FIRST SITTING

The first sitting of the Sixth Annual Michigan District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 a. m., July 13, 1961 at the camp grounds in Gaines, Michigan.

Rev. W. N. Miller, district superintendent, greeted the pastors and delegates then Rev. L. R. Neff led in the singing of "A Charge To Keep I Have". Rev. G. V. Skinner accompanied at the piano. The Rev. C. R. Hendrick led in the opening prayer.

Our presiding officer and general superintendent, Rev. R. G. Flexon was then introduced by Rev. W. N. Miller.

Dr. Flexon's message was taken from Haggai 1:8. This scripture refers to the time when the tabernacle lay destroyed. The people were told to go up and build God's house and He would take pleasure in it. What kind of church is Jesus pleased with and glorified in? One where the services begin on time and close on time. He is pleased when the services are cheerful and faithfully attended. He is pleased when the church is well advertised and the spiritual walls are not covered with misplaced emphasis. The truth is found in between extremes.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the Sixth Annual Conference of the East Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings:

We extend a hearty welcome to our esteemed General Superintendent R. G. Flexon, in remembrance of the Spiritual contribution and leadership which he has given our beloved Church for so many

Port Huron first completed a beautiful new Ranch type Brick Parsonage and Flint First is now in a major church building program. While Lincoln Park is constructing a new Parsonage. This "Decade of Dedications should point out one fact; namely, that we should be in a position to make some substantial gains this next decade in the realm of S. S. and Youth, and church membership since we do have so much increased building facilities.

There are three newly organized churches to be received into this conference this year. They are Flint 12th Street Pilgrim Holiness Church, Lennon Pilgrim Holiness Church and Sparlingville Pilgrim Holiness Church. All three of these churches are doing fine work and showing gains in all departments. We shall receive them at the call of the chair.

Last fall we sponsored a District Home Missionary Convention for the purpose of raising money for a new project in the Detroit area. Through the fine labours of Dr. R. G. Flexon, Rev. E. K. Purcell, and some of our faithful pastors and our many laymen, several thousand dollars was pledged to be paid in one year, of which over Three Thousand dollars has come to the hands of the Treasurer thus far. Rev. John Croft of Port Matilda, Pa. has been selected to launch this work and is with us in this Conference ready to open the campaign following our Camp Meeting. It is not a small thing to launch a new work of full salvation in these times. This man and this work will need our prayers, our financial support, and our cooperation to make this new church the blessing and success it should be.

All of us should be happy and thankful to God for the success of the District Home Missionary Project at Sparlingville. The church was organized and a beautiful new church building dedicated this year. Their Sunday School for the Month of April published in our last "Pilgrim Voice" shows an average attendance for that month of 147. This church is assuming its own financial support and should be entirely on its own this year. It is my own personal opinion that we have accomplished more in three years in one good strong work than we could have done in five or six poorly supported works over the same time.

It has been a personal pleasure to work with the Ministers and laymen of this District this past year. Your interest in God's Kingdom and in me personally is deeply appreciated. Our love and affection for one another manifested by brotherly kindness and unselfishness is the first base for success in this district. May the Gracious God help us as we face a new year, to face it with courage, kindness, forgiveness and faith.

In concluding may I make some suggestions:

There are some very important matters coming before the conference which deserve our prayerful and thoughtful consideration. May we give ourselves to them in the best interests of the church.

For this year our goals should include the following:

1. A new look and interest in the "Prayer and Fasting League" as suggested in our Minutes.
2. The continuation of "Lay Visitation and Personal Soul Winning".
3. Sunday School Teachers Training in each church.

years. May we be an inspiration to him and he in turn will be a blessing to us as he presides over this District Conference.

The mills of time have ground out another year and it is our purpose in the conference now assembled to determine whether we have gained, lost or just marked time. Good reports can sound bad and poor reports, by words, can be made to sound good; however, we shall do our best to present a picture of our District in an unbiased light.

I am not too happy with the spiritual condition of our church or any other church of this day for that matter. People are just too busy with secular things to be holy before God. Even the church has so many secular interests and is so busy with incidentals, that true righteousness, Godliness, and spiritual endeavors are becoming second rate. Too many things are being measured by man's approval rather than God's rule. May some prayer bands be formed, and agonizing, confessing, believing and obeying, be so sincerely carried out according to God's Word that He may come in mighty power to revive us again. Let us all pray and look for a mighty moving of God's Holy Spirit in our midst.

