First Sitting

The first sitting of the Seventh Annual Michigan District Conference of The Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at $9\!:\!00$ a.m., July 12, 1962 at the camp grounds in Gaines, Michigan.

The conference was opened with the singing of "My Jesus I Love Thee" led by Rev. Gerald McDonald. Rev. G. V. Skinner accompanied at the piano. Rev. H. C. Rickner led in prayer.

Rev. W. N. Miller, Chairman, greeted the pastors and delegates.

The roll was called by Rev. G. V. Skinner.

Rev. R. K. Fay was received into this district from the Eastern Ohio District.

One new church of Mt. Morris was presented, now pastored by Rev. Jess Moss, and was received into the Conference.

The report of the Examining Committee was read by Rev. L. R. Neff. This report was accepted.

The conference bar was designated to be the first twelve seats in the middle section and the platform. The time of the sittings was determined.

Rev. Bare presented Mrs. Warner from Stevens Van Lines

The following reports were read and accepted:

Rev. William Lyons, District Youth Treasurer Rev. E. K. Purcell, Sunday School Promotional Secretary and Treasurer.

Rev. Purcell then gave the Sunday School awards.

Mrs. Wm. Lyons reported for the District Missionary Society Treasurer.

Rev. Bare presented Rev. Bernard Churchill to the confernce.

Rev. Raymond Dean reported for the Pilgrim Loan and Investment Incorporated.

The motion was made that the district secretary send a letter of appreciation to Attorney Patterson for help and advice given to the Pilgrim Loan and Investment corporation.

Rev. W. N. Miller presented Dr. Melvin Snyder, our presiding officer and general superintendent, to the conference.

Dr. Snyder then made a few remarks of greetings to the conference.

Rev. Raymond Dean gave the district statificians report. It was accepted.

Announcements were made.

Rev. Hiatt dismissed in prayer.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting convened at 1:30 p.m. with Rev. James Krieder leading in the singing of "He's A Wonderful Savior To Me."

Rev. Raymond Dean led in prayer.

Rev. W. N. Miller made a few remarks.

Rev. Bare presented Mr. Bluett, who loaned the organ for the camp meeting. Rev. Draggoo from the Michigan Conference, and Rev. Cebert Walker from the Michigan Conference were also introduced.

Rev. Miller introduced Dr. Snyder.

Dr. Snyder took his text from Mathew 8:5-13 and Hebrews 11:1-2. The miracle spoken of here was not in the heading of the centurions servant but in the centurions faith.

- 1. He had a faith that was exercised in profound humility.
- 2. His faith was exercised in profound love.
- 3. It was a faith that recognized constituted authority.

Dr. Snyder introduced Rev. R. A. Beltz to the conference.

Rev. Beltz talked to the conference about the Pilgrim Pension Plan and the Ministerial Benefit Association.

Rev. G. V. Skinner read the minutes. They were accepted.

The tellers were appointed as follows:

R. K. Fay, Virgil Appleton, Douglas Severance, Ed Purcell, Ed Smith, Doyle Brannon, D. E. Coble and William Doe.

Rev. Bare introduced Rev. F. H. Miller pastor of a Free Methodist Church, Rec. E. C. Swanson, District Superintendent from West Virginia, and Mrs. Beltz. They were given honorary seats in the conterence bar.

The ballots were cast for district superintendent and resulted in the election of Rev. W. N. Miller who later resigned. Ballots were cast again resulting in the election of Rev. C. Hendrick.

Rev. Purcell dismissed in prayer.

THIRD SITTING

The Ordination Service began at 7:30 p.m. with Rev. Brown leading in the singing of "A Charge To Keep I Have."

Rev. C. Hendrick read from I Timothy 3:1-7.

Rev. Joppie led in prayer.

Rev. Brown then led in singing of "Rock of Ages."

Rev. Miller presented the candidates to be ordained to Dr. Snyder. They were as follows: Doyle Brannon, Rudyard K. Fay, W. C. Jones, Douglas Severance, Edward A. Smith and Kenneth Smith.

Rev. D. Brown read II Timothy 4:1-8.

Rev. L. R. Neff read Titus 3:1-11.

Dr. Snyder's text was taken from I Timothy 4:1-8. He told our candidates that the word is, 1. A word of warning, 2. A word of exortation, 3. A word of promise. He also warned that 'what you are is more important then what you say.' Our ministers must, 1. Take heed to their spiritual life, 2. Take heed to their intellectual life and, 3. Take heed to care for their body.

