Proceedings

The Thirty-Fourth Annual Conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 8:00 A. M. on Thursday, July 29, 1943, in the Tabernacle on the Camp Ground, with District Superintendent Rev. L. S. Houston in charge.

The session opened by singing "My Faith Looks Up To Thee" and "My Jesus, I Love Thee". We were led in prayer by Rev. C. F. Shields. Then Rev. S. M. Stikeleather brought a helpful and instructive message from Luke 14:5-24, using for a subject "Excuse Makers", emphasizing the truth that God has a work for us all and we should not try to excuse ourselves from doing it. Adjourned for breakfast. Dismissed by prayer.

THURSDAY, 10:00 A. M.

The second sitting opened by all standing and singing "Amazing Grace". Bro. Shields then led us to the throne of grace in prayer. Our District Superintendent then asked us to continue to pray for those who are sick. He then introduced Rev. R. G. Flexon, First Assistant General Superintendent, who is also our Camp Evangelist, to the Conference, who then took the chair. After a few words of exhortation, the roll of ministers and delegates was called. Mrs. Nancy Wesler was seated as delegate for Covington First Church, also Mrs. S. M. Stikeleather was seated as delegate for Kingswood instead of Mrs. L. E. Stewart. The Conference bar was then fixed, which was the first six rows of seats across the Tabernacle including the platform.

A motion carried that we seat all local preachers who are active as pastors or evangelists within the Conference bar.

The District Superintendent then presented two new churches to the Conference with their pastors and delegates. They were Greenup, and Tyrone. These were accepted by the Conference and seated within the bar.

The time of the sittings was then decided upon, which was to be the same as last year.

Transfers of ministers from other districts were then read. There were nine names which were all accepted.

Motion prevailed that the District Superintendent read his report. It was accepted by a hearty Amen. The Assistant Superintendent then gave a verbal report of his activities of the year.

Report from the Ways and Means Committee:

Recommendation that No. 1 be changed to read "two" instead of "three" was lost.

Recommendation that No. 10a be deleted carried.

Recommendation that each church provide a quilt for the Camp take its place. This was amended to include a sheet also. This carried as amended.

Recommendation that No. 13 be changed to read "food" instead of "sweets" carried.

Recommendation that the last part of No. 19 be deleted and the words "for the duration" be added to the first part. Carried.

Recommendation to delete Nos. 25 and 27 carried.

Recommendation carried that we form a District Home Missionary Committee.

Motion to send a wire of sympathy to Sister Willa Perkins due to the death of her husband carried.

Moved and seconded that at the sitting tomorrow at 10:00 A. M. we have our election of officers. Carried.

Motion to rescind former motion relative to the Conference bar and make it eight seats across the Tabernacle instead of six carried.

Motion prevailed to recess until next sitting at 1:30 P. M.

THURSDAY, 1:30 P. M.

The third sitting of the Conference was called to order by singing "Close to Thee". Led in prayer by Rev. J. W. Smack. Rev. C. F. Shields read a Scripture lesson from Phil. 2:1-11.

Report of the Ways and Means Committee:

Recommendation to have a District Home Missionary Representative to visit the churches in the interest of Home Missions carried. Recommendation to change Section (a) of No. 14 to a percentage basis carried.

Recommendation to change No. 16 to read "20 cents" instead of "10 cents" carried.

Recommendation that all monies be turned over to the local church treasurer at the end of each month and the church treasurer pay all the bills carried.

Recommendation to delete Nos. 19 and 20 carried.

Recommendation to change No. 8 to read "annually" instead of "quarterly" was lost.

Report of the Condolence Committee was read and accepted.

Report of the Auditing Committee was read and accepted.

