Conference Proceedings

MORNING SITTING, AUGUST 20, 1956

The Thirty-fifth Conference of the Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 A.M., on August 20, 1956, at the District Camp Ground. Mr. C. M. Price led the congregation in singing, "Stepping in the Light." Rev J. Herbert Norton read the 45th chapter of Ezekiel and the 114th Psalm. Mr. D. B. Driver then led the congregation in prayer.

The District Superintendent, Rev. J. E. Guill introduced the Presiding Chairman, Rev. William H. Neff, General Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church with appropriate words of welcome. Rev. Neff gave a brief testimony of God's special help during his recent illness and requested prayer for his continued recovery. Using the "Forward Movement" as the basis of his talk, he challenged us to GROW as a Church. From Paul's writings he brought out the fact that true religion has "Faith, Feeling and Fruitage." This fruitage is among other things definite numerical growth. While we seek growth he further challenged us to go deeper in our own devotional lives and to lead our people deeper.

Following this inspiring address, the Conference bar was set as the first seven rows of seats across the center and right hand section of the tabernacle. The Reception Committee then presented Rev. Lloyd Edge, Rev. Charles Stout and Rev. W. M. Marksberry to the Conference. These men have accepted pastorates in our District and were received into our fellowship with the provision that letters of transfer will be forthcoming from their respective conferences. The hours of sitting were established as follows:

Morning: 9 A. M. to 12 Noon

Afternoon: 2 P.M. to 5 P.M.

Evening: 7 P.M. to 9:30 P.M.

Rev. Charles Muse was appointed to serve on the Reception Committee for this Conference. The Roll Call of Ministerial and Lay Delegates was then read.

Rev. J. E. Guill, District Superintendent, then read his report. It was received with expressions of appreciation for the work done during the past year.

The Conference welcomed Rev. and Mrs. Frank Nason, visitors from Eastern District and Rev. and Mrs. W. C. Wheedleton former pastors in our District to our Conference.

Rev. Byrd Puffenbarger read his personal report as Assistant District Superintendent. This was accepted by the Conference.

Preliminary report of the Auditing Committee was received by the Conference after which Rev. I. T. Dunn presented the District Treasurer's report. Many expressions of appreciation for the fine work done were given as the report was received. The session adjourned by expiration of time and was dismissed with prayer.

AFTERNOON SITTING

The afternoon sitting of the Conference was opened with singing, "I'll Live For Him." Rev. G. A. Castevens, District Superintendent of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District was presented to the Conference and then led in prayer. He was granted a voice and seat in the Conference.

In his afternoon message Rev. Neff again spoke on the "Forward Movement" of the Church. He urged each Church and each minister to do their best to make the Movement a success.

The District Statistician reported. In addition to the statistics graphical data was given to clearly pin point our position as a District. The report of the Resolutions Committee was then called for. They reported as follows:

Resolution No. 1. Be it resolved that there be an annual youth camp under the direction of the Youth Council, the dates to be set by the Youth Council with the approval of the District Superintendent. This was adopted.

Resolution No. 2. Be it resolved that there be a Fellowship Meeting to be held quarterly in each zone. The District Superintendent is to appoint the zone leaders. Adopted.

Resolution No. 3. Be it resolved that Resolution No. 3 on page 20, of the 1955 Conference Minutes be deleted. Approved.

Resolution No. 4. Resolved that we adopt as our slogan at this Conference of 1956: "Gearing our program to the needs rather than to our limitations." "I will lift up mine eyes to the hills from whence cometh my help." Psalms 121:1. Adopted

Resolution No. 5. In order that the printing of our Minutes might be speeded up, be it resolved that the District Secretary and the Editing Committee shall get together before the Secretary and the Editing Committee go home from Conference. The District Secretary shall furnish the Editing Committee with a rough draft of the Conference Minutes. The Editing Committee shall then immediately proceed to make preparation for the printing of the Minutes. Approved by the Conference.