District Reports

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, delegates and friends of the seventh annual conference of the East Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings!

Providence has again decreed that we should meet together in the interest of His Kingdom and our own church to review the conquests and victories of the past and to consider plans and goals for the year ahead.

Our denomination may be small, but our task is great, and the fields of labor before us are endless and standing with ripened grain. Men are needed today in our church. Real men, working men, laborers who are willing and able to tackle the ordinary and commonplace, and see the job done. There are so many small jobs to be done, so many little places to fill and so few who will fill them. I believe in our church and its future and that we have a place in this generation, plus an obligation to every community where we can labor, to get the gospel of Jesus Christ in example and precept before a needy world. We could be standing on the threshold of a mighty revival and a grand awakening to the glorious truths and blessings which our church has proclaimed for half a century. Let us not fail now, nor be discouraged for God is able and His promises are sure. Some of us still believe that God is leading us to encourage the evangelistic message coupled with fasting, weeping, and broken hearts which has always brought wonderful results from our Gracious Jehovah.

During January thru May of this year, our Pilgrim Voice committee lauched a program emphasizing the Sunday P.M. service. Evangelism and attendance were the two goals set forth. Many Churches who cooperated in this plan have reported rich blessings to their services and churches. The winners are to be announced and awarded in this conference. The district-wide exchange of pastor night was highly praised by a great majority of our people and cooperation in this was nearly 100 per cent.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation for the friendship and cooperation of the men who have worked with us this year. The assistant superintendent, Rev. C. R. Hendrick, the secretary, Rev. G. V. Skinner, the treasurer, Rev. A. F. Osborn, the advisory members of the district council, along with every committee and board with which it has been my privilege to work this past year.

The district council, the district Sunday School committee, the District youth committee and the district missionary committee, are working a cooperative plan for the future of this district in her respective fields. The object of this plan is to correlate the dates and activities of each so that the years program for each may harmonize with the others. I personally feel that this is a real forward step in the area of organization and will greatly benefit our work in the future.

The district camp ground program is progressing slowly and although slowly, it is progressing. It has taken time for us to get accustomed to Gaines Camp Ground. It looks now like we might just as well make up our minds that this is it and make the best of it. Twelve lots have been leased to private parties or churches and some cottages are going to be in the building stages soon, following this camp meeting. We will always need a place like this to meet for worship and fellowship on the district level, so let's agree to make this the place, and put some real heart, time and money in it this year.

The district Home Missionary work presents a continually encouraging picture. Sparlingville in just three years has become fully self-

supporting, with wonderful gains and glowing reports from every branch of its work. We shall be eternally grateful to God for His work there through the efforts of Rev. Bob Nelson and his fine people.

Three new churches were added to the Pilgrim family in our district this year. Livonia, Gaines and $Mt.\ Morris.$

Rev. John Croft as pastor launched a new work in Livonia, Mich. in Sept. of 1961. Their Sunday School has averaged approximately 34 to date, with the church attendance the same or better. They are saving money now for a building site and have great hopes for the future under the leadership of Rev. Melvin Straight,, who has accepted the pastorate there since the departure of Rev. Croft to the Foreign Missionary field.

Rev. Doyle Brannon felt a Divine call of God to open a new work right here in Gaines. With the help of the L. O. Dice family and others, this work is progressing very well. The average Sunday School attendance for the year is 23 and all of us feel that we will see a strong work here at our camp grounds.

Rev. Jess Moss, of Mt. Morris, and his people contacted us this last winter with the thought of effecting a merger of their independent Holiness work with the Pilgrims. After much prayer and consideration on the matter, the congregation met and voted officially to unite with us. They bring to us a fine group of Holiness people who believe as we do and are ready to work with us as we work with them for God and His kingdom. The pastor and some representatives of his group will be formally received into this conference at the call of the chair.

According to the statistics which I have received to date, every department of our church in this district has made a gain this year. This proves that it can be done and let's make next year show even better gains.

The church improvement picture in our district is exceptional and continues to increase. I shall mention only the major projects and cover the others in news items this next year.

Flint First (pastor D. W. Brown) plans to complete the erection of one of the finest and most beautiful churches in our denomination.

One of the bright spots for our church of recent years is the new work at Lennon. Their progress may not be spectacular but certainly inspiring and encouraging for times like these. They have been worshipping in a new parsonage built just five years ago. Now they are constructing a new church building which should be adequate for some years to come. This will then make it possible for the pastor, Rev. Bruce White, to move into the parsonage and be in the community and conduct services in the church they are now erecting.

