FIRST SITTING

The first sitting of the Fifth Annual Michigan District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 a. m., July 11, 1960 at the camp grounds in Gaines, Michigan.

Rev. James Krieder led in the singing of "The Blood Will Never Lose It's Power." Ruth Alexander played the piano.

Rev. Miller greeted the Conference with a few words in which he asked that we have the right spirit. Then Rev. John Dean led in prayer.

Rev. W. N. Miller introduced the presiding officer, our general superintendent, Dr. Flexon. He spoke from I Corinthians 9:16-27. A planned Ministry. Paul had a planned ministry and advised Timothy to plan his ministry. The ministers were told to plan their revivals, a plan to get results. Plan their altar work. Plan their services. Sunday School Secretary: Rev. W. Walker.

It was moved and carried that the three already serving as district trustees be retained. They are A. F. Osborn, A. S. Joppie, and W. D. Phillips.

Rev. Miller then welcomed Mrs. Warner, who represents the Stevens Van Lines.

The reception committee presented the following to the Conference:

Dr. and Mrs. H. T. Mills and Rev. and Mrs. M. L. Goodman. They were given honorary seats in the conference bar.

Rev. Raymond Dean reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

The following resolutions were read and passed:

Resolution No. 1 regarding a Finance Committee.

Resolution No. 2 regarding developing the camp grounds.

Resolution No. 3 regarding changing No. 7 in the Standing Rules

Resolution No. 7 regarding a district paper.

Rev. D. Wayne Brown reported for the Resolutions Committee.

The following resolutions were read and passed:

Resolution No. 1 regarding mimeographing all resolutions.

Resolution No. 2 regarding pastors conference.

Resolution No. 4 regarding editing of resolutions.

Resolution No. 5 regarding labor on camp grounds.
Resolution No. 6 regarding standing rule No. 16.

We were dismissed in prayer by Rev. Hiatt.

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of Conference convened at 7:30 p. m., July 11, 1960, with Rev. Skinner leading in the songs "Rock of Ages" and "A Charge to Keep I Have". Then Rev. Miller led in prayer.

The ordination service proceeded with the reading of scriptures as follows: Rev. Hendrick reading I Timothy 3, Rev. D. Wayne Brown reading II Timothy 4:1-8 and Rev. Joppie reading Titus 3.

Rev. Flexon then addressed the candidates from I Kings 17:24, "Thou art a man of God". He admonished the ministers to "be loyal to God, denomination and church and district. — Be sure your conduct is always spiritual. — We cannot all be scholars but we can be students. Be kind, keep appointments, keep out of debt and keep pure. Keep spiritual and keep prayerful. If you do not have the unction of God on your life and message, your message will be a failure. Be careful not to get so busy that you don't have time to pray."

Rev. Flexon read from the manual to the following candidates: Andrew Counterman, Eugene Erickson, Roy Randolph and R. I. Sweet. Rev. Flexon then offered prayer after which Rev. and Mrs. Skinner sang a special song which led to a marvelous altar service concluding the ordination ceremonies.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting convened at 9:00 a. m., July 12, 1960, with Rev. William Doe leading in the singing of "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." Rev. Skinner played the piano.

Rev. Hendrick led in prayer.

Rev. Flexon read Psalm 4. He told the Conference the pastors must get busy or the denomination will die on the denominational vine. They should have a junior church to keep the young people. Try to start branch Sunday Schools and make house to house visits handing out tracts to the people.

Rev. Flexon introduced Dr. Elliott, president of Owosso College. Dr. Elliott mentioned the Pilgrim Pension Plan that takes care of our retired ministers. "Our Bible College must keep separate records from the Liberal Arts College department", he said. "We ask for your prayers and support for the college."

Rev. G. V. Skinner read the minutes from the second and third sittings and they were approved.

Rev. Hendrick reported and explained for the Ways and Means Committee resolution No. 4, regarding East Michigan Pilgrim Loans and Investments, Inc.

Rev. Raymond Dean of the Ways and Means Committee presented resolution No. 6. It was passed.

Rev. D. Wayne Brown reported for the Resolutions Committee.

The following resolutions were read and passed:

Resolution No. 7 regarding leases for lots on the camp grounds.
Resolutions No. 8 regarding a room for committees to have meetings.

Resolution No. 9 regarding the district secretary sending greetings to missionaries from our district.

Resolutions No. 10 regarding changing No. 4 in the standing rules.

Resolution No. 11 regarding general board authorizing loans.

Resolution No. 12 regarding changes in the annual report blanks.

Resolution No. 13 regarding all eligible members to exercise their right to vote and to vote against a Catholic for president of the United States of America.

The following names were read by Rev. Skinner and it was voted that they be given District license: Miss Myrtle Bosma, Mr. D. Severance, and Mrs. F. Griffin, Sr.

