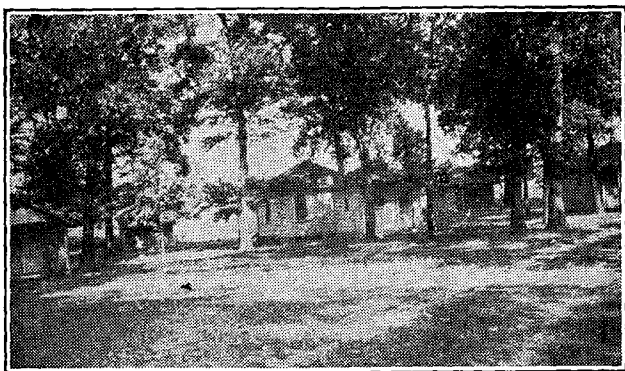

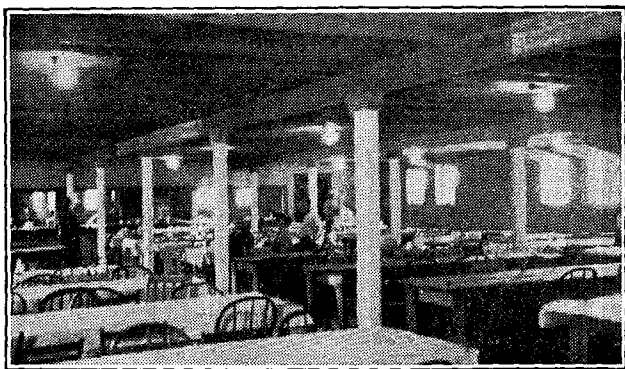

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

Morning Session—Monday, August 15, 1927

The fifth annual assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Indiana District convened in the tabernacle on the Camp Ground at Frankfort, Indiana, Monday morning, August 15, 1927, with Rev. W. R. Cox, General Superintendent in chair. A devotional service was conducted by Rev. Paul Greeson, reading the twelfth chapter of Romans, after which Rev. A. M.

Ewing led in prayer. Then, an address was given by our General Superintendent, Rev. W. R. Cox.

Moved and supported that each pastor hand in to the secretary the names of their delegates at once. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that the conference bar extend from the front four tiers of seats back to the third post. Carried.

The following ministers came forward to be introduced into the conference as advisory members: Rev.'s C. G. Taylor, A. R. Miller, Paul H. Greeson, J. T. Cotton, Frank Buffington, Kentucky District; W. R. Teltoe, Carrol Jones, Grace Jones, M. H. Adams, Marguerite Baker, O. G. Hahn, W. H. Pratt, Illinois District; R. A. Beltz, Illinois District; E. Bradley, Terre Haute; Stelle Gasauay, All Dodson, Cedar Run, Michigan; Minnie Snyder, Illinois District; Miriam Moxier, Illinois District; Miriam Moxier, Illinois District; Frank Brown, Kentucky District; Miss Jeannah Steward, Kentucky District.

Moved and supported that the above mentioned names be accepted into conference bar as advisory members. Carried.

Moved and supported that all local preachers who are in active ministerial work as pastors, be admitted to the conference bar and have privilege of voting. Carried.

Moved and supported that we adopt the rules in our manual for this assembly. Carried.

Rev. E. W. Wright was appointed by Rev. A. M. Ewing to fill the vacancy of Brother Bradley on the Educational Committee.

The following names were appointed to assist the statistical committee: Minnie Snyder, Miriam Moxier and Hattie Dunkleberger.

Rev. R. W. Chatfield was appointed to fill the vacancy on the Examining Committee.

Rev. A. H. Plunkett was appointed to serve on the Auditing Committee.

Rev. Paul Greeson was appointed to fill the vacancy on the Ordination Committee.

Moved and supported that the offer of Sister Agnes McVay of her assistance to the Secretary be accepted. Carried.

Moved and supported that the different committees be dismissed to get material prepared for the assembly. Carried.

Next in order was to read reports and the pastors of the following churches reported and reports were accepted by the Assembly: Anderson (first and second churches), Aurora, Coalmont, Versailles, Dupont and East Columbus.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn. Carried.

Afternoon Session—Monday, August 15, 1927

This afternoon session of the assembly was called to order with Rev. W. R. Cox in chair. Song service was conducted by Rev. C. E. Snow and prayer by Rev. Glenn Newton.

