JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING

The Forty-seventh Annual Session of the Indiana Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Frankfort, Indiana, August 21, 1950, at nine a. m.

The Conference opened with devotions in charge of Rev. James E. Kerby. Rev. Russell Wooten led in singing "Where He Leads I'll Follow", after which Rev. Adam Schwing led in prayer. Rev. Ernest Carroll read, as the Scripture lesson, Col. 3:1-15.

Rev. Ralph Nibarger introduced Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent, who took the chair.

Rev. Sturk addressed the Conference from the subject "Prayer and Evangelism", using the Scripture Matt. 17:20-21.

Motion prevailed that Rev. Ernest Carroll be seated as a member of the Examining Board.

The Secretary, Rev. Carl R. Reed, called the roll.

Motion prevailed to permit pastors to suggest some member of local church who is present to be seated in the Conference in the absence of the elected lay delegate or alternate.

Motion prevailed to seat June Risinger as delegate for the Madison Church.

Motion prevailed to amend the standing rule fixing the conference bar by eliminating the South wing of the tabernacle from the bar.

Motion prevailed that the hours of the Conference session be the same as last year: 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.; 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. and from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.

Rev. M. H. Snyder appointed Mrs. Ethel Morrison to fill a vacancy on the Memorial Committee.

Rev. Floyd Goins, Superintendent of Northern District, read his report, which was accepted.

The Conference recessed by expiration of time. Dismissed with prayer by Rev. Melvin Snyder.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting opened with Rev. James Colter in charge of devotions. Rev. Dale Emery led in singing "Amazing Grace". Rev. Wayne Stroud read the first chapter of I John as a Scripture lesson, after which Rev. Gilbert Noel led in prayer.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Rev. Victor Cokley and Rev. Roy Phillips were introduced to the Conference. Each gave a brief testimony.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read and accepted.

The report of the Conference Treasurer was read and accepted.

The report of the Conference Statistician was read and accepted.

Rev. R. G. Flexon, at the suggestion of the Chairman, greeted the Conference and gave a brief speech of appreciation.

The report of the Camp Meeting Treasurer was read and accepted.

Rev. Melvin Snyder, Superintendent of the Southern District, read his report, which was accepted.

✓ Rev. A. L. Luttrull was introduced to the Conference and he testified briefly.

The report of the Sunday School Committee was read and accepted.

The report of the Young People's Treasurer was read and accepted.

The report of the Ministerial Convention Treasurer was read and accepted.

The report of the Frankfort Pilgrim College was read and accepted.

The Resolutions Committee gave a partial report.

A motion was made that in view of the growing sentiment for division that the following be substituted for Resolution No. 1: A test vote concerning division shall be taken, and if the Conference is in favor of division, a committee be appointed to bring in a plan for such division.

The previous question was called and carried.

The motion to substitute was voted on and carried.

The previous question was called and carried.

The test vote was taken and the results showed 228 for division with 47 against.

Motion was made that each of the three district superintendents appoint two men from his district, who shall, together with the district superintendents, form the committee.

Motion prevailed to amend the main motion to read that each superintendent appoint seven men from each district to serve on the committee instead of two.

The motion as amended carried.

Agreed by common consent to give superintendents time to appoint the committee before adjourning.

The superintendents made appointments as follows:

Rev. Floyd Goins; Northern District: G. R. Bateman, G. W. Noel, Lindley Arnett, Angus Jeffers, Fay Locke, Ernest Carroll, Ralph McCrory.

Rev. Melvin Snyder; Southern District: Mark Storey, W. A. Frye, Clarence Morrison, Milford Burcham, Virgil Camp, Aaron Hayhurst, Willis Clock.

Rev. Ralph Nibarger; Central District: T. J. Preusz, E. V. Halt, James Kerby, James Hertel, C. D. Jester, O. W. Barnes, Eula Kennedy.

Agreed by common consent that the General Superintendent meet with the committee on "Division" and act as its chairman.

Motion prevailed to meet at 7:30 p.m. instead of 7:00.

Recessed by expiration of time. Dismissed with prayer by Rev. R. G. Flexon.

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting opened with Rev. Murry Booth in charge of devotions. Rev. Ray L. Williams led in singing "Love Lifted Me". Rev. C. J. Adams read the 49th Psalm as a Scripture lesson, after which Rev. C. D. Hamilton led in prayer. Rev. Williams led in singing "Love Divine". By request Rev. A. L. Luttrull sang "Pass Me Not".

Rev. P. F. Elliott spoke to the Conference on Sunday Schools and the Pilgrim Pension Plan.

A motion prevailed to extend time to 9:30 p.m.

The minutes of the second sitting were read and approved.

The Committee on Division presented the following recommendation to the Conference:

That permanent division be made one year hence, with three separate districts to be formed with present boundaries and that the present Committee named by the Conference remain active throughout the Conference year to work out details of said division.

Motion made and seconded to adopt the recommendation of the Committee.

Motion prevailed that the time be extended until the vote is taken.

Previous question was called and carried.

Motion prevailed to accept the recommendation of the Committee.

The Conference adjourned by expiration of time. Dismissed with prayer by Rev. W. H. Pratt.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting opened with Rev. James E. Kerby in charge of devotions. Rev. J. M. Burcham led in singing "We Have An Anchor". Rev. M. E. Cormican read Acts 3:1-18 as a Scripture lesson, after which Rev. Guy Mowery led in prayer. A healing and testimony service followed.

Rev. L. W. Sturk spoke briefly on the "Greatest Need of the Church—The Divine Presence".

The minutes of the third sitting were read and approved.

Motion prevailed that Rev. F. B. Dunn make a report of the Camp and Conference to the "Advocate".

A motion was made that the School Board be authorized to raze the old administration building if and when it is no longer of use to the school.

Motion prevailed that the matter concerning the old administration building be referred to the Resolutions Committee for further study.

Motion prevailed that the time 9:00 to 10:00 a.m. on the last Sunday of Camp Meeting be given for a promotional service by the Director of Sunday Schools and Youth Work.

The Resolutions Committee continued the partial report.

Motion prevailed that Resolution No. 2 be amended by adding: that the District Statistician be compensated, to the amount that the District Council shall deem proper, for the extra work entailed in making separate reports for each of the three districts.

Motion prevailed that Resolution No. 6 concerning a memorial service be referred to the Resolutions Committee for redrafting.

Motion prevailed that the young people have a service each day during the Camp Meeting; said service to be under the direction of the Conference Secretary of Youth Work.

Motion prevailed that the districts, when they divide for the election of district officers, decide the place and time for their Ministerial Convention.

Rev. Ralph Nibarger, Superintendent of the Central District, read his report, which was accepted.

Motion prevailed that the time be extended until the report of the Ways and Means Committee be heard.

The Ways and Means Committee gave a full report recommending that all recommendations be retained.

Motion prevailed that recommendation No. 11 under District Financial be deleted from the minutes.

Motion prevailed to accept the report of the Ways and Means Committee.

Dismissed with prayer by Rev. P. F. Elliott.

FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting opened with Rev. Murry Booth in charge of devotions. Rev. Robert Malone led the Conference in singing "Follow On". Rev. Clarence Jackson read Ephesians 5:1-21, as the Scripture lesson, after which Rev. Ralph Conner led in prayer. Rev. L. W. Sturk led the Conference in singing "Rock of Ages".

The minutes of the fourth sitting were read and approved.

The Resolutions Committee continued the partial report.

Motion prevailed to amend the resolution concerning rooms for Camp Meeting by adding: that the deadline for the notification of the Room Committee concerning the time of occupancy by persons having deposits on Camp Meeting rooms be by the first Sunday of the Camp.