Ways and Means Committee resolution No. 1 was amended to provide that the Finance Committee be appointed by the District Council and that the chairman of the Ways and means Committee shall be the chairman of the Finance Committee. This amendment carried.

Rev. R. Dean reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

The following resolution was read and passed:

Resolution No. 5 regarding conditions under which camp ground lots shall be leased.

Resolution No. 8 was read and voted down. Then the motion was made that the ministers vote on it in their fall ministerial meeting and given the power to act. The motion carried.

Rev. Hendrick dismissed in prayer.

FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting of the Conference convened at 1:30 p. m., July 12, 1960. Rev. Gerald MacDonald led in the singing of "In The Sweet By and By", with Ruth Alexander at the piano.

Rev. D. W. Brown led in prayer.

Rev. Skinner read the minutes from the fourth sitting and they were approved.

Rev. Skinner presented the following names for the Board of Directors for the East Michigan Pilgrim Loans and Investment, Inc., and they were elected by acclamation:

Two Years: L. Cole, Elmer Green, R. Dean.

Rev. Dean reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

The following resolution was read and passed:

Mrs. W. D. Phillips read the report from the Memorial Committee. It was passed.

Rev. W. Walker presented the following Sunday School Awards:

Utica, Rev. M. Goodrich — Highest Percentage gain.

North Branch, Rev. Walker, Highest Numerical gain.

Rev. Brown reported for the Resolutions Committee.

The following resolutions were read and passed:

Resolution No. 14 regarding giving time in the Conference to the Bible Department of Owosso College.

Resolution No. 15 regarding a rising vote of thanks to Rev. R. G. Flexon.

Resolution No. 16 regarding a rising vote of thanks to the cook, dining room help, the camp board, and all other camp workers.

Resolution No. 7 regarding a rising vote of thanks to Rev. W. N. Miller.

It was moved and passed that greetings be sent to Rev. Schweitzer and Mrs. Counterman.

It was moved and passed that Rev. Osborn explain the United Stewardship Fund to the Conference again.

It was moved and passed that the Memorial Committee prepare memorials to Dr. Butler for the Conference Journal.

It was moved and passed that the Council approve the minutes of this sitting.

It was moved and passed that the pastor's wives be remembered by the Memorial Committee.

Rev. Skinner dismissed in prayer.

Report of District Superintendent

To the fifth annual Conference of the East Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings:

We welcome General Supt. Flexon, who shall be the presiding officer in this Conference, for the first time.

A time of heavy responsibility is upon us as individuals and as a Church. We face a day of international propaganda, fears and threats; added to a national crisis of political chaos with no one offering any real solutions to our problems, or positive leadership for the people of this great nation.

With this picture it is great comfort to know that God has "led us out that He may lead us in". So while they struggle with their problems, let us honestly and sincerely face the business of this, our church in this our Conference.

SPIRITUAL CONDITION

This past year has been a busy year, with revivals, personal visitation, Sunday School and youth promotion and activities.

Some churches have reported gracious revivals, with souls saved, sanctified and blessed. However, I sense a deep need of spiritual awakening, which must be God sent.

There is a creeping malady of professionalism, indifference and materialism on us. John puts it "love of the world" crowding into our busy lives and churches.

Let us all constantly pray for genuine revival.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS

Only major improvements mentioned

APPLEGATE CHURCH and pastor, Rev. R. Dean, have constructed a beautiful new parsonage valued at \$15,000, costing only \$8,000 because of the sacrificial labors of the pastor and some of the laymen. They also installed new aluminum storm windows in the church, cost \$600 and spent \$500 on improvements in the church basement.

CLIO CHURCH and pastor, Rev. L. R. Neff have added a 40x50 addition to their church edifice, giving them a commodious building, dimensions totaling 40x80. This at a cost of \$25,000 and many hours of donated labor. This gives them an attractive and serviceable church for years to come.

CROSWELL CHURCH and pastor, Rev. Wm. Lyons are in the process of building a lovely new church adjacent to the old location. Details will be coming in the District paper and in next years Supt. report.

DETROIT GREELEY and pastor, Rev. Ruth N. Alexander, have put new surface brick on the exterior of their church, a new surface brick Bulletin board outside and painting inside and trim outside.

FLINT BROWN STREET and pastor, Rev. W. D. Phillips, are launching a major project at present by erecting a new educational unit, which will probably cost \$50,000 when completed.

FLINT FOURTH and pastor, Rev. J. Hiatt, have purchased as fine a parsonage as I know of, total cost \$26,000. They have paid a substantial sum on it and have the balance well financed.

