Journal Of Proceedings

Flint, Michigan

June 24, 1957

FIRST SITTING

The First Sitting of the Second Annual East Michigan District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 a. m., June 24, 1957, at the Free Methodist Bethel Park Camp Grounds, Flint, Mich.

Rev. W. N. Miller, District Superintendent, called the Conference to order. Rev. Allan LaRose led in the singing of "Take The Name of Jesus With You." Mr. Fred Thomas led in the opening prayer.

After a few brief remarks, Rev. Miller introduced Rev. Wm. H. Neff, General Superintendent of the Church, as presiding officer of the Conference. As a devotional lesson Rev. Neff read Philippians 4:1-8. He exhorted to the necessity of our position in Christ, unity of the Spirit and not uniformity of ideas, but of the same mind in the Lord.

After the singing of a couple chorses and a testimony, Rev. Neff introduced Rev. P. F. Elliott, General Youth and Sunday School Director. After a brief resume of the plans for the First National Sunday School Convention, he informed the Conference of the honor of a LL.D. degree which was conferred on Rev. Neff by Asbury College.

Rev. Miller requested prayer for Rev. and Mrs. Raymond Dean because of the death of her father. Also Rev. A. H. Williams who is hospitalized.

The roll was called by Rev. G. V. Skinner, District Secretary.

By common consent the Conference Bar was designated to be the first 10 seats in the middle sections and the platform. Also that the time of the sittings be from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00, and 1:30 to 5:00 p. m.

Rev. Miller read his personal report, which also included the report of the Forward Movement Committee.

Rec. and Mrs. Arnold Gibson were introduced to the Conference.

It was moved and carried they be accepted into the Conference pending the receipt of their transfer.

Rev. A. F. Osborn, District Treasurer read his report, which was accepted by a rising vote of thanks.

It was moved and carried that in as much as the churches have already paid their apportionments, that the ministers and delegates be entertained free.

Pontiac Church, Rev. E. C. Swanson, pastor, received the award for highest numerical gain in the District. Gain of 44.

Montrose, Rev. R. E. Randolph, pastor, received the award for the highest percentage gain in the District. Gain of 58%.

Port Huron: Rev. A. S. Joppie, pastor, received the award for the largest Sunday School average in the District. Average of 300.

Adjourned by expiration of time. Rev. Hiatt was asked to pray.

SECOND SITTING

The Second Sitting convened at 1:30 p. m. with the singing of "My Jesus I Love Thee." Rev. Klein led in prayer after which Dr. W. H. Neff gave a short exhortation.

The Minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

Mr. Lucius McHargue was received into the Conference pending receipt of his transfer from the North Carolina District.

The following new church were received into the Conference; Mt. Clemens, Pastor Rev. Ruth Alexander; Montrose, Pastor Rev. Roy Randolph, and Goodrich, Pastor Rev. Oliver McCoy.

Rev. Ruth Alexander read the report of the Youth Conference. This report was ratified by the Conference.

After exhortations and admonitions from the General Superintendent and the singing of the Doxology, Dr. Wm. Neff dismissed with prayer.

District Superrintendent's Report

To our Chairman, General Superintendent, Rev. W. H. Neff, pastors, evangelists, licensed ministers, delegates, and friends of the Second Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the East Michigan District.

Greetings in the name of Jesus, our Saviour, our Example, and our coming King !

I would like to thank all of you for your prayers, cards and flowers, your interest and cooperation during my recent physical difficulties. When we place ourselves unconditionally in His hands, little do we know about what lies ahead, however, in this covenant arrangement there is solid conviction and real joy in knowing "Whatever betides God will take care of His own."

A number of our churches reported times of spirit visitation and revival tides during the course of the year. Thank God for this, and without it, all of our program ,organization and promotion would be no more than soap bubbles. As long as our churches can witness visitation of the Holy Spirit along with the songs of the newborn and sancified, we can be assured of progress in the direction which God wants us to move.

NEW CHURCHES ORGANIZED

Three new churches were organized this past year and are ready to be formally received by this Conference.

MONTROSE — Rev. Melvin Farrand, one of our very successful home missionary pastors, started a new work in a small country school house a few years ago. Rev. Ted Neeley served this group very faithfully for about one year following Bro. Farrands resignation. Then Rev. Roy Randolph was appointed as pastor and under his faithful and earnest leadership, along with some fine families from the Brown St. Church, they were able to present this Church for organization Dec. 30, 1956. Sixteen charter members formed this new church.