The resolution as amended carried.

Motion prevailed to adopt Resolutions deleting the following Resolutions from the Minutes: No. 14 under "Camp and Conference", No. 3 under "Young People", Nos. 1, 8, and 9 under "Miscellaneous".

At the suggestion of Rev. F. J. Goins an offering was taken for the purchase of a new brief case for the General Superintendent. The offering amounted to \$58.75.

Motion prevailed to rescind the former motion concerning Camp Meeting rooms.

Motion prevailed that the original Resolution concerning Camp Meeting rooms be adopted.

Motion prevailed that the Resolution be amended by adding: that the deadline for the notification of the Room superintendent concerning the time of occupancy by persons having deposits on Camp Meeting rooms be the first day of the Camp.

The Conference was favored with a solo, "Stand by Me", by Rev. L. W. Sturk.

A motion prevailed that a telegram of greeting be sent to Rev. and Mrs. Lee Goins and one to Rev. and Mrs. C. G. Taylor.

The Ways and Means Committee gave a further report, which was accepted.

A partial report of the Examining Board was read and adopted.

The Council presented the names of two candidates for ordination which were accepted.

Rev. Ralph Nibarger, Superintendent of the Central District, presented the new church at Bloomington.

Motion prevailed to accept the Bloomington church into the Conference.

Rev. Melvin Snyder, Superintendent of the Southern District, presented the Trinity Gospel Tabernacle work, Evansville, which has united with the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Motion prevailed that the former Trinity Gospel Tabernacle, now the Trinity Pilgrim Holiness Church, be accepted into the Conference.

The Conference was resealed according to the respective districts for the purpose of voting for the District Superintendents and Assistants and to decide where the Ministerial Conventions shall be held.

The Chairman appointed the following chairmen of the different sections: Rev. E. V. Halt, Southern District; Rev. P. F. Elliott, Northern District; Rev. L. W. Sturk, Central District.

The session adjourned by expiration of time.

SIXTH SITTING

The sixth sitting opened with Rev. James Colter in charge of devotions. Rev. Ray Garlitch led in singing "The Sweet By and By". Rev. Boone Murphy read the thirteenth chapter of I Corinthians, as a Scripture lesson. Rev. F. W. Gibbs led in prayer. Miss Norene Grummons sang "I'm Glad He Came My Way".

The minutes of the fifth sitting were read and approved.

The report of the tellers showed that for the Southern District, Rev. Melvin H. Snyder was elected Superintendent, and Rev. Mark Storey as Assistant; for the Central District, Rev. R. E. Nibarger was elected Superintendent, and Rev. T. J. Preusz as Assistant; and in the Northern District, Rev. F. J. Goins was elected Superintendent, and Rev. Gilbert W. Noel as Assistant.

The Districts decided that the Ministerial Conventions shall be held at the following places: Southern District, Evansville Forest Hills; Central District, Connersville; Northern District, Elwood.

Motion prevailed that the Cannelton church be changed from Zone 11 to Zone 10.

Motion prevailed that the Secretary appoint tellers.

The Secretary appointed the following as tellers: Rev. Noel Taylor, Rev. Fay Locke, Rev. Dennis Barber, Rev. Willis Clock, Rev. Edgar A. Poe, and Rev. Guy Mowery.

Ballots were cast for the Conference Secretary.

Report of the tellers showed that Rev. Carl R. Reed was elected Conference Secretary.

The following nominations for Conference Treasurer were made by the Council: Rev. E. V. Halt, Rev. Angus Jeffers, Rev. E. W. Wright.

Ballots were cast for the Conference Treasurer.

The report of the tellers showed that Rev. E. V. Halt was elected Conference Treasurer.

The Conference was seated according to their Districts, and ballots were cast for one Council member each from the Northern and Central Districts, and two from the Southern District.

The report of the tellers showed the following elections: Southern District, Rev. E. W. Wright and Rev. A. L. Luttrull; Northern District, Rev. Ernest Carroll; Central District, Rev. James Hertel.

Ballots were cast for the Council member at large.

Report of tellers showed no election.

Motion prevailed that the vote be taken on the three names receiving the highest number of votes. They were Rev. Area Montgomery, Rev. C. D. Jester, Rev. Clarence Hamilton.

The ballots were again cast for the Council member at large.

The report of the tellers showed that Rev. Area Montgomery was elected as Council member at large.

Motion made that the time be extended to have the ordination service and the introduction of evangelists.

Motion prevailed that the motion be amended by deleting the words "and the introduction of evangelists".

The resolution as amended carried.

Rev. C. D. Jester led the Conference in singing "We Have An Anchor".

The names of the candidates for ordination were read, and the candidates were seated in front of the platform. The candidates were: Wilkes Ragsdale, Duane Watkins, Oran Spencer, Thomas Manuel, Theodore Meckes, Landis Bradfield, Robert Martin, Donald Rohner, Estel Eckart, John Mosier, Paul Miller, Isom Eskridge, B. M. Murphy, O. D. Emery, Mamie Yaryan, Cecil E. Bowker, Oscar Hunter, Lewis Smith; for ordained ministers, and Juanita Burcham and Susie Butts for ordained deaconesses.

The ordination service opened with Rev. C. D. Jester leading the Conference in singing "A Charge To Keep I Have". Scripture lessons were read by Rev. Ralph Nibarger, I Tim. 3:1-7, and Rev. George Huff, II Tim. 4:1-8. Rev. Floyd Goins led in prayer.

Rev. L. W. Sturk delivered a challenging ordination message using Acts 26:15-19, on the subject, "The Minister, His Responsibility, His Resource, and His Reward".

After the ordination service the Conference joined in singing "Blest Be The Tie That Binds" and "When We All Get To Heaven".

The session adjourned.

SEVENTH SITTING

The seventh sitting opened with Rev. James Kerby in charge of devotions. Rev. Gerald Leavell led in singing "When the Roll Is Called Up Yonder". Rev. Eula Kennedy read the 12th Chapter of Romans as a Scripture lesson, after which Rev. Dennis Barber led in prayer.

The minutes of the sixth sitting were read and approved.

Nominations for the Examining Board as made by the Council were: Rev. Gilbert Noel, Rev. Clarence Hamilton, Rev. Mark Storey.

Ballots were cast for Examining Board members.

Motion prevailed that the Conference Statistician be re-elected by acclamation.

Motion made and seconded that due to the building program the same trustees be re-elected for another year: Rev. Melvin Snyder, Rev. F. J. Goins, Rev. R. E. Nibarger, Rev. E. V. Halt, and Rev. Area Montgomery. Motion carried unanimously and they were elected.

The Council made the following nominations for School Board members: Southern District, Rev. E. W. Wright and Rev. Carl Roark; Central

District, Rev. James Hertel and Rev. O. W. Barnes; Northern District, Rev. Ralph McCrory and Rev. Carl Reed.

Ballots were cast for the Southern District School Board member.

Ballots were cast for the Central District School Board member.

The report of the tellers showed three nominees elected to Examining Board. A question arose concerning advisability of having men on this board who were on other boards and this election was laid aside until the Council returned to the Conference from a Council Meeting.

Report of tellers showed that Rev. James Hertel was elected as the School Board member from the Central District.

Report of tellers showed that Rev. E. W. Wright was elected to the School Board for the Southern District.

Ballots were cast for the Northern District School Board member.

Report of tellers showed that Rev. Ralph McCrory was elected as School Board member from the Northern District.

Motion prevailed that the two School Board members-at-large be elected from the laymen.