Lincoln Park and pastor Rev. Purcell have completed a beautiful and spacious new brick parsonage directly across the street from their church.

Montrose has completed their parsonage which is occupied by the pastor Rev. Carl Jones. They are buying property adjacent to the church to be used for Sunday School use at present and for future expansion.

Pontiac has purchased a house and lot joining their church property. This will house their custodian at present and will work beautifully into their future expansion program.

Russellville has built some major improvements and is again enjoying growing pains.

Utica and pastor, Rev. Merlin Goodrich, have sold the old parsonage and bought a lovely new one near their church location. They are also right now engaged in the building of an additional brick unit to match the church, approximatley 40' x 56', to serve as Sunday School rooms etc.

Warren (pastor Rev. Roy Webster) has completely outgrown its present facilities and of necessity are building an addition to meet the demand.

Ypsilanti with pastor Rev. Kenneth Smith is also ready for a building program. Too many people for the size of the building is a good problem. Their plans are already complete to enlarge and rebuild the original church, to improve its appearence and increase its size. The future looks good for Ypsilanti.

Flint Hanna Street Church and pastor, Rev. Forrest Griffin Jr., are purchasing an additional parcel of ground which fronts on Fenton Road and extends back to their present location. Plans are to build a church fronting on Fenton Road and then the parsonage, which is used now for a chapel, can be occupied by the pastor.

ASSISTANT DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the chairman, Dr. Snyder, delegates and friends of E. Michigan Conference - Greetings in the name of Our Lord.

Time certainly does not drag when one is trying to keep in step with it as it moves swiftly along. Thus once again we find ourselves in another conference. A Year of "gleaning" and "beating out" and now we come to evaluate our "harvest."

To me this has been a good year, and I have appreciated very much the privilege to serve under my superior officer, Rev. W. N. Miller and God. The District Council has also done what they could to make our work a success.

As you know, last conference added responsibilities were placed upon the Assistant Superintendant in the way of Camp Development. I will attempt to give you a brief report on this work.

In the "Miller Addition" (a name we have adopted until this conference gives it an official name) we have sold THIRTEN lots, built a MODEL COTTAGE, graded and graveled a STREET running from the Northern boundry to the Southern boundry and opening into the County road, making it possible for us to declare the street in front of the Tabernacle, a ONE WAY STREET, thus adding to the afety features of our camp. FIFTY beautiful Sugar Maple trees were planted last fall and every one of them are living, Electricity was run into the property and can now be connected up to any cottage which is ready for it.

We think we have good news, in that we have a few thousand dollars availible for financing cottages for those who have paid in full the purchase price of their lease.

All this has been done with money received from the sale of lots. The Company is solvent, and while funds for development are now depleated we are optimistic as to the future.

To incourage buying we are planning to drill a well which will be centrally located and supply water for all leases. And if we could have the good fortune to sell as many lots as we did last year we would hope to project our plans next year even farther and run water mains down at least one street.

OTHER RESPONSIBILITIES:

I held three annual meetings, placed one pastor, attended all Council meetings, four, Ways and Means Committee meetings, three Finance Committee meetings and two District Association Committee meetings.

Sunday School Reports

This has been a busy year. Trying to become acquainted with the regular duties of Sunday School Secretary, District Church Extension Secretary, as well as adopting several new ideas for the District Sunday School promotions, has kept us on our toes.

We were sorry to have been so late in the year before begining to get the monthly reports to you, but did our best to make up for the late start, by keeping steadily at it the rest of the year.

During the year we traveled 1932 miles plus the trip to Allentown, Pa., for the interest of the district Sunday School and Church Extension work. We spent over 336 hours in working for district Sunday school and promotions. This is also exclusive of the trip to Allentown for the leaders convention there. We had seven committee meetings with the Sunday School committee and district council. We conducted a convention in each of the zones with very good results. Attendence totaling 831.

Pastors attending 37

S. S. Supts. attending 28

Teachers attending 217

This plus many laymen, and young people who confessed their willingness to train as workers in the churches.

With God's help we were able to send to you as pastors and superintendents some suggestions and ideas, some of which have been used, and reports coming to us seem to indicate that they were worth while ideas.

The district showed gains this year in Sunday School attendance amounting to 3 per cent. This isn't a great gain, but it is a gain. The average attendance Iast year was 4274 per Sunday. This year we had had a average of 4403 in attendence each week. A gain of 131 persons per week.

