

CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

MORNING SITTING, AUGUST 7, 1959

The thirty-eight annual Conference of the Virginia District, Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened at the tabernacle on the Camp Ground at Roanoke, Virginia, August 7, 1959 at 9:00 A. M.

Rev. B. L. Puffffenbarger led in singing "A Soul Winner For Jesus" and "Standing on the Promises," after which Rev. Frank Schweitzer led in prayer.

Rev. W. A. Massey, District Superintendent, presented the permanent Chairman to the Conference, Rev. Melvin H. Snyder, General Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. The speaker read Revelation 3:2-13. There are seven messages in Revelation, given to seven churches in Asia Minor. Each message was applicable to the specific need of the individual church. These letters seem to concern churches in almost every age. There are three statements listed in all these letters that are exactly alike:

(1) Unto the angel of the Church

(2) I know thy works

(3) He that hath an ear let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches.

A. Hear what the Spirit hath to say to the Churches.

The Holy Spirit is the Lord of the Harvest. When the Holy Spirit gets through to us He often explodes our preconceived ideas and plans. Are you willing that He should get through to you? Peter, on the housetop was dealt with by the Holy Spirit three different times before he recognized the divine leadings of God in the matter. Three in the New Testament represented the divine trinity and for the first time the Apostle recognized that it might be God who was talking to him.

B. I know thy works.

Are we keenly conscious that Christ is walking among the golden candlesticks and is constantly checking on us? Here is Christ reporting on the condition of the church, instead of the church reporting its labors to the Master. The Lord knows the quantity or extent of our labors. He knows whether or not we are in a rut. If the Pilgrim Holiness Church is to fulfill its task we are going to have to let God speak to us by the direct leadings of his Spirit.

Then, too, Christ knows the quality of our work. The matter of motive is of tremendous importance in the eyes of the Lord. Of the seven churches mentioned in Asia Minor only two of them could stand the test and did not need to repent and return to God.

C. Unto the angel of the church.

The message was first given to the pastor of the church and then through him to the people. It is up to the man to decide whether he will deliver the message to the people or deprive them of the blessing of its truth. We should never forget that when divine love is gone from our hearts, that holiness is gone for holiness of heart is nothing short of love perfected. There can be no true spiritual fruitfulness without real holiness. The Chairman ended his message with an urgent appeal to the ministers to go home and deliver the messages that God would give to them. If we will do this then God will give us success in His work.

The roll was called by the Secretary. Conference Bar was set as the seven rows of seats in the center and right hand section of the tabernable.

Report of District Superintendent, Rev. W. A. Massey given and accepted with expression of appreciation.

Moved, seconded and carried that Rev. Stout, former pastor at Roanoke and recently transferred to the North Carolina District, be granted honorary seat within the bar.

The Auditing Committee gave a report on the books of the District Treasurer, finding everything in fine condition. The report was received.

Report of the District Treasurer, Rev. I. T. Dunn, was read and received with deep appreciation.

Report of Ass't. District Superintendent, Rev. B. L. Puffenbarger, given and accepted by the Conference.

Report of Conference Statistician, Rev. J. E. Kraus, presented and accepted with deep appreciation.

Report of the District Sunday School Committee was received and accepted.

The Reception Committee, Rev. Elbert Barrow, Chairman, presented the following visitors to the Conference: Rev. and Mrs. Leonard Conner; North Carolina Conference, recently accepting pastorate at Christiansburg, Virginia; and Rev. Ray

Hotle from the Tennessee Conference. After testimonies these friends were invited to have a seat within the Conference Bar for the remainder of the Conference.

The District Council recommends to this Conference that all delegates be seated with full Conference privileges this year. It further recommends that next year all pastors failing to reach 100% goals in the United Stewardship and District Budget Programs shall be asked to appear before the District Council and fully explain the failure to meet required goals. The motion was passed by Conference action.

Rev. Earl T. Gentry, President of the Virginia Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America was presented to the Conference as fraternal delegate from that denomination. The visiting minister brought an inspiring message. By unanimous consent he was granted a seat within the bar of the Conference.

There was a supplementary report presented by the Board of Education and Examination as follows:

Rev. Ray Close—transferring from the Ohio District Church of the Nazarene

Rev. G. A. Castevens-from Penna.-New Jersey District

Rev. Leonard Conner-from North Carolina District

Rev. James Crews—pending receipt of required letter of transfer from the North Carolina District

Report was accepted by the Conference as presented. The Resolutions Committee presented the following resolution:

Resolution No. 1 was tabled pending receipt of a special report from the Special Study Commission for the District Camps.

