JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

Gaines, Michigan

July 9, 1959

First Sitting

The First Sitting of the Fourth Annual Michigan District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 a.m. July 9, 1959, at the Camp Grounds in Gaines, Michigan.

Rev. W. N. Miller, District Superintendent, called the Conference to order. Rev. L. R. Neff led the song service singing "A Charge to Keep I Have" with Ruth Alexander playing the piano.

Rev. W. N. Miller greeted the conference with a few remarks concerning the Lord's presence. He emphasized that we want God here. "Let's characterize this conference with the proper attitude and seeking God's presence." Dr. A. S. Joppie led in the opening prayer.

Rev. Miller then made comment on the wonderful work done the past month by different people on the Gaines Camp Ground. He than introduced our General Superintendent, Rev. W. H. Neff.

Rev. Neff brought a short message on II Corinthians, 12th Chapter; Colorful and Dramatic incidents in the life of St. Paul. He mentioned there were three things said about this man. "Man who is in Christ. Man who had a vision. God who had response to this vision." Message closed by singing, "I'll Live For Him Who Died For Me."

The roll was called by Rev. G. V. Skinner, District Secretary.

By common consent the Conference Bar was designated to be the first twelve seats in the middle section and the platform. Also that the time of the sittings be from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00, 1:30 to 5:00 p.m. and from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.

Rev. Miller read his report and presented several objectives for the Conference to achieve this year. The report was accepted.

Auditors reports accompanied each treasurer's report.

The welcoming committee introduced to the Conference Dr. P. F. Elliott. Also Mrs. W. H. Neff was introduced. It was moved and carried to give Mrs. Neff a complimentary seat in the Conference Bar. Mrs. Warner, representing the Stevens Moving Company, was also introduced and welcomed.

A report from the examining and educational board was read by Rev. L. R. Neff and approved.

Our District Secretary read the names of the ministerial transfers and moved that they be received. They are as follows: Dale Emery, Wisconsin District; Wayne Greve and Bob Nelson, Michigan District; Roy Webster, Tennessee District; Merlin Goodrich; Capitol District. It was moved and carried to receive B. Ivan Williams from the Arizona District.

It was moved that the first sitting be adjourned for lunch. Rev. Fast dismissed in prayer.

Second Sitting

The Second Sitting convened at 1:30 p.m. with Rev. Skinner leading in the song" There is a Fountain Filled With Blood". Rev. Bob Nelson led in prayer.

The minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

Dr. W. H. Neff spoke a few words on humility. "What would it be like if 50,000 Pilgrims were on their knees before God?" "It would make us humble, it would confront us with our need, it would bring us to the point of confession, would mean a great thrust in evangelism, it would anoint us of power by the Holy Spirit and finally would mean a victorious church even in days like these."

The welcoming committee introduced Rev. and Mrs. Doehring from the Michigan Conference. Also Rev. C. Dean and Rev. V. Drummond, pastors from Midland, Michigan. By common consent these people will have seats in the conference bar.

Rev. Melvin Straight, Youth Treasurer read his report. It was moved and carried that the report be received.

Rev. Raymond Dean, District Statistician gave his report. It was moved and carried that the report be accepted.

Rev. W. N. Miller moved that Clifford VanSickle be received into the East Michigan District as transferred from the Michigan District. Also that Cleon and Avis Brown be received by the conference as Song Evangelists.

The District Superintendent appointed the following tellers: Ronald Diehl, Don Griffin, Forrest Griffin, Arnold Gibson, Bob Nelson, Robert Smallwood, Roy Webster, Don Coble, Dale Emery and Cletis Mick. A moment of silent prayer was followed by prayer by Dr. Neff.

Nominations for the examining Board were Rev. R. R. Neff and K. J. Phillips. Rev. L. R. Neff was elected.

It was moved and carried that the District Trustees be the same as last year, Rev. W. D. Phillips, A. S. Joppie, A. F. Osborn.

Nominations for the Camp Board were as follows: Roy Webster, Merlin Goodrich, Dale Emery, Ronald Diehl resulting in Rev. D. Emery and Rev. R. Diehl being elected.

Nominations for Sunday School Secretary were Wilbert Walker, and Raymond Dean. Wilbert Walker was elected for Sunday School Secretary.

Rev. J. A. Hiatt reported for the Resoultions Committee.

Rev. W. N. Miller made prayer request for Mr. Ed Snyder. Rev. Hiatt led in prayer.

The Conference recessed until 7:00.

Third Sitting

The Third Sitting of the Conference convened at 7:00 p.m. July 9, 1959 with Rev. Skinner leading in song "Jesus Lover of My Soul" and Rev. Ruth Alexander at the piano. Rev. L. R. Neff led in prayer.