FIRST PILGRIM CHURCH at Detroit has just completed an extensive modernization and improvement program. A new Hammond church-type organ and piano were purchased for the church. Aluminum eave-troughs and gutters and aluminum trim were installed on the church. Both lavatories were tiled. A new driveway and patio, sixe 30'x21' were poured between the church and the parsonage. The front porch of the parsonage was given extensive repairs and stone steps were installed. New storm windows and new screens were fitted on the parsonage. The entire building was then covered with aluminum siding. The total cost of this program approximated \$7700. In addition to the above, the Sunday School and Young People's Society have pooled their efforts and resources and have purchased for general use of the church a good used bus.

FLINT LAPEER ROAD and pastor, Rev. J. Bare have completed their new fellowship building and youth chapel was nearly completed under the ministry of Rev. G. V. Skinner, former pastor. Total cost of the new fellowship building and youth chapel, was \$8,500. They are laying plans now for a new church edifice, estimated cost \$55,000.00.

FLINT PASADENA and pastor Rev. John Dean have sold the church located on Pasadena Avenue and have constructed a new brick church at the corner of Ruth and College. This beautiful little church is nearly completed and is in a location second to none in the northwest section of Flint.

MT. CLEMENS and pastor Rev. James Krieder, have purchased a beautiful new parsonage, valued at about \$15,000.

NORTH BRANCH and pastor Rev. Wilbert Walker, have constructed a new vestibule, with Nursery and Sunday school classroom downstairs, also new ceiling in the church. Total cost \$7,000.

SAGINAW and pastor Rev. Theodore Neeley, are completing and decorating their church basement.

UTICA and pastor Rev. Merlin Goodrich, are constructing a lovely new church in a new location. This is a real forward step for Utica.

WARREN and pastor Rev. Roy Webster, have constructed and dedicated a fine new brick parsonage, adjacent to their church, and have improved their Sunday school rooms.

WAYNE and pastor Rev. B. Mead, have purchased a new parsonage near the church, and decorated their church auditorium.

CHURCH EXTENSION - HOME MISSIONS

Sparlingville has been our District Project this year. We are supporting the pastor and furnishing the parsonage while the local congregation is financing the building of their new church. We find that after a location is settled for a new work, there are two vital necessities: the man and the money. In Sparlingville we have a man that I personally feel is outstanding in this field, Rev. Bob Nelson. Only God knows the hours of labor, coupled with faith and courage, he is giving to this work. We are investing nearly all the money there that the District has available for Home Missions and the results are very gratifying. They have a new church nearly completed located on a lovely lot and their average S. S. attendance exceeded one hundred last month. This work when organized should actually show and produce more than many neglected, little, struggling works we might have started that can hardly exist in the demands of these days.

CAMP GROUNDS

Last year we purchased the new twelve acres and erected a new laundry and Sanitation Building and launched a plan called the Thousand Club to finance the project. Although we still owe a substantial amount on the endeavor, yet the plan yielded excellent financial results.

This year we would like to develop the twelve acres; roads laid out, lots marked off and made available to our people and churches with some shade trees planted and if possible, a large youth dormitory erected. These are the plans for the first two of a five year program. The third year — motel and guest cottages; the fourth year — dining room; the fifth year — at least a start on a new tabernacle. We realize many things can enter and change this plan; the State Inspector, finances, etc. The Combined District Council and Executive Youth Committee are working toward a satisfactory District and Youth Camp arrangement to the advantage of us all.

Allow me to insist that we continue our drive toward the following:

1. The deepening of our private devotional lives.
2. Lay visitation.
3. Branch Sunday schools and new churches.
4. Work out some financial source to help our small, struggling, organized churches.
5. The increase of our church membership by junior members as well as adults.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

This past year has been another year of good will and cooperation among the brethren. Many thanks to the members of the District Council, the Sunday School and Youth leaders and heads of committees for your good attitude of cooperation and tolerance toward the District Superintendent and many phases of District interest and God's Kingdom in general.

No. 1

Be it resolved that the editing committee group the resolutions according to their subjects, numbering them accordingly.

No. 2 — RESOLUTIONS

Be it resolved that the resolutions of the resolutions committee and Ways and Means Committee be mimeographed and made available to all delegates and ministers.

No. 3 — PASTOR'S CONFERENCE

Be it resolved that we have two one-day pastors conferences: one in the spring and one in the fall, each year.

No. 4 — CAMP LABOR

Be it resolved that each church in the Conference be responsible for 5 days labor, at the call of the council or the Camp Meeting Board, to make ready for the Annual Camp Meeting.

No. 5 — CAMP BOARD

Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 16 in the Conference Journal be read to this Conference for their consideration, to either change or approve.

No. 6 — LEASE AGREEMENT

Whereas the topographical map of the camp ground calls for a division of a portion for lots to be leased for cottages and tents and trailers; therefore be it resolved that the following be adopted as an agreement for lease and building. (Copy of lease available from district office).

