A report of the Ways and Means Committee was read by Rev, Lloyd Lewis. Report as follows:

(1)

We recommend that the workers in the Camp Meeting and Assembly be appointed by the Camp Meeting Committee, and no pastor or church assume the authority to send persons for such purposes, unless duly authorized by the Camp Meeting Committee.

(2)

We recommend that each church raise and send in monthly to the State Treasurer, the equivalent to three cents per member, for the Old Peoples' Home.

(3)

We recommend that churches calling other preachers for trial sermons or other occasions, at least pay their car fare, and give them a free will offering.

(4)

We recommend that the District Secretary be paid \$30.00 for editing the Assembly Minutes.

(5)

We recommend that the business year of the church close on July 31, 1929, but that the minister continue as pastor until conference, and that he be paid accordingly. Also, that the church report the extra time in the next year.

(6)

We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be paid \$125.00 for his services for 1928 and 1929.

(7)

We recommend that the General Secretary of Burial Association be paid \$20.00 for a single death and \$25.00 for a double death.

· (8)

We recommend that we have one District Superintendent, and that he be paid \$2,500.00 for his labor.

(9)

We recommend that this conference refuse credentials to all ministers who do not tithe.

(10)

We recommend that no person be eligible for membership in the burial association over the age of 60 years, unless the applicant has been a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church at least two (2) years.

(11)

We recommend that preachers failing to report to the conference for two consecutive years have their credentials withheld until a written report is submitted to the conference.

(12)

We recommend that no money raised by the local church be paid direct to the General Superintendents, Secretary, solicitors or district superintendent, but all money except money raised for local interest be sent to our District Treasurer, namely, Foreign and District Treasurers.

We recommend that a board of directors consisting of seven (7) members be elected for Frankfort Pilgrim Col-

(15)

We recommend that articles 14 and 22 of the minutes of 1927 be omitted from the minutes.

(16)

We recommend that 1000 copies of the Conference Minutes be published and sold at cost and that our State Secretary notify the pastors of the price and time for distribution, and that pastors notify the Secretary the number of copies wanted, and send the money for same.

(17)

We recommend that we have one Assistant State Superintendent, elected from among our pastors, and that when assisting in the state work his expenses be paid from the State Treasury.

(18)

We recommend that the budget consist of 10 per cent of all money raised by the church and Sunday school, except that raised for building fund, and young peoples' society.

(19)

We recommend that all money raised for the State Budget be send the first of each month to our State Treasurer, and that it be apportioned as follows: 65 per cent for State expenses, 40 per cent of the remainder for the Old Peoples' Home, and 60 per cent for Home Missions.

(20)

We recommend that the District Superintendent perform his duties as prescribed by the Manual, Page 29, section 6 and on page 46 section 99 and that he be relieved of all institutional responsibilities

(21)

We recommend that inasmuch as our Manual requires our State Superintendent to advertise his visits to our respective churches that he be required to map out an itinerary of appointments and have them published in our General Church paper the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate.

(22)

We recommend that a concise report blank be furnished to each pastor and that this be filled out in full, and read at the next Annual Assembly.

(23)

We recommend that no board or boards obligate financially the Indiana District, to exceed \$3,000.00, without the sanction of the District Assembly.

(24

We recommend that in electing of committees or boards, where there is a committee or board of three, that one be elected new, on a committee or board of five, two be elected new; on a committee or board of seven, three be elected new; on a committee or board of nine, four new members.

(25)

We recommend that we have one State Home Missionary, and that he have charge of all tent and other home

missionary equipment, and that he oversee and organize all our available forces, Young People, etc., and use them under competent leaders, for the advancement of our Home Missionary work.

(26)

We recommend that parsonages not heated by furnaces be furnished with a heater by the church.

(27)

We recommend that all persons holding workers' tickets, work at the job assigned them until excused by the one in charge. Everyone refusing to comply with this recommendation shall forfeit their ticket.

(28)

We recommend that each church furnish for the Camp, the following articles or their financial equivalent: 3 to 6 plates, 3 to 6 cups, 3 to 6 dessert dishes, 3 to 6 glasses, one tick, one pillowslip and one sheet.