Report of Special Committee for Study of District Camps presented as follows:

In accordance with Resolution No. 18, page 28, of the 1958 District Minutes, the Study Commission for the District Camps recommends the following: Whereas the preamble of Resolution 18 has been investigated, be it resolved that the present Camp Ground be maintained by the District as the surroundings mentioned in the preamble are an asset to our Camp, and that a long range development program be drawn by a committee appointed by this Conference immediately. Be it further resolved that during the next Conference year another dining hall be built on the left side of the present kitchen and a second story unit be built over the dining rooms and kitchen with dormitory rooms suitable for Camp Meeting.

This motion was amended from the floor to sell the present Camp Ground and relocate the Camp Ground in new surroundings at a centrally located ground and that proceeds from sale be used to purchase land and erect new buildings. This amendment was defeated by majority vote. A second amendment was made and seconded to mark a line across the Camp Ground to include the large house and all land in a straight line to U. S. highway 11, and put it up for immediate sale. The proceeds from such sale to go towards liquidating the indebtedness on the property and erecting much needed camp facilities.

After much discussion the session adjourned because of expiration of time. A motion was made from the floor that the evening evangelistic service of the Camp be cancelled and the Conference go on into the night. This motion was defeated by majority vote of the Conference. A final motion was passed to meet at thirty minutes after the close of the night service for a one hour session and to have a final session on Saturday to begin at 8:00 A. M. Motion was carried by majority vote. Dismissed with prayer by the Secretary.

EVENING SESSION, 10:00 P. M.

The Conference convened after the night service at approximately 10:00 P. M. Minutes of the afternoon sitting were read and approved with minor corrections. The resolution of the Special Committee on Study of District Camps was re-read and the amendment which was on the floor. Motion was made to vote on the amendment and by standing vote it was lost. The Committee report was presented to the Conference and by standing vote it was accepted. The Ways and Means Committee was instructed by the Presiding Chairman to prepare a recommendation for the final session as to how expenses of expanding enlarged camp facilities might be met.

Adjourned after a glowing exhortation by Rev. W. N. Fort in which he made an inspiring offer to pay off the last \$250 of Camp Land Indebtedness if the remainder could be raised and paid off within the next conference year. Dismissed in prayer by Brother Snyder.

SATURDAY SESSION, 8:00 A. M.

August 8, 1959

The Saturday morning sitting of the Conference of the Virginia District, Pilgrim Holiness Church, met at 8:00 A. M. in the Camp Meeting Tabernacle. The congregation was led

in singing by Rev. W. A. Cresswell, Song Evangelist from Hopewell. Rev. J. E. Kraus led in prayer. Rev. Melvin Snyder then called for additional devotional time to be expressed by personal quoting of favorite passages of Scripture. This spontaneous expression of Bible Quotes was an inspiration to all who participated.

Reading of Roll Call was dispensed with and it was understood that all minutes not approved by the Conference would be edited and approved by the District Council.

Two alternate delegates were seated by the Conference: Mr. T. W. Tice of Christo and Mr. W. O. Miller of Roanoke.

The Resolutions Committee continued its report:

Resolution No. 1 tabled as the Conference action of the preceding evening was ruled to have superseded its recommendation. The special report of the previous evening with its Conference approved action became Resolution No. 1.

Resolution No. 2. Be it resolved that each Church Treasurer be given the much needed moral and financial support to meet the overall requirements of local, district and general church needs. Be it further resolved that the Church Treasurer of each church furnish a monthly financial report for the church bulletin board. a complete record of receipts in all departments and expenditures. It should be understood that it would then become the responsibility of the pastor, board and church to make any necessary adjustments to improve their standing. Carried.

Resolution No. 3. Whereas the District Superintendent is so near the overall work of the Conference, and messages and reports from the Superintendent's office may have to be included at the last minute, therefore be it resolved that the District Superintendent be Editor of the District Paper "Virginia Pilgrim"—a bi-monhly publication. Carried.

Resolution No. 4. Be it resolved that the ministers of the Youth Council or any minister of the District who is actively engaged as a worker for the entire Youth Camp be exempted from the requirements of standing Resolution No. 13. Carried.