MT. CLEMENS -- After considering a rumber of cities for the possibilities of opening a new work last Fall, the District Council prayerfully purchased a church building in the busy little city of Mt. Clemens, located northeast of Detroit. This is a good solid frame building, with full basement, Sunday school rooms, restrooms, and new oil furnace. Rev. Ruth N. Alexander was placed there by the Council as a home missionary worker. The first service was conducted on Nov. 16, 1956, with 41 attending.

A strong portion of this group was contributed by the band of Pilgrims worshipping at Fraser. Bro. and Sis Weeks, pastor and wife of the Fraser Church felt divinely led to bring their group in with the District project at Mt. Clemens. Bro. Weeks had very faithfully led his people to this time and then graciously encouraged them to get in with the new work. Because of this and a number of other families Sister Alexander had contacted, who lived in the vicinity, we were able to organize a new church with 16 charter members on Jan. 16, 1957. This is the second fine church that Sister Alexander has brough to organization in the District.

This new Church besides making its monthly payment on their loan, have repaid the District \$1500 on the building, and are paying their budget to date.

GOODRICH -- A few years back at the Flint Lapeer Road Church, Paster Rev. Gaylord Skinner, felt led to promote a new work near Goodrich.

Bro. Oliver McCoy, who was then a youth leader in the Pontiac Church, was called to pastor this new project. Under his leadership this work has developed until we were able to organize this year with 13 charter members.

They have purchased a property which adjoins our new camp grounds, and are worshiping in the home on this property at present. This Church being located by our camp grounds should be a blessing to our District and the District a blessing in return.

NEW CHURCHES AND BRANCH SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The Lord has helped us unusually in this department.

I. LENNON -- Bro. R. K. Ballard went out to Lennon last Fall and opened a new work in the home of Bro. and Sis. Peelman. A fine lot well located at the edge of town was given to the church by a neighbor f_{ϵ} mily named Watkins.

A new building program was launched and by the aid of the District, and the Flint Brown St. Church, the building, size 28 by 42 with full basement has been enclosed.

The Brown St. Church, Pastor Rev. W. D. Phillips, has adopted this work and have sent a number of families to finance and develop it. I would like to commend B.o. Phillips and his Church for their cooperation in providing families and money to aid both Lennon and Montrose Churches. Rev. Melvin Farrand is now pastoring the Lennon work.

2. MT. CLEMENS -- Was the second new church started this year, as well as being a newly organized church they have a growing Sunday school with a record attendance of 60 and average attendance of 40.

3. ZILWAUKEE -- In the early winter, Bro. Bare, pastor of our Saginaw Church and his people, went out to Zilwaukee and started a branch Sunday School. Their average attendance for the remainder of the year is 27. Rev. Andrew Counterman has felt the call of God to pastor this work, and is faithfully on the field at this time.

4. NORTH RIVER ROAD, PORT HURON -- Bro. Harry Pyscher was called to pastor an independent group, north of Port Huron. These pecple expressed desire to unite with the Pilgrim Holiness Church. After some personal contacts and meeting with the main families represented, they unanimously agreed to unite with us. The final details are now being arranged.

They bring to us a Sunday School which averaged 39 last year, also a new concrete block building 40 by 60 on a large lot, with a total indebtedness of less than \$6,000. This is a very fine group and their church is in an excellent location.

Please pray for each of these four new Churches in our District.

DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Our Sunday Schools are still making gains and breaking all records of the District.

Our average net gain for the entire District over last year is almost 10%. Some of our schools made phenominal gains. These will all be recognized at the propertime by our very capable and efficient District Sunday School Secretary, Rev. Wilbert Walker.

OUR YOUTH WORK

Rev. Gerald MacDonald, District Youth President, has been a real inspiration and example in his promotion of our District Youth work.

Many of us experienced a wonderful surprise at the District Youth Camp last July. Every night evangelistic service was characterized by a real visitation of the spirit and some of those most glorious altar services, we shall always remember.

Our youth work is showing remarkable response to its leaders and both the youth and Sunday School department are beginning to make definite and genuine contribution to our District.

