CONFERENCE MINUTES

The fortieth Annual Conference of the Virginia District, Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened in Roanoke, Virginia on August 14, 1961. The congregation was led in singing by Rev. B. L. Puffenbarger who selected the old hymn of the Church, "We're Marcing To Zion". Rev. Dale Reynolds read a scripture lesson from Romans Chapter 12, after which Rev. G. A. Castevens led in prayer.

District Superintendent, Rev. W. A. Massey, presented General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff to the Conference as its presiding Chairman.

Dr. Neff spoke to the assembled ministers and delegates concerning the importance of such gatherings as times of decision to determine where we are going and what we have done. We must set the course for the present, and make plans for tomorrow. Most of us work best when we know what we are going to do in a given day. We need both activism and faith in our lives. There are times when our feet must catch up with our lips and our walk catch up with our talk.

Men who object to programs often are disorganized and get the least accomplished. Perhaps the high light of such a meeting as this is the wonderful fellowship which Christians enjoy. There are scores of our people who would like to be at the conference and enjoy the warmth of Christian fellowship which we are experiencing.

Then, too, certain rivalries occur due to differences in personal traits and tastes. The right of dscrimination is fundamental to the work of the church. Some people feel that differences of opinion discussed vigorously is an evidence of the carnal mind. This is not so. The fact is that where there is theological concern for truth there will be discussion and the pro and con of debate will be heard but carried on in an atmosphere of love without casting reflection and insinuations as to motive and character.

Bro. Neff mentioned the fact that he and Mrs. Neff would be leaving later that week for a trip to Africa in the interest of the Foreign Missionary work there and for that reason would ask to be excused from this Conference late in the afternoon after the election of the District Superintendent.

Following the message the conference roll call was completed by Secretary. Hours for the conference sessions were as follows: Morning — 9 A. M. to 12 Noon Afternoon — 1:30 P. M. to 4 P. M. Evening — 6:30 P. M. until close of conference.

The Conference Bar was established as the platform and first seven rows of seats in center and right sections of tabernacle.

Rev. Kenneth Taylor was received by transfer from the North Carolina Conference. He will pastor the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Preston, Virginia.

Rev. Robert Garthwaite received by favorable vote of Board of Education and Examination as transferring from the Norfolk Salvation Army.

Moved, seconded and carried that these two men be accepted into the Conference with full privileges.

Report of District Superintendent, Rev. W. A. Massey was received by unanimous vote.

Report of Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. B. L. Puffenbarge received by conference vote.

Report of the Auditing Committee was presented by Rev. Marshall and Barrow. This favorable report was accepted.

Report of District Treasurer, Rev. I. T. Dunn presented and accepted.

Report of the 1960 Camp Meeting was presented and accepted.

Moved, seconded and carried that a rising vote of thanks be given to our District Treasurer for his fine services over the past several years.

Report of District Statistician, Rev. Dale Reynolds, presented and received by Conference with gratitude.

Report of Promotional Sunday School Secretary, Rev. Eldon Hotle, given and accepted.

The Resolution Committee, Rev. Charles Carrol, Secretary, presented its report as follows:

Res. No. 1 was amended to included families represented by the sunday school as well as those of the church itself. Amendment was adopted and resolution as amended was passed by vote. Res. No. 2 Lost by Conference Vote.

Res. No. 3 Carried as Recommended by Committee.

Res. No. 4. Action deferred until later session until legal format of action desired could be furnished by the Secretary.

Res. No. 5. Recommended by committee; passed by Conference.

Res. No. 6. Deferred until Conference could consider the Youth Conference Resolution and then the committee would reword and represent the motion incorporating the ideas of the youth conference.

Res. No. 7. Amended to call for two revival meetings a year with the church board determining the supply. Substitute motion to leave entire matter to local church board carried as amended.

Morning Session of the Conference ended by expiration of time.

Afternoon Sitting

The conference convened for the afternoon sitting at 1:30 P. M. The beautiful song, "I Need Thee Every Hour" was sung by the congregation and Dr. Neff led the assembled group in earnest prayer.

By Conference vote Mr. Sparrow was seated as delegate from Gwynn in the absence of his wife.

Res. No. 4 was read by the Secretary and passed by Conference vote. This resolution will replace No. 21 of the 1960 Minutes.