No. 7 — CONFERENCE ROOM

Whereas the business of the Conference comes through various committees and whereas there is no place where these committees may meet: therefore, be it resolved that a room be provided for the private meetings of committees.

No. 8 — GREETINGS

Whereas, we have missionaries who are members of this Conference serving in the foreign fields, and whereas they are deprived of the privileges we enjoy while being together in the Conference; therefore, be it resolved that the Conference secretary send greetings to all the missionaries who are members of this Conference.

No. 9 — OWOSSO COLLEGE

Be it resolved that District Resolution No. 4 of Journal, page 19, be made to read as follows:

Inasmuch as Owosso College had a successful history in training young people for Christian Service, and inasmuch as the General Board has assigned the State of Michigan as the patronizing territory for Owosso College: (Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference go on record in pledging to the college its full co-operation and prayerful support and open the doors of its churches to a representative of the college at which time the financial needs of the Bible Dept. of the college shall be presented and an offering received subject to section 149, paragraph 3, of the manual). Be it further resolved that this resolution be placed in the Standing Rules.

No. 10

Whereas we are particularly related to Owosso College, therefore be it resolved that we grant the Bible Dept. of Owosso College time in our annual Conference to remind us of this relationship and to report on the same.

No. 11 — COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that the District Council appoint the Ways and Means Committee to be comprised of six members plus the District Treasurer, the term office of the said six persons shall be graduated, so that only two members shall vacate annually.

No. 12 — SUNDAY SCHOOL

Be it resolved that the following goals be adopted for our Sunday School's this year. Namely:

1. A 5% gain in Sunday School attendance.
2. Enroll 1000 new scholars.
3. Greater co-operation with general and district Sunday School programs.
4. Encourage regular Sunday School Board meeting's and Sunday school worker's conferences.
5. A more accurate method of keeping records.

No. 13

Whereas there is a definite need for a more uniform plan of operation in our Sunday Schools, and,

Whereas there should be a greater understanding and closer working between local Sunday Schools and the District Sunday School department.

Therefore be it resolved that there shall be a pastor's and Sunday School superintendent's conference held in each zone. For the purpose of meeting and solving our problems. And a correlation of ideas that would greatly benefit in promoting Sunday School work.

No. 14

Whereas there is a great need of advancing the work of God, and since it is generally recognized that the Sunday School is a great feeder for established churches, and sometimes the beginning of new ones,

Therefore be it resolved that the district Sunday School department be responsible for starting five branch Sunday Schools this coming year. Be it further resolved that the method for securing a location and promoting these Sunday Schools be as follows:

- That there be a planning committee composed of the district superintendent, district Sunday School committee, and three members in each zone, who shall investigate and decide on a suitable location for starting a branch Sunday School with the respective zone.
2. When a suitable location is decided upon, the churches in that zone will contribute personnel and finance for carrying on the work under a leader agreed upon by said committee of the zone. And where it is possible, a preaching service to be held by one of our licensed or local preachers.
3. That the appointed leader will work under, and be amenable to the district Sunday School committee and the three members representing the zone.

No. 15 — LAY VISITATION

Whereas the entire program of general conferences seems to present a forward and aggressive program, and,

Whereas one of the things urged upon each of our districts was a plan for "Lay Visitation" and "Personal Soul-Winning,"

Therefore be it resolved that we adopt the following plan, to be known as "Personal Soul-Winning and Lay Visitation Plan."

1. That a committee of not more than three be appointed by the district superintendent, who's work will be:
 - (a) To lay out a course of study.
 - (b) To appoint committee's and instructor's in each zone, and advise in organizing classes.
 - (c) To gather information and give reports on progress and accomplishments.
2. Be it further resolved:
 - (a) That there be an intense effort on the part of the pastor to attend all classes, and that he enlist as many of the laity of his church as possible.
 - (b) That a certificate of accomplishment be given to all who finish the course.
3. Also be it resolved that at sometime during the period of instruction or immediately after, the pastor of each church will organize in his or her church a group of soul winning and lay visitation, and set up files and records recommended by the committee, and that these be kept as permanent records of the church.

No. 16 — PRAYER AND FASTING LEAGUE

The Prayer and Fasting League of the East Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

1. Be it resolved that in keeping with the program of our church that we urge each church in our Conference to organize a prayer and fasting league.
2. The objectives of the Prayer and Fasting League shall be:
 1. The Prayer and Fasting League is not to take the place of the regular church mid-week prayer meeting.
 2. The membership of this League shall be directed to pray for the general interests of our church at home and abroad.
 3. We urge that the membership of the League be encouraged to pray for local community needs.
4. That where the pastor feels it advisable a list of definite needs be provided for each member covering such things as:
 - Unsaved families in the community.
 - Unsaved families in the Sunday School.
 - Unsaved individuals.
 - Definite church objectives and needs.