The Reception Committee presented the following to the Conference: Bro. Pearl Byrge from McAndrews, Ky.; Bro. and Sr. Jack Beavers, and Sr. Nancy Wesler, and Sr. Chas. Sipple and children all from Covington, Kentucky; Sr. Lulu Bowles from Lexington, Sr. Georgia Tomey from Indiana, Sr. Lon Huffman and Sr. Norman Huffman from Pikeville, Sr. Minerva Godbey from Denton, Kentucky; Sr. Mary Lou Proffitt from Elizabethtown, Kentucky, Sr. Devore, Bro. S. M. Stikeleather from Kingswood; Bro. and Sr. Edgar Hullett from Van Lear, Kentucky; Sr. Carr from Tyronne, Kentucky; Bro. and Sr. Beard from Latonia; Bro. L. E. Stewart from Kingswood. Bro. Hansel Wright from Carrollton, Ky.; Sr. June Swinford from Olive Hill, Kentucky; Bro. and Sr. Rook from Owensboro, Ken-

tucky; Bro. William Miller from Dayton, Kentucky; Bro. Brown Holland and Sr. R. G. Flexon from Pennsylvania. These were all welcomed by a cheery Amen.

Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

A call for a special song was responded to by Bro. Vernon Reynolds, our blind evangelist, which was enjoyed by all. God bless Brother Reynolds.

Rev. L. S. Houston, District Superintendent, brought the matter of the Ministerial Benefit Association before the Conference. Some expressed their desire to join the Association. Later several signed up.

Adjourned until tomorrow at 8:00 o'clock.

FRIDAY A. M., 8:00

The service opened by singing, "Whosoever Meaneth Me". Led in prayer by Bro. F. M. Singleton. Bro. Flexon then brought a message on the subject of "Good Organization" with seven major thoughts, giving some very helpful and interesting thoughts for the work of the Lord: 1. Well defined administration. 2. Well defined objectives. 3. Preach neglected truth. Holiness is a neglected truth in many places, but it is the doctrine of our Church. 4. A uniformity of standards. 5. Formation of character. 6. Proper co-ordination of all departments of the Church. 7. A proper leadership.

FRIDAY, 10:00 A. M.

The fifth sitting was called to order by singing "Close to Thee" and "Amazing Grace". We were led in prayer by Bro. Tromble and Bro. C. F. Shields. Roll call of ministers and delegates were read. The order of the day being the election of officers, but that was set aside until the matter of receiving Sr. Mildred Hullett a licensed deaconess by transfer was taken care of. She was received unanimously. Motion also prevailed that we grant those who are recommended for District license from the local license group a vote in the Conference.

We then proceeded with the order of the day, the election of officers. The District Superintendent appointed the Tellers as follows: Bros. Smack, May, Thomas, Mayle, Tromble and Wilcox. Before ballots were cast the Conference bowed in prayer to ask the blessing of the Lord upon us in the election. Ballot was then cast for District Superintendent which resulted in the re-election of Rev. L. S. Houston. Ballots were then cast for an Assistant District Superintendent which resulted in no election. Motion prevailed that we vote for the two receiving the highest number of votes, which resulted in the election of Rev. F. M. Singleton. Rev. C. L. Oden was re-elected on the first ballot to the office of District Secretary. The District Council presented the names of Rev. Ralph Tromble, Rev. J. A. Thomas and Rev. E. E. Leadingham for District Treasurer. First ballot declared Bro. Tromble elected. Ballots were cast for three Advisory Members of the District Council. A motion prevailed to extend the time to complete the election. Counting of the votes cast resulted in the election of Bros. C. E. Johnson and F. W. May. Ballots were again cast for the two receiving the next highest number of votes. This resulted in the election of Bro. G. J. Tackett. Motion prevailed to set aside the rules and re-elect Bro. F. M. Singleton by acclamation for a period of three years as

District Trustee. The Council presented the names of Bro. P. O. Carpenter and Bro. F. M. Singleton for a member on the Examining Board. The first ballot declared Bro. Singleton elected. The Council presented the names of Bros. Oden and Stikeleather for a member on the Educational Board. Ballots declared Bro. Oden elected.

Adjourned by prayer by Bro. Singleton.

FRIDAY, 2:00 P. M.