To be fair to the subject of Spiritual condition, I am happy to report that a good number of our churches and pastors have reported some unusual melting and breaking up times before the Lord. As a result of this there have been many new converts, and our District should show a very substantial gain in the membership department this year. While many of the districts of our General Church have been showing a loss of membership over a period of years; it is at least comforting to note that this district has consistently shown a gain. Some of our churches have shown a very good net increase in membership this year and I shall point this out with the Statistician's report.

In the Sunday Schools of our district some of our churches have made a very remarkable gain and these will be pointed out and awards made at the appropriate time by our District S. S. Secretary. With the increase of facilities, which I shall mention later, and the splendid ground work of organization and promotion by our S. S. Secretary and his staff, we should look to the future for healthy progress in this field.

The Youth work has made very fine progress this year under the leadership of our sincere and capable Youth President. He will bring the details to our attention through his report to the conference. Outstanding in their progress this year is the construction of four very serviceable youth dormitories which add to this camp and the youth camp for years to come.

We might very well call this past ten years the "Decade of Church Dedications". Counting the building programs now in progress, we have constructed twenty-four new church buildings in this district in the past ten years. This does not count the major overhaul and improvement of many others. In addition to the churches, we have either bought or built sixteen new Parsonages in this same period.

I shall only mention the churches which bought or built this past year, leaving the details for the district paper to cover and report to us, in the coming months.

Croswell, Flint Bentley, Flint Grace, Sparlingville and Utica, have all completed beautiful new church edifices this past year. Flint Brown St. completed their lovely educational unit.

The Treasurer of the District shall be instructed to act for the District and for the ministers and clerical personnel in contracting the representatives of Michigan Hospital service and Michigan Medical Service.

The Treasurer of the District shall collect all periodic subscriptions for the District Treasury. The Treasurer shall be empowered to make payment of the total Blue Cross Blue Shield subscrip-

tions for the District by a check drawn against the District Treasury. The Treasurer shall drop a subscriber after two unpaid subscriptions.

A committee of three Ministers from this district shall be appointed by the District Superintendent to assist the Treasurer in such a way as the superintendent may request. This committee shall be known as the committee on Blue Cross Blue Shield enrollment.

CAMP MEETING

1. **CAMP DATE** - Be it resolve that the Camp meeting date be set to begin the second Friday in July.
2. **CAMP BOARD** - Be it resolved that the Camp Meeting Board of six members be elected in the following manner: two members to be elected for three years, the next two elected to serve two years, and the last two elected for one year. Following this two members shall be elected annually for a three year term. The Board shall secure all workers for Camp and Conference, supervise buildings and grounds, purchase good and necessary equipment for camp and conference, and have charge of all advertising.

Whereas Camp Board members are pastors and whereas much of their time must be devoted and their minds occupied with the many duties connected with the manual working of the Camp, and therefore are not free to attend and enjoy the camp services; Therefore be it further resolved that after any member of the Camp Board has served for a period of three years, he shall not be reelected to the Camp Board until at least three years have expired. The District Council shall provide nominations from which board members shall be elected.

Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer and one other Council member serve on this Board, and that the District Superintendent by virtue of his office serve on this but shall not be the Chairman. The Chairman of the Camp Board shall be appointed by the District Council.

The District shall plant one tree on each lot and shall gravel the street in front of lots.

6. **SUNDAY SCHOOLS SESSIONS** - Be it resolved that on the two Sundays during camp meeting that there be a Sunday School session beginning at 9:30 until 10:15 a.m. following the Testimony meeting, and that said session be arranged and supervised by the Sunday School Committee.

Be it further resolved that a credit card be given to all in attendance, and that each card be signed and returned by the pupil to their local church Sunday School Secretary for the Attendance, record and reports to the Conference.

CONFERENCE

7. **FISCAL YEAR** - The Conference Year shall close May 31st and all reports be mailed to the Conference Statistician by June 15th.

8. **EXAMINING AND EDUCATIONAL BOARD** - The District Superintendent shall be chairman of the Educational and Examining Board by virtue of his office. He shall have sections 105 and 107 of the Manual read instructing all district licentiates that hereafter they shall appear before the District Examining Board before their credentials shall be granted.