NEW CAMP GROUND

In accordance with the action of the Conference of 1956, the 61 acre plot just south of Goodrich on M-15 was purchased on contract. We paid \$4,000 down and are paying \$90 per month on the balance. Total purchase price was \$12,000.

The Youth Department contributed \$3,000 and the District \$1,000 with the agreement that the Youth would need pay no more on the purchase price but would raise funds to develop their interest on the grounds.

Nearly \$5,000 was pledged last camp meeting toward this new camp and a good percent of this has been paid or is being paid.

It has been my hope and prayer that enough can be raised in this Camp to start the initial necessary developments, such as: wiring, well and sanitation, followed by a kitchen and dining hall, tabernacle, etc.

We have drawings in our hands now to be presented to the proper zoning authorities, showing the plan for roads, cottages, etc. As scen as these are approved, copies will be sent to every church so that individuals and churches may make their choice of lot location and cottages.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS

Some of the material improvements in our local churches are as follows:

ANN ARBOR -- Pastor, Rev. A. F. Osborn. Have painted parsonage and garage and redecorated the Sunday School rooms.

DRYDEN -- Pastor, Rev. Melvin Straight. Have completed and decorated new Sunday School rooms and landscaped church yard.

DETROIT BURT ROAD -- Pastor Rev. C. R. Hendrick. Have completed a beautiful remodeling and rebuilding project in church auditorium.

DETROIT GREELEY -- Pastor Rev. L. N. Nelsen. Have redecorated the interior of church auditorium.

DETROIT VAN DYKE -- Pastor Rev. Wm. Lyons. Have made extensive improvements in new Sunday School rooms in church basement.

CLIO – Pastor Rev. L. R. Neff – Have invested \$1,000 in Sunday School facilities plus other minor improvements.

CROSWELL – Pastor, Rev. Ernest Klien – Have purchased new lots for a proposed building site. Total dimensions 132x183.5.

FLINT BROWN STREET -- Pastor, Rev. W. D. Phillips -- Have paid off the entire mortgage on their new church, installed new sidewalks and paid their share of the street paving amount \$4,400, contributed \$474 for a siding on the new Lennon project. Installed a new public address system, cost \$700. They have also purchased a new lot on which to move the old parsonage then build a new parsonage and educational unit.

FLINT FIRST -- Pastor, Rev. D. Wayne Brown -- Have launched their fund raising campaign for a new church.

FLINT HILL ROAD -- Pastor, Rev. Frank Kingen -- Are adding a much needed extension to their parsonage.

IDA -- Pastor, Rev. Roy Webster -- Have completed a new parsonage valued at \$9,000.

KINGSTON -- Pastor, Rev. Howard Rogers -- Have liquidated their debt on organ, purchased new Sunday School facilities and painted the outside of the church.

LAPEER -- Pastor, Rev. Kenneth Boileau -- Have completed and dedicated a lovely superstructure on their basement. This building is a real credit to our church.

NORTH BRANC H-- Pastor, Rev. Wilbert Walker -- Have painted parsonage inside and out and put tile on the basement floor.

SAGINAW - Pastor, Rev. John Bare -- Are constructing an addi-

tion to their church sixe 36x42 with full basement making the church dimensions 42x64. Cost will be approxmixately \$17,000.

WAYNE – Pastor, Rev. Bertie Mead – Have completed and dedicated a lovely new auditorium and plan to convert the old building into Sunday School rooms.

YPSILANTI -- Pastor, Rev. Phillip Fisher -- Have completed and dedicated a superstructure on their basement at a minimum of cost.

FLINT FENTON ROAD -- Pastor, Rev. Robert Ackerman -- Have enclosed a new building 24x36 and are worshiping in it at present.

LENNON -- Pastors, Rev. R. K. Ballard and now Rev. Melvin Farrand -- Have enclosed a new building 28-42 with full basement and are occupying it at this date.

MT. CLEMENS -- Pastor, Rev. Ruth N. Alexander -- Have raised money to paint the outside of the church, also to tile and redecorate the rest rooms and furnace room in the basement.

CHURCH EXTENSION FELLOWSHIP

Two calls were sent out this year to the membership of this club. For MONTROSE and they have a lovely new building paid for as a result. For MT. CLEMENS and they also have purchased a lovely new church on the strength of this aid.