Res. No. 8 amended to read that the Committee bring back to the 1962 Conference a report of its discoveries, findings and recommendations. The amendment carried and motion as amended carried by one vote. Motion was made to reconsider the previous motion. Amendment was offered that Committee report back to the District Council and that the Council be authorized to sell the present property and relocate in central part of the state. Amendment carried. Motion as amended was voted on and lost by conference vote.

Ways and Means Committe, Rev. G. A. Castevens, Secretary, reported:

Council Rec. No. 2. Referred to the council for redrafting. After an intermission the redrafted recommendation was presented and passed.

Rev. Strickland, Field Representative of Southern Pilgrim College was introducted to the Conference along with Rev. A. E. Blann. Both men were given honorary seats within the Conference Bar.

Board of Education and Examination, Rev. F. H. Schweitzer, Chairman, presented its report to the Conference. Report accepted as given.

The next order of business before the conference was election of officers. The Chairman appointed the following ministers to serve as tellers: Revs. Hotle, Reynolds, Clough, Barrow, Sherwood and Carroll.

Prior to the election of the District Superintendent there was a moment of silent prayer followed by audible petition by the chairman. The following elections were completed in order:

District Superintendent: Rev. W. A. Massey. Assistant District Superintendent — Rev. B. L. Puffenbarger District Secretary — Rev. J. A. Howard District Treasurer — Rev. Eldon Hotle The vote was taken on the advisory members of the District Council with the tellers to count the vote while the conference was in recess. The District Secretary recorded quantities of the 1961 Conference Minutes desired by the various churches. Session was dismised in prayer by Mr. Paul Priest, Delegate from Richmond First Church.

Evening Sitting

Elections for advisory members to the District Council resulted in the election of Rev. G. A. Castevens, Rev. Dale Reynolds and Rev. I. T. Dunn, respectively to fill the vacancies.

District Superintendent gave an oral report to the Conference relative to proper filing of deeds of church and parsonage properties. Report was accepted.

Thus the fortieth annual conference of the Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church passes on to become history. I am sure that all delegates, Ministerial and Laymen, left this sacred spot with the feeling that God had deigned to meet with His people and had left His benediction upon them.

DISTRIST SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Through the mercy and good providence of God we are privileged to assemble in the fortieth conference of the Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. It is a pleasure to welcome our highly esteemed General Superintendent and presiding Conference Officer, Dr. W. H. Neff. Also, a sincere welcome is extended to each delegate and friend present.

The world situation today is anything but bright. The ominous spread and threat of communism is casting its shadow over the hearts of millions throughout the world. The leaders of our nation and other nations are faced with problems too great for human wisdom to solve. In the light of this, we cannot expect that it will be easy to carry on a genuine Gospel work, but with purpose of heart and faith in God we must move forward to meet the challenges of this our day. May the Lord annoint and guide us in the business of this conference.

Some churches have experienced good revivals during the past year. For this we are grateful. However, I fear that a materialistic philosophy and indifference to spiritual things are making inroads into the hearts and minds of too many otherwise good people. The only remedy I see is revival. My prayer is that such may be experienced in every church in the district.

During the past year Rev. W. S. Allred was called to his heavenly reward. He will be greatly missed in the camps, conferences and other district gatherings. He will long be remembered for his love and devotion to the Lord. He faithfully labored with his good companion to make possible the Christiansburg Church. His influence continues in the hearts and lives of many.

Statistical and Financial Status

As we review the past year I regret that I am unable to bring a more encouraging report. However, it is necessary that we face the facts as they are and plan for better things in the future.

Several churches have shown a net gain in church membership. Those leading in gains are: Hopewell 7, Roanoke 6, and Beulah and Richmond Emmanuel each a gain of 5. The membership of some churches remained the same while others have shown a loss. The losses have outbalanced the gain, and the statistical report will indicate a small loss in membership.

The report of our Executive Secretary of Sunday Schools will show some loss in this department. We need to stimulate greater interest and activity in our Sunday Schools in order that this trend may be changed in the weeks and months ahead. The growth of the Sunday School is vital to the growth of every department of the church.

