The Ways and Means Committee bring back to the assembly that which was referred to them for redrafting.

Moved and supported that all the ministers pay one-half their tithes into the district treasury. An amendment is added to this motion that all deaconesses pay one-half of their tithe of the moneys they receive from their ministerial labors. Moved and supported that this resolution be referred back to the committee for redrafting, setting a minimum to be paid by all ministers and deaconesses who are not actively engaged in the ministry. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that the secretary collect as far as possible all the old minutes and place them in the record book. Carried.

Next in order is the election of one member on the examining board to serve for three years. Brother J. C. Brillhart was re-elected, and E. D. Joy serving for two years more and J. F. Woods for one year more.

H. F. Ensley gives his report relative to his portion of the tent work in the district.

Moved that report be received and added to the regular tent meeting report. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that the Auditing Committee's report be accepted. Motion carried.

The Charleston Delegates give the Sunday School Statistical and Financial reports which were accepted.

Brother Eaton is excused from the Assembly.

Moved and supported that the Wilburn church report be accepted and handed over to the Statistical Committee. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that Sisters Gibson, Green and Jones, from Charleston be granted honorary seats within the conference bar. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that the assembly extend a rising vote of thanks at the evening services, expressing our appreciation to the Barboursville church and community for the splendid way in which they have entertained this assembly. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that the recommendation of the Council relative to the distribution of the general and district funds be accepted by the assembly. Motion carried.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the Eighteenth Assembly convened at Barboursville, W. Va., September 20th to 25th, 1927,

Dear Pilgrims and Assembly:

Another Assembly year has rolled around and we have met for the purpose of not only transacting business for God's glory, but I trust, fellowship and comfort.

Time seems to be on wings. It reminds us that our opportunities for advancement of the Kingdom of God are slipping by almost before we realize it. I am sure we are thankful to Him for the way He has helped us this year, but it seems we ought to have accomplished more in this great harvest field. I trust we have done our best.

Some of us will not soon forget the beautiful spirit which pervaded the assembly last year. God wills that all our assemblies shall be characterized by this same atmosphere. Our constant prayer during the year has been, that the West Virginia District would be deeply spiritual. If we fail in this respect all our efforts will only be mechanical.

By the help of the Lord we have been enabled to reach new territory this year. We have organized six new churches, namely:

Richwood, of which Rev. C. S. Gladwell is the pastor.

Clarksburg, of which Rev. Hattie Hickman is pastor.

Rammage, of which Rev. W. C. Hill is pastor.

Rawl, of which Rev. Cecil Phillips is pastor.

Wilburne, of which Rev. John Stewart is pastor,

and West Union of which Rev. H. F. Ensley is pastor.

I have preached 165 times; have made 75 calls; have had 86

seekers; have prayed with or anointed 30 persons; I have received free will offerings from the following churches:

Williamson, \$47.32; Bramwell, \$40.32; Nine Mile, \$13.45; Logan, \$32.18; Wayne, \$4.40; Parkersburg, \$39.58; Richwood, \$14.42; Charleston, \$16.37; Three Mile, \$6.60; Dana, \$9.30; Rawl, \$4.00; Ramage, \$19.30; Barboursville, \$10.01; Wilburne, \$7.22; Clarksburg, \$7.62; Huntington, \$48.82 and Ona, \$14.64.

My expenses for traveling over the district were \$163.48.

I visited the most of the churches four times.

Last assembly we reported 410 members. This year we can report 510. A net gain of 100 members. I have received for support up to date, \$1,200.00.

### RESOLUTIONS

#### RESOLUTION NUMBER ONE

Whereas, there is no provision in our manual whereby an outgoing District Superintendent can plan for the future as he has no way of knowing if he will be continued in office or not until the election of officers.

Therefore, BE IT RESOLVED:

That the newly elected District Superintendent at each District Assembly of West Virginia be ex-officio chairman of the District Council for sixty (60) days after the District Assembly at which time his official term of office shall begin, and shall continue until sixty (60) days after the next District Assembly.

Be it further resolved:

That the newly elected District Superintendent's salary begin at his official term of office, sixty (60) days after the District Assembly and that it shall continue until sixty (60) days after the next District Assembly.

Be it further resolved:

That the outgoing District Superintendent shall council with the District Superintendent elect and shall as far as possible, carry out any program that may be formed by him and the District Council. He shall have a voice and vote in the District Council until his term of office expires, at which time, unless having been elected a member of the District Council, he shall no longer have a voice or a vote.

Be it further resolved:

That this resolution be effective on its passage; and that it continue in effect until the next General Assembly when it shall be presented to the General Assembly as a memorial.—Adopted.

## RESOLUTION NUMBER TWO

No. 2—Be it resolved: That no pastor shall proceed to build, repair or buy a meeting house or parsonage where more than \$1,000 is involved without the consent of the District Supt.—Adopted.

## RESOLUTION NUMBER THREE

No. 3—Be it resolved that resolution No. 2, page 21 and Resolution No. 11, page 22 of the Minutes of the District Assembly of West Virginia of the year 1924, also all other resolutions that have been, or shall be passed by the District Assembly of West Virginia, shall remain valid until such a time as they shall be revoked by the District Assembly.—Adopted.

## RESOLUTION NUMBER FOUR

No. 4—Whereas the last three lines of Section 90, top of page 43 of the manual of 1926 was not passed by the General Assembly held at Frankfort, Indiana.—Adopted.

Be it resolved: That the pastors of West Virginia be called according to Section 90, and that they continue in office as long as they and the church feel it is God's will. A change may be made by either the pastor or the church by giving 60 days notice, or by mutual consent, it can be made immediately.

Recommended by resolution committee.

## RESOLUTION NUMBER FIVE

Since the educational necessities in all our districts are practically the same, and in that a great deal of hard and duplicated work can be avoided, be it resolved that this Assembly appeal to the general Board of Education to prepare the needful amount of question on all the subjects in the course of study, and copies of the same forwarded to all the secretaries of the various districts who, in turn, forward same to district examining board.—Adopted.

## RESOLUTION NUMBER SIX

Resolved, that a fund be created by all our active preachers, both pastors and evangelists, paying into the treasury the other one-half of their tithe from all their ministerial labors to be divided by the District Council among our poorly supported pastors.—Lost.

## RESOLUTION NUMBER SEVEN

Resolved, that the District Council be instructed to prepare a form for the district treasurer to follow in dividing and apportioning the money of the district not definitely provided for.—Tabled.

## WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTION No. 1

In order to proportionately and duly consider all the departments of our church and at the same time protect the local church so it can still handle its local obligations without embarrassment, we submit to you the following recommendations:

That we increase the salary of our District Sup. (plus expenses) per year -----	\$ 100.00
That we raise for Home Missions -----	500.00
That we raise for church extension -----	500.00
That we raise for Dist. Printing -----	150.00

That we raise for Dist. Secretary -----	25.00
That we raise for Dist. Treasurer -----	25.00
	-----\$1,300.00

—Adopted.

That this amount be raised by apportioning the same among our churches at the rate of \$3.50 per member, apportioned on the basis of the numerical and financial strength of each church by the District Council.—Adopted.

Amendment—That the District Council should present to Assembly the apportioned amount for each church.

We further recommend the adoption of the financial plan which Brother Cox has to present to this Assembly.—Adopted.

### RESOLUTION NUMBER TWO

We recommend that all regular ordained and licensed ministers who are not regularly engaged in the ministry pay into the District Treasury eight dollars per year, which is equal to one-fourth the average amount paid by those regularly engaged in ministerial work.—Adopted.