There were 21 churches which showed a gain this year.

There were 3 new Sunday schools listed this year.

There were 20 churches which had losses for the year.

Only 5 church have sent (as of July 4) Standard of Excellence and Decade of Progress reports. The awards are being made on the basis of those reporting.

To the seventh annual East Michigan Conference: Greetings. Two years ago this conference passed legislation known as East Michigan Pilgrim Loans and Investments. It may seem to some that very little has been done but to some of us who knew a little of what was involved it seems we have made considerable progress. Last year the conference voted to leave the board of directors as they were because of incorporation proceedings. Following several delays because of changes in state laws East Michigan Pilgrim Loans and investments was accepted by the Michigan Corporation and Securities Commission as an Non-Profit Corporation.

Our thanks to the members of the executive committee for the help given in the organizational process; also our special thanks to attorney Leonard J. Patterson of Sandusky, Michigan for his legal counsel given free of charge. Our goal this year was to make the program operational and we have reached that goal. During the year we, first were incorporated; second, we sent two letters to each pastor of the district; third, we mailed to all pastors an informative folder of the program to give to their people; fourth, we met in several committee sessions in planning and promoting.

Often in a major program of this kind you discover minor changes that need to be made later. There are several changes being recomended in the by-laws and at the proper time will be presented by the Ways and Means Committee. Recently a committee has been at work in making plans to raise money as investments in the corporation. A plan is now ready to be presented to the board of directors for their adoption. As money was needed for promotion we solicited the aid of the churches by the way of a small gift. Funds are now coming in to the treasurer for this purpose. We anticipate that with the planned promotional program we will receive sufficient funds to make our first loan under the program. The treasurer's report is prepared and will be given at the call of the chair.

- 13. Be it resolved that Division C be added to Section no. 1 of Article 8 to read as follows: 3 per cent of the conference budget shall be placed in East Michigan Pilgrim Loan and Investment Incorporated.
- 14. Be it resolved that Section 3 be added to Article 9 to read: Persons or churches wishing to withdraw money loaned to the Corporation in excess of \$1,000.00 shall give thirty days written notice.

- 15. **GOALS** . Be it resolved that the following be adopted for our Sunday Schools this year, namely:

 - 4. Encourage regular Sunday School board meetings and Sunday School workers conferences.

Miller felt that God would have him terminate his services as conference superintendent; therefore, be it resolved a love offering be received as an expression of our appreciation for his faithful and efficient service as district superintendent. This offering to be received this Sunday afternoon.
- 17. Be it resolved we give a rising vote of thanks for Dr. Melvin Snyder for his splendid words of advise in sermon and for efficiently conducting this conference.
- 18. Be it resolved we give a rising vote of thanks to the cooks, dining room help and all camp workers.
- 19. Be it resolved we give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. W. N. Miller our former Superintendent for his Godly leadership given his conference for the past eight years.

Annual Resolutions

CAMP

- 1. CAMP ASSOCIATION Be it resolved that all pastors shall promote camp association membership in local church.
- 2. **YOUTH ACTIVITY** . Be it resolved that the Youth department and the camp board be in charge of and provide for all youth activity during the annual camp meeting.
- 3. **MULTI-UNIT BUILDING** Whereas there is need for rooms to entertain the workers of the different departments and whereas finances is limited, therefore, be it resolved that the Missionary department, the Youth Department and the Camp combine efforts to built a multi-unit building to house the workers of these departments.

Be it further resolved that the cost be prorated according to the financial strength of each department.

4. **LEASE AGREEMENT** - Whereas the topographical map of the camp grounds calls for a division of a portion for lots to be leased for cottages and tents and trailers; therefore be it resolved that the following be adopted as an agreement for lease and building. (Copy of lease available from District Office.)

COLLEGE

5. **COLLEGE** - Whereas, the month of May has been designated by the General Church as Education Month and whereas, more than half of our churches this year did not receive an offering for Owosso College; therefore, be it resolved that the Sunday following Mother's Day be designated as Owosso College Day and an offering of \$1.00 or more per member be set as a goal.

CONFERENCE

- 6. **GREETINGS** Whereas we have missionaries who are members of this conference serving in the foreign fields, and whereas they are deprived of the priviledges we enjoy while being together in the Conference; therefore be it resolved that the Conference Secretary send greetings to all missionaries who are members of this Conference.
- 7. CONFERENCE ROOM Whereas the business of conference comes through various committees, and whereas there is no place where these committees may meet; therefore be it resolved that a room be provided for the private meetings of the commitees.