The response of this membership is remarkable.

FORWARD MOVEMENT COMMITTEE

It is difficult to report all the activities and results of the Forward Movement in our District.

The Council and Superintendent or members from the Council and the Superintendent met at least six times last Fall to launch the Mt. Clemens work. In addition to this the Superintendent made eight or nine trips to secure information etc.

Then the official Forward Movement committee, or part of them met five times during the year.

This committee sent out letters to all the pastors urging a definite lay visitation program and special prayer meetings. They also encouraged and promoted the new work at Lennon, and the new building at Fenton Road.

Our District goal for new members was 92. We took in more than this number but removed such a large number meanwhile that according to our statistician our net gain is the 60's!

We surpassed our goal for branch Sunday Schools which was two and new churches which also was set at two. Our Sunday Schools take the lead in Forward progress. Our branch Sunday Schools and new churches started this year came second while our increase in church membership trails along last.

Members of the East Michigan District can talk about revivals, altar services and seekers, and finances, plus great Sunday School and youth activities; nevertheless if we do not become Pentecostal enough that God can add to the church those that are being saved, we will fail at the most vital point of all. I hope that this year the Forward Movement committee, the council and all of our pastors and people will get a burden and a vision for this church membership situation. And that by next Conference we will be able to see glowing results.

With a deep feeling of gratitude and thanks to the finest council and collection of ministers and layman God ever allowed a District Superintendent to work with, I submit at this time by personal report.

6. Ordination Candidates -- Whereas ordination is an extremely important event in the life of a Minister and whereas the families of the candidates may desire to be present and make plans well in advance of the Ordination Day; therefore be it resolved that the Examining and Educational Board interview and examine and then notify candidates 15 days prior to the Conference.

7. Month of Rest for District Superintendent – Inasmuch as Rev. Miller's doctor recommends extra rest for him to fully recuperate, therefore be it resolved that he be given a full month off with pay at his earliest convenience.

8. Greetings – Since Rev. A. H. Williams is in the hospital, be it resolved that the District Secretary be instructed to send him greetings from this Conference.

The Treasurer of this District shall be instructed to act for the District and for the ministers and clerical personnel in contacting the representatives of Michigan Hospital Service and Michigan Medical Service. The Treasurer of the District shall collect all periodic subscriptions for the enrolled Ministers and clerical personnel, and deposit the money in the District Treasury. The Treasurer shall be empowered to make payment of the total Blue Cross - Blue Shield subscriptions for the District shall make available to the Treasurer such additional funds as he may require in undertaking this responsibility.

A committee of three ministers from this District shall be appointed by the District Superintendent to assist the Treasurer in such a way as the Superintendent may request. This committee shall be known as the committee on Blue Cross - Blue Shield Enrollment.

Standing Rules

No. 1 -- CONFERENCE YEAR

The Conference year shall close on May 31, and all reports must be sent directly to the Statistician by June 15.

No. 2 -- CHURCH BUDGET

Each church shall raise for the General Budget the equivalent of \$6.00 per member, and for the District Budget the equivalent of \$10.00 per member. The District Budget to be divided as follows: District Church Extension \$2.00; District Church Extension Loan Fund \$1.25; Owosso Bible College Debt Retirement \$2.50; Owosso Bible College Operational Expense \$2.00; Ministerial Relief \$.75; General Delegate Expense \$.25; Administration Fund \$1.25.

No. 3 -- DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUND

All monies raised in the local church for District and General work shall be sent to the District Treasurer, who shall forward general funds to the General Treasurer. The local Church Treasurer shall send to the District Treasurer along with the monthly budget, the equivalent of 8 per cent of the pastor's salary for the Administrative Fund.

Also ministers doing secular work shall turn one-half of their tithe to the Conference Budget.

All other licensed and ordained ministers shall turn 8 per cent of their ministerial income to the Administrative Fund.

No. 5 -- PASTORS AT CAMP MEETINGS

Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend the Annual Camp Meeting each Church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the Camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire Camp Meeting.

No. 6 -- EXAMINING AND EDUCATIONAL BOARD

The District Superintendent shall be chairman of the examining and Educational Board by virtue of his office.

