## CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

### FIRST SESSION

The First Annual Conference of the Florida District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 7:45 p.m., Tuesday, January 26, 1954, in the new Pilgrim Holiness Church in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

Rev. Ray Richards, the host pastor, opened the conference by delivering a short address of welcome and then introduced the conference song evangelists, Mr. and Mrs. Max Hamilton and sons, of Greensburg, Indiana.

At the close of a lively song service Rev. Richards relinquished the reins of the service to the Field Superintendent, Rev. J. M. Burcham. At the proper place in the service Rev. Burcham introduced the evening's speaker, Rev. R. A. Beltz, the Conference's permanent chairman and General Secretary of Church Extension of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, from Indianapolis, Indiana.

Rev. Beltz addressed the conference on the theme of "Mountain Moving Faith."

### SECOND SESSION

The second session opened with a song service led by Mr. Hamilton which was followed by a devotional period conducted by Rev. J. H. Morningstar.

Rev. R. A. Beltz took the chair, at the invitation of Field Superintendent Burcham, and proceeded with the order of business. He gave a brief summary of the infant district's achievements and a short history of its conception and birth. He followed this with a statement of the Church Extension Department's financial investment in the Florida District.

Rev. Beltz then announced the following appointments by the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church: District Superintendent, Rev. J. M. Burcham; District Secretary, Rev. Moreland Yundt; and District Treasurer, Rev. Ray Richards.

A roll call, called for, was made of the participating ministry, potential ministerial members, and lay delegates.

A motion was made and seconded that all new ministerial members, heretofore not associated with the district in its embryo stage, be directed to appear before the district council for examination before their admittance. The motion carried.

A motion prevailed to seat Mrs. Dora Newton as delegate for the Miami church to replace their duly elected delegate who was unavoidably hindered from being present.

A motion was supported to seat Mrs. J. H. Morningstar as the lay delegate for Kissimmee, who had made no provision for a delegate.

A motion carried making the first four rows of the conference bar.

A motion was passed to seat all ministers, those whose names were called at the roll call, as honorary members until validated by the conference as full-fledged members.

The Committee on Reception introduced the following guests: Rev. and Mrs. I. K. Blowers and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Max Hamilton, and Rev. C. M. Andrews.

The newly appointed District Superintendent, Rev. J. M. Burcham, gave his Field Superintendent's report. It was approved as read.

The Committee on Auditing gave a favorable report on the District Treasurer's book. Their report was accepted.

The District Treasurer reported with an itemized account of receipts and disbursements for the year.

The District Statistician gave his report. The report was accepted as it was amended by suggestions from the conference.

The Committee on Reception introduced Rev. Eugene Freeland, a United

Brethren minister from Miami, to the conference.

Rev. A. L. Luttrull, conference evangelist, dismissed the session with prayer.

### THIRD SESSION

Max Hamilton opened the session with a service of praise in song.

Rev. Eugene Freeland sang a medley of hymns playing his own accompaniment at the piano.

Rev. I. K. Blowers delivered a soul-stirring devotional message.

Rev. R. A. Beltz spoke on the leadership qualities of an individual coming to the forefront in times of emergency. His message was entitled, "Paul, A Leader," and his lesson was taken from Acts, the 27th chapter.

The Committee on Ways and Means reported. (See report.)

The report by the Committee on Resolutions was accepted with some amendments to Resolution number 4. The amended amendment reads: "that we print 200 copies and sell them for 35c each."

### FOURTH SESSION

During the opening song service the congregation was treated to a special song by the Hamilton brothers, Phillip, age 4, and Stephen, age 2.

The Spirit of God, in a very moving fashion, fell upon the congregation as they were led in prayer by Rev. I. K. Blowers. The spiritual atmosphere that prevailed during the prayer period continued through a soul-searching message delivered by Rev. A. L. Luttrull.

Following the sermon Rev. R. A. Beltz gave a pictorial retrospect, through the medium of colored slides, of the vast church extension program carried on by the Pilgrim Holiness Church. He accompanied the slides with a running commentary of explanation of each picture. He brought the service to a climactic close by showing a scene of a golden harvest field, the heads of grain, bent and drooping, white unto harvest. This scene was followed with one of a beautiful sunset emphasizing that "the night cometh when no man can work" is rapidly closing in upon us.

### FIFTH SESSION

Rev. Eugene Freeland led the song service and Rev. Russel Howard brought the Scriptural portion of the devotional period.

Resolution number 5 was presented by the Committee on Resolutions. It was adopted as amended. The words, "undivided efforts and support," were substituted with, "Undivided loyalty and entire support."

The Committee on Memorials to the General Conference reported. (See report.)

### SIXTH SESSION

Prior to the convening of this session a photographer from the Fort Lauderdale Daily News photographed the assembled conference for the minutes, and the District Council for the next edition of their paper.

A motion prevailed that the District Superintendent appoint the district trustees. He appointed the district council.