3. Organization.

1. The pastor shall act as director of the Prayer and Fasting League.
2. Secretary, on the recommendation of the pastor of one or more names the official board shall appoint a secretary to work with the pastor.
3. The secretary shall form a membership list. Membership of the Prayer and Fasting League shall be volunteer members of the church, Sunday School and Youth Society, and friends of the church.
4. The membership shall be kept active by being revised twice each year, September 1 and March 1 of each Conference year.
5. Whereas this is a new Conference venture, we hereby ask that the next ministerial meeting of this Conference set aside 1 hour for open discussion of this district project, that better understanding and organization may be perfected at our next District Conference.

No. 17 — CHILDREN'S MEETINGS

Be it resolved that we have children's meetings during the afternoon and evening services.

Be it further resolved that the council secure a youth director and children's director to plan activities between services.

No. 18 — LOANS

Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts,

Therefore, Be it resolved by the annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all district officials be, and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

No. 19 — REPORT BLANKS

Whereas the annual report blanks seem to be inadequate for our present needs; therefore, be it resolved that the district secretary write general headquarters suggesting changes.

No. 20 — CURRENT ELECTION

Whereas, as a Nation we are faced with the possibility of a Catholic president, and Whereas we are comparatively sure he will be governed by the Papacy, and whereas, we as holiness people are vitally interested in the future of our church and the doctrine: Therefore be it resolved that we as protestants go on record as being opposed to a Catholic president, and be it further resolved that the East Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church urge every voting member to cast a vote in opposition to a non-protestant president.

No. 21 — APPRECIATION

Be it resolved that we give a rising vote of thanks to our general superintendent Rev. R. G. Flexon, for his faithful leadership in this Conference.

No. 22

Be it resolved that we give a rising vote of thanks to the cook, the dining room help, the camp board and all other camp workers who have helped to make this Conference a success.

No. 23

Be it resolved that we give a rising vote of thanks to our district superintendent, Rev. W. N. Miller, for his efficient leadership among us.

Ways and Means

No. 1 — COMMITTEES

Whereas finance is so important to the ongoing of the District and the local church, therefore be it resolved that a finance committee of three members be appointed by the District Council from the Ways and Means committee. The duties of this committee shall be as follows:

1. To study all finance if each local church as to their ability to pay district and general united stewardship fund and to recommend as to ways of paying same.
2. To recommend to the District Council in regard to amount of indebtedness the local congregation is able to carry.
3. To report all findings to the District Council.
4. To give yearly report to the District Conference.
5. The chairman to be the same as the chairman of Ways and Means Committee.

Be it further resolved that:

1. Any church unable to pay their stewardship fund in full shall contact the chairman of this committee at least 90 days before the close of the church year.
2. Any church wanting to finance property, either building or buying, shall contact the chairman of this committee.
3. The local church shall receive the report from the committee and the District Council in not more than 30 days following request.

No. 2 — FINANCE AND LOANS

Whereas there is a need for a more adequate loan program in our District, therefore be it resolved that the program known as East Michigan Pilgrim Loans and Investments, Inc., be adopted and replace our present Church Extension Loan Fund.

No. 3

Be it resolved that division of District Stewardship Fund be changed to read as follows:

Church Extension Fund 20%.
College Fund 10%.
Ministerial Relief Fund 6%.
General Conference Delegate 4%.
Administrative Fund 54%.
Property Fund 6%.

No. 4 — SALARIES

Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 7 be amended to read as follows:

The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$4,500 per year plus 7 cents per mile traveling expense. The District Treasurer shall receive \$400.00 per year. The District Statistician \$50.00.

Be it further resolved the Statistician be permitted to hire help to tabulate reports.

No. 5 — LEASING OF LOTS

Be it resolved that the District lease lots on the camp ground to ministers and laymen desiring them as follows:

The lease fee shall be \$125.00 if paid in cash.

Terms: \$145.00 at the rate of \$25 down and \$10 per month for one year.

The District shall plant one tree on each lot and shall gravel the street in front of lots.

The terms of the lease shall be approved by the Conference before any lots are leased.

No. 6 — DISTRICT PAPER

Whereas there is some demand for a District paper, and whereas there is no financial provision for the same, be it resolved that the District Council prorate the costs — such as printing, postage, and secretarial help among the four departments of the District.

No. 7 — CAMP GROUND

Whereas there is need to further develop our camp ground, therefore be it resolved that we adopt a six step program of development.

1. Improvement and development of grounds.
2. Youth dorm.
3. Well and restrooms.
4. Adult dorm (motel type).
5. Dining room.
6. Tabernacle.

No. 8 — INSURANCE

Whereas the majority of Pilgrim Holiness Ministers of the East Michigan Conference have expressed keen interest for the participation in the Blue Cross-Blue Shield movement on a group basis,

Be it resolved that this Conference shall as an integral part of its official functions sponsor and promote the enrollment of its assigned ministers, and full time clerical employees of the District.