Resolution No. 5. Whereas our Youth Societies pay budget to the District Youth Treasurer, be it resolved that the words, "Youth Society" be deleted from Ways and Means Recommendation No. 4 of the 1958 Minutes. Lost by Conference vote.

A District Council recommendation was adopted as follows: "Moved, seconded and carried that the 1959 District Conference of the Virginia Conference go on record as authorizing the District Council to take all necessary steps to facilitate the borrowing of money from the Pilgrim Pension Plan from General Headquarters of the Pilgrim Holiness Church for the construction and/or refinancing of church properties in the Virginia District."

Report of Ways and Means Committee was presented as follows: Recommendation No. 1. We recommend that this resolution replace No. 13 on page 31 of the 1959 Minutes. We recommend that an offering be taken to cover the travel expense of the District Superintendent on each visit to the local church and that this amount be set as follows: Churches with less than 40 members not less than \$8.00 per visit. Churches with over 40 members would pay not less than \$12.00 per visit. Carried.

Recommendation No. 2. We recommend that due to the increased attention on General and District budgets that during the first quarter of this church year the Council is to inquire of each pastor whether he has a method of raising his budgets in operation. Where no adequate method exists the churches shall consider using the dime card system through the Church or Sunday School. Carried.

Recommendation No. 3. Due to a favourable vote by the 38th Virginia Conference to begin an expansion program at the Roanoke Camp Ground, therefore be it resolved that a loan of approximately \$10,000 be arranged and that for the coming year efforts at repayment shall be as follows: A committee be appointed by the District Superintendent and said committee shall solicit funds, gifts and grants from individuals. The goal of the committee shall be \$6,000. Be it further resolved that an offering be asked from each church at some appropriate time during the year. Carried.

Following the report of the Ways and Means Committee the Reception Committee presented Dr. Russel Gunsalus, President of Eastern Pilgrim College, Allentown, Penna. Brother Gunsalus gave his testimony after which he was granted an honorary seat in the Conference by unanimous consent. A letter from Eastern Pilgrim College was read to the Conference.

Moved, seconded and carried that a letter of response be sent to the Board of Eastern Pilgrim College expressing the District's appreciation for the school and what it has meant down through the years. A motion was presented from the floor that a six room parsonage be prepared in the large house on the Camp Ground. that it be modern and absolutely private to be used as living quarters for the District Superintendent. This motion was seconded and after some discussion the Conference voted to refer it to the District Council for action.

The District Superintendent was asked to appoint tellers to serve in the elections. He appointed as follows:

Rev. G. A. Castevens was elected to the vacancy on the Board of Education and Examination.

Rev. Frank Schweitzer was elected as member of College Board of Southern Pilgrim College at Kernersville, North Carolina.

The District Trustees were re-elected by acclamation upon recommendation of the District Council.

A rising vote of thanks was given to Rev. Snyder for his able ministry in presiding over the 38th Annual Conference.

A general resolution of appreciation was accepted by the Conference as follows: Be it resolved that appreciation be expressed to the General Superintendent; the District Superintendent; the Conference cooks; the Press; the Principal of William Byrd High School and to all whose services have contributed in making this Conference a success. Be it further resolved that the District Secretary write a letter of appreciation to the Roanoke World News. Carried.

A love offering was raised to go to our Chairman in deep appreciation for his faithful services. The Conference then was adjourned by motion and dismissed in prayer by Brother Snyder. Each delegate, ministerial and laymen, left the Conference floor feeling that God had surely met with His people and furnished His grace throughout the Conference.

THE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

Mr. Chairman, delegates and friends of the Thirty-eighth Conference of the Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings.

Our hearts are filled with gratitude to the Lord for His overshadowing providence through another year and for giving us the privilege of gathering in another conference. Truly we can say with the Psalmist, "the lines have fallen unto me in pleasant places."

We are living in a world of rapid change. The scientific advancement is staggering. Nations hold weapons that could destroy civilization itself. Confusion and international tensions are at a high peak. There was never a time in human history when the world needed the Gospel more than now. In the midst of change the mission and message of the church remin the same. We are to "occupy 'til He comes." While world conditions may appear anything but bright, yet for the church, this is a day of great opportunity and challenge.

As we review in brief the past year we have much for which to praise the Lord. Several of our churches have experienced very gracious revivals that have resulted in new souls added to the Kingdom and to the church. Some have made noted improvements on their church buildings and some have purchased new equipment.

