Conference Proceedings

FIRST SITTING

The first sitting of the Ninth Annual Conference of the East Michigan District convened at 9:00 A.M., July 9, 1964.

The Conference opened with Rev. D. Wayne Brown leading in the singing of "Draw Me Nearer." Prayer was requested for Rev. Ed Smith, pastor of Montrose and Mr. Clayton Spring. Rev. G. V. Skinner lead in the opening prayer. After appropriate remarks, Rev. C. R. Hendrick, District Superintendent, introduced General Superintendent, Dr. P. W. Thomas, as presiding officer of the Conference in the absence of Dr. Wm. Neff. Dr. Thomas addressed the Conference using Matthew 24:1-14, as the basis for his remarks. He spoke on, first, the Faith of Jesus in His message. It was the only message with hope and the only message that satisfies deep Spiritual need. Second, Jesus had faith in His program. The Gospel shall be preached and we are a part of this program and nothing should stop us from preaching it to all Nations. Third, Jesus has faith in His people that they shall preach this message.

After the address we entered into the business of the day. It was passed that the first 12 rows of seats across the front of the tabernacle and the platform shall constitute the Conference Bar.

Motion carried that the time of the sittings be from 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M., 1:30 to 5:00 and from 7:30 to 9:00 P.M.

The Conference secretary, Rev. M. C. House, called the Ministerial and Lay roll.

It was moved that we accept the agenda for business as recommended by the Council.

Rev. Hendrick introduced to the Conference the newly organized Church, Westland Chapel, with its pastor, Rev. Melvin Straight, and lay delegate Mrs. Lovella Dorony. Motion carried that we accept this church into the Conference.

The Secretary read the following transfers to the Conference: Rev. Roger Gast, third year licentiate from the Canadian District and Rev. Ronald Walker, fourth year licentiate from the Free Methodist Church.

Motion carried that we accept these into the Conference and each gave his personal testimony.

Rev. L. R. Neff reported for the Examining and Educational Board. This report was received and all recommendations approved by vote of the Conference.

The Reception Committee introduced the following to the Conference; Rev. Roy Beltz, representative from headquarters in the interest of the Pilgrim Pension Plan and Ministerial Benefit; Mrs. Beulah Warner, representative for Stevens Van Lines; and Rev. Francis Miller, minister from the Free Methodist Church. These were cordially accepted and given an honorary seat within the Conference Bar.

The following reports were read and accepted by the Conference:

After announcements it was moved and carried that we adjourn. Rev. D. Wayne Brown dismissed with prayer.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting convened at 1:30 P.M. with Rev. D. Wayne Brown leading in the singing of "Showers of Blessing". Rev. Raymond Dean lead in prayer. It was carried that we dispense with the roll call.

The Minutes of the previous sitting were approved as read.

The Secretary read the transfer of Mrs. Esther Molin, an ordained Deaconess from the Michigan District. It was moved and carried that Mrs. Molin be accepted into the District.

The following reports were read and accepted:

Motion carried that the Pastors' reports be deferred until the discretion of the Chairman.

The District Secretary read the Auditor's report which was accepted.

The next report was by the District Treasurer, Rev. Raymond Dean. After some discussion the report was accepted as read.

The following reports were read and accepted:

The next report was that of the District Statistician, it was carried that Rev. Walker read only the totals of each department.

Dr. and Mrs. Paul F. Elliott, President of Owosso College, were introduced to the Conference. After testimonies, it was carried that they be granted honorary seats within the Conference Bar.

Rev. Wm. Lyons read the report of the District Youth Treasurer. This report was accepted. Motion prevailed that we accept the Supplemental report as well.

Mrs. P. W. Thomas, wife of the General Superintendent, was introduced to the Conference. It was moved and carried that she be granted an honorary seat within the Conference Bar.

Motion carried that we recess for 15 minutes.

After recessing, the first order of business being the election of officers, the Chair asked Rev. Hendrick to lead in prayer.

Ballots were cast for Assistant Superintendent with Rev. H. C. Rickner elected.

Ballots were cast and Rev. M. C. House was elected.

Nominations for District Treasurer were read as follows: Rev. Raymond Dean, Rev. Wm. Lyons and Rev. Bruce White.

Ballots were cast and Rev. Dean was elected.

Ballots were cast for the three remaining advisory Council members. The tellers reported that Rev. D. Wayne Brown and Rev. Wm. N. Miller were elected.

Ballots were cast for the last Council Member. There was no election. Ballots were cast again. Motion carried that we extend the time until these ballots could be collected.

Adjourned by expiration of time. Rev. G. V. Skinner dismissed with prayer.

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting convened at 7:30 p.m. with Rev. G. V. Skinner leading in the singing of "Take My Life and Let It Be". Rev. H. C. Rickner led in prayer.

The following Scriptures were read:

Matt. 25: 31-40 by Rev. A. F. Osborn

Rev. Hendrick presented Mrs. Eula Irish, candidate for ordination for deaconess, to Dr. Thomas. He spoke from Romans 16: 1 and 2. He mentioned the work of different women in the church. He called attention to the fact that the work of a deaconess must still be carried on. Dr. Thomas prayed the dedicatory prayer and then gave the charge to Mrs. Irish. Rev. Hendrick prayed the closing prayer. The Congregation joined in singing "I'll Live For Him".

The business of the Conference was again resumed.

The Minutes of the previous sitting were approved as read.

The tellers reported that Rev. Joppie was elected as the third Advisory Council member.

Nominations for the District Missionary President were read as follows: Mrs. Wilda Nelson and Mrs. Elsie House.

Ballots were cast and Mrs. House was elected.

Nominations for Camp Board were read as follows: Rev. Eldon Nelson, Rev. Ronald Schmidt, Rev. John Dean and Rev. Roger Gast. Ballots were cast and Rev. Eldon Nelson and Rev. John Dean were elected.

By a recommendation of the Council and a unanimous vote of the Conference Rev. D. Wayne Brown, Rev. A. S. Joppie and Rev. M. C. House were elected as District Trustees.

Nominations for lay members of the Board of Directors of the Pilgrim Loan and Investment, Inc. were as follows: Arnold Moore, Paul Clark, Garth Thompson and Earl Barrett. Mr. Earl Barrett and Mr. Arnold Moore were elected.

Nominations for the Ministerial member to the Board of Directors of the Pilgrim Loan and Investment, Inc. were: Rev. W. N. Miller and Rev. Wilbert Walker. Ballots were cast and Rev. W. N. Miller was elected.

It was carried that we approve the recommendation of the Examining and Educational Board for William Bauman to be granted a First year license.

The Chair called for the pastors' oral reports.

After announcements all joined in the singing of the Doxology.

Adjourned by expiration of time. Mrs. Irish dismissed with prayer.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the Conference was opened at 9:00 A.M. with Rev. James Kreider leading in singing "Faith Is the Victory". Rev. Bruce White led in prayer.

Dr. Thomas addressed the Conference as to the importance of each member of the church. He admonished as to each one's attitude toward the entire organization of the church. He stressed that we can not exist alone but that it takes a united effort of all and that we are all one body. Dr. Thomas closed with prayer.

The Minutes of the previous sitting were approved as read.

Rev. G. V. Skinner, chairman of the Conference Committee, called Rev. Webster, secretary of said Committee to read resolutions of the committee.

The Conference committee reported action taken as to the place of the Conference as requested by the 1963 Conference. Their decision is to keep the Conference at the present Camp Ground site. The District Council's decision is to set the date of the annual Conference for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday (July 12, 13, 14, 1965) of the regular camp week. This to begin with the 1965 Conference.

Rev. Webster read the preface to the work done by the Conference Committee and District Council in regard to changes in names of some committees, organization and their duties.

Motion carried that we consider the Conference Committee report item by item.

Motion carried that we recess for 10 minutes.

Rev. Webster proceeded to read the first item of the Conference Committee regarding Building and Finance Committee. This resolution carried as read.

The following resolutions were read:

Blue Cross - Blue Shield Insurance remains as is in Standing Rules in 1963 Journal.

Camp Board was passed as read.

Camp Ushers was referred to the Camp Board.

Resolution regarding Church Extension Committee was passed as read.

Church Government was passed as read.

Conference Committee to remain as is in 1963 Journal.

District Trustees to remain as is.

Examining and Educational Board was passed as read.

Missionary Society to remain as is.

Resolution regarding Memoirs Committee was passed as read.

Ordination Committee was passed as read.

Pastor's Conference Committee was passed with this amendment, "To be No. 4 under Section 2 - Duties - The Committee shall plan their work at least three years in advance.

Pilgrim Loan and Investment, Inc. was passed as read.

Resolution regarding Reception Committee was read and discussed.