Ballots were cast for the three advisory members on the District Council. The following were elected:

Rev. O. W. Bogan

Mr. D. B. Driver

Mr. J. H. Fralin

The District Trustees were unanimously elected to succeed themselves in office.

The Ways and Means Committee presented its report as follows:

We recommend that each church contribute 4% of the regular offerings of the church, the regular offerings of the Sunday School and the regular offerings of the Youth Society to be sent to the District Treasurer each month for District obligations. Each church shall raise its General Budget of \$6.00 per member as assessed by the General Church in a manner best suited to the local situation. We further recommend that this General Budget be raised and sent in to the District Treasurer on a monthly basis. After considerable questioning and discussion this motion was adopted.

The Resolutions Committee presented the following material:

Resolution No. 6. Since the children that attend our camp have no services of their own, be it resolved that a children's meeting be conducted every afternoon of the District Camp for them. Carried.

Resolution No. 7. Be it resolved that all committees making reports shall present said report in either a legible hand writing or preferably in typewritten form to the Secretary at the time such reports are received by the Conference. Approved.

Resolution No. 8. Since our Sunday morning services of the Camp are hindered by the different churches having Sunday School, be it resolved that a Sunday School be held on the

Camp Ground and that the neighboring churches be invited to attend. Adopted.

The District Council nominated Rev. Byrd Puffenbarger and Rev. O. W. Bogan for the 3 year term on the Board of Education and Examination. Rev. Puffenbarger was elected.

In an open discussion of camp facilities it was moved that dormitory facilities should be provided over the Dining Hall this fall. Details were left in the hands of the District Council. This was unanimously adopted.

The District Superintendent then expressed the burden of his heart for Church Extension funds to enter new fields in our District. Twenty-five people spontaneously pledged \$1.00 per month to be paid through this year for this project. All were urged to get behind this cause and see what could be done in our churches to push our extension work. A resolution was then presented calling for at least 200 who would share in this important work. This was adopted.

The Resolutions Committee presented the final resolution as follows:

Resolved that all who have so willingly rendered their services to make this Conference a success, viz.,

Rev. W. H. Neff who acted so graciously as our Chairman;

Rev. J. E. Guill, our beloved District Superintendent;

Our cooks who have prepared such fine meals for pastors and delegates to this Conference;

be given a rising vote of thanks. This was carried by Conference action.

An ordination service was then held for Alfred Moore, Pastor of Cristo Church. General Superintendent Neff gave the charge to our brother and with feeling spoke to all ministers present. Rev. J. E. Guill, Rev. B. L. Puffenbarger and Rev. J. A. Howard served as a Council of ordination to lay hands on Brother Moore and set him aside for the work of the ministry.

Following the ordination service, Rev. Neff dismissed the 1956 Conference with prayer.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Thirty-fifth Annual Conference of the Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church: Greetings:

We sit together in this Conference more than conquerors through the precious blood of Christ Who loved us and gave Himself for us.

The Camp Meeting that just closed has been one of the greatest and most blessed of the Lord, in the history of our District. The workers, Dr. D. E. Wilson and Dr. John R. Church

along with the Brecheisens and Gordon Miller were certainly anointed and blessed of the Lord. God manifested Himself in saving sinners, sanctifying believers and blessing the saints.

The Forward Movement which began in January of this year, we believe was of God. God would have us see the needs and arouse ourselves to His great work. We, in Virginia, have a part in this work and we must stir ourselves to action. In outlining my report may we look at the past, present and future.

The Past —

Thirty-five years ago, in 1921 our District was organized. Ten years later we had 16 churches, 4 parsonages with a total property value of \$98,863.23. The indebtedness stood at \$24,913.23. Membership then was 562. Pastors received \$5,814.73. Twelve years later we had 21 churches and 8 parsonages with a valuation of \$108,830.00. Against this was an indebtedness of \$13,-898.00 Membership stood at 534. Pastors received \$16,708.47.

