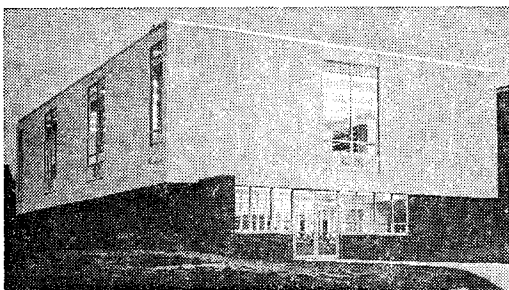


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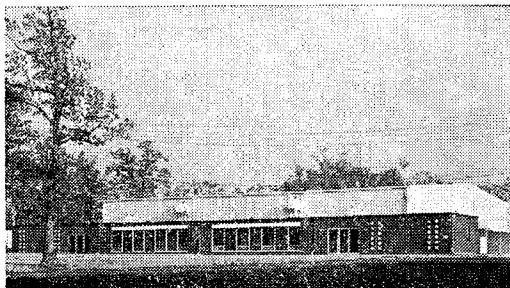

CONFERENCE MINUTES

FIRST SITTING

The forty-fifth Annual Conference of the Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, opened its first session August 15, 1966 at 9:00 A.M. in Roanoke, Va.

The District Superintendent, Rev. W. A. Massey, welcomed the delegates. He then introduced our camp Song Evangelists, Rev. and Mrs. Larry Neff. Rev. Neff led the conference in singing "Faith of Our Fathers!" Mrs. Neff accompanied at the piano. Rev. Massey then called the Conference to prayer asking Rev. C. A. Simmons to lead the prayer.

Dr. P. F. Elliott, General Superintendent and presiding officer of the conference was introduced. He brought greetings from the Board of General Superintendents giving a brief report of each one's activities. He stated that since there would be an ordination service later in the conference, he would delay his address to the conference until that time.

At the conclusion of his few remarks the conference proceeded with the business at hand. The District Secretary called the roll, calling the names of the Ministerial delegates first and then the lay-delegates. There was a motion to set the conference bar using the first ten (10) rows of seats in the middle section of the tabernacle and the platform. Motion carried.

The time for the sittings were set: The first sitting ended at 11:45 A.M., second sitting beginning at 1:30 P.M. until 4:30 P.M., the third sitting (if needed) from 6:30 P.M. until finished.

District Superintendent, Rev. W. A. Massey, then read his report to the Conference. It was received by a rising vote of appreciation and a hearty "Amen".

The Assistant Superintendent, Rev. G. A. Castevens, gave an oral report which was accepted.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read by Rev. J. A. Howard and accepted by the conference.

The District Treasurer, Rev. Arlie Cook, gave his report to the conference which was received with appreciation.

The District Statistician, Rev. C. A. Simmons, read his report. It was moved, seconded and carried to add the District Property Statement to this report. The report was then received.

The report of the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Ralph Clayton, was presented and accepted. Awards were then presented to the Sunday Schools having made outstanding achievements.

The Reception Committee presented the following visitors to the conference: Dr. Clyde Parker, President of Southern Pilgrim College, and Rev. Charles Stout. These men gave brief testimonies and were then granted honorary seats within the Conference Bar.

Mrs. G. A. Castevens, District Missionary Society President, gave a glowing report of the Society's work over the past year, including a financial report. This was accepted with appreciation.

The PELT report was then given and received. PELT Director, Rev. Charles Carroll urged all the Churches to launch this program.

Rev. Kenneth Story, Director of CYC gave an oral report stating only a few churches were now having CYC and urged the Pastors and Laymen of the conference to start this program, as soon as possible, in their church.

Rev. W. A. Massey introduced the new ministers in the Conference. They are: Rev. and Mrs. W. C. Bradley, pastors of Richmond Emmanuel, and Rev. and Mrs. Meredith Davis, pastors of the Radford Church.

The report of the Memoirs Committee was read by Mrs. Kenneth Story. With respect to those who have fallen in battle, the Conference stood for a moment of silent prayer.

Rev. B. L. Puffenbarger reported to the conference the work of the State Alcohol Education Council. This report was received with appreciation for the work they are doing.

The report of the Educational and Examining Board was read and accepted.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was called for at this time.

Recommendation #8—Amendment #1, adding the words, “by June first” was lost. Amendment #2, adding the words “by the beginning of camp meeting” was carried. Recommendation as amended—Carried.