9. **APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES** - The District Council shall appoint all committees. The Standing Committees are to be appointed to include new men where possible and to avoid duplication of men on several committees. It is recommended that the entire constituency be considered.

The Ways and Means Committee shall have six members plus the District Treasurer, and the term of office of the six members shall be so graduated that only two members shall vacate annually.

10. **BUILDING COMMITTEE** - The District Council shall appoint a building committee composed of three members who have exper-

ience in the work of accoustics, architecture, and construction.

All Churches and Church Boards must have the approval of said committee before the purchase of building sites or the erecting of buildings or improvements in excess of \$500.00.

11. **ELECTION OF OFFICERS** - Inasmuch as most religious bodies follow the order of having elections immediately following district reports, and inasmuch as many conferences of the Pilgrim Holiness Church follow the same order, therefore be it resolved that election of officers be immediately following district reports. Whereas there has been successive balloting for important offices, and whereas this has often resulted in the election of individuals to several positions of officialdom, therefore be it resolved that balloting for respective officers shall be taken care of in regular and proper sequence, and that the elections be posted immediately.
12. **COMMITTEE MEETINGS** - Be it resolved that the Chairman of the Resolutions committee and of the Ways and Means committee shall call a meeting of their respective committees at least one month before Conference

No resolution shall be presented to this conference until it has been typewritten and signed.

13. **ORDINATION SERVICE** - Be it resolved that the order of business on the first night of the Conference be the ordination service. Whereas the Minister's wife makes a vital contribution to her husband's work, therefore we recommend that the wife of the candidate be given an honorary seat with the candidate during the ordination service.

Whereas ordination is an extremely important event in the life of a minister, whereas the family of the candidate may desire to be present and make plans well in advance for the ordination day, therefore be it resolved that the Examining and Educational Board review and examine and then notify candidates 15 days prior to the conference.

14. **CHURCH EXTENSION** - Inasmuch as the present conference Church Extension Department is not producing the number of churches that we are capable of producing, and whereas the establishing of new churches is necessary for a steady and healthy growth for any district, and whereas there appears to be a definite weakness in our present policy of raising funds for church extension work;

Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference adopt the Church Extension Fellowship which reads as follows:

Church Extension Fellowship of the Pilgrim Holiness Church East Michigan District----Holding the conviction that God would have us further the cause of Christ by establishing new churches within our District borders, I subscribe to the following:

- (a) I will pray for the leading of the Lord in the work of the Church Extension Board.
- (b) I will be alert for any possibilities of new churches and inform the Board.
- (c) I recognize that the first financial obligations in the open-

ing of a new work are the most difficult to meet and will therefore be responsible two units, \$5.00 per unit, to total \$10.00 for the Church Extension Fellowship.

(d) I assume this obligation for not more then two new works in any one conference year, said works to be approved by the Church Extension Board.

(e) I will try to secure other members for the fellowship.

(f) I understand this agreement may be terminated any time I deem it necessary by notifying the Church Extension Board.

15. **DISTRICT PAPER** - Whereas there is some demand for a district paper, and whereas there is not financial provision for the same, be it resolved that the District Council prorate the costs — such as printing, postage, and secretarial help among the four departments of the District.

16. **LAY VISITATION** - Whereas the entire program of the General Conference seems to present a forward and aggressive program, and whereas one of the things urged upon each of our Districts was a plan of "lay visitation" and "Personal Soul Winning";

Therefore be it resolved that we adopt the following plan, to be know as "Personal Soul Winning and Lay Visitation Plan."

1. That a committee of not more than three be appointed by the District Superintendent, whose work shall be;

(a) To lay out a course of study.

(b) To appoint committees and instructors in each zone and advise in organizing classes.

(c) To gather information and give reports on progress and accomplishments.

2. Be it further resolved:

(a) That there be an intense effort on the part of the pastor to attend all classes, and that he enlist as many of the laity of his church as possible.

(b) That a certificate of accomplishment be given to all who finish the course.

3. Also be it resolved that at sometime during the period of instruction or immediately after, the pastor of each church will organize in his or her church a group for soul wining and lay visitation, and set up files and records recommended by the committee, and that these be kept as permanent records of the church.