FINANCE

- 8. PATOR'S TITHE Whereas the finance proportioned to the administration fund is insufficient, and whereas our present commitments will not permit the raising of the percentage going into the fund; therefore be it resolved that every pastor shall send direct to the District Treasurer one half of the tithe from his Church Salary.
- TREASURER'S NOTICES Be it resolved that the District Treasurer mail a reminder to all who make pledges to District Projects if pledge is unpaid after six months.

INSURANCE

10. Whereas the majority of Pilgrim Holiness ministers of the East Michigan Conference have expressed interest for participation in the Blue Cross and Blue Shield protection on a group basis, BE IT RESOLVED: Be it further resolved that a credit card be given to all in attendance, and that each card be signed and returned by the pupil to their local church Sunday School Secretary for the Attendance, record and reports to the Conference.

CONFERENCE

- *8. FISCAL YEAR The Conference Year shall close May 31st and all reports be mailed to the Conference Statistician by June 15th.
 - 9. **EXAMINING AND EDUCATIONAL BOARD** The District Superintendent shall be chairman of the Educational and Examining Board by virtue of his office. He shall have sections 105 and 107 of the Manuel read instructing all district licentuates that hereafter they shall appear before the District Examining Board before their credential shall be granted.
- 10. **APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES** The District Council shall appoint all committees. The Standing Committees are to be appointed to include new men where possible and to avoid duplication of men on several committees. It is recommended that the entire constituency be considered.

The Ways and Means Committee shall have six members plus the District Treasurer, and the term of office of the six members shall be so graduated that only two members shall vacate annually.

- 11. **BUILDING COMMITTEE** The District Council shall appoint a building committee composed of three members who have experience in the work of accoustics, architecture, and construction.
- * All Churches and church Boards must have the approval of said committee before the purchase of building sites or the erecting of buildings or improvements in excess of \$500.00.
- 12. **ELECTION OF OFFICERS** Inasmuch as most religious bodies follow the order of having elections immediately following district reports, and inasmuch as many conferences of the Pilgrim Holiness Church follow the same order, therefore be it resolved that election of officers be immediately following district reports. Whereas there has been successive balloting for important offices, and whereas this has often resulted in the election of individuals to several positions of officialdom, therefore be it resolved that balloting for respective officers shall be taken care of in regular and proper sequence, and that the elections be posted immediately.
- 13. **COMMITTEE MEETINGS** Be it resolved that the Chairman of the Resolutions committee and of the Ways and Means committee shall call a meeting of their respective committees at least one month before Conference.

 No resolution shall be presented to this conference until it has been typewritten and signed.
- 14. **ORDINATION SERVICE** . Be it resolved that the order of business on the first night of the Conference be the ordination service. Whereas the Minister's wife makes a vital contribution to her husband's work, therefore we recommend that the wife of the candidate be given honorary seat with the candidate during the ordination service.

Whereas ordination is an extremely important event in the life of a minister, whereas the family of the candidate may desire to be present and make plans well in advance for the ordination day, therefore be it resolved that he Examining and Educational Board review and examine and then notify candidates 15 days prior to the conference.

STANDING RULES

*All resolutions or parts thereof marked with a star indicate a duty of or instruction to the local church.

CAMP MEETING

- 1. CAMP DATE · Be it resolved that the Camp meeting date be set to begin the second Friday in July.
- 2. CAMP BOARD Be it resolved that the Camp Meeting Board of six members be elected in the following manner: two members to be elected for three years, the next two elected to serve two years, and the last two elected for one year. Following this two members shall be elected annually for a three year term. The Board shall secure all workers for Camp and Conference, supervise building and grounds, purchase good and necessary equipment for camp and conference, and have charge of all advertising. Whereas Camp Board members are pastors and whereas much of their time must be devoted and their minds occupied with the many duties connected with the manual working of the Camp, and therefore are not free to attend and enjoy the camp services; Therefore be it further resolved that after any member of the Camp Board has served for a period of three years, he shall not be reelected to the Camp Board until at least three years have expired. The District Council shall provide nominations from which board members shall be elected.

Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer and one other Council member serve on this Board, and that the District Superintendent by virtue of his office serve on this but shall not be the Chairman. The Chairman of the Camp Board shall be appointed by the District Council.