The Sitting was adjourned by expiration of time.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the Virginia District Conference opened at 1:30 P.M., August 15, 1966. Rev. Larry Neff led the conference in singing, “Break Thou The Bread Of Life.” A special number in song was rendered by the Neffs entitled, “Jesus Gave All For Me.”

Dr. Parker, President of Southern Pilgrim College, led in Prayer.

Rev. Massey stated that by action of the conference, the first order of business was an Ordination Service for Rev. Kenneth Story, pastor of the Danville church. He then presented Rev. Story. Bro. and Sis. Story were asked to take their seats on the first row for the service. Dr. Elliott was again presented to the conference to conduct the Ordination Service and to proceed with the business of the Conference.

Rev. G. A. Castevens led in prayer. The Scripture, I Timothy 3:1-10 was read by Rev. Paul Sherwood; II Timothy 4:1-8 was read by Rev. Arlie Cook; and Titus 3:1-11 was read by Rev. B. L. Puffenbarger.

Dr. Elliott, in giving the Ordination Address, used Romans 1:15 for a text. “So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the Gospel to you that are at Rome also.”

Dr. Elliott stated that God requires total commitment. Such a man as Paul with his wealth, career and education, renounced it all and said in effect, “With all my being, all my power, I am ready to preach the Gospel”. He further stated that the Pilgrim Holiness Church is looking for ministers like this. Why do we say the call to the Christian Ministry is the highest calling?

I. There are three reasons:

A. Because of Who calls—God Calls.

B. Because of what is involved—the responsibility of lost souls.

C. Because of the rewards—Souls getting saved and working for the Lord.

II. There are three periods in a minister's life:

A. The period of preparation

B. The Active period

C. The Retirement period

(note) For all three of these periods the church has a responsibility.

III. Ministers should have "Total Commitment."

A. Total Commitment in Service

B. Total Commitment To The Holy Spirit.

C. Total Commitment to Jesus Christ.

(note) The Apostle had a similar situation to ours, but he never gave up. He said "I am ready to preach the Gospel to you that are in Rome also." God gave him success.

After Dr. Elliott's fine address, Rev. Story was asked to kneel at the altar, with his hands on the Bible, while the members of the District Council knelt with him and laid their hands on him. Dr. Elliott then prayed the Ordination prayer. The congregation sang the Doxology while the members of the Conference shook hands with Bro. and Sis. Story.

The Welcoming Committee presented Rev. Earl Gentry, President of the Virginia Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and Rev. Charles Heavilin. Rev. Gentry gave words of greeting to the conference after which these brethren were granted a seat in the conference bar.

The Ways and Means report was continued at this time.

Recommendation #9—Adopted

Recommendation #10—with the addition of the word "otherwise" was adopted.

The Resolutions Committee read another resolution

Resolution #3—adopted

Due to the fact that one of the Covington Church delegates was unable to attend, it was moved and carried that another member could be seated in her place.

There being no further reports or business to come before the conference the Chairman called for the Election of officers. Rev. Massey appointed the following as tellers: Rev. J. A. Howard, head teller; Rev. Arlie Cook, Rev. Charles Carroll, Mr. William Booth, Rev. Robert Tice, Rev. D. L. Reynolds and Rev. W. B. Derr.

Dr. Elliott explained that Bro. Massey was elected for a term of two years last year and would not be voted upon this year.

District Trustees were nominated by District Supt. Massey, and were approved by the conference. They are: Mr. J. H. Fralin, Mr. Paul Priest, and Mr. J. H. Massey.

A motion prevailed to have the District Council read and approve the minutes of the conference, and to take care of any unfinished business. Motion carried.

The Resolutions Committee read three additional resolutions all having to do with expressions of appreciation. These were approved.

Dr. Elliott spoke briefly to the conference, giving information regarding the Pension plan and the Ministerial Benefit Association. Urging both the pastors and churches to join up.

Rev. Massey expressed words to the conference for the fine co-operation he had received the past year and reminded the conference of the goals which had been set.

There being no further business, it was moved and seconded to adjourn. The conference was dismissed in prayer by Dr. Elliott.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

I extend warm greetings to our newly elected General Superintendent, Dr. Elliott, and to the delegates and friends of the forty-fifth conference of the Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Another year is history and we are gathered here to hear reports and face factually our failures as well as our accomplishments and to lay plans for the future. May the Holy Spirit be pleased to assist and guide us that we may discover the Divine will and follow through as would please Him.

STATISTICAL REPORT

According to the reports I have received eleven churches have shown a gain in membership, seven have shown a loss, and all others have remained the same as last year. The churches leading in net gains are: Roanoke 18, Vinton 11, and Boissevain, Danville, and Millenbeck each reported a gain of five. A small increase in membership was realized for the district.

