REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE**LOCAL CHURCH WORK**

1. Whereas many of our members are not familiar with the actions of this conference therefore be it resolved; that each pastor shall at his earliest possible convenience familiarize his church with their responsibilities to the district as outlined by this conference.

2. We recommend that the sacrament of the Lord's Supper be observed in our churches at least once each quarter.

3. We further recommend that opportunity for baptism be given by our churches at least once a year.

4. Resolved that each pastor may hold two revival meetings each year off his charge.

5. Be it resolved that our churches do not open their doors to other churches, organizations, institutions, or individuals for financial appeals.

6. Resolved that no pastor employ an evangelist outside the Pilgrim Holiness Church without first consulting the District Superintendent.

7. Inasmuch as some of our churches are quite a distance from our district camp, be it resolved that each church pay the traveling expense of their delegate to camp and conference.

8. Resolved that the first prayer meeting of each month shall be donation night for the pastors of the district. The announcement to be made the Sunday previous by the Sunday School Superintendent.

9. Resolved that each pastor leaving his charge, leave the parsonage and premises clean; also he shall leave a complete calling list with the location.

10. We recommend that the churches of the district be encouraged as far as possible to purchase Sunday School and Church supplies through our own Publishing House.

11. Whereas some of our churches are failing to meet their financial requirements, therefore be it resolved that the District Superintendent as he visits the district shall give this matter careful consideration with each local church board.

12. We recommend that each pastor be granted two weeks vacation with pay.

13. Resolved that each pastor read to his church section 65, page 49 of the manual at regular intervals.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH WORK

The duties of the Sunday School Committee in harmony with the manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall be as follows:

1. The District Sunday School Committee together with the District Superintendent shall arrange for Sunday School conventions to be held in the District during the year.

2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the District.

3. To present an annual report to the Conference which shall include the following:

a. A statement of the work accomplished during the year.

b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the District.

4. We recommend that where possible each local church conduct a Summer Vacation Bible school and report of that work be sent to the District Sunday School Committee.

5. We further recommend that each pastor resolve to make an earnest effort to attend and bring as large a delegation as possible of Sunday School workers to the Sunday School Convention.

6. Be it resolved that each church strive for a 20% gain in

Sunday School attendance this year, and that they use the plan suggested by the General Church.

7. Be it resolved that each church of the Kansas District seek to establish children's meetings this conference year.

8. Be it resolved that each church on the Kansas District where Young People's Societies are not organized, or who have no services in their behalf, endeavor to organize a chartered Young People's Society (as suggested by our General Church) and where it is impossible to do so, that they strive toward this great goal.

9. We recommend that the District Young People's committee arrange for Youth Conventions to be held throughout the state.

CAMP AND CONFERENCE

1. We recommend that a system of rules and regulations governing our camp and premises be adopted by this conference which shall read as follows:

Whereas the Pilgrim Holiness Camp Grounds at Hutchinson, Kansas, has been established and dedicated for the purpose of that fellowship and ministry that will promote and propagate scriptural holiness, it is expected that those attending shall willingly observe the following—

RULES

1. Smoking on grounds prohibited.
2. The wearing of immodest dress will not be tolerated.
3. No dogs or pets are permitted on camp grounds.
4. Those sleeping in dormitories are expected to be in by 10:45 p. m. unless special permission is obtained from those in authority.
5. Unmarried young ladies shall not be permitted to rent tents, except by special permission and that only if properly chaperoned.
6. Loud talking, rowdyism, or behavior unbecoming a Christian will not be tolerated in the dormitories.
7. It is presumed that those attending the camp have read and are willing to observe the above rules and regulations.
8. Anyone refusing to comply with the above rules and regulations may expect to be asked to leave the camp premises without any refund of registration fee.

2. We further recommend that the above camp rules and regulations be printed on cards for display on camp premises and also that a copy be included in the camp advertisements sent to the churches.

3. We recommend that the first service of camp meeting be conducted on Friday night of the first week and that all pastors make a special effort to come on the day previous to assist in making preparations for the camp.

