Conference Proceedings

FIRST SITTING

The first sitting of the Eleventh Annual Conference of the East Michigan District convened at 9:00 A.M., July 7, 1966.

The Conference opened with Rev. H. James Kreider leading in the singing of "The Solid Rock" and "He Hideth My Soul." Rev. Rev. J. A. Hiatt read the scripture lesson, Ephesians 3. Rev. Raymond Dean lead in the opening praver.

Rev. C. R. Hendrick, District Superintendent, introduced the presiding Chairman of the Conference, Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, Dr. Snyder stated that he would address the Conference at the opening of the afternoon session. After appropriate remarks, Dr. Snyder called the Conference to order.

The Roll Call was completed and accepted as presented by the District Secretary, Rev. M. C. House.

It was carried that the time of the sittings be from 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon, 1:30 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. and from 7:30 P.M. to 9:00 P.M.

Nyle Ruppert, Fourth Year Licenciate from the Michigan District.

Carried that these Ministers be accepted into the Conference and be seated within the Conference bar.

The following guests were introduced to the Conference and given honorary seats within the bar, namely: Rev. Clyde Marshall, District Superintendent of the Michigan District, Rev. Larry Kessor, pastor from Jackson, Michigan and Rev. Drummond, pastor from Alma, Michigan.

Rev. L. R. Neff read the report of the Examining and Educational Board. Carried that this report be accepted as read.

Mrs. Beulah Warner, Stevens Van Lines was introduced to the Conference. She gave words of greeting and offered their moving services to the Conference ministers. She was extended an honorary seat within the Conference Bar.

Dr. Elliott brought greetings from Owosso College and gave a brief report on the progress of the College. Carried that Dr. Elliott be granted an honorary seat within the Conference Bar.

Reporting further was:

Dr. Snyder then commended the District on the efficient manner in which they pay their obligations both to the General and District interests.

After announcements, adjournment by expiration of time. Rev. Harold C. Rickner dismissed with prayer.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting convened at 1:30 P.M. with Rev. Gerald MacDonald leading in the singing of "He Abides." Rev. R. K. Fay lead in prayer.

Dr. Snyder then addressed the Conference using this scripture, I Timothy 4:16 as a basis for his address. He used two main thoughts: 1. Saving ourselves, and 2. Saving others. Rev. Hendrick presented the candidates to be ordained to Dr. Snyder, namely: Rev. Ronald Walker, ordained minister, and Mrs. Hilda Gibson, ordained deaconess.

The following scriptures were read:

I Timothy 3:1-10 by Rev. H. C. Rickner

II Timothy 4:1-8 by Rev. William Doe Titus 3:1-11 by Rev. G. V. Skinner

Dr. Snyder read II Chronicles 16-7-11 as the basis for his address to the candidates. He gave three qualifications God wants of the minister:

1. Men who will get quiet enough to hear the voice and message of God.

2. A minister who will have courage enough to deliver that msesage.

3. A minister who will be honest enough to live that message.

Rev. Hendrick prayed the dedicatory prayer for Rev. Ronald Walker.

Dr. Snyder then gave the charge to Rev. Walker.

Rev. Rickner prayed the dedicatory prayer for Mrs. Hilda Gibson.

Dr. Snyder gave the charge to Mrs. Gibson.

The tellers reported that Rev. M. C. House was elected as District Secretary, ballots having been cast during the second sitting. Ballots were cast for the Examining and Educational Board. Rev. Lester Nelsen and Rev. A. S. Joppie were elected for a three year term.

Rev. C. R. Dean was elected as District Treasurer.

Ballots were cast for the lay members to the Pilgrim Loan and Investments, Inc. Mr. Mason Mills and Paul Clark were elected.

Rev. John Hiatt was elected to the Pilgrim Loan and Investment, Inc.

Ballots were cast for the advisory members to the Council. Rev. Wm. Doe, Rev. Roy Webster and Rev. A. S. Joppie were elected.

It was moved and carried that we elect District Trustees by acclamation as follows: M. C. House, Wm. Doe and A. S. Joppie.

The report of the Conference Committee was accepted as read by Rev. Roy Webster.

The report of the Memoirs Committee was read by Rev. Ronald Walker.

Following this, the Chairman asked Rev. Rickner to present to Rev. and Mrs. Brown and Rev. and Mrs. Miller the token of appreciation from the District for their years of faithful and effective service given to this District.

FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting of the Conference opened with Rev. C. R. Hendrick leading in the singing of "We'll Work 'Til Jesus Comes."

The Minutes of the previous sitting were approved as read.

Rev. Webster reported for the Conference Committee.

Resolutions No. 10 and 11 regarding appreciations were accepted as read.

Resolution No. 12 was accepted as read.

It carried that this Conference authorize the ministers to meet immediately at the close of this session and that their business regarding the Ministerial shall be a part of this Conference Minutes.

The Ministerial Conference: The ministers confirmed the plan to have a Ministerial Retreat September 28 and 29.

The session Tuesday afternoon and evening will be given to recreational and Spiritual inspiration. The session Wednesday morning, September 29 shall be devoted to District interests. This motion passed.

Dr. Snyder expressed appreciation to the Conference for their cooperation. It carried that this Conference be adjourned.

All joined in singing "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder." Dr. Snyder dismissed the Conference with prayer.

Report of The District Superintendent

To our General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, Lay Delegates, Fellow Ministers, and Friends of East Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church — greetings in Christ's Name!

Once again the pendulum on God's dispensational clock has completed another stroke, marking off another year in the history of our District.

What has been done cannot be undone, the last page in this chapter has been completed. Yet, God has permitted us to gather here to begin another chapter, and we, I am sure, will be wise to profit from any mistakes of the past year, and quick to praise God for any successes which might have been attained.

At this point I wish to express a profound gratitude to God for the measure of health given to me, and also to Mrs. Hendrick, the one who has labored faithfully by my side. One need not suffer the pangs of sickness, or the inconveniences of the sick to be able to understand and appreciate the blessings of good health which God sends our way.

THE SPIRITUAL LIFE OF OUR DISTRICT

The spiritual life of a district as well as the spiritual life of an individual is a delicate thing to try to evaluate. Nevertheless I feel it can be said, that in the face of the ever-increasing appeal of materialism; the frustration of many of the spiritual leaders of formerly great denominations; the brainwashing process of religious people who seek an education in many of our universities and colleges, which remove from their philosophy the very "CORNERSTONE" of Christianity — I say, regardless of all these things our people are most determined that OUR GOD IS THE TRUE GOD AND HE IS ALIVE!

My understanding of spirituality is ones love for God, a dedication for His service, and a consecration to do His Will. These seem to be the weights by which spirituality must level the balances.

OUR FINANCES

On the matter of finance our people have proven again this year that God can trust them as stewards of His possessions.

Out of the increases, they have gone beyond the rise in the National or State economy in their giving. Our tithing to the District seems to be God's answer to our financial need. You will discover in the treasurer's report that new records have been set in giving: to World Missions, General Interests and District Interests. For the first time in the history of our District, and as far as I can discover in the records of the United Michigan Districts, we have met the 100 percent payment of General Stewardship, PLUS. Praise God!

I should say at this point that our International Conference passed a resolution in June to increase our General Stewardship from \$8.00 to \$9.50 per member. This action was to take care of a new plan for assisting our Evangelists who are giving full time to evangelism, also to try and stay somewhere near the rising costs caused by an escalating economy.

However, I am most happy to tell you that if six of our churches and pastors, who are doing very little to meet our District Plan of tithing regular Church Offerings, Sunday School Offerings, Youth Society Offerings, and pastor's half tithe, would assume their responsibilities we would be able to meet this extra rise in budget without changing our plan in any manner.

CHURCH EXTENSION

Church extension in our District as well as all Districts of our Church are coming in for a closer scrutiny than any other aspect of our work.

1. Because of the weak churches already existing.

2. Shortage of pastors dedicated to this type of work.

3. The enormous amount of money needed for starting new churches.

In spite of these handicaps which seem to be ever-present with us, the fact remains that this is God's plan and our aim and we have been steadily laying a groundwork for the past four years which would bring us to that time when we could launch a definite plan for new churches. You will find a provision for this coming out of the Conference Committee in the way of a resolution.

THE MERGER OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS AND WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCHES

Highlights on the progress of the merger will be presented by our Assistant Superintendent, Rev. Harold C. Rickner, at the time of his report.

SOME PROGRESS HAS BEEN MADE FOR THE YEAR

From our statistician I understand that we have a fair gain in total membership, with a small gain in Sunday School attendance.

YPSILANTI — this church which for many years has been dependent upon a pastor who could supply his own parsonage has at last had a dream realized. Rev. Kenneth Smith supervised the building of a lovely parsonage and now resides in it.