Our District Promotional Secretary of Sunday Schools will be giving the full report on this department. I do regret that we have shown a loss in attendance. However, with God's help we can change the losses into gains. A resolution will be presented to this conference in which a numerical goal is set for each Sunday School. I hope the conference will adopt it and that each pastor, and Sunday School Superintendent may seek to challenge their group to reach its goal and that we may come to the next conference and report a substantial increase.

The members of the Christo Church decided last November that it would be best, for at least a while, to discontinue services. A part of the congregation is attending one of our other churches. It is hoped this work may be re-opened in the not too distant future.

FINANCIAL FACTS

There has been fine increase in the over-all finances in the district, over the past several years.

The per capita giving for the 1964-65 Conference year was \$209.08. The increase has been reflected in some measure in the United Stewardship Fund and in a greater degree in our giving to district interests. The percentage of United Stewardship Fund paid is very slightly above a year ago and is the best we have done in the last eight years. We paid 66.1% which is far below what should have been done. I can see no reason why Virginia should not take its place among the highest districts percentagewise and I would like to challenge us to do it this year.

Our District Treasurer's report will indicate a substantial increase in District Budget and ministerial tithe over one year ago. However, there was some decrease in the penny-a-meal for District Home Missions.

Ten churches paid the United Stewardship Fund, District Budget, and ministerial tithe 100% and deserve honourable mention. They are: Beulah, Charlottesville, Danville, Norfolk, Remlik, Richmond Emmanuel, Richmond First, Roanoke, Salem, and Staunton. Several others have given substantially but did not make the hundred per cent on all three items.

PROPERTY GAINS AND IMPROVEMENTS

Since the churches are afforded the opportunity of reporting through the "Virginia Pilgrim", I shall report only the major improvements that I know about. The Doran Church constructed a 26 x 38 foot wing on both the main floor and basement and has remodeled the original part of the church. The Covington Church remodeled its sanctuary and added a nursery, choir room, choir loft, and a pastor's study. Richmond First installed air-conditioning and a new furnace for the sanctuary, also new light fixtures and re-decorated the same at a cost of approximately \$5,300.00.

The first unit of the Warwick Church has been completed and used for worship since December. The Waynesboro Church is progressing with the construction of eight Sunday School Rooms and improvements in the sanctuary. The most of the work is being done by the congregation.

YOUTH CAMPS

Both the junior and senior youth camps were well attended and a number found spiritual help. We are grateful to our District Youth President and the corps of workers who gave unstintingly of their time and energy to make these camps a success. Let us all faithfully work for continued increase in the youth camps.

HOME MISSIONS

A small nucleus of people have been located in Fredericksburg who would be interested in starting a Pilgrim Church. I have sought for a minister to go in and help us start a church in this area, but so far my efforts have been unsuccessful. Let us continue to pray that the Lord may enable us to find the open door He may have for us and that a new church may be opened this conference year.

LOOKING AHEAD

As we face the future let our motto be "forward with Christ." Let us emphasize first of all the deepening and cultivation of the spiritual life of all. May there be a united effort for greater outreach and substantial increase in Sunday School and Church attendance with the ultimate purpose of winning the lost to Christ and bringing them into membership and fellowship of the church. The CYC and PELT programs can be of untold value in strengthening the ministries and outreach of our churches. I would sincerely solicit the cooperation of every pastor and church in making an all out effort to meet all district and general church assessments a hundred per cent.

Included in our net loss of 43 is that of the Christo Sunday School which accounts for a numerical loss of 23. We sincerely trust that this next year will be a year of gain.

Staunton has the honor of having the largest numerical gain for the

year, and Millenbeck the largest percentage gain. Of the nine schools that are participating in the "Standard of Excellence" and the "Decade of Progress", Roanoke is the winner with 12,495 points, and receives the "Ship" trophy for the first time. Remlik comes in second, and Richmond First, third in competition for the "Ship". We encourage all our Sunday Schools to participate in this contest this next year.

PERSONAL

We were privileged this past year to have a group of men from our Headquarters come to Virginia with Rev. O. D. Emery and hold three area seminars. Each seminar was well attended with many teachers and officers from the district.

I have endeavored to promote the Sunday School through monthly reports, letters, and a district-wide "March to Sunday School in March" contest which we continued through the month of April. The winners of the contest were Richmond Emmanuel and Millenback.

