GENERAL PROCEEDINGS

With the echoes of a blessed and divinely owned camp meeting reverberating in our hearts, the ministers and delegates of the Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened Monday morning, July 7, 1941, in the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Staunton, Virginia, in their Twentieth Annual Assembly.

Monday Morning

A devotional service preceded the business sessions. The song service was in charge of Rev. C. M. Muse. Brother Baldwin of North Carolina, in his characteristic manner, offered prayer.

A letter of greetings was read by the Secretary from our General Superintendent, Rev. W. L. Surbrook. A motion of appreciation was passed for the letter from the General Superintendent.

District Superintendent Rev. D. E. Snow presented Rev. R. G. Flexon, First Assistant General Superintendent, and added words of appreciation for the life and ministry of Brother Flexon.

After words expressing his pleasure of again being with the saints of the Virginia District, Brother Flexon read Scripture portions from Matthew, chapters 16, 18, and Luke, chapter 11. "Prayer" was chosen for the subject of the message. The following thoughts were noted relative to prayer: The "plan, parable, promise, power, and purpose of prayer." In particular the "purpose" of prayer was discussed.

The roll of both the Ministerial and Lay Delegates was called.

Moved and seconded that the first seven seats of the middle section of the Church constitute the Assembly bar. Carried.

A motion prevailed to rescind the former action relative to the Assembly bar. Moved and seconded that the first five seats across the Church constitute the Assembly bar. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the District Superintendent set the time for the business sessions. Carried,

The hours for business were set as follows: 1:30 P. M. to 5 P. M., and 7:00 to 9:00 P. M.

The report of Rev. D. E. Snow, District Superintendent, was given. In connection with the District Superintendent's personal report, he gave a summary of the progress and prospects of the District.

Moved and seconded that the Superintendent's report be accepted, and the motion was amended to include the report relative to the summary of the District. Carried as amended.

Moved and seconded that the Assembly recess for forty-five minutes, Carried.

The Assembly was dismissed with prayer by Brother Snow.

On reconvening, the Assembly sang "Amazing Grace".

The Committee on Memorials to the General Assembly reported.

Memorial No. 1 died for want of a motion.

Memorial No. 2 died for the want of a motion.

Motion that we adjourn. Carried.

Brother Flexon dismissed the Assembly with prayer.

Monday Afternoon

The afternoon sitting began by singing "A Charge To Keep I Have", and "Near the Cross". We were led_in prayer by Brothers Guill, Puffen-

barger and Dunn. After two verses of "Draw Me Nearer" (on our knees), Scripture quotations were given from the floor.

The roll was called.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. M. A. Baldwin to the Assembly. Brother Flexon spoke of the godly life of Brother Baldwin. By motion, Brother Baldwin was granted a seat in the Assembly bar.

The minutes were read and approved.

The Auditors' Report was given and by motion was received.

The Resolution Committee reported.

Resolution No. 1: Carried as amended.

Resolution No. 2: Carried.

Resolution No. 3: Carried.

Resolution No. 4: Carried.

Brother Hocking was granted the privilege of giving an explanation relative to the money received from the District Treasurer for the Camp Meeting.

The Memorial Committee reported.

Memorial No. 3: Lost.

Moved and seconded that Memorial No. 2 on page 16 of 1940 Minutes be reconsidered. Motion was lost.

Moved and seconded that the election of officers be at 3:30 P. M. Motion was lost.

Moved and seconded that when the Camp Meeting report is completed it be sent to the Secretary, and placed in the Minutes. Carried.

The District Treasurer's report was given, and accepted by motion.

The Ways and Means Committee reported:

Recommendation No. 1: Tabled by motion.

Moved and seconded that the election of officers be immediately. Carried.

The following tellers were appointed: Brothers Muse, Puffenbarger, Howard and Jackson.