It was carried that we refer this resolution to the Committee.

Adjourned by expiration of time. Rev. G. E. Stace dismissed with prayer.

FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting of the Conference opened with Rev. D. Wayne Brown leading in the singing of "Love Lifted Me".

The Minutes were approved as read.

The motion to refer the resolution regarding the Reception Committee was before the Conference. The motion to refer was withdrawn.

The original proposition was before the Conference. This resolution was passed as read.

The resolution regarding District Statistician remains as is.

Resolution regarding Sunday School Board remains as is.

Resolution regarding Lay Visitation passed as read.

The following resolution regarding an addition to the By-Laws of the Pilgrim Loan and Investment, Inc. was passed. "Be it resolved that the By-Laws of the Pilgrim Loan and Investment, Inc. be amended by an addition of Section 4, article 9 to read thus: East Michigan Pilgrim Loan and Investment, Inc., is authorized to enter into agreement with local and/or District Trustees to mortgage church property to secure loans made from the Loan and Investment Corporation. Said agreements shall be according to the by-laws of the Corporation and the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Nominations were read for Examining and Educational Board as follows: Rev. L. R. Neff, Rev. J. A. Hiatt, Rev. A. S. Joppie and Rev. John Dean.

Rev. L. R. Neff and Rev. J. A. Hiatt were elected.

The District Secretary read the report for the Memoirs Committee in the absence of Mrs. Thelma Brown.

Rev. James Kreider reported for the Visitation Committee.

The following resolution from the Lay Visitation Committee was passed with its amendment: Whereas there is a need for a definite Lay Visitation and Personal Evangelism program in our churches, be it therefore resolved, that this visitation plan, as presented, be adopted as a District plan. Be it further resolved, that the months of September and October of each year, be designated as Lay Visitation and Personal Evangelism Training months, wherein a class of four to six sessions be taught in each church, to refresh workers and enlist and train new workers for this visitation program. Be it further resolved, that this resolution be placed in the standing rules of the Conference Journal.

The amendment: Be it resolved that this report be referred to the Committee to be put in condensed form and given to the District Secretary for publication in the Journal.

Rev. Paul A. Graham, Regional Director for the National Association of Evangelicals was introduced to the Conference. It was carried that Rev. Graham be granted an honorary seat within the Conference Bar.

Motion prevailed that Rev. Graham be granted 10 or 15 minutes to speak in behalf of the National Association of Evangelicals.

Rev. and Mrs. H. B. Kreider of the Florida District were introduced to the Conference and granted honorary seats within the Conference Bar.

The motion prevailed that when any minister transfers into the East Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and qualifies for the eligibility listing that he be covered by Blue Cross-Blue Shield.

The Chair called for the continuation of the pastors' oral reports.

The Chair spoke words of commendation to the Pastors. Rev. C. R. Hendrick then thanked each church for their cooperation and their contributions for the District and General Church support.

Resolution prevailed that this Conference give a standing vote of gratitude for all manual help on the campus; for the District Superintendent, Rev. C. R. Hendrick, for his faithful administration and service; and also for the Chairman of the Conference, Dr. P. W. Thomas, for his encouraging leadership during these business sessions.

Be it further resolved that we give Dr. Thomas a love offering of \$50.00.

The motion prevailed that the Council take care of all unfinished business.

Announcements were made, Rev. C. R. Hendrick dismissed the Conference with prayer.

Dr. Thomas announced that this Conference was adjourned.

Report of The District Superintendent

To the Chairman, Dr. Paul W. Thomas, Delegates, and Friends of the East Michigan Conference -- Greetings!

It seems but yesterday that I stood here giving you my Annual Report for 1963. Though many leaves have fallen from the tree of the human race, to return to the earth from whence they came; God has been very good to us. I bring no report of any delegates of last year, either laymen or ministerial who have fallen to the sickle of the "grim reaper." I especially give praise to our God for the exceeding good health which Sister Hendrick and I have enjoyed.

The world picture has changed but little. Nations are still maneuvering for power at the cost of human lives as pawns, while races fight in the streets in their struggle for positions in society which are inherently theirs by equality in creation and by constitution. Men and women who are followers of Christ are keeping one eye upon these human situations while the other eye scans Biblical history as written by Holy Prophets. They are convinced that our dispensation of "preparation" and "fruit gathering" is swiftly drawing to a close. However, we should know also that in the midst of this dangerous crisis around us, God has taken the opportunity to show forth His mighty keeping power, while at the same time the number who will at last sit with His Son at the "marriage supper" is increasing. This is our blessed hope!

Ours has been a challenging year with greater opportunities than resources; nevertheless, God has provided a good harvest in each area and department of our District Organization. I do believe that in spite of opposing forces our people are seeking to be more spiritual. It is also my observation that our pastors are taking advantage of this and are leading our people into a deeper consecration and dedication to God's cause.

God has signally blessed with good financial gains that surpass the percentage gains of the State and National economy. East Michigan District will stand at or near the top in per capita giving in relation to all other denominations as well as our own denomination. This picture holds true as near as I can determine in numerical gain, though modest. Thus the direction of readjustment taken two years ago by our District is beginning to show results. This seems to fit into the pattern of the "first Church" taken from the description in Acts where it says, "And they added to the Church daily such as should be saved."

The churches which merged last year have definitely shown good progress. As the result of this progress, plans are already drawn up and construction of buildings will begin soon. East Michigan District showed the largest average Sunday School attendance and the largest average Church membership in the entire denomination (a position that should be strengthened further this year). This indicates that we are strengthening our local churches to meet the challenging demands placed upon them by increased population and the physical transformation of the communities which they serve.

Camp Ground

I am sure you have already noticed real progress here, in spite of the many needs which are still quite obvious, and for which our people will still be required to make great sacrifice and effort.

This year the water problem became acute because of the failure of the well which supplied water for the buildings west of the highway. Fortunately, we had already decided to increase our water supply by pulling up the two inch casing in our main well and increasing it to a four inch casing. This was accomplished before the failure of the other well, therefore we were able to supply water to the dining room at minimum cost to the camp. The water problem has however cost us approximately \$1,800.00 this year.

More than 600 feet of sidewalk was poured at an approximate cost of \$1,200.00. A tractor with sickle bar, a blade for moving dirt or snow, and a plow added another \$800.00 to our expense. Three lawn mowers were purchased. The sanitation building and water storage tank were painted. Various other small improvements were made which will add to your convenience.

Last, but certainly not least, was the building of the young people's pavilion at an approximate cost of \$5,000.00. This was accomplished under the capable leadership of the Youth President, Rev. Roy Webster.

All these improvements are yours to enjoy, and we hope by the end of this Camp Meeting that very little indebtedness on them will remain.

Five Hundred Camp Club

The response to this project has been very gratifying with an enrollment already of 380. No one would dare to question the leading of God in launching this project since learning of the unforeseen expense we have had to meet this year. Our plan for another year is to complete the 500 enrollment and try to reach a number that will assure approximately \$5,000.00 per year for the operation of this camp.

Pilgrim Loan And Investment Inc.

Here is one of the bright spots on our financial horizon. This was set up about three years ago with the idea of financing at least a portion of the building needs of the District. It took two years to acquaint ourselves with the procedure and to prepare advertising to meet State requirements. Last year the plan was introduced to some of our people and the results were most rewarding. Several thousand dollars have been received in the way of loans from some of our people, and several thousand have, in return, been loaned to a number of churches. Next year we hope to present this project to our churches. It is our humble opinion that within three years we can have an operating capital of at least SEVENTY FIVE to ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS. Listen for the Chairman's report on this later in the conference.

Dedications And Improvements

Our family of churches over the District have committed themselves to a very aggressive program in the area of building. As a result we have come up this year with some very beautiful churches and parsonages.

Flint First, with Rev. D. Wayne Brown as pastor, has given in dedication to the Lord one of the finest churches in our District. His people are to be commended for the hard work and fine job done.

Flint Grace, working with, and holding up the hands of Rev. John Dean, have set a fine example in economy and quality in building their beautiful brick church. They also purchased a new parsonage in the vicinity of the church.

Lennon Church, where Rev. Bruce White is pastor, also dedicated a new brick sanctuary to God. While in the process of building they continued to set records in attendance. This church also finished a fine new parsonage which was formerly used as a chapel.

At North Lakeport we were met by a crowd of approximately 300 where we had the privilege of holding a double dedication. The new brick veneer church and educational arrangement are a great testimony for these loyal Pilgrims. The new four bedroom parsonage is most inviting. Rev. Wm. (Bill) Doe and his hard working group have been blessed of God.