The Ordination Service proceeded with the reading of scriptures as follows: Titus Chapter 3, Verse 1-11 by Rev. W. D. Phillips. II Timothy 4, Verses 1-8 by Rev. A. F. Osborn and Matthew 26:31 by Rev. A. S. Joppie.

Rev. W. N. Miller then presented R. J. Smallwood, Ronald Diehl, Bertie Mead, Oliver McCoy and Mrs. W. D. Phillips to Dr. Neff to be ordained.

Dr. Neff addressed the candidates speaking first from Romans the 1st Chapter where Paul said "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Jesus Christ", then from the 3rd Chapter of Colosians, "I am made a minister of this Gospel", and finally from the 9th Chapter of I Corinthians, "I am a servant of all." Rev. G. V. Skinner offered prayer after which each one was presented with their credentials.

Report of District Superintendent

We have already crossed the dateline which marks the end of a very eventful and busy church fiscal year and are better than one month into the new.

Who can adequately describe the age we are serving. Change is the modern and up to date rule of our day. Charles Wesley states in one hymn "To serve the present age my calling to fulfill". May God help us to serve this age as he would direct, rather than as the spirit of this day would have us serve.

SPIRITUAL CONDITION

Many of us seem to sense the forces of opposition pressing upon the true church today and are praying for God to not only continue to help as He has in the past but visit us with a revival that will stir us to more forceful action against sin and all wrong doing.

I am glad for the many reports of revivals in our churches where souls have been saved or sanctified, many for the first time. Also for the many times that pastors have reported spontaneous praise and testimony services ending in good altar services.

We need mighty outpourings into our souls privately, and into our churches publicly, if we surive and gain in this conflict.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS

ANN ARBOR church and pastor Rev. Gerald MacDonald have sold the former church building at 411 Fountain and have purchased two and one fourth acres of land with a two bedroom house in a fine location near a new high school. A new church and 4 bedroom was constructed on this property. This building is 96 feet in length and will handle 300 in Sunday school. It has a full basement with several class rooms plus a large fellowship hall under the parsonage. This property fronts on a good paved highway and is large enough for parking and future expansion.

APPLEGATE church and pastor Rev. P. H. Emlinger have installed new carpeting in the church isle and platform and purchased a new piano.

CLIO church and pastor Rev. L. R. Neff have made some splendid improvements on the parsonage and are now considering plans for a large addition to the sanctuary.

CROSWELL church and pastor Rev. E. Klein have constructed a lovely new office for the pastor and utility room, both on the parsonage. They also have purchased a nice lot along side of the church for expansion in the future.

DETROIT GREELEY church and pastor Rev. Ruth N. Alexander have converted the church furnace to gas and also accomplished a major program of redecoration in the parsonage.

FLINT 4th and pastor Rev. J. Hiatt, have made many improvements adding up to a good program for the year; such as converted furnace to gas, new sump pump, improved parking lot, painting and refinishing work, plus some new chairs for Nursery and Sunday school.

FLINT LAPEER ROAD and pastor Rev. G. V. Skinner, are building now a 32x40 addition to the church annex, to be used for Sunday school and youth work. A sum of \$3,000 has been promised to the church from an estate.

MONROE CHURCH and pastor Rev. A. S. Joppie spent approximately \$500. on Sunday school and church equipment this year.

MONTROSE church and pastor Rev. Roy Randolph completed and dedicated a lovely new church on their property. This church is a credit to our district. We are grateful to the people and pastor of Montrose for their sacrifice and untiring efforts.

NORTH BRANCH church and pastor Rev. Wilbert Walker have added a lovely 16x30 vestibule on their church, including a Nursery and Sunday school class room in the basement, plus increased restroom facilities. Also installed a new public address system.

NORTH LAKEPORT church and pastor Rev. Wm.Doe have redecorated church basement throughout and have purchased new hymnal racks.

PONTIAC church and pastor Rev. Dale Emery, have converted the annex which was the orignal auditorium into several classrooms with partitions, which can be rolled back, so the auditorium may still be used.

PORT HURON, NORTH RIVER ROAD (yet unorganized) and pastor Rev. Andrew Counterman have bought and help build a new 3 bedroom ranch type parsonage and have completed the interior of their church. This is a fine accomplishment for a small church.

RUSSELLVILLE church and pastor Rev. Donald Griffin, have completed a much needed interior decoration job on the church.

SAGINAW church and pastor Rev. J. Bare, have installed new carpeting on rostrum and in front of the altar also a new outside bulletin board.

UTICA church, and pastor Rev. Merlin Goodrich, have purchased new lots for construction of church and also painted the present building.

WATERTOWN church and pastor Rev. R. I. Sweet have redecorated the interior of their church building.