- *3. CAMP LABOR Be it resolved that each church in the conference of less than 20 members give 2 days labor or \$20.00; 20 to 50 members 4 days or \$40.00; above 50 members give 6 days or \$60.00 to employment to make ready for the annual Camp Meeting and construction of new buildings and maintenance until a maintenance man be employed. This call may be issued by the District Council or Camp Board.
 - 4. CAMP GROUND DEVELOPMENT Whereas the Assistant District Superintendent is limited in his service to the District, there fore be it resolved that the Assistant District Superintendent shall be chairman of the Camp Ground Development Committee which shall consist of the Camp Board Chairman, the District Youth President, a SECRETARY TREASURER and two LAY members all of whom are appointed by the District Council.
 - 5. **CHILDREN'S MEETINGS** Be it resolved that we have children's meetings during the afternoon and evening services of camp.
 - 6. LEASING OF LOTS Be it resolved that the District lease lots on the camp grounds to Ministers and laymen desiring them as follows:

The lease fee shall be \$125.00 if paid in cash. Terms: \$145.00 at the rate of \$25.00 down and \$10.00 per month for one year.

The District shall plant one tree on each lot and shall gravel the street in front of lots.

7. SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSIONS - Be it resolved that on the two Sundays during camp meeting that there be a Sunday School Session beginning at 9:30 until 10:15 a.m. following the Testimony meeting, and that said session be arranged and supervied by the Sunday School Committee.

- (a) To lay out a course of study.
- (b) To appoint committees and instructors in each zone and advise in organizing classes.
- (c) To gather information and give reports on progress and accomplishments.

*2. Be it further resolved:

- (a) That there be an intense effort on the part of the pastor to attend all classes, and that he enlist as many of the laity of his church as possible.
- (b) That a cretificate of accomplishment be given to all who finish the course.
- *3. Also be it resolved that at sometime during the period of instruction or immediately after, the pastor of each church will organize in his or her church a group for soul winning and lay visitation, and set up files and records recommended by the committee, and that these be kept permanent records of the church.
- *18. **PRAYER AND FASTING LEAGUE** Be it resolved that in keeping with the program of our church that we urge each church in our Conference to organize a Prayer and Fasting League. The Objectives of the Prayer and Fasting League shall be:
 - 1. It shall not take the place of the regular church mid-week prayer meeting.
 - 2. The League Membership shall be directed to pray for the general interest of our Church at home and abroad.
 - 3. They shall be encouraged to pray for the local community needs.
 - 4. That where advisible the pastor shall provide a list of definite needs for each member of the League covering such needs as: Unsaved families in the community.

Unsaved families in the Sunday School.

Unsaved individuals definate church objectives and needs.

Organization:

- (a) The pastor shall act as director of the prayer and Fasting League.
- (b) The pastor shall recommend one or more names of the official board who shall appoint a secretary to work with the pastor.
- (c) The secretary shall form a membership list. Membership in the League shall be volunteer membership of the church, Sunday school, youth society, and friends of the church.
- (d) The membership shall be kept active by being revised twice each year, September 1, and March 1 of each Conference year.
- (e) Whereas this is a new Conference venture, we hereby ask that the next ministerial meeting of this Conference set aside one hour for open discussion of this district project that better understanding and organization may be perfected at our next District Conference.

15. **CHURCH EXTENSION** - Inasmuch as the present conference Church Extension Department is not producing the number of churches that we are capable of producing, and whereas the establishing of new churches is neccessary for a steady and healthy growth for any district, and whereas there appears to be a definite weakness in our present policy of raising funds for church extension work;

Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference adopt the Church Extension Fellowship which reads as follows:

Church Extension Fellowship of the Pilgrim Holiness Church East Michigan District----Holding the conviction that God would have us further the cause of Christ by establishing new churches within our District borders, I subscribe to the following:

- (a) I will pray for the leading of the Lord in the work of the Church Extension Board.
- (b) I will be alert for any possibilities of new churches and inform the Board.
- (c) I recognize that first financial obligations in the opening of a new work are the most difficult to meet and will therefore be responsible two units, \$5.00 per unit, to total \$10.00 for the Church Extension Fellowship.
- (d) I assume this obligation for not more then two new works in any one conference year, said works to be approved by the Church Extension Board.
- (e) I will try to secure other members for the fellowship.
- (f) I understand this agreement may be terminated any time I deem it necessary by notifying the Church Extension Board.