A dream of several years came true at Pontiac when Rev. W. N. Miller and his people built a much needed and very beautiful parsonage. The basement is complete with fire place and adequate room for church and youth gatherings. A fine crowd of people celebrated the dedication with joy.

The slogan at Ypsilanti was, "And the people had a mind to work", and work they did. With Rev. Kenneth Smith acting as contractor, Pastor, and errand boy, they completed an addition more than doubling the floor space. At the same time they completely remodeled and bricked the concrete block structure of the old church resulting in a completely new-looking building. A new zeal has been burning for some time. The dedication was a high day.

I visited Mt. Morris unannounced one day and entered into a sizable addition built completely across the front of the church. The colorful Indiana Sand Stone not only is pleasing to the eye, but the interior of the addition is beautiful and was very much needed. As I looked around, a sound calculated to be singing, issued forth to the rhythm of a hammer. I discovered the singer to be Rev. Jess Moss giving a "demonstration" of how many of our Pilgrim Holiness Churches are built.

Evergreen Valley Church of Flint is responding to the leadership of Rev. John Hiatt, and is on the verge of completing a very large and practical educational activity building.

After hearing the frustrating question of Rev. A. S. Joppie, "What will we do?", his people took it as a challenge and rose up to action, purchasing a property across the street and launching a program that will soon help to provide the answer to a continuing growth in their church.

Flint Cresthaven, under the guidance of Rev. Ron Schmidt, has been making progress by completely redecorating and remodeling the interior of their chapel. In addition they purchased several hundred dollars worth of carpeting covering church and parsonage floors from wall to wall.

Croswell has fallen in step by purchasing new pews for their church, followed by a major remodeling of the interior of their parsonage. The cost of this is all paid. Rev. Wm. Lyons is doing good work there.

Russellville, after several years of struggling, has, under the leadership of Rev. Truman Munsel, taken on new life. They have purchased a piece of ground adjoining their present property, and have drawn up plans for building an educational building this fall which will relieve their congestion in Sunday School. They have been holding a Sunday School class in their bus each Sunday.

Detroit Greeley, pastored by Rev. Miss Ruth Alexander, has purchased a very fine brick parsonage with breezeway and garage. This is located on 25 acres of ground. Blue prints are already drawn up for the building of a new church.

Westland Chapel, formerly known as Livonia Church Extension project has been organized into a church. This group is at present worshipping in one of the better school buildings. They have purchased and paid for a 3 acre plot upon which they plan to build either this Fall or early Spring. They also have purchased another 3 acre plot adjoining them and are well on their way paying for this. The entire cost of the property amounted to \$20,000.00.

This has been a report of major accomplishments only, which will add to our property valuation more than \$200,000.00 making our total valuation soar to approximately TWO and THREE QUARTERS of a MILLION, with a possible indebtedness of \$650,000.00. This would boost our equity to more than TWO MILLION DOLLARS.

Word of Commendation and Appreciation

I think it would be sheer neglect if I closed my report without placing the credit where it rightfully belongs.

First I would like to say that God has talked to us during the day time and in the night time in our attempt to give direction in this work. I have appreciated His leadership.

The Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. H. C. Rickner, has answered the call at all times when possible, and has helped to make my load lighter.

I have found our District Council to be men of wisdom, and I have drawn from this source of wisdom and experience many times during the year. I would say that there is no group of men called upon to give so many man-hours without receiving tangible remuneration.

To the many who have served on our committees, I have the highest regard. They have accepted their area of responsibility with humility, and have implemented their work with dispatch. In many instances these committees have been responsible for thousands of pages of written material, and numbers of their ideas have been incorporated in our organizational procedure. What is brought to this conference will be the result of their years of experience, and research and study that extended over the past twelve months.

Last, but certainly not least, I have a deep appreciation for our laymen and their pastors; that unit which we call the local church. Not only are they interested in the welfare of our total church activities, but have made contributions to our needs. This has resulted in what our former Treasurer of twenty-five years said, "The highest percentage of stewardship ever paid to the General Church (92.5 per cent) was paid this year". With this they have also paid the District sufficient to keep all our interest out of the red ink. It is with this kind of vision and cooperation from our laymen and their pastors that we, by God's help, shall build a strong Church to God's glory.

Report of Assistant Superintendent

Rev. P. W. Thomas, fellow ministers, delegates, and friends of the Annual Conference:

Sunday School Secretary's Report

General Superintendent Thomas, District Superintendent Hendrick, Fellow Ministers, and Delegates,. . . GREETINGS!

I was indeed surprised and challenged when informed at our last District Conference that the District Council had appointed me District Promotional Secretary for the East Michigan Sunday Schools. It certainly is common knowledge that my predecessor, Rev. E. K. Purcell was a hard working, as well as very capable Sunday School Promotional Secretary, and I knew that it would be difficult following a man of his ability. The confidence placed in me by the District Council, however, was deeply appreciated, and I purposed to do the very best I could, with the limited time I knew I would be able to devote to this work.

The District Council appointed a very capable committee with which to work, in the persons of the Reverends M. V. Goodrich, Bob Nelson, and Bruce White. Reverend Bob Nelson felt it necessary to resign because of a number of other responsibilities and Reverend Eldon Nelson has been serving on the committee as secretary, and I might add, has done splendid work. The committee asked Reverend Arnold Gibson to be in charge of our "Sunday School Aids" Department. Reverend Gibson reports that many of our schools are using the "Aids",. . . which include "Teacher's Training Courses, film strips, recorded tapes, and others". The committee and entire district is indebted to Reverend Gibson for his work.

During the month of September the committee conducted "Sunday School Conferences" on a zone level. The purpose of the conference was to inform the officers and teachers of our schools as to their responsibilities. A special class was conducted for Pastors and Superintendents, a class for treasurers, a class for secretaries, and a class for Teachers. We tried to impress upon our Sunday School workers the importance of their tremendous task of "Reaching and Teaching"!

In October we cooperated with our General Rally Day Program, and this year our schools responded very well to the Rally Day Offering for our General Sunday School Department. Our total offering for the District was \$768.15 as compared to \$408.14 of last year, or an increase of \$360.01.

At the beginning of the calendar year, the Sunday School Committee sent a suggested program to each Pastor and Superintendent to cover the entire calendar year of 1964. We received considerable comment from Pastors and Superintendents expressing appreciation for the program. We realized, when sending it out, that all schools would not adopt it, that some would adopt a part of it, and some might use all of it. We do hope that it has been a help to some at least we did have a program. . . or perhaps I should say we do have a program. It is not elaborate, but there are ideas here that will work if employed. This also provides help to any new man who may be placed in this office. The existing program can be used for a few months giving the new man an opportunity to develop his own program without being rushed.

Included in the program are the following interests:

1. Teacher of the Month plan.
2. Re-evaluation of the Visitation Board plan.
3. District Sunday School aids.

4. P. E. L. T. program.
5. V. B. S. (Vacation Bible School) plan.
6. "Beat the Heat" months.
7. "Back to Sunday School Month".
8. "Canvass for Christ" month.
9. "Citizens for Christ" month.
10. "Count for Christ" month.

Last, but not least, our **March to Victory Campaign** . . . which proved to be a real success. This year, for the months of February and March we launched a District-wide Sunday School Contest. The contest was designed for seven Sundays. Prior to the beginning of the drive, we had a "kick off" program in each zone on February 3rd. Zone speakers were as follows:

Eastern Zone, Rev. C. R. Hendrick; Industrial Zone, Rev. A. Gibson; North Central Zone, Rev. M. Goodrich; Saginaw Valley Zone, Rev. B. White; University Zone, Rev. E. Nelson; Blue Water Zone, Rev. G. MacDonald.

The **March to Victory Campaign** began February 16th. The following are a few of the important items regarding the campaign:

Winning Sunday Schools: Utica, Lincoln Park, Pontiac, Flint Evergreen Valley, Gaines, Montrose, Warren, Detroit Greeley, North Branch, Flint Hannah St., Kingston, Russellville, Flint Emmanuel, North Lakeport, Flint First, Saginaw, Lennon, Wayne, Clio, and Flint Cresthaven.

Gold Star Schools: (10 per cent or more gain during contest over February and March of last year) Pontiac, Flint Evergreen Valley, Gaines, Montrose, Warren, Detroit Greeley, North Branch, Russellville, Flint Emmanuel, North Lakeport, Lennon, Clio, Flint Cresthaven.

Our highest District total attendance record was 5,214. Our record-breaking-GOAL for the final Sunday was set at 5,500, our total attendance on the final Sunday was 6,669; or 1,169 over our goal, and 1,455 over all previous records. CONGRATULATIONS to all for a job well done in our **March to Victory**. One final note concerning this campaign: Flint First accumulated the highest number of total points during the contest. Some of the schools made outstanding gains.