GOALS

To have bigger and better Sunday Schools we need people with a vision. Then with much prayer, promotion through "Citizens for Sunday School", visitation on class levels, PELT, and other church delegated contests, we believe there can and will be progress this year of 1966-'67. *We are asking that each Sunday School with an average weekly attendance of over 50 strive for a numerical gain this year of ten, and that those under 50 work for a gain of 7.* May God richly bless each Sunday School as we labor together for His Kingdom.

REPORT OF PELT DIRECTOR

Mr. Chairman, and delegates to the Forty-fifth annual conference of the Virginia District Pilgrim Holiness Church; Christian Greetings.

In 1963, our denomination, through the Sunday School and Youth Department, launched a wonderful program for leadership training, on the local level, called "PELT" (Pilgrim Evangelical Leadership Training). Our Church had contracted with "E.T.T.A." (Evangelical Teacher Training Association) in setting up Pilgrim training courses. By using the "E.T.T.A." text books in our "PELT" course, we were able to offer credit with E.T.T.A.

Much progress has been made and I feel will continue to be made in the "PELT" program of our church. As of May 6, 1966, Rev. O. D. Emery, the General Director, stated the following in a letter to me: "Twenty-eight districts now have one or more certified PELT instructors. There are two hundred twenty-six certified instructors, six hundred ninety-six credits have been issued to persons in fifty-five churches in twenty-five districts".

I am happy to report to you that in the Virginia Conference, we have ten certified instructors and that during this past year, three of our churches, for the first time, have had a course taught. They are as follows:

DISTRICT RESOLUTIONS — 1966

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

1. Be it resolved that Sunday School enrollment for each school be corrected at the beginning of each calendar quarter. Names shall not be dropped from the roll unless they were absent at least four Sundays of the quarter, sickness excepted.

2. Be it resolved that Sunday School Workers meetings be held in strategic locations over the District so as to accommodate groups of Churches.

3. Be it resolved that each Sunday School of the Virginia Conference strive for the following gains:

(a) Those with average attendance less than 50 strive for a numerical goal of seven (7) for this fiscal year, 1966-67.

(b) Those with average attendance more than 50 strive for a numerical goal of ten (10) for this fiscal year, 1966-67.

DISTRICT CAMP

1. Be it resolved that we have a District Camp Committee. The District Superintendent shall serve as Chairman. Other members of the Committee shall be chairmen of the following sub-committees: Advertising, Finance, Tabernacle, and Dining Room.

2. Be it resolved that a set of rules be drawn up by the District Council governing the dormitory and camp grounds. Said rules shall be posted in conspicuous places. Further, the District Council shall appoint two men to serve as policemen to enforce these rules.

3. The District Camp Committee met July 19, 1964, in the afternoon at the Staunton Pilgrim Holiness Church, with two members present. After discussion the following resolutions were made relative to the building of cottages on the camp grounds:

(a) Be it resolved that all cottages shall be constructed of cinder block with concrete floors and asphalt composition roof. Single cottages should be 24' x 22' and double cottages should be 32' x 22'. Each owner shall have the privilege of finishing the inside as he chooses.

(b) As long as the grounds are kept clean, electric costs paid and everything conducted properly, owners of cottages may use them at times other than during camp period.

(c) The District shall charge a fee of \$30.00 to lease space for a single cottage and \$50.00 for a double cottage space. Further-

more, any transfer of ownership of cottages may be made only after District Council and Camp Board approval.

(d) A fee of \$2.00 shall be charged for a cottage for the period of the annual Camp to cover cost of lights and ironing privileges. Cottages with additional appliances such as electric refrigerators, etc., shall be charged \$6.00 for the same period.

(e) The workmanship of each cottage must meet the standards established by the Camp Committee. A contract of regulations is to be drawn up between each cottage owner and the Camp Committee.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. Be it resolved that whenever there is a change in the office of the District Superintendent, the District Council shall endeavor to place the retiring Superintendent in a satisfactory pastorate, if he so desires.

2. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be authorized to inform each church board whose deeds are not filed correctly according to the Manual to make such necessary changes within the Conference year. In the future it is further resolved that copies of deeds of all newly acquired properties be filed with the District Superintendent.

3. Be it resolved that a report on the amount of insurance carried on various properties in the District be filed with the District Superintendent.

4. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent appoint a Home Missionary Committee of two members to serve along with him in formulating the District Home Missionary program.

5. The District Superintendent shall be granted a two weeks vacation with pay.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Be it resolved that as far as possible all appointments of Committees be made so that all committees can meet simultaneously. Further, all committees shall meet at the call of the chairman and have their business ready for presentation at the opening session of the Annual Conference.