YPSILANTI church and pastor Rev. R. J. Smallwood have purchased new pews for the sanctuary, also new songbooks and a beautiful painting for the front of the sanctuary, completed a new Sunday school room, insalled a new track rack and panic bars on all doors.

CHURCH ORGANIZED

We are happy to organize our new church at Ida, Mich. This is the first child of our Church Exstenion Fellowship Club. Rev. Wayne Greve is doing a fine work of pastoring there and we wish to receive this church into this conference at the appropriate time.

BRANCH SUNDAY SCHOOLS

We started two new branch Sunday schools this past church year.

PIGEON

We had the indirect promise of support by 10 or 12 families in Pigeon, Mich.; if we would open a work. We launched the work and Rev. Roy Webster gave it a gallant try, but the people changed their minds and left us in such an embarrasing position that we felt it wise to invest our money and time elsewhere.

SPARLINGVILLE

We are happy to report that our new branch Sunday School at Sparlingville, with Rev. Bob Nelson as pastor is coming along very well. They have purchased a beautiful wooded lot with a down payment of \$1,000. which was a gift by one of the families attending. Footings are in and they are ready to put up a new church building. Please pray for this work and its needs.

CAMP GROUND IMPROVEMENTS

The campgrounds has been the heaviest burden and perhaps the greatest challenge facing the District council and Supt. this past year.

We have purchased on time 12, acres on the East line of the orignal property for \$6,000 in addition to this purchase a new sanitation plant has been installed at a probable cost of about \$7,000. This building is modern and will be adequate for youth camp as well as District camp. It houses toilets, showers, and a laundry room with hot water for showers and laundry.

We are asking you pastors and delegates to help us promote the "One Thousand Club" program, launched June 14. If we can reach our goal of One thousand people giving ten dollars each, this program can be handled nicely.

During this next year the future planning committee will have the drawings of the new development, showing location of lots and other buildings etc.

The lots will be made available to individuals or churches as soon as this plan is completed.

DISTRICT PROGRAM

I call attention to the program suggested a year ago by the District Superintendent.

No. 3

Church membership gain-Thanks to the new emphasis on Junior church membership, and our new tithe system which takes the heat off membership and places it upon finance where it belongs; we are showing very good gains in this department. For example Monroe, recived eight adults and 55 Junior church members. Two or three of our larger churches showed a good gain also. Then a number of our smaller churches gained in this manner. This is a good trend and lets keep it going.

No. 5

We also definitely have and are accomplishing No. 5. The Tithe system which has been accepted enthusiastically by our laymen and pastors. We do need some adjustments which will be brought to us by the Ways and means committee.

No. 9

The contents of No. 9 have also been carried out. Purchasing new acreage and building a new sanitation system on these grounds.

I am personally grateful to God and to you pastors and people who have made this much possible.

No. 1 and No. 2

Prayer and Fasting No. 1 and Lay Visitation No. 2 have edged a little up the graph, but not enough. Bro Hendrick gave a lot of time and intertest in promoting Lay Visitation from a District level but this must catch fire on the local level.

We cannot give up on these recommedations. I suggest we remember the unfulfilled goals listed a year ago and add to them the following:

FIRST

Active and loyal support to all the General church relationship: visits by the General Supt. of this area; visits by the departmental representatives such as General Home and Foreign Missions, General Sunday School and youth.

SECOND

A keener interest and better attitude by some pastors and churches toward the District interests and needs!

For Example: Every church should pay at least something to stewardship and tithe, goose eggs on the report are almost inexcusable.

District Church Extension or Home Missions—You pastors are the key to success for our District. Only two or three pastors in the entire District have ever actually procured new members to our "Church Extension Fellowship Club." The District Supt. and Bob Nelson have done the rest.

Also we need your help right now to keep this "One thousand club" before your people. Please help us in this and cooperate in other District capacities when asked.

THIRD

A new and renewed emphasis placed upon the Spiritual and Devo-

tional needs of our churches, pastor and people. With this a warning concerning the ever increasing tend toward the MERCENARY and wordly way of interpreting success, and progress. MONEY, NUMBERS, THINGS!!

FOURTH

That the District Supt. and council prompt and aid the District committees to a more specific and organized program namely: Finance committee, Sunday school, Church exstension and youth etc.

CONCLUDING REMARKS:

I care not for praise or compliments that are mere gush or politically motivated. What I have to say now is sincere and from my heart.

I doubt if a District council anywhere could have a better spirit or work in sweeter harmony than we have enjoyed this past year. We have suffered reverses and may complex and trying situations have confronted us, but these men have been gracious, fair and Christian through it all. I thank them at this time.

My assistant Supt. Rev. Joppie has been very helpful and cooperative and his wisdom and council deeply appreciated.

It has always been a pleasure to work with our District Treasurer, Rev. Osborn and Secretary Rev. Skinner.

