REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To our esteemed General Secretary of Church Extension, Dr. R. C. Hawkins; To the ministers and layleaders who are members of this conference; To our visitors and friends; Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord and Redeemer.

Another year has moved swiftly into the annals of human history, and the closing of this conference year brings to a close another quadrennium of effort by our district for God and our church. The records that we have written are parallel to those recorded by the Christian church throughout their 2000 years of history. You have shared with me in both triumph and trial with gains in one area only to be offset by losses in another.

In the past three or four years, our work in the Gulf-states area has been effected by organizations, on no way connected with our church, working in an effort to champion the rights of minority groups in our society. For the next several years, all of us will find ourselves in troubled waters in this regard. Men can never and will never be equal in a society such as ours until they have been set free from sin by the blood of Jesus Christ. We have been called of God to champion the right of the sinner by showing him the way of our Christ regardless of who he is or where he is from. We are not sent as reformers of a social order or economic reformers. We must preach Christ and Him crucified.

Our reports reflect nearly a 10% loss in Sunday Schools with Bastrop absorbing over half of this. The membership will show a slight numerical gain of 3 or 4.

Both Birmingham and Bogalusa continue to show steady numerical gains and are finding their place among the strong churches of our district. The gains at Birmingham are the kind that claim the attention of all of us. They have more than doubled their church membership and are near double in Sunday School attendance in two short years under the capable leadership of Rev. and Mrs. Charles Crowder.

Huntsville has a beautiful new brick church which is adequate in every respect. This includes an auditorium with laminated arch construction, full basement, spacious parking area, completely air conditioned, and a total of 5,800 square feet of floor space. This lovely church plant will accommodate 250 people. This \$85,000 property is an outgrowth of a \$6000 beginning just a few short years ago. It further reflects

the dedicated work and sacrifice of a wonderful group of laity and the effort of Rev. and Mrs. Shelton and their predecessors. This work has a bright future and will show gains this year.

Seven of our churches are in the 100% bracket in fulfilling their District and General church obligations. Alexandria is the pace setter in total district and General church giving. Many months of preplanning, by the church board and wise guidance of Rev. and Mrs. Goins, have paved the way for a new educational unit for this solid church.

Magnolia Springs is in second place in total giving with Pineville, Huntsville, and Birmingham in close range. Bayou La Batre and Columbus complete the list of churches and pastors that make up this distinguished group of "ONE HUNDRED PER CENTERS."

In looking forward to this new quadrennium, your Superintendent and Conference Action Committee are presenting a program entitled "Waging the War." This program has its beginning with fighting on our knees with the mighty weapon of prayer. From this prayerful beginning we will launch an offensive in every local church with each pastor leading the way in conquest of goals further outlined in the program you have in your hands. I trust this program will be adopted and that it will serve not only as a guideline with goals, but that it will be a constant reminder that we are at war.

What I witnessed at this altar last night must become the norm for the district rather than the unusual and is an example of the war we must wage. I call on each of you for an all-out offensive this coming year. Go back and sound the trumpet and let us march to victory.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the Gulf States Conference now in session at Paul Johnson State Park, Mississippi, this twenty-first day of July, 1965.

This has been a year of heavy losses, but there are a few bright spots here and there which should encourage us in the midst of these other calamities.

Although the records of this past year leave much to be desired, we can look forward to a good year ahead; if we will but plan our work and then work our plan. There is no shame in discarding methods that are obsolete and adopting newer and more effective ones. Rather, this is the earmark of a successful church school.

Let this year ahead be one of forgetting those things that are behind, and may we be found pressing, praying, and preparing for next year at this time when, hopefully, we can give reports of successes in our Sunday Schools.

The report for the year included seventeen churches reporting. Six (6) churches show a total gain of 33. Eleven (11) churches report a total loss of 114, for a NET LOSS of 81.

On the bright side of the slate, highest honors go to Bogalusa for a numerical gain of 5 and a percentage gain of 10%. Bogalusa has shown a consistent gain for six straight years.

Huntsville has a numerical gain of 6 with a percentage gain of 8%. Oakdale, a numerical gain of 1 and a percentage gain of 3%. Columbus, a numerical gain of 1 and a

percentage gain of 7%; and Birmingham, a numerical gain of 3 with a percentage gain of 3%. Ribbon winners are, respectively: Bogalusa, 10%, Huntsville 8%, and Columbus with 7%. Honorable mention is given to Birmingham and Oakdale churches.