4. We further recommend that all pastors make a special effort to attend all of camp and conference.

5. Resolved that the District Camp have children's and young people's services; workers to be secured as soon as possible.

6. Resolved that we hold conference at the close of camp.

7. Resolved that each pastor urge his people to bring their musical instruments to camp.

8. Resolved that each church take an offering for dining hall equipment such as silverware and cooking utensils and the money be sent to District Treasurer on or before April 1st. And be it further resolved that the secretary send out notice to this effect not later than ten days prior to the above date.

9. Be it resolved that a pay telephone be installed on Camp Ground for use during the next Camp.

10. Be it resolved that the first Friday night service and the day services of the first Saturday be designated as Y. P. services and during this period the Youth Conference be held—

And be it further resolved that each church endeavor to have as many of their Young People as possible.

11. Inasmuch as the manual requires in section 90, page 68, paragraph 4 in 1950 manual or section 91, page 67, paragraph 4, in the 1946 manual that the ministers' reports be read at the District Conference.

We resolve that one-third of the annual reports be read at each District Conference; the selection being made by lot.

12. Resolved that those attending Sunday morning service of the Camp Meeting be given credit on the Sunday School attendance at home.

13. Resolved that we, as a Pilgrim Holiness Camp, have men and women's prayer bands and that the leaders be appointed by the District Council.

DISTRICT WORK

1. Be it resolved that our district have a ministerial convention—and be it further resolved that a permanent date be set, and the place be centrally located—and the date be set for beginning the first Tuesday in March and the place be set by district council.

2. Be it resolved that the district council appoint an editor and arrange a means of finance for a district publication which would include reports, news, etc., and that the paper be published monthly.

3. Resolved that any pastor who is required to be away from his church on any District, local or general business, receive his salary as usual.

4. Resolved that we, as the Kansas District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, go on record as opposed to members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church being required to violate their religious convictions and the standards of the Church in physical education classes in the public schools.

5. Resolved that the committees be appointed by the council, said committees to be appointed before the adjournment of the conference.

6. Resolved that in the event of death of any of pastors' or evangelists' immediate family, the District Secretary shall be immediately wired and in turn each pastor notified by wire by the District Secretary.

7. Be it resolved that no mortgage be placed upon our District Camp Ground, parsonage and equipment pertaining thereto, without two-thirds vote of this conference.

8. Be it resolved that each church strive for a 10 per cent gain in membership and that each pastor work toward this goal.

EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE

1. We recommend that at each annual camp meeting, on the last Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, there shall be one daily session of the Educational and Examining Boards for the purpose of the examination of licensed ministers. All ministers knowing themselves due to appear before these boards are urged to be present with their recommendations.

We further recommend that the time of each session shall be announced from the platform.

2. We recommend that all ministers working toward ordination consult with the educational board at the close of district conference.

3. We recommend that one-half year's credit on the study

course be granted for each year of seminar work approved. This credit does not apply to the reading course required in the manual.

SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS

In the event that no dormitory is erected on the camp ground during this conference year, we recommend that the district erect at least two cottages or one or two units each to be offered for sale by next camp meeting at cost. Carried.

We recommend that the history of the Kansas District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be included in the district minutes this year. Carried.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 1953

The Sunday School Committee met three times during the past year. Nine Sunday School bulletins were published.

There were five Zone conventions. They were held at the following places: Lakin, Bird City, Topeka, Fredonia, and Hutchinson.

We are glad to report a gain of 84 in average attendance for the district during the past year.

Lamont receives the Certificate this year for the largest gain numerically and in percentage in Sunday School attendance.

Eighteen of the churches made gains during the past year of which we are happy to report.

5. We recommend that our pastors encourage those who feel the call of God to special service, and that the church assist them in their preparation as much as possible.

6. We recommend that our local missionary societies be encouraged to send as many packages of used clothing as possible for distribution to the poor. And that the missionaries be remembered at Christmas and birthdays.