The following officers were elected: Rev. D. E. Snow, District Superintendent; Rev. H. H. Michael, Assistant District Superintendent; Rev. G. A. Castevens, District Secretary; Rev. J. E. Kraus, District Treasurer; Advisory Members, Rev. O. T. Bowles, Rev. C. A. Cooper, Rev. O. W. Bogan. Rev. E. J. Hocking was elected for three years to the Board of Education and Examination.

Motion that the District Trustees be elected by acclamation, and that the Trustees remain as last year. Carried.

The following Ministerial Delegates were elected to the General Assembly: Rev. J. E. Guill, Rev. C. H. Flexon, Rev. C. A. Cooper.

The following were elected as Ministerial Alternates to the General Assembly: Rev. E. J. Hocking, Rev. O. T. Bogan.

The following Lay Delegates were elected to the General Assembly: D. B. Driver, J. S. Harlow. R. R. Kirtz was elected as the Lay Delegate Alfernate.

Moved and seconded that the time be extended until election is completed. Carried.

Moved and seconded that in case the delegates cannot go to the General Assembly, that they inform the alternates at least a week to ten days previously. Carried.

The Assembly adjourned by expiration of time, and Brother Southall dismissed with prayer.

Monday Evening

The song service was in charge of Rev. I. T. Dunn. Brothers Ferry and Norton led in prayer.

Our presiding officer, Rev. R. G. Flexon, addressed the Assembly, using Haggai 1:8 as a text. He spoke on "A Few Ways God Can Be Glorified In the Church". The following thoughts were discussed relative to the subject: "When the Church is unified, when the Church has an objective, cheerful attendance at the Church, letting the public know the location of the Church, when the spiritual walls of the Church are not tempered with untempered mortar, when the Church's privileges are not curbed by carnal members, when people are getting sanctified, when Jesus Christ lives in and dwells in the Church." Because of the outpouring of the Spirit, the shouts and rejoicing of the saints, the following motion was carried in order to have some time for business:

Moved and seconded the time be extended an hour. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we dispense with the roll call. Carried.

The Ways and Means Committee reported:

Recommendation No. 1 was lifted from the table, and was discussed.

Moved and seconded that Recommendation No. 1 be tabled in order to hear other recommendations.

Recommendation No. 2 was read and discussed.

We adjourned by expiration of time, and Brother Snow dismissed with prayer.

Tuesday Morning

The service began with the singing "I'm a Child of The King", and "When We All Get To Heaven". Prayer was offered by Brothers Byrd Puffenbarger and Driver. Brother Howard read the 12th chapter of Romans.

The Puffenbarger brothers rendered duets entitled "Your Roses May Have Thorns" and "Jesus, Lover of My Soul." Brother Snow presented the matter of improving the Camp Grounds to the Assembly.

Recommendation No. 1 was lifted from the table.

Moved and seconded that Recommendation No. 2 be substituted for Recommendation No. 1. The motion to substitute was lost.

Moved and seconded that the matter of finances be referred back to the Committee, and that they formulate a system that will include all our needs. Carried.

We adjourned by expiration of time, and the Secretary dismissed with prayer.

Tuesday Afternoon

Brother Muse was in charge of the song service. Prayer was offered by Brothers Howard and Castevens.

Brother Flexon presented the Foreign Missionary Calendar to the Assembly.

The Board of Education and Examination reported, and the report was accepted by motion by the Assembly.

The Committee on Memorials reported:

Memorial No. 4. Covered by the Manual.

Memorial No. 5 was amended to read "at the discretion of the minister." The amendment was lost.

Memorial No. 5 was carried.

Memorial No. 6 was read and discussed.

The previous question was called for, and Memorial No. 6 was carried.

The Ways and Means Committee reported.

Recommendation No. 3, after being discussed, was carried.

Moved and seconded that the remaining half of the ministers' tithes be applied on the budgets. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Assembly recess for five minutes, and on reconvening the Ordination service be the order of the day. Carried.

