pointing up the outside walls, repairing ceilings, etc.

Furthermore, the building of a new dining room and kitchen seem to be imperative, and seems to have considerable interest throughout the district. The type of building considered is a two story block construction with a kitchen and dining room on first floor, rest rooms and dormitory on the second floor. The size of the building would be approximately 32 ft. wide and 76 feet long. The estimated cost of these improvements would be near \$15,000.00.

It was moved and seconded to adopt, but lost.

A motion was then made and seconded to appoint a committee to study camp grounds. It was carried.

The Ways and Means Committee reported.

Recommendation No. 1: "Due to the action of the International Conference in raising our budget, we recommend that each local church be faithful in sending in their 12% each month which would take care of this new obligation. Carried.

Recommendation No. 2 was read. (replaces No. 17). "Be it resolved that the district pastors and unstationed ministers participating or non-participating in the Pension Plan, pay all their ministerial tithe into the district treasury to be applied to district administration expense.

"Be it further resolved that all district evangelists and teachers participating in the Pension Plan, pay their entire tithe into the district treasury. On the basis of the tithe paid to the district, the district treasurer shall pay the 8 per cent required by the Pension Plan." It was moved and seconded to adopt. Carried.

The conference recessed until 4:15. Conference reconvened at 4:15.

Council appointees were read by the secretary. Hubert Hughes as Sunday School Promotional Secretary, James Koons as Sunday School treasurer for the coming year; Robert Sander, CYC director and D. L. Knierim, Public Relations man.

It was moved and seconded to ratify. Carried.

Committees appointed by the district superintendent were read by W. J. Brown and ratified by the conference.

The Ways and Means Committee reported again.

Recommendation No. 3: "Be it resolved that the district superintendent be authorized to take three special offerings this church year in each church in an effort to raise \$5.00 per member to finish paying our camp ground debt, and repair our dormitory. If this goal is attained, approximately \$3,500.00 would be raised. It was carried.

The Pastoral appointments were read by the district secretary and ratified by the conference.

The previous vote concerning the camp ground improvement and build-

ing of new dining room was challenged. It was moved and seconded to have another vote and that the motion from the Improvement Committee be read again. Carried. A standing vote was taken — 35 for proposal and 20 opposing. Carried.

The Ways and Means Committee reported.

Recommendation No. 4: (replaces No. 14). "Due to the conference decision to build a new dining room and dormitory: Be it resolved that the district superintendent be authorized to take three special offerings in each church during the year, 90% of said offerings to be applied to the dining room and dormitory debt and interest, and 10% to be set aside for maintenance and repair on the camp ground.

We further recommend that the goal for these offerings be set at \$5.00 per year, per member for the district.

We further recommend that the district superintendent be authorized to take a special offering each year at district camp to be applied to the dining room and dormitory debt and interest.

It was carried, thus negating former recommendation No. 3.

District Supt. W. J. Brown mentioned the possibility of renting the south room on the main floor of the old dormitory to the Bristol School for kindergarten class room; if so the area rented would be redecorated and also a part of needed finance for building improvement would be made possible.

General Supt. J. D. Abbott challenged the conference to back the district council in promotion of progress in support and prayer. A motion prevailed to pledge themselves in this behalf.

The following special resolutions were read and approved by a standing vote:

We, the members of the Forty-Fifth Annual Conference of the Rocky Mountain District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, resolve that there be given our chairman, General Supt. J. D. Abbott, a rising vote of thanks to express our appreciation for his labor of love.

We, the members of the Forty-Fifth Annual Conference of the Rocky Mountain District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, resolve that there be given to our district superintendent, W. J. Brown; our secretary, D. L. Knierim, and our treasurer, V. G. Story, a rising vote of thanks to express our appreciation for their faithfulness to us. Be it further resolved that there be given our cook, Lois Rothfuss, and all the kitchen and dining room help a rising vote of thanks to express our appreciation for their faithful service.

A motion prevailed for the district council to take care of all unfinished business and to hear the reading of the conference minutes.

General Supt. J. D. Abbott expressed his appreciation to the conference and mentioned that he would be praying for our district and leaders. He exhorted the people again to uphold our superintendent and officers, also standards of God's Word and true righteousness.

District Supt. W. J. Brown then announced that J. D. Abbott would be our Ministerial Convention speaker in March.

A motion prevailed to adjourn. The chorus was started, "When we all get to heaven," and the conference joined in with grateful hearts for the good conference the Lord had given.

Superintendent W. J. Brown was asked by General Supt. J. D. Abbott to have the benediction.

## DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our presiding general superintendent, Rev. J. D. Abbott, pastors, evangelists and lay delegates of the 45th annual conference of the Rocky Mountain District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings in Jesus dear Name. Another time the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ has enabled us to gather for the great occasion of hearing reports and charting the course of our district. With the passing of another church year we are brought closer to the return of our Master Who said, "Occupy till I come." As we are assembled here today these words ring in our ears with the force and import in which they were spoken. It is my sincere desire that all the business of this conference will be transacted under their influence.

