CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

The Thirty-Sixth Annual Conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened on the camp grounds at 8:00 a. m. Monday, August 6, 1945, in the tabernacle on the camp grounds, with the District Superintendent, Rev. L. S. Houston, in charge.

The session opened by singing "The Blood Will Never Lose Its Power" and "Marching To Zion". We were led to the Throne of Grace in prayer by Bro. W. E. Lowery. The District Superintendent then presented Rev. W. L. Surbrook, General Superintendent, who gave a timely message from I Timothy 4:2-16. His subject was "Watchful Warnings For Ministers". He emphasized the minister's worship and his work. We were dismissed at 9:00 o'clock for breakfast, after an agreement to reconvene at 10:00 o'clock.

MONDAY, 10:00 A. M.

The second sitting opened at 10:00 o'clock by singing "The Unsearchable Riches of Christ". Led in prayer by Bro. Ralph Tromble, the Roll of Ministers and Delegates was read. Some vacancies among the delegates were filled by the Conference. The bar being the first eight seats including the platform was cleared. Hours for sittings were then set, being 8:00 - 9:00 a. m.; 10:00 to 4:00: 7:30 to 10:00 p. m.

A motion prevailed that all standing rules be printed on the first page of the minutes.

The District Superintendent's report was read, which was received by a hearty "Amen."

The District Superintendent gave a brief report of the two new churches organized this year and made a motion that they be accepted into the Conference. The representatives of these churches were presented with the pastors. Rev. Leonard Fleming, pastor of the Pleasureville Church, and since there was no delegation from the Turkey Creek Church present, Rev. W. M. Marksberry, who was instrumental in the opening of the church, was asked to represent the church. They were received and welcomed into the Conference by a cheery "Amen."

The Statistician's report was read and after some discussion regarding the valuation of parsonages the report was received.

The Auditors' Report was read and accepted.

The District Treasurer's Report was read and received.

An oral report was given by the Assistant Superintendent, which was received by a cheery "Amen."

The names of Thomas Shirk, Rufus Gleason, Earl Dulaney, W. W. Hanks, Mrs. W. W. Hanks, Richard Beeks, Clay McCain, Wayne Hill, Kermit Phillips and Malcolm C. Glass were presented to the Conference as ministers coming to this Conference. They were introduced by the District Superintendent and received by a cheery "Amen."

Motion carried that the Council bring to the Conference the names of local preachers who are pastoring to allow them a seat within the bar.

Report from the Ways and Means Committee was heard.

Recommendations No. 1 and 2 were adopted.

Recommendation No. 3, which was to delete No. 22 in old Minutes, carried.

Recommendation No. 4 was referred back to the Committee for redrafting.

Recommendations No. 5 and 6 were adopted.

Report from the Resolutions Committee was read:

Resolution No. 1 was referred back to the Committee.

Resolution No. 2 was received.

Resolution No. 3 was referred back to the Committee.

Resolution No. 4 was amended to read "that the Conference be on Thursday and Friday of the last week of camp. Carried as amended.

Resolutions No. 5 and 6 were adopted.

Resolution No. 7 was referred back to the Committee.

Resolution No. 8 was adopted.

Recessed until 2:00 p. m.

MONDAY, 2:00 P. M.

The Conference reconvened at 2:00 o'clock by singing "He Leadeth Me". Rev. C. E. Johnson led the Conference in prayer.

The report of the Condoence Committee was read and received.

Motion carried that Rev. Sam Adams, a local preacher who is pastoring our work at Cynthiana be granted a seat within the bar.

A partial report from the Examining Board was read and accepted.

A resolution from the Committee on Resolutions was read and as it was considered to be a problem for the General Conference to care for, a motion prevailed that this be referred to the Committee on Memorials to General Conference.

A motion to proceed with the election of officers prevailed.

The Superintendent appointed the tellers. Before the ballots were cast all knelt before the Lord in prayer to seek His anointing on us in voting.

Ballots were then cast for District Superintendent, which resulted in the reelection by a large majority of Rev. L. S. Houston.