A number of churches have been faced with financial difficulties. This has been reflected in the General and District Budgets as well as the local churches. The sharpest decline has been in the United Stewardship Fund. A statement from our General Secretary-Treasurer reveals that we paid 49.2 per cent of this fund, which is 13 per cent less than was paid last year. While there was some decline in District Budget the over-all district receipts (including the penny a meal for District Home Missions) have shown a substantial increase. It appears that more emphasis on Christian Stewardship plus an increased sense of obligation to the denominational program, would do much in improving our position at this point. There are several churches that have paid both the United Stewardship Fund and District Budget 100 per cent and deserve honorable mention. They are: Beulah, Newport News, Preston, Remlik, Roanoke, and Salem.

Property Gains and Improvements

Since many of the property improvements have been mentioned in the "Va. Pilgrim" I shall mention only a few. The Vinton church has purchased a lot adjoining the church property which has given them an additional 200 foot frontage. The new property includes an eight room frame house that is providing additional Sunday School rooms. The purchase of this property will safeguard against any business establishment moving close to the church, and will make possible ample space for future expansion. The church was fortunate through this purchase to re-finance its indebtedness and at the same time reduce the amount of the monthly payments. The Hopewell church has sold its old parsonage and purchased a nice brick parsonage beside the church building. The basement Sunday School rooms of the Salem church have been finished making them very attractive and inviting. Through the cooperation of several ministers of the district the dining room-dormitory building on the camp ground was painted on the exterior. Also, ceiling was put in the dining room and kitchen, and the garage converted to a lunch and book stand. Our District Youth president and Youth Council are responsible for the construction of the outdoor chapel and for providing additional recreational facilities. The cost of the materials for these projects was paid by the district youth department.

Youth Camp

The district youth camp proved to be a success and blessing. Rev. D. L. Reynolds and those who worked with him did a splended job in planning and directing the camp. There was a fine group of young people present, and a goodly number bowed at an altar of prayer and sought the Lord. We should ever strive for numerical increase at the youth camps. Efforts to win young people to Christ and the church will pay big dividends.

Home Missions

Much effort has been put forth in searching for a suitable location in Warwick. A fine lot of about two acres, in an excellent location is under consideration. We have endeavored to secure a loan for the purchase of the lot and the construction of the first unit of a church building. The securing of such a loan is difficult. It is hoped that this may soon be accomplished and the work started in this prospective field.

By Council authorization the penny-a-meal calendar plan for Home Missions was launched at the beginning of 1961. A number of churches have responded favorably, and the plan is proving to be a success. If each pastor will promote it such a simple plan can become a good source of income for this all important work. The income from the budget alone is inadequate in the light of present day costs.

Goals

We cannot allow the failures of the past to discourage us. Neither can we accept them passively, but by God's help we must purpose to reverse the trend and move forward on all fronts. To help accomplish this I would recommend the following:

1. That we earnestly strive in the coming year for at least an 8 per cent increase in Sunday School attendance and a 5 per cent gain in church membership.

2. As a means in reaching these goals I would further recommend the organization of prayer groups in each local church, the program of personal evangelism, and that the "Standard of Excellence" be adopted by every Sunday School. Also, I would urge the attendance of the pastors and Sunday School Officers and teachers to the National Sunday School Convention to be held in Allentown, Pa., August 29-31.

3. That this conference adopt the penny-a-meal plan to help make possible the establishing of new churches in the district.

4. That conscientous effort be put forth to raise the District Budget and United Stewardship Fund on a month-bymonth basis.

Personal Report

During the past year I have preached 90 times, spoken on the radio for 6 devotional periods, made 59 official visits to the churches, conducted 25 annual business meetings and 40 board meetings. I planned for and attended four fellowship meetings. for the ministers and their wives. I presided over 3 Ministerial Convention Committee meetings and presided over the convention. It was my privilege to attend the two area meetings of our General Superintendent, and the two Sunday School Institutes under the direction of our Secretary of General Sunday Schools and Youth. I assisted in the youth camp. I attended one Sunday School Committee meeting and one Youth Council meeting. I attended one S.P.C. Board meeting, 2 Executive Committee meetings, and 1 meeting of the Building Committee. I presided over the Youth Conference and have endeavored to fulfill my responsibility to the district Camp. I presided over 7 District Council meetings and served as evangelist for two revival meetings and two week-end meetings. I have edited 6 issues of the "Va. Pilgrim" and circulated it among the churches. I have taken care of the correspondence and sought to discharge the duties of this office. I have traveled approximately 18,000 miles in interest of the Lord's work.