The treasurer of this District shall be instructed to act for the District and for the ministers and clerical personnel in contracting the representatives of Michigan Hospital Service and Michigan Medical Service. The treasurer of the District shall collect all periodic subscriptions for the District treasury. The treasurer shall be empowered to make payment of the total Blue Cross-Blue Shield subscriptions for the District by check drawn against the District treasury. This District shall make available to the treasurer such additional funds as he may require in undertaking this responsibility.

A committee of three ministers from this District shall be appointed by the District superintendent to assist the treasurer in such a way as the superintendent may request. This committee shall be known as the committee on Blue Cross-Blue Shield Enrollment.

No. 9 — APPRECIATION

Whereas we appreciate the leadership and guidance of Rev. Flexon has given this Conference and the godly Council given minister and layman alike, therefore be it resolved that we receive a love offering for Mrs. Flexon.

Standing Rules

No. 1 — CONFERENCE YEAR

The Conference Year shall close May 31st and all reports be mailed to the Conference Statistician by June 15th.

No. 2 — UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND

Whereas the present method of securing finances to promote the District and General work is irregular and unequal and some churches with many members have low finance and some churches with fewer members have high finance, and whereas we are in full accord with the plan of God, namely tithes and offerings for financing the work of the Kingdom, and advise our people to tithe their income into the local church: Therefore be it resolved that each Church pay 10% of their church receipts each month to the District Treasurer.

Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer send the equivalent of \$8.00 per member to the General Treasurer for the General United Stewardship Fund, and that the District United Stewardship Fund be divided as follows:

- Church Extension Fund 20%.
- College Fund 10%.
- Ministerial Relief Fund 4%.
- General Conference Delegate 4%.
- Property Fund 6%.
- Administrative Fund 54%.

No. 3 — DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUND

All monies raised in the local church for District and General work shall be sent to the District Treasurer, who shall forward general funds to the General Treasurer.

No. 4 — PASTORS AT CAMP MEETINGS

Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend the Annual Camp Meeting each Church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the Camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire Camp Meeting.

No. 5 — EXAMINING AND EDUCATION BOARD

The District Superintendent shall be chairman of the examining and Educational Board by virtue of his office.

No. 6 — CAMP MEETING and CONFERENCE EXPENSES

Whereas there is a great deal of expense in connection with the Annual Camp Meeting and Conference, let each local church pay into the District Treasury 1% of their regular offerings to be designated for Camp Meeting and Conference expense. Inasmuch as it is impossible

under the present set-up to any longer give free entertainment to our ministers and their families: therefore be it resolved that each minister and their families will be responsible for their lodging and meals.

An exception can be made to this by the District Council for retired ministers, visiting ministers and home missionary workers.

Be it further resolved that during the Annual Conference all delegates (Ministerial and Lay) be given their meals free.

The District Superintendent, his wife and members of his family under 16 years of age shall be given meals and lodging without charge during the Annual Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer pay out the Administrative Fund the Pension Plan for the District Superintendent.

No. 7 — SALARIES

The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$4,500 per year plus 7 cents per mile traveling expenses. The District Treasurer shall receive \$400 per year, the District Secretary shall receive \$200, the District Sunday School Secretary \$100, the Youth Director \$100, the District Statistician \$50. All District officials receive 6 cents per mile for all miles traveled in the interest of the District.

No. 8 — PARSONAGE UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is located. All churches in the District are to provide the utilities for the parsonages. This District shall provide the same for the District parsonage.

No. 9 — CREDENTIALS

The District Superintendent shall have read Section 105 and 107 of the Manual instructing all District licentiates that hereafter they shall appear before the district Examining Board before their credentials shall be granted.

No. 10 — CAMP MEETING FUNDS

The District Treasurer shall submit an itemized report of Camp Meeting Funds as recorded in the 1945 Conference Journal, page 13. This report to appear in the Journal.

No. 11 — APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

The District Council shall appoint all committees. The Standing Committees are to be appointed to include new men where possible and to avoid duplication of men on several committees. It is recommended that the entire constituency be considered.

No. 12 — BUILDING COMMITTEE

The District Council shall appoint a Building Committee composed of three members who have experience in the work of acoustics, archi-

tructure and construction. All churches and church boards must have the approval of said committee before the purchase of building sites or the erecting of buildings or improvements in excess of \$500.00.

No. 13 — BURIAL BENEFITS

All actively engaged ministers and their wives of the District shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association. Cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the Treasuries of the department that employs them. Complete resolution appears in Standing Rule No. 20 of the 1947 Journal.

No. 14 — VACATIONS

It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a two-weeks vacation with pay. The District Superintendent shall be given a two-weeks vacation with pay.