It has been my privilege to organize two new churches, Millenbeck and Preston. The splendid Millenbeck church building was purchased for \$5,200.00. This was made possible through the faithful labors of Rev. B. L. Puffenbarger and the churches he pastors. The Beulah, Remlik, and Clancie churches made the down payment of \$1,000.00 and have assumed the responsibility of standing back of this church in the monthly payments until it is in a position financially to carry the full obligation.

Our former District Superintendent, Rev. J. E. Guill, had been in contact with the Preston church for several years, making regular visits to the church. Rev. Richard Prendergrast, the faithful pastor together with the people of the church, have worked diligently and prayed that this work may be brought into the Pilgrim Church. I am delighted to report to you that God has rewarded their prayers and labors. At a cost of only \$500.00 to the District this excellent church building has been deeded to the Pilgrim Holiness Church. I should state that the local congregation has assumed a \$1000.00 obligation to make this possible.

Above all others we give thanks to God who has made possible the addition of these two fine groups and these two church properties to the District.

The reports reaching me indicate an increase in both church membership and Sunday School attendance. Though the increase is small we are grateful for what has been done and may we unitedly purpose by God's grace to go all out for greater victories in the coming year, if Jesus tarries.

The churches leading in membership gains as gleaned from the reports reaching me are as follows: Danville, a gain of 16; Remlik, a gain of 16; Salem, a gain of 13; and Hopewell, a gain of 11.

The District Youth Camp was a time of blessing to the more than fifty young people that attended. Our Youth President together with the District Youth Council had a well arranged program. They are to be commended for the excellent leadership given to this work. What we do in interest of the young people is of vital importance. I trust we shall give our wholehearted support that the Youth Camp may continue to grow and become a great blessing to an ever increasing number of young people.

Our District Treasurer's report will indicate a good gain in both District Budget and the United Stewardship Fund. However, we are far short of meeting our full apportionment. With intensified effort and the cooperation of all concerned, I am sure this can be much improved in the coming year.

Since we last met in this capacity death has visited the home of one of our ministers. Mrs. W. N. Fort was called to be with the Lord a few weeks ago. I am sure the Conference extends its sympathy to Bro. Fort and assures him of our prayers. Several of our good laymen have been called to their heavenly reward. Their godly lives should inspire us to press forward until we too shall receive the "crown of life."

Goals:

I would like to recommend the following goals for the new conference year:

- 1. That each pastor and church strive for at least a 5% gain in church membership and an 8 per cent gain in Sunday School attendance.
- 2. That each pastor organize lay-visitation groups in his church for the purpose of doing personal evangelism.
- 3. That each pastor organize a prayer group or prayer groups in interest of revival and the salvation of the lost.

PERSONAL REPORT

I have preached 131 times, made 62 visits to the churches, conducted 24 annual Business Meetings, held 37 board meetings, presided over 6 District Council meetings, had two meetings with the Home Missionary Committee, 2 Camp Committee meetings, attended two ministers fellowship meetings, served as chairman for 1 meeting of the Camp Study Commission, attended 1 meeting of the District Youth Council traveled with the General Superintendent to four area meetings in the district, held 3 week-end meetings and four revivals on the district. I also served as evangelist for our District Youth Camp and was evangelist for one Camp Meeting in another district. I officiated at two weddings and assisted in three funeral services. I have attended five Executive Committee Meetings and two Board Meetings of Eastern Pilgrim College and two Board Meetings at Southern Pilgrim College. have traveled approximately 16000 miles in District interest.

My salary has been received in full. I have received for travel expense \$636.58. Offerings for meetings on the Dis-

trict amounted to \$632.13.

I am grateful for the privilege of laboring together with you and all whom you represent in the District. I deeply appreciate the capable and understanding Council with whom it has been my privilege to work. I have enjoyed working with the faithful and devoted ministers and wives. For every courtesy extended me I sincerely thank you. We give thanks to our Heavenly Father.

Congratulations are herewith extended to Salem Sunday School on its excellent growth this year that makes it the largest Sunday School in Virginia District. However, outstripping them both in numerical gain and also in percentage gain is the Waynesboro Sunday School. Under the leadership of Rev. Eldon Hotle and his staff, this Sunday School has attained a numerical gain of 17 per Sunday over a year ago, and against great odds. The percentage gain is also significant—22%. Salem comes in second in numerical gain with 15 per Sunday increase. Martinsville takes second place in percentage with a gain of 16%. Completing the statistical part of this report is the following table showing the first four Sunday Schools in both numerical and percentage gains.