No. 7 -- CAMP MEETING AND CONFERENCE EXPENSES

Whereas there is a great deal of expense in connection with the Annual Camp Meeting and Conference, let each local church pay into the District Treasury $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1% of their regular offerings to be designated for Camp Meeting and Conference expense. Inasmuch as it is impossible under the present set-up to any longer give free entertainment to our ministers and their families; therefore be it resolved that each minister and their families will be responsible for their lodging and meals.

An exception can be made to this by the District Council for retired ministers, visiting ministers and home missionary workers.

Be it further resolved that during the Annual Conference all delegates (Ministerial and Lay) be given their meals free.

No. 8 -- SALARIES

The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$4,400 per year plus 7 cents per mile for traveling expenses. The District Treasurer shall receive \$375.00 per year; The District Secretary shall receive \$175.00; the District Sunday School Secretary \$75.00; the Youth Director \$75.00: the District Statistician \$40.00; all District officials shall receive 6 cents per mile for all miles traveled in the interest of the District.

No. 9 -- PARSONAGE UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is located. All churches in the District are to provide the utilities for the parsonages. The District shall provide the same for the District parsonage.

No. 10 -- CREDENTIALS

The District Superintendent shall have read Section 105 and 107 of the Manual instructing all District licentiates that hereafter they shall appear before the District Examining Board at Conference time before their credentials shall be granted.

No. 11 -- CAMP MEETING FUNDS

The District Treasurer shall submit an itemized report of Camp Meeting Funds as recorded in the 1945 Conference Journal, page 13. This report to appear in the Journal.

No. 12 – APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEE

The District Council shall appoint all committees. The Standing committees are to be appointed to include new men where possible and to avoid the duplication of men on several committees. It is recommended that the entire constituency be considered.

No. 13 -- BUILDING COMMITTEE

The District Council shall appoint a Building Committee composed of three members who have experience in the work of acoustics, architecture and construction. All churches and church boards must have the approval of said committee before the purchase of building sites or the erecting of buildings or improvements in excess of \$500.00.

No. 14 -- BURIAL BENEFITS

All actively engaged ministers and their wives of the District shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association. Cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the Treasuries of the department that employs them. Complete resolution appears in Standing Rule No. 20 of the 1947 Journal.

No. 15 -- VACATIONS

It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a twoweeks vacation with pay. The District Superintendent shall be given a two-weeks vacation with pay.

No. 16 – MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

Be it resolved that a committee of six be appointed as a Ministerial Convention Committee by the District Council; that two be appointed for three years, two for two years, two for one year, and that two shall be appointed each year respectively.

Be it also resolved that the afternoon service of t helast day of the Ministerial Convention be the concluding service of the Convention,

No. 17 - CAMP MEETING BOARD

Be it resolved that a Camp Meeting Board of six members be elected in the following manner; two members to be elected for 3 years; the next two elected to serve two years, and the last two elected for one year. Following this, two members shall be elected annually for a three year term. Board duties; Secure all workers for Camp and Conference, supervise grounds and buildings; purchase good and neccessary equipment for Camp and Conference; have charge of all advertising.

Whereas, Camp Board Members are pastors, and whereas much of their time must be devoted and their minds occupied with the many duties connected with the manual working of the Camp, and therefore are not free to attend and enjoy the Camp services;

Therefore be it further resolved that after any member of the Camp Board has served for a period of three years, he shall not be re-elected to the Camp Board until at least three years have expired. The District Council shall provide nominations from which Board members shall be elected; Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer, and one other member of the Council serve on this Board, also that the District Superintendent shall by virtue of his office serve on this Board but that he shall not be the chairman.

Be it further resolved that the chairman of the Camp Board shall be appointed by the District Council.

No. 18 -- RECALL OF THE PASTOR

Be it resolved that the second week of May shall be designated as the time for the churches of our Conference to vote on the recall of the pastor. Be it further resolved that no election of pastors can be taken until the second week of May, no pastoral changes will be recommended until the results of this vote are in the hands of the District Superintendent, but an exception can be made to this if the District Superintendent deems it necessary.

No. 19 -- RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT

Be it resolved that whenever there shall be elected another District Superintendent, that the Council earnestly endeavor to place said retiring Superintendent in satisfactory position.