The following nominations were made from the floor: Virgil Halt, Loren Downey, Robert Hine, Charles Warren, Claude Storey.

Motion prevailed that nominations be closed.

Ballots were cast for the two School Board members-at-large.

The report of the Educational Board was read and accepted.

By common consent it was agreed that the Committee on Memoirs complete its work and send it to the Secretary for publication in the Minutes.

The Examining Board gave a partial report which was accepted.

Report of the tellers showed one election for the School Board member-at-large, Virgil Halt.

Motion prevailed that vote be taken on the two highest names, Loren Downey and Robert Hine.

Report of the tellers showed Robert Hine elected as the second School Board member-at-large.

Motion made and seconded that the Conference action of last year concerning persons being on more boards than they can well serve, Recommendation 21 under "Camp and Conference" be rescinded.

The Conference consented to the withdrawal of motion concerning persons being on too many boards by Brother Dunn.

Motion was made and seconded to amend Resolution No. 21 by adding: that no person in the Conference hold more than two major positions.

By common consent it was agreed to leave the word "major" out of the motion.

Motion prevailed that the amendment to No. 21 be adopted.

Rev. Clarence Hamilton was declared elected to the Examining Board.

The Council made the following nominations for the Educational Board: Flo Andrews, Walter Daugherty, Elmer Grossman, E. O. Howell, Eula Kennedy.

Motion prevailed that the Council be asked for nine nominations for the Educational Board, three names from each district, since the Conference desires that persons from each District have experience.

Motion prevailed that the Conference send a letter of appreciation to the Frankfort City Bakery for the gift of \$5.00 to the Young People's Work of the Conference and for 20 per cent discount on bakery goods sold to the Conference.

A partial report of the Resolutions Committee was read.

Motion prevailed that the Resolution concerning recommendation of ministers be tabled.

Motion prevailed that the Resolution concerning ordination service be tabled.

Motion prevailed to extend time to 12:00 o'clock noon.

The Resolutions Committee continued its partial report.

Motion prevailed that the Conference re-convene at 1:00 o'clock p.m.

Recessed by expiration of time. Dismissed with prayer by Rev. F. J. Goins.

The Conference re-convened with Rev. F. B. Dunn leading in prayer.

The Council made the following nominations for the Educational Board: Southern District, Elmer Grossman, J. W. Adcock, Duane Watkins; Central District, Flo Andrews, Eula Kennedy, E. E. Crowder; Northern District, Walter Daugherty, E. O. Howell, O. D. Williams.

Ballots were cast for the Educational Board members.

The following evangelists were introduced to the Conference: Southern District; Edith Trotsky, Helen Kelley, Helen Heugel, Pauline Watson, Wilkes Ragsdale, E. I. Faidley, Rev. and Mrs. Ray Williams, William S. Dean, Plen Smith. Central District; W. B. Fugett, Thomas Lauderbaugh, Clarence May, Isom Eskridge, Mamie Yaryan, June Risinger, Rex and Gladys Phares, W. T. Spoonamore, Velma Hertel, Dorsey Schenck. Northern District; Area Montgomery, A. M. Ewing, Clifford Conard, William McFarlin.

Report of tellers showed no election for Educational Board members.

Motion prevailed that election be on plurality basis and the four receiving the highest number of votes be considered elected.

Motion prevailed that the Bloomington church be considered as a part of the Central District:

The Secretary read the names of the various committees submitted by the District Superintendents:

ANNUAL REPORTS

REV. FLOYD J. GOINS

Superintendent of the Northern District

To the Indiana Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church now in session, I bring Gospel Greetings and a brief report of my activities as Superintendent of the Northern District of this great conference. With some 400 licensed ministers and deaconesses and near 200 lay delegates, we constitute a sizeable conference. It seems we have altogether too little to show for a sanctified army of such proportions.

As in the past, I have enjoyed the sweet fellowship, confidence and co-operation of my co-superintendents, Rev. Ralph Nibarger and Rev. M. H. Snyder. Due to extensive building program there have been additional responsibilities and burdens, yet it has been a real joy and pleasure to serve the church in this capacity.

DISTRICT FARM. With the close of the Conference one year ago, the Council voted to sell the large farm. Due to the responsibility placed upon me by the Council, I gave considerable time to the preparation for and disposal of the real estate and farm equipment. The Treasurer's report will show that we realized near \$30,000 from this sale, the proceeds of which have gone into the building program.

OLD PEOPLES HOME. I have given due time to the oversight of the Old Peoples Home. God has given us a splendid matron in the person of Mrs. Rosa Mobly. The spiritual tide is good in the Home. We lost two members by death this year, Aunt Josie Hummel, as we knew her, who was 96 years of age and had been at the home for twenty years; and Sister Groshart, who also had been at the home many years.

EXPANSIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS

BASS LAKE has moved into their new building. Rev. Victor Wade, long time pastor of the church was instrumental in raising sufficient money to completely rebuild the church. Rev. Virgil Skinner is the present pastor.

ELWOOD, under the supervision of Rev. Fay Locke has done their first works over. Lifting the church free of the old foundation, they "went a little deeper" and have a complete new basement with youth auditorium and Sunday School rooms and new heating plant. The approximate cost was \$5,000.00.

FRANKFORT, EASTSIDE, has built a beautiful five room modern parsonage and completed it with a debt of around \$3,000.00. Rev. John Stewart is the efficient pastor.

LEBANON, under the leadership of the pastor, Rev. E. O. Howell, has started the basement, the first unit of a new church building 40 x 70 feet, which is to be completed later.

FORT WAYNE who has been worshipping in a basement church for some time have now gone up with the super structure and in a short time will be ready to move in. Rev. Robert Addington is the good pastor there.

At WABASH, Brother Arnett is in the process of building a large garage to house their many buses. They are planning to have living quarters overhead.

HOME MISSIONS

Rev. Wm. Babb is pastor of the new work at LaPorte. With the co-operation of Zone One, we have purchased a building in LaPorte, a beautiful city in Northern Indiana, and are holding regular services.

UPLAND. Rev. Carl Sager and E. K. Purcell with help from the Home Missions Department, are holding services in a nice hall in Upland and have faith for a church in that place. This, as you know, is the home of Taylor University.

CRAWFORDSVILLE. After planning for three years to start a work in Crawfordsville, we are at last holding services there. Through the kind providence of God we have rented the Simonidies Court Building and have installed Rev. F. B. Dunn as the pastor of this new work. Our first service on a Sunday night brought 75 people out. They have organized a nice Sunday School which for the last two Sundays have had 50 present. They are having good crowds at the regular services and the outlook is very encouraging.

We have not organized in either of these places as yet but feel in another year, if Jesus tarries, we can organize in each place.

GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT. It was our happy privilege to have the General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk, in our district for four days. The Zone chairmen planned four zone meetings. Brother Sturk spoke twice at each gathering. His spirit and ministry was a great blessing to the Northern District.

In my labors for God and the church, I have made a total of 201 visits to the churches, 23 of which were to Zone gatherings and 15 were annual meetings.

I attended all Camp Board, Council and School Board meetings, also three General Board meetings and one District Superintendents Conference, spent some time in getting ready for the General Conference and attending the same. I held one Home Missionary meeting, one revival, spoke one week at Allentown Bible Institute, also was the engaged speaker at the Illinois Ministerial Meeting. I preached a total of 207 sermons with a goodly number of souls seeking God.

THE CHALLENGE. With the war clouds again gathering in the sky, with Laodicean luke-warmness incapacitating many professors and churches for Christian service, with the conquest of atheistic Communism and the carnal desire for world power, we see no future for the church or nation, only in God.