First in order was the reading of the minutes of last session and calling of roll.

The chairman called for pastor's reports to be read and the following reports were read:

English report was read by Wilbur Moore and received.

Evansville first church report was read by Bro. Senn, and carried.

Rev. Augus Jeffers, pastor of Evansville second church read the report and was received by the assembly.

Forrest church report was read and accepted by the assembly.

Frankfort second church report was read by the pastor, Nora Allen and the report was received.

Rev. Crowder read the report from the French Lick Church and it was received.

Rev. Harry Shepherd read the report from the Greenwood church and it was received by the assembly.

The report from the Greensburg church was read and accepted.

Grey's Ridge report was read and received after correction.

Moved and supported that we suspend the reading of reports until some committee reads a report.

Committee on Examination brought in a resolution that we write a letter

of transfer to Theodore Theabold to the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Granted.

Next was the reading of the report of the Ways and Means Committee.

The following recommendations were read by the Ways and Means Committee Secretary and, after a second reading, were received:

Moved and supported that we refer the resolution relative to pro-rating of budget, to the committee. Carried.

Moved and supported that each church pay \$1.00 per month to The Old People's Home. Carried.

Moved and supported that we adjourn.

Evening Session—Monday, August 15, 1927

The evening session of the assembly was called to order by the chairman, Rev. W. R. Cox, in chair. Song was sung entitled "Tell it to Jesus," after which we were led in prayer by Rev. W. A. Frye.

By request of chair, Rev. A. M. Ewing was called on to explain the report blank.

Moved and supported that we extend the time thirty minutes. The vote tied and the chair voted off the time by way of a compromise that we extend the time fifteen minutes. Carried.

Moved and supported that we leave off the word "amount" in the Sunday School report in Article 6.

Moved and supported that we take the two items "Number of prayer meetings and Class Meetings" reported under the head of the pastor's report. Carried.

Moved and supported that the words in the summary report "Total amount paid out from this place for quarter" be stricken out. Carried.

Moved and supported that we dispense with the remainder of reports after making corrections on reports, they be turned to Committee. Carried.

Moved and supported that we have our Ordination Service at the evening session, Tuesday evening. Carried.

Moved and supported that we erase small print at top of our report blanks. "Include all finances in this report, including all the departments." Carried.

Moved and supported that we adjourn. Carried.

Morning Session—Tuesday, August 16, 1927

The Tuesday morning session of the assembly was called to order by Rev. W. R. Cox in chair. The song service was conducted by Rev. Floyd Goins with prayer by Rev. Lee Goins.

Rev. Pleiny Cox from the Free Methodist Church was introduced to the assembly and given a place in the conference bar as an advisory member. Moved and supported that he speak by Rev. W. R. Cox relative to the difficulties of the churches be printed and also published in the church paper. Carried.

Moved and supported that Sister Chatfield summarize the treasurer's report of the conference. Carried.

The roll was called and the minutes of the last session were read and received.

Moved and supported that we set the time for the election of officers at 2:00 P. M., Tuesday, August 16, 1927. Carried.

Report of the camp treasurer, Rev. A. M. Ewing was read and received.

Report of conference and camp treasurer, Sister Chatfield was read and accepted.

Final report of the district treasurer's report was read and accepted.

Partial report of the Ways and Means Committee was read.

Moved and supported that all the actions of the former assembly remain in action until annulled. Carried.

Partial report of the Auditing Committee was given and found the report of the Burial Association books to be complete and received.

The following new churches were accepted into the conference as follows: Shelburn Pilgrim Holiness Church comes with 26 members. This church was received and the delegate admitted to the Conference Bar.

Grace Pilgrim Holiness Church at South Washington was accepted with

21 members.

Jonesboro Pilgrim Holiness Church was received into the conference with 14 members.

Church at Rushville came to us with 20 members and received into conference.

Pilgrim Holiness Church at Fairmount was received into the conference with 38 members.

Pilgrim Holiness Church at Ft. Wayne was admitted into conference with 11 members.

Moved and supported that we adopt the file system Camp Association as the District Superintendent has already arranged. Carried.