WARREN — again this church has, because of growing pains and forsightedness, purchased another dwelling place adjoining their property with the idea of enlarging their Church and Sunday School facilities.

PONTIAC — Pontiac has now completed their new educational building and not only are occupying it, but have it already filled to capacity. Plans are being discussed at this time of soon going into another building venture.

GAINES — the church at Gaines, a small group with great determination, have completed the building of a very nice church and are looking forward to the time when it will be in condition to invite all of you to the dedication service. Rev. W. C. Jones and his group entered into the work with the contractors and have built what you will see, for an almost-unheard-of price of \$14,000.00.

LINCOLN PARK — under the leadership of Rev. Eldon Nelson, these people have brought their Sunday School to capacity, discharged their indebtedness, and have purchased several lots adjoining their property with the ideas of building a new church auditorium and using all their now existant buildings for educational purposes.

UTICA — besides increasing their percentage of District giving, they have also installed a new Conn Organ, carpeted the church auditorium, bought and installed a public address system, and have determined to try for a Full District Tithe this coming year.

SPARLINGVILLE — even while we gather here, Sparlingville, under the leadership of Rev. R. K. Fay is in the process of building a beautiful new parsonage. Approximate valuation \$20,000.00.

FLUSHING — I think it could be said that much of the handicap to the Flushing Church for several years has been the lack of a parsonage. This is coming to an end: for their new pastor, Rev. John Hall, a former teacher at Owosso College, a fine pastor and an excellent builder, is, at present, leading his people in a very fine display of dedicated physical service to God. They are furnishing most of the labor, and under his direction, are building this new parsonage which will have an estimated value of not less than \$25,000.00.

DISTRICT HEADQUARTERS — thank God and The District Council for their business acument in purchasing this fine living quarters and almost indispensable suite of offices. This year we have not only kept up payments but have paid an extra thousand dollars on the principal. We now have but one church which does not have a parsonage.

CAMP GROUND — With the completion of twenty-one rooms with a new coat of paneling, we now have lovely rooms to offer to our people. Twenty-five young trees have been planted. One hundred new chairs for the youth pavilion, and fifty for the dining room, have been added.

The "500 Camp Club" has been of inestimable help in financing our camp. Let me once again give credit to our Assistant Superintendent for the help he has given; to all our committees who have done a commendable job in their various areas; to the fine District Council who has made great contribution to the smooth operation of this District. That two of these have grown so tall as to be noticed and called to General Offices, is not a thing to sorrow over, though we shall miss them very much.

Youth President's Report

Mr. Chairman, Rev. Hendrick, Pastors, Youth Presidents, and Delegates: I greet you in the name of the Master, our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. It has been a high honor and a real challenge to serve another year as Youth President of the East Michigan District. Our District has some of the finest young people in the denomination. It has been the burden of the youth department not only to reach the youth for Christ, but to present a program that will help hold them. My faith has been strengthened and my heart encouraged as I have seen these young people responding to the will of God.

The conference year began with the youth program at camp meeting. There was a fine group of young people attending the camp meeting who were challenged each day by an emphasis on missions and doctrine. In the evening services many youth responded to the call of Christ. The activities also included recreation with the last Saturday of camp being the annual Youthspiration Day.

The youth camp was held at Brighton last August with an attendance of 158. We greatly appreciated the fine work of the camp staff. The chapel speaker was Rev. G. L. MacDonald. We found it necessary to cancel the spring Junior-Senior Banquet due to lack of response to the banquet survey. Many of us were disappointed, for we felt this Banquet was worthwhile. Thanks to Dick Wynn and his interest and help as chairman of the Banquet committee the past 3 years.

I have held 5 zone elections, conducted 1 district youth camp, directed the youth program at camp meeting, attended all the district committee meetings on which the youth president serves by virtue of his office, as well as being co-sponsor of Youth In Action Day at Owosso College. My salary and mileage is paid to date.

I have deeply appreciated the wise counsel of our District Superintendent, Brother Hendrick, the concern and interest of the District Youth Executive committee, and the cooperation of the zone presidents and the fine spirit of cooperation of the local societies in the district program. The pastors of the District are to be commended for their heartfelt interest in our youth.

With Christ as our captain may we continue to march forward.

Sunday School Secretary's Report

General Superintendent Snyder, District Superintendent Hendrick, pastors, and delegates to the Eleventh Annual Conference of the East Michigan District, Greetings in the bonds of our blessed fellowship in Christ.

Because the Sunday School is the arm of the church that touches the lives of the greatest number of unconverted people, and because Christ has commanded His church to "teach all nations" of His blood-bought redemption, we stand at the threshold of today's revolutionary world and pale at the awful responsibility that it thrusts upon us. But, praise God, the responsibility becomes life's greatest opportunity as we realize that the Pilgrim Holiness Church and her sister denominations of like faith have the answer through Jesus Christ to today's world dilemma.

In an effort to stimulate this part of God's work your District Sunday School Committee has acted in a number of areas:

1. Last fall we helped promote the general Sunday School program of outreach.

- 2. During January workshops were held in every zone of our district. An unusually large number of attending pastors and Sunday School workers have spoken of the great value of these workshops to them.
- 3. During the Lenten Season we participated in a March to Sunday School Campaign which included a contest with our sister Michigan district. This contest was concluded on Easter Sunday with a total attendance of nearly 12,500 people in Pilgrim Holiness Sunday Schools in Michigan. We believe that this total was the highest ever achieved by Pilgrim Sunday Schools in our state. To God be the glory!
- 4. Various teaching aids have continued to be added to our library for cost-free use to any and all Sunday Schools of our district. We now have an especially fine number of filmstrips. Under the able direction of Rev. Arnold Gibson they are enjoying a wide usage.

While our over-all gain for the year is small, a number of churches show fine gains for both this year and also for the quadrennium just ended. For this year, Pontiac led the way with a gain of 29, followed by Cresthaven with a gain of 14, Dryden and Flint Bentley each with gains of 11, and Lennon with a gain of 9.

During the recent quadrennium, eight schools had average gains over the preceding quadrennium of more than 30. Lennon led the way with a numerical gain of 62, followed closely by North Lakeport with a gain of 59, Warren with a gain of 54, Flint Bentley with a gain of 49, Russellville with a gain of 41, Croswell with a gain of 33, Ypsilanti with a gain of 32, and Monroe with a gain of 31.

We offer our hearty congratulations to Russellville for its recognition by the general Sunday School Department for its great percentage gain during the past quadrennium.

We look to the future with great expectancy. The grain is there — the fields are white unto harvest. We have the tools — we have fine churches waiting to be filled. And above all else we have the promise of help from God Himself in the fulfillment of our mission.

I express my appreciation to District Superintendent Hendrick for his fine support and words of wisdom, to my fine fellow committee members — Rev. Wm. Doe, Rev. Eldon Nelson, and to Rev. Arnold Gibson. Also to all of those pastors, superintendents, secretaries and others for their wonderful spirit of cooperation and helpfulness.

My salary and mileage are paid in full.

At least five trips were made to various churches to view tentative sites for churches. After due consideration and discussion, recommendations and suggestions were given to each.

Annual Resolutions

- 1. Be it resolved that the following become a standing rule: The District Council shall provide each year a Blue Cross eligibility listing to include all conference ministers working 30 hours or more per week to be approved by the annual conference. And be it further resolved that approved list be placed in the annual conference journal, under annual resolutions.
- 2. Be it resolved that this conference approve the following Blue Cross eligibility listing for 1966 as of Conference date:

Any further adjustment in eligibility list due to pastoral changes will be made by the District Council.

- 3. Be it resolved that the Blue Cross 65 insurance be provided for ministers retiring from the East Michigan Conference as follows:
 - A. One-half to be paid based on 5 to 10 years of service, total cost be paid based on 10 or more years of service.
 - B. Was and is enrolled in Blue Cross-Blue Shield insurance or some comparable insurance that is designed to supplement Medicare, and that this be financed through the pastor's half tithe or a source provided by action of the District Council.
- 4. Be it resolved that upon a temporary working agreement being effected between our district and an independent group, that said group be listed as "associate church." Be it further resolved that all assets and properties be legally transferred to the Pilgrim Holiness Church before final acceptance of said group by the conference, and that this be placed in the standing rules.
- 5. Be it resolved that the last two lines of standing rule #3, page 34, beginning with "UNTIL," be deleted from the Conference Journal.
- 6. Be it resolved that standing rule #22 pf. e, page 38, of the Conference Journal be deleted, because it is annual in nature.
- 7. Whereas there is often duplication in financial reports from local churches due to transferring of monies from one department to another, and whereas this does not give an accurate picture of the financial strength of the local church, therefore be it resolved that the following become a standing rule:

"All monies within the local church shall be recorded only in the Treasurer's book of the department where funds are raised and separate checks shall be made payable to the account involved. No funds shall be transferred from one department to another."