The sixth sitting was called to order by singing "Pass Me Not, O Gentle Saviour" and "Precious Name". We were led in prayer by Bro. S. S. Hullett. Bro. E. E. Leadingham read the Scriptures from Acts 2:41-47 speaking a few minutes on the "Early Church", to the edifying of all who heard. The minutes of the morning sitting were read and approved as corrected. Motion carried to dispense with the reading of the roll.

The question of a place for the Ministerial Convention was brought before the Conference. Motion prevailed that this be delegated to the District Council.

The roll of ministers was read to get the number of subscriptions to the Advocate. Four hundred and ninety-two were pledged.

Two more recommendations from the Ways and Means Committee were adopted.

Report of Resolutions Committee:

Resolution to change No. 46 to read 25 cents instead of 20 cents was adopted.

Resolution regarding Licentiates and their reports was lost.

Resolution that the Council see about more shade trees was referred back to the Committee.

Resolution to change No. 47 was passed.

Resolution that pastors have two weeks vacation with pay was adopted.

The District Superintendent read the appointment of various committees.

Report from the Educational and Examining Boards of renewal and granting of license was read and received.

A motion to leave all unfinished business in the hands of the District Council carried.

The Conference stood and was dismissed with prayer by Bro. Flexon.

RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make at least three trips over the District during the year.
2. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be consulted and present if possible when drawing up all deeds in the District.
3. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a Statistician for the next year.
4. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be a member of our Zone Bible School Board.

Council

5. Resolved: That the date of our Camp and Conference be left in the hands of the District Council.
6. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plans.
7. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Convention and said date to be recorded in the Minutes.
8. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years of their existence, or until said Council shall decide to do otherwise.
9. Resolved: That we, as a Conference, delegate to the Council power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots and the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp ground; same to be printed in the Minutes.
10. Resolved: That the District Council make provisions for the planting of more trees on the Camp Grounds.

Church

11. Resolved: That each church supply the Camp with two each of the following: cups, plates, glasses, large spoons, cereal dishes, and one pitcher.
- (11a). Resolved: That each church provide this Conference with one quilt and one sheet, same to be collected by the District Superintendent at the Annual Meeting.
12. Resolved: That each church close their books on the last day of each month, and that the reports be sent to the District Treasurer immediately.
13. Resolved: That each church, preacher, and deaconess send a copy of their reports to the Statistician not later than five days after the Conference year closes, which is the 30th of June; and that the Statistician disregard any and all reports that shall be received thereafter. Be it also resolved that the District Treasurer's books close at noon on the 10th day of July.

14. Resolved: That each church send ten quarts of food to the Camp.
15. Resolved: Whereas, many of our pastors have not received sufficient financial support, it is resolved that each local church appoint one prayer meeting night each month as "Donation Night", at which time food-stuffs and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved that an agitator for the coming year be appointed by the Superintendent at the Annual Business Meeting.
16. Resolved: Since it is a matter of importance for the pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, be it therefore resolved, that the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor, shall continue over the two Sundays he attends said Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.
17. Resolved: That each church provide a cottage on the Camp grounds for their pastor, and that other members of the District be urged to build for their personal need.
18. Resolved: Whereas, the times in which we are living are perilous, and the needs of the District, both financially and spiritually, are so great, therefore, be it resolved that we set aside the first day of each month for fasting and prayer.
19. Resolved: That the pastor and wife and delegate of the church having their District and General Budgets paid in full will be admitted to the Camp and Conference free.
20. Resolved: That each church do something toward recognizing "The Boys" from their community that are in the armed forces of the United States for the duration.
21. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of securing tithes and offerings.

Sunday School

22. Resolved: That each of our Sunday Schools correctly enroll each class, said enrollment to be revised quarterly.
23. Resolved: That each Zone have a Sunday School Attendance Banner to be given quarterly to the Sunday School having the largest attendance; also an offering Banner to be given to the Sunday School having the largest offerings.
24. Resolved: That we provide a Sunday School Convention to be held during the Annual Ministerial Convention, and that this be the order of the first day. We further recommend that the Superintendent or a representative of each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in Sunday School meetings in the local church.