17. **PRAYER AND FASTING LEAGUE** - Be it resolved that in keeping with the program of our church that we urge each church in our

Conference to organize a Prayer and Fasting League. The Objectives of the Prayer and Fasting League shall be:

1. It shall not take the place of the regular church mid-week prayer meeting.
2. The League Membership shall be directed to pray for the general interests of our Church at home and abroad.
3. They shall be encouraged to pray for the local community needs.
4. That where advisable the pastor shall provide a list of definite needs for each member of the League covering such needs as:
 - Unsaved families in the community.
 - Unsaved families in the Sunday School.
 - Unsaved individuals, definite church objectives and needs.

Organization:

- (a) The pastor shall act as director of the prayer and Fasting League.
 - (b) The pastor shall recommend one or more names to the official board who shall appoint a secretary to work with the pastor.
 - (c) The secretary shall form a membership list. Membership in the League shall be volunteer members of the church, Sunday school, youth society, and friends of the church.
 - (d) The membership shall be kept active by being revised twice each year, September 1, and March 1 of each Conference year.
 - (e) Whereas this is a new Conference venture, we hereby ask that the next ministerial meeting of this Conference set aside one hour for open discussion of this district project, that better understanding and organization may be perfected at our next District Conference.
18. **FINANCE COMMITTEE** - Whereas finance is so important to the ongoing of the District and the local church, therefore be it resolved that a finance committee of three members be appointed by the District Council from the Ways and Means committee. The duties of this committee shall be as follows:
1. To study all finance in each local church as to their ability to pay district and general united stewardship funds and to recommend ways of paying the same.
 2. To recommend to the District Council in regard to amount of indebtedness the local congregation is able to carry.
 3. To report all findings to the District Council.
 4. To give a yearly report to the District Conference.
 5. The Chairman to be the same as the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee.

Be it further resolved that:

- (a) Any church unable to pay their united stewardship fund in full shall contact the chairman of this committee at least 90 days before the close of the conference year.
- (b) Any church wanting to finance property, either building or buying, shall contact the chairman of this committee.
- (c) The local church shall receive the report from the committee and the District Council in not more than 30 days following request.

FINANCE

19. **UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND** - Whereas the present method of securing finances to promote the District and General work is irregular and unequal, and some churches with many members have low finance, and some churches with fewer members have high finance,

And whereas we are in full accord with the plan of God, namely, tithes and offerings for financing the work of the kingdom, and advise our people to tithe their income into the local church; therefore be it resolved that each church pay 10 per cent of their church receipts each month to the District Treasurer.

Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer send the equivalent of \$8.00 per member to the General Treasurer for the General United Stewardship Fund, and that the District United Stewardship Fund be divided as follows:

- Church Extension Fund, 20 per cent
- College Fund, 10 per cent
- Ministerial Relief Fund, 6 per cent
- General Conference Delegate, 4 per cent
- Property Fund, 4 per cent
- Administrative Fund, 54 per cent

20. **CAMP AND CONFERENCE, 1 PER CENT** - Whereas there is a great deal of expense in connection with the annual camp meeting and Conference, let each church pay into the District Treasury 1 per cent of their regular offerings to be designated for Camp meeting and conference expense.

Inasmuch as it is impossible under the present set-up to any longer give free entertainment to our ministers and their families, therefore be it further resolved that ministers and their families be responsible for their lodging and meals. An exception can be made to this by the District Council for retired ministers, visiting ministers, and home missionary workers.

Be it further resolved that during the Annual Conference all delegates (Ministerial and Lay) be given their meals free, and that the District Superintendent, his wife, and members of his family under 16 years of age shall be given meals and lodging without charge during the Annual Camp and Conference.

Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer pay out of of the Administrative Fund the Pension Plan for the District Superintendent.