Be it further resolved since one of the purposes of the East Michigan Pilgrim Loans and Investments is to assist in the financing of Church Extension projects of the East Michigan District, and since the Church Extension Fellowship can be a source of finance to aid in such projects, be it resolved that the Church Extension Fellowship be made a part of the Loan and Investment program.

- 16. **DISTRICT PAPER** Whereas there is some demand for a district paper, and whereas there is not financial provision for the same, be it resolved that the District Council prorate the costs-such as printing, postage, and secretarial help among the four departments of the District.
- 17. **LAY VISITATION** Whereas the entire program of the General Conference seems to present a forward and aggresive program, and whereas one of the things urged upon each of our Districts was a plan of "lay visitation" and "Personal Soul Winning";

Therefore be it resolved that we adopted the following plan, to be known as "Personal Soul Winning and Lay Visitation Plan."

1. That a committee of not more than three be appointed by the District Superintendent, whose work shall be;

Therefore be it resolved:

- (a) each local church shall tithe its receipts
- (b) EACH Sunday School shall tithe its receipts.
- (c) each local Youth Society shall tithe its receipts.
- (d) each Youth Zone shall tithe its Zone offerings.

These tithes shall be sent each month to the respective Department treasurers, and forwarded by said treasurer to the District Treasurer.

These tithes shall not include loans or money from sale of land or buildings.

Be it further sesolved that the District Treasurer send the equivlent of \$8.00 per member to the General Treasurer for the General United Stewardship fund, and that the District Stewardship fund be divided as follows:

45 per cent Administration
7 per cent Owosso College
5 per cent Ministerial Relief
2 per cent General Conference
8 per cent Property, Debt
21 per cent Church Extension
4½ per cent Sunday School
4½ per cent Youth
3 per cent Loan Fund
100 per cent

*24. CAMP AND CONFERENCE, 1 PER CENT - Whereas there is a great deal of expense in connection with the annual camp meeting and Conference, let each church pay into the District Treasury 1 per cent of their regular offerings to be designated for Camp meeting and conference expenses.

Inasmuch as it is impossible under the present set-up to any longer give free entertainment to our ministers and their families, therefore be it further resolved that ministers and their families be responsible for their lodging and meals.

Exception shall be, all retired ministers, full time pastors and their families whose salaries are under \$50.00 per week, and all full time camp workers as determined by the camp board.

Be it further resolved that during the Annual Conference all delegates (Ministerial and Lay) be given their meals free, and that the District Superintendent, his wife, and members of his family under 16 years of age shall be given meals and lodging without charge during the Annual Camp and Conference.

Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer pay out of the Administraive Fund the Pension Plan for the District Superintendent.

- *25. MISSIONARY SOCIETY 10 PER CENT Be it resolved that 10 per cent of the local missionary societies regular offerings be sent to the District Missionary Treasurer for yearly projects and district expense.
- *26. **DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUND** All monies raised in the Local Church for District and general work shall be sent to the District Treasurer, who shall forward general funds to the General Treasurer.

- 19. FINANCE COMMITTEE Whereas finance is so important to the ongoing of the District and the local church, therefore be it resolved that a finance committee of three members be appointed by the District Council from the Ways and Means committee. The duties of this committee shall be as follows:
 - 1. To study all finance in each local church as to their ability to pay district and general united stewardship funds and to recommend ways of paying the same.
 - 2. To recommend to the District Council in regard to amount of indebtedness the local congregation is able to carry.
 - To report all findings to the District Council.
 - 4. To give a yearly report to the District Conference.
 - 5. The Chairman to be the same as the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee.
 - *Be it further resolved that:
 - (a) Any church unable to pay their united stewardship fund in full shall contact the chairman of this committee at least 90 days before the close of the conference year.
 - (b) Any church wanting to finance property, either building or or buying, shall contact the chairman of this committee.

 - c) The local church shall receive the report from the committee and the District Council in not more than 30 days following request.
- 20. DISTRICT CALENDAR Be it resolved that the District Superintendent meet with heads of the departments to prepare a district calendar and this to be placed in conference journal annually. Within thirty days after the annual conference a copy of this calendar be sent to each pastor, sunday school superintendent, missionary society president and youth society president.
- 21. OWOSSO COLLEGE Whereas we are particulary related to Owosso College, therefore be it resolved that we grant the Bible Department of Owosso College time in our Annual Conference to remind us of this relationship, and to report on the same.
- 22. Whereas there is a need for the delegates to be acquainted with the resolutions and to understand the meaning of them, therefore be it resolved that the resolutions of the resolutions commitee and the ways and means committee be mineographed and made available to the delegates and ministers at least two weeks before annual district conference.