HISTORY OF THE KANSAS DISTRICT OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH

In January of 1906 while the wintry winds were whipping the snow across the prairies of Western Kansas, an old-fashioned revival meeting was in progress in the Methodist Church in Winona, Kansas. The Methodist evangelist was the Rev. R. E. Dunham. Into this revival came a young farmer and his wife. Under the anointed preaching of the Word, the Holy Spirit shot arrows of pungent conviction deep into their hearts. They saw their lost condition and after crying mightily to God for mercy they were wonderfully saved and a few years after sanctified. They have been rejoicing in and working for the Lord ever since. The name of this couple has long been a household word throughout the Pilgrim Holiness Church, a couple loved and respected for their fidelity to God and souls and for their holy living, the Rev. and Mrs. J. J. Cork.

Rev. and Mrs. Cork cast their lot with the "International Apostolic Holiness Union and Churches," a name adopted in 1905 by an organization effected in 1897 as the "Apostolic Holiness Union" in the home of Martin Wells Knapp in Cincinnati, Ohio. However the name "International Apostolic Holiness Union and Churches" was changed in 1913 to "International Apostolic Holiness Church."

In 1908 the Corks left the farm and moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, where Rev. Cork attended God's Bible School, graduating in the spring of 1913. In August of that year, Rev. and Mrs. Cork and Rev. E. G. Marsh went to Keystone, Kansas, some 35 to 40 miles southeast of Rev. Cork's farm near Winona, to hold a revival meeting in a school house. They went out as Abraham of old, led of the Spirit and without any church backing or support, knowing only that there were souls out there that needed their Christ. They traveled in a wagon in which they took a cow for their milk supply, three tents, two in which to sleep and one in which to cook and eat, a stove, cooking utensils, a table, chairs, beds, etc. Somewhere in the midst of all this they stacked Rev. and Mrs. Cork's four children. Then high up on a spring seat rode these missionaries of the Cross. Out of this effort a Church was organized the following year, and later a stone church and a stone parsonage were built.

In 1914 Rev. and Mrs. Cork sponsored a ten-day camp meeting in a tent at Winona. Rev. George B. Kulp was engaged as evangelist. The Church at Winona was organized the next year and a church built. A camp meeting was held there every year after that up to and including 1926, after which Western Kansas and Eastern Kansas were united as a District.

In the fall of 1915 Rev. and Mrs. Cork and Rev. J. E. DeCamp went 55 to 60 miles north of Winona for a meeting in a school house near Bird City. A church was organized after that revival. Later a church and parsonage were built. About this time the Corks purchased a Model T Ford and pastored both the Keystone church and the Bird City church, alternating Sundays. It is interesting to note that 33 years later in the Conference year of 1948 while Rev. and Mrs. Cork were again pastoring the Bird City church, the church and parsonage were moved into town.

On May 15, 1916, the Western Kansas-Eastern Colorado District was organized at a meeting held in the Humboldt, Kansas, church by Rev. Nelson, who was authorized to do so by Rev. George B. Kulp, the general superintendent at that time. The

officers elected were: Rev. J. J. Cork, superintendent; Rev. J. E. DeCamp, assistant; Rev. Mrs. C. F. Berggren, secretary; and Rev. Mrs. J. J. Cork, treasurer. Rev. and Mrs. Cork and Mrs. Berggren held their respective offices continuously until the fall of 1926 when Kansas was made a united district. Since entering the ministry, Rev. Cork has organized 11 churches in the Kansas district.

In Eastern Kansas the Lord was working also. In 1914 the Indiana Conference of the "Holiness Christian Church," believing that the Eastern Kansas-Oklahoma district should be organized into an annual conference, elected Rev. C. C. Brown their general superintendent, to organize the same. Accordingly, a conference was held at the Mt. Pleasant church near Freeport, Kansas, November 13 and 14, 1914, where such an organization was realized. At the ensuing election by an informal ballot the following officers were chosen: Rev. W. J. Webster, presiding elder; Rev. J. Earl Benjamin, conference secretary; and Rev. Thomas Willis, conference treasurer.