21. **MISSIONARY SOCIETY 10 PER CENT** - Be it resolved that 10 per cent of the local missionary societies regular offerings be sent to the District Missionary Treasurer for yearly projects and district expense.
22. **DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUND** - All monies raised in the Local Church for District and general work shall be sent to the District Treasurer, who shall forward general funds to the General Treasurer.
23. **SALARIES** - The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$4,500.00 per year plus 7c per mile traveling expense. The District Treasurer shall receive \$400.00 per year, the District Secretary shall receive \$200.00, the District Sunday School Secretary \$100.00, The Youth Director \$100.00, the District Statistician \$50.00. All District officials receive 6c per mile for all miles traveled in the interest of the District.
24. **PARSONAGE UTILITIES** - The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is located. All churches in the District are to provide the utilities for the parsonages. The District shall provide the same for the District Parsonage.
25. **CAMP FUNDS REPORT** - The District Treasurer shall submit an itemized report of camp meeting funds as recorded in the 1945 Conference Journal, page 13. This report to appear in the Journal.
26. **BURIAL BENEFITS** - All actively engaged ministers and their wives of the District shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association. Cost of the membership and the calls shall be paid from the treasuries of the department that employs them. Complete resolution appears in Standing Rule No. 20 of the 1947 Journal.
27. **DISTRICT AUDIT** - Be it resolved that all Treasurers books of the District be audited annually by a certified Public Accountant so that a report from the auditor can be given to the conference when called for.
28. **OWOSSO COLLEGE** - Inasmuch as Owosso College had a successful history in training young people for Christian Service, and inasmuch as the General Board has assigned the state of Michigan as the patronizing territory for Owosso College;
Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference go on record in pledging to the College its full cooperation and prayerful support, and open the doors of its churches to a representative of the College at which time the financial needs of the Bible Department of the College shall be presented, and an offering received subject to Section 149, Paragraph 3 of the Manual.
29. **PILGRIM LOAN & INVESTMENT INC.** - Whereas there is a need for a more adequate loan program in our District, Therefore be it resolve that the program known as East Michigan Pilgrim Loans and Investment Inc., be adopted and replace our present Church Extension Loan Fund.

MINISTERIAL

30. **PASTOR'S AT CAMP** - Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend the annual camp meeting each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the camp, and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire camp meeting.
31. **VACATIONS** - It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a two weeks vacation with pay, and that the District Superintendent shall be given a two-weeks vacation with pay.
21. **PASTOR'S CONFERENCE COMMITTEE** - Be it resolved that a committee of six be appointed as a Pastor's conference committee by the District Council; that two be appointed for three years, two for two years, and that two for one year, and that two shall be appointed each year respectively.
The Pastor's Conference Committee shall arrange the program, set the date, the place, and notify all ministers, of the Pastor's conferences and one-day ministerial retreat.
33. **PASTORAL RECALL** - Be it resolved that the vote on the recall of the pastor be taken by Conference Superintendent at the time of the Annual Meeting. This vote to be taken by secret ballot and shall be counted by the Conference Superintendent who shall report the results of the voting to the pastor and the Church.
34. **RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT** - Be it resolved that whenever there shall be elected another District Superintendent, that the Council earnestly endeavor to place said retiring Superintendent in satisfactory position.
35. **DEATH NOTICES** - Since in the past on several occasions District Ministers, Widows have deceased without the ministers being notified of their death, therefore be it resolved that in the case of the death of a minister or his widow, the District Secretary notify the ministers of the district.
Be it further resolved that we request the Michigan District to give us this information from their District.

No. 3 Inasmuch as our District Youth Conference and Convention has been detached from our regular camp meeting, therefore be it resolved that our District Council and District Youth Council shall set the date of our Annual Youth Conference and Convention.

No. 4 Be it resolved that Res. No. 2 page 37 of Conference Journal be placed in the Standing Rules.

No. 5 Be it resolved that Res. No. 5, page 38 of the Conference Journal be placed in the Standing Rules.

No. 6 Inasmuch as the time of our District Youth Convention is earlier, and the weather conditions often hinder our Mid - Winter Rally, therefore be it resolved that the time of the District Youth Rally be changed to late Fall. Be it further resolved that the District Youth Council set the date of said Rally.

No. 7 Be it resolved that the date and number of Youth Camps be decided upon by the District Youth Council and the Camp Meeting Board.

No. 8 Whereas the Owosso College is planning a yearly Michigan youth in Action Day, therefore be it resolved that we support this program and that it be included as a part of our Dist. Youth Schedule.