The Present —

Using last year's minutes, we find 28 churches, 17 parsonages with a property value of \$789,700.00. Against this property there is a debt of \$122,925.00. Membership has increased to 1077. Last year pastors received \$43,639.26.

These figures show gains have been made in membership, church buildings and in parsonages. We have more and better churches. Also we have more and better parsonages. Through the membership gains we have a fine group of laymen and pastors.

The Future —

We live in a great state and it offers us a challenge to preach full salvation and conserve our fruits by organizing Holiness Churches. God is speaking to us through the Word saying: "Go ye into all the WORLD and preach the gospel to every creature." As His people we must carry out this great Commission. A great responsibility is upon each one of us. We have 2 new preaching points, one in Bluefield and one here in Roanoke. We hope that these will be organized before next Conference. In Galax and in Pulaski there are doors opening for our church.

Statistically, our gains this year are quite small. However we are making some progress. Indebtedness is being reduced on our properties. Danville has bought a parsonage beside the church. Christiansburg has brick veneered their church and many others of the District have made improvements.

I trust that we will set some goals for next year and then do our best to meet them.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. Resolved that as far as possible all appointments of committees shall be made so that each committee may meet simultaneously. Further that all committees shall meet prior to Conference, at the call of the chairman, and have their business ready for presentation.

2. Resolved that we have a District Camp Committee composed of five members. The District Superintendent shall be the chairman. The other members shall be the chairman of the following committees: Advertising, Finance, Tabernacle and Dining Room.

3. Be it resolved that our Y. P. Zone Chairmen be requested to have a minimum of two zone rallies each year.

4. Be it resolved that a set of rules be drawn up by the District Council governing the dormitory and camp ground. These shall be posted in convenient places for all to see.

5. Resolved that provision be made in our District Budget to cover the portion of General Conference expense that we shall be expected to pay.

6. Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to attend and support our annual camp meeting, therefore be it resolved that all of our churches shall provide the regular support for the two Sundays of camp for their pastors in their absence at camp.

7. In order to obtain uniformity in reporting enrollments for Sunday School reports, be it resolved that Sunday School enrollments shall be corrected at the first of each quarter based on the experience of the attendance during the previous quarter. Names shall not be dropped from the roll unless they were absent at least four Sundays of the quarter. (Sickness excepted.)

8. Be it resolved that our District Sunday School Committee sponsor Sunday School Workers meetings in strategic locations to accommodate groups of churches.

9. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent appoint a Home Missionary Committee of two other members to serve with him. They shall formulate a home missionary policy for the District with the guidance and approval of the District Council.

10. In order that our churches may know shortly after Conference of changes by the Conference, each pastor shall be supplied with three mimeographed copies of said changes within 30 days of Conference.

11. Be it resolved that each pastor try and bring the Advocate subscriptions in his church up to the membership of his pastorate.

12. Be it resolved that the Y. P. Executive Secretary be instructed to visit each church once each year to encourage and to inspire our Youth work.

13. Inasmuch as our District Camp Meeting is suffering from the lack of a permanent tabernacle, be it resolved that a committee of three members and the District Superintendent be appointed to formulate plans for the construction of a tabernacle. Be it further resolved that this committee be known as the Tabernacle Construction Committee and that this commit-

tee shall present a report to the 1956 Conference, with a detailed building plan and recommendation for construction in the immediate future. Be it further resolved that this committee shall supervise the construction of the tabernacle.

WAYS AND MEANS RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend that each church pound its pastor at least once a month.

2. We recommend that the Conference fee be \$4.00 per ministerial and lay delegate; and we further recommend that each church having unstationed ministers within its membership who shall be present for the Conference shall pay said fee for them.

3. We recommend that each local treasurer forward to the district treasurer all offerings for general and district funds by the last day of each month and that a receipt for same be sent to the sender immediately. We further recommend that all general church funds shall be sent to the General Treasurer by the last day of each month.