CONFERENCE ACTION COMMITTEE

Section I: Regulations:

1. Reports:

- A. Be it resolved that two copies of monthly reports be made. One copy of which shall be received by the District Superintendent no later than the 10th of the month.
- B. Be it resolved that three copies of the annual reports are to be made and one shall go to the District Superintendent, one to the Statistician, and one copy to be retained for local files.

2. Resolved that each preacher and deaconess send a copy of his or her annual report to the District Statistician, not later than ten days after the conference year closes.

3. Resolved that the elected advisory member to the District Council may be a lay member.

4. Resolved that we have a District camp to accommodate both the needs of youth and adults. Be it further resolved that this camp begin at noon on the first Monday in August and close on Friday night and that conference convene on Saturday morning at 8:00 A.M.

5. Be it resolved that no pastor be absent from his church more than 30 days a year, camp meeting excepted.

6. In as much as the General Board has rezoned our district as a part of the Central Pilgrim College School Zone; Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and one lay member serve as our representative on the school board during the coming year.

7. Whereas the District Superintendent is in closer relation with our ministers of the district and their ministerial standing that the Educational and Examining Board; Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be a standing member of the Educational and Examining Board.

8. Be it resolved that the entire camp fund be used only at the discretion of the District Conference; Be it further resolved that the District Council has access to this fund on a "Short Term Loan" basis.

9. Be it resolved that the names of all evangelists be put into the district minutes, providing they are passed on by conference members.

10. Be it resolved that any church desiring to call an evangelist of another denomination should first consult the District Superintendent.

11. Be it resolved that the first Friday of each month be known as a day of fasting, prayer, soul-burden and consecration.

12. Be it resolved that our conference year close on June 30, and that all reports be in by July 10th.

13. Be it resolved that the Gulf States District begin the "Waging the War" program as presented to us by the District Superintendent with the approval of the Church Extension Secretary and recommended by the District Council. That this program embody the following goals and objectives:

- A. Waging War on our knees
- B. Waging war to enlarge local church
- C. Waging a war for prosperity
- D. Waging the war by planned aggression
- E. Waging the war on all present established battle-fields.
- F. Establish District goals.
- G. Requirements for local churches to be considered "Mobilized for war."

14. Whereas the work of the Resolution Committee and the Ways and Means Committee is of a nature, at times, that it necessitates a combined meeting of the two; Be it resolved that this Conference establish a "Conference Action Committee" consisting of five men to take the place of these Committees.

15. Resolved that each church consider a hospitalization plan for its pastor.

16. Resolved that there be nine Regional Monthly Meetings of preachers for the purpose of: Fellowship, instruction, the giving of reports, and the bringing in of the monthly budget payments. The time and place of each monthly meeting will be set by the District Superintendent, who will notify each pastor of said meetings.

17. Resolved that the Gulf States Conference, in accordance with a recent action of the General Board, elect a CYC Director and a Director of the PELT program.

18. Resolved that the date for the District Ministerial Meeting be set for the month of January, beginning on the third Tuesday at noon and ending Wednesday evening.

19. Inasmuch as the laymen of the Gulfstates District constitute the larger part of the total membership, and whereas a good share of the support of this district comes from the laymen; and whereas an active cooperating lay group is an asset to the district program; Be it resolved that at least one member of the District Council shall be a layman.

Section II: Finance:

1. Be it resolved that the District Conference pay the gasoline travel expense of each automobile involved in the pastor's monthly meetings.

2. We recommend that all money from the local churches for District operations and General Church operations be brought to the Regional Monthly Meetings by each pastor.

3. We recommend that the District Treasurer be paid \$10.00 a month for his services; also that each member of the District Council be paid at the rate of five cents per mile when called to District Council meetings and the District Treasurer and Secretary be supplied their stationary and postage for district work.

4. We recommend that our District Secretary be paid \$50.00 a year for his services.

5. We recommend that our Sunday School Promotional Secretary and Executive Youth Secretary attend the Worker's Conference held annually at Church Headquarters. Expense for same shall be taken from these separate departmental funds.

6. We recommend that our Sunday School fund be adopted by the following plan; (a) The first Sunday of August shall be known as "S. S. Dolar Day" in our churches wherein adults shall be urged to give one dollar, (b) All Sunday School offerings received this first Sunday of August shall be sent no later than August 15th to the District Treasurer. This is to become a separate S. S. fund which shall further be used to promote District Sunday School work.