No. 20 -- ORDINATION SERVICE

Be it resolved that the order of business on the first night of the Conference be the Ordination Service.

Whereas, the minister's wife makes a vital contribution to her husband's work, therefore we recommend that the wife of the candidate be given an honorary seat with the candidate during the Ordination Service.

Whereas, Ordination is an extremely important event in the life of a Minister and whereas the families of the Candidate may desire to be present and make plans well in advance of the Ordination Day; therefore be it resolved that the Examining and Educational Board review and examine and then notify candidates 15 days prior to the Conference.

No. 21 -- CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

Be it resolved that all Treasurer's books of the District be audited annually by a certified public accountant so that a report from the auditor can be given to the Conference when called for.

No. 22 -- CAMP MEETING SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSION

Be it resolved that on the two Sundays during Camp Meeting that there be a Sunday School session beginning at 9:30 until 10:15 following the testimony meeting and that said session be arranged and supervised by the Sunday School Committee.

Be it further resolved that a credit card be given to all in attendance, and that each card be signed and returned by the pupil to their local Church Sunday School Secretary for the attendance record and reports to the Conference.

No. 23 -- ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Inasmuch as most religious bodies follow the order of having election immediately after District reports, and inasmuch as many Conferences of the Pilgrim Holiness Church follow this same order, therefore, be it resolved that election of officers be immediately following District reports.

Whereas there has been successive balloting for important offices and whereas this has often resulted in the election of individuals to several positions of officialdom, therefore be it resolved that balloting for respective officers shall be taken care of in regular and proper sequence. Be it further resolved that the elections be posted immediately.

No. 24 -- COMMITTEE MEETINGS

Be it resolved that the chairman of the resolution committee and of the Ways and Means Committee shall call a meeting of their respective committees at least one month before Conference.

No resolutions shall be presented to this Conference until it has been typewritten and signed.

No. 25 -- SUNDAY SCHOOL FINANCE

Whereas there is a certain amount of expense in connection with promoting the District Sunday School Work.

Whereas there has never been a plan ratified by this East Michigan District, delegating a responsibility to each Sunday School in the Financial sense. Be it therefore resolved that the following plan be put into effect; Sunday Schools with an average of 50 and under \$5.00 per year; Averages 50 to 100, \$7.50; Averages 100 to 200, \$10: Averages over 200 \$15.00.

No. 26 - CHURCH EXTENSION

Inasmuch as the present Conference Church Extention Department is not producing the number of new churches that we are capable of producing and whereas the establishing of new churches is necessary for a steady and healthy growth for any District, and whereas there appears to be a definite weakness in our present policy of raising funds for Church Extension work;

Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference adopt the Church Extension Fellowship which reads as follows:

CHURCH EXTENSION FELLOWSHIP OF PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH, EAST MICHIGAN DISTRICT

Holding the conviction that God would have us further the cause of Christ by establishing new churches within our District borders, I subscribe the following:

- (a) I will pray for the leading of the Lord in the work of the Church Extension Board.
- (b) I will be alert for any possibilities of new churcches and will inform the Board.
- (c) I recognize that the first financial obligations in the opening of a new work are the most difficult to meet and will therefore be responsible for two units, (\$5.00) per unit, to total (\$10.00) for the Church Extension Fellowship.
- (d) I assume this obligation for not more than two new works in any one Conference year. Said works to be approved by the Church Extension Board.
- (e) I will try to secure other members of the Fellowship.
- (f) I understand this agreement may be terminated any time I deem

it necessary by notifying the Church Extension Board.

Annual Youth Report East Michigan District 1957

G. L. MacDONALD, PRESIDENT

Mr. Chairman, Pastors, (Youth President), and delegates to this Conference, GREETINGS in the Name of our Preicous Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who loved us and gave himself for us. How wonderful that we may have the privilege of working together, in harmony and love, in the greatest business on earth, the King's business.

The youth work for the year 1956-57 began with an outstanding youth camp at Sebewaing, Michigan, where we had 153 young people enrolled, with a total attendance of 175. Classes were given that were of practical he'p to our youth, and after the afternoon spent in a quiet period and recreation, the day was crowned with an unusual evening service, unusual because of the wonderful presence of the Lord. From night to night many of our youth prayed through to definite victory, and on the final evening 150 young people came forward dedicating their lives to whatever service God should call them. This was the biggest enrollment that the East Michigan or Michigan Conference has known. (I speak of the Michigan Conference because our youth camp was started before we became two districts).