I have conducted one Teacher Training Course for one of our schools. My salary and milage is paid in full.

Report of Pilgrim Loans and Investments, Inc.

To the ninth annual East Michigan Conference:

Greetings:

This has been a year of progress for the Loan and Investment program. At the beginning of the church year we had a net worth of approximately \$2,100.00. This year has seen investments of \$5,000.00 with two more received since the treasurer closed his books for the year. This year we have made loans in the amount of \$6,700.00. The promotional committee has secured some splendid literature and already we are reaping results from this. Plans are laid to carry this program into all of our churches in the year to come.

These next months should be a time of great expansion for the loan fund. Meetings have been held and the ground work is being done to negotiate a loan for five hundred thousand dollars. Under such an expanded program we would absorb many of the outstanding mortgages on church property in our district. The churches participating in the program would make their payments, to the Loan and Investment treasurer, and he in turn would make one payment to the bank.

This would give the churches the advantage of lower monthly payments and a longer time to repay their loan. More will be said about this.

The Loan and Investment Corporation ask no favors, but rather invite our people to invest their money where it will help the church while they help themselves. They currently are paying 4 per cent interest per year on investments. Some of our pastors have seen the value of this program and already have secured several investors from their churches. Your support as pastors is greatly needed and appreciated in making this program the success it ought to be.

I. "500 Camp Club"

V. Vacations — (Standing Rule 39 — 1963 Journal)

Be it resolved that Standing rule 39, page 48 of the Conference Journal be changed to read: "It is recommended that vacations with pay for all ministers of this district range from a minimum of two weeks to a maximum of four weeks based on years of service in the full time ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church as follows:

- (a) Full time service — a minimum of two weeks.
- (b) 15 years of service — three weeks.
- (c) 20 years or more — four weeks.

VI. Annual Resolutions

Be it resolved that all resolutions approved by the Conference shall be annual in nature unless otherwise specified as standing rules.

VII. Building and Finance

ORGANIZATION

1. Recommended Name: Building and Finance Committee.

2. Committee shall be appointed by the District Council.
3. Number of appointed members shall be five.
4. Committee personnel: Five appointed members, the District Superintendent, and the District Treasurer.
5. Term: Committee members shall serve one year.
6. The chairman shall be appointed by the District Council.
7. The chairman shall preside and call all meetings in cooperation with the District Superintendent.
8. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the District Office.

DUTIES

1. To study all finance in each local church as to their ability to pay district and general united stewardship funds, and to recommend ways of paying the same.
2. To recommend to the District Council regarding the amount of indebtedness the local congregation shall be able to carry.
3. Report all of its findings to the district council.
4. Give an annual report to the District Conference.
5. Report to the local church through the district council (Manual Sec. 102 Pf.8, 9) within thirty days following request on matters of finance, and the building or buying of property in excess of \$500.00.

VIII. Insurance (Blue Cross — Blue Shield)

ORGANIZATION

1. The District council shall appoint the Treasurer, who shall be an ordained minister.
2. He shall serve until his successor is appointed.

DUTIES

1. He shall act for the ministers and personnel in relations with the representatives of the Michigan Hospital Service and the Michigan Medical Service.
2. He shall receive all periodic subscriptions from the ministers and make payments of the same to Blue Cross Blue Shield.

IX. Camp Board

ORGANIZATION

1. This Board shall be elected by the Annual Conference from nominations by the District Council.
2. Number of Board members shall be 11.
3. Board personnel: Six ordained ministers, the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, the District Secretary, the District Treasurer, and the District Youth President.

4. Term: Two shall be elected for one year, two for two years, two for three years, and two elected each year thereafter for three years. When the term of a board member expires, we recommend he not be reelected for three years.
5. The chairman shall be appointed for three years by the District Council.
6. The chairman shall preside over and call all meetings in cooperation with the District Superintendent.
7. The secretary of the board shall record the minutes and file them within ten days after each meeting with the District Office.
8. The recommended quorum is seven.

DUTIES

1. The Board shall secure all workers for camp and conference.
2. They shall supervise buildings and grounds.
3. They shall purchase good and necessary equipment for the camp and conference.
4. They shall have charge of all advertising.
5. They shall have charge of development and expansion of camp facilities.
6. The board shall hold an organizational meeting following the election in conference, and department heads shall be chosen and printed in the conference Journal.
7. The work of the Board shall be supervised under department heads, and each active minister of the District shall be assigned responsibility under a department head.
8. There shall be a department on development, expansion, and long range planning, of which the District Youth President shall be a member.
9. The board shall hold its first regular meeting in the second quarter of the conference year.
10. The selection of evangelists and singers by the board shall be approved by the district council before engaged as camp workers.

X. Camp Ushers

ORGANIZATION

1. Committee is appointed by the District Council.
2. Number of committee members four.
3. Committee Personnel: Any four persons.
4. Term: Committee members serve for one year.
5. The chairman is appointed by the district council, presides over and calls all meetings of the committee in cooperation with the district superintendent.

DUTIES

1. Be in charge of seating people where there is an overflow crowd.
2. Check with the Tabernacle clean-up chairman on the general appearance of the tabernacle and platform between services.
3. Operate the public address system.
4. See that song books are distributed.
5. Be on hand to pass out necessary literature.
6. Take care of the lights.
7. Check ventilation.
8. Select qualified men to receive the offering.
9. Usher special guests to the platform as the Superintendent requests during Camp.
10. Prepare platform for conference such as table, chairs, drinking water, etc.
11. Ushers are to meet with the chairman before conference to plan their work.

XI. Church Extension Committee

ORGANIZATION

1. Committee is appointed by the district council.
2. Number of committee members is six.
3. Committee personnel: District Treasurer, Missionary officer, Youth President, District Sunday School Secretary, and two others.
4. Term: Committee members serve for one year.
5. The chairman is appointed by the district council and presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the District superintendent.
6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
7. The recommended quorum is four.

DUTIES

1. To see that its work is carried in harmony with section 27 of the manual (1963 Journal Page 43, No. 20)
2. To inquire through the pastor and church, by request or solicitation of groups, by prayer and persuasion, where there may be possible locations for starting sunday schools and churches.
3. Consider any personal contact by mail or otherwise of any individual who has an interest in starting a church or sunday school in some area.
4. Shall seek out and recommend, locations for new churches and sunday schools, the amount of finance needed, and the way it is to be used and how it should be raised.

5. Organize a survey from the ministry, laity, and Owosso College for the purpose of determining the possibilities for a church in any community.
6. Organize "work groups" from the ministry and laity and any volunteers for emergency calls.
7. When all data is received and agreed upon by the committee a report shall be compiled, together with the committee's recommendations and filed with the district office for the district council's final approval before any projects are started.
8. It is recommended that this committee meet at least once a year at camp meeting time.

XII. Church Government

ORGANIZATION

1. Recommended name: Church Government Committee.
2. Committee is appointed by the district council.
3. Number of committee members is nine.
4. Committee Personnel: Two Ordained ministers and the district council.
5. Term: Committee members serve for one year.
6. The chairman and secretary are appointed by the district council.
7. The chairman presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent.
8. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
9. The recommended quorum is seven.

DUTIES

1. There shall be a chairman and secretary appointed each year during the quadrennium so that the committee may give annual consideration to its work.
2. This committee shall study the government of our church only where it relates to the manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and report when requested on all such work assigned them by the Annual Conference and district council.
3. The committee shall recommend not more than five resolutions to the Annual Conference for their approval, copies of which shall be supplied delegates two weeks prior to such conference. (Manual Sec. 83 Pf. 1 (14)).

XIII. Conference Committee

ORGANIZATION

1. Committee is appointed by the district council.
(1963 Journal Page 42 No. 18)
2. Number of committee members is nine.

3. Committee Personnel: Nine active ordained pastors and the district treasurer, and district superintendent, and that two of the active pastors appointed be the District youth president, and district Sunday School Secretary.
4. Term: Three serve for one year, three for two years, and three for three years, and three appointed each year thereafter for three years.
5. The chairman shall be appointed by the district council, and shall preside over and call all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent.
6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
7. The recommended quorum is seven.

DUTIES

1. Meet at the call of the chairman at least one month before conference.
2. Receive all signed resolutions for their study, resolutions to be in the hands of the committee by May 1st.
3. Appoint members of this committee to be responsible to study, prepare and plan any phase of the committee's work and report same to the committee.
4. Provide all delegates with mimeographed copies of resolutions recommended by the committee two weeks before conference.
5. Report the committee's recommendations to the Annual Conference.
6. Provide the district secretary with typewritten copies of all resolutions approved by the conference.
7. Do any research work and study any matter requested of them by the annual conference or district council and report on the same as requested.