My salary from the district has been received in full. I received 6 cents per mile for all reported mileage in district interests. For revivals and week-end meetings I have received \$355.36.

It has been a privilege to serve the Lord and the district for another year. I appreciate the fine Council with whom it has been my privilege to work. It has been a joy to fellowship and work with the ministers and churches throughout the district. I am grateful for your consideration and every kindness extended me. Above all we are thankful to God for His good hand that has been upon us.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY REPORT

Mr. Chairman, and delegates of the Virginia Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings in His Name!

In the spring of this year the council asked me to fill the vacancy created by Rev. Kraus when he accepted a pastorate in another district. The Sunday School report is hereby given under two divisions Statistical and General.

This year 8 of our Sunday Schools showed a gain, 19 showed a loss and one remained the same. The two outstanding Sunday Schools that had the largest numerical and percentage gains are as follows:

These are figures which bear witness to how these fine Sunday Schools are showing it can be done.

We would like to express a word of praise to the Salem Sunday School for holding the honor of being the largest Sunday School in the conference for the third consecutive year with an average of 142. Danville has done a wonderful job of following Salem with an average of 140. Keep an eye on these two schools and see who will be leading next year.

General:

In reviewing the past year it seems a bit discouraging when we note that out of our 28 Sunday Schools 19 showed a loss. We are not placing the blame directly on any one individual or individuals. However, I do not feel it is God's will for this to continue. I realize in some local situations there seems to be some almost insurmountable problems. On the other hand in some localities such as Boissevain where the mines have shut down and families are moving away that school showed a gain. Let us bring the problem directly into focus and quit hiding behind excuses. We preach to our people not to use excuses. It is time that we as preachers and Sunday School superintendents start practicing what we preach and show that by God's help we can have a growing Sunday School that is reaching the unchurched.

In this coming conference year I would like to stress the importance of our Second National Sunday School Convention which will convene at Allentown, Pa., Aug. 29, 30 and 31 and urge every pastor, Sunday School superintendent and Sunday School teacher or officer to attend if at all possible. We are planning to attend and to those of you that will not be able to attend we shall try and bring back something that will help you and your school.

I am asking that each school will try to make some gain, and win more to Christ. Let us prove to the world and to ourselves that it can be done. We should inventory our Sunday School and see where the trouble spots are and then go to work and try to correct them. Let the words of the Psalmist David encourage our hearts, "I will intruct thee and teach thee in the way which thou shalt go: I will guide thee with mine eye." It is with appreciation for how you have worked with me in these few weeks that I ask your whole hearted support this next year.

RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that as far as possible all appointments of committees shall be made so that each committee may meet simultaneously. Further that all committees shall meet at the call of the chairman, and have their business ready for presentation.

2. Be it resolved that we have a District Camp Committee. The District Superintendent shall be the chairman. Other members of the committee shall be chairman of the following sub-committees: Advertising, Finance, Tabernacle and Dining Room.

3. Be it resolved that the Youth Zone Chairmen plan a rally each month during the school year and be it further resolved that the Zone Chairman shall coordinate all zone rallies and that the Youth President be informed of said rallies and, if possible, the Youth President shall attend at least one zone rally in each zone during the Conference year. During this rally an offering shall be taken to apply towards the president's travel expenses.

4. Be it resolved that a set of rules be drawn up by the District Council governing the dormitory and the camp ground. These shall be posted in conspicuous places. Further the District Council shall appoint two men to serve as policemen to enforce these rules.

5. Be it resolved that each pastor support the District Camp by his presence and that he strongly urge his people to attend and support the camp. It is further recommended that the local churches provide the regular support for the pastors while they are at camp.

6. Be it resolved that Sunday School enrollment be corrected not oftener than the first of each quarter. Names shall not be dropped from the roll unless they were absent at least four Sundays of the quarter, sickness excepted.

7. Be it resolved that Sunday School workers meetings be held in strategic locations over the District to accomodate groups of our churches.

8. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent appoint a Home Missionary Committee of two members to serve along with him in formulating the District Home Missionary program.

9. Be it resolved that each pastor try to bring the total Advocate subscriptions up to the total number of families represented within his church and Sunday School membership. 10. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint two of its members to serve with the Youth Executive Council in planning the date and place of the Youth Camp.

