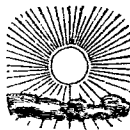

Minutes of the Seventh Annual Convention Held at West Terre Haute, Ind., September 23, to October 3, 1910.

First business session opened with the Assistant Superintendent in the chair, at 9:30 a. m., September 26, 1910.

Session opened by song and prayer.

Enrollment of delegates, preachers and deaconess.

Moved and seconded that the three first rows of seats be reserved as conference bar. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we omit the reading of the minutes of last convention by placing in the hands of each member the printed minutes to be passed upon later, carried.

Moved and seconded the chair appoint officers pro tem to act in the place of those absent. Carried.

The chair appointed the following: Brother J. E. Jackson to take Brother Overholser's place as second assistant superintendent; Brother H. A. Shirley to take Brother Beaty's place as treasurer; and Sister Alma Kenner to take Sister Owen's place as advisory member.

Moved and seconded the chair appoint various committees: Committee on Resolutions, Council on Ordination, and Committee on Printing Minutes. Carried.

Chair reported appointment of the following committees:

Resolution Committee—Sister Mary Linerode, Sister Lillian Hattabaugh, Bro. H. Coffman.

Council on Ordination—Superintendent, E. O. Prather, E. D. Joy, J. E. Jackson, H. A. Shirley, W. J. Crider.

Printing Committee—Mrs. Alma Kenner, Wm. Schmidt, H. B. Jackson.

Mrs. M. A. Crane was appointed pro tem to act in Brother Overholser's place on Camp Meeting Committee.

Moved and seconded that all preachers' wives, who are in the experience of regeneration, shall be given a voice in this convention. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the minutes of this convention be out by December 1st, and if not by that time, that they be not printed, and earlier if possible. Carried.

Chair requested the Manual Committee to report Tuesday morning.

Moved and seconded that election of officers be set for Wednesday morning. Carried.

Camp Meeting Committee requested to report Tuesday morning.

Moved and seconded we adjourn to meet at 8:30 a. m. Tuesday. Carried.

Tuesday morning business session, September 27, 1910, opened with the superintendent in the chair.

Session opened with song, followed by prayer by Brother Owen.

Enrollment of new delegates and preacher.

Roll call.

Minutes of last session read and accepted as corrected.

Camp Meeting Committee report postponed until Wednesday.

The Manual Committee presented the following: "We, the members of the Manual Committee assembled, do hereby recommend the adoption of the new International Manual, under the present circumstances of the Indiana Union."

The changes in the new International Manual were brought forth by the chairman of the Manual Committee. Discussion followed, during which the assistant superintendent took the chair.

Moved and seconded that the chair appoint an auditing committee to audit the books of treasurer, and treasurer of the Missionary Board. Carried.

The following auditing committee was appointed: E. O. Prather, Mrs. E. O. Prather and Frank Morris.

Adjourned to meet at 4 p. m.

Tuesday evening business session, September 27, 1919:

Song and roll call

Minutes of last session read and approved.

This session was given up to a discussion of the Manual.

Adjourned.

Wednesday morning business session, September 28, 1910,
opened by song and prayer.

Song and roll call.

Minutes of the last session read and accepted as read.

Election of officers.

Brother H. A. Shirley and Brother H. B. Jackson were appointed as tellers.

Moved and seconded that the secretary cast a unanimous ballot for Brother Joy as superintendent. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the secretary cast a unanimous ballot for Brother Crider as assistant superintendent. Carried.

Sister Hattabaugh and Sister Kenner nominees for secretary.

Moved and seconded that the secretary cast a unanimous ballot for Sister Hattabaugh as secretary. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the secretary cast a unanimous ballot for Brother Prather as treasurer. Carried.

Sister Kenner elected as first advisory member of the advisory board.

Brother H. B. Jackson and Sister E. O. Prather were nomi-

nees for second advisory members.

Moved and seconded that the secretary cast a unanimous ballot for Brother H. B. Jackson as second advisory member. Carried.

Sister Owen, Sister Linerode, and Sister Prather were nominees for third advisory members.

Moved and seconded that the election of Sister Owen be made unanimous. Carried.

Recess of five minutes.

Moved and seconded that we accept the I. A. H. U. Manual, Assistant superintendent took the chair.

Moved that it be the voice of this assembly to advise that all our local organizations refuse for membership any and all persons belonging to or supporting secret or oath bound societies; also any one being divorced and remarried during the life of a former companion, or one who is married to a divorced party. Seconded. Carried.

Superintendent took the chair

Moved and seconded that all licensed and ordained preachers and ordained deaconesses, who receive credentials from the State Union, pay their tithe into the state treasury. Carried.

Wednesday afternoon business session opened with song and prayer.

Roll call.