The churches in this newly organized district consisted of Osawatomie, El Dorado, Freeport, and Gognac or Black Walnut, in Kansas, and Hillsdale, Pleasant View, Elmdale, and Lone Star, in Oklahoma. In 1915 and 1916 their camp meeting and conference was again held at the Mt. Pleasant church near Freeport. In 1917 at Winfield, Kansas, 1918 at the Pleasant View church near Hopeton, Okla.; in 1919 and 1920 at Freeport again, 1921 at Osawatomie, Kansas, 1922, 1923, 1924, 1925, and 1926 at Fredonia, Kansas. In 1925 a camp ground was purchased in Fredonia, but since Eastern Kansas and Western Kansas were united as a district in the fall of 1926, this camp ground was sold.

In 1919 the "Holiness Christian Church" of which the Eastern Kansas-Oklahoma district was a part, united with the "International Apostolic Holiness Church" of which the Western Kansas-Eastern Colorado district was a part. This union was completed at the General Assembly of the "International Apostolic Holiness Church" held in Cincinnati, Ohio. These united bodies became the "International Holiness Church." Thus, Eastern and Western Kansas became one in church affiliation though separate in district organization. Rev. George B. Kulp, who was superintendent of the "International Apostolic Holiness Church," became the general superintendent of these merged organizations.

At the General Assembly held at Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1922 two other bodies united with the "International Holiness Church." They were the "Pentecostal Rescue Mission" of New York state and the "Pilgrim Church" of California. When this merger took place the word "International" was dropped and the word "Pilgrim" put in its place and we have the "Pilgrim Holiness Church." Rev. W. R. Cox was elected general superintendent.

Consequently in 1922 we have the Eastern Kansas-Oklahoma district of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the Western Kansas-Eastern Colorado district of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. At the General Assembly in 1926 Eastern and Western Kansas were united and made the Kansas District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Rev. Howard J. Beecher was made the district superintendent with Rev. D. R. Close the assistant. Rev. J. Earl Benjamin, who was the assistant over the Eastern Kansas-Oklahoma work, was made the district superintendent over Oklahoma. At the time of this union the churches in Western Kansas consisted of: Keystone, Bird City, Winona, Colby, Johnson, Hansen, Goodland, and Number "35," later known as Plainview, and in the fall of 1945 moved

into Oakley during the pastorate of Rev. George W. Farr. The churches in Eastern Kansas consisted of: Battle Creek, Fall River, Mt. Pleasant, Fredonia, New Albany, Osawatimie, Hutchinson, Severy, Paola, Humboldt, Ross Branch, and Lincoln. However, Lincoln was organized by Rev. J. J. Cork of the Western District.

Hutchinson being centrally located, the district camp meeting and conference were held there in 1927, 1928, and 1929. In 1928 it was voted to buy our present location and the block south of it. This was done, but after the 1929 camp it was allowed to revert to its original owner. Then, like the children of Israel, we started our wandering in the wilderness. We held squatters' rights at the fair ground in Lincoln during 1930, 1931, and 1932.

We journeyed back to our original location in Hutchinson for 1933 and 1934. Then the wanderlust spirit struck again and we took off for Winfield where we encamped in the city park during 1935 and 1936. At this camp we were informed that the land of Canaan lay some 200 miles to the north. After camp some spies were sent out to view the land. They came back with glowing reports. So, for the following eight years 1937-1944 we camped in Chautauqua Park in Beloit, though not on the banks of the Jordan, as we had supposed, but on the banks of the Solomon, a river like the Jordan in that it overflowed its banks, perhaps every year and sometimes several times in a year. Many times this camp ground was flooded just before or soon after camp. We felt that God did especially help us in this respect. As we lay down to sleep at night with the river bank full and with the lightning flashing and the thunders roaring up stream, how easily we could have been engulfed in swirling waters and midnight darkness even as the Egyptians of old in the Red Sea, except for the hand of our God. Thus, we were made to realize that truly here we had no continuing city or camp ground but we sought one to come—and—we found it.