Moved and supported that we set the time and place for our next ministerial convention. Carried. Different invitations were given as follows: Lafayette, Logansport, Kokomo, Frankfort, Tipton, Indianapolis 1st church and Anderson. After voting, Lafayette was the place chosen and that the time and program be left to the State Council. Carried.

Partial report of the Resolution Committee was read by Brother Wright and the following received:

Rev. E. Hannah was introduced to the assembly and given a place in the conference bar as an advisory member.

Rev. E. W. Wright read the report of the Burial Association and it was accepted.

Moved and supported that we adjourn. Carried.

Benediction by Rev. Edward Schoeff.

Afternoon Session—Tuesday, August 16, 1927.

The afternoon session was called to order with Rev. W. R. Cox in chair. After devotional services we entered into regular business.

Moved and supported that we dispense of the roll call. Carried.

Next in order was the reading of the minutes of last session and carried.

Next in order is the election of officers which was preceded by prayer.

Moved and supported we recind the motion as to the time of election of officers. Carried.

Moved and supported that we have the election of officers at 9:00 o'clock Wednesday morning. Carried.

Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee reported a partial report. (See report for the resolutions adopted.)

Moved and supported that the Ways and Means resolutions relative to churches furnishing dishes and straw ticks for camp be referred back to committee. Carried.

Moved and supported that we have an overflow meeting in the chapel during times when the tabernacle won't accommodate the crowds. Carried.

On account of the critical condition of Brother McCune at the hospital the entire conference was called to prayer in his behalf.

Moved and supported that we adjourn. Carried.

Evening Session—Tuesday, August 16, 1927

The evening session was called to order with Rev. W. R. Cox in chair.

Brother Salvadore sang a special song accompanied by his accordinian. Prayer was offered by Rev. E. C. Boyles.

An address was given by Rev. W. R. Cox, after which the minutes of the last session was read and received.

A report was given by Brother Chatfield from the examining committee and the following names were recommended for ordination. Adam Schwing and Anna Steward.

Moved and supported that we receive the recommendations for ordination of Anna Steward and Adam Schwing. Carried.

At the beginning of the ordination service, Rev. A. M. Ewing read a portion of scripture found in 1st Timothy, 4th chapter, after which Rev. W. R. Cox gav us a very effective address relative to the call and preparation for the ministry.

After the address by Rev. W. R. Cox, the ordination council laid hands upon the two candidates and by prayer they were ordained and commissioned to go into the whole world and preach God's word.

Rev. C. G. Taylor was given the remaining time to speak relative to our Frankfort school. Brother Taylor spoke in regard to the need of our boys and girls, men and women having a scholastic training.

Moved and supported that we receive the Frankfort Pilgrim Holiness College and Seminary as a district school. Carried.

The Schwing Quartette sang a song entitled, "When the Train Comes In."

Brother Salvadore gave us a beautiful selection on his accordin.

Moved and supported that we adjourn. Carried.

Morning Session—Wednesday, August 17, 1927

Morning session of the assembly was called to order with Rev. W. R. Cox in chair. Song service was led by Rev. C. E. Snow, after which Brother Willie Pratt led in prayer.

Brother Cox gave us an address in reference to the local church.

Rev. H. J. Morgan was introduced to the conference and granted a seat in the bar.

Minutes of the last session were read and accepted.

Next in order was the entering into the election.

The tellers for the election were as follows: James Donoho, Glenn Newton, E. W. Wright, John Williams, A. H. Plunkett as recorder of votes.

Moved and supported that we recind the action relative to the time of election until we receive some preachers into the assembly. Carried.

Examining committee made a partial report. The following were recommended for renewal. (See report of list of prachers.) Moved and supported that the preachers be accepted. Carried.

Recommendations were read by the chairman of the 1st year licensed. (See report of preachers.)

Second year recommendations were read and received into the assembly.

First Year Renewals of Licensed Ministers.

The names of first year renewals were read by the chairman of the committee and received.

Moved and supported that names on preacher's roll that have not been investigated by the committee be referred to the committee. Carried.

First Year Deaconesses

First year deaconesses were recommended by the committee and passed on by the assembly. (See report.)

The first election will be that of the State Superintendent.

Rev. A. M. Ewing was elected on the first voting and the secretary cast a ballot and made it unanimous.

Moved and supported that we suspend the rules for fifteen minutes for the purpose of arranging some business before further elections. Carried.