A very impressive Ordination service was conducted by Rev. R. G. Flexon, in which Brother Alvin Jackson and Sister Mabel Boggs were set apart to the ministry.

Moved and seconded that the time be extended until business is finished. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the appointment of Committees be left in the hands of the District Superintendent and the District Council. Carried.

Moved and seconded that pledges be taken from the Assembly floor to pay for the printing of the Minutes. Carried. Pledges to the amount of \$43.00 were taken.

Moved and seconded the same set up of District stationery and report blanks remain as last year. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the motion relative to the ministers paying half of their tithes on the budgets be rescinded. Motion was lost,

Moved and seconded we give Brother Flexon, our presiding officer, a rising vote of thanks for his service during the Assembly. Carried.

Brother Flexon commended us to the keeping of the loving heavenly Father.

Report of the District

We all have reason to believe that this has been a good year in all our Churches. Some gracious revivals have been had and the spiritual condition of the District is encouraging. We praise the Lord for all He is doing for us. This year, we have had several open doors, to us as a District. The Church at Deltaville has desired to have a Pilgrim Holiness Church. We feel that in just a short time, we will have an organized Church there. They are making plans to turn over their Church and camp grounds to the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and it is debt free.

We have an excellent opportunity at Five Points, near Gwynns Island—a church building, owned by a man who desires to give it to us if we can establish a work. Attendance is good and they had a gracious revival this year. This prospect is good.

We have another at Germans—a good opportunity to do a good work in an interested community. Brother Norton is being used of the Lord in these open doors.

The Church at Clancy, near Beulah—Brother Michael has been asked to preach there, and he has been going there for some time, with splendid results.

Our prospects at Newport News or Hampton Roads are excellent. With the Defense program in full swing, it is bringing into this Peninsula thousands of people. There isn't a distinctive holiness church at work there. The field is wide open to us. In the two campaigns there, we have twenty or more people interested in having a Pilgrim Holiness Church there. We have a building fund started, and a gracious saint (a widow) gave us an acre of ground that we feel sure will bring five hundred dollars. In our four weeks of broadcasting we reached many people, and we have had response from at least six other towns in reach of the station. The Broadcasting Company has offered us a contract for the programs we desire to put on, at a cost of only ten dollars per half hour. Now is our time for this work.

As the coming of the Lord nears, we should enter every open door, and work while it is day, for the night cometh. Let us pray that the Lord will help us as we plan for the coming days.

Resolution No. 13. Resolved that Resolution No. 11 read thus: "That we have a Camp Meeting Committee of five who shall have full supervision of the Camp".

Resolution No. 14. Resolved that we drop Resolution No. 2 of 1939 Resolutions.

Resolution No. 15. Dropped.

Resolution No. 16. Resolved that since our District Camp Meeting will be at Staunton, that a permanent date be fixed, and the Assembly year close May 31st, and the Assembly convene at Staunton on Monday at 8:30 a. m., following the close of Camp.

Resolution No. 17. Resolved that the District build a parsonage for the District Superintendent.

Resolution No. 18. Resolved that all Licensed Ministers who have been denied the privilege of attending Bible School be required to take the correspondence course from Allentown Bible Institute, leading to Ordination.

Resolution No. 19. Resolved that we appease Recommendation No. 8 under Ways and Means.

Resolution No. 20. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall appoint a committee of two that shall act with himself as the Evangelistic League.

Resolution No. 21. Resolved that the Evangelistic League revert back to the former custom, the District Superintendent being Chairman, and appointing two others to serve with him.

Resolution No. 22. Resolved that the Annual District Young People's Rally be held the first Friday night, Saturday and Sunday of the Annual Camp

Resolution No. 23. Resolved that Resolution No. 2, under "Previous years", be deleted from the Minutes.

Resolution No. 24. Resolved that no person who is a member of the Virginia District of the Filgrim Holiness Church be permitted to wear a ring.

Resolution No. 25. Be it resolved that all Resolutions be grouped in one group and numbered accordingly.