Our General Board has outlined a four-year intensive and extensive evangelistic program in which we are challenged to bring in 200 new churches, to raise our Sunday School attendance to 65,000 and to bring in 10,000 new members, and to increase the Advocate subscriptions to 15,000.

If this is to be accomplished, we must work together, we must of necessity go to our knees in prayer, be given to much fasting and be faithful in supporting every department of the church.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the Forty-seventh Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Indiana District:

Above all things I am very grateful unto the Lord for His blessings unto me. Especially I want to thank the many churches and friends who prayed for me this past year during my sickness. Through the months of November and December when I was suffering from a spine injury and the Doctor had told me on January 7th that about the only thing was an operation, which would place me in a cast for 10 or 12 weeks, and without any assurance of being able to work again for 9 months to a year. On Sunday morning January 8th, under the influence of strong medicine, I made my way to the New Castle Church, where they gathered for special prayer. God wonderfully touched me. Then again while in the hospital at Terre Haute for a few days following the Ministerial meeting, because of a hemorrhage due to high blood pressure, God has again undertaken for me, Praise His Precious Name, and restored me once again to normal health.

It is with deep gratitude to God for these manifest favors that I present this report of the work which God and the Church has entrusted to my oversight during the past year. Even amidst many hinderances God has given to us His mighty Grace to carry on.

REVIVALS. Truly this has been a year which God has honored among His Church and people, by giving gracious revivals in many places. Again and again God has given us altars filled with seekers during our visits to the churches.

Many of the Pastors have also reported the greatest interest in Spiritual things among their people, and are encouraged to press on until Jesus calls us home.

NEW CHURCH BUILDINGS

CONNEERSVILLE Church has completed its new church building, and now have a beautiful building to glorify God. They have worshipped nearly 2 years in a basement church.

DEPUTY, which is also building a new church, hopes to move in before early fall. May God richly help this group, granting them the desire of their hearts.

RISING SUN. I was grateful for the assistance of our General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk in the dedication of our new church here. The old church was destroyed by a storm. They now have a new brick church, heated by an oil furnace. Many thanks to the friends of our church here and to Rev. Harry Cochran.

GREENSBURG. God has wonderfully blessed this local church by giving them a new masonry church located on the main street and highway in this notable town, where the trees are plentiful, even growing on top of the Court House.

KNIGHTSTOWN. This year this local group moved out upon the promise of God and erected a lovely basement church, in a fine part of the town. They have left the old hall where they had worshipped for many years and moved into their own.

NEW PARSONAGES

EDINBURG has built a modern brick parsonage and is also remodeling the church. This has been done through prayer and the faithful labors of

the Pastor and people, without going in debt over a few hundred dollars. Thanks again for a prayer-hearing God.

RICHMOND. Rev. Crowder, the pastor, was privileged to move into a new modern 7 room parsonage which was finished last year on the lot adjoining the church.

GREENFIELD. The local church felt the need of the pastor living among them, and purchased a new parsonage. May God give to others the Vision and Courage of this small but fine group of Christian Pilgrims.

IMPROVEMENTS

It seems that amidst the showers of Spiritual blessings, God has moved upon the hearts of the people to advance the cause by making many local improvements.

INDIANAPOLIS, NORTH SIDE. This church has recently installed a new automatic oil heating system in the church, and remodeled the Sunday School rooms, even stone coating the exterior of the church.

GREENWOOD. The church here has completed a new church basement with Sunday School rooms and many other needed facilities to help advance the cause of Christ. They have also installed an automatic oil furnace in the church.

BETHEL. A small church needing many repairs even without electric lights, hid away in the country, amidst the morning glories, have completely remodeled both interior and exterior, installing electric lights. Now it would grace any city community.

SHELBYVILLE. This fine group of shouting Pilgrims have changed the Parsonage next door to the church into a partial church annex by placing a basement under the parsonage, using a large room for the Sunday School, by the means of a passage-way under ground between the church and parsonage.

INDIANAPOLIS, BROOKSIDE. Under the fine leadership of the Pastor the church has found itself not on a siding, but on the improvement line. The high ceiling in the church has been lowered, and the interior remodeled.

WESTPORT. Rev. Smith and church have proven to many that they are not tied up at the port, but sailing upon the sea of advancement. A complete bathroom has been added and many other improvements to the home of the noble Pastor.

RUSHVILLE. Pastor and people alike felt their need for an enlarged Sunday School, but their present plant built a few years ago was too small. Having reached a zenith, they began to dig and as the result have a new basement with which to expand and build a Sunday School, which was dedicated October 30th.

INDIANAPOLIS, RIVERSIDE. A beautiful church, with a small congregation and a debt of many years, the pastor, Rev. E. V. Halt, felt something should be done relative to the debt, and, since taking this church, has paid off the debt of over \$2,300.00, and completely redecored the interior of the church. Thanks again for noble leadership and the Holy Spirit.

HOME MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

It was our happy privilege to meet a local group of Holiness people, in one of the beautiful cities amidst the hills of central Indiana. This group showed signs of courtship, and out of it has grown a new Pilgrim Holiness Church. Two years ago Rev. Siscoe and a local builder felt it upon their hearts to build a new church in downtown Bloomington. A modest masonry building 34 x 60 with basement was built a little over 2 years ago. This was operated without any denominational connections. Feeling a need of this,

they deeded the property to us and about 10 weeks later we were able to organize a new Pilgrim Holiness Church.

NEW PROSPECTS

INDIANAPOLIS, SUNSHINE GARDENS. A fine young man from our School here at Frankfort felt led to enter the field of labor where we had only a basement church. Rev. John Eastburn and family have shown the greatest zeal for God of anyone I have ever met. He has built a new church atop the old basement and hopes to complete it and organize a new church yet this fall.

CHESTERTVILLE. This coming Friday night Rev. Cochran is beginning a tent meeting at this place with the folk in Zone 8. We hope that out of this meeting will grow a new church.

INDIANAPOLIS. Plans are now in the making and contracts have already been made to start a colored Holiness work among the lost and deceived people living on our own door steps. May God give us greater vision of the lost, regardless of color or race.

CAMP. Many improvements much needed have been added to our camp equipment, a new 10 burner gas stove for the kitchen. One hundred new steel hospital cots, 31 full size mattresses, and 94 twin size. This is exclusive of the 86 twin size beds and mattresses in the new school dormitory.

SCHOOL BUILDING. As Chairman, I am grateful for the help of the Lord in this great building program. Many things could be said at this point. However I will say we are grateful for the business concerns, of Frankfort and Indianapolis and elsewhere, for their considerations in discounts as high as 65%.

I also want to express my heart-felt appreciation for all counsel and help of my assistant Rev. T. J. Preusz and co-laborers, Rev. F. J. Goins and Rev. M. H. Snyder.

DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

I have attempted to do my best among those I have been called upon to serve. Only sorry that I could not have done more. But by His help I have attended all regular council meetings, except one called meeting. Attended all Executive and School Board meetings, District Youth rallies, 12 zone meetings, 154 calls to churches, 27 board meetings and annual elections, 5 funerals, and District Superintendent meeting. I have received my salary in full and \$750.00 in mileage expense.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT •

Southern District

To the Forty-seventh Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Churches of Indiana, Greetings:

Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ: According as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love.

Once again we are privileged to assemble for our annual conference to hear reports of the activities of the past year and to seek the guidance of our Heavenly Father with regard to the coming year. I have a feeling that this conference will be one of the most important ever held on these grounds. Decisions will be made which will have far-reaching effects in the salvation of souls for years to come, if Jesus should tarry. We must not miss the mind

of the Spirit. He is the Lord of the Harvest and we must labor under His direction. Though war-clouds are again on the horizon let us not be motivated by our fears, but rather by our faith in the living God.