It was my wonderful opportunity to attend the youth leader's Conference at Indianapolis, Indiana, again this year. This is always a thrill as it gives an opportunity to meet the youth leaders in our Church across the nation, as well as to make plans for National Youth Week projects and other phases of our Youth work in general.

During the month of September I presided over the business meetings of 4 cf our 5 zones. Brother Swanson, the vice-president of East Michigan District conducted the business meeting in the University Zone. As well as directing the business meeting I also presented the Youth Work in our District, as well as our general projects such as Pilgrim Youth News, Spiritual Life outlines, and our Missionary Project for National Youth Week-Sending the Gosepel Teams to the various areas. The East Michigan Pilgrim Youth played a very important part in the National Youth Week project, and were thrilled to have a part in such a worthwhile endeavour. This was probably the greatest project the youth department has ever attempted, and under the direction of our General Youth Director, Dr. P. F. Elliott, proved to be a tremendous success.

On October 6th the Youth department of East Michigan Conference did something that had never been done before, in this District or any other. The Youth president of the various churches met at the New Grounds at Goodrich, Michigan, for a YOUTH LEADERS DAY. The response was excellent, and we enjoyed a wonderful day together. We had a time of devotions beginning at 10 a. m. and in the afternoon we had three separate periods. The first having to do with planning how we are to promote our projects, local, district, and general. Following that, there was a time of putting together ideas for local youth programs and services. We then took a guided tour across our new grounds, back to the lovely spring at the back of the area. We then came back to the Chapel and outlined our district program for the year. An even fireside fellowship was enjoyed by all before going our separate ways to be better youth leaders than ever before.

During the month of February we again met at our new grounds, this time for a District Youth gathering. Approximately 225 of our youth from over the District met to enjoy this evening together. After the devotions the group had chili, hot dogs, and pop. Everyone had a wonderful time, and are anticipating being able to do something like this again.

NATIONAL YOUTH WEEK was observed throughoutt the District, with many of our youth societies having youth revivals, fellowship gatherings, prayer meetings, Bible studys, and exchange services. A number of good reports were sent to me by the local presidents, or the reporters from the societies.

The month of March was marked by a wonderful "District Spring Rally" held at the Pontiac Church. We had a workshop, "How to Win Youth and Hold Them" which was presented by Rev. E. E. Cutler in the morning service. The afternoon service was a Singspiration, one of the greatest I have ever known. The singing of the Musical Trombones, The Gospelairs Quartette, and the Junior Choir from the Flint First Church was outstanding. People were thrilled as the songs were sung. Souls rejoiced in the fact that Christ had given them a NEW SONG OF PRAISE. The evening service was crowned with souls seeking the Lord, and many young people dedicating their lives to the servicce of the King, following a very pointed message by Rev. Cutler, our rally speaker.

We are looking forward to a wonderful convention and Conference this year, and already the applications are literally "pouring in" for our Youth camp. In fact the interest is so great that we are going to have to get our own grounds developed as soon as possible if we expect to adequately handle the group, or groups in the coming years.

I would like to give a word of appreciation to Brother Miller, our D. S., our Pastors, Zone Presidents, Youth Presidents of the local societies, and to all of my Executive committee for their outstanding cooperation this year. I can honestly say they have not disappointed me, but have stood by and have responded each time I have let them know I was counting on them. I really believe the Pilgrim Holiness Youth of East Michigan Conference are marching forward in great strides, in fact I might say they are MOVING FORWARD WITH THE FOR-WARD MOVEMENT!

It has been a real challenge to serve our church in this department and I feel that our Church will better in the tomorrows because of the place that our youth have today.

I have attended three executive committee meetings, six zone rallies, the Forward movement Conference at Indianapolis, as well as the Youth Leaders Conference, held one youth revival (Brown St. Church) and was speaker at one Annual District Youth Convention in the Ontario District. I have travelled some 3,256 miles and have been reimbursed at the rate of 5c per mile.

I should like to close this report with the words of the Psalmist when he said, "OUR HELP IS IN THE NAME OF THE LORD WHO MADE HEAVEN AND EARTH!"