The District Sunday school leader, Rev. W. Walker and Youth Leader Rev. Wm. Doe have stood by me at all times and are ready always for an aggressive program.

The camp chairman Rev. W. D. Phillips, has done a masterful job in this capacity. We both appreciate the few men who came so many times to work at camp, even though they were busy. They came anyway. Some made as many as 20 trips to work on these grounds.

Most of your pastors have labored and sacrificed to see your part of the vineyard produce for God this year. I have noticed this and if I have, you may rest assured that our heavenly father has so much the more.

Brethren we can work together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus. My first desire is that we as pastors and people work in Harmony and Unity, with brotherly love, in honor preferring one another. Remember the promise "Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee a crown of life"

DISTRICT RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Whereas Standing Rule No. 1, page 23 of the Conference Journal does not give sufficient time for the Conference Statistician to compile his reports before Conference; therefore be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 1 be changed to read as follows: The Conference year shall close May 31st and all reports be mailed to the Conference Statistician by June 15 th.
- 2. Be it resolved that Resolution No. 2 of the 1958 Conference Journal be placed in standing rules. (Be it resolved that the Camp Meeting date be set to begin the second Friday of July).
- 3. Whereas Standing Rule No. 17, page 26 of the Conference Journal makes unnecessary work for the District Superintendent and is impractical, therefore be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 17 be changed to read as follows: (Be it resolved that the vote on the recall of the pastor be taken by the Conference Superintendent at the time of the Annual Meeting. This vote to be taken by secret ballot and shall be counted by the Conference Superintendent, who shall report the results of the voting to the pastor and to the Church.)
- 4. Inasmuch as Owosso College has for 50 years had a successful history in training young people for Christian service, and inasmuch as the General Board has assigned the State of Michigan as the patronizing territory for Owosso College,: (Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference go on record in pledging to the College its full co-operation and prayful support and open the doors of its churches to a representative of the College at which time the financial needs of the College shall be presented and an offering received subject to Section 149, Paragraph 3, of the Manual.)
- 5. Be it resolved that we give a rising vote of thanks to the cook, Kitchen and dining room help, the Camp Board and all other camp workers who have made the Conference a success.
- 6. Be it resolved that we give our General Superintendent Dr. W. H. Neff a rising vote of thanks for his efficient leadership during the Conference.
- 7. Be it resolved that we give a rising vote of thanks to our beloved District Superintendent, Rev. W. N. Miller for his faithful leadership.
- 8. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint the Ways and Means Committee to be comprised of six members plus the District Treasurer, the term office of the said six persons shall be graduated, so that only two members shall vacate annually.
- 9. Be it resolved that the District Council be empowered to sell the land on Highway 15, formerly purchased for a Camp-Site, and to purchase acreage in connection with the present camp site.
- 10. Whereas the Conference of 1950 adopted what was known as The Michigan Conference Church Extension Plan. And whereas assessments to

the amount of \$1.25 appears under the title Budget, page 18, in minutes of that year, and whereas from editing error, or other reason, nothing is in the Minutes;

Therefore be it resolved that this conference adopt the plan and Constitution presented and accepted by the 1950 Conference, subject to revisions by the Council which are necessary to bring it in line with our present plan of operation. Further, be it resolved that when completed by the council that a mimeographed copy be placed in the hands of each licensed and ordained minister of the Conference, and that a seperate and detailed report of his finance be given at each Conference hereafter.

- 11. Be it resolved that the following goals be adopted for our Sunday School's this year. Namely -
 - 1. A 5% gain in Sunday School Attendance.
 - 2. Enroll 1000 new scholars.
- 3. Greater cooperation with General and District Sunday School program.
- 4. Encourage regular Sunday School Board Meeting's and Sunday School Worker's Conferences.
 - 5. A more accurate method of keeping records.
- 12: Whereas there is a definite need for a more uniform plan of operation in our Sunday Schools and,

Whereas there should be a greater understanding and closer working between Local Sunday Schools and the District Sunday School Department.

Therefore be it resolved that there shall be a Pastor's and Sunday School Superintendent's Conference held in each Zone. For the purpose of meeting and solving our problems. And a correlation of ideas that would greatly benefit in promoting Sunday School Work.

13. Whereas it is recognized that to have a sound and aggressive Sunday School, it is necessary that our Teachers, Co-Teachers and Officers be well informed in their field.

Therefore Be it resolved that the District Sunday School Committee promote a Teacher's Training Course in each Local Church.

14. Whereas there is a great need of advancing the work of God, and since it is generally recognized that the Sunday School is a great feeder for established churches, and sometimes the beginning of new ones.