A motion was supported to elect the District Council to serve as both the Educational and Examining Boards.

The Rev. Mrs. Celia Bradshaw Winkle was elected as the Ministerial delegate-at-large to the General Conference.

Rev. Russel Howard was elected to serve as alternate ministerial delegate-at-large.

A motion was made and supported that each pastor nominate a lay candidate for lay delegate to the General Conference.

Mr. Ernest White, of Saint Petersburg, was elected lay delegate and Mr. Harold Winkle, of Bradenton, was elected alternate.

The Committee on memoirs reported.

The conference empowered the District Council to administer any unfinished business of the conference.

Rev. R. A. Beltz made a brief but fitting address to bring the business sessions to an end.

## SEVENTH SESSION

The Hamiltons and Rev. A. L. Luttrull both participated in a very enjoyable service to bring the historical First Annual Conference of the Florida District to a close.



## FIELD SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the First Annual Conference of The Florida District of The Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings in the name of Christ our coming king.

Without question we all need to bow our heads and our hearts for this great moment in the history of our church. Churches and newly organized districts are not commonplace these days. They represent a tremendous amount of toil, tears, sacrifice, and venturesome faith in God.

This occasion indeed represents the complete cooperation of spirit-filled men and women who would rather see the Lord's work advance than to receive great gain unto themselves.

By the good guidance from the Department of Church Extension, under the faithful leadership of Rev. R. A. Beltz, plus the sacrificing ministry, a faithful laity, and a host of other boosters and contributors, we are met together for this heavenly occasion.

History will record that each of us present have been privileged to turn the first conference page of this newly organized Florida District.

Somewhat like the early pioneers of our country, the General Board three years ago staked off a claim on a portion of the United States as a designated place for the establishment of new Pilgrim Holiness Churches. That claim was the state of Florida. Since this action God has wonderfully worked in our midst for which we are so grateful. We hope the following report will substantiate this claim.

### AVON PARK

God has given us some faithful Pilgrims at Avon Park with Rev. Howard as their newly appointed pastor. Rev. Howard replaced Rev. Ray Fitzgerald who resigned to take up teaching duties in our Frankfort Pilgrim College. The pastor of this field has worked hard to strengthen this work which has had its difficulties as well as its times of great blessing. They recently built a three room parsonage to the rear of the church which has helped the work in many ways. This put their rent money into their church loan. Also it has provided permanent living quarters for our ministry. Furthermore it is suitable for classroom conversion.

The people of this field are greatly encouraged and feel their future will be brighter.

## **BRADENTON**

Our Bradenton Church brings to this conference a very encouraging report. They have become the first church in the district to liquidate their entire indebtedness. They have made steady progress since their beginning under the good leadership of the pastor Sister Winkle. This pastor has worked hard to bring to you this splendid report. They also have purchased a small parsonage with sufficient ground on which to build a new one later. They are sponsoring the Sunday School hour broadcast, and have already consulted us about definite plans for new class rooms for the coming year. At no time has stagnation been evident in this work and today they are on the road to better things.

## **ST. PETERSBURG**

The St. Petersburg church came through with the greatest year since its beginning. God has added new people to the church during the past twelve months. For this we are very grateful. This church carries the largest yearly and weekly average of our District. They have a twenty-one weekly average increase over a year ago. Also their District Budget and all other financial obligations have been paid in full. Plans for bettering the Sunday School are being laid, and growth in each department is being evidenced. Their future looks bright. The pastor gives credit to the good and faithful laity for its splendid gains.

## **MIAMI**

The Miami church has passed another milestone under the faithful leadership of its pastor Rev. Moreland Yundt. This has not been an easy field. Circumstances have made the going hard, yet God has evidenced His presence many times and given them the victory. They have built a lovely new parsonage with garage and a study attached. The pastor has spent many long hard hours in this project and deserves much of the credit for its accomplishment. We look ahead at this work in full confidence that God will lead His people victoriously on.

## **KISSIMMEE**

Our Kissimmee Pilgrims have been somewhat like the people of Israel as they prepared their Exodus from Egypt. Rev. Morningstar with patience of iron has been forced to wait God's time to make the necessary moves in this field. Although things have seemed much delayed at times yet the pastor and people on this field have never gone to sleep. They have informed me of their intended plans for progress this year. May we in the name of Jesus pray heaven's best for these fine Pilgrims.

## **FT. LAUDERDALE**

The latest district development falls to the great city of Ft. Lauderdale where our Pilgrims are being faithfully led by the pastor Rev. Ray Richards. Without the progress of this fine work we would not be assembled this day as we are. This work which had many fade away periods in its beginning has definitely taken shape and is on its way upward and forward. The pastor and people are to be commended for their sacrifice and the accomplishment of this new gospel beacon. This work shows every sign of becoming a strong spiritual church.