(29)

We recommend that we have one State Home Missionary, and that he be paid the sum of \$30.00 a week and expenses while he is actually engaged on the field and that he take offerings, and evangelistic money and turn the same into the Home Missionary treasury.

(30)

We recommend that September 22-23 1928, we have a two-day Young Peoples' Convention in Frankfort First Church, and that each pastor appoint two delegates to this convention. And that the District Superintendent preside at this convention. That a permanent organization be effected at that convention.

(31)

Whereas, the proposition of zone presidents needs some adjustment, and whereas the system of church classes and class leaders employed by John Wesley was a marked success, therefore,

Be it resolved, that we apply that principle of administration to our district. To this end let us create an office of district elder, such elder to have charge of his particular part of the Indiana district, such districts and elders to be provided by the Indiana District Assembly. Such elders to be under the supervision of the District Superintendent.

Recommendation No. 1, relative to workers in the Camp, was adopted.

Recommendation No. 2, relative to raising money for the Old Peoples' Home, was read.

Moved and supported that this resolution be amended by inserting at the close "the minimum of such offering shall be one dollar." Amendment lost.

Original motion was voted on and carried .

Resolution No. 4, relative to paying Secretary \$30.00 for his labor was accepted.

Resolution No. 5, in regard to the close of the conference year was read and received.

Resolution No. 6, in regard to Treasurer's pay, was read and received.

Tellers were appointed as follows: D. E. Snow, B. H. Colen, Area Montgomery, Ray Smith, Willie Pratt, Glenn Baker and W. P. Senn.

Moved and supported that Rev. Wilbur Moore be permitted to send in his vote in an envelope, being not able to sit in session.

The first election was that of State Superintendent. Election as follows: Rev. A. M. Ewing elected State Superintendent, receiving 109 votes, 182 votes being cast.

Rev. A. M. Ewing was called to the platform for a speech, in which he pledged himself to give his best to the state work, for the next year, and also expressed his gratitude to the Assembly.

Next in order was the election of an Assistant State Superintendent. There was no election by the first voting.

The second vote was taken, with no election.

A third election was held and Rev. Area Montgomery was elected Assistant State Superintendent, receiving 86 votes.

Moved and supported that Rev. Boyles be excused from the conference. Carried.

Moved and supported that the rules be suspended and that the chairman appoint a nominating committee to appoint nominees for the position of a Conference Secretary.

The above motion was withdrawn.

Moved and supported that we extend the time until 12 o'clock. Carried.

Ballots were prepared for a Conference Secretary. No election by the first voting. At the second voting, Rev. E. J. Clem was elected Secretary, receiving 91 votes. Adjourned.

Evening Session, August 22, 1928

The evening session was opened by song and prayer with Rev. A. M. Ewing in the chair.

The minutes of the last session were read and received.

The report of the State Superintendent was read and received.

Moved and supported that we hold our ministerial convention at the Third Church at Indianapolis, Ind., the second week in April. Carried.

A partial report of the Ways and Means Committee was read.

We recommend that each member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of Indiana give an offering of 35c to pay our District's part of the General Superintendent's support. Carried.

Moved and supported that we table the above motion. Carried.

We recommend that the operation of the lunch stand be placed in the hands of the Camp Meeting Committee and that the committee operate it according to their best judgment. Carried.

Moved and supported that we dismiss the State Council to bring various names of committees to be voted on. Carried.

We recommend that all pastors be granted a two weeks vacation with pay. Recommendation received.

We recommend that we dispense with the Foreign Missionary treasury and that all Foreign Missionary money go thru the state treasury. Recommendation lost.

We recommend that the churches, in selecting delegates for the District Conference use discretion and not select delegates that will add extra work in cooking for a family of children, and that delegates be selected who are able to stay during conference.

Moved and supported that we table the above recommendation indefinitely. Carried,

Moved and supported that we extend the time to 10:00 o'clock. Carried.