8. Be it resolved that on page 42 of the Conference Journal the following be added to Paragraph 5, under duties of the Building and Finance Committee:

"Such report shall include a financial ceiling ratified by the District Council, beyond which no local church shall be allowed to purchase property, construct buildings, or add to or re-model existing structures." Be it further resolved that the District Secretary edit this paragraph to be placed in the standing rules.

9. Be it resolved that standing rule #27, page 39, of the Conference Journal be revised to read as follows:

"The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$6,000.00 per year plus 7c per mile travel expense; the District Treasurer shall receive \$750.00 per year; District Secretary shall receive \$550.00 per year; the Statistician shall receive \$75.00 per year; Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$100.00 per year; The Youth President shall receive \$125.00; District Sunday School Treasurer shall receive \$50.00 per year. All District Officials shall receive 6c per mile for all miles traveled in the interest of the District."

- 10. Whereas we appreciate the cooperation of the Ministry and lay workers in helping to make this Conference possible, and have enjoyed the fine leadership of our District Superintendent, Rev. C. R. Hendrick; therefore be it resolved that this Conference express their gratitude by a rising vote of thanks.
- 11. Whereas we have appreciated the presence of our General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin Snyder and the efficient way he has conducted our Conference, therefore be it resolved that we express our gratitude by a rising vote of thanks, and be it further resolved that we give a love offering of \$50.00 to Mrs. Snyder. This offering to be taken from the Treasury.
- 12. Be it resolved that the council be authorized to approve the Minutes of the last sitting and care for any incidental items of business.

Standing Rules

Camp Meeting

- 1. Camp Date Be it resolved that the Camp Meeting date be set to begin the second Friday in July.
- 2. Camp Board Be it resolved that the Camp Board consist of 11 members, which shall include the District Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent, the District Secretary, the District Treasurer and the District Youth President. Two members shall be elected annually from nominations by the District Council, for a three-year term. No member shall be re-elected until he has been off the board for three years. The chairman is to be appointed by the District Council for a three-year term, and shall preside over all meetings.

The Board shall secure all workers for Camp and Conference, supervise building and grounds, purchase good and necessary equipment for camp and conference and have charge of all advertising. They shall also have charge of development and expansion of camp facilities. The board shall hold an organizational meeting following the election in conference, and department heads shall be chosen and printed in the Conference Journal. The work of the Board shall be supervised under department heads, and each active minister of the District shall be assigned responsibility under a department head. There shall be a department on development, expansion, and long range planning, of which the District Youth President shall be a member. The board shall hold its first regular meeting in the second quarter of the conference year. The selection of evangelists and singers by the board shall be approved by the district council before engaged as camp workers.

- 3. Camp Labor Be it resolved that each church in the conference of less than 20 members give 2 days labor or \$20.00; 20 to 50 members, 4 days or \$40.00; above 50 members give 6 days or \$60.00 to employ help to make ready for the annual camp meeting and construction of new buildings and maintenance.
- 4. Leasing of Lots Be it resolved that the District lease lots on the camp grounds to ministers and laymen desiring them as follows: The lease fee shall be \$125.00 if paid in cash. Terms: \$145.00 at the rate of \$25.00 down and \$10.00 per month for one year. The District shall plant one tree on each lot and shall gravel the street in front of lots.
- 5. Sunday School Sessions Be it resolved that on the two Sundays during camp meeting that there be a Sunday School Session beginning at 9:30 until 10:15 a.m. following the Testimony meeting, and that said session be arranged and supervised by the Sunday School committee. Be it further resolved that a credit card be given to all in attendance and that each card be signed and returned by the pupil to their local church Sunday School Secretary for the attendance record and reports to the conference.
- 6. Children's Meetings Be it resolved that we have children's meetings during the afternoon and evening services of camp.
- 7. Youth Activities Be it resolved that the Youth department and the camp board be in charge of and provide for all youth activities during the annual camp meeting.
- 8. 500 Camp Club There shall be a 500 Camp Club promoted by the District Superintendent and pastors for the purpose of raising a part of the expense of the annual camp meeting. Members of the club shall be

those who pledge ten dollars (\$10.00) per year for this purpose. Any member may withdraw from the Club by notifying the District Office.

Conference

- 9. Fiscal Year The conference year shall close May 31 and all reports be mailed to the Conference Statistician by June 15.
- 10. The Examining and Educational Board shall consist of six ordained ministers, with the District Superintendent as chairman. Two members to be elected each year for a three year term. The chairman shall have Sections 105 and 107 of the Manual read to all District licentiates. This board is to meet at least by the first Tuesday of May of each year, and the Secretary to maintain a file on all ministers for the District office. Ordination candidates are to be notified fifteen days prior to Conference.
- 11. Ordination Service Be it resolved that the order of business on the first night of the Conference be the ordination service. Whereas the minister's wife makes a vital contribution to her husband's work, therefore we recommend that the wife of the candidate be given honorary seat with the candidate during the ordination service.
- 12. Election of Officers Inasmuch as most religious bodies follow the order of having elections immediately following district reports, and inasmuch as many conferences of the Pilgrim Holiness Church follow the same order, therefore be it resolved that election of officers be immediately following district reports.

Whereas there has been successive balloting for important offices and whereas this has often resulted in the election of individuals to several positions of officialdom, therefore be it resolved that balloting for respective officers shall be taken care of in regular and proper sequence. The election results shall be posted immediately.

- 13. Greetings Whereas we have missionaries who are members of this conference serving on foreign fields and being deprived of the privileges we enjoy while being together in the Conference; therefore be it resolved that the Conference Secretary send greetings to all missionaries who are members of this Conference.
- 14. District Paper There is some demand for a District paper, and whereas there is not financial provision for the same, be it resolved that the District Council prorate the costs, such as printing, postage and secretarial help among the four departments of the District.
- 15. District Calendar The District Superintendent shall meet with the heads of the departments to prepare a district calendar and this to be placed in Conference Journal annually. Within thirty days after the annual conference a copy of this calendar shall be sent to each Pastor, Sunday School Superintendent, Missionary Society President and Youth Society President.
- 16. Appointment of Committees The District Council shall appoint all committees except the Visitation Committee. The Standing Committees are to be appointed to include new men where possible and to avoid duplication of men on several committees. It is recommended that the entire constituency be considered.
- 17. Annual Resolutions Be it resolved that all resolutions approved by the Conference shall be annual in nature unless otherwise specified as standing rules.
- 18. Building and Finance Committee The District Council shall appoint a Building and Finance Committee composed of five appointed members and the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer who shall

serve for one year. The Chairman, appointed by the District Council, shall report annually to the Conference.

All churches and church boards must have the approval of said committee before the purchase of building sites or the erecting of building or improvements in excess of \$500.00. They shall recommend to the District Council the amount of indebtedness the local church shall be able to carry.

Be it further resolved that:

- a. Any church unable to pay their United Stewardship fund in full shall contact the chairman of this committee at least 90 days before the close of the Conference year.
- b. Any church wanting to finance property, either building or buying, shall contact the chairman of this committee.
- c. The local church shall receive the report from the committee and the District Council in not more than 30 days following request.
- 19. Conference Committee Be it resolved that the District Council appoint a committee of nine persons and the District Superintendent and District Treasurer, to serve for three years. The District Council shall designate one member of the committee to serve as chairman. Two of the nine members shall be the District Youth President and the District Sunday School Secretary.

This committee shall be known as the Conference Committee and shall have the following duties:

- 1. Meet at the call of the chairman at least one month before Conference.
- 2. Receive all signed resolutions for their study and approval. (Resolution to be in the hands of the committee by May 1.)
- 3. Appoint members of the committee to be responsible to study, prepare and plan any phase of the Committee's work, and report same to the committee.
- 4. Provide all delegates with mimeographed copies of resolutions recommended by the committee two weeks before conference.
- 5. Report the committee's recommendations to the Annual Conference.
- 6. Provide the District Secretary with typewritten copies of all resolutions approved by the Conference.
- 7. Do any research work and study any matter requested of them by the Annual Conference or District Council and report on the same as requested.
- 20. Church Extension Committee Be it resolved that a District Church Committee be appointed by the District Council, to consist of the District Treasurer, the Sunday School Secretary, the District Youth President, one member of the District Missionary Executive Committee, and two members, to serve for one year. The Chairman shall be appointed by the District Council.

The duties of this committee shall be as follows:

- 1. To see that its work is carried out in Harmony with Section 27 of the 1962 Manual.
- 2. To inquire through pastor and church, by request or solicitation of groups, by prayer and persuasion, where there may be possible locations for starting Sunday Schools and Churches.