Young People

25. Resolved: That we shall have a District Young People's Convention beginning on Thursday before the Camp, at 7:30 P. M. The day services on Friday and Saturday to be devoted to Young People's work. Be it further resolved, that the District Council appoint a president in each zone, who shall create interest about our young people, and conduct zone

rallies and who shall work directly under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the Young People's Executive Secretary.

Zones

26. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in our Minutes.

District Home Missions

27. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory Members to be chosen from the ordained ministers by the Council.

Credentials

28. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; and in that case some member of the Conference certify to his or her character and location.

29. Resolved: That those pursuing the Study Course send for their Home Study Course early in the year, forwarding with their request 25 cents to cover the cost of questions and postage for each subject.

30. Resolved: That each pastor read all Resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible convenience.

31. Resolved: That each pastor of our District make a special effort to place a current Manual in the home of each member of our Church.

32. Resolved: That each local church board or pastor calling an evangelist outside the District, or from another church, consult the District Superintendent.

33. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each "Advocate" subscriber, with the date of expiration, said book to be transferred to the following pastor.

34. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church board and the District Superintendent, and that no pastor hold a revival away from his church within thirty days after a revival in his own church; then not more than two revivals during the Conference year, provided said church is supporting him.

35. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Condolence Committee immediately following the funeral.

36. Resolved: That every active pastor be given two weeks vacation a year with pay.

Ministers

37. Resolved: That each minister who has not been supporting financially the local church to which he belongs, do so this year.

38. Resolved: That each minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance, to the District Council.

Conference

39. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without its permission.

40. Resolved: That no church elect a delegate to our District Conference who will not agree to stay through the entire Conference. (Manual, Sec. 82, Par. 2.)

41. Resolved: "That the Conference convene on Thursday of the last week of Camp.

Camp

42. Resolved: That we register all who come to Camp, assigning work to each one, as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, which is to be presented at the dining room door.

43. Resolved: That the District Superintendent and wife be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved that our District Superintendent and wife and called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

44. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:

a. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who shall come to Camp shall abide by its rules.

b. Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 10:00 P. M.

c. A dean shall be appointed over each dormitory when necessary.

d. No single young people shall be allowed off the ground after 7:00 P. M.

e. No article shall be taken from the dining room or kitchen without permission from the one in charge, and any article shall be returned in good condition.

f. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

g. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the Camp Grounds.

h. A supervisor shall be appointed for the kitchen and dining room workers, for the parking of cars, for the care of the tent and tabernacle, and for the cleaning of the Camp Ground; these to be appointed by the Camp Meeting Committee.

45. Resolved: That all preachers give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing our Camp Ground, or in preparation for the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

46. Resolved: That the District furnish bedding for the Camp Evangelist and workers' cottages.

Minutes

47. Resolved: That we have 600 copies of the District Minutes printed, said Minutes to sell for 25 cents per copy.

48. Resolved: That the Condolence Committee confine their report to the Ministerial body.

49. Resolved: That this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to our First Assistant General Superintendent and Camp Evangelist, Rev. R. G. Flexon; General Home Missionary Representative, Rev. E. O. Howell; Foreign Missionary Representative Rev. W. F. Drown; Visiting Missionary, Rev. Miss Leanna Stewart; Beulah Redemption Home Representative, Rev. Miss Carrie Gick; our District Superintendent, Rev. L. S. Houston; and to our District Officials; our efficient cooks; our laboring help, donors, those providing the Public Address System, and to all those who have served so faithfully to make this Camp Meeting a blessing.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School of our District pay 10 cents per week for a Tent Fund. We further recommend that each Sunday School adopt the Birthday Offering plan, said offerings to go toward the Tent and Home Missionary Fund.

2. We recommend: That each church pay not less than \$5.00 on the expenses of the pastor and delegate to the District Conference, this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the Annual Meeting. We further recommend: That the amount raised be equally divided, providing the pastor and delegate do not go to the Conference together.