4. We recommend that the first Sunday of June be designated as District Camp Day on which the pastors of the various churches of the Virginia District will present the cause of the Camp Membership Association and raise an offering to help defray the cost of the camp.

5. We recommend that the District Conference pay the following amounts to these respective officers:

6. We recommend that the ministers of the Virginia District pay their ministerial tithes through the local church treasurer to the District Treasurer for the support of the District Superintendent. It is further stipulated that the Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$65.00 per week with the addition of the following utilities, gas, lights, and telephone. Any difference between the stated salary and the tithes received shall be supplied from or applied on the Contingency Fund of the District Budget.

7. We recommend that when the Y. P. Executive Secretary shall visit each Church or Society, he shall be paid the sum of Five Dollars, plus travel expense at the rate of 3c per mile. The Executive Secretary shall visit churches or societies in groups of two or more at a time. In these services an offering shall be taken, any amount in excess of Five Dollars to go to the Young

People's District Treasurer, from which account the Executive Secretary's travel expense shall be paid. In his visits the Executive Secretary shall remind the church or society of its assessed obligation to the District Young People's organization.

8. We recommend that each YPS send \$1.00 per month to their District Treasurer and that each church or unorganized society send a free-will offering to the district YPS Treasurer. This sum shall be used for operational expenses, youth council meetings, incidental expenses with any balance being reserved for the next District Youth Camp. We further recommend that the District YPS Treasurer send quarterly notices of the assessments to the societies which shall be read in a regular Young People's Meeting.

9. We recommend that the District Council be authorized to rent the District Parsonage with the provision that the premises will be vacated for use during the Youth Camp and the regular District Camp. The proceeds from this rental shall go into the regular District Treasury to help defray expenses.

10. Since some of our churches are laboring under severe financial strain, be it resolved that the Sunday Schools with enrollment of less than 40 persons shall be asked to pay only fifty cents per month to the work of the District Sunday School Committee while those schools with enrollment exceeding 40 shall continue to pay the one dollar per month as assessed.

11. Whereas the Virginia Conference is committed officially and morally to the Eastern Pilgrim College Zone and whereas the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has twice turned down a petition to rezone the Virginia District be it resolved that this Conference go on record as continuing our support of Eastern Pilgrim College and that a representative of said college be requested to visit each church in the Virginia District to assist in raising the budget for the Eastern Pilgrim College.

12. We recommend that the following items be considered by the Conference to effect economy in the expenses of the District Camp Meeting: viz.

- (1) Each pastor shall work to raise 100 percent Camp Membership of \$1.00 per member to be sent by the Pastor to the District Treasurer prior to Camp.
- (2) The engaged singers of the Camp be paid a sum not to exceed that paid to one evangelist. The sum to be reserved for the singing of the Camp whether the party workers consist of one, two or more workers.

- (3) The assessment of \$10.00 for all ministers with a salary of \$40.00 or less per week and \$15.00 for those ministers with a salary exceeding \$40.00 per week and this amount shall be placed in the Camp Expense Fund.
- (4) In no service shall an offering be taken for both camp expense and camp ground notes. Further that no preaching service (morning, afternoon or night) shall be devoted exclusively to raising monies for this or any other purpose.

REV. MRS. LILLIAN M. ELLIOTT

During the past year our hearts were again sharply reminded of the frailty of life and the certainty of death as one of our number was suddenly called from time to eternity. Rev. Lillian Elliott was converted in 1905 and shortly after was led into the experience of holiness under the ministry of Rev. George B. Kulp. She affiliated with the Huntington, West Virginia Pilgrim Holiness Church and faithfully labored there until coming to Hopewell, Virginia, in 1931.

Rev. Lillian Elliott was an ordained minister of Virginia District and her influence has been felt across the years. Her testimony and prayers were very noticeably absent this year.

Mourning her homegoing are five children, three sisters, several grandchildren, one great-grandchild and a host of friends. May the memory of her sweet spirit and Christ-like life help each of us to be true to God and to meet her after our life too is done.