- 3. Consider any personal contact by mail or otherwise of any individual who has an interest in starting a Church or Sunday School in some area.
- 4. Seek out and recommend, locations for new churches and Sunday Schools, the amount of finance needed, and the way it is to be used and how it should be raised.
- 5. Organize a survey from the ministry, laity, and Owosso College for the purpose of determining the possibilities for our Church in any community.
- 6. Organize "Work groups" from the Ministry and laity and any volunteers for emergency calls.
- 7. When all data is received and agreed upon by the committee, a report shall be compiled, together with the committee's recommendations, and filed with the District Office for District Council final approval before any projects are started.
- 8. It is recommended that this committee meet at least once a year at camp meeting time.
- 21. Lay Visitation Committee Be it resolved that the Lay Visitation Committee of three be appointed by the District Superintendent who shall serve for one year. The chairman to be appointed by the District Superintendent.

They shall plan and promote a program of lay visitation in the local churches of the District. They shall provide the outline of such a program so that it may become a matter of record in the Conference journal as approved by the annual conference.

- 22. Prayer and Fasting League Be it resolved that in keeping with the program of our church that we urge each church in our Conference to organize a Prayer and Fasting League. The objectives of the Prayer and Fasting League shall be:
 - 1. It shall not take the place of the regular church prayer meeting.
 - 2. The League Membership shall be directed to pray for the general interest of our Church at home and abroad.
 - 3. They shall be encouraged to pray for the local community needs.
 - 4. That where advisable the pastor shall provide a list of definite needs for each member of the League covering such needs as:

Unsaved families in the community.

Unsaved families in the Sunday School.

Individual church objectives and needs.

Organization:

- a. The pastor shall act as director of the Prayer and Fasting League.
- b. The pastor shall recommend one or more names of the official board who shall appoint a secretary to work with the pastor.
- c. The secretary shall form a membership list. Membership in League shall be volunteer membership of the church, Sunday school, youth society, and friends of the church.

d. The membership shall be kept active by being revised twice each year, September 1, and March 1 of each Conference year.

Associate Churches

Be it resolved that upon a temporary working agreement being effected between our district and an independent group, that said group be listed as "associate church." Be it further resolved that all assets and properties be legally transferred to the Pilgrim Holiness Church before final acceptance of said group by the conference.

Finance

- 23. United Stewardship Fund Whereas we are in full accord with the plan of God, namely tithes and offerings for financing the work of the Kingdom and advise our people to tithe their income into the local church, therefore be it resolved:
 - a. Each local church shall tithe its receipts.
 - b. Each Sunday School shall tithe its receipts.
 - c. Each local Youth Society shall tithe its receipts.
 - d. Each Youth Zone shall tithe its Zone offerings.
 - e. Each pastor shall send direct or through the local church treasurer one-half tithe of his church salary to the District Treasurer for the Administrative Fund.

These tithes shall be sent each month to the respective Department Treasurers, and forwarded by said treasurer to the District Treasurer. These tithes shall not include loans or money from a sale of land or buildings.

Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer send the Equivalent of \$9.50 per member to the General Treasurer for the General United Stewardship fund and that the District Stewardship Fund be divided as follows:

- 44 percent administration; 8 percent Owosso College;
- 5 percent Ministerial Benefit; 2 percent General Conference;

7 percent property debt; 21 percent Church Extension;

4¹/₂ percent Sunday School; 5¹/₂ percent Youth and 3 percent Loan and Investment Fund. The District Council shall be authorized in cases of emergency to make necessary adjustments in percentages.

24. Camp and Conference Expense — Whereas there is a great deal of expense in connection with the annual camp meeting and conference, let each church pay into the District Treasury one (1) percent of their regular offerings to be designated for Camp meeting and Conference expenses.

Inasmuch as it is impossible under the present set-up to any longer give free entertainment to our ministers and their families, therefore be it further resolved that ministers and their families be responsible for their lodging and meals.

Exception shall be all retired ministers, full time pastors and their families whose salary is under \$50.00 per week, and all full time camp workers as determined by the Camp Board.

Be it further resolved that during the Annual Conference all delegates (Ministerial and Lay) be given their meals free and that the District Superintendent, his wife, and members of his family under 16 years of
age shall be given meals and lodging without charge during the Annual Camp and Conference.

Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer pay out of the Administrative fund the Pension Plan, Medical and Hospitalization insurance for the District Superintendent.

- 25. Missionary Society 10 percent Be it resolved that 10 percent of the local missionary societies' regular offerings be sent to the District Missionary Treasurer for yearly projects and district expense.
- 26. District and General Fund All specified monies raised in the Local Church for District and General work shall be sent to the District Treasurer, who shall forward General funds to the General Treasurer.
- 27. Salaries The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$6,000.00 per year plus 7 cents per mile travel expense; the District Treasurer shall receive \$750.00 per year; District Secretary shall receive \$550.00 per year; the Statistician shall receive \$100.00 per year; Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$100.00 per year; the Youth President shall receive \$125.00; District Sunday School Treasurer shall receive \$50.00 per year. All District Officials shall receive 6 cents per mile for all miles traveled in the interest of the District."
- Camp Funds Report The District Treasurer shall submit an itemized report of Camp Meeting Funds as recorded in the 1945 Conference Journal page 13. This report to appear in the Journal.
- 29. District Audit Be it resolved that all Treasurers' books of the District be audited annually by a certified Public Accountant so that a report from the auditor can be given to the Conference when called for.
- 30. Pilgrim Loan and Investment Inc. Whereas there is a need for a more adequate loan program in our District, therefore be it resolved that the program known as East Michigan Pilgrim Loan and Investment Inc., be adopted and replace our present Church Extension Loan Fund.
- 31. Owosso College Inasmuch as Owosso College has a successful history in training young people for Christian service, and inasmuch as the General Board has assigned the State of Michigan as the patronizing territory for Owosso College; Therefore be it resolved that the East Michigan Conference go on record in pledging to the College its full cooperation and prayerful support, and open the doors of its churches to a representative of the College at which time the financial needs of the College shall be presented;

Inasmuch as the month of May has been designated by the General Church as Education month, be it further resolved that the Sunday following Mother's Day be designated as Owosso College Day and an offering of \$1.00 or more per member be set as a goal. Be it further resolved that we grant the Bible Department of Owosso College time in our Annual Conference to remind us of this relationship with the College, and to report on the same.

Ministerial

32. Pastoral Recall — Be it resolved that the vote on the recall of the pastor shall be taken prior to May 15, this vote shall be taken by secret ballot and shall not be counted in the local church, but shall be placed in an envelope and sealed in the presence of voting body and sent directly to District Superintendent who shall report the results of the vote to the Pastor and the church Secretary.

All ministers receiving calls from churches shall notify the District Superintendent at the time he gives his decision to the church.

- 33. Pastors at Camp Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend camp meetings, each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the camp, and the pastors shall be required to attend the entire camp meeting with the exception of Sunday morning.
- 34. Insurance Whereas the majority of Pilgrim Holiness ministers of the East Michigan Conference have expressed interest for participation in the Blue Cross-Blue Shield protection on a group basis, be it resolved: There shall be a Blue Cross Treasurer, appointed by the Council, instructed to act for the ministers and personnel in relations with the representatives of the Michigan Hospital service and Michigan Medical service. The Blue Cross treasurer shall receive all periodic subscriptions from the ministers and make payments of the same to Blue Cross-Blue Shield.

Be it further resolved that we recommend each local church pay their pastor's Medical and Hospitalization insurance.

- 35. Parsonage Utilities The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is located. The district shall provide the same for the District Parsonage.
- 36. Pension Plan Each local church shall contribute to the Pilgrim Pension Plan fund each month an amount equivalent to 6 percent of the pastor's salary for the year ending March 31, 1964; 7 percent for the year ending March 31, 1965 and 8 percent thereafter. These monies are to be remitted to the District Treasurer, who will forward the same to the Pension Plan Treasurer. If the pastor of a local church is not a member of the Pilgrim Pension Plan, the above percentages paid by the local church of which he is a pastor, shall be placed in a fund to assist aged ministers.
- 37. Burial Benefit Each local church shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association, and pay the expense of their membership and each call thereafter from the church treasury.

All general full-time evangelists and their wives receiving their principal support from their meetings shall be enrolled in the M. B. A. and said membership and each call thereafter shall be paid by the church of which he is a member.

The District Superintendent and his wife shall be enrolled in the M. B. A. and the expense be paid from the Administration fund.

Home Missionary pastors and wives are included in this action, the expense to be paid from the Home Missionary Treasury.

The retired elderly ministers and wives are included in this action, the expense to be paid from the Ministerial Relief fund.

- 38. Vacations It is recommended that vacations with pay for all ministers of this district range from a minimum of two weeks to a maximum of four weeks based on years of service in the full time ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church as follows:
 - (a) Full time service a minimum of two weeks.
 - (b) 15 years of service three weeks.
 - (c) 20 years or more four weeks.

39. Minister's Conference Committee — Be it resolved that the Minister's Conference Committee be composed of six members, two of which will be appointed each year for a three-year term, by the District Council.