3. We recommend: That each church take a free-will offering for the District Superintendent on his regular visits, same to be sent in by the local treasurer as District Budget.

4. Inasmuch as this State is included in the Frankfort Pilgrim School Zone, we, therefore, strongly recommend that our people patronize our own Bible School.

5. Whereas there is a pressing need for funds to erect buildings to house our people, we recommend that we, as a Conference, make strenuous efforts this year to raise such funds; the same to be used at the discretion of the District Council.

6. We recommend: That we adopt the system of raising Foreign Missionary money requested by the General Church Board as follows: That each church have a weekly prayer service and that a Missionary Rally be held monthly on the Lord's Day, and at this service an offering be taken for Foreign Missions, same to be forwarded to the District Treasurer.

7. We recommend: That all active pastors and evangelists pay to the District three-fourths of their ministerial tithes and one-half of their tithes from secular labor. All other licensed and ordained ministers to be assessed \$12.00 per year same to be paid monthly. Failure to do this will call for the action of the District Council.

8. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to each local church quarterly statements showing amounts due in each department. We further recommend: That quarterly statements be sent to each minister, showing amount due on assessment.

9. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid \$150.00 per year, and the District Secretary be paid \$75.00, same to be in equal monthly payments.

10. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be \$1,800.00 per year, and that he be granted two weeks vacation with pay; and that we pay \$30.00 per month of his rent; also that he be paid three cents per mile for traveling expenses.

11. We recommend: That the Assistant Superintendent be allowed fifty cents per meal for meals bought while working in District work.

12. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastors a salary at least equal to the average wage of the working people of the church, and that this be taken care of at the first visit of the Superintendent.

13. We recommend: That the District Treasurer prepare a chart for the Conference, listing all the churches, giving honorable mention to the churches paying the most according to their membership.

14. We recommend: That we adhere to the ruling of the Manual,

Section 133, paragraph 12, in regard to General Funds. "To set a yearly budget of expense of not more than \$3.00 per member for the General Church both at home and abroad; namely, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and Administrative Expense. The General Conference of 1942 instructed the General Board to make division of such General Church funds as follows: 63 1-3 per cent for Foreign Missions, 20 per cent for Home Missions, and 16 2-3 per cent for General Administrative Expense". The action of the General Board: "Be it resolved: That when a local church raises its General Budget allotments monthly, such church shall be granted the privilege of specifying surplus funds. In the event the local church treasurer does not allot General Budget Funds according to the Manual, Section 133, paragraph 12, that the General Board authorize the District Treasurer to make the proper allotment."

15. We recommend: That District Budget, Camp Budget, Home Missions, Bible School and General Conference Expense be combined under the head of District Budget. We further recommend: That 50 per cent of the District Budget go to the Sinking Fund, which shall be a preferred claim, 15 per cent to Home Missions, 20 per cent to Camp Budget, 10 per cent to General Conference Expense and 5 per cent to Bible School.

16. We recommend: That each church send in to the District Treasurer the sum equivalent to 20 cents per member for the Camp Evangelist offering.

17. We recommend: That each church be requested to raise for District Budget at least the amount equivalent to \$3.00 per member of voting age reported to the Conference. Also that a chart appear in the Minutes stating the amount that each church will be expected to raise by the month according to the amount assessed.

18. We recommend: That we form a Camp Meeting Association, the purpose of which shall be to promote the Camp. That each member of the Association shall pay at least \$1.00 per year. (This to be a standing pledge from year to year). The Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer shall notify each member at least thirty days before Camp.

19. We recommend: That the District Council appoint a representative to visit each church in the interest of District Home Missions and take an offering to be applied on District Home Missions.

20. Be it resolved: That all monies be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all bills.

21. We recommend: That the District Council be empowered to purchase a parsonage for the District Superintendent. The same to be bought so the payments will not exceed \$40.00 per month.