Moved and supported that the Assistant State Superintendent also be the Home Missionary Evangelist. Carried.

The former motion was withdrawn and worded as follows: The office of the Assistant State Superintendent and the Home Missionary superintendent shall be combined. Carried.

The next office to be filled by the election is the Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. Chatfield was elected District Assistant Superintendent by 111 votes being the majority.

Next ballot was for a district Secretary. Rev. E. J. Clem was elected by a vote of 106.

Moved and supported that we extend the time fifteen minutes. Motion carried.

Partial report of the Resolution Committee. Report was read by Rev. Wright.

The resolution as follows (20) Whereas, God in His providence has removed from our midst our beloved brother, Rev. Orth McCune, and whereas our entire district feels keenly our loss, and also being desirous of expressing our sympathy to Sister McCune, be it resolved that we take an offering and place in her hands as an expression of the same. Carried.

Moved and supported that we adjourn.

Benediction by Sister Alice Hart.

Afternoon Session—Wednesday, August 17, 1927

Afternoon session of the assembly was called to order with Brother W. R. Cox in chair. Song service was led by Brother Schrock and prayer was offered by Sister White.

Brother Cox gave us a talk before we entered into business.

Moved and supported that we dispense with the roll call the rest of the assembly. Carried.

The minutes were read of the last session and received.

Next in order was the election of District Treasurer.

No election on the first voting, and ballots were prepared for further voting.

Moved and supported that we suspend the rules and elect Arthur Plunkett as District Treasurer by acclamation. Carried.

Moved and supported we elect as treasurer by acclamation, Arthur Plunkett.

Moved and supported we substitute a motion by suspending the rules and take the highest three names and vote for Treasurer, Arthur Plunkett, Sister Chatfield and Brother Crider.

Rev. A. H. Plunkett was elected.

Moved and supported that Brother Montgomery recite us a recitation. Carried.

Moved and supported we present to assembly Ministerial Benefit Ass'n. Carried.

Brother Cox gave a talk on the same. Also Sister Dean and Bro. Wright.

Moved and supported that we extend the time until 5:00 o'clock. Carried.

Moved and supported that we suspend the rules and leave the appointment of the remaining boards to the district council. Carried.

Moved and supported that we suspend the rules and leave the appointing of the school board to the State Council.

Moved and supported that we recind the former motion relative to the election school board and the chair appoint a committee to nominate persons from which the assembly may vote for 7 and the one that gets the highest number of votes will be the school board.

Brother Wright at this time read his final report from the resolution committee and was passed upon by the assembly.

Brother Edwards was appointed to fill Bro. Chatfield's place on the examining committee on the account of being absent on another committee.

Motion to adjourn.

Wednesday Evening Session—August 17, 1927

The evening session was called to order by W. R. Cox in chair. Song service was conducted by Rev. C. E. Snow. Prayer was offered by Rev. John Clark.

Brother Cox gave an exhortation relative to increasing our membership in our local churches.

Next in order was the election of 7 to act on the school board.

Moved and supported that we proceed with business and tellers to report in the morning. Carried.

Chairman of the resolution committee reported the resolution relative to putting a representative in the field to represent the Burial Association was lost.

Moved and supported that the matter relative to Sister Allen going to India be referred to the committee on re-drafting. Carried.

Brother Shepherd read the final report of the Ways and Means Committee. The resolution are received as seen in the report.

We recommend that No. 11, 14, 17, 22, 23 in the Ways and Means report of our 1926-1927 minutes be dropped. Carried.

Moved and supported that we amend the resolution relative to the salary of the Ass't. Superintendent and Home Missionary Superintendent and that it be paid half from the Home Missionary Treasury and half from the District Treasury. Carried.

The recommendation was moved upon and received.

Moved and supported that we adopt the re-drafted resolution relative to Nora Allen going to India. Voted upon and carried.

Moved and supported that we extend the time until the motion that was on the table be taken off and settled. Carried.

Moved and supported that the matter tabled relative to the budget be lifted from the table. Carried.

Moved and supported that we adjourn.

Morning Session—Thursday, August 18, 1927

The morning session of the assembly opened with W. R. Cox in chair. Song service was led by Rev. D. E. Snow and prayer by Bro. Colen.

Minutes were read and accepted.