A SPIRIT OR REVIVAL has prevailed in many of the churches of the Southern District during the past year. This has been reflected in increased membership and Sunday School attendance. On the other hand, some of our churches have hardly held their own and in some instances showed a loss. However, the overall picture will show a fair gain in Sunday School attendance and we believe the report of the statistician will show a substantial gain in membership.

CHURCH EXTENSION. Much of our gain in membership on the Southern District will be due to the addition of the Trinity Gospel Tabernacle of Evansville. This group under the leadership of Rev. A. L. Luttrull, their pastor, has been looking our way for a number of years. From the viewpoint of courtship much credit is due Brother Goins, my predecessor, Brother Nibarger, a former pastor, and Brother Mark Storey, my able assistant, but over all we believe it has been the Holy Ghost who attracted them our way. They bring with them a membership of nearly 200, a Sunday School with the largest average in the Conference, and a church and parsonage valued at \$150,000.00.

Home missionary meetings have been held at Bruceville, Vincennes, and a number of places in and around Evansville. Just what will develop from these efforts we are not able to say at the present. We do know the fields are white unto harvest and the type of laborers it takes to establish new churches are so very few.

NEW CHURCH BUILDINGS. The new church at Forest Hills, Evansville, has been completed for some months but as yet the people are worshiping in the old building because of a delay on delivery of the church pews. This lovely church of Bedford stone construction will be one of the nicest in the movement. Brother Mark Storey and his fine people have labored and given sacrificially. We are just starting a new church building at Cannelton where Sister Stella Critchfield is the pastor. It will occupy one of the most prominent locations in town. The Shelburn people, under the direction of the pastor, Brother Basil Hayes have built a nice new church of concrete block construction. The church at Marengo is also worshiping in their new building of concrete block construction. This was made possible by the sacrificial labors of their pastor, Brother Herschel Hamm, and his fine people. How refreshing it is to see these churches move out of halls into nice commodious church auditoriums.

NEW PARSONAGES. The Vincennes church has completed its new parsonage valued at \$12,000.00. Rev. Herman Smith, the pastor, saved them thousands of dollars by doing much of the work himself. Five other churches have purchased nice parsonages during the past year. They are: Valeene, Fort Branch, Grandview, Austin, and Poplar Grove.

IMPROVEMENTS. Brother Hascue Carter, pastor of the Wheatland church, has remodeled the parsonage and built Sunday School rooms in the basement of the church improving the properties in the amount of about \$1,500.00. Other churches improving their church properties substantially include Mitchell, French Lick, and Shoals.

The Greenwood Street Church at Terre Haute will soon complete a 15 x 26 addition to their church auditorium increasing the value of their church property at least \$2,000.00.

FRANKFORT PILGRIM COLLEGE. As chairman of a committee appointed to put on a drive for funds in the city of Frankfort to apply on our new school buildings I have spent about five weeks in Frankfort planning and prosecuting this drive known as the Greater Frankfort Pilgrim College Advance. Because of the summer vacation when so many businessmen are away

we suspended the completion of the drive until this fall. It is planned that all the rural part of the country be canvassed this fall. To date better than \$4,000.00 has been received in cash and approximately \$1,500.00 in donations such as newspaper publicity and discounts. Much work is to be done in the city as well as throughout the county. Brother R. K. Storey and Brother Ralph McCrory, the other members of the committee as well as many teachers and students of the school have labored most faithfully in the drive.

OUR LOSSES. Some weeks ago the Southern District lost one of its most faithful pastors, the Rev. Steven Burke, pastor of our church at Mecca. After several weeks of illness he slipped away to be with Jesus. Though well up in years he had gone on foot from house to house seeking the lost. He left a real impact for good upon the town of Mecca.

A PERSONAL LOSS. On August the ninth Grandma Groshart quietly passed to her eternal reward. Having lived with my grandparents from my infancy until I was fifteen years of age she also filled the place of a mother to me. Her constant prayers are missed more than I can express in words. I can but lean a little harder on Jesus.

Not the least of my blessings this year has been the fellowship and understanding love of my fellow superintendents, Brother Goins and Brother Nibarger. It has been a genuine pleasure to labor with them in sharing the burdens of the great Indiana Conference.

PERSONAL ACTIVITIES. REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL BOARD

We, the Educational Board of the Indiana Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, have examined 123 applicants and 33 absentees. We have tried to handle impartially each case in the sight and fear of God.

Special Sections from the Manual

Section 210, paragraphs 2, 3, and 4:

Those entering a ministerial office shall immediately enter upon the prescribed course of study and pursue same until completed. To this end they shall place themselves under the direction of the District Educational Board, which has charge of this work, unless the same course, or its equivalent, is taken in school.

Examinations required by the District Educational Board shall be submitted in writing and shall be conducted at the time and place of the annual conference or during the year upon completion of a book or subject, either personally or through the mails.

The passing grade of any study shall not be less than an average of 70 per cent.

Section 154:

No person shall be eligible for ordination until first having served at least two years in active ministry.

Section 155:

The licentiate who has held his license at least three years, and has successfully completed the required course of study, shall be eligible for ordination as a minister of the Gospel, unless the district council will have deemed it wise to have ordained before the expiration of the three year period.

Section 149, paragraph 1:

All licensed ministers failing to complete and report on at least two subjects a year in their required Course of Study, for two consecutive years, will automatically forfeit their licenses, unless in the judgment of the educational board an exception shall be made. The district council shall have power to review and pass upon such action when it deems advisable. (Section 109, paragraph 2.)

The following recommendations were brought in by the Resolutions Committee:

1.

We recommend that at each annual Camp Meeting on the last Thursday, Friday and Saturday, there shall be one daily session of the Educational and Examining Boards for the purpose of the examination of ministers. All ministers knowing themselves due to appear before these boards are urged to be present.

We further recommend that the time of each session shall be announced from the platform.

2.

We recommend that all ministers pursuing the Conference Ministerial Course by correspondence take the subjects through the Correspondence and Extension departments of Frankfort Pilgrim College. The Educational Board will serve only to review standing of the candidates.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

Church Government

1.

Whereas many of our members are not familiar with the actions of the Conference, therefore

Be it resolved that the Pastor shall have a special meeting of his church at the earliest possible date, for the purpose of familiarizing his people with their responsibilities for the Conference year.

2.

We recommend that the annual business of the church be closed on June 30 of each year.

3.

Inasmuch as it is impossible for the local church to send Conference funds to the Conference Treasurer by June 30, we recommend that the Treasurer hold his books open until July 15.

4.

We recommend that each church provide a parsonage with telephone, and if possible, other utilities also be furnished as recommended by the Local Church Board.

5.

We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating facilities, window shades, kitchen and bathroom floor coverings that provisions be made for the same by the local Church.

6.

We recommend that where churches and parsonages are located in cities that the location of the church and parsonage appear in our Minutes. We further recommend if possible, that where parsonages are equipped with phones, that the name of the pastor and Pilgrim Holiness Church be listed in the phone book.

7.

We recommend that no Local Church Board endorse for Conference license anyone who is not willing to give full time to the ministry of God's Word. We further recommend that the Examining Board pass no candidate for Conference license who fails to give evidence of a Divine Call to the ministry or a willingness to give full time to the same.

8.

Whereas, we have many able-bodied licensed and ordained ministers, who are employed in other than ministerial work, and seldom if ever preach, we recommend that the Examining Board be instructed to draw the lines closer on such individuals and that no one who is not active in the ministry be recommended for ordination.