A chairman shall also be appointed by the District Council.

This committee shall set the date, arrange the program, and notify the ministers for both the Ministers' Conference and the one-day ministerial prayer retreat. It is recommended that the Committee plan its work three years in advance.

- 40. Ministers' Conference Be it resolved that we have two pastors' conferences; one in the Spring and one in the Fall each year.
- 41. Retiring Superintendent Be it resolved that whenever there shall be elected another District Superintendent, that the Council earnestly endeavor to place said retiring Superintendent in satisfactory position.
- 42. Death Notice Since in the past on several occasions District Ministers, Widows have deceased without the ministers being notified of their death, therefore be it resolved that in the case of the death of a minister or his widow, the District Secretary notify the ministers of the district. Be it further resolved that we request the Michigan District to give us this information from their District.
- 43. Blue Cross Be it resolved that the District Council shall provide each year a Blue Cross eligibility listing to include all conference ministers working 30 hours or more per week to be approved by the annual conference. And be it further resolved that approved list be placed in the annual conference journal, under annual resolutions.

Standing Rules Supplement

I. Building and Finance Committee

ORGANIZATION

- 1. Recommended Name: Building and Finance Committee.
- 2. Committee shall be appointed by the District Council.
- 3. Number of appointed members shall be five.
- 4. Committee personnel: Five appointed members, the District Superintendent, and the District Treasurer.
- 5. Term: Committee members shall serve one year.
- 6. The chairman shall be appointed by the District Council.
- 7. The chairman shall preside and call all meetings in cooperation with the District Superintendent.
- 8. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the District Office.

DUTIES

- 1. To study all finance in each local church as to their ability to pay district and general united stewardship funds, and to recommend ways of paying the same.
- 2. To recommend to the District Council regarding the amount of indebtedness the local congregation shall be able to carry.
- 3. Report all of its findings to the district council.
- 4. Give an annual report to the District Conference.
- 5. Report to the local church through the District Council (1962 Manual Sec. 102 Pf. 8, 9) within thirty days following request on matters of finance, and building or buying property in excess of \$500.00. Such report shall include a financial ceiling ratified by the District Council beyond which the local church shall not purchase property, construct buildings, or add to or re-model existing structures.

II. Insurance (Blue Cross - Blue Shield)

ORGANIZATION

- 1. The District council shall appoint the Treasurer, who shall be an ordained minister.
- 2. He shall serve until his successor is appointed.

DUTIES

- 1. He shall act for the ministers and personnel in relations with the representatives of the Michigan Hospital Service and the Michigan Medical Service.
- 2. He shall receive all periodic subscriptions from the ministers and make payments of the same to Blue Cross Blue Shield.

III. Camp Board

ORGANIZATION

1. This Board shall be elected by the Annual Conference from nominations by the District Council.

- 2. Number of Board members shall be 11.
- 3. Board personnel: Six ordained ministers, the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, the District Secretary, the District Treasurer, and the District Youth President.
- 4. Term: Two shall be elected for one year, two for two years, two for three years, and two elected each year thereafter for three years. When the term of a board member expires, we recommend he not be reelected for three years.
- 5. The chairman shall be appointed for three years by the District Council.
- 6. The chairman shall preside over and call all meetings in cooperation with the District Superintendent.
- 7. The secretary of the board shall record the minutes and file them within ten days after each meeting with the District Office.
- 8. The recommended quorum is seven.

DUTIES

- 1. The Board shall secure all workers for camp and conference.
- 2. They shall supervise buildings and grounds.
- 3. They shall purchase good and necessary equipment for the camp and conference.
- 4. They shall have charge of all advertising.
- 5. They shall have charge of development and expansion of camp facilities.
- 6. The board shall hold an organizational meeting following the election in conference, and department heads shall be chosen and printed in the conference Jonrnal.
- 7. The work of the Board shall be supervised under department heads, and each active minister of the District shall be assigned responsibility under a department head.
- 8. There shall be a department on development, expansion, and long range planning, of which the District Youth President shall be a member.
- 9. The board shall hold its first regular meeting in the second quarter of the conference year.
- 10. The selection of evangelists and singers by the board shall be approved by the district council before engaged as camp workers.

IV. Camp Ushers

ORGANIZATION

- 1. Committee is appointed by the District Council.
- 2. Number of committee members: Four.
- 3. Committee Personnel: Any four persons.
- 4. Term: Committee members serve for one year.
- 5. The chairman is appointed by the district council, presides over and calls all meetings of the committee in cooperation with the district superintendent.

DUTIES

- 1. Be in charge of seating people where there is an overflow crowd.
- 2. Check with the Tabernacle clean-up chairman on the general appearance of the tabernacle and platform between services.
- 3. Operate the public address system.
- 4. See that song books are distributed.
- 5. Be on hand to pass out necessary literature.
- 6. Take care of the lights.
- 7. Check ventilation.
- 8. Select qualified men to receive the offering.
- 9. Usher special guests to the platform as the Superintendent requests during Camp.
- 10. Prepare platform for conference such as table, chairs, drinking water, etc.
- 11. Ushers are to meet with the chairman before conference to plan their work.

V. Church Extension Committee

ORGANIZATION

- 1. Committee is appointed by the district council.
- 2. Number of committee members is six.
- 3. Committee personnel: District Treasurer, Missionary officer, Youth President, District Sunday School Secretary, and two others.
- 4. Term: Committee members serve for one year.
- 5. The chairman is appointed by the district council and presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the District Superintendent.
- 6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
- 7. The recommended quorum is four.

DUTIES

- 1. To see that its work is carried in harmony with section 27 of the manual (1963 Journal Page 43, No. 20)
- 2. To inquire through the pastor and church, by request or solicitation of groups, by prayer and persuation, where there may be possible locations for starting Sunday schools and churches.
- 3. Consider any personal contact by mail or otherwise of any individual who has an interest in starting a church or Sunday school in some area.
- 4. Shall seek out and recommend, locations for new churches and Sunday schools, the amount of finance needed, and the way it is to be used and how it should be raised.
- 5. Organize a survey from the ministry, laity, and Owosso College for the purpose of determining the possibilities for a church in any community.
- 6. Organize "work groups" from the ministry and laity and any volunteers for emergency calls.

- 7. When all data is received and agreed upon by the committee a report shall be compiled, together with the committee's recommendations and filed with the district office for the district council's final approval before any projects are started.
- 8. It is recommended that this committee meet at least once a year at camp meeting time.

VI. Church Government Committee

ORGANIZATION

- 1. Recommended name: Church Government Committee.
- 2. Committee is appointed by the district council.
- 3. Number of committee members is nine.
- 4. Committee Personnel: Two Ordained ministers and the district council.
- 5. Term: Committee members serve for one year.
- 6. The chairman and secretary are appointed by the district council.
- 7. The chairman presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent.
- 8. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
- 9. The recommended quorum is seven.

DUTIES

- 1. There shall be a chairman and secretary appointed each year during the quadrennium so that the committee may give annual consideration to its work.
- 2. This committee shall study the government of our church only where it relates to the manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and report when requested on all such work assigned them by the Annual Conference and district council.
- 3. The committee shall recommend resolutions to the Annual Conference, copies of which shall be supplied to delegates two weeks prior to such conference. "(1962 Manual Sec. 83 Pf. 1 (14))".

VII. Conference Committee

ORGANIZATION

- 1. Committee is appointed by the district council. (1963 Journal Page 42 No. 18)
- 2. Number of committee members is nine.
- 3. Committee Personnel: Nine active ordained pastors, the District Treasurer, District Superintendent, and two of the active pastors appointed shall be the District Youth President, and District Sunday School Secretary.
- 4. Term: Three serve for one year, three for two years, and three for three years, and three appointed each year thereafter for three years.
- 5. The chairman shall be appointed by the district council, and shall preside over and call all meetings in cooperation with the District Superintendent.

- 6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
- 7. The recommended quorum is seven.

DUTIES

- 1. Meet at the call of the chairman at least one month before conference.
- 2. Receive all signed resolutions for their study, resolutions to be in the hands of the committee by May 1st.
- 3. Appoint members of this committee to be responsible to study, prepare and plan any phase of the committee's work and report same to the committee.
- 4. Provide all delegates with mimeographed copies of resolutions recommended by the committee two weeks before conference.
- 5. Report the committee's recommendations to the Annual Conference.
- 6. Provide the district secretary with typewritten copies of all resolutions approved by the conference.
- 7. Do any research work and study any matter requested of them by the annual conference or district council and report on the same as requested.

VIII. District Trustees

ORGANIZATION

- 1. Recommended name: District board of trustees.
- 2. Nominated by the district council and elected by the annual conference.
- 3. There shall be three board members.
- 4. Board personnel: Corporation by-laws require three district council members to serve.
- 5. Term: Three shall serve for one year (Manual Sec. 98).
- 6. The chairman shall be elected by the board.
- 7. The chairman presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent and functions only with the district council.