Therefore be it resolved that the District Sunday School Department be responsible for starting five Branch Sunday Schools this coming year. Be it further resolved that the method for securing a location and promoting these Sunday Schools be as follows:

- 1. That there be a planning committee composed of the District Superintendent, District Sunday School Committee, and three members in each Zone, who shall investigate and decide on a suitable location for starting a Branch Sunday School with the respective Zone.
- 2. When a suitable location is decided upon, the churches in that Zone will contribute personnel and finance for carrying on the work under a leader agreed upon by said committee of that Zone. And where it is possible, a preaching service to be held by one of our Licensed or Local Preachers
- 3. That the appointed leader will work under, and be ameneable to the District Sunday School Committee and the three members representing the Zone.
- 15. Whereas the entire program of General Conference seems to present a forward and agressive program, and,

Whereas one of the things urged upon each of our Districts was a plan for, "Lay Visitation" and "Personal Soul-Winning".

Therefore be it resolved that we adopt the following plan, to be known as "Personal Soul-Winning and Lay Visitation Plan."

- 1. That a committee of not more than three be appointed by the District Superintendent, who's work will be;
- (a) To lay out a course of Study. (b) To appoint committee's and instructor's in each Zone, and advise in organizing classes. (c) To gather information and give reports on progress and accomplishments.
- 2. Be it further resolved (a) That there be an entense effort on the part of the Pastor to attend all classes, and that he enlist as many of the laity of his church as possible. (b) That a cerificate of accomplishment be given to all who finish the course.
- 3. Also be it resolved that at sometine during the period of instructions or immediately after, the Pastor of each church will organize in his or her church a group of Soul Winning and Lay Visitation, and set up files and records recommended by the committee, and that these be kept as permanent records of the church.
- 16. The Prayer and Fasting League of the East Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- 1. Be it resolved that in keeping with the program of our Church that we urge each Church in Our Conference to organize a Prayer and Fasting League.
 - 2. The objectives of the Prayer and Fasting League shall be:
- 1. The Prayer and Fasting League is not to take the place of the regular church mid-week prayer meeting.
- 2. The membership of this league shall be directed to pray for the general interests of our church at home and abroad.

- 3. We urge that the membership of the League be encouraged to pray for local community needs.
- 4. That where the Pastor feels it advisable a list of definite needs be provided for each member covering such things as:

Unsaved families in the community.

Unsaved families in the Sunday School.

Unsaved individuals.

Definite church objectives and needs.

3. ORGANIZATIONS

- 1. The Pastor shall act a director of the Prayer and Fasting League.
- 2. SECRETARY; On the recommendation of the Pastor of one or more names the Official Board shall appoint a Secretary to work with the Pastor.
- 3. The Secretary shall form a membership list.

 Membership of the Prayer and Fasting League shall be volunteer members of the Church, Sunday School and Youth Society, and friends of the Church.
- 4. The membership shall be kept active by being revised twice each year. September 1st. and March 1st., of each Conference year.
- 5. Whereas this is a new Conference venture, we hereby ask that the next Ministerial Meeting of this Conference set aside 1 hour for open discussion of this District Project, that a better understanding and organization may be perfected at our next District Conference.
- 20. Children's Meeting Be it resolved that we have children's meetings during the afternoon and evening services.

Be it further resolved that the Council secure a youth director and children's director to plan activities between services.

Ways and Means Committee Resolutions

1. Whereas the "Tabernacle Fund" is out-dated:

Therefore be it resolved that we merge the "Tabernacle Fund" and the "Camp and Conference Fund." and that the merged fund be known as the "Camp and Conference Fund".

2. Whereas, we are in dire need of funds to meet property payments, the district officials have had to borrow from the Church Extension Loan Fund:

Therefore be it resolved that we transfer Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) from said Church Extension Loan Fund to a fund known as the Property Fund.

3. Whereas, because of continued improvements and general maintenance, the $\frac{1}{2}$ of $\frac{1}{6}$ designated for Camp and Conference Fund is very insufficient;

Therefore be it resolved that each church pay 1% of its regular Church offerings to said Camp and Conference Fund.

4. Whereas it is imperative that changes be made in the distribution of the District United Stewardship Fund;

Therefore be it resolved that the following percentage plan be adopted:

Church Extension Fund	22%
Church Extension Loan Fund	
College Fund	10%
Ministerial Relief Fund	6%
General Conf. Delegate Fund	4%
Property Fund	6%
Administrative Fund	50%

5. Whereas the stipulations of Ways and Means Resoultion No. 3 should be permanent;

Therefore be it resolved that Resolution No. 3 1958-1959 Minutes be placed in the Standing Rules.

6. Whereas it is customary for this body to present a love gift to the wife of the presiding officer;

Therefore be it resolved that we give Mrs. W. H. Neff the sum of \$50.00.