XIV. District Trustees

ORGANIZATION

1. Recommended name: District board of trustees.
2. Nominated by the district council and elected by the annual conference.
3. There shall be three board members.
4. Board personnel: Corporation by-laws require three district council members to serve.
5. Term: Three shall serve for one year (Manual Sec.98).
6. The chairman shall be elected by the board.
7. The chairman presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent and functions only with the district council.

DUTIES

1. To hold all property belonging to the district in trust for the Pilgrim Holiness Church. (Manual Sec. 99, pf. 1).

2. To attend to all legal matters pertaining to the District.
3. To sign all legal papers for loans, money borrowed, renting, selling and buying property and disposing of the proceeds as ordered by the district council.
(Manual Sec. 219 Pf.2, Sec. 220 Pf.2, Sec. 221.)
4. Shall be called as desired by the district council.

XV. Examining and Educational Board

ORGANIZATION

1. This board is elected by the District Conference from nominations by the district council (Manual Sec. 102, Pf.5).
2. Number of elected board members is six.
3. Board personnel: Six ordained ministers and the district superintendent.
4. Term: Two serve for one year, two for two years, two for three years, and two elected each year thereafter for three years.
5. The district superintendent shall be the chairman, and preside over and call all meetings of the board (1963 Journal page 41, no. 10).
6. The secretary shall record the minutes and file them within **ten days after each meeting** with the district office.
7. The recommended quorum is four.

DUTIES

1. They shall examine all applicants for new and renewal of license, including singers (Manual Sec. 95 Pf.1 (1), sec. 97 and 145).
2. Require applicants to sign questionnaire of the general Board. (Manual Sec. 95 Pf.1 (2)).
3. Examine ordained and licensed ministers on questions of **doctrine, character, and conduct.** (Manual Sec. 95 Pf.2)
4. Notify ordination candidates fifteen days prior to conference. (1963 Journal Page 41, no.11)
5. See that board actions are subject to the approval of the district council. (Manual Sec. 102 Pf.3)
6. Give an annual report to the district conference. (Manual Sec. 95 Pf.1 (3)).
7. Maintain a permanent file, on all ministers examined, for the district office; the secretary to do this.
8. Meet at least by the first Tuesday in May of each year.

XVI. Missionary Society

ORGANIZATION

1. The Society Secretary and Treasurer and two advisory members are appointed by the district council.
2. Number of society members is five.

3. Society Personnel: Lay women and/or ministers wives.
4. Term: All members shall serve for one year.
5. The chairman (President) shall be elected by the conference from two or more nominations by the district Council, and shall preside over and call all meetings of the society in cooperation with the District Superintendent.
6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
7. The recommended quorum is three.

DUTIES

1. President: (Manual Sec. 79 Pf.7)
 - (a) Organize adult and junior missionary societies in the local churches where they desire them.
 - (b) Give direction and assistance to organized societies.
 - (c) Arrange zone missionary rallies in the district.
 - (d) Promote missionary interest at camp meetings.
 - (e) Arrange with the district council or camp board for special missionary services at camp meeting.
 - (f) Report annually to the district conference on district missionary society activities.
 - (g) Serve as a member of the annual conference (Sec. 79 Pf5)
2. Secretary (Manual Sec. 79 Pf.8)
 - (a) Record minutes of meetings of the district missionary committee.
 - (b) Notify the local presidents of dates and places of missionary rallies.
 - (c) Keep a record of the district missionary zone rallies.
 - (d) Assist the District Missionary President in promoting missionary society work throughout the district.
3. Treasurer: (Manual Sec. 79 Pf.9)
 - (a) To receive and disburse all missionary society monies.
 - (b) Forward to the district treasurer money designated for General Church purposes.
 - (c) Report the finance of the society to the District Conference annually.
4. Missionary Society: (Manual Sec. 79 Pf. 1).
 - (a) Shall stimulate missionary interest.
 - (b) Coordinate activities on three levels:
 - District Home Missions
 - General Church Extension
 - And World Missions
 - (c) Raise funds for the necessary operation of its district function. (Manual Sec. 79 Pf.4)
 - (d) They shall be amenable to the district council. (Manual Sec. 79 Pf.6)

XVII. Memoirs Committee

ORGANIZATION

1. Recommended name: Memoirs Committee.
2. Committee is appointed by the district council.
3. Number of members on the committee shall be two.

4. Committee Personnel: Two ordained ministers or their wives.
5. Term: Two shall serve for one year
6. Chairman shall be appointed by the district council.
7. The chairman presides over and calls all meetings of the committee in cooperation with the district superintendent.

DUTIES

1. This committee shall secure information and prepare a report on the death of any person holding credentials in this district, including a brief history of their work and service for the church.
2. They shall file their report with the district office within thirty days following such death for the district superintendent's approval.
3. All such death reports approved by the district superintendent shall be filed with the advocate office by the chairman of the committee.
4. The chairman shall give a typewritten report to the annual conference each year.

XVIII. Ordination Committee

ORGANIZATION

1. This committee is appointed by the district council.
2. Number of appointed members is five.
3. Committee Personnel: Five ordained ministers.
4. Committee members serve for one year.
5. The district superintendent shall be the chairman, and preside over and call all meetings.

DUTIES

1. This committee shall sign the certificates for ordination of candidates. (Manual Sec. 153)
2. This committee shall meet before conference to set up a specific order of service for the ordination of candidates.
3. They shall assist the General Chairman of the Conference in the ordination of candidates. (Manual Sec. 152 Pf.2)

XIX. Minister's Conference Committee

ORGANIZATION

1. Committee is appointed by the district council.
2. Number of committee members is six.
3. Committee Personnel: Ministers.
4. Term: Two serve for one year, two for two years, two for three years, and two appointed each year thereafter for three years.

5. The chairman is appointed by the district council, presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent.
6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district superintendent.
7. The recommended quorum is four.

DUTIES

1. The committee shall arrange the program, set the date, and place of the Ministers conference.
2. They shall plan a one-day ministerial prayer retreat.
3. They shall notify all ministers of such above mentioned meetings for the ministry.

XX. Pilgrim Loan and Investment, Inc.

ORGANIZATION

1. Board members are elected by the conference from nominations by the district council
2. Number of board members is nine.
3. Board personnel: Six laymen and three ordained ministers.
4. Term: Three shall serve for one year, three for two years, three for three years, and three elected each year thereafter for three years.
5. The chairman shall be elected by the board of directors, and shall preside over and call all meetings of the board in cooperation with the district superintendent.
6. The secretary of the board shall record the minutes and file them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
7. The established quorum is five.

DUTIES

1. This board shall be governed by the by-laws of the corporation as approved by the annual conference.

XXI. Reception Committee

ORGANIZATION

1. The committee is appointed by the district council.
2. Number of committee members is three.
3. Committee personnel: Three ordained ministers.
4. Term: One to serve for one year, one to serve for two years, one to serve for three years, and one appointed each year thereafter to serve for three years.
5. The chairman is appointed by the district council, and presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent.

DUTIES

1. This committee shall keep a register of all visitors and guests and file them with the District Secretary.
2. Assist in their entertainment by providing information as to dining and room accommodations in cooperation with the host or hostess.
3. Introduce special guests to the chairman of the meeting.
4. This committee may advise with the clerk concerning the arrival of any guests during camp and conference and coordinate and plan their activity for such meeting.
5. This committee is to function at all district meetings and to be present one half hour before starting time of services for the purpose of efficiency.

XXII. Statistician

ORGANIZATION

1. The committee is appointed by the district council.
2. Number of committee members is one.
3. Committee Personnel: Anyone.
4. Term: He shall serve for one year.

DUTIES

1. He shall compile the annual reports of the churches of the district.
2. He shall prepare charts for the annual conference of the compiled annual reports.

XXIII. Sunday School Board

ORGANIZATION

1. The Board shall be appointed by the district council.
2. Number of appointed members shall be four.
3. Board personnel: Four ordained ministers and the district superintendent.
4. Term: One to serve for one year, one for two years, and one for three years, and the Chairman appointed each year by the district council (Manual Sec. 69 Pf.2, 3)
5. The chairman(Promotional Secretary) presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent.
6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days following each meeting with the district office.
7. The recommended quorum is three.

DUTIES

1. They shall supervise district sunday school work in cooperation with the General Secretary of Sunday schools. (Manual Sec. 69 Pf. 4)

2. They shall encourage the organization and maintenance of a sunday school in each church of the district.
3. They shall establish mission sunday schools where practicable.
4. Plan district or zone conventions or institutes in cooperation with the district superintendent.
5. Arrange sundty school services at general gatherings, such as camp meetings, conferences, etc.
6. The chairman(Promotional Secretary) shall report for the board regularly to the district conference and the General Secretary of sunday schools.
7. They shall provide an outline of the projected program and goals for each conference year in the conference journal.