2. Be it resolved that Resolution number 2 on page 31 of the 1965 Conference Journal be deleted.

3. Be it resolved that all matters pertaining to District Youth work be placed in a separate section in the District Minutes. This includes

Youth Executive Directory, Youth Zone Chairmen, Conference Minutes, Ways and Means Report, Resolutions, Standing Rules and Treasurer's Report.

LOCAL PASTORS

1. Be it resolved that each pastor support the District Camp with his presence and that he strongly urge his people to attend and support the camp. Local churches shall provide the regular support of the Pastors while they are in attendance at camp.

2. Be it resolved that each pastor strive to bring the total Advocate subscription to the total number of families represented within his Church and Sunday School membership.

3. Be it resolved that all pastors within the radius of 100 miles of the Camp Grounds be required to come on a date set by the District Council, prior to Youth Camp to make preparations and clean the buildings and grounds; those who live beyond 100 miles of the Camp Grounds be required to come on a date set by the District Council, prior to District Camp to make preparations and clean the buildings and grounds. All pastors shall remain after the camp and clean the buildings and grounds.

Be it further resolved that any pastor who cannot be present shall secure someone in his place and pay that person a fee of \$10.00.

4. Whereas no standard procedure has been established by the General Church to determine what shall constitute a pastoral call; therefore, be it resolved that the Virginia District shall establish the following as its procedure for reporting pastoral calls. Each personal call to the home or hospital shall constitute a pastoral call. Further, each person called on shall be counted as one call. Example—if a father and mother with three children are visited by the pastor and only the father and mother are church members the pastor shall report it as two pastoral calls on members and three pastoral calls on non-members. Further, a call at a home where no one is home shall be counted as one call.

LOCAL CHURCHES

1. Be it resolved that each local church in the Conference shall provide the utilities for the parsonage. The Conference shall provide the utilities for the District Superintendent.

2. Be it resolved that each local Church Treasurer furnish a monthly financial report for the Church bulletin board, covering all receipts and disbursements. The local church board shall then endeavor to make the necessary adjustments to bring up the financial obligations to both the District and General Church.

3. Whereas we as a District have not realized the desired gains in the various departments of our local churches; therefore, be it resolved that we as a Conference strive this year to obtain the following goals:

(a) That a prayer and fasting league be organized in each church to pray for the Pilgrim Holiness Church—General, District and Local.

(b) To realize a five per-cent net gain in Church membership.

(c) To strive for the following gains in the Sunday School Department:

(1) Sunday Schools with average attendance less than 50 strive for a numerical goal of seven (7).

(2) Sunday Schools with average attendance more than 50 strive for a numerical goal of ten (10).

(d) To pay the United Stewardship Fund, District Budget, Pastor's tithe in full and encourage the support of the Penny-A-Meal offering for District Home Missions.

4. To better acquaint new members received into the Pilgrim Holiness Church; resolved that each church give one year's subscription of the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate and a copy of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Manual to said member's home.

JOURNAL MINUTES

1. Be it resolved that the report of receipts and expenditures for the District Camp be prepared and placed in the District Minutes of the following year.

2. Be it resolved that the Editing Committee classify all resolutions appearing in the Conference Journal under appropriate headings, such as Youth, Annual Resolutions, etc.

DISTRICT AND GENERAL CHURCH

1. Whereas the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc. to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of Pilgrim Holiness Church Districts; Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of the District that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials, be, and they are authorized to do and perform all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans of local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this District, subject however, to the limitations set forth in said resolutions of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

2. Be it resolved that the Virginia District assume its proportionate part of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Advancement Program as outlined by the recent General Conference. The goals for our District are: One new Church organized each year for the next four years with the overall 7% increase in Church membership.

3. Be it resolved that a permanent date be set for the District Ministerial Convention with the District Council making arrangements for the program and the workers.

APPRECIATION

1. Be it resolved that a rising vote of thanks and a hearty "Amen" be given to our General Superintendent, Dr. P. F. Elliott, for his splendid leadership, in presiding over the Virginia District Conference.

2. Be it resolved that we show our sincere appreciation to our District Superintendent, Reverend W. A. Massey, for his faithful ministry among us, his great leadership and his dedication to the work of the Lord and the District by saying, "God Bless You."

3. Be it resolved that we express our deep appreciation to the cooks and helpers for the good meals they've prepared and served during the Conference, by a great big, "Thank You."

WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTIONS — 1966

DISTRICT COUNCIL

1. Each representative and pastor of each church who comes up to the end of the conference year without budgets paid in full, shall meet with the District Council, prior to the Conference and give an explanation for its failure, to meet such commitments. (Budgets shall include, District, General Stewardship and Ministerial Tithe.)

2. Paragraphs 2 and 3 of section 149 of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall be brought to the attention of the local church boards and treasurers by the pastor. The provision of the Manual relative to specified giving shall be adhered to and a sound financial plan be worked out for the raising of budget quotas.

3. Four hundred feet across the front of the Camp Grounds be sold at a price of approximately one hundred dollars per foot frontage. The proceeds from this sale would be used to pay off the indebtedness on the Camp Ground and provide much needed facilities.

LOCAL CHURCHES

1. Each Local Treasurer shall forward to the District Treasurer all offerings for general and district funds and the pastor's tithe, by the last day of each month and a receipt for the same shall be sent to the sender immediately. All general church funds shall be sent to the General Treasurer by the last day of each month.

2. All ordained and licensed ministers, except active and retired missionaries, shall pay their ministerial tithe to the District Treasurer monthly through the local church by withholding the ministerial tithe or otherwise, or by direct remittance to the District Treasurer.

3. Our churches shall be advised of the General Board Resolution of May 12, 1960 relative to a recommendation that each church pay the assessment fees for pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the District cover fees for the District Superintendent and his wife.

4. Where churches have no adequate method of raising District and General Funds the dime book system shall be used.

5. Travel expenses of the District Superintendent on his visits to the churches shall be raised as follows:

Churches with less than 40 assessable members shall pay \$8.00 per visit; and churches with more than 40 assessable members shall pay \$12.00 per visit.

6. Each local church shall pay the conference fee of \$4.00 each for the pastor, and retired ministers, and District officials who are members of its congregation. The local churches shall also pay the conference fee and travel expense of their lay delegates.

7. Each church shall contribute 10% of the regular offerings of the Church and Sunday School to be sent to the District Treasurer each month for District obligations. Each Church shall raise its United Stewardship Fund of \$9.50 per member by the method best suited. General monies shall be sent to the District Treasurer on a monthly basis.

8. We recommend that each church pay its pastor's hospitalization insurance if at all possible, unless a working pastor has insurance through the company where he is working.

9. Whereas, the need of a District Parsonage is evident and an effort to build one has been hindered by lack of funds, be it resolved that at least \$500.00 of the Superintendent Fund be set aside each year, if possible, until sufficient money is accumulated to make a substantial down payment. The balance could be handled by the rental allowance.

10. We recommend that each church send at least \$10.00 to the District Treasurer by February 15 to help support Alcohol Education Council.

11. Whereas our United Stewardship Fund is prorated to a Home Missionary Church in the following manner; $\frac{1}{4}$ the first year, $\frac{1}{2}$ the second year and $\frac{1}{4}$ the third year, full responsibility the fourth year, therefore, be it resolved that our district budget of 10% be prorated in the following manner: 2% the first year, 4% the second year, 6% the third year and the full 10% the fourth year.

12. Inasmuch as the District ministerial conventions are held each year for the specific purpose of aiding the ministers in their work for the Church, therefore, we recommend that each church pay the pastor's expense to make possible his attending. The expense shall include Transportation and Meals.

13. Since there are so many new communities in Virginia with a growing population, and Pilgrim Churches could be established if funds were available, we recommend that each pastor urge the members of his congregation to seriously consider leaving a stipulation in a will or insurance policy to help sponsor a home missionary church in the Virginia Conference. If a substantial amount be given, the new church could become a memorial church to his memory, bearing his name.

DISTRICT

1. The District Conference shall pay the following amounts to the respective officers:

District Statistician	\$ 50.00
District Treasurer	300.00
District Secretary	150.00
District Sunday School Promotional Secretary	\$100.00

2. The District Council is authorized to rent the District Parsonage with the provision that the premises be vacated during Youth and Regular Camps. The proceeds from this rental shall go into the regular treasury to help defray expenses.

3. Each of the following shall apply to the respective groups:

(a) Each pastor and local church board shall raise an offering on the First Sunday of May for the District Camp Meeting Expenses and forward the same to the District Treasurer. If this free-will offering does not amount to \$1.00 per member, the needed amount to make the difference is to be taken from the Church Treasury.

(b) The engaged singers for the District Camp Meeting shall be paid a sum not to exceed that paid the Evangelist. This sum shall be reserved to pay the singers whether the party consists of one, two or more workers.