Minutes of last session read and accepted.

Moved that the manual prepared by the manual committee last year be laid on the table. Seconded. Carried.

Report of Camp Meeting Committee—Committee did nothing during the year, and have decided that because of expense we have no camp meeting this year. For building up the cause, we advise the state board to purchase a tent, providing the money is in the treasury by March 1st, 1911, and engage workers to take the tent into the field as the state board may direct. The state to bear the expenses of shipping and incidental expenses.

Moved and seconded the report of the camp meeting committee be accepted. Carried.

Report of Resolution Committee—"Be it resolved that this convention extend a hearty vote of thanks to the church of West Terre Haute and also the friends for their kindness and hospitality in entertaining this convention."

Moved and seconded that the report be accepted. Carried.

The chair appointed the Home and Foreign Missionary Board as follows:

MRS. MARY LINEIODE, Chairman.
 MRS. E. O. PRATHER, Secretary.
 MRS. M. A. CRANE, Treasurer.

Moved and seconded the advisory board be instructed to purchase the interest in the tent, which is offered at \$20. Brother Prather offers to donate his interest in the same to the state work. Carried.

Intermission for testimony meeting.

Report from West Terre Haute, by Sister Bishop: "The church, spiritually, is in a better condition than it was. In regard to the pastor, we have no fault to find. He has been a blessing to us, and stood true to God and kept sweet under persecution."

By the Pastor: "The church is on a solid footing. West Terre Haute is prospering, with a good Sunday-school of an average attendance of thirty-five to forty, and is growing. The church has a debt of about \$600."

Report accepted.

Report from Brazil, by delegate, Sister Alice Walling: "The devil has been fighting hard, but we look for the clouds to break forth with the morning light. The Sunday-school is poor, but we are praying for victory."

By the Pastor: "The church is in debt. The Building and Loan has a claim of \$918.34, and lately we found that a lumber bill which the Building and Loan was to have paid, is not paid, and we have that to face, which is \$70. Members have moved away and left us with about five folks with the victory. Things look rather dark, but we are trusting God."

Later: A preacher saved in the Brazil church, says: "Brazil has been well paid, because in the last two years three preachers came from the place. A rift is appearing in the sky."

Report accepted.

Report from Grantsburg: "Glad to report victory, and we are moving on. There is no friction in the church, no division among the members. The church is all on fire, and has a lively Sunday-school averaging about thirty-five. When there is any trouble in any way the folks go to their knees and pray it through. Once they stayed on their knees two hours and forty-five minutes. There are some local preachers who will work ten days to get to preach ten days. We have cottage prayer meetings that average four and five conversions and sanctification each month. In one service last month three were saved and sanctified. The church has an evangelistic spirit. We are free from debt, and are now repairing the house."

Report accepted:

Report of Rev. W. J. Crider: "In many ways this has been the best year of my life. I have learned things of God that I never knew before. Amen! He has permitted me to do some little work in His vineyard. Have only held three meetings since last convention, and in one of them could only stay a few days on account of my throat. Spent about a month visiting the different bands over the state in behalf of the Union. I did not get around

to all, but considering the work as a whole, those that I did visit are in fair condition and I see no reason of being discouraged. God gave us some blessed times on our rounds; and to Him we give all the glory. Jesus saves; the Holy Ghost abides, and we are going through."

Report of Rev. H. A. Shirley: "Shortly after the Huntington convention I went to Vincennes to assist Brother Beatty in his Bible school. In the spring I returned home and about a month after, the way was providentially opened for me to go as pastor to the A. H. Mission at Union City, Ind., where I spent the summer laboring in the Lord's vineyard, The Lord having called me to His work in Africa and as I'm expecting to sail with Brother Fage, returned missionary, in the coming July. I will probably spend the intervening time at God's Bible School in Cincinnati, in preparation for my work on the field. I earnestly desire the prayers of God's people that I may be used and sustained in dark Africa.

Yours for earth's last ones."

Report from Switzerland county—Fairmont, Fairview, and Aberdeen: by Bro. H. B. Jackson: "We had a camp meeting there in August and found things on the background. Some things had come in. At Fairmont a lack of confidence had come in. Had a prayer service at the close of the campmeeting when some confessed out. Then had services a few nights and God showed folks where they were, and they began to move up-grade. They are honest folks and when they find they need something they pray through and get it. I expect to go there as pastor in next month. The Aberdeen and Fairview band have disbanded. I believe God is going to bless at Aberdeen and make it a place of victory because there are people there who know God. Fairmont has an indebtedness of \$167 about \$100 of which is now subscribed. A man is holding property which will be given to the Aberdeen church when they get a good start."