No. 15 — PASTOR'S CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

Be it resolved that a committee of six be appointed as a Pastor's Conference Committee by the District Council; that two be appointed for three years, two for two years, two for one year, and that two shall be appointed each year respectively. The Pastor's Conference Committee shall arrange the program, set the date, the place, and notify all ministers. Be it resolved that said Committee set the date and make plans for a one day ministerial Retreat.

No. 16 — CAMP MEETING BOARD

Be it resolved that Camp Meeting Board of six members be elected in the following mannner: two members to be elected for 3 years; the next two elected to serve two years, and the last two elected for one year. Following this, two members shall be elected annually for a three year term. Board duties: Secure all workers for Camp and Conference, supervise grounds and building; purchase good and necessary equipment for Camp and Conference; have charge of all advertising.

Whereas, Camp Board Members are pastors and whereas much of their time must be devoted and their minds occupied with the many duties connected with manual working of the Camp, and therefore are not free to attend and enjoy the Camp services;

Therefore be it further resolved that after any member of the Camp Board has served for a period of three years, he shall not be re-elected to the Camp Board until at least three years have expired. The District Council shall provide nominations from which Board members shall be elected; Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer, and one other member of the Council serve on this Board, also that the District Superintendent shall by virtue of his office serve on this Board but that he shall not be the chairman.

Be it further resolved that the chairman of the Camp Board shall be appointed by the District Council.

No. 17 — RECALL OF THE PASTOR

Be it resolved that the vote on the recall of the pastor be taken by the Conference Superintendent at the time of the Annual Meeting. This vote to be taken by secret ballot and shall be counted by the Conference Superintendent, who shall report the results of the voting to the pastor and to the church.

No. 18 — RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT

Be it resolved that whenever there shall be elected another District Superintendent, that the Council earnestly endeavor to place said retiring Superintendent in satisfactory position.

No. 19 — ORDINATION SERVICE

Be it resolved that the order of business on the first night of the Conference be the Ordination Service.

Whereas, the minister's wife makes a vital contribution to her husband's work, therefore we recommend that the wife of the candidate be given an honorary seat with the candidate during the Ordination Service.

Whereas, Ordination is an extremely important event in the life of a Minister and whereas the families of the Candidate may desire to be present and make plans well in advance of the Ordination Day! therefore be it resolved that the Examining and Education Board review and examine and then notify candidates 15 days prior to the Conference.

No. 20 — CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

Be it resolved that all Treasurer's books of the District be audited annually by a certified public accountant so that a report from the auditor can be given to the Conference when called for.

No. 21 — CAMP MEETING SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSION

Be it resolved that on the two Sundays during Camp Meeting that there be a Sunday School session beginning at 9:30 until 10:15 following the testimony meeting and that said session be arranged and supervised by the Sunday School Committee.

Be it further resolved that a credit card be given to all in attendance, and that each card be signed and returned by the pupil to their local Church Sunday School Secretary for the attendance record and reports to the Conference.

No. 22 — ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Inasmuch as most religious bodies follow the order of having election immediately after District reports, and inasmuch as many Conferences of the Pilgrim Holiness Church follow this same order, therefore be it resolved that election of officers be immediately following District reports.

Whereas there has been successive balloting for important offices and whereas this has often resulted in the election of individuals to several positions of officialdom, therefore be it resolved that balloting for respective officers shall be taken care of in regular and proper sequence. Be it further resolved that the elections be posted immediately.

No. 23 — COMMITTEE MEETINGS

Be it resolved that the chairman of the Resolution Committee and of the Ways and Means Committee shall call a meeting of their respective committees at least one month before Conference.

No resolutions shall be presented to this Conference until it has been typewritten and signed.

No. 24 — SUNDAY SCHOOL FINANCE

The following plan for the financing of the District Sunday School Department shall be put into effect:

Sunday Schools with an average of 50 and under	\$5.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 51-75	7.50 per year
Sunday Schools with an average 76-100	10.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 101-150	15.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 151-200	20.00 per year
Sunday Schools with an average of 201 and over	25.00 per year

No. 25 — CHURCH EXTENSION

Inasmuch as the present Conference Church Extension Department is not producing the number of new churches that we are capable of producing and whereas the establishing of new churches is necessary for a steady and healthy growth for any District and whereas there appears to be a definite weakness in our present policy of raising funds for Church Extension work:

Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference adopt the Church Extension Fellowship which reads as follows:

CHURCH EXTENSION FELLOWSHIP OF

PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH - EAST MICHIGAN DISTRICT

Holding the conviction that God would have us further the cause of Christ by establishing new churches within our District borders, I subscribe the following:

- (a) I will pray for the leading of the Lord in the work of the Church Extension Board.
- (b) I will be alert for any possibilities of new churches and will inform the Board.
- (c) I recognize that the first financial obligations in the opening of a new work are the most difficult to meet and will therefore be responsible for two units, \$5.00 per unit), to total (\$10.00) for the Church Extension Fellowship.
- (d) I assume this obligation for not more than two new works in any one Conference year. Said works to be approved by the Church Extension Board.
- (e) I will try to secure other members of the Fellowship.