(c) The assessment of \$10.00 for all ministers, except missionaries, with a salary of \$40.00 or less per week; and \$15.00 assessment for ministers whose salaries exceed \$40.00 per week shall be paid to the Camp Expense Fund, by the beginning of each District Camp, whether the minister is present or absent.

4. The District Council is authorized to work with any local church in securing loans using the financial standings of the Conference as reflected in the property statements of the Journal, the combined Conference equity and the current District Treasurer Balance Sheet, as the basis of negotiation for such loans.

5. The Home Missionary (Church Extension) Calendars shall be used by our churches as the method of raising funds for District Church Extension.

6. All official travel in the District shall be paid at the rate of 7¢ per mile.

7. The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$100.00 per week, with the addition of utilities, gas, lights, phone, water, and fuel. The District shall pay his remittance to the Pilgrim Pension Fund, and his hospitalization insurance. Official travel shall be covered by District Funds at the rate of 7c per mile, plus meals, lodgings and road tolls. The rental allowance for the District Parsonage shall be set at \$80.00 per month.

8. A determined effort shall be made throughout the District to secure one hundred or more friends who will pledge ten dollars per year as a supplementary fund for the District Camp Meeting expense.

9. The District Superintendent shall be paid the equivalent of one week's salary as a Christmas gift.

10. We recommend that each church of 35 members or less send \$5.00 annually to help defray the expense of the District Ministerial Convention. The Churches that exceed 35 members shall send \$10.00 annually. The Designated amounts are to be paid to the District Treasurer by the end of February of each year.

11. In order that more may be accomplished in home missionary work, we propose that a plan be worked out with some bank or loan company for open line credit with a maximum of \$40,000.00 to be underwritten by the District. The transaction would be authorized and arranged by the District Council.

This will provide funds for land and buildings for a new church to get started. After one or two years, when the new church group

has had time to establish credit locally; it is expected that they will refinance the project, and the District will clear the loan with the original lender. The District will then borrow again for another home missionary project. The District will help pay the interest to the bank granting the open line credit.

A revolving fund of this kind under proper direction will help us get moving in our home missionary program. The plan is working in several other districts.

We recommend that the plan be implemented by the District Council as soon as possible.

12. We recommend that the second Sunday of September be designated as Tabernacle Day and the pastors shall present the pledge cards to their congregations and urge liberal offerings for the Tabernacle on the Roanoke Camp Grounds.

REPORT FROM THE TRUSTEE TO THE ALCOHOL EDUCATION COUNCIL

RICHMOND,VIRGINIA

The annual board of trustees met at Roslyn, the spacious retreat of the Episcopal Church just West of Richmond, Va., in December 1965.

The Council now has delegates from 18 denominations in the State of Virginia. There are two full time men and a Secretary. The men travel to schools and colleges in the State and set forth the program of Alcohol Education. The Council also wields a tremendous influence in the legislature to prevent the sale of whiskey by the drink.

It used to be that ministers and temperence workers carried the revolt against liquor. Now, however, industrialists, educators, police departments, traffic engineers etc., along with welfare agencies are very concerned about the alcohol problem.

The office in Richmond contacts the trustees from the denomination and he in turn notifies the churches in his denomination as to letter writing to legislators, etc.; or other methods of united effort for the cause of alcohol education.

1966 YOUTH CONFERENCE MINUTES

Clayton on behalf of the Resolutions Committee expressed appreciation for Dr. Elliott, presiding over our conference, by having everyone to stand and say, "God Bless You." Dr. Elliott then spoke briefly on the great challenge of America. He pointed out that $\frac{1}{2}$ of America is under the age of 25. He also pointed out that 4 out of 5 of everyone he preaches to gets saved before they are 25.

Conference concluded by expiration of time.

Rev. W. A. Massey gave the dismissal prayer.

I have appreciated the opportunity to serve another year as your District Youth President. It has been a privilege to work with those whom you have chosen to labor with me in this great task. Their co-operation has made the job much easier. God's blessings have been evident in many of our activities, which make the work seem worth while.

LOCAL YOUTH SOCIETIES

The Statistician's report shows a gain of 26 members and a loss of 4 in the average attendance in our Local Youth Societies. I realize that the conditions vary in our Zones, but it seems evident that the Zone Chairmen largely hold the key to the success of the Zone activities. The work of the Zone Leader, however, can be made much easier and more effective, if he has the cooperation of every pastor and Youth President. I enjoyed being in the rallies which I was able to attend, in a number of the zones. We trust that the Zone Leaders elected in this Conference will give your best to this important part of the District Youth Program.