Brother Ewing made a motion and it was supported that we take an offering to get a floral tribute for Brother McCune. Carried and offering taken, \$8.27.

Moved and supported that we rescind the motion relative to the action of electing a board of directors on account of some being on the school faculty. Carried.

Moved and supported that the committee that was appointed to bring in the first names to be voted upon bring in 7 more names which shall be approved by this assembly. Carried.

The report of the examining committee was read by Rev. R. W. Chatfield and accepted.

Moved and supported that the district council act as a board of directors for the school. Lost.

Moved and supported that the local board of each church take action on the calling of their pastors and send a sealed call to the district superintendent in this call they have 1st, 2nd and third choice.

Next was a partial report of the Ways and Means Committee.

Auditing Committee reported and found the following books correct: Frankfort College, State Treasurer, Camp Treasurer, Home Mission Treasurer, Foreign Missionary Treasurer, Burial Association, Old People's Home, and they were received.

The examining committee also received into the assembly Rev. C. C. Cremer from the Kentucky district as a second year licensed preacher.

The report of the state superintendent and the assistant superintendent was read before the assembly and received.

Sister Hart read her foreign missionary report and it was received.

Moved and supported we appoint a floral committee to care for the flowers that were to be bought by the assembly for Rev. McCune. Carried. \$8.27 was raised for this purpose.

The Statistical Committee reported and the report was accepted.

Moved and supported we bring before the assembly the financial problem which was unfinished. Carried.

Brother Cox gave us a talk relative to what he called a "Governor" for the financial plan.

Moved and supported that we accept the financial plan which Bro. Cox introduced. Carried.

Moved and supported that we adopt the report of the nominating committee relative to the school board and the following names were approved by the assembly: C. G. Taylor, A. M. Ewing, R. W. Chatfield, Oscar Sheets, Marvin Lewis, E. W. Wright, W. P. Senn.

Moved and supported that we excuse Brother Wright that he may go home on the account of his wife being sick. Carried.

Moved and supported that we re-convene at 1:00 P. M. Carried.
Moved and supported that we adjourn. Carried.
Benediction by Rev. R. W. Chatfield.

Afternoon Session—Thursday, August 18, 1927

The assembly was called to order by Rev. Cox in chair and after devotional service the minutes were read and accepted.

Moved and supported that we re-consider the matter of electing an officer for the Young People and lay the matter on the table.

Report of the Home Missionary Treasurer, Brother Chatfield, was read and accepted.

Moved and supported that the state council meet at once and appoint the members of the different boards and committees. Carried.

Moved and supported that the district council be given the right to apportion the churches relative to the financial plan and notify the churches at the earliest date, also plans be printed with explanation. Carried.

Moved and supported that the last Sunday in October be the day set to take an offering of at least \$1.00 per member for to pay the indebtedness of the Frankfort College building. Carried.

Moved and supported that Bros. Ewing and Chatfield be excused from their official duties to help finish the work on the college.

Moved and supported the matter concerning the work on the college in which Bros. Ewing and Chatfield were permitted to do be tabled.

Moved and supported that Sister Lydia Harrington be appointed as a Home Missionary on the pacific coast to work especially among foreigners. Also that Sister Clara Buntain be appointed for Home Missionary work in the mountains of Tennessee. Carried.

Moved and supported that the board of directors of the Pilgrim college be authorized to make steps to incorporate it.

Moved and supported that we as an assembly engage our General Superintendent Rev. W. R. Cox as a co-laborer with Rev. Paul Rees during our next camp meeting. Carried.

Also a standing of appreciation in behalf of Bro. Cox being with us was taken.

Inasmuch as Sister Agnes McVey has been so faithful in performing her work as a stenographer, we express our thanks by standing vote and also give her an offering equivalent to her car fare.

Moved and supported that we take this offering from the Treasury. Carried.

Stationing report was read by the Secretary. (See Stationing report) and received.

Moved and supported that we adjourn.

All stood and sang "Doxology."

RESOLUTIONS

1

Whereas, God has so richly blessed our lives and permitted us to attend another good camp and enjoy the fellowship of the saints, be it resolved that we lift our hearts in praise to Him with a determination to be true until He comes, recognizing this by standing with bowed heads for one minute.