DUTIES

- 1. To hold all property belonging to the district in trust for the Pilgrim Holiness Church. (Manual Sec. 99, pf. 1).
- 2. To attend to all legal matters pertaining to the District.
- 3. To sign all legal papers for loans, money borrowed, renting, selling and buying property and disposing of the proceeds as ordered by the district council. (Manual Sec. 219 Pf. 2, Sec. 220 Pf. 2, Sec. 221.)
- 4. Shall be called as desired by the District Council.

IX. Examining and Educational Board

ORGANIZATION

- 1. This board is elected by the District Conference from nominations by the District Council (Manual Sec. 102, Pf. 5).
- 2. Number of elected board members is six.

- 3. Board personnel: Six ordained ministers and the district superintendent.
- 4. Term: Two serve for one year, two for two years, two for three years, and two elected each year thereafter for three years.
- 5. The district superintendent shall be the chairman, and preside over and call all meetings of the board (1963 Journal page 41, no. 10).
- 6. The secretary shall record the minutes and file them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
- 7. The recommended quorum is four.

DUTIES

- 1. They shall examine all applicants for new and renewal of licenses, including singers (Manual Sec. 95 Pf. 1 (1), Sec. 97 and 145).
- 2. Require applicants to sign questionnaire of the general board. (Manual Sec. 95 Pf. 1 (2).
- 3. Examine ordained and licensed ministers on questions of doctrine, character, and conduct. (Manual Sec. 95 Pf. 2).
- 4. Notify ordination candidates fifteen days prior to conference. (1963 Journal Page 41, No. 11).
- 5. See that board actions are subject to the approval of the district council. (Manual Sec. 102 Pf. 3).
- 6. Give an annual report to the district conference. (Manual Sec. 95 Pf. 1 (3).
- 7. Maintain a permanent file, on all ministers examined, for the district office; the secretary to do this.
- 8. Meet at least by the first Tuesday in May of each year.

X. Missionary Society

ORGANIZATION

- 1. The Society Secretary and Treasurer and two advisory members are appointed by the district council.
- 2. Number of society members is five.
- 3. Society Personnel: Lay women and/or ministers wives.
- 4. Term: All members shall serve for one year.
- 5. The chairman (President) shall be elected by the conference from two or more nominations by the District Council, and shall preside over and call all meetings of the society in cooperation with the District Superintendent.
- 6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
- 7. The recommended quorum is three.

DUTIES

- 1. President: (Manual Sec. 79 Pf. 7).
 - (a) Organize adult and junior missionary societies in the local churches where they desire them.
 - (b) Give direction and assistance to organized societies.
 - (c) Arrange zone missionary rallies in the district.

- (d) Promote missionary interest at camp meetings.
- (e) Arrange with the district council or camp board for special missionary services at camp meeting.
- (f) Report annually to the district conference on district missionary society activities.
- (g) Serve as a member of the annual conference (Sec. 79 Pf. 5).
- 2. Secretary (Manual Sec. 79 Pf. 8).
 - (a) Record minutes of meetings of the district missionary committee.
 - (b) Notify the local presidents of dates and places of missionary rallies.
 - (c) Keep a record of the district missionary zone rallies.
 - (d) Assist the District Missionary President in promoting missionary society work throughout the district.
- 3. Treasurer: (Manual Sec. 79 Pf. 9).
 - (a) To receive and disburse all missionary society monies.
 - (b) Forward to the district treasurer money designated for General Church purposes.
 - (c) Report the finance of the society to the District Conference annually.
- 4. Missionary Society: (Manual Sec. 79 Pf. 1).
 - (a) Shall stimulate missionary interest.
 - (b) Coordinate activities on three levels: District Home Missions. General Church Extension. And World Missions.
 - (c) Raise funds for the necessary operation of its district function. (Manual Sec. 79 Pf. 4).
 - (d) They shall be amenable to the district council. (Manual Sec. 79 Pf. 6).

XI. Memoirs Committee

ORGANIZATION

- 1. Recommended name: Memoirs Committee.
- 2. Committee is appointed by the district council.
- 3. Number of members on the committee shall be two.
- 4. Committee Personnel: Two ordained ministers or their wives.
- 5. Term: Two shall serve for one year.
- 6. Chairman shall be appointed by the district council.
- 7. The chairman presides over and calls all meetings of the committee in cooperation with the district superintendent.

DUTIES

1. This committee shall secure information and prepare a report on the death of any person holding credentials in this district, including a brief history of their work and service for the church.

- 2. They shall file their report with the district office within thirty days following such death for the district superintendent's approval.
- 3. All such death reports approved by the district superintendent shall be filed with the advocate office by the chairman of the committee.
- 4. The chairman shall give a typewritten report to the annual conference each year.

XII. Ordination Committee

ORGANIZATION

- 1. This committee is appointed by the district council.
- 2. Number of appointed members is five.
- 3. Committee Personnel: Five ordained ministers.
- 4. Committee members serve for one year.
- 5. The district superintendent shall be the chairman, and preside over and call all meetings.

DUTIES

- 1. This committee shall sign the certificates for ordination of candidates. (Manual Sec. 153).
- 2. This committee shall meet before conference to set up a specific order of service for the ordination of candidates.
- 3. They shall assist the General Chairman of the Conference in the ordination of candidates. (Manual Sec. 152 Pf. 2).

XIII. Minister's Conference Committee

ORGANIZATION

- 1. Committee is appointed by the district council.
- 2. Number of committee members is six.
- 3. Committee Personnel: Ministers.
- 4. Term: Two serve for one year, two for two years, two for three years, and two appointed each year thereafter for three years.
- 5. The chairman is appointed by the district council, presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent.
- 6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district superintendent.
- 7. The recommended quorum is four.

DUTIES

- 1. The committee shall arrange the program, set the date, and place of the Ministers conference.
- 2. They shall plan a one-day ministerial prayer retreat.
- 3. They shall notify all ministers of such above mentioned meetings for the ministry.

XIV. Pilgrim Loan and Investment, Inc.

ORGANIZATION

- 1. Board members are elected by the conference from nominations by the district council.
- 2. Number of board members is nine.
- 3. Board personnel: Six laymen and three ordained ministers.
- 4. Term: Three shall serve for one year, three for two years, three for three years, and three elected each year thereafter for three years.
- 5. The chairman shall be elected by the board of directors, and shall preside over and call all meetings of the board in cooperation with the district superintendent.
- 6. The secretary of the board shall record the minutes and file them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
- 7. The established quorum is five.

DUTIES

1. This board shall be governed by the by-laws of the corporation as approved by the annual conference.

XV. Reception Committee

ORGANIZATION

- 1. The committee is appointed by the district council.
- 2. Number of committee members is three.
- 3. Committee personnel: Three ordained ministers.
- 4. Term: One to serve for one year, one to serve for two years, one to serve for three years, and one appointed each year thereafter to serve for three years.
- 5. The chairman is appointed by the district council, and presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent.

DUTIES

- 1. This committee shall keep a register of all visitors and guests and file them with the District Secretary.
- 2. Assist in their entertainment by providing information as to dining and room accommodations in cooperation with the host or hostess.
- 3. Introduce special guests to the chairman of the meeting.
- 4. This committee may advise with the clerk concerning the arrival of any guests during camp and conference and coordinate and plan their activity for such meeting.
- 5. This committee is to function at all district meetings and to be present one half hour before starting time of services for the purpose of efficiency.

XVI. Statistician

ORGANIZATION

1. The committee is appointed by the district council.

- 2. Number of committee members is one.
- 3. Committee personnel: Anyone.
- 4. Term: He shall serve for one year.

DUTIES

- 1. He shall compile the annual reports of the churches of the district.
- 2. He shall prepare charts for the annual conference of the compiled annual reports.

XVII. Sunday School Board

ORGANIZATION

- 1. The Board shall be appointed by the district council.
- 2. Number of appointed members shall be four.
- 3. Board personnel: Four ordained ministers and the district superintendent.
- 4. Term: One to serve for one year, one for two years, and one for three years, and the Chairman appointed each year by the district council (Manual Sec. 69 Pf. 2, 3).
- 5. The chairman (Promotional Secretary) presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent.
- 6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days following each meeting with the district office.
- 7. The recommended quorum is three.

DUTIES

- 1. They shall supervise district Sunday School work in cooperation with the General Secretary of Sunday Schools. (Manual Sec. 69 Pf. 4).
- 2. They shall encourage the organization and maintenance of a Sunday School in each church of the district.
- 3. They shall establish Mission Sunday Schools where practicable.
- 4. Plan district or zone conventions or institutes in cooperation with the district-superintendent.
- 5. Arrange Sunday School services at general gatherings, such as camp meetings, conferences, etc.
- 6. The chairman (Promotional Secretary) shall report for the board regularly to the district conference and the General Secretary of Sunday Schools.
- 7. They shall provide an outline of the projected program and goals for each conference year in the conference journal.