No. 9 Inasmuch as we, the Young People of East Michigan wish to show our appreciation for the active interest of our District Supt. Rev. W. N. Miller in the youth work, and for his fine leadership of our District Youth Conference; therefore be it resolved that we give him a rising vote of thanks.

No. 10 Inasmuch as our General Youth Secretary Rev. J. D. Abbott was unable to attend the Conference, be it resolved that the Dist. Youth Secretary send him a letter of Greetings.

No. 11 Inasmuch as we are thankful and appreciative of the fine leadership of our District Youth Pres. Rev. Wm. Doe, and the time he has spent in making this a good year for the Youth work of East Michigan District, therefore be it resolved that we give him a vote of thanks.

Ways and Means Resolutions - - Youth

Motion made and carried that Res. No. 1 be retained for one more year while the Financial system is being studied by the appointed committee. No. 1. Whereas their is a continued need to improve and develop our youth camp facilities, therefore be it resolved that each Zone receive a youth camp offering at each Rally. No. 2 Whereas the financial system of youth work is so important and so involved, therefore be it resolved that a special study committee be appointed by our Youth President to study this system and bring recommendations to the Youth Conference, next year.

Standing Rules

NO. 1 YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Inasmuch as we feel that it is helpful for our Conference to know what the Youth Conference is accomplishing, therefore be it resolved that the Youth President be called upon to give a report to the District (adult) Conference each year.

NO. 2 ZONE PRESIDENTS REPORT

Be it resolved that the Zone presidents give a written report of their work for the year at the Youth Conference.

NO. 3 NUMBER OF ZONE RALLIES

Inasmuch as there is no uniformity as to the number of Zone Rallies held each year, therefore be it resolved that the minimum of rallies that each Zone shall have shall be six per year.

NO. 4 PRINTING PROCEEDINGS

Inasmuch as it is helpful to have a permanent record of our Youth work, therefore be it resolved that the Journal of Proceedings be published in the Conference Journal each year.

NO. 5 FINANCIAL SYSTEM

Be it resolved that the present financial system, 35 per cent for Zone expenses and 5 per cent for General Missionary Project sent to the Zone Treasurer, and the Zone Treasurer shall send 75 per cent of the receipts plus the General Missionary Project; he shall retain 25 per cent of all receipts plus one offering from each Rally to maintain the Zone. He shall send one offering from each Zone Rally to the District Treasurer for the Youth Camp Fund.

NO. 6 ZONE OFFICERS ELECTION

Inasmuch as the Zone Treasurer should be an efficient person, therefore be it resolved that the Zone Treasurer be elected from nominations made by the Zone Executive Committee.

NO. 7 ZONE RALLY COUNT

Whereas there are many systems used to tally the points for awarding the Zone Rally banner, therefore creating an unfair basis for counting said points, therefore be it resolved we adopt the following plan to be used in all Zones.

12-35—2 points each service.

Under 12—1 point each service.

Over 35—1 point each service.

Pastor—2 services, 10 points.

Youth President—2 services, 10 points.

This added to handicap—Total points.

NO. 8 ZONE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Whereas there has been a lack of communication between the Zones and District President; therefore be it resolved that each Zone President report each Zone Rally to District President as soon as possible after each Rally.

NO. 9 ZONE COUNCIL

Inasmuch as there has been a lack of uniformity in the composition of the Zone Councils, therefore be it resolved that the Zone Council shall consist of elected Zone officers, local youth presidents, or some other local officer in presidents absence. One pastor to be elected as counsellor if a pastor was not elected to the Zone Council.

NO. 10 NOMINATIONS FOR ZONE PRESIDENTS

Whereas the District Council presents two names per Zone, for the election of Zone President to the Youth Conference and whereas the District Youth President is in close touch with each Zone, therefore be it resolved that the District Youth President meet with the District Council to aid them in these selections.

District Youth President's Report

Mr. Chairman, Pastors, Youth Pres. and Delegates to this Conference, Greetings in Jesus Name. It has been a joy and priviledge again this year to work together with Pilgrim youth.

The youth work began with two outstanding youth camps. Rev. M. Goodrich directed the first camp. The youth enjoyed the activities of the day and from night to night many prayed through to definite victory. Our youth camps have proved to be a blessing in the lives of many, it is a time not only for fun, excitement, getting acquainted with other youth but a time of Spiritual growth.