2

Whereas, God has given us a beautiful Camp Ground and favored us with the privilege of having the Pilgrim Holiness College on the ground, be it resolved that steps be taken to provide a custodian for the grounds and buildings that beauty and order may be maintained for the glory of God.

3

Whereas, our General Superintendent, Rev. W. R. Cox was with us for the last night of the Camp Meeting and God so wonderfully blessed the Camp through his message, and, whereas we so appreciate his faithfulness in his official capacity, be it resolved that we show our appreciation by a rising vote.

4

Whereas, God in His mercy and love has lengthened the cords of life of our esteemed District Superintendent Rev. A. M. Ewing in his labor of love

and sacrifice for our district, be it resolved that we show our appreciation by co-operation not only in prayer but also with our moral and financial support.

5

Whereas, the Pilgrims at Frankfort and the many friends of the church there have gladly co-operated in making our Camp a success, be it resolved that we remember them when we pray.

6

Whereas, the spirit of unrest which not only prevails in our governmental and financial affairs, but which has also extended its influence into the realm of the church, be it resolved that we be on the alert lest in this unsettled condition we be shaken from the firm foundation of the doctrines of our church.

7

Realizing that a subtle influence is abroad in the land working through press and other means of publicity to revise the Volstead Act, be it resolved that we use every available means to combat this influence and preserve the Eighteenth Amendment to the constitution of the United States, and also to promote the teaching of Prohibition to the coming generation.

8

Whereas, the Burial Association has needed legal advice and service, and whereas, this service has so gladly been rendered by Mr. John M. Fitzgerald of Terre Haute, Ind., thereby saving the Association this expense, therefore, be it resolved that the General Secretary of the Burial Association convey to him the appreciation of this assembly for his kind co-operation.

9

Be it resolved that we as the laity of our church stir our hearts and hold up the hands of our sacrificing pastors not only through prayer and financial support which is commendable, but also by encouraging them through gifts and donations.

10

Whereas, God has commanded us to preach the word and to evangelize the world, therefore, be it resolved that we extend our Home Missionary work by giving it our very best support by prayer and financial aid.

11

Be it resolved that we commend our official brethren in observing the Lord's day in regard to buying and selling on the Camp Ground.

12

Whereas, our city paper, the Morning Times has accorded the front page space each day during the Camp and Assembly, and has assigned Mr. Edward Thacker, their excellent reporter to represent us through their paper, and whereas, this privilege is seldom extended to religious gatherings, be it resolved that we recognize this service by a rising vote, and instruct our District Superintendent to express our thanks in person to the management of the Morning Times.

13

Whereas our District Assembly is being prolonged because individuals are placed upon two or more committees, be it resolved that our assembly use care in the appointment or election of committees.

14

Realizing the strain under which our workers in the Stand are placed during the Camp and also the fact that they were denied many of the privileges and blessings of the Camp, be it resolved that we show our appreciation of their sacrifice by Christian courtesy in making our purchases at the Stand.

15

Whereas, our ministerial conventions have suffered because some evangelists have been in meetings, and also because many of our preachers were unable financially to attend, be it resolved that we request our pastors and evangelists to arrange their dates so that their dates do not conflict with the ministerial convention date, and that the portion of their fare in excess of \$3.00 be paid from the convention offerings.

16

Inasmuch as it is very difficult for one committee to take care of the educational examinations in the short time allowed during Assembly on

account of the number of studies, be it resolved that our Educational Board be divided into three separate boards of three members each. Each board to take charge of one year of the study course. The boards to be known as First Year, Second Year and Third Year Educational Boards.

17

Whereas a number of our pastors have worked for several weeks on the Camp Grounds and whereas the churches have sacrificed the services of their pastors during that time, be it resolved that we show our appreciation of the workers and churches by standing and singing "Farther on the Way Grows Brighter."

18

Inasmuch as we see the great need of some action to inspire greater activity in the ranks of our ministry, be it resolved that applicants for license and those who wish to retain their standing must show by their ministerial activities their eligibility for advancement or to retain their present standing. While a recommendation from the local church is required, this in itself is insufficient.

19

Inasmuch as the Supreme Court of the State of Indiana has convicted Rev. E. S. Shoemaker, Superintendent of the Anti Saloon League, because of his criticism of certain members of said court for their laxity of enforcement of the Prohibition law, therefore be it resolved that we the Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of Indiana, now in session at Frankfort, Indiana, commend him for his noble stand for law and order, and that we offer him our assistance and prayers and that a copy of this resolution be mailed to Brother Shoemaker.