7. Whereas there seems to be a little inequity in the renumerating of our officers:

Therefore, be it resolved that the District Secretary's and the District Sunday School Secretary's salaries be increased \$25.00.

8. Whereas the Ways and Means Resolutions No. 7, 1958-1959 Minutes brought favorable results;

Therefore, be it resolved that said Resolution No. 7 be placed in the Standing Rules.

9. Whereas the District Council's plan for the Sunday School Department worked most satisfactorily;

Therefore be it resolved that the following plan for the financing of the District Sunday School Department be put into effect:

Sunday Schools with an average of 50 and under \$5.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 51-75
Sunday Schools with an average of 76-100 10.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 101-150 15.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 151-200 20.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 201 and over 25.00 per year

10. Whereas the majority of Pilgrim Holiness Ministers of the East Michigan Conference have expressed keen interest for their participation in the Blue Cross-Blue Shield movement on a group basis.

Be it resolved that this Conference shall as an integral part of its official functions sponsor and promote the enrollment of its assigned ministers, and full time clerical employees of the District.

The Treasurer of this District Shall be instructed to act for the District and for the ministers and clerical personel in contracting the representatives of Michigan Hospital Service and Michigan Medical Service. The Treasurer of the District shall collect all periodic subscriptions for the enrolled Ministers and clerical personnel, and deposit the money in the District Treasury. The Treasurer shall be empowered to make payment of the total Blue Cross-Blue Shield subscriptions for the District by check drawn against the District Treasury. This District shall make available to the Treasurer such additional funds as he may require in undertaking this responsibility.

A committee of three ministers from this District shall be appointed by the District Superintendent to assist the Treasurer in such a way as the Superintendent may request. This committee shall be known as the Committee on Blue Cross-Blue Shield Enrollment.

11. Be it resolved that all ministers be required to give five days labor without pay per year to the District at the call of the Council or Camp Meeting Board.

STANDING RULES

NO. 1 - CONFERENCE YEAR

The Conference Year shall close May 31st and all reports be mailed to the Conference Statistician by June 15th.

NO. 2 - UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND

Whereas the present method of securing finances to promote the District and General work is irregular and unequal and some churches with many members have low finance and some churches with fewer members have high finance, and whereas we are in full accord with the plan of God, namely tithes and offerings for financing the work of the Kingdom, and advise our people to tithe their income into the local church: Therefore be it resolved that each Church pay 10% of their church receipts each month to the District Treasurer,

Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer send the equivalent of \$8.00 per member to the General Treasurer for the General United Stewardship Fund, and that the District United Stewardship Fund be divided as follows:

Church Extension Fund	22%
Church Extension Loan Fund	2%
College Fund	10%
Ministerial Relief Fund	6%
General Conference Delegate Fund	4%
Property Fund	6%
Administrative Fund	50%

NO. 3 - DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUND

All monies raised in the local church for District and General work shall be sent to the District Treasurer, who shall forward general funds to the General Treasurer.

No. 4 — PASTORS AT CAMP MEETING

Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend the Annual Camp Meeting each Church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the Camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire Camp Meeting.

NO. 5 - EXAMINING AND EDUCATION BOARD

The District Superintendent shall be chairman of the examining and Educational Board by virtue of his office.

NO. 6 - CAMP MEETING and CONFERENCE EXPENSES

Whereas there is a great deal of expense in connection with the Annual Camp Meeting and Conference. let each local church pay into the District Treasury 1% of their regular offerings to be designated for Camp Meeting and Conference expense. Inasmuch as it is impossible under the present set-up to any longer give free entertainment to our ministers and their families; therefore be it resolved that each minister and their families will be responsible for their lodging and meals.

An exception can be made to this by the District Council for retired ministers, visiting ministers and home missionary workers.

Be it further resolved that during the Annual Conference all delegates (Ministerial and Lay) be given their meals free.

The District Superintendent, his wife and members of his family under 16 years of age shall be given meals and lodging without charge during the Annual Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer pay out the Administrative fund (the Pension Plan for the District Superintendent.

No. 7 — SALARIES

The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$4,400 per year plus 7 cents per mile traveling expenses. The District Treasurer shall receive \$375.00 per year; The District Secretary shall receive \$200.00; the District Sunday School Secretary \$100.00; the Youth Director \$75.00; the District Statistician \$40.00; all District officials receive 6 cents per mile for all miles traveled in the interest of the District.

NO. 8 - PARSONAGE UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is located. All churches in the District are to provide the utilities for the parsonages. This District shall provide the same for the District parsonage.

NO. 9 - CREDENTIALS

The District Superintendent shall have read Section 105 and 107 of the Manual instructing all District licentiates that hereafter they shall appear before the District Examining Board before their credentials shall be granted.