9.

We recommend that the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper be observed at least once each quarter by our local churches.

10.

We recommend that each District elect a full time Superintendent.

11.

We recommend that each District elect an Assistant Superintendent from the Pastors of that District.

12.

We recommend that the District Superintendents with their Assistants together with the Zone Chairmen in their respective Districts shall be responsible for the promotion of Home Missionary Work.

13.

We recommend that there be District Parsonage Committees composed of the District Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, and Zone Chairmen, whose duty it shall be to supervise the liquidation of their parsonage debt, and also be responsible for the maintenance of the parsonage.

14.

We recommend that the Conference Council consist of 13 members comprised of the three District Superintendents, their Assistants, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, one Advisory member from each District, and two additional members from the District or Districts which are unequally represented.

15.

We recommend that the District Superintendents' alternate in presiding at Council Meetings unless otherwise required by emergency.

16.

We recommend that the District Superintendents be members of the Camp Meeting Board by virtue of their office.

17.

Whereas in many of our building projects there seems to be poorly formulated plans due to incompetent committees which has resulted in some poor constructed buildings, therefore

Be it resolved that before constructing church buildings or parsonages that plans and specifications be approved by the conference council or by a committee appointed by same.

18.

We recommend that the time of voting of the church on its pastor be May 15 to 30.

19.

We recommend that the District Superintendents release no name of changing pastors until June 15, at which time a complete list of all available ministers be given to each church.

20.

Inasmuch as the Resolutions Committee has been approached with the matter of the use of lantern slides and motion pictures in our churches, therefore

Be it resolved that the Indiana Conference go on record as opposed to the use of the same.

21.

We recommend that a committee consisting of the three Superintendents formulate a questionnaire, which shall be ratified by the Conference Council, the same to be filled out in quadruplicate form by all Conference Ministers.

We further recommend that this questionnaire be given to each one of the Superintendents and one to be kept on file by the Examining Board.

22.

We recommend that no person be recommended for ordination without having served two years in full time pastoral or evangelistic work.

23.

Whereas there are many of our churches that are failing to meet their financial requirements, therefore

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, as he visits his District, shall give this matter careful consideration with each local church board.

24.

We recommend that each District have separate church reports in our 1950 Minutes.

25.

We recommend that each District have a Ministerial Convention.

26.

We recommend that the Committee on Division send to each Pastor the final plans for division. Said plans to be distributed among our churches by April 1, 1951.

27.

We recommend that the following recommendations in our 1949 Minutes be deleted:

Camp and Conference No. 14.

Young Peoples No. 3.

Miscellaneous Nos. 1, 8, and 9.

Sunday School

1.

The duties of the Conference Sunday School Board in harmony with the manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall be as follows:

1. The Conference Sunday School Board, together with Zone Presidents shall arrange for Sunday School Conventions to be held in the respective Zones during the year.

2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the Conference.

3. To present an annual report to the Conference which shall include the following:

- a. A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
- b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the Conference.

4. The Council shall direct the Conference Treasurer to take care of all finance incurred by the Conference Sunday School Board.

5. The Conference Sunday School Board shall be amenable to the Council.

6. The Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the Conference Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

7. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the Conference Sunday School Board, the Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.

8. The Conference Sunday School Board shall work in conjunction with the General Sunday School Secretary in promoting the annual Rally Day, etc.

9. To have published each quarter a Conference Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School in the Conference for the quarter, this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the Conference.

10. We recommend that where possible each local church conduct a summer Vacation Bible School.

Camp Meeting and Conference

1.

We recommend that all those desiring to pay for their board by serving as a worker during the Camp Meeting be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00 when accepted as a worker by the Camp Meeting Committee.

2.

We recommend that Conference Ministers and their wives and dependent children be granted workers tickets for their meals during the Camp Meeting.

We further recommend that those physically able be assigned to their respective duties and all failing to fill their assignment shall have their workers tickets forfeited.

3.

We recommend that the Camp Meeting Secretary issue no workers tickets to Laymen except as he is authorized by the Superintendents of the various departments.

4.

We recommend that all proposed building programs or all major changes on the State Camp Ground be endorsed by a two-thirds vote of the Council, Camp Meeting Board, and the School Board.

We further recommend that all future constructions be made to conform to State and Local codes.

5.

We recommend that the Camp Meeting Board pass upon all improvements or construction not entailing an expense of more than \$1,000.00.

6.

We recommend that our Camp Meeting begin on the second Friday of August each year.

7.

We recommend that there be a purchasing agent appointed by the Conference Council for the purpose of aiding the Conference, Churches, Camp, and School in purchasing of their supplies and equipment, and etc.

8.

We recommend that all bills for camp meeting purchases be placed in the Camp Meeting Treasurer's hands at the close of the Camp Meeting.

9.

We recommend that all who rent rooms during Camp be advised to bring their own bedding.

10.

We recommend that in case the Conference considers changing or increasing the amounts in financial recommendations by the Ways and Means Committee that Ways and Means Committee may appeal to the Conference for a Committee to investigate the financial balance of the treasury before voting on the change, this investigation committee to consist of one member from the Conference Council, one member from the Ways and Means Committee, and one member chosen from the Conference.

11.

We recommend that only ministers, their wives and unmarried dependent children and lay delegates be given entertainment during Conference. All entitled to this entertainment shall be duly registered and given cards of recognition. For all other entertainment the same rate shall prevail as during Camp Meeting.

12.

We recommend that there be a Publishing Committee composed of the Conference Secretary and two appointee members. It shall be the duty of this committee to publish the Conference Minutes.

13.

We recommend that each church give the purchase price of one cot pad and one sheet for each 50 members or major fraction thereof.

14.

We recommend that the Conference Council be responsible for providing needed help for the kitchen and dining room during Conference.

15.

Inasmuch as different persons have bought and sold leases on lots without the sanction of the Camp Board or agent thereof therefore

We recommend that no lease be bought or sold without the sanction of proper agent signing the same and that a carbon copy of this contract be kept in the agent's file, the same to be the property of the Camp Meeting Board.

Be it further resolved no persons be allowed to own two leases and any person who buys a lease must build within three years or the Camp Board, at their discretion, may repossess the lot by refunding the payment made.

16.

We recommend that the water and sewer service be installed under the directions of the Camp Meeting Board.

17.

We recommend that there be one Conference Statistician.

18.

We recommend that the Conference Council in conjunction with the School Board formulate a plan for the maintenance of the buildings and equipment, for all Conference property.

19.

We recommend that the Conference Secretary at his earliest possible convenience inform the Chairmen of the various Boards and Committees of their respective duties.

We further recommend that within three months said Committee and Boards be required to formulate plans to meet the desires of this Conference.

20.

We recommend that caution be taken to not over-estimate the values of Church property in our Annual Reports.

21.

We recommend that the Conference go on record as interpreting I Peter 3:3, where it speaks of the wearing of gold, to mean all rings including wedding and class rings.

22.

We recommend that where a man is inadvertently placed on more Boards and Committees than he can well serve that the Conference Council be authorized to make proper adjustment in such Committees.

23.

We recommend that the camp meeting board appoint a committee to see that there are two blueprints made; one showing the plumbing, and sewerage system, and the other showing the wiring of the camp grounds, and buildings.

24.

We recommend that no District levy any assessments, other than Conference assessments, without the consent of the Conference Council.

25.

Inasmuch as we have an active Memorial Committee therefore

Be it resolved that instead of a Memorial Service during the Conference, we ask this committee to bring adequate memoirs of the deceased to the Conference and the same be recorded in the Conference Minutes.