Ballots were cast for Assistant Superintendent, which resulted in the reelection of Rev. F. M. Singleton by a good majority.

Ballots cast for District Secretary resulted in the reelection of Rev. C. L. Oden.

The District Council presented the names of Rev. Ralph Tromble and Rev. J. W. Smack for District Treasurer. Ballots were cast which resulted in the reelection of Bro. Tromble.

It was agreed to vote for the three Advisory Members of the Council on one ballot, and when ballots were counted the count revealed the three old members reelected, namely: Rev. C. E. Johnson, G. J. Tackett and F. W. May.

Motion carried that the District Council take care of the matter of appointing the District Trustees.

The Council presented the names of Rev. E. E. Leadingham and Rev. W. E. Lowery as nominees for the vacancy on the Examining Board. Ballots were cast which resulted in the election of Rev. E. E. Leadingham.

The Council presented the names of Rev. F. W. May and Rev. W. L. Robinson as nominees for the vacancy on the Educational Board. The count of the ballots revealed the reelection of Bro. May.

The General Superintendent explained to the Conference the qualifications of ministerial delegates to General Conference, also the ratio of lay delegates to elect. Motion carried to have the Council check the Ordained Ministers' list and bring the names of eligibles and also to bring the names of nine laymen to the Conference from which we can elect delegates.

A motion to recess until 5:00 o'clock carried.

MONDAY, 5:00 P. M.

The Conference reconvened at 5:00 o'clock.

The list of Ordained Ministers who are eligible to be delegates to the General Conference was read. The District is entitled to six Ministerial Delegates and three Lay Delegates. It was agreed to vote on all six Ministerial Delegates at once. Ballots were cast. It was moved and carried that the District Superintendent appoint two groups of three each to count the ballots while the Conference proceeded with the election of the Lay Delegates.

The Council presented the names of nine laymen from which to elect the delegates. Ballots were cast. Motion prevailed to have the Superintendent appoint three persons to count these ballots.

The list of Candidates for Ordination was read and accepted by the Conference.

The Resolutions Committee again reported:

The first resolution presented was adopted. The second and third resolutions were adopted.

Rev. E. E. Leadingham was called upon to present the proposed retirement fund sponsored by the General Board. He presented the plan as given on the circular. Questions were asked and explained. Motion carried that we go on record as a District as being 100 per cent back of this proposal.

Report of the count of ballots for Ministerial Delegates to General Conference revealed the election of Rev. C. C. Mayle, Rev. E. W. May and Rev. J. W. Smack. Motion made and seconded that we select the six highest and elect three of that number, with the other three being alternates according to the plurality of their votes. Carried. They were Rev. G. J. Tackett, Rev. H. H. Barber, Rev. P. O. Carpenter, Rev. W. L. Robinson, Rev. J. A. Thomas and Rev. W. E. Lowery. The ballots were then cast. Motion carried to have three persons count these ballots.

Report of ballots for Lay Delegates revealed one election, that of Miss Opal Venters. A motion carried that four names receiving the highest vote be again voted on, the two names receiving the highest vote be delegates, and the next two be alternates. Also the other five be alternates according to the plurality on first ballots cast.

Ballots were cast and three were appointed to count them.

The District Superintendent appointed the Committees for another year. Motion carried that we leave the matter of the Ministerial Convention in the hands of the District Council and in case we can have the Convention, they shall send out notices of time and place.

A report of the count of the ballots for the Ministerial Delegates to General Conference revealed that Rev. H. H. Barber, Rev. J. G. Tackett and Rev. J. A. Thomas were elected as the other delegates, with Rev. P. O. Carpenter, Rev. W. E. Lowery and Rev. W. L. Robinson as alternates.

Report of ballots for Lay Delegates revealed Mrs. C. C. Mayle and Miss Jenny V. Vincent as the other two delegates, and Mr. H. D. Wright.