*Be it further resolved that the pastors meet with appointed committees or church members and send their resolutions to District Resolutions Committee by May first. Be it resolved further that this resolutions be placed in the sanding rules.

FINANCE

*23. UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND - Whereas the present method of securing finances to promote the District and General work is irregular and unequal, and some churches with many members have low finance, and some churches with fewer members have high finance.

And whereas we are in full accord with the plan of God, namely tithes and offerings for financing the work of the kingdom, and advise our people to tithe their income into the local church;

- *36. **VACATIONS** It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a two weeks vacation with pay, and that the District Superintendent shall be given a two-weeks vacation with pay.
- 37. **PASTOR'S CONFERENCE COMMITTEE** Be it resolved that a committee of six be appointed as a Pastor's conference committee by the District Council; that two be appointed for three years, two for two years, and that two for one year, and that two shall be appointed each year respectively.

The Pasor's Conference Committee shall arrange the program, set the date, the place, and notify all ministers, of the Pastor's conferences and one-day ministerial retreat.

- 38. **PASTOR'S CONFERENCE** Be it resolved that we have two pastors conferences; one in the Spring and one in the Fall each year. Be it further resolved this be placed in standing rules.
- 39. **RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT** Be it resolved that whenever there shall be elected another District Superintendent, that the Council earnestly endeavor to place said retiring Superintendent in satisfactory position.
- 40. **DEATH NOTICES** Since in the past on several occasions District Ministers, Widows have deceased without the ministers being notified of their death, therefore be it resolved that in the case of he death of a minister or his widow, the District Secretary notify the ministers of the district.

Be it further resolved that we request the Michigan District to give us this information from their District.

- 27. **SALARIES** The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$4,500.00 per year plus 7c per mile traveling expense. The District Treasurer shall receive \$400.00 per year, the District Secretary Treasurer shall receive \$200.00, the District Sunday School Secretary \$100.00, The Youth Director \$100.00, the District Statistician \$50.00. All District officials receive 6c per mile for all miles traveled in the interest of the District.
- *28. **PARSONAGE UTILITIES** The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is located. All churches in the District are to provide the utilities for the parsonages. The District shall provide the same for the Disrict Parsonage.
- 29. **CAMP FUNDS REPORT** The District Treasurer shall submit an itemized report of camp meeting funds as recorded in the 1945 Conference Journal, page 13. This report to appear in the Journal.
- 30. **BURIAL BENEFITS** All actively engaged ministers and their wives of the District shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association. Cost of the membership and the calls shall be paid from the treasuries of the department that employs them. Complete resolution appears in Standing Rule No. 20 of the 1947 Journal.
- 31. **DISTRICT AUDIT** Be it resolved that all Treasurers books of the District be audited annually by a certified Public Accountant so that a report from the auditor can be given to the conference when called for.
- *32. **OWOSSO COLLEGE** Insamuch as Owosso College had a successful history in training young people for Christian Service, and inasmuch as the General Board has assigned the state of Michigan as the patronizing territory for Owosso College;

Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference go on record in pledging to the College its full cooperation and prayerful support, and open the doors of its churches to a representative of the College at which time the financial needs of the Bible Department of the College shall be presented, and an offering received subject to Section 149, Paragraph 3 of the Manual.

33. **PILGRIM LOAN AND INVESTMENT INC.** - Whereas there is a need for a more adequate loan program in our District, Therefore be it resolved that the program known as East Michigan Pilgrim Loans and Investment Inc., be adopted and replace our present Church Extension Loan Fund.

MINISTERIAL

- *34 PASAOR'S AT CAMP Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend the annual camp meetings each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the camp, and the pastor shall be required to attend the entire camp meeting with the exception of Sunday morning.
- *35. PASTCRAL RECALL Be it resolved that the vote on the recall of the pastor shall be taken prior to May 15, this vote shall be taken by secret ballot and shall not be counted in the local church, but shall be placed in an envelope and sealed in the presence of voting body and sent directly to District Superintendent who shall report the results of the vote to the Pastor and the church Secretary. No pastoral changes will be recommended until after May 15.

NO. 8 YOUTH MISSIONARY PROJECT:

Whereas we wish to co-operate with the general missionary project, therefore, be it resolved that each local youth society endeavor to comply with the general Youth Department's request for finance.

NO. 9 APPRECIATION