We further recommend that the Conference Secretary gather the needed information of each of our Ministers by sending out a questionnaire. This information is to kept up to date by making the needed additions at the close of each Conference.

26.

Whereas there are new cottages being built and others being remodeled and

Whereas there has been no set of rules formulated to govern the same, therefore

Be it resolved that a committee of three, composed of our Conference Secretary, electrician, and plumber, formulate a set of rules governing the plumbing, wiring, construction, and remodeling of all privately owned cottages, trailers, etc.

We further recommend that a written permit must be secured from this committee before construction is started.

We further recommend that all cottage owners be notified of this recommendation, and that anyone failing to meet the requirements shall be required to make the necessary changes or their lease forfeited.

27.

We recommend that there be a fee for each house car, car or trailer which is on the camp ground for three months or more during the year for the purpose of maintaining the roads.

28.

We recommend that the camp meeting board appoint an inspector for camp grounds and buildings who shall make periodic inspections and shall have the authority to enforce such regulations that shall be delegated him by the camp meeting board.

29.

Whereas there is a growing number of cottages being constructed upon the camp grounds and whereas these cottages and buildings are helping to meet the housing needs of the school and whereas our properties are part of a non-profit organization, and whereas there is the possibility that some are not aware of the limitations of such an organization, and hereby may make charges for use of cottages which are out of harmony with our organization, therefore

Be it resolved that an appraisal committee be appointed by the Camp Meeting Board for the purpose of appraising the camp cottages and trailers to determine the maximum amount of remuneration to be received from the same during the school year.

30.

We recommend that upon the death of a Conference Minister or his wife, that the conference secretary be notified at once, who shall notify all conference pastors by telephone or telegraph.

31.

Whereas the Conference Council has considerable business to care for between conferences, and such business is important and more or less unknown to the members of the Conference, therefore

Be it resolved that the Conference Secretary read in review to the assembled Conference the major actions of the Council during the preceeding year.

32.

We recommend that our School President be a member of the Camp Meeting Board.

33.

Whereas improper names have been attached to some of our camp and school buildings, therefore

Be it resolved that the Conference Council give them proper names.

34.

We recommend that any Minister, who fails to get his annual report to the Conference Statistician by July 31st, shall be referred to the Examining Board.

35.

We recommend that all auditing material be brought to the Auditing Committee by the first Monday of the Camp Meeting.

36.

We recommend that the Conference Council appoint a Committee to prepare a uniform Report Blank for the District Superintendents.

37.

We recommend that the ground west of the Tabernacle that has been designated for camp purposes be sowed in grass, laid off in lots, and leases be sold.

We further recommend that the following be the rules for construction.

1. Construction

1. All cottages shall be of single story, standard 2 x 4 frame, tile, or block with 8 foot ceiling height. The roof shall be of gable or hip construction.

2. All cottages shall be with uniform front line, said line to be determined at the time the lots are laid out.
 3. No cottage shall be built closer than 3 feet to either side line or to the rear line of the lot.
 4. Written permission shall be obtained before any construction is started.
 5. Trailers shall not be permitted on lots for permanent use.
2. Plumbing
 1. All plumbing shall conform to the local code and shall be inspected by a person authorized by the camp meeting board.
 3. Electric Wiring
 1. All electric wiring shall conform to the National code and to the rules of the local power company. No connections shall be made to any service line until permission is obtained for such connection by the person authorized to grant such permission by the Camp Meeting Board.

38.

Whereas there is great difficulty in providing rooms for many who desire to attend this Camp Meeting and

Whereas there are some rooms vacant for many days of the Camp, but cannot be used because the Room Superintendent has not been notified when they will be occupied, therefore

Be it resolved that each one having a deposit on a room notify the Room Superintendent by the first day of Camp Meeting of the date of their arrival, and that the Room Superintendent shall have the right to rent out their room during the time that they will not occupy it.

We further recommend that the Room Superintendent notify all persons who have a deposit on a room of said recommendation, and anyone who fails to comply with said recommendation shall forfeit their deposit and room.

Zone Work

1.

Inasmuch as the Zone Meetings have been beneficial in advancing the spiritual, educational, and doctrinal interests of the Conference, we recommend they be continued.

We further recommend that the Zone Chairmen be elected by secret ballot by the Ministers and lay delegates.

2.

Whereas as the need arises for a district to change its zone boundaries because of receiving new churches and distance, therefore be it resolved that there be a committee appointed by the District Superintendent to work out the rezoning of that district to be ratified by the Conference.

Educational and Examining Board

The Recommendations brought in regarding this work are printed under the report of the Educational Board at its request.

Pastoral

1.

We recommend that each pastor be granted a two weeks vacation with pay.

2.

We recommend that pastors of deceased members of our District Conference bring to the Committee on Memoirs a copy of the obituary of the deceased and any other information that is available.

3.

We recommend that no pastor call an evangelist outside of our church without the approval of the District Superintendent.

4.

We recommend that each Pastor keep a record of all names and addresses of the subscribers to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate in the vicinity of his pastorate and shall endeavor to secure the renewal of each subscription before the date of expiration.

Young People

1.

We recommend that the Young People's Committee consisting of the Conference Young People's Secretary, Treasurer, and zone chairman make plans for a young people's convention.

We further recommend that this convention be held the third Thursday of June each year.

2.

We recommend that there be District Young People's conventions and zone rallies.

Miscellaneous

1.

We recommend that immediately following the Conference the Secretary mail to each pastor an itemized postal notice of the financial requirements of the church for the year.

2.

We recommend that 1200 copies of the Conference Minutes be provided within 30 days after the Conference adjourns. Each church must send in the money with its order.

3.

We recommend that we have a Thanksgiving Harvest day for the School. Such day shall be set aside for the various zones to bring in their canned goods and produce of all kinds for the School.

4.

Whereas example is more powerful than precept and

Whereas our Officials and Ministers are looked upon as examples of standards of our Church, therefore

Be it resolved that the Indiana Conference call attention to Sec. 65, page 49 of our Manual and urge our Ministers and Officials and their families to exemplify these standards.

5.

We recommend that the three District Superintendents be members of the School Board by virtue of their office.

We further recommend that they form a committee to nominate two men from each district from which one shall be elected by the Conference.

We further recommend that the Conference elect two members at large, which shall comprise the School Board.

6.

We recommend that the Ways and Means Committee and the Resolutions Committee meet at the call of the Chairman of said committees prior to the next Annual Conference. The District Superintendents may also meet with these committees.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Local Church Financial

1.

We recommend that the Conference budget consist of 10% of all money raised by the local church, Sunday School and 5% from the Young People's Society, except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds and all funds raised for specified Conference interests. Building fund purposes shall be interpreted to include rent on parsonages and churches and money paid on contracts of the same.

2.

We recommend that the Conference Budget be prorated as follows: Conference Fund, 62%; Old Peoples Home, 5%; Frankfort Pilgrim College, 17%; Home Missions, 14%; and General Conference, 2%.

3.

We recommend that each church raise five cents per member per month for Home Missionary Work and Church Extension, money to be paid to the Conference Treasurer.

4.

We recommend that each church pay the Frankfort Pilgrim College at the rate of 1% of their annual gross receipts of the local church treasury up to and including \$3000.00, and 2% for all churches with an annual income over \$3000.00. Said amount to be paid monthly through the Conference Treasury.

District Financial

1.

We recommend that our regular Conference stenographer be paid \$30.00 and that the Secretary be authorized to secure additional helpers at the rate of \$20.00 per person.

2.

We recommend that our District Superintendents be paid a salary of \$65.00 per week plus mileage at the rate of four cents per mile not to exceed \$750.00 for the Conference year.