XXIV. Visitation Committee

ORGANIZATION

1. The committee is appointed by the District Superintendent.
2. Number of committee members is three.
3. Committee personnel: Any three qualified persons.
4. Term: All three serve for one year.
5. The chairman is appointed by the district superintendent and presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent.
6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
7. Recommended quorum is two.

DUTIES

1. They shall plan and promote a program of lay visitation in the local churches of the district.
2. They shall provide the outline of such a program so that it may become a matter of record in the conference journal as approved by the annual conference.

Recommended Outline of Visitation Program

1. Preach several sermons on this New Testament plan.
2. Make a large map of your field, block off into Zones your entire church territory. Number the zones for easy reference in your records.
3. Set up a 4x6 file drawer to correspond with your map.
4. Organization of workers.
5. Ways of securing prospects.
6. Classify and file prospects as follows:
 - a. Members of your own church, or non-church members who prefer it.

b. Church members or non-church members who actually have no church or denominational preference of any kind anywhere--more or less indifferent as to denomination.

c. Non-church members who have a church or denominational preference other than yours.

d. Church members whose church is too far away for them to attend at all or only occasionally, yet they prefer another church or denomination that is not in the community or accessible. In this category would appear those of other Protestant denominations.

ORGANIZATION

1. Elect visitation director.

a. Qualifications: a deacon, elder, or official of the church; a man or woman of deep convictions, energetic, capable of leadership, spiritually sound, filled with the Holy Spirit. (Acts 6:3)

b. How elected: he may be appointed by nominating committee, the church board, or pastor, then elected by church. He should be inspired with an appreciation of the importance of the position.

2. Elect visitation secretary.

a. Qualifications: This person may be a deacon or deaconess, elder, or any member of the church who knows how to take notes, follow simple directions, keep accurate records and is dependable. This office could be held by one of the captains, or possibly the Pastor's secretary.

3. Elect zone captains.

a. Qualifications: Person of deep convictions, energetic, capable of leadership, spiritually sound, and filled with the Spirit.

b. How elected: Same as visitation director.

4. All members helpers.

a. Qualifications: Must be a resident member of the local church, or an individual who is qualified for membership, having a Christian experience.

b. How elected: Every church member automatically becomes a helper.

Note: Detailed copy of Lay Visitation Plan may be obtained from the office of the District Superintendent or Lay Visitation Committee.

Standing Rules

Camp Meeting

1. **Camp Date** - Be it resolved that the Camp Meeting date be set to begin the second Friday in July.
2. **Camp Board** - Be it resolved that the Camp Board consist of 11 members, which shall include the District Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent, the District Secretary, the District Treasurer and the District Youth President. Two members shall be elected annually from nominations by the District Council, for a three year term. No member shall be re-elected until he has been off the board for three years. The chairman is to be appointed by the District Council for a three-year term, and shall preside over all meetings.

The Board shall secure all workers for Camp and Conference, supervise building and grounds, purchase good and necessary equipment for camp and conference and have charge of all advertising. They shall also have charge of development and expansion of camp facilities. The board shall hold an organizational meeting following the election in conference, and department heads shall be chosen and printed in the conference Journal. The work of the Board shall be supervised under department heads, and each active minister of the Dist. shall be assigned responsibility under a department head. There shall be a department on development, expansion, and long range planning, of which the District Youth President shall be a member. The board shall hold its first regular meeting in the second quarter of the conference year. The selection of evangelists and singers by the board shall be approved by the district council before engaged as camp workers.
3. **Camp Labor** - Be it resolved that each church in the conference of less than 20 members give 2 days labor or \$20.00; 20 to 50 members 4 days or \$40.00; above 50 members give 6 days or \$60.00 to employ help to make ready for the annual camp meeting and construction of new buildings and maintenance until a maintenance man be employed. This call may be issued by the District Council or Camp Board.
4. **Leasing of Lots** - Be it resolved that the District lease lots on the camp grounds to ministers and laymen desiring them as follows: The lease fee shall be \$125.00 if paid in cash. Terms: \$145.00 at the rate of \$25.00 down and \$10.00 per month for one year.

The District shall plant one tree on each lot and shall gravel the street in front of lots.
5. **Sunday School Sessions** - Be it resolved that on the two Sundays during camp meeting that there be a Sunday School Session beginning at 9:30 until 10:15 a.m. following the Testimony meeting, and that said session be arranged and supervised by the Sunday School committee.

Be it further resolved that a credit card be given to all in attendance and that each card be signed and returned by the pupil to their local church Sunday School Secretary for the attendance record and reports to the conference.
6. **Children's Meetings** - Be it resolved that we have children's meetings during the afternoon and evening services of camp.
7. **Youth Activities** - Be it resolved that the Youth department and the camp board be in charge of and provide for all youth activities during the annual camp meeting.

Conference

8. **Fiscal Year** - The conference year shall close May 31 and all reports be mailed to the Conference Statistician by June 15.
9. **The Examining and Educational Board** - shall consist of six ordained ministers, with the District Superintendent as chairman. Two members to be elected each year for a three year term. The chairman shall have Sections 105 and 107 of the Manual read to all District licentiates. This board is to meet at least by the first Tuesday of May of each year, and the Secretary to maintain a file on all ministers for the District office. Ordination candidates are to be notified fifteen days prior to Conference.
10. **Ordination Service** - Be it resolved that the order of business on the first night of the Conference be the ordination service. Whereas the minister's wife makes a vital contribution to her husband's work, therefore we recommend that the wife of the candidate be given honorary seat with the candidate during the ordination service.
11. **Election of Officers** - Inasmuch as most religious bodies follow the order of having elections immediately following district reports, and inasmuch as many conferences of the Pilgrim Holiness Church follow the same order, therefore be it resolved that election of officers be immediately following district reports.

Whereas there has been successive balloting for important offices and whereas this has often resulted in the election of individuals to several positions of officialdom, therefore be it resolved that balloting for respective officers shall be taken care of in regular and proper sequence. The election results shall be posted immediately.
12. **Greetings** Whereas we have missionaries who are members of this conference serving on foreign fields and being deprived of the privileges we enjoy while being together in the Conference; therefore be it resolved that the Conference Secretary send greetings to all missionaries who are members of this Conference.
13. **District Paper** - There is some demand for a District paper, and whereas there is not financial provision for the same, be it resolved that the District Council prorate the costs, such as printing, postage and secretarial help among the four departments of the District.
14. **District Calendar** - The District Superintendent shall meet with the heads of the departments to prepare a district calendar and this to be placed in Conference Journal annually. Within thirty days after the annual conference a copy of this calendar shall be sent to each pastor, Sunday School Superintendent, Missionary Society President and Youth Society President.
15. **Appointment of committees** - The District Council shall appoint all committees. The Standing Committees are to be appointed to include new men where possible and to avoid duplication of men on several committees. It is recommended that the entire constitution be considered.

16. **Building and Finance Committee** - The District Council shall appoint a Building and Finance Committee composed of five appointed members and the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer who shall serve for one year. The Chairman, appointed by the District Council, shall report annually to the Conference.

All churches and church boards must have the approval of said committee before the purchase of building sites or the erecting of building or improvements in excess of \$500.00. They shall recommend to the District Council the amount of indebtedness the local church shall be able to carry. Be it further resolved that:

- a. Any church unable to pay their United Stewardship fund in full shall contact the chairman of this committee at least 90 days before the close of the Conference year.
- b. Any church wanting to finance property, either building or buying, shall contact the chairman of this committee.
- c. The local church shall receive the report from the committee and the District Council in not more than 30 days following request.

17. **Conference Committee** - Be it resolved that the District Council appoint a committee of nine persons and the District Superintendent and District Treasurer, to serve for three years. The District Council shall designate one member of the committee to serve as chairman. Two of the nine members shall be the District Youth President and the

District Sunday School Secretary.

This committee shall be known as the Conference Committee and shall have the following duties:

1. Meet at the call of the chairman at least one month before Conference.
2. Receive all signed resolutions for their study and approval. (Resolution to be in the hands of the committee by May 1st.)
3. Appoint members of the committee to be responsible to study, prepare and plan any phase of the Committee's work, and report same to the committee.
4. Provide all delegates with mimeographed copies of resolutions recommended by the committee two weeks before conference.
5. Report the committee's recommendations to the Annual Conference.
6. Provide the District Secretary with typewritten copies of all resolutions approved by the Conference.
7. Do any research work and study any matter requested of them by the Annual Conference or District Council and report on the same as requested.