**NEW PROSPECTS** are evidenced in many portions of our state. Investigations have been conducted in each of the following fields; West Palm Beach, Key West, Ft. Myers, Tampa, Kissimmee, Clearwater and Orlando. In each of these cities we have some of our own Pilgrims who are not privileged to worship in their own church. Due to the great need and lack of funds we were unable to

reach these harvest fields in time to see developments for this Conference. At no time since the start of the Florida District have we had to wait for open doors. We are ready to go to work if funds can be found with which to operate.

## MY PERSONAL REPORT

In the past year we have been honored by the presence of God throughout the District. It affords me great pleasure to report we have enjoyed the best of Christian fellowship with our District pastors. This fellowship became even sweeter as we came to the closing of the year. In all our meetings and counsels with the ministry there has not been the slightest ruffle among us. For this wholesome atmosphere I am indeed very grateful, for it has made our task so much easier. I have never worked with a more congenial and respectful group of ministers. They have borne with me, and some way have been able to find a place in their hearts for me as well as to look over and forgive my faults.

This splendid spirit seemed to carry throughout our laity as we finished conducting the annual meetings. The final report of each meeting shows each pastor being recalled for another year. This is unusual but we praise God for it.

In my labors as your Field Superintendent outside my St. Petersburg pastoral duties, I have:

Held 4 annual meetings.

Organized 1 church.

Conducted 16 board meetings.

Met with pastors on 3 occasions to make necessary remodeling plans for improvement.

Made personal investigations of 16 prospective communities for new Pilgrim Churches.

Have to our knowledge answered all mail regarding the District.

Met with our Secy. of Church Extension on numerous occasions in the interest of the District.

Visited each church 2 to 4 times.

Donated 264 hours of manual labor.

Met the District Council 4 times.

Preached 17 times.

Raised funds on 2 occasions.

Attended 1 Supt. Conference.

Attended the Pastors and Wives Conference.

I have traveled approximately 6000 miles for the District.

Received from Dept. of Church Extension for mileage \$183.53.

Received from Florida District for Mileage \$122.10.

Received my salary in full.

Our Florida District shows a gain of 126 in membership since its beginnings.

In conclusion may I express my deep appreciation to the leader of the Department of Church Extension, our District Council, every pastor and companion, and all laymen for their cooperation this past year. I have appreciated your prayers and kind words of encouragement.

We are now on the road to a greater Florida District. There are many victories ahead if we will dare to accept the challenge. I pray God to help us in faith to join hands and hearts once again as we prepare to go out into this new year determined that it shall be the greatest year of all our lives. To this end may we march onward and upward as we are led by the Master's hand.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

1. We recommend that the district officials shall be reimbursed, when using their automobiles, at the rate of five cents per mile plus meals and lodging when traveling in the district's interest.
2. We recommend that one-half of all ministerial tithes be paid to the district treasurer by all the licensed and ordained ministers of the conference.
3. We recommend that each district church be assessed 5 per cent of all the regular offerings of the church, Sunday school and young peoples services as their portion of the district budget.
4. We recommend that, inasmuch as Home Missionary Districts are exempted from paying the General Budget, we give special emphasis to the three yearly offerings for the General Church's interests, namely; the Rally Day offering for Sunday schools, the November Self-denial offering for Foreign Missions and the Easter offering for Church Extension.
5. We recommend that the District Budget be prorated as follows: General Conference 15%, District Conference 10%, District Church Extension 22%, District Administration 50%, and a District Contingent Fund 3%.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

1. We recommend that the conference year shall coincide with the calendar year and that the conference shall convene on the fourth Tuesday of each January.
2. We recommend that the District Superintendent shall appoint all committees.
3. We recommend that 200 copies of the Journal of Proceedings of the First annual conference of the Florida District be printed and we further recommend that they be sold for 35c each.
4. We recommend that the local church treasurers balance their books at the close of each month and send all district and general funds at once to the district treasurer.
5. Whereas there are many groups engaged in gospel work that continue to solicit the co-operation and financial support of our people, and, Whereas, the Pilgrim Holiness Church furnishes us with a full program of gospel work in the local church, the district and the world wide program of church extension and missionary work, and, Whereas while we do recognize that there are many other worthy groups engaged in gospel work, and we bid them God's speed, but we further believe that our own church deserves our full support, .  
Therefore be it resolved that we advise and encourage all our Pilgrims in the Florida district to give their undivided loyalty and entire support to the work of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.



## COMMITTEE'S REPORT ON MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

1. Re: Withdrawal of Members Paragraph 3, Section 38, Page 35. We recommend that the clause, "over a period of a year," be deleted from paragraph 3, section 38, page 35 of the Manual. And we further recommend that said section be amended to read: "Members of a church who wilfully fail to attend services or who fail to support it financially as they are able or fail in keeping the whole Church Covenant, may be dropped from the rolls, provided a letter has been mailed to them notifying them of intention to drop them from the roll, and providing they have been dealt with according to Matthew 18:15-20." (Note: Amendment underscored.)