Report from Liberty, by Bro Stanton: "Have had a hard time but are pulling through, and are now having good meetings and a right good time. Bro. Wiggans goes down there sometimes, and a Brother from Cincinnati comes also."

Moved and seconded that the Superintendent be instructed to investigate Liberty. Carried.

Report from Medora, by Bro. Prather: "We went there in March and found a nest of snakes in the form of the tongues people. However we prayed through, God straightened things out and folks began to get saved. The place is more settled now and on better footing. Just before the convention brother Shortridge and myself held a meeting in which \$100.41 was raised for Brother Shirley. There is a debt of \$150 but the place is safe. There are some good people there and they know when you preach the truth. Interest is increasing and victory is ahead. The Sunday school attendance is from twenty-five to thirty. In the missionary box

was over \$17.

Report accepted.

Report from Richmond, by Bro. Stanton: "We own our home with an indebtedness of \$130 or \$140. We now have twenty-three members that we can count on. Did have fifty but lost some. During the year we have taken in ten new members, and ten were given letters or withdrew. The spiritual condition is good, and there is some salt of the earth there. Had one revival this year and because of oppositio the crowdes were small. The Sabbath school averages twenty-five. Sister Trueblood held a meeting which did much good."

Report of Union City by Bro. Stanton: "Union City is in pretty good shape. The membership is about half as large as that of Richmond. There was one revival near town in a school house, but not much accomplished."

By Bro. Shirley: "They have cottage prayer meeting on Tuesday evenings, and have a good attendance, and very spiritual meetings. They also have four services during the week at the hall, and are in good condition financially."

Reports of Richmond and Union City accepted.

Report from Winchester: "Have a room in a home for worship. They sent no delegate."

Moved and seconded that the Superintendent investigate Winchester. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn. Carried.

Thursday morning business session, September 29, 1910. opened with song and prayer.

Roll call.

Report from Huntington by Bro. Owen: "Huntington is retrograding. Things went well for a while after last convention. Some of them do not tithes. They had a protracted meeting which did not prove the blessing that it was thought it would. The question of finance came up. There was a total indebtedness of \$1,543.00 on the church. Offers came to buy the church one of which was accepted and the church was sold for \$2,000.00 leaving \$459 in the treasury. They have cottage prayer meeting every Tuesday evening and God is blessing. Do not know what they will do. They are just waiting on God. There are some folks at Huntington that stand by and do what God has for them to do. Some have moved away making a decrease in the membership. But Huntington is going on and expects to hold up the banner until victory crowns their efforts.

Report accepted.

Report from Muncie: "The Muncie class is still among the living. Have hard trials but they are a natural result and work out a more exceeding weight of glory. There is a membership of thirty-five and these thirty-five have the victory and are willing to sacrifice. The spiritual condition is not as good as it has been.

Several souls have been saved since our revival held last February during which the Lord worked in a way which will tell in time and eternity. We hold six services a week, with good attendance and good prayer meetings. Average collection a week for pastor is \$3.20. Everything is paid up with \$12.92 in the treasury. Have a good Sunday School with an attendance of fifty-four, and an average collection of \$1.27. Have \$15.67 missionary money. We do not own our house but rent an upper room at \$6 a month, and we want a pastor."

Moved and seconded that Muncie report be accepted. Carried.

Report of Rev. H. B. Jackson: "Have been in the evangelistic field during the year. First meeting was at Fithian, Ill., where several were saved and sanctified and some real work done for God. Then held a tent meeting at Rosedale against great opposition, but God blessed. Then in company with Bro. Taylor we went to Switzerland county for camp meeting. Brother Cowman, returned missionary from Japan, was with us and received about \$50 in cash and pledges. After the camp meeting I remained in the community two weeks. Our last meeting was at Spraytown, Ind., where some definite work was done. As for myself, I'm going through. The battle's have been hard but I love the fight, and God supplies my needs.

Yours for the last."

Report from Mitchell, by Bro. Joy: "I called at Mitchell after the Orleans camp meeting and preached for them two nights, and had blessed services, and elected two delegates. They are in good condition and have folks who can pray and can pull fire. Have their church but it is not plastered, as they pay as they go. It doesn't look so nice but God blesses them. Have a good Sunday school. As to the membership I do not know, but think it is about one hundred. They have a mind to work and have the confidence of the people."

Report accepted.

Report from Orleans, by Sister Hattabaugh: "We have had a testing time. Had some trouble with a few members who were entrapped and lost out, but the church is on the upward move and folks are praying through. The financial condition of the church is good. They pay the pastor well, and the property which is worth about \$1400 is free from debt. The camp meeting this year was good. Have a good Sunday School, and a membership of forty."

Report accepted.

Sparksville disbanded.