20

Whereas, God in His divine providence has removed from our ranks our beloved Brother Orf McCune, and whereas our entire district feels keenly our loss and also being desirous of expressing our sympathy to Sister McCune, be it resolved that we take an offering and place it in her hands as an expression of the same.

21

Whereas, Sister Nora Allen has the work of India upon her heart, and has at this time her transportation raised and her support on the field pledged, and whereas the General Missionary Board has not as yet assigned her a place. Therefore, be it resolved that we, as the Indiana District Assembly appeal to our General Missionary Board to reconsider her, and also that we carry this matter to God in special prayer.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1

We recommend that the workers in the Camp Meeting and Assembly be appointed by the Camp Meeting Committee and no pastor or church have the authority to send persons for such purposes unless duly authorized by the Camp Committee.

2

We recommend that each church send in one dollar (\$1.00) a month to the Treasurer for the support of the Old Peoples' Home.

3

We recommend that churches calling other preachers for trial sermons or other occasions, at least pay their car fare and give a free will offering.

4

We recommend that each church give their pastor a two week's vacation with pay, provided he acceptably supply his pulpit while away. We suggest that he spend this time holding a meeting and endeavor to organize a new church.

5

We recommend that the District Secretary be paid \$30.00 for editing the Assembly Minutes.

6

We recommend that the business year of the church close on July 31st, but that the preachers continue as pastor until conference and that he be paid accordingly. Also, that the church report the extra time on the new year.

7

We recommend that the District Treasurer be paid \$100.00 for his services for the 1927-1928 conference year.

8

We recommend that our Burial Association General Secretary be paid \$20.00 for a single death and \$35.00 for double deaths.

9

We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid \$2,500.00 for his labor this year, and this amount to include his traveling expenses.

10

We recommend that this conference refuse the renewal of credentials to all ministers that do not tithe.

11

We recommend that no person shall be eligible for membership in the Burial Association over the age of 60 years unless the applicant has been a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church at least two years.

12

We recommend that preachers failing to report to the conference for two consecutive years have their credentials withheld until a satisfactory report is made.

13

We recommend that all monies raised in our local churches, except for local purposes, be sent to our two State Treasurers, to be forwarded to the institutions for which they were raised.

14

Whereas, the business at the lunch stand has grown in volume in proportion to the growth of the Camp in attendance, and whereas, the facilities of the business are inadequate to care for the business, that it has necessitated the working of the same during services, we recommend that a building and means be provided for taking care of said business and Campers recognize the preaching hours as closing hours at the stand.

15

We recommend that a board of directors consisting of seven (7) members be elected for Frankfort Pilgrim College by this assembly.

16

We recommend that parsonages not heated by furnaces be furnished with a heater by the church.

17

We recommend that all persons holding workers tickets who refuse or neglect to work when asked, unless sick, shall forfeit their ticket. We suggest that this recommendation be printed on the ticket.

18

We recommend that each church furnish for the Camp the following articles, or their financial equivalent: 3 to 6 plates, 3 to 6 cups, 3 to 6 dessert dishes, 3 to 6 glasses, one strawtick, one pillow, one pillowslip and one sheet.

19

We recommend that numbers 11, 14, 15, 17, 22 and 23 of the Ways and Means report for the year 1926-1927 be dropped from the assembly minutes.

20

We recommend that our State and Home Missionary Superintendent be paid \$30.00 per week and traveling expenses, that one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of his support to be taken from the District Treasury and one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) from the Home Missionary Treasury. We also recommend that he take Home Missionary offerings and turn them along with his evangelistic offerings back into the respective treasury to which they naturally belong.

21

We recommend, first, that 1,000 copies of the conference minutes be published and sold at cost; second, that our State Secretary notify the pastors

of the price and time for distribution; third, that pastors notify Secretary of number of copies wanted, sending money for the same.

22

Whereas, the camp has grown so that the tabernacle will not accommodate the crowds we recommend that preaching services be held in the College chapel, when necessary, to take care of the overflow crowd.

23

We recommend that the budget consist of 10 per cent, of all money raised by the church and Sunday school except that raised for building purposes.