Mr. B. E. Stewart, Mrs. S. M. Stikeleather, Mr. Wallace Ratliff, and Miss Lillian Kerrick as alternates.

The Conference was dismissed in prayer by Rev. Ralph Tromble.

MONDAY 8:00 P. M.

The Conference was called to order in the Tabernacle for the Ordination service. Rev. C. E. Johnson led the congregation in singing, "A Charge To Keep I Have". Rev. C. L. Oden led in prayer. Scripture passages appropriate to the occasion were read in turn by Revs. Ralph Trombie, F. M. Singleton and L. S. Houston. Rev. Surbrook then gave a stirring address to the candidates, charging them to be true to their calling and reminding them that the minisry is a calling from God. Eight candidates then knelt at the altar and by the laying on of hands were duly ordained to the Gospel ministry.

A report from the Ways and Means Committee was heard:

Recommendations 1, 2 and 3 were adopted as read.

No. 4, which had been referred back to the Committee regarding churches calling the Superintendent was presented to take the place of No. 3 in the Minutes. After some discussion it was adopted.

Examining Board gave another partial report, which was accepted and the remainder was referred to the Council to pass on.

Report of Committee on General Conference Memorials was read: They presented three memorials which were all adopted as read.

The District Superintendent presented and introduced the ministers of the District who are active in evangelistic work, requesting the churches to keep them busy.

The District Superintendent then presented the Ministerial Benefit Association. Several ministers took application blanks to become members of this organization.

Motion made and seconded that we rescind the action of the Conference in a former sitting, regarding the date of the Conference being during the camp meeting. Motion was lost.

Moved and carried that the Council approve the Minutes of the Conference.

A motion prevailed that Sister Wayne Hill and daughter sing a number just before the benediction.

A motion carried that the Council take care of any unfinished business.

Sister Hill and daughter sang beautifully, to the edification of all.

The Superintendent then asked that we take a love offering for the General Superintendent out of gratitude for his untiring services rendered during the Conference. This was done by a march and hand shake.

The 1945 Conference thus closed with all feeling that God had been gracious to us and we owe him a debt of gratitude we can never pay, also praying that He may make it possible in these days of unrest and growing hatred toward the ministry for us to make greater gains this year and if Jesus tarries we be permitted to meet again next year.

RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make at least three trips over the District during the year.
2. Resolved That the District Superintendent be consulted and present if possible when drawing up all deeds in the District.
3. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a Statistician for the next year.

4. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be a member of our Zone Bible School Board.

Council

5. Resolved: That the date of our Camp and Conference be left in the hands of the District Council.

6. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plans.

7. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Convention and said date to be recorded in the Minutes.

8. Resolved: That the District appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years of their existence, or until said Council shall decide to do otherwise.

9. Resolved: That we, as a Conference, delegate to the Council power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots and the building of cottages, and to govern the camp ground; same to be printed in the Minutes.

10. Resolved: That the District Council make provision for the planting of more shade trees on the camp grounds.

Church

11. Resolved: That each church supply the camp with two each of the following: cups, plates, glasses, large spoons, cereal dishes, and one pitcher.

12. Resolved: That each church close its books on the last day of each month, and that the reports be sent to the District Treasurer immediately.

13. Resolved: That each preacher and deaconess send a copy of their reports to the Statistician not later than five days after the Conference year closes, which is the 30th day of June; and that the Statistician disregard any and all reports received thereafter. Be it also resolved that the District Treasurer's books close at noon on the 10th day of July.

14. Resolved: That each church send ten quarts of food to the camp.

15. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors have not received sufficient financial support, it is resolved that local church appoint one prayer meeting night each month as "Donation Night", at which time food-stuffs and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved that an agitator for the coming year be appointed by the Superintendent at the Annual Business Meeting.

16. Resolved: Since it is a matter of importance for the pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, be it therefore resolved that the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor, shall continue over the two Sundays he attends said Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

17. Resolved: That each church provide a cottage on the camp grounds for their pastor, and that other members of the District be urged to build for their personal needs.