GENERAL:

In the past 10 years, an army of 40,000,000 has come into our midst. Quietly, without fanfare, but surely, this army has established itself. Ere long, they will be running our national government, operating our business houses, making our laws and filling our pulpits. The army is that of the new-born babes in our homes—but frankly—the overwhelming importance comes into this picture from the religious and

sociological changes that are taking place in our day.

Never was greater challenge given to any—that Christ gave to His disciples—"Go ye into all the world—teach—make disciples." That His words were powerful and important is seen by the fact that after the Pentecostal experience—the 120 went out—not counting their own lives dear and soon—within the span of their generation there were 500,000 Christians. Political forces and spiritual animosities could not dampen their fervor and dedication to the Great Commission. The Sunday School needs just such a spirit to characterize it today. The Sunday School is the reaching and teaching arm of the Church.

Recently, General Omar Bradley made a statement that sticks and wounds. He said that the most dedicated person he had ever met was a Communist. Along this line about two years ago, Bishop Richard Raines of the Methodist Church was addressing a conclave of district superintendents and 50 bishops. He called for serious searching rather than optimism as reports showed statistical gains. He called attention to the fact that nearly three quarters of American Protestant church members are not regular attenders. He cried: "No army would dare attack with a percentage of inactives like that." Turning to the stage, it is reported he pointed to the chairs filled by the 50 bishops and said, "40 years ago there were not enough Communists to have filled these seats. Today, 800 million people and one third of the earth's surface is under Communist control. In the light of these truths—what manner of people ought we to be?"

In the coming year, may we earnestly seek to do two special things above what we are now doing. Sponsor a Home Department in your Sunday School and Church. At present the Virginia District does not have one Home Department reported. Not for the reports am I speaking—but for what this will do for your church and school. Second—in view of this great invasion—in your community and mine of babies—take a sobering look at the inefficiency of our Cradle Roll Departments. Nothing will pay you greater dividends in winning new people than this.

To have served you another year has been a great pleasure and privilege. The Sunday School Convention at Charlottes-ville this past spring was indeed a great blessing. We are deeply indebted to Bros. Elliott and Brown for the excellence of their services in this inspirational and challenging convention. Also, the cooperation of the ministers and Sunday School workers who came. May God grant that the coming year will be a greater year for Virginia than we have ever known.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Be it resolved that as far as possible all appointments of committees shall be made so that each committee may meet simultaneously. Further that all committees shall meet at the call of the chairman, and have their business ready for presentation.
- 2. Be it resolved that we have a District Camp Committee. The District Superintendent shall be the chairman. Other members of the committee shall be chairman of the following committees: Advertising, Finance, Tabernacle and Dining Room.
- 3. Be it resolved that our Youth Zone Chairmen have a minimum of two zone rallies each year.
- 4. Be it resolved that a set of rules be drawn up by the District Council governing the dormitory and the camp ground. These shall be posted in conspicious places. Further the District Council shall appoint two men to serve as policemen to enforce these rules.
- 5. Be it resolved that each pastor support the District Camp by his presence and that he strongly urge his people to attend and support the camp. It is further recommended that the local churches provide the regular support for the pastors while they are as camp.
- 6. Be it resolved that Sunday School enrollments be corrected not oftener than the ,first of each quarter. Names shall not be dropped from the roll unless they were absent at least 4 Sundays of the quarter, sickness excepted.
- 7. Be it resolved that Sunday School workers meetings be held in strategic locations over the District to accomodate groups of our churches.
- 8. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent appoint a Home Missionary Committee of two members to serve along with him in formulating the District Home Missionary program.
- 9. Be it resolved that each pastor try and bring the total Advocate subscriptions in his church up to the church membership that he serves.
- 10. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint two of its members to serve with the Youth Executive Council in planning the date and place of the Youth Camp.
- 11. Be it resolved that a permanent date be set for the District Ministerial Convention with the District Council arranging the program and the workers.