18. **Church Extension Committee** - Be it resolved that a District Church Extension Committee be appointed by the District Council, to consist of the District Treasurer, the Sunday School Secretary, the District Youth President, one member of the District Missionary Executive Committee, and two members, to serve for one year. The Chairman shall be appointed by the District Council.

The duties of this committee shall be as follows:

1. To see that it's work is carried out in Harmony with Section 27 of the 1962 Manual.
 2. To inquire through pastor and church, by request or solicitation of groups, by prayer and persuasion, where there may be possible locations for starting Sunday Schools and Churches.
 3. Consider any personal contact by mail or otherwise of any individual who has an interest in starting a Church or Sunday School in some area.
 4. Shall seek out and recommend, locations for new churches and Sunday Schools, the amount of finance needed, and the way it is to be used and how it should be raised.
 5. Organize a survey from the ministry, laity, and Owosso College for the purpose of determining the possibilities for our Church in any community.
 6. Organize "Work groups" from the Ministry and laity and any volunteers for emergency calls.
 7. When all data is received and agreed upon by the committee, a report shall be compiled, together with the committee's recommendations, and filed with the District Office for District Council final approval before any projects are started.
 8. It is recommended that this committee meet at least once a year at camp meeting time.
19. **Lay Visitation Committee** - Be it resolved that the Lay Visitation Committee of three be appointed by the District Superintendent who shall serve for one year. The chairman to be appointed by the District Superintendent.
- They shall plan and promote a program of lay visitation in the local churches of the District. They shall provide the outline of such a program so that it may become a matter of record in the Conference journal as approved by the annual conference.
20. **Prayer and Fasting League** - Be it resolved that in keeping with the program of our church that we urge each church in our Conference to organize a Prayer and Fasting League. The objectives of the Prayer and Fasting League shall be:
1. It shall not take place of the regular church prayer meeting.
 2. The League Membership shall be directed to pray for the general interest of our Church at home and abroad.
 3. They shall be encouraged to pray for the local community needs.
 4. That where advisable the pastor shall provide a list of definite needs for each member of the League covering such needs as:
Unsaved families in the community.
Unsaved families in the Sunday School.
Unsaved individual church objectives and needs.

Organization:

- a. The pastor shall act as director of the prayer and Fasting League.
- b. The pastor shall recommend one or more names of the official board who shall appoint a secretary to work with the pastor.
- c. The secretary shall form a membership list. Membership in League shall be volunteer membership of the church, Sunday school, youth society, and friends of the church.
- d. The membership shall be kept active by being revised twice each year, September 1, and March 1 of each Conference year.
- e. Whereas this is a new Conference venture, we hereby ask that the next ministerial meeting of this Conference set aside one hour for open discussion of this district project so that better understanding and organization may be perfected at our next District Conference.

Finance

21. **United Stewardship Fund** - Whereas we are in full accord with the plan of God, namely tithes and offerings for financing the work of the kingdom and advise our people to tithe their income into the local church, therefore be it resolved:
 - a. Each local church shall tithe its receipts.
 - b. Each Sunday School shall tithe its receipts.
 - c. Each local Youth Society shall tithe its receipts.
 - d. Each Youth Zone shall tithe its Zone offerings.
 - e. Each pastor shall send direct or through the local church treasurer one-half tithe of his church salary to the District Treasurer for the Administrative Fund.

These tithes shall be sent each month to the respective Department Treasurers, and forwarded by said treasurer to the District Treasurer. These tithes shall not include loans or money from a sale of land or buildings.

Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer send the Equivalent of \$8.00 per member to the General Treasurer for the General United Stewardship fund and that the District Stewardship Fund be divided as follows:

44 percent administration, 8 percent Owosso College, 5 percent Ministerial Benefit, 2 percent General Conference, 7 percent property debt, 21 percent Church Extension, 5½ percent Sunday school, 4½ percent Youth and 3 percent loan fund.

22. **Camp and Conference Expense** - Whereas there is a great deal of expense in connection with the annual camp meeting and conference, let each church pay into the District Treasury one (1) percent of their regular offerings to be designated for Camp meeting and Conference expenses.

Inasmuch as it is impossible under the present set-up to any longer give free entertainment to our ministers and their families, therefore be it further resolved that ministers and their families be responsible for their lodging and meals.

Exception shall be all retired ministers, full time pastors and their families whose salary is under \$50.00 per week, and all full time camp workers as determined by the CAMP Board.

Be it further resolved that during the Annual Conference all delegates (Ministerial and Lay) be given their meals free and that the District Superintendent, his wife, and members of his family under 16 years of age shall be given meals and lodging without charge during the Annual Camp and Conference.

Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer pay out of the Administrative fund the Pension Plan, Medical and Hospitalization insurance for the District Superintendent.

23. **Missionary Society 10 percent** - Be it resolved that 10 percent of the local missionary societies regular offerings be sent to the District Missionary Treasurer for yearly projects and district expense.
24. **District and General Fund** - All specified monies raised in the Local Church for District and General work shall be sent to the District Treasurer, who shall forward General funds to the General Treasurer.
25. **Salaries** - The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$5200.00 per year plus 7 cents per mile traveling expense. The District Treasurer shall receive \$500.00 per year; the District Secretary, \$300.00, the District Sunday School Secretary \$100.00; the Youth Director, \$100.00, the District Statistician, \$65.00. All District Officials receive 6 cents per mile for all miles traveled in the interest of the District.
26. **Camp Funds Report** - The District Treasurer shall submit an itemized report of Camp Meeting Funds as recorded in the 1945 Conference Journal page 13. This report to appear in the Journal.
27. **District Audit** - Be it resolved that all Treasurers books of the District be audited annually by a certified Public Accountant so that a report from the auditor can be given to the Conference when called for.
28. **Pilgrim Loan and Investment Inc.** - Whereas there is a need for a more adequate loan program known as East Michigan Pilgrim Loan and Investment Inc., be adopted and replace our present Church Extension Loan Fund.
29. **Owosso College** - Inasmuch as Owosso College has a successful history in training young people for Christian service, and inasmuch as the General Board has assigned the state of Michigan as the patronizing territory for Owosso College; Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference go on record in pledging to the College its full cooperation and prayerful support, and open the doors of its churches to a representative of the College at which time the financial needs of the College shall be presented;

Inasmuch as the month of May has been designated by the General Church as Education month, be it further resolved that the Sunday following Mother's Day be designated as Owosso College Day and an offering of \$1.00 or more per member be set as a goal. Be it further resolved that we grant the Bible Department of Owosso College time in our Annual Conference to remind us of this relationship with the College, and to report on the same.

Ministerial

30. **Pastoral Recall** - Be it resolved that the vote on the recall of the pastor shall be taken prior to May 15, this vote shall be taken by secret ballot and shall not be counted in the local church, but shall be placed in an envelope and sealed in the presence of voting body and sent directly to District Superintendent who shall report the results of the vote to the Pastor and the church Secretary.

All ministers receiving calls from churches shall notify the District Superintendent at the time he gives his decision to the church.

31. **Pastors at Camp** - Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend the annual camp meetings each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the camp, and the pastors shall be required to attend the entire camp meeting with the exception of Sunday morning.
32. **Insurance** - Whereas the majority of Pilgrim Holiness ministers of the East Michigan Conference have expressed interest for participation in the Blue Cross-Blue Shield protection on a group basis, be it resolved: There shall be a Blue Cross Treasurer, appointed by the Council instructed to act for the ministers and personnel in relations with the representatives of the Michigan Hospital service and Michigan Medical service. The Blue Cross treasurer shall receive all periodic subscriptions from the ministers and make payments of the same to Blue Cross-Blue Shield.

Be it further resolved that we recommend each local church pay their pastor's Medical and Hospitalization insurance.

33. **Parsonage Utilities** - The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is located. The district shall provide the same for the District Parsonage.
34. **Pension Plan** - Each local church shall contribute to the Pilgrim Pension Plan fund each month an amount equivalent to 6 percent of the pastor's salary for the year ending March 31, 1964. 7 percent for the year ending March 31, 1965 and 8 percent thereafter. These monies are to be remitted to the District Treasurer, who will forward the same to the Pension Plan Treasurer. If the pastor of a local church is not a member of the Pilgrim Pension Plan, the above percentages paid by the local church of which he is a pastor, shall be placed in a fund to assist aged ministers.
35. **Burial Benefit** - Each local church shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association, and pay the

expense of their membership and each call thereafter from the church treasury.

All general full-time evangelists and their wives receiving their principal support from their meetings shall be enrolled in the M. B. A. and said membership and each call thereafter shall be paid by the church of which he is a member.