XVIII. Visitation Committee

ORGANIZATION

- 1. The committee is appointed by the District Superintendent.
- 2. Number of committee members is three.
- 3. Committee personnel: Any qualified persons.
- 4. Term: All three serve one year.

- 5. The chairman is appointed by the district superintendent and presides over and calls all meetings in cooperation with the district superintendent.
- 6. The secretary records the minutes and files them within ten days after each meeting with the district office.
- 7. Recommended quorum is two.

DUTIES

- 1. They shall plan and promote a program of lay visitation in the local churches of the district.
- 2. They shall provide the outline of such a program so that it may become a matter of record in the conference journal as approved by the annual conference.

Recommended Outline of Visitation Program

- 1. Preach several sermons on this New Testament plan.
- 2. Make a large map of your field, block off into Zones your entire church territory. Number the zones for easy reference in your records.
- 3. Set up a 4×6 file drawer to correspond with your map.
- 4. Ways of securing prospects.
- 5. Classify and file prospects as follows:
 - a. Members of your own church, or non-church members who prefer it.
 - b. Church members or non-church members who actually have no church or denominational preference of any kind anywhere — more or less indifferent as to denomination.
 - c. Non-church members who have a church or denominational preference other than yours.
 - d. Church members whose church is too far away for them to attend at all or only occasionally, yet they prefer another church or denomination that is not in the community or accessible. In this category would appear those of other Protestant denominations.
- 6. Organization of workers.
 - A. Elect visitation director.

a. Qualifications: a deacon, elder, or official of the church; a man or woman of deep convictions, energetic, capable of leadership, spiritually sound, filled with the Holy Spirit. (Acts 6:3).

b. How elected: he may be appointed by nominating committee, the church board, or pastor, then elected by church. He should be inspired with an appreciation of the importance of the position.

B. Elect visitation secretary.

a. Qualifications: This person may be a deacon or deaconess, elder, or any member of the church who knows how to take notes, follow simple directions, keep accurate records and is dependable. This office could be held by one of the captains, or possibly the Pastor's secretary.

C. Elect zone captains.a. Qualifications: Person of deep convictions, energetic, capable of leadership, spiritually sound, and filled with the Spirit.

b. How elected: Same as visitation director.

D. All members helpers.

a. Qualifications: Must be a resident member of the local church, or an individual who is qualified for membership, having a Christian experience.

b. How elected: Every church member automatically becomes a helper.

Conference Proceedings

The Eleventh Annual Youth Conference of the East Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:30 A.M. at Emmanuel Pilgrim Holiness Church, Flint, Michigan, on Saturday, May 21, 1966. The Conference was opened by District Youth President Rev. Roy Webster. The Rev. G. L. MacDonald led in singing "Victory In Jesus," then District Superintendent Rev. C. R. Hendrick led in prayer.

The Rev. O. D. Emery, Secretary of General Sunday School and Youth, was presented to the conference and brought an inspiring message to us on "Watch ye and pray lest ye enter into temptation, the spirit truly is ready but the flesh is weak." Mark 14:38. Rev. Emery stated that we are gathered here in a common interest, and that we only have success as we are able to keep our youth in the church. He spoke to us very warmly on "The Importance of Prayer". He asked, "What does prayer mean to you?" From John Bunyan's "Tale of Mansoul" he gave us the dialogue in which Lord Will, Mayor Understanding and Mr. Conscience are confronted by Mr. Carnal Security who influences them away from the Prince's table. Mr. Godly fear confronts them with their neglect and states that the Prince is gone from the castle of Mansoul village. In order to have the Prince return they closed up the house of Mr. Carnal Security and burned it to the ground with Mr. Carnal Security, Lord Hate, Lord Envy, Lord Jealousy and all others in it. The Prince came back when these enemies were destroyed and Man-Soul began to rejoice again.

Roll call was made by the secretary and by common consent corrections and additions were made to complete the roll. There were present 21 Pastors, 15 Youth Presidents, 26 Delegates, 4 Zone Presidents, 1 District Superintendent and 1 General Youth Leader, making a total of 65 members in Conference.

A motion was made and carried that the time of sittings be 9:30 to 12:00, and 1:30 P.M. to the end of the Conference. The motion also set the Conference Bar to include the first 8 pews on both sides of the church, and the platform.

The District Youth President, Rev. Roy Webster, gave his report.

Words of commendation were given to Rev. Webster by Rev. O. D. Emery and a rising vote of appreciation was given by the Conference.

It was stated that there could be no Auditor's report until the close of the year.

The District Youth Treasurer's report was given by Rev. Wm. Lyons. A motion was made and carried to receive this report.

The following Zone Presidents reported:

Blue Water Zone, Mr. Tim Hinkley.

Eastern Zone, Mr. David E. Bundy.

Industrial Zone, Mr. Walter Reynolds.

Saginaw Valley Zone, Rev. Truman Munsell.

A motion was made and carried that all these reports be accepted.

The chairman made mention of indicated changes taking place in our Youth work here and elsewhere in the church. He encouraged us to be careful not to make abrupt and sudden changes but give time for Councils and leaders to sit down and work out the programs needed. He urged us to keep flexible in our program but, with care, guard those programs and organizations which have worked in the past. Local Youth Society reports were given. There were 11 Youth Presidents, 3 Vice Presidents, and 3 Delegates who reported for their Societies

Upon expiration of time the morning session was dismissed with prayer by Dr. P. F. Elliott, President of Owosso College.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the Conference was called together by the piano playing of Rev. G. V. Skinner, and opened by Chairman, Rev. O. D. Emery.

The minutes of the previous sitting were approved as read.

A motion was made and carried that we receive the Local Society reports.

The Chairman reminded us that the Local Society has for its purpose the training hour which gives the youth expressional opportunity to active service. "Our objective is training, training, training to doing, doing, doing."

A motion was made and carried to give Dr. Elliott an honorary seat within the Conference Bar.

The following officers were elected by secret ballot:

District Youth President, Rev. Roy Webster elected to a two year term. District Youth Vice President, Rev. Ronald Walker.

District Youth Treasurer, Rev. Wm. Lyons

District Youth Secretary, Rev. H. James Kreider

The following Zone Presidents were elected:

Blue Water Zone, Mr. Tim Hinkley

Eastern Zone, Mr. David E. Bundy

Industrial Zone, Mr. Walt Reynolds

North Central Zone, Rev. Roger Gast

Saginaw Valley Zone, Rev. M. L. Tolan

A motion was made and carried that the Secretary cast a unanimous ballot to elect the five Zone Presidents by the Conference.

Rev. Roger Gast reported for the Resolutions Committee. The following resolutions were read and approved:

- 1. Whereas, the date of our District Youth Rally conflicts with the Michigan Sunday School Association Rally and the Detroit area HYC Rally, therefore be it resolved that Standing Rule Number 4 be changed to read "... the District Youth Rally, the last Saturday in October."
- 2. Resolution regarding Youth Conference. See Annual Resolution No. 1.
- 3. Resolution regarding a Youth Conference Committee. See Annual Resolution No. 2.
- 4. Resolution of Appreciation. See Annual Resolution No. 5.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was read by Rev. Wm. Lyons. The following resolutions were approved:

- 1. Resolution regarding Youth Camp Sunday. See Annual Resolution No. 3.
- 2. Resolution regarding changing Standing Rule No. 8. See Standing Rule No. 8.
- 3. Resolution regarding appreciation and love offering for Rev. O. D. Emery. See Annual Resolution No. 4.

A motion was made and carried to request the District Youth Council to study Standing Rule No. 15 of the 1965 Conference Journal and that they be given the power to revise and suggest modification for the resolution.

A motion was made and carried to authorize the District Youth Council to approve the minutes of the second sitting of the Conference.

After words of commendation by Rev. O. D. Emery the Conference was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Roy Webster.

Annual Resolutions

1. YOUTH CONFERENCE

Whereas there are many problems that arise each year because of our Youth Conference being held before the closing of our Conference Year. therefore be it resolved that we present this matter to the District Conference Committee for study in view of the total District program. Be it further resolved that their recommendation for changing the date shall be considered by the District Youth Council and said council shall be granted authority to change the District Youth Conference date for the coming year.

2. CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

Be it resolved that the District Youth Council appoint a committee each year, of five persons to serve as a Youth Conference Committee. The Youth Council shall designate one member of this Committee to serve as chairman. The District Youth President shall be a member of this Committee.