NO. 10 - CAMP MEETING FUNDS

The District Treasurer shall submit an itemized report of Camp Meeting Funds as recorded in the 1945 Conference Journal, page 13 This report to appear in the Journal.

No. 11 — APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

The District Council shall appoint all committees. The Standing committees are to be appointed to include new men where possible and to avoid the duplication of men on several committees. It is recommended that the entire constituency be considered.

No. 12 — BUILDING COMMITTEE

The District Council shall appoint a Building Committee composed of three members who have experience in the work of acoustics, architecture and construction. All churches and church boards must have the approval of said committee before the purchase of building sites or the erecting of buildings or improvements in excess of \$500.00.

NO. 13 - BURIAL BENEFITS

All actively engaged ministers and their wives of the District shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association. Cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the Treasuries of the department that employs them. Complete resolution appears in Standing Rule No. 20 of the 1947 Journal.

NO. 14 - VACATIONS

It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a two-weeks vacation with pay. The District Superintendent shall be given a two-weeks vacation with pay.

NO. 15 - PASTOR'S CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

Be it resolved that a committee of six be appointed as a Pastor's Conference Committee by the District Council; that two be appointed for three years, two for two years, two for one year, and that two shall be appointed each year respectively. The Pastor's Conference Committee shall arrange the program, set the date, the place, and nofity all ministers. Be it resolved that said Committee set the date and make plans for a one day ministerial Retreat.

NO. 16 - CAMP MEETING BOARD

Be it resolved that a Camp Meeting Board of six members be elected in the following manner; two members to be elected for 3 years; the next two elected to serve two years, and the last two elected for one year. Following this, two members shall be elected annually for a three year term. Board duties; Secure all workers for Camp and Conference, supervise grounds and building; purchase good and necessary equipment for Camp and Conference; have charge of all advertising.

Whereas, Camp Board Members are pastors, and whereas much of their time must be devoted and their minds occupied with the many duties connected with the manual working of the Camp, and therefore are not free to attend and enjoy the Camp services;

Therefore be it further resolved that after any member of the Camp Board has served for a period of three years, he shall not be re-elected to the Camp Board until at least three years have expired. The District Council shall provide nominations from which Board members shall be elected; Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer, and one other member of the Council serve on this Board, also that the District Superintendent shall by virtue of his office serve on this Board but that he shall not be the chairman.

Be it further resolved that the chairman of the Camp Board shall be appointed by the District Council.

NO. - 17 RECALL OF THE PASTOR

Be it resolved that the vote on the recall of the pastor be taken by the Conference Superintendent at the time of the Annual Meeting. This vote to be taken by secret ballot and shall be counted by the Conference Superintendent, who shall report the results of the voting to the pastor and to the Church.

NO. 18 - RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT

Be it resolved that whenever there shall be elected another District Superintendent, that the Council earnestly endeavor to place said retiring Superintendent in satisfactory position.

NO. 19 - ORDINATION SERVICE

Be it resolved that the order of business on the first night of the Conference be the Ordination Service.

Whereas, the minister's wife makes a vital contribution to her husband's work, therefore we recommend that the wife of the candidate be given an honorary seat with the candidate during the Ordination Service.

Whereas, Ordination is an extremely important event in the life of a Minister and whereas the families of the Candidate may desire to be present and make plans well in advance of the Ordination Day; therefore be it resolved that the Examining and Education Board review and examine and then notify candidates 15 days prior to the Conference.

NO. 20 - CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

Be it resolved that all Treasurer's books of the District be audited annually by a certified public accountant so that a report from the auditor can be given to the Conference when called for.

NO. 21 - CAMP MEETING SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSION

Be it resolved that on the two Sundays during Camp Meeting that there be a Sunday School session beginning at 9:30 until 10:15 following the testimony meeting and that said session be arranged and supervised by the Sunday School Committee.

Be it further resolved that a credit card be given to all in attendance, and that each card be signed and returned by the pupil to their local Church Sunday School Secretary for the attendance record and reports to the Conference.

NO. 22 - ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Inasmuch as most religious bodies follow the order of having election immediately after District reports, and inasmuch as many Conferences of the Pilgrim Holiness Church follow this same order, therefore be it resolved that election of officers be immediately following District reports.

Whereas there has been successive balloting for important offices and whereas this has often resulted in the election of individuals to several positions of officialdom, therefore be it resolved that balloting for respective officers shall be taken care of in regular and proper sequence. Be it further resolved that the elections be posted immediately.

NO. 23 - COMMITTEE MEETINGS

Be it resolved that the chairman of the resolution committee and of the Ways and Means Committee shall call a meeting of their respective committees at least one month before Conference.

No resolutions shall be presented to this Conference until it has been typewritten and signed.