Our search came to an end during the camp in Beloit in 1943. There we were urged into action by our District Superintendent, Rev. Howard K. Busby, and our present camp site in Hutchinson was purchased for \$1800.00 and the money raised to pay for it. In the spring of 1944 at the close of the Ministerial Convention in Hutchinson the trees were planted that we are enjoying today. The summer of 1944 marked our last camp at Beloit. And, though treated with all possible kindness by the city officials, yet we were glad to get away from a place that was so wet that even our District Superintendent worked barefooted in setting up tents for camp. Had we had a theme song, it probably would have been:

On Solomon's stormy banks we stand
And cast a wistful eye—
To Hutchinson's fair and happy land
Where our possessions lie.

In the spring of 1945, Rev. Busby, the District Superintendent, called the ministers together, and anyone else that could come, for our first "work week," an expression that became a very familiar phrase throughout Kansas during the next several years. The dining room and rest rooms were built that spring, and that year we had our first camp meeting here on our own ground in a 40 by 80 tent erected over a cement floor. It was at that camp that Rev. Busby raised \$7,000.00 with which to build the tabernacle. In the spring of 1946 during some more "work weeks" the tabernacle was built. The quarter of a block of ground upon which the parsonage stands, was procured through the foresight and

mostly paid for by the sacrifice of two men during the camp in 1945. In 1947 work was begun on the parsonage. It was completed and moved into in 1949. In 1950 the garage was built and sidewalks added. Before camp in 1953 the tabernacle was enclosed and permanent wiring installed. Rev. M. L. Pottenger was the architect and construction foreman for these buildings and Rev. A. I. Wise, the electrician.

Those serving as District Superintendent and the years of service are: Rev. J. J. Cork, ten consecutive conference years over the Western District, 1916 to 1926. Rev. W. J. Webster, six years over the Eastern District, 1914, 1915, 1916, 1919, 1920, and 1922. Rev. J. Earl Benjamin, two years, 1917 and 1918, in the Eastern District. Rev. Thomas Willis served four years in the Eastern District, 1921, 1923, 1924, and 1925. He passed away May 23, 1926, while still in office. Rev. Howard J. Beecher, the assistant, served until the Conference in August when he was elected District Superintendent and served six years, 1926, 1927, 1928, 1929, 1936, and 1937, one year of which was over Eastern Kansas and five over the united Kansas District. Rev. L. L. Waddell served six consecutive years, 1930 to 1935, inclusive. Rev. Howard K. Busby served 11 consecutive years, 1938 to the conference of 1949. Rev. Wayne R. Plummer served two years, 1949 and 1950. Rev. Abraham I. Wise served two years, 1951 and 1952. At the Conference in 1953 Rev. Howard K. Busby was again elected District Superintendent.

It is worthy of notice that we have with us today (1953) in the Kansas District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church four members who participated in that organizational meeting for Western Kansas which was held thirty-seven years ago last May 15th. They are: Rev. and Mrs. J. J. Cork and Brother and Sister Clarence F. Berggren. We have likewise, two members who helped to organize the Eastern Kansas District thirty-nine years ago the 13th of this month (August). They are the Rev. and Mrs. J. E. Isgrigg. For length of service, Rev. J. H. Fortner and Rev. H. K. Busby deserve special mention as having served twenty years each as a councilman in the Kansas District.

Then there are others, many others, who should be mentioned; pastors, evangelists, missionaries, who have toiled and preached and prayed. Some have served for a mere pittance—made tents, as it were, for a livelihood—that the gospel might be proclaimed. These soldiers of the cross with their sacrificing wives and families have all contributed toward the work of the Pilgrim Holiness Church in Kansas. In fact, without them, there would be no district about which to write a history. But worthy though they be, yet their names are not recorded here.

Again there is the laity—those stalwart souls—foundation material, upon which to build. How they have stood as the Rock of Gibraltar throughout the years, as a city set on a hill that cannot be hid. They are in church every Sunday, their tithes and offerings in, and their faces shining with the blessings of God. Neither do their names appear here.

How we'd like to write down all these worthies—name after name. But our ledger is too small. I am glad, though, that God has a big book in which He has all their names inscribed and a perfect record kept. And I am fully persuaded that their names will be emblazoned in letters of celestial glory in that Great Day when God reveals the history that He has written of the Kansas District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