YOUTH CAMP

Our Youth Camps are one of the strongest arms of our Youth work and I know of no part of our District Program that has had a more encouraging growth. We must not only preserve our Youth Camps, but do all we can to see them grow from year to year. To do this, every pastor, young person and member of the district must feel his responsibility.

The results of our two Camps this year were thrilling. We had 74 registered Campers in the Junior camp and 80 enrolled in the Senior Camp. The presence of God was evident in both Camps, with most of the young people going home knowing Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour.

We appreciated the many who cooperated so well in doing the

various jobs assigned to them. God honored the preaching of Rev. and Mrs. Bradley in the Junior Camp and Rev. G. A. Castevens in the Senior Camp.

1. Be it resolved that each Zone Chairman give an annual report to the Youth Conference of the activities of his Zone.
2. Be it resolved that each local pastor advise his Youth Society President as to the dues of one dollar per month, and 10% of the regular offerings to be sent to the District Youth Treasurer.
3. Be it resolved that the Standing Resolutions and Ways and Means resolutions from the Youth Conference be listed as such in a separate section of the conference journal under "Youth Conference."
4. Whereas, in the past, the minutes of the District Youth Conference have not been approved until the following Youth Conference and whereas, the minutes of the District Youth Conference go into the conference journal not having been approved, be it therefore resolved that the minutes of the District Youth Conference be approved

by the District Youth Executive Council before said minutes are placed in the Conference Journal.

5. Be it resolved that the host church for the Youth Rally count one point for each person towards the Youth Banner, other participating churches count one point per person plus one point per mile up to twenty-five (25) miles one way. Also an extra point per person is given all person between the ages 13 - 35 years.

6. Whereas the youth camp has outgrown our present facilities, therefore, be it resolved that we have two separate youth camps in the future; ages 9-12, and 13-teens. Further that the District Youth Council schedule the date for said camps.

7. Be it resolved that in the event of a change of local youth presidents, the outgoing president shall prepare the annual report for the incoming president to give at the District Youth Conference.

8. Be it resolved that a Zone Committee be set up. This will consist of an assistant Zone Chairman, a Secretary, and Treasurer. These members will assist the Zone Chairman.

9. Be it resolved that each church bring to the first Zone meeting of said church two recommended candidates of the active membership for the office of assistant Zone Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer.

10. Be it resolved that the pastors and local youth presidents or representatives within the Zones serve as advisory members of the Zone committee in planning zone meetings.

11. Be it resolved that the zone committee meet immediately following each zone meeting.

12. Be it resolved that the District Youth President attend the first Zone Rally of each zone for the purpose of organizing and explaining the duties of the Zone committee and that the Youth President work out a schedule for this first meeting only.

YOUTH RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint two of its members to serve with the Youth Council in planning the date and place of the Youth Camp and other related activities. This Committee to meet at least twice a year.

2. Be it resolved that the Youth Zone Chairman plan a rally each month during the school year and be it further resolved that the Zone

Chairman shall co-ordinate all Zone Rallies and that the Youth President of the District be informed of said rallies and, if possible, be present at the first Zone rally during the Conference year. At this rally an offering shall be taken to help defray the travel expense of the District Youth President.

3. Be it resolved that Zone #1—Western Zone and Zone #2 — Rovinco Zone be combined into one Zone.

Be it further resolved that the Youth Council shall name and number the new combined Zone.

YOUTH CONFERENCE

WAYS AND MEANS

1. We recommend that each youth society shall send \$1.00 per month to the District youth treasurer and each church or organized society send a free-will offering to the District Youth Treasurer. This sum shall be used for operational expenses, and any balance shall be reserved for the next District Youth Camp. The District Youth Treasurer shall send, at the beginning of the Third Quarter, a notice of assessments to the Youth Society Presidents which shall be read in a regular Youth Society meeting.

2. We recommend that the District Youth President's salary be established at \$100.00, and we further recommend that the payment be made from the District Youth Treasury.

3. We recommend that the Youth Camp fee be \$10.00 per camper, and we further recommend that the fee be \$9.00 per camper for any church sending in five or more campers to each camp.

4. We recommend that after all Zone expenses have been paid, 50% of the balance remaining in the Zone treasury be retained by the Zone and 50% of the balance be forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer.

5. We recommend that 10% of the regular offerings of the local youth society be sent to the District Youth Treasurer. 5% of this to be sent on to the General Sunday School and Youth work and 5% to be kept for the District Youth work.

6. We recommend that 3 cents per mile be paid to all youth Camp workers who incur transportation expense to and from Youth Camp.