11. Be it resolved that the permanent date be set for the District Ministerial Convention with the District Council arranging the program and the workers.

12. Be it resolved that the report of receipts and expenditures for the District Camp be prepared and placed in the minutes of the District the following year.

13. Be it resolved that Virginia District assume its proportionate part of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Advancement Program as outlined by the recent General Conference. The goals for our District are: one new church organized each year for the next four years with an overall 7% increase in church membership.

14. Be it resolved that each local church in the Conference shall provide the utilities for the parsonage. The Conference shall also provide the utilities for the home of the District Superintendent.

15. Be it resolved that whenever there is a change in the office of District Superintendent, that the District Council shall endeavor to place the retiring Superintendent in a satisfactory pastorate, if he so desires.

16. Be it resolved that all pastors within a radius of 100 miles of the Camp Grounds be required to come on a date set by the District Council prior to Youth and Regular Camps to make preparations and clean up the buildings and grounds. If those who are supposed to come cannot be present, they shall send a fee of Ten Dollars to secure help locally. At the close of Camp, the same applies to those living over 100 miles away.

Note: By resolution of the 1961 Conference the District Superintendent gave a verbal report on compliance with the above standing resolution and conference took action to enforce same.

17. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be authorized to inform each church board whose deeds are not correctly filed according to the Manual to make necessary changes as soon as possible within the conference year. In the future it is further resolved that copies of deeds of all newly acquired properties be filed with the District Superintendent.

18. Be it resolved that a report on the amount of insurance carried on various properties in the District be filed with the Superintendent. 19. Be it resolved that each local church treasurer furnish a monthly financial report for the church bulletin board, covering all receipts and disbursements. The local board shall then endeavor to make the necessary adjustments to bring up the financial obligations to both the District and General Church.

20. Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc. to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

21. Whereas many churches desire to use a pastor as an evangelist for revival meetings the entire matter as to the number of meetings and the payment of supply shall be left to the local church board of the church who will work out an agreement with the pastor in this matter.

DISTRICT COUNCIL WAYS AND MEANS RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Recommend that a representative and pastor of each church which comes up to the end of the conference year without budgets paid up in full, shall meet with the District Council prior to conference and give an explanation as to the failure to meet such committments. (Budgets shall include District, General Stewardship and Ministerial Tithes).

2. Reccomend that paragraphs 2 & 3 of Section 149 of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be brought by the pastors to their respective church boards and church treasurers and that the provision of the Manual relative to specified giving be adehered to and that a sound financial plan be worked out for raising budget quotas.

WAYS AND MEANS RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend that each church pound its pastor at least once a month.

2. We recommend that the Conference fee be \$4.00 per ministerial and lay delegate; and we further recommend that each church having unstationed ministers within its membership who shall be present for the Conference shall pay said fee for them.

3. We recommend that each local treasurer forward to the district treasurer all offerings for general and district funds and the pastors tithes by the last day of each month and that a receipt for same be sent to the sender immediately. We further recommend that all general church funds shall be sent to the General Treasurer by the last day of each month.

4. We recommend that each church contribute 10% of the REGULAR offerings of the Church, the Sunday School and the Youth Society to be sent to the District Treasurer each month for district obligations. Each church shall raise its General Budget of \$8.00 per member as assessed by the General Church in a manner best suited to the local situation. We further recommend that this General Budget be raised and sent to the District Treasurer on a monthly basis.

5. We recommend that the District Conference pay the following amounts to these respective officers:

District Statistician	\$ 45.00
District Treasurer	175.00
District Secretary	75.00
District Sunday School Promotional Secretary	50.00
District Youth President	50.00

6. We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be set at \$80.00 per week, with the addition of utilities gas, lights, phone and fuel. Further, the District shall pay his remittance to the Pilgrim Pension Plan. We further recommend \$.07 per mile for District Travel plus meals, lodging and tolls.

7. We recommend that when the Y. P. Executive Secretary shall visit each Church or Society, he shall be paid the sum of Five Dollars, plus travel expense at the rate of 3c per mile. The Executive Secretary shall visit churches or societies in groups of two or more at a time. In these services an offering shall be taken, any amount in excess of Five Dollars to go to the Young People's Treasurer, from which account the Executive Secretary's travel expense shall be paid. In his visits the Executive Secretary shall remind the church society of its assessed obligation to the District Young People's organization. 8. We recommend that each YPS send \$1.00 per month to their District Treasurer and that each church or unorganized society send a free-will offering to the District YPS Treasurer. This sum shall be used for operational expenses, with any balance being reserved for the next District Youth Camp. We further recommend that the District YPS Treasurer send quarterly notice of the assessments to the societies which shall be read in a regular Young People's Meeting.