- (f) I understand this agreement may be terminated any time I deem it necessary by notifying the Church Extension Board.

Be it resolved that 10% of the Local Missionary Societies regular offerings be sent to the District Missionary Treasurer ,for yearly projects and District expense.

No. 27 — CAMP MEETING DATE

Be it resolved that the Camp Meeting date be set to begin the second Friday in July.

No. 28 — MINISTERIAL NOTIFICATION

Since in the past on several occasions, District Ministers Widows have deceased without the District Ministers being notified of their death, therefore be it resolved that in the case of the death of a Minister or his widow, the District Secretary notify the Ministers of the District. Be it further resolved that we request the Michigan District to give us this information from their District.

No. 29 — OWOSSO COLLEGE

Inasmuch as Owosso College had a successful history in training young people for christian service, and inasmuch as the General Board has assigned the State of Michigan as the patronizing territory for Owosso College: Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference go on record in pledging to the College its full cooperation and prayerful support, and open the doors of its churches to a representative of the College at which time the financial needs of the Bible department of the College shall be presented and an offering received subject to section 149, Paragraph 3 of the Manual.

Youth President — Two services - 10 points.

Add this to your handicap equals the total points.

No. 4 — Be it resolved that Resolution No. 4, page 36, of Conference Journal be placed in Standing Rules.

No. 5 — Whereas the District Council presents two names per Zone for the election of Zone President to the Youth Conference and whereas the District Youth President is in close touch with each Zone, therefore be it resolved that the District Youth President meet with said Council to aid them in these selections.

No. 6 — Be it resolved that the date and number of Youth Camps be decided upon by the District Youth Council and the Camp Board.

No. 7 — Whereas the Owosso College is planning a day of Michigan Youth in Action when the Pilgrim Youth of Michigan and East Michigan shall meet together at the Owosso College, therefore be it resolved that we go on record as being in full support of this program, and and that it be included as part of our District Youth Schedule.

No. 8 — Inasmuch as we, the Young People of East Michigan appreciate the active interest of our District Superintendent, Rev. W. N. Miller in the Young People's work, therefore be it resolved that we give him a rising vote of thanks.

No. 9 — Inasmuch as we are thankful and appreciative of the fine leadership of our District President, Rev. William Doe, and the time he has spent in making this a good year for the Young People's work of the East Michigan District, therefore be it resolved that we give him a rising vote of thanks.

No. 10 — Inasmuch as our General Youth Secretary, Rev. J. D. Abbott, was unable to attend the Conference, be it resolved that the District Youth Secretary send him a letter of greetings.

Ways and Means Committee Resolutions - Youth

No. 1 — Whereas there is continued need to improve and develop our youth camp facilities, therefore be it resolved that each Zone receive a Youth Camp offering at each rally.

No. 2 — Whereas there are many requests for finances from many worthy organizations, be it resolved that no special offerings be received in Zone rallies unless District Youth Executive Committee approves the project.

No. 3 — Whereas Dr. P. F. Elliott has done an excellent job of conducting our Youth Conferences, be it resolved the Conference give him a rising vote of thanks and instruct our treasurer to present him with a check for twenty-five dollars (\$25.00).

Standing Rules

No. 1 — YOUTH PRESIDENTS REPORT

Inasmuch as we feel that it is helpful for our Conference to know what the Youth Conference is accomplishing, therefore be it resolved that the Youth President be called upon to give a report to the District (Adult) Conference each year.

No. 2 — ZONE PRESIDENTS REPORT

Be it resolved that the Zone Presidents give a written report of their work for the year at the Youth Conference.

No. 3 — YOUTH CONVENTION

Be it resolved that the Youth Convention will begin Friday night preceeding the Annual Camp Meeting with a youth rally. The free meals will begin with the evening meal Friday. The Youth Conference shall convene on Saturday at 9 A. M. and be finished by noon. Those who are not pastors or delegates shall meet at this time for fellowship meeting.

No. 4 — NUMBER OF ZONE RALLIES

Inasmuch as there is no uniformity as to the number of Zone Rallies held each year, therefore be it resolved that the minimum of rallies that each Zone shall have be six per year.

No. 5 — PRINTING PROCEEDINGS

Inasmuch as it is helpful to have a permanent record of our Youth work, therefore be it resolved that the Journal of Proceedings be published in the Conference Journal each year.

No. 6 — FINANCIAL SYSTEM