Afternoon session August 21, 1928. was brought to order with Rev. A. M. Ewing in the chair. A song was sung, "If Jesus goes with me, I'LL go", after which prayer was offered by Major Russell.

The minutes of the last session were read and received. Sister Chatfield was elected Conference Treasurer by 97 votes, 145 votes cast.

Next in order was the election of three members of the District Council. Rev. Geo. Huff with 84 votes elected. Moved and supported that we suspend the rules and elect the next two highest men which were Rev. W. J. Crider

Next was the election of Home Missionary Evangelist. Rev. Chatfield was elected by the majority of 120 votes as Home Missionary Superintendent. A call for a speech was made. Rev. Chatfield responded to the same.

and Rev. D. E. Snow. Carried.

We moved that we proceed to elect the executive officers of the institutional boards and that the District Council elect the remaining members of all the various boards in accordance with the resolution governing boards. Tabled.

Moved and seconded that we have a nominating committee, appointed by the chair, for the purpose of bringing in a list of nominees from which a Superintendent of the Old Peoples' Home, and Bro. Ewing to be a member of the committee. Lost.

Moved and supported that the State Council appoint all boards. Carried.

Moved and supported that the Assembly elect the executive members of the different boards. Lost,

The Assembly was called to prayer after which we sang "We Praise Thee, O Lord."

Moved and seconded that we adjourn.

Motion was amended to read "We adjourn to meet again at 6:30 p. m." Carried.

The resolution in regard to pride was read, and adopted.

Recommendations

The recommendation relative to the death of J. V. Colewas was read, and adopted.

Recommendation relative to the city paper and the reporter, was read and adopted.

Recommendation relative to the Wet issue was adopted. Resolution relative to our deceased this year was read and adopted.

Resolution in regard to our lunch stand being closed, was read and motion was made and seconded to table the resolution. Carried.

Moved and supported that in the event that the Marion Church shall have to borrow over \$3,000.00 that this Assembly give them this privilege. Carried.

Moved and supported that the First Church at Indianapolis. be granted privilege of building a new parsonage. Carried.

We moved that the District Council be empowered by this District Assembly to decide matters relative to money expended for church improvement, during this conference year.

Be it resolved, that no board or boards be allowed to obligate the Indiana District to exceed \$3,000.00, without the sanction of the District Council. Carried.

Moved and supported that we adjourn. Mction lost.

Moved and supported that the time be extended to 10:30. Carried.

A partial report of the Auditing Committee was read as follows: State Treasurer, Old People's Home and Burial Association Treasurer were found correct. The Foreign Mission Treasury was found to be \$23 00 overplus. These auditing reports were received.

Moved and supported that we have the State Treasurer's report. It was read and accepted.

Moved and supported that we extend the time until the examining committee makes a report and ministers received

The names for first year license were read and received into the conference. Carried.

Moved and supported that we set the time for the ordination service at nine o'clock and that we reconvene at 8:00 Thursday morning. Carried.

Moved and supported that we adjourn. Carried.

REPORT OF THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT

I am glad for the little part, under God, that we have been permitted to fill with our brothers and sisters in the ministry. I am so sorry that more has not been accomplished for Jesus, but thank Him for what has been done. May we unite in this year for a greater victory than our Church has ever known.

At present, we have 97 churches reported in the Assembly, seven of which are not functioning, leaving 90 actually active and alive, to which will be added the four new churches coming in. I have held 139 services. I kept no account of the converts, leaving that for the churches to report. Funerals preached and assisted in, 3. Four pastors resigned during the year, whose places were filled.

We also engaged in a financial campaign in the interest of the College at Frankfort, in which nearly \$9,000.00 cash was raised on the indebtedness, among the business men of Frankfort. Nearly \$12,000.00 cash for the College and Home was raised this year. We assisted in one campaign in Shelbyville, which we believe was greatly owned and blessed of God, and will bear fruit in the near future.

We are now engaging ourself with the cares and problems before us for the new year, and trust that we may have the hearty co-operation of the Saints throughout the whole entire District, that God may make it the greatest of all our lives.