As we glance over our shoulder to the year which is past, we are reminded of the goodness of the Lord, the battles fought, and the victories won. Perhaps the change in district leadership this year has slowed our pace in some areas, however, it seems to me there is marked improvements in our work in some areas and you are to be commended and the Lord praised for all which has been accomplished.

This has been a busy year with the international conference and two youth camps in one church year. It seemed to be the feeling of many who attended the international conference that it was one of the very best. There is no question of the presence of the Lord as the conference progressed. The merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church seems nearer than ever before. Other plans were laid for the next quadrennium which, if Jesus tarries, will mean advancement for His cause and which should be an encouragement to all His saints.

Because of having our youth camp in June this year it made two youth camps for this church year. The Lord placed His seal of approval upon both these camps. The youth of our district are showing an interest in things spiritual and if you, pastors, can continue to give them the guidance and support which you are now, I feel we will be given workers to the much needy field of the ministry.

### LOCAL CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS

Much has been done this year to improve the properties of the district and the pastors and people alike are to be commended. I have endeavored to mention every church which has told me of any improvements made this year. If my record is incomplete I trust you will consider it human weakness and not intentional.

ARTHUR — Finished paying the loan on their parsonage and had a mortgage burning service.

BOULDER — Placed a new altar in the sanctuary and put a carport on the parsonage.

CAMPO — Fixed guest room in church basement and planted new lawn.

CANON CITY — Painted church exterior and front of the parsonage.

COLORADO SPRINGS, FIRST — Tiled the basement floor, did some interior painting, and placed drainage around church exterior.

GRAND JUNCTION — Redecorated the parsonage.

IMPERIAL — Put new siding on the church.

LAMAR — Put new roof on the annex, new floors in parsonage and refinished the floor in the sanctuary.

McCOOK — Redecorated the parsonage kitchen and their classrooms in church basement, also put new front doors on church.

**OSHKOSH** — Put new plumbing in the parsonage bath and new pews and piano in the church.

**PUEBLO WEST PARK** — Completely rewired church and remodeled the church basement.

**ROCKY FORD** — Finished another bedroom in the parsonage and built a garage.

**SUPERIOR** — Rewired and remodeled the church basement.

**SUTHERLAND** — Put a new floor covering in the parsonage living and dining rooms and painted the parsonage.

Each of these improvements were much needed and have added to the value and usability of our property.

### **CAMP GROUND**

Many of our churches have faithfully kept up their share in this part of our district work. Some have failed and so an offering has been taken in the camp just past which nearly cares for this debt. In this conference material will be given to you for improvements which the committee feels are necessary.

### **BIBLE COLLEGE**

The Lord has blessed through another year at CPC and it appears we will soon have the initial debt erased. This, because of your loyal support of our college. The Rocky Mountain District is well represented in the student body and it has been our aim to keep a spirit of loyalty to the district among our students while they are in college, thus encouraging them to return to our district to pastor.

### **CAMP MEETING**

In the district camp just past the Lord has moved among us another time. The preaching and singing were of the highest quality. From the very beginning there was an excellent spirit which prevailed throughout the camp. My heart is filled with praises to God "for His wonderful works among the children of men." May He help you to return to your churches with a holy glow upon your life which will spread through the entire lay body of our district.

### **MY PERSONAL REPORT**

It has been my privilege to labor with you this year as your district superintendent. May I say the pastors and laymen alike have been gracious and longsuffering during this time of adjustment. I feel the brethren have responded well and this is much appreciated.

I have preached 81 times; visited the local churches 88 times; held 28 board meetings; 33 church business meetings; 6 council meetings. I have attended 3 zone meetings; all of the CPC board meetings and executive committee meetings; and the leaders' conference at headquarters held in February; also the international conference. I have personally conducted all the local church annual meetings. I have traveled a total of 24,498 miles in the district work. Part of these miles have been by air as it is cheaper for the district and saves much time. I have had one wedding, two funerals and dedicated two babies. To the best of my ability I have endeavored to carry out all of the duties of my office and be of assistance to our pastors whenever possible. My salary is paid in full. Your Christmas gift to us was received with much appreciation and is being enjoyed by all who chance to share our home with us.

As we face the future the job which is ours to perform is certainly a

momentous one. This year we should plan to have more churches cooperating in the CYC and PELT programs of the church. The records show our total Sunday School attendance has been on the down grade. This is due in part, perhaps, to the lack of workers which necessitated the closing of some of our churches. However, God forbid we should hide behind this. Some of our Sunday Schools have broken their previous records in attendance, thus others must be showing great losses. The great command still stands and we must have a greater out-reach for the lost.

Our district paper, "The Rocky Mountain Pilgrim," should be improved even above that which it has been this year. Your help is being enlisted to do this. Plans are being made to strengthen our district home missions program. I am not interested in reporting a certain number of new churches as such, but I am interested in starting new churches and getting them self supporting. This is the only way the work can go forward. May God help us to realize the fulfillment of this desire.

I urge each of the pastors of this district to covenant with God at this conference to return to your respective fields of labor to see more accomplished for God and the church this year than you did the year just past.