9. We recommend that the District Council be authorized to rent the District Parsonage with the provision that the premises will be vacated for us during the Youth Camp and the regular District Camp. The proceeds from this rental shall go into the regular District Treasury to help defray expenses.

10. We recommend the following:

- (1) That each pastor and local church board be responsible for each member of the church becoming a member of the Camp Association or raising equal to \$1.00 per member. These funds should be sent in to the District Treasurer before the beginning of the fourth quarter.
- (2) The engaged singers of the Camp be paid a sum not to exceed that paid to one evangelist. The sum to be reserved for the sing of the Camp whether the party workers consist of one, two or more workers.
- (3) The assessment of \$10.00 for all ministers with a salary of \$40.00 or less per week and \$15.00 for those ministers with a salary exceeding \$40.00 per week and this amount shall be placed in the Camp Expense Fund.

11. We recommend that the local treasurer withhold the tithe of the pastor's salary and that this be sent in to the District Treasurer each month along with other District and General funds.

12. We recommend that a committee appointed from the District Council explore the possibility of building a parsonage for the District Superintendent on the Camp Ground. This committee shall report its findings to the next District Conference.

13. We recommend that pastors of all churches who are not paid up in full for the past year's budgets, submit a monthly report to the District Superintendent, by the 10th of the following month. Comparison shall be made my months in '59 and '60, in receipts of USF. District Budget and Ministerial Tithe.

14. We recommend that all of our churches and members be contacted and pledges taken for the liquidation of the indebtedness on our Camp Grounds and Buildings.

15. We recommend that General Board Resolution of May 12, 1960, relative to a recommendation that each local church be requested to pay the assessment fees for pastor and wife to the Ministerial Benefit Association as well as the District paying the fees for the District Superintendent and wife, be adopted and our churches be so advised.

16. We recommend that where churches have no adequate method of raising District and General Funds the dime card system be used.

17. We recommend that the travel expense of the District Superintendent on his visits to the churches be raised as follows: Churches with less than 40 members shall pay \$8.00 per visit; churches with more than 40 members shall not pay less than \$12.00 per visit.

18. We recommend that the Home Missionary Calendars be continued as the method for raising funds for District Home Missionary work.

19. We recommend that all official travel in District interest be set at \$.07 per mile.

MEMORIALS TO THE 1962 GENERAL CONFERENCE

Memorial No. 1

"WHEREAS, the Church's Liberal Arts College is receiving a percentage of the General Budget to set up a liberal arts program for the whole Pilgrim Holiness Church and,

WHEREAS, the Liberal Arts College has become a competitor to our other college in soliciting and receiving Bible College students contrary to the stated purpose of the General Conference action, and,

WHEREAS, the said College requested and secured the conferences of East and West Michigan which had already been given as patronizing zones to other Pilgrim Colleges, and,

WHEREAS, this budget committment to our Liberal Arts College clearly shows to the world and our people a greater interest on the part of a small, evangelical denomination in liberal arts than in training ministers for the denomination,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that this unnatural and unfair situation be remedied by giving 50% specified for a Liberal Arts College to Owosso College and the other 50%of said sum to be divided equally among our Bible Colleges."

Memorial No. 2

WHEREAS, the representation on our General Board seems to consist of unequal area representation, and,

WHEREAS, there exists at present a lack of direct contact between the General Board who formulates plans and the District Superintendents, who are to carry out those plans; therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that the latter part of Section 142 of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be changed to read, "ALL District Superintendents, instead of 3 members from each of 4 area Zones.

Memorial No. 3

"WHEREAS, our Pilgrim Churches are building churches at a good rate and,

WHEREAS, our churches have a good rating in regard to payments, and,

WHEREAS, the loan fund from our Pilgrim Pension Fund is not adequate for these loans, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that our General Church Board be authorized to act as a holding company and borrow one half million dollars for the purpose of granting loans to our churches and thus keep this interest money in our church".