NO. 24 - SUNDAY SCHOOL FINANCE

The following plan for the financing of the District Sunday School Department shall be put into effect:

Sunday Schools with an average of 50 and under \$5.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 51-75 7.50 per year
Sunday Schools with an average 76-100 10.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 101-150 15.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 151-200 20.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 201 and over 25.00 per year

NO. 25 - CHURCH EXTENSION

Inasmuch as the present Conference Church Extension Department is not producing the number of new churches that we are capable of producing and whereas the establishing of new churches is necessary for a steady and healthy growth for any District, and whereas there appears to be a definite weakness in our present policy of raising funds for Church Extension work:

Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference adopt the Church Extension Fellowship which reads as follows:

CHURCH EXTENSION FELLOWSHIP OF PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH, EAST MICHIGAN DISTRICT

Holding the conviction that God would have us further the cause of Christ by establishing new churches within our District borders, I subscribe the following:

- (a) I will pray for the leading of the Lord in the work of the Church Extension Board.
- (b) I will be alert for any possibilities of new churches and will inform the Board.
- (c) I recognize that the first financial obligations in the opening of a new work are the most difficult to meet and will therefore be responsible for two units, (\$5.00) per unit, to total (\$10.00) for the Church Extension Fellowship.
- (d) I assume this obligation for not more than two new works in any one Conference year. Said works to be approved by the Church Extension Board.
- (e) I will try to secure other members of the Fellowship.
- (f) I understand this agreement may be terminated any time I deem it necessary by notifying the Church Extension Board.

Motion was made and carried that we refer the nominations for youth zone leaders for the Industrial Zone back to the District Council, inasmuch as Rev. Ronald Diehl is leaving the District.

DISTRICT RESOLUTIONS — YOUTH

- No. 1 Whereas the District Youth have liquidated their debt on the Cottages, and whereas there is still need for housing facilities at the Youth Convention, conference and camp. Therefore be it resolved that the District Youth accept as its project for the coming year, the raising of funds to build a new Youth Doromitory to house young people during the Youth activities.
- No. 2 Whereas the district youth program demands a great many hours of work on the part of the District Youth President, as well as a great deal of responsibility, therefore be it resolved that the District Youth President's salary be raised from \$75.00 a year to \$100.00. This salary. as in the past to be paid from the district youth treasury.

- No. 8 Inasmuch as we have so much repetition in our youth programs in our local churches, therefore be it resolved that a district committee be appointed by the executive committee to study the situation and bring some original ideas to our local presidents.
- No. 10 Whereas the Owosso College is planning a day of "Michigan Youth in Action", when the Pilgrim youth of Michigan and East Michigan shall meet together at the Owosso College, therefore be it resolved that we go on record as being in full support of this program, and that it be included as part of our District Youth Schedule.
- No. 11 Inasmuch as we feel it a great privilege and high honor to have Dr. Elliott, Director of Youth and Sunday Schools with us to preside over our conference; therefore be it resolved that we express our appreciation by giving him a rising vote of thanks.
- No. 12 Inasmuch as we, the young people of East Michigan appreciate the active interest of our District Superintendent, Rev. W. N. Miller, in the Young People's work; therefore be it resolved that we give him a rising vote of thanks.
- No. 13 Inasmuch as we are thankful and appreciative of the fine leadership of our District President Rev. William Doe, and the time he has spent in making this a good year for the Young Peoples' work of the East Michigan District; therefore be it resolved that we give him a rising vote of thanks.

STANDING RULES

No. 1 — Youth Presidents Report

Inasmuch as we feel that it is helpful for our conference to know what the youth conference is accomplishing, therefore be it resolved that the youth president be called upon to give a report to the District (adult) conference each year.

No. 2 — Zone Presidents Reports

Be it resolved that the zone presidents, give a written report of their work for the year at the youth conference.

No. 3 — Youth Convention

Be it resolved that the youth convention will begin Friday night preceding the annual camp meeting, with a youth rally. The free meals will begin with the evening meal Friday. The youth conference shall convene on Saturday at 9 a.m. and be finished with business by noon. Those

who are not pastors or delegates shall meet at this time for a fellowship meeting.

No. 4 — Number of Zone Rallies

ANNUAL YOUTH REPORT EAST MICHIGAN DISTRICT 1959

Mr. Chairman, Pastors, Youth Leaders and Delegates to this conference, Greetings in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. As we close this year, our hearts rejoice for the privilege of working together with our fine young people in the interest of saving, training, and guiding our youth so that they may LOOK TOWARD TOMORROW.

Our youth program began with a wonderful youth camp at Gaines under the direction of Rev. Gerald MacDonald. We had approximately 160 enrolled, this does not include our workers. Classes were conducted which gave the background of our church and spiritual help from God's Word. Also handicraft and a fine recreation program.