24

We recommend that all money raised for the State budget be sent in the first of each month to our State Treasurer and that it be apportioned as follows: 65 per cent for state expenses, 60 per cent of the remainder for the Old Peoples' Home, and 40 per cent for home missions.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Another year has gone by on the wings of time with its opportunities. And, personally we can say this has been the most strenuous year of our lives, with nearly 100 churches to claim our attention with their local adjustments, changing of preachers, filling vacancies, and as arbiter in all of the controversies of the church. I have made something like seventeen changes since last conference, and have looked after nearly all of the legal work in the district. I have sold two churches where the work has gone down. There have been six churches organized this year in the district, and never, in any previous year, to our knowledge, has there been so much improvements in the property of the local churches as this year. Nearly every church has done something in the way of improvement. A new church building at Berne City, Indiana; two at Indianapolis, and prospect of more. I have visited all the churches the past year except about five or six and more than half of them the second time, and some the third and fourth time, and can say that things are on the up grade. Much of my time has been given to the promotion of the College at Frankfort and the Old People's Home.

The prospects are bright for the College and the Home is in good condition. \$2,500.00 was given by the Chamber of Commerce on the College buildings. No public solicitation has been made so far to cover the balance of the indebtedness. As to my service given to the church, I have made nearly 200 trips to the various churches, and preached 153 times, have seen some converted and sanctified and healed. I regret that I have been unable to do more. I will humbly ask you to forgive me for not doing more, but I am glad for the little that we have done. I praise God for good Ministers and Workers. I praise God for our churches and all its people. They have been gracious to me and I love them. I have been compensated in full. And, now, let's take what God has for us and be satisfied with our lot. May the Lord bless you all. Amen.

REPORT OF ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

As Assistant Superintendent, I visited the following churches: Bicknell, Vincennes, Gray's Ridge, Sanford, Evansville first, second and third churches, Mitchell, Medora, Orleans and French Lick. We would advise that the District Home Missionary Board take some step toward strengthening the work at Vincennes. At Mitchell, we preached from a man's front porch while the congregation sat under the trees, as they have no house of worship at present, but we believe there is a better day ahead of them. Orleans has made some improvement on their building and their future seemed hopeful. We believe if a good level headed pastor could be placed at Medora the work there will go forward with good strides, as the one who has been serving them has the confidence of the business men and people of the town, but he is leaving to attend school. We would recommend if possible, at all, that these places be formed into a circuit so as to better support a pastor and thereby better enable a pastor to give his entire time to their welfare.

French Lick has purchased a parsonage recently. The work at Evansville seemed to be in fair shape at the first and second churches. We reorganized the third church while there, do not just remember the number of members but they seem much encouraged and we believe have a bright prospect before them. The other places seemed to be running in good condition with no thought of giving up the race.

As your Home Missionary Evangelist we wish to submit the following report:

It has been our privilege in the providence of God to enjoy the best of health the entire year and we highly appreciate the privilege of serving you

as a District Evangelist. we have, by the hearty co-operation of ministers, and the Superintendent of the Indiana District been able to establish churches in the following places: Shelburn, Ind., charter members 26, 136 saved or sanctified; a beautiful site for the church has been obtained, free from debt and preparations are being made for a new building. Another church at Rushville has been organized with 20 members and more are coming. Also a mission has been established with 17 members at Otterbein. Another at South Washington with 25 members and Fairmount with 32. At this place the people gave us subscription enough to purchase a beautiful church building and Brother Arthur Plunkett, pastor of the Frankfort First Church, who is a paper hanger as well as a preacher, together with several other brethren beautifully papered the church and the congregation furnished and equipped the parsonage. Another church was organized at Fort Wayne with 11 members, and one at Jonesboro with 26 members. Besides these churches, some 6 or 8 meetings have been conducted. Fifty cottage meetings and meetings in school houses. We have traveled with the Home Missionary truck 2,724 miles; by rail, 1,537 miles; and our own car, 3,708 miles, and borrowed Bro. Ewing's, Frank Edward's and E. J. Clem's cars and on foot, 1,207 miles. Total mileage, 9,176 miles. We have received all of our traveling expenses and a salary \$25.00 each week. Entire traveling and itemized expense account, \$608.68.