District Superintendent's Report

To the Thirty-fourth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Kentucky District, now in session, greetings in Christ's dear Name.

As we come into His presence today we are very conscious of two things: First, that another year is history, the other, that God has been graciously near us during that time. In spite of the conditions existing, many of them due to the war which have meant many burdens, we have never felt nearer to the Lord, neither have we ever felt more like loving Him, serving Him, and giving ourselves unreservedly to Him and the Church, which He loved and gave Himself for. The year just past has been a very difficult one. Gas, tire, and food rationing together with my hospital experience have all had their part in limiting the activities of the Superintendent. Yet, through it all we have been able, God helping us to keep prayer up, paid up, and ready to go up.

God has given us a number of gracious revivals over the District during the year. Three of our churches have liquidated their indebtedness and a number of others have almost done so.

The Ashland First Church has done considerable remodeling, such as a new roof, Sunday School rooms, and is beginning to plaster the interior of the church next week; Ashland Second has purchased a parking lot and built steps and walk to the church. It has also made other improvements; Central City has built new pews and laid a new floor; Covington First has purchased a parsonage, made some improvements, and installed a large church sign with lights; Elizabethtown has purchased seats for the auditorium, painted the exterior and interior, also papered the parsonage with other improvements; Erlanger has purchased lovely pews and painted the interior; Frankfort has painted the interior and exterior of the church and parsonage; Fullerton has enlarged its possibilities for progress by moving to a more desirable location; Garvin Hill has drilled a well, built a large porch to the parsonage, and is now building new pews; Hitchins has sold their old parsonage and purchased property next door to the church which is much more desirable; Kingswood has approximately \$400.00 subscribed for the building of a new parsonage; Latonia has remodeled the Sunday School rooms and redecored the church. It has also has a marked increase of forty-five per cent in Sunday School over last year; Louisville has painted the parsonage with other improvements; Maysville has sold the old parsonage and purchased one that is modern and next door to the church; McAndrews has bought and papered a parsonage. It is one of the churches which has liquidated its debt; Olive Hill has liquidated the church debt, and had a lot donated for a new parsonage; Rush has purchased a parsonage and made some improvements; Soldier has purchased a parsonage also installed new lights in the church; Toler has painted the exterior of the church; and Tyrone has done some improving. It is also contemplating buying a parsonage soon.

The Lord has given us one new work in Pikeville and we have purchased a large eight-room house containing 13,500 feet of lumber in splendid condition. It has been torn down and moved to Pikeville ready to build

when a lot is available. We are building our new pews at this time. We have also built six new cabins on the Camp Ground.

We have conducted two revival meetings and assisted in another. We have preached 214 times with 110 souls seeking God. We have conducted 76 business meetings, 39 annual meetings, one ministerial convention, attended 1 General Board meeting and 2 School Board Meetings. We have dedicated seven children, participated in 11 communion services, prayed with 34 for healing, made 321 calls, given out 2,500 tracts and religious papers, secured 14 Advocate subscriptions, spent three weeks on the Camp Ground, traveled 18,966 miles, received our salary in full, traveling expenses to the amount of \$569.00, \$217.00 for revivals, \$230.00 love offering from the District for our operation for which we are very thankful, and approximately \$45.00 in donation tithe from the pastors.

We deeply appreciate our Council, pastors, evangelists, and everyone whom it has been our privilege to labor with this year.

In spite of the war clouds hanging low and the powers of satan loosed on every hand, we are determined to keep looking up and unto the hills from whence cometh our help. We are anticipating better days ahead for the Kentucky District.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING OF COTTAGES

Price of lots \$10.00 each. Terms: \$100 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each.

Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for within six months or contract is void.

All outside lots shall be in dimension, 20 feet front and 30 feet in length. Inside lots size 20 by 20. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10 by 12 feet, with and 8-ft. eave, six concrete piers, one door and two or more windows, a screen door, and either metal or asphalt roof. This made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of 9 ft. may be built to cabins on the outside lots, said additions to be same dimensions as cabin, with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages.