- 12. Be it resolved that the report of receipts and expenditures for the District Camp be prepared and placed in the minutes of the District the following year.
- 13. Be it resolved that all pastors within a radius of one hundred miles of the Camp Ground be required to come two days before Camp to help set things in readiness for the Camp and that those who live beyond this radius shall be required to stay over to dismantle and store things until needed again.
- 14. Be it resolved that Virginia District assume its proportionate part of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Advancement Program as outlined by the recent General Conference. The goals for our District are: one new church organized each year for the next four years with an overall 7% increase in church membership.
- 15. Resolved that the Youth President be invited to attend all Zone Rallies held within the District during the Conference year, and that he be required to attend at least one in each zone during the year. During this rally he shall explain the District program. His travel expenses to and from these rallies shall be paid by the respective zones which he shall be visiting.
- 16. Be it resolved that each local church in the Conference shall provide the utilities for the parsonage. The Conference shall also provide the utilities for the home of the District Superintendent.
- 17. Be it resolved that whenever there is a change in the office of District Superintendent, that the District Council shall endeavor to place the retiring Superintendent in a satisfactory pastorate, if he so desires.

WAYS AND MEANS RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. We recommend that each church pound its pastor at least once a month.
- 2. We recommend that the Conference fee be \$4.00 per ministerial and lay delegate; and we further recommend that each church having unstationed ministers within its membership who shall be present for the Conference shall pay said fee for them.
- 3. We recommend that each local treasurer forward to the district treasurer all offerings for general and district funds and the pastors tithes by the last day of each month and that a receipt for same be sent to the sender immediately. We further recommend that all general church funds shall be sent to the General Treasurer by the last day of each month.
- 4. We recommend that each church contribute 10% of the REGULAR offerings of the Church, the Sunday School and the Youth Society to be sent to the District Treasurer each month for district obligations. Each church shall raise its General Budget of \$8.00 per member as assessed by the General Church in a manner best suited to the local situation. We further recommend that this General Budget be raised and sent in to the District Treasurer on a monthly basis.
- 5. We recommend that the District Conference pay the following amounts to these respective officers:

District	Statistician	35.00
District	Treasurer	100.00
District	Secretary	50.00
District	Sunday School Promotional Secretary	50.00
District	Youth President	50.00

- 6. We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be set at \$75.00 per week, with the addition of utilities—gas, lights, phone and fuel.
- 7. We recommend that when the Y. P. Executive Secretary shall visit each Church or Society, he shall be paid the sum of Five Dollars, plus travel expense at the rate of 3c per mile, The Executive Secretary shall visit churches or societies in groups of two or more at a time. In these services an offering shall be taken, any amount in excess of Five Dollars to go to the Young People's Treasurer, from which account the Executive Secretary's travel expense shall be paid. In his visits the Executive Secretary shall remind the church or society of its assessed obligation to the District Young People's organization.

- 8. We recommend that each YPS send \$1.00 per month to their District Treasurer and that each church or unorganized society send a free-will offering to the District YPS Treasurer. This sum shall be used for operational expenses, with any balance being reserved for the next District Youth Camp. We further recommend that the District YPS Treasurer send quarterly notice of the assessments to the societies which shall be read in a regular Young People's Meeting.
- 9. We recommend that the District Council be authorized to rent the District Parsonage with the provision that the premises will be vacated for us during the Youth Camp and the regular District Camp. The proceeds from this rental shall go into the regular District Treasury to help defray expenses.

10. We recommend the following

- (1) That each pastor and local church board be responsible for each member of the local church becoming a member of the Camp Association or raising an offeiring equal to \$1.00 per member. These funds should be sent in to the District Treasurer before the beginning of the fourth quarter.
- (2) The engaged singers of the Camp be paid a sum not to exceed that paid to one evangelist. The sum to be reserved for the singing of the Camp whether the party workers consist of one, two or more workers.
- (3) The assessment of \$10.00 for all ministers with a salary of \$40.00 or less per week and \$15.00 for those ministers with a salary exceeding \$40.00 per week and this amount shall be placed in the Camp Expense Fund.
- (4) In no service shall an offering be taken for both camps expense and camp ground notes. Further that no preaching service (morning, afternoon or night) shall be devoted exclusively to raising monies for this or any other purpose.
- 11. We recommend that the local treasurer withhold the tithe of the pastor's salary and that this be sent in to the Disrict Treasurer each month along with other District and General funds.
- 12. We recommend hat the District Council in conference with the District Superintendent work out a plan for providing housing for the Superintendent for the coming year.