7. We recommend that the district pay its portion of the District Superintendent's salary which is \$175.00 a month, also that we pay him a 6 cent per mile travel expense, his postage, stationary, telephone expense (as used in connection with his duties in District work) and his utilities.

8. We recommend that the district pay the District Superintendent's Social Security.

9. We recommend this conference adopt a unified budget of 15% of regular church and Sunday School offerings. This 15% to cover District and General interests. This money to be prorated by the District Council.

10. We recommend that our conference adopt a home missionary plan: a dollar a year per member for each new church.

CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

The fifth annual conference of the Gulfstates District of Pilgrim Holiness Churches convened at 8 A.M. on July 21, 1965 at Johnson State Park, near Hattisburg, Mississippi. A lovely Mississippi morning was further adorned by the blessing of God's presence as delegates and ministers assembled beneath the pines for another yearly meeting. District Superintendent, Arnold Peck, greeted those assembled and envited them to begin with a song. Edsel Goins, pastor from Alexandria, led the congregation in singing the song, "Sound the Battle Cry." Pastor of the West Monroe church, Rev. W. E. Crowder, led the group in prayer.

The Chairman of the conference, Dr. R. C. Hawkins, was introduced and presented a challenge to the gathering. "Making our witness relevant" was the theme of his message. "The Bible," he said, "is a book that reveals, not man's wisdom, but the perfect will of God." Our business then," he continued, "is to give the message to our day with a prayer that the Spirit will use it to the salvation of others. This witness is seen first through ones personality; second, through his prejudices, and finally, problems faced with sanctified characters and grace reveals the relevancy of God's message to our day."

The conference secretary was asked to call the roll. A total of 12 delegates were present, 2 district trustees, 1 advisory council member and 16 ordained and licensed ministers.

Rev. Peck moved to seat the District Trustees, Mr. B. F. Garlington and Mr. J. D. Hooter, both of Alexandria, La.

The Chairman then called for those persons who were to be introduced to the conference. Rev. Jack Polson introduced the following persons: Rev. Paul Scheuermeier, pastor at Pineville, Louisiana; Rev. Ed Moore, pastor at Bogalusa, Louisiana, and Rev. Richard Powell, District Superintendent of the Texas district. They were all received. Rev Powell was given an honorary seat in the conference.

The Superintendent was asked to set the bounds of the conference bar. The front section with the benches left of the Chairman were outlined as the area in which the delegates and members should sit. It was ruled that business session should include the period from 8:00 A.M. until adjournment.

Rev. Hawkins called for the report of the Educational and Examining Board. Rev. Jack Polson reported that the group recommended Elmer Cruthirds to be given first year district license, carried.

A ruling was asked from the conference floor regarding the relation of junior and members in figuring the number of delegates to represent a church. The chairman ruled for the present, that they should not be included when finding total number of delegates. He suggested that the board of General Superintendents be written in order to receive a definite ruling on this matter.

Dr. Hawkins called for the report of the District Superintendent. Rev. Peck announced for the first time the business interest the Gulfstates District has in Southern Memorial Gardens, Baton Rouge, Louisiana. He reported a potential income of $5\frac{1}{2}$ million dollars with an actual value of \$500,000.00 of this amount the district owns one half. He also told of a gift of 5000 shares of stock belonging to the church with the market value of over \$6,000.00.

The chairman gave words of commendation for the work of Rev. Peck, and ask that the conference give a rising vote of thanks to him for his work and report.

The report of the auditing committee noted that the district books do not balance up to June 1, 1965. The work of Paul Scheuermeier, temporary Treasurer, did balance. It was suggested that the committee be allowed to complete their audit after conference and that the results be noted. It was revealed that difficulties appeared because Rev. Kensell, former treasurer had left before the end of the conference year and was not available for explanations.

The report of the District Treasurer was given by Paul Scheuermeier. It was accepted with the note that the Loan to the Shreveport Church be listed in accounts receivable.

The Statisticians report was given by Paul Schooley, a member of the Statistical Committee, and was received.

The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Thomas Garrison, read his report, which was accepted.

The pastors report revealed a spirit of determination to press forward in the cause of Christ. An "Amen" from the delegates accepted them as given.

A recess for 10 minutes was called at 9:20 A.M.

The conference resumed business at 9:30 A.M. and were advised that Robert Norris, advisory member of the District Council, was to be seated as a member of the conference, and that the alternate from Columbus was seated.