This Youth Conference Committee shall have the following duties:

- 1. Meet at the call of the chairman at least one month before the Youth Conference.
- 2. Receive all signed resolutions for their study and approval.
- 3. Report the committee's recommendations to the annual Youth Conference.
- 4. Provide the Secretary with a typewritten copy of all resolutions approved by the District Youth Conference.
- 5. Do any research work and study any matter requested of them by the Annual Youth Conference of Youth Council and report of the the same as requested.

3. YOUTH CAMP SUNDAY

Inasmuch as there is a need, in our churches, for the support and uniform promotion of our youth camps, be it therefore resolved that we designate the first Sunday of May, each year, as Youth Camp Sunday. Inasmuch as the youth we desire to reach are members of our Sunday Schools, we therefore request that Youth Camp Sunday be promoted through the Sunday Schools at which time we request that an offering be taken for the support of our youth camps, and that youth camp materials and applications be distributed.

4. APPRECIATION

Whereas this Youth Conference deeply appreciates the able leadership of Rev. O. D. Emery, Secretary of General Sunday School and Youth, in this Youth Conference, therefore be it resolved that we give him a love offering of \$20.00 to show our gratitude.

5. APPRECIATION

Whereas this Youth Conference appreciated the help and leadership of Rev. O. D. Emery, our General Secretary, and, the faithful and well directed leadership of Rev. Roy Webster, our District Youth President, and whereas the Emmanuel Pilgrim Holiness Church has so graciously opened its doors to this Conference, therefore be it resolved that we give these herein mentioned an expression of our appreciation by a rising vote of thanks.

Standing Rules

DISTRICT

1. YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Inasmuch as we feel that it is helpful for our Conference to know what the Youth Department is accomplishing, therefore be it resolved, that we request permission for the District Youth President to give a report to the District (adult) Conference each year.

2. CONFERENCE ELECTION

Inasmuch as the election of our District Youth Officers is important to the other business of the Conference; therefore, be it resolved that the election of officers be the first order of business following the reports.

3. PRINTING PROCEEDINGS

Inasmuch as it is helpful to have a permanent record of our youth work, therefore, be it resolved that we request that our journal of proceedings be published in the Conference Journal each year.

4. YOUTH CALENDAR

Be it resolved that the following dates be placed in the Standing Rules. Youth Conference and Convention the third Saturday of May, Youth Leaders Day the second Saturday of September, the District Youth Rally the last Saturday of October.

5. YOUTH COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that all youth committees appointed by the District Youth President be placed in the Youth Section of the Conference Journal.

6. MINUTES FROM CONFERENCE AND COUNCIL MEETINGS

Be it resolved that a copy of the Minutes of the Annual District Youth Conference and District Youth Council meetings be mailed to the District Superintendent within 10 days following such meetings.

7. DISTRICT JUNIOR-SENIOR BANQUET

Be it resolved that an Annual District Junior-Senior Banquet be planned for the first Saturday of May.

8. DISTRICT YOUTH OFFICERS SALARIES

Be it resolved that the District Youth President receive \$125.00 per year, the District Treasurer \$50.00 per year, and the District Secretary \$25.00 per year for their services.

ZONE

1. ZONE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Be it resolved that the Zone Presidents give a written report at the Youth Conference.

2. NOMINATIONS FOR ZONE PRESIDENTS

Whereas the District Council presents two names per zone for the election of Zone Presidents at the Youth Conference, and whereas the District Youth President is in close touch with each Zone; therefore, be it resolved that we request the District Youth President be allowed to meet with the District Council when making these nominations.

3. ZONE PRESIDENTS REPORTING

Whereas there has been a lack of communication between the Zones and the District Youth President; therefore, be it resolved that each Zone President report each Zone Rally to the District Youth President as soon as possible after each rally. Be it further resolved that the District Youth President provide all Zone Presidents a uniform report blank.

4. ZONE OFFICERS ELECTION

Inasmuch as the Zone Treasurer should be a qualified person; therefore be it resolved that the Zone Treasurer be elected from nominations made by the Zone Executive Committee.

5. DUTIES OF ZONE OFFICERS

Whereas there is a definite need for our Zone Officers to be informed of their responsibilities; therefore be it resolved that the duties of the Zone Officers be printed in the Conference Journal.

6. ZONE COUNCIL

Inasmuch as there has been a lack of uniformity in the composition of Zone Councils; therefore, be it resolved that the Zone Council shall consist of elected zone officers, local Youth Presidents or some other local officer in the President's absence, one Pastor to be elected as counsellor if a Pastor was not elected to the Zone Council.

7. ZONE RALLY COUNT

Whereas there is a need to encourage our youth to attend Zone Rallies, therefore, be it resolved that we adopt the following plan to be used in determining the count in all Rallies: under 9 years of age and over 35, one point each service; 9 through 12 and 20 through 35, three points each service; 13 through 19, six points each service, this includes Pastor and Youth President regardless of age. Pastor and Youth President are to receive a 10 point bonus each if they attend both services. This is added to the handicap for total points. In case the rally consists of only one service, the pastor and youth president shall still be given the 10 point bonus.

8. FIGURING THE HANDICAP

Be it resolved that the following handicap be placed in the standing rules of the Conference Journal: Subtract the number of active and associate members of the local society from 100, then multiply by .6. This figuring of a handicap shall be used in determining total points of local societies at all Zone Rallies.

EXAMPLE -- Local Society has 22 active and associate members, 100 less 22 equals 78. 78 x .6 equals 46.8 or a 47 handicap.

9. NUMBER OF RALLIES

Inasmuch as there is a need of unformity as to the number of zone rallies held each year, therefore, be it resolved that the minimum number of rallies per zone be set at four per year.

10. ZONE FINANCE

Whereas our zones will receive no finance from local societies; therefore, be it resolved that zone monies received be retained for the financial operation of the zone, except 10 per cent tithe which will be sent to the District Youth Treasurer.

11. Be it resolved that each zone shall pay 6 cents per mile, as traveling expense to any District Officer visiting the zone in the interest of youth work in addition to any honoraium given him.

12. ZONE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Be it resolved that no church shall have more than one person elected to the zone executive committee.

LOCAL

1. FINANCIAL SYSTEM

Be it resolved that each Local Society pay 10 per cent of Society receipts each month to the District Youth Treasurer. This resolution shall apply wherever Youth meetings are held and offerings taken.

2. Whereas we wish to cooperate with the General Youth Department's request for finances; therefore be it resolved that each local Youth Society pay 5 per cent of the Societies receipts each month to the District Youth Treasurer for the General Youth Department.

3. LOCAL YOUTH PRESIDENTS

Be it resolved that the names and addresses of the local youth presidents be placed in the Youth section of the Conference Journal.

4. UNIFORM REPORTING BY YOUTH PRESIDENTS

Whereas there is need for a more uniform reporting at the District Youth Conference; be it therefore resolved that the District Youth President provide a report form for each Local Youth President at least 15 days before District Youth Conference, and this report be presented in writing.

CAMP

1. YOUTH ACTIVITIES DURING CAMP MEETING

Be it resolved that the Youth Department and the Camp Board be in charge of, and provide for all youth activities during the Annual District Camp Meeting.

2. YOUTH CAMPS

Be it resolved that the date and number of youth camps be decided upon by the District Youth Council and the Camp Board.

3. YOUTH CAMP SUPPORT

Whereas there will be no youth camp offerings received in the zones; therefore, be it resolved that funds for development and improvement of our youth camp be raised through District Youth projects.

COLLEGE

1. YOUTH IN ACTION DAY

Whereas Owosso College is planning a yearly Youth In Action Day; therefore be it resolved that we support this program.

Duties of Zone Officers

President:

- 1. Meet with the Zone Committee and plan dates in advance for Zone Rallies.
- 2. Send a copy of dates which have been set for Zone meetings to the District Youth President and to all Pastors in the Zone.
- 3. Plan and promote all Zone Rallies.
- 4. Preside at all Zone Rallies.
- 5. Report all Zone Rallies to the District Youth President.
- 6. Give attention to financial matters of the Zone.
- 7. Serve on the District Youth Council.
- 8. Co-operate in promoting the District and National Youth Program.
- 9. Must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the local youth society.
- 10. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the Zone.

Vice-President:

- 1. Serve on the Zone Committee.
- 2. Serve for one year as the Zone President requests.
- 3. Must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the local Youth Society.

Treasurer:

- 1. Receive and disburse funds as directed by the Zone Committee.
- 2. Keep accurate records of receipts and disbursements and bank all monies immediately upon receiving.
- 3. Send in regularly 10 per cent of all offerings to the district youth treasurer.
- 4. Send a treasurer's report at least twice a year to the Zone Pastors.
- 5. Serve on the Zone Committee.
- 6. Must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the local youth society.

Secretary:

- 1. Keep minutes of all Zone Committee meetings.
- 2. Help the Zone President with Zone correspondence.
- 3. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local youth officers in the Zone.
- 4. Must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the local youth society.