Report from Vincennes, by Bro. Crider: "Visited there over Sunday. The people are not in as good condition spiritually as they have been, but are moving up, and there is a good opportunity at that place for work. They own their church, but are in debt for the lot. Have a good Sunday School. They sent no delegate."

Report accepted.

Report from St. Joseph St., Evansville, by Bro. Crider: "The membership is about fifteen. They are moving along well, and are a good people. Have a good Sunday School and hold services in a rented room."

Waterstreet Mission, Evansville is closed.

Moved and seconded we accept the report. Carried.

Report from Jasonville, by Bro. Schmidt: "January 23rd I arrived at Jasonville and preached my first sermon that night. I intended to go back to Brazil the next day, but God led otherwise so I stayed at Jasonville and preached every night. In March Bro. Joy came down and we organized with seven members. Had baptizing in July and in August we undertook to buy property. And this finds us with a membership of twenty on fire for God, a good Sunday School with an attendance of forty-six, and average collection of \$0.61."

Report accepted.

Minutes of last session read and upon correction were accepted.

Report of treasurer to be given later.

Finance committee appointed as follows:—Bro. J. E. Jackson and Bro. Wm. Schmidt.

Moved that the Superintendent be instructed to ascertain the number of manuals to be used and attend to distribution of same. Seconded. Carried.

Moved that the advisory board have printed as many tracts as they deem best of our profession of faith as given on pages 10-17 in the Manual. The same to be distributed gratuitously and the expenses to be paid by the treasurer. Directions for further information to be given on tract. Seconded and carried.

Moved and seconded that state board have printed blank reports. The same to be given to churches and preachers to fill and return to the next annual convention. Carried.

Adjourned.

Thursday afternoon business session September 29, 1910
opened with song and prayer.

Roll call.

Minutes of last session read and after correction were accepted.

Moved and seconded that in the motion in Wednesday morning's business session in regard to refusing for membership any and all persons belonging to or supporting secret and oath bound societies, also any one being divorced etc., that the words "also shall not retain in," be inserted after the words, "refuse for," and "membership any." Carried.

Moved and seconded that all members of the Apostolic Holiness Union, eighteen years of age and over desiring to receive license to the Gospel Ministry having been in the experience of entire sanctification continuously one year or more shall receive license upon recommendation of the local union or church of which

they are members or of the state president, and upon giving satisfactory evidence of their qualification to the examining committee which shall consist of three or more ordained ministers who are members of the Apostolic Holiness Union to be appointed by the state president. Carried.

Report of Missionary board: "Board discussed plans for arousing a missionary spirit in the future in the different churches. Means were adopted for use in the Sunday Schools. Bro. Shirley to explain the idea to the convention. It was decided that besides this means each church be instructed to hold at least one special missionary service, with offerings by cash and subscription, during the year, and that that service be conducted by some preacher or evangelist other than the regular pastor of that particular church."

Moved and seconded we accept report of the missionary board. Carried.

Resolution committee: "Be it resolved that in this convention we express our love and appreciation to Brother Owen as superintendent, and Brother Joy as secretary, for their faithfulness and untiring efforts in carrying on the work this past year."

Moved and seconded we accept the above resolution. Carried. "Resolved that inasmuch as Bro. H. A. Shirley and Bro. E. D. Joy feel the call of God upon them to go as Missionaries to South Africa, and as they expect to leave shortly for that field, that we assure them that our earnest prayers and hearty support shall follow them."

Moved and seconded we accept the above resolution. Carried.

Moved and seconded we accept the minutes of the sixth annual convention. Carried.

Adjourned.

Report of Rev. J. E. Jackson.—"Praise God for the precious blood. This has been the greatest year of my life. Have found that at the end of all tests there is victory, and behind every dark cloud shines the light of God's love. Held several meetings of which Eckerty camp was the best. The Lord knoweth how many were saved during the year. I'm pressing on toward the city.—Hallelujah!"

Report of Rev. Geo. S. Owen: "Since last convention victory has been on our banners, although the enemy has been doing all he could to get our eyes on other things than Christ. Being unable to meet the indebtedness that was on the church here, we felt it was the proper thing to sell the church building and thus lift a heavy load from the little flock which was weighing heavily upon them. Our membership in good standing is about seventeen. A few have been saved during the year and are standing true to our

Christ. The writer has had many things to hinder in the work as my wife was very sick for nearly five months and in addition to laboring with my hands, caring for the sick, and preaching the word, I had very little time for calling etc., but we can say that we believe God will bring the saints at Huntington out more than conquerors. Praise the Lord!"

Have a Sunday school of twenty which is holding its own. There are some folks who are pressing the battle for God here. They rent their place of worship and Bro. Porter from God's Bible School at Cincinnati, O., is their pastor and is loved and respected. He is doing good work in Liberty."