The District Superintendent and his wife shall be enrolled in the M. B. A. and the expense be paid from the Administrative fund.

Home Missionary pastors and wives are included in this action, the expense to be paid from the Home Missionary Treasury.

The retired elderly ministers and wives are included in this action the expense to be paid from the Ministerial Relief fund.

36. **Vacations** - It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a two weeks vacation with pay, and that the District Superintendent shall be given two-weeks vacation with pay.
37. **Minister's Conference Committee** - Be it resolved that the Minister's Conference Committee be composed of six members, two of which will be appointed each year for a three year term, by the District Council. A chairman shall also be appointed by the District Council.

This committee shall set the date, arrange the program, and notify the ministers for both the Minister's Conference and the one day ministerial prayer retreat. It is recommended that the Committee plan its work three years in advance.
38. **Ministers Conference** - Be it resolved that we have two pastors conferences; one in the Spring and one in the Fall each year. Be it further resolved this be placed in Standing Rules.
39. **Retiring Superintendent** - Be it resolved that whenever there shall be elected another District Superintendent, that the Council earnestly endeavor to place said retiring Superintendent in satisfactory position.
40. **Death Notice** - Since in the past on several occasions District Ministers, Widows have deceased without the ministers being notified of their death, therefore be it resolved that in the case of the death of a minister or his widow, the District Secretary notify the ministers of the district.

Be it further resolved that we request the Michigan District to give us this information from their District.

Whereas this Youth Conference appreciated the help and leadership of Rev. C. R. Hendrick, our District Superintendent, in the youth work; therefore, be it resolved that we acknowledge our gratitude by a rising vote of thanks.

Whereas the Cresthaven Pilgrim Holiness Church has so graciously opened its doors to this Conference; therefore, be it resolved that we express our appreciation to Rev. Schmidt and the Cresthaven Church by a rising vote of thanks.

Standing Rules

DISTRICT

1. YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Inasmuch as we feel that it is helpful for our Conference to know what the Youth Department is accomplishing, therefore, be it resolved, that we request permission for the District Youth President to give a report to the District (adult) Conference each year.

2. ZONE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Be it resolved that the zone presidents give a written report at the Youth Conference.

3. CONFERENCE ELECTION

Inasmuch as the election of our District Youth Officers is important to the other business of the Conference; therefore, be it resolved that the election of officers be the first order of business following the reports.

4. PRINTING PROCEEDINGS

Inasmuch as it is helpful to have a permanent record of our youth work, therefore, be it resolved that we request that our journal of proceedings be published in the Conference Journal each year.

5. YOUTH CALENDAR

Be it resolved that the following dates be placed in the Standing Rules. Youth Conference and Convention the Third Saturday in May. Youth Leaders Day the second Saturday of September, and the District Youth Rally the first Saturday of November.

6. YOUTH COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that all youth committees appointed by the District Youth President be placed in the Youth section of the Conference Journal.

7. MINUTES FROM CONFERENCE AND COUNCIL MEETINGS

Be it resolved that a copy of the Minutes of the Annual District Youth Conference and District Youth Council meetings be mailed to the District Superintendent within 10 days following such meetings.

8. DISTRICT JUNIOR-SENIOR BANQUET

Whereas the recent District Junior-Senior Banquet was so well received and attended; therefore, be it resolved that an Annual District Junior-Senior Banquet be planned for the first Saturday of May.

ZONE

9. DISTRICT YOUTH OFFICERS SALARIES

Be it resolved that the District Youth President receive \$100.00 per year, the District Treasurer \$50.00 per year, and the District Youth Secretary \$25.00 per year for their services.

10. NOMINATIONS FOR ZONE PRESIDENTS

Whereas the District Council presents two names per zone for the election of Zone Presidents to the Youth Conference, and whereas the District Youth President is in close touch with

each Zone; therefore, be it resolved that we request the District Youth President be allowed to meet with the District Council when making these nominations.

11. ZONE PRESIDENTS' REPORTS

Whereas there has been a lack of communication between the Zones and the District Youth President; therefore, be it resolved that each Zone President report each Zone Rally to the District Youth President as soon as possible after each rally. Be it further resolved that the District Youth President provide to all Zone Presidents a uniform report blank.

12. ZONE OFFICERS ELECTION

Inasmuch as the Zone Treasurer should be a qualified person; therefore be it resolved that the Zone Treasurer be elected from nominations made by the Zone Executive Committee.

13. ZONE COUNCIL

Inasmuch as there has been a lack of uniformity in the composition of the Zone Councils; therefore be it resolved that the Zone council shall consist of elected zone officers, local Youth Presidents or some other local officer in the President's absence. One Pastor to be elected as counsellor if a pastor was not elected to the Zone Council.

14. ZONE RALLY COUNT

Whereas there is a need to encourage our youth to attend zone rallies, therefore be it resolved that we adopt the following plan to be used to determine the count in all Zones: Under 12 one point each service, over 35 one point each service, between 12 and 35 three points each service. This includes Pastor and Youth President regardless of age. Pastor and Youth President are to be given a 10 point bonus each if they attend both services. This is added to the handicap for total points. In case the rally consists of only one service, the Pastor and Youth President shall still be given the 10 point bonus.

FIGURING THE HANDICAP - Subtract the number of active and associate members of the local society from 100, then multiply by .6.

EXAMPLE -Local Society has 22 active and associate members.

100 less 22 equals 78. $78 \times .6$ equals 46.8 or a 47 handicap.

15. NUMBER OF RALLIES

Inasmuch as there is a need of uniformity as to the number of zone rallies held each year, therefore, be it resolved that the minimum number of rallies per zone be set at four per year.

16. ZONE FINANCE

Whereas our zones will receive no finance from local societies; therefore be it resolved that zone monies received be retained for the financial operation of the zone, except the 10 per cent tithe which will be sent to the District Youth Treasurer.

17. Be it resolved that each zone shall pay 6 cents per mile, as traveling expense to any District Officer visiting the zone in the interest of youth work in addition to any honorarium given him.

18. ZONE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Be it resolved that no church shall have more than one person elected to the zone executive committee.

LOCAL

19. FINANCIAL SYSTEM

Be it resolved that each local society pay 10 per cent of society receipts to the District Youth Treasurer. Be it further resolved that the District Youth Department request 4½ per cent for the District Youth Operational Fund from the District Treasurer.

20. Whereas we wish to co-operate with the General Youth Department's request for finances; therefore be it resolved that each local Youth Society pay 5 per cent of the societies receipts each month to the District Youth Treasurer for the General Youth Department.

21. LOCAL YOUTH PRESIDENTS

Be it resolved that the names and addresses of the local youth presidents be placed in the Youth section of the Conference Journal.

CAMP

22. YOUTH ACTIVITIES DURING CAMP MEETING

Be it resolved that the Youth Department and the Camp Board be in charge of, and provide for all youth activities during the Annual District Camp Meeting.

23. YOUTH CAMPS

Be it resolved that the date and number of youth camps be decided upon by the District Youth Council and the Camp Board.

24. YOUTH CAMP SUPPORT

Whereas there will be no youth camp offerings received in the zones; therefore, be it resolved that funds for development and improvement of our youth camp be raised through district youth projects.

COLLEGE

25. YOUTH IN ACTION DAY

Whereas Owosso College is planning a yearly Youth In Action Day; therefore be it resolved that we support this program .

Duties Of Zone Officers

President:

1. Meet with the Zone Committee and plan dates in advance for Zone Rallies
2. Send a copy of dates which have been set for Zone meetings to the District Youth President and to all Pastors in the Zone.
3. Plan and promote all Zone Rallies.
4. Preside at all Zone Rallies.
5. Report all Zone Rallies to the District Youth President.
6. Give attention to financial matters of the Zone.
7. Serve on the District Youth Council.
8. Co-operate in promoting the District and National Youth Program.
9. Must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the local youth society.
10. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the Zone.

Vice-President:

1. Serve on the Zone Committee.
2. Serve for one year as the Zone President requests.
3. Must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the bank all monies immediately upon receiving.

Treasurer:

1. Receive and disburse funds as directed by the Zone Committee.
2. Keep accurate records of receipts and disbursements and bank all monies immediately upon receiving.
3. Send in regularly 10 per cent of all offerings to the district youth treasurer.
4. Send a treasurer's report at least twice a year to the Zone Pastors.
5. Serve on the Zone Committee.
6. Must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the local youth society.

Secretary:

1. Keep minutes of all Zone Committee meetings.
2. Help the Zone President with Zone correspondence.
3. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local youth officers in the Zone.
4. Must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the local youth society.