3.

We recommend that our Assistant District Superintendents be paid at the rate of \$7.50 per day plus mileage for each day's service.

4.

We recommend that the Conference Secretary be paid \$150.00 for his services for the year.

5.

We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be paid \$400.00 for his services for the year.

6.

We recommend that the Conference Statistician be paid \$100.00 for his services for the year.

7.

We recommend the Superintendents be authorized to launch a drive in their respective Districts to help finance the new buildings now under construction.

8.

We recommend that the standard mileage rate be fixed at 4 cents per mile.

9.

We recommend that each church raise fifty cents per member per year for the operating expense of the Old Peoples Home.

10.

Inasmuch as the Pension Plan would entail considerable expense to make it fully operative in our District, we recommend that our District go on record as favoring the Plan; We further recommend that the matter be left on

a voluntary basis, both as to ministers becoming members and churches desiring to participate in the Pension Plan.

11.

Whereas there is a debt on the new building to the amount of \$35,000.00, and whereas no provision is made for the liquidation of this debt,

Therefore, be it resolved each pastor or church raise the equivalent of two dollars per member this Conference year to be applied on said debt.

Young People's Work

1.

We recommend that each Young People's Society be requested to send an offering for the Young People's Rally to the Conference Young People's Treasurer; also that Churches without organized Societies be invited to send an offering for same.

We further recommend that said offering be sent in at least 30 days prior to the Conference Young People's Rally.

2.

We recommend that each Young People's Society send six per cent of all money raised in the regular offering to the State Young People's Treasurer to finance the work of the Conference Young People's Organization.

Camp Meeting and Conference

1.

Whereas there is a need of improved roads on our camp ground, we recommend a fee of \$5.00 be collected from all persons owning a car who live on the grounds for a period of three months or more out of each Conference year. This money to be used exclusively for improving necessary roads.

We further recommend an equal amount be paid by the Camp Meeting Treasurer for this purpose.

2.

We recommend where repairs are necessary on the buildings used by the school, the material be furnished by the Camp Meeting and the labor by the School.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The Sunday School Committee wishes to present the following report to this Forty-seventh Annual Conference of the Indiana Districts.

With the co-operation of the pastors and our three district superintendents and the effort of our Sunday School secretary, the Rev. James Hertel, we are able to give you a complete annual report of the Sunday School work throughout the Conference for the past year.

This year the Sunday School conventions were held in the following churches: West Terre Haute, Vincennes, French Lick, Lawrenceburg, Columbus, Indianapolis, Brookside, New Castle, Anderson, Wabash, Logansport, and Frankfort.

The guest speaker at these conventions was the Rev. Paul F. Elliott. His message to the Sunday Schools was an inspiration and blessing.

The attendance at these conventions showed a 275 per cent gain over that of last year for which we praise the Lord.

Once again the Sunday School Revival was a great blessing to our churches throughout the state both spiritually and numerically. There were

847 children that sought the Lord for salvation at our altars and there was a gain in attendance of 19 per cent over that of last year.

The conference average in our Sunday Schools for each Sunday for the past year was 10,809, or an average of 73 for each church, which reveals a total gain of 9 per cent for each Sunday over that of last year.

In Memoriam

KATHERINE INMAN

Rev. Katherine Edith Dunkelburger was born near Three Oaks, Michigan. She was converted early in life and together with her sister Hattie entered the evangelistic field. They travelled together singing and preaching the Gospel until she was united in marriage to Richard D. Inman in 1923.

Sister Inman was pastor at Michigan City for two years, at Sandford one year, and at Seeleyville four years. She also did some evangelistic work after moving to Terre Haute.

She passed away at her home in Terre Haute, Indiana, June 13th, 1950.

SANTFORD FAGG

Santford Fagg was born in Vigo County, Indiana, on September 1, 1875 and died December 5, 1949. His ministry was mostly along pioneer lines and little record was kept of the number of such meetings held. The work at Coalmont was organized as the result of his ministry there and he served as pastor of the church for several years. He also pastored the church at Jasonville for a few years.

While actual records are meager here, yet a full record of his sacrificial ministry is in the hands of the Great Recorder. The church was enriched by the faithful ministry of one who sought for neglected fields in which to labor.

WILLIAM ELI RIBKEE

William E. Ribkee was born at Spencerville, Ohio, June 26, 1892 and died January 2, 1950. He was converted on January 25, 1929 at the Centerville Pilgrim Holiness Church and united with the church a few days later. His first sermon was preached at the Centerville Church in 1932 and he was licensed as a minister the same year. He assisted his wife in the pastorates at Centerville, Winchester, Michigantown, Madison and Noblesville. His ministry covered a period of about twenty-one years.

ALBERT J. SMITH

Albert J. Smith was born June 23, 1894 and died August 19, 1950 after an illness of several years. He was converted in July 1934 at Andrews, Indiana, and obtained the experience of heart purity in April of 1935. He united with the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Huntington in September 1934 and became a charter member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Andrews when it was organized in 1935. Here he preached his first sermon in 1936. He attended Frankfort Pilgrim College for one year and finished his ministerial course in North Carolina by correspondence. He was ordained August 28, 1944. His active ministry was spent in North Carolina where he labored for better than five years until ill health forced him to give up the work. He pastored at Hickory, Durham, Whittier and Wilmont. The church building at Hickory was constructed during his ministry there. He assisted in the launching of a new church at Lenore, North Carolina. Though entering the ministry late in life he left a record of faithful service.

WILLIAM T. DUNN

William T. Dunn was born January 1, 1866 and died May 6, 1950. He was converted September 5, 1881 and sanctified in August 1886. He united with the Methodist Church in 1885 and preached his first sermon in the Graves County Methodist church in September 1892. He was ordained to preach the gospel September 9, 1896. He had four years of Theological training. He united with the Pilgrim Holiness Church in 1940 as a retired minister. He spent fifty-two years in active ministry, serving as pastor and evangelist. His heart was in the work of the Lord both at home and abroad. In his early life he sold a farm and gave the proceeds to foreign missions and then for ten years supported a native worker in Africa.

STEPHEN COLE BURKE

Stephen C. Burke was born in January 4, 1872. He was converted December 31, 1889 at the Union Chapel Methodist Church. His first sermon was preached at the Mount Pisgah Methodist Church in 1899 and he was ordained to preach the gospel in 1904. He pastored for several years in the Oklahoma Conference of the Methodist church. He united with the Pilgrim Holiness Church in 1947 and was serving as pastor of the church at Mecca at the time of his death.

LELA MONTGOMERY JEFFERS

Lela M. Jeffers was born May 15, 1890 and died on February 28, 1950. She was converted in October 1904 at Evansville, Indiana, and received the blessing of entire sanctification in February 1905. Her first sermon was preached in 1907 at Kinmundy, Illinois. She was the first woman licensed to preach in the Southern Illinois Methodist Conference. She spent about seventeen years in active evangelism. She was ordained to the ministry August 21, 1939. After her marriage to Angus Jeffers she served as assistant pastor on the charges to which he was assigned. They were serving the Muncie church at the time of her death.

PEARL CLYMER

Pearl Clymer had served in the ministry for a period of about thirty years. A record of his ministry had not been turned to the secretary so no full record can be given here.

LAWRENCE WADE

Lawrence Wade was one of the best known evangelists in the Indiana Conference but he had not returned his record of ministry and such record could not be found. His ministry had carried him into most parts of the nation and the church will long remember his faithful labors.

ELMER CLARK

Elmer Clark was another of the veteran ministers of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. The secretary has no record of his ministry. The church at Delphi was organized as the result of his labors there.