Ways and Means Recommendations

Recommendation No. 1. We recommend that the Churches pound the Pastors at least once a month.

Recommendation No. 2. We recommend that pledges be taken from the Assembly floor to cover the publication of the Assembly Minutes, same to be included in the budget.

Recommendation No. 3. We recommend that the Missionary Budget of \$2.00 or more per member be raised as a Foreign Missionary fund by best methods suited to local conditions.

Recommendation No. 4. We recommend that each local Church, each Pastor and each Evangelist forward to the District Treasurer through the local Treasurer an offering equivalent to \$1.00 per representative of the Annual Assembly, to help defray the expense of the Assembly.

Recommendation No. 5. We recommend that each Church take a special offering and also a donation or pounding for the support of the District Camp Meeting. Said cash offering to be sent to the District Treasurer at least thirty days previous to the Camp. (Added Recommendation of 1938). We recommend that we add to this, pledges for donations be taken from the Assemby floor.

Recommendation No. 6. We recommend that the Evangelistic League shall be free to raise money in addition to the budget for Church Extension work.

Recommendation No. 7. We recommend that each local Treasurer forward to the District Treasurer all offerings for General and District funds by the 20th of each month.

Recommendation No. 8. We recommend that we have a Church Extension fund, this fund to be raised by each Church paying an average of at least one per cent. of the regular offerings. This fund is to be used for buying or building Church property in the District only. And Church borrowing fom this fund shall give a note signed by the Trustees and a deed of trust for the amount borrowed. This fund shall be under the control of the District Council.

Recommendation No. 9. We recommend that the Young People's Societies of the District send in an offering to the District Camp to help defray expenses of free entertainment at the Young People's Convention. These offerings may be taken monthly in the Young People's Society.

Recommendation No. 10. We recommend that the following plan be used in raising funds for Bible School:

	\$.50 per month
A Church of 10 to 20 to pay	1.00 per month
A Church of 20 to 30 to pay	1.50 per month
A Church of 30 to 40 to pay	2.00 per month
A Church of 40 to 60 to pay	2.50 per month
A Church of 60 tor more to pay	3.00 per month

Recommendation No. 11. We recommend that we as an Assembly go on record to support the request of the Allentown Bible Institute when and if all the other Districts in the Zone adopt it.

Recommendation No. 12. Inasmuch as we have a Camp Meeting Association, we recommend that Recommendation No. 11, page 15, be deleted from the Minutes. Carried.

Recommendation No. 13. We recommend that our District and General Budgets be set at \$2,985.00, this to cover Foreign Missions, General Budget, District incidentals, District Home Missions, General Assembly expense, contingency or emergency fund, and last year's deficits. We further recommend that our District Superintendent receive as his remuneration, one-half of Minister's tithe for which he will visit each Church twice this year, his traveling expenses to be raised by free-will offerings at time of the visit.

Memorials to the General Assembly

Memorial No. 1. Since the colored man in the United States is just as precious in the sight of God as any other in the world, and since we have raised hundreds of dollars to evangelize the colored man abroad and nothing to evangelize in the homeland, be it resolved that this General Assembly make definite plans to evangelize the black race in the United States.

Memorial No. 2. Inasmuch as so many ungodly organizations and unorthodox organizations have adopted the word "Assembly" for their gatherings, we recommend that the word "Assembly" connected with our General and District Church be changed to the word "Conference".

Memorial No. 3. Since the membership of the Ministerial Associations of our cities are composed of lodge members and show-going preachers, Be it therefore resolved that none of our Ministers unite with or take part in their meetings.

Memorial No. 4. Since our Manual prohibits our Ministers from performing marriage ceremonies for those who are divorced and have a living companion, and since no divoced person who is remarried is eligible for office in our Church, Be it therefore resolved that no divorced person living in a state of wedlock with another party while their former companion still lives, shall be eligible for membership in the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