18. Resolved: Whereas the times in which we live are perilous and the needs of the District both financial and spiritual are so great, therefore, be it resolved that we set aside the first day of each month for fasting and prayer.

19. Resolved: That the pastor and wife and delegate of the church having their District and General Budgets paid in full will be admitted to the Camp and Conference free.

20. Resolved: That each church do something toward recognizing "The Boys" from their community that are in the armed forces of the United States for the duration.

21. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of securing tithes and offerings.

Sunday School

22. Resolved: That each of our Sunday Schools correctly enroll each class, said enrollment to be revised quarterly.

23. Resolved: That each zone have a Sunday School attendance banner to be given quarterly to the Sunday School having the largest attendance; also an offering banner to be given to the Sunday School having the largest offerings.

24. Resolved: That we provide a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Convention. We further recommend that the Superintendent or representative of each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in Sunday School meetings in the local church.

25. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School other than their own this year.

Young People

26. Resolved: That we have a District Young People's Convention beginning on Thursday before camp, at 7:30 p. m. The day services on Friday and Saturday to be devoted to Young People's work. Be it further resolved, that the District Council appoint a president in each zone who shall create interest among our Young People, conduct zone rallies and work directly under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the Young People's Executive Secretary.

Zones

27. Resolved: That the District zones be recorded in the Minutes.

28. Resolved: That each zone hold at least one rally a year, after the previous order of zone rallies; time to be arranged in conjunction with and at the discretion of the District Superintendent.

District Home Missions

29. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory Members to be chosen from the ordained ministers by the Council.

General

30. Whereas need of a new Headquarters building is pressing and steps have been taken toward the purchase of one in Indianapolis, Indiana: Be it resolved that the Kentucky District go on record as supporting 100 per cent the financial drives and all other requests of the General Board pertaining thereto.

31. Since our General Superintendent has so efficiently filled his position and discharged his duties so faithfully, be it resolved that this Conference send a petition to the General Board suggesting that his salary be increased.

Credentials

32. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless applicant is sick or otherwise unable

to appear; and in that case some member of the Conference certify to his or her character and location.

33. Resolved: That those pursuing the Study Course send for their Home Study Course early in the year, forwarding with their request 25 cents to cover the cost of questions and postage for each subject.

Pastor

34. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible convenience.

35. Resolved: That each pastor of our District make a special effort to place a current Manual in the home of each member of our Church.

36. Resolved: That each local church board or pastor calling an evangelist outside the District, or from another church, consult the District Superintendent.

37. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each "Advocate" subscriber, with the date of expiration, said book to be transferred to the following pastor.

38. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church and the District Superintendent, and that no pastor hold a revival away from his church within thirty days after a revival in his own church; then not more than two revivals during the Conference year, provided said church is supporting him.

39. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Condolence Committee immediately following the funeral.

40. Resolved: That every active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

41. Resolved: That the telephone number be included with the address in the Directory of Pastoral Appointments.

Ministers

42. Resolved: That each minister who has not been supporting financially the local church to which he belongs, do so this year.

43. Resolved: That each minister attend the Camp and Conference in full, or present a written explanation of non-attendance, to the District Council.

44. Whereas, ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and whereas there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister: We therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it further resolved that every pastor and his wife be urged to join this Association. Be it also resolved that the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the auspices of the District Home Missionary Committee.

45. Resolved: That a blank be filled out by ministers that cannot attend the Conference, blank to be furnished by District.

Conference

46. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without its permission.

47. Resolved: That no church elect a delegate to our District Conference who will not agree to stay through the entire Conference. (Manual, Sec. 82, paragraph 2.)

48. Resolved: That the Conference convene on Thursday morning, the last week of camp.

Camp

49. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one, as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, which is to be presented at the dining room door.

50. Resolved: That the District Superintendent and wife be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved that our District Superintendent and wife and called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

51. Resolved: That the lunch stand remain closed until twenty minutes after the close of the altar call.

52. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:

a. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who shall come to camp shall abide by its rules.

b. Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 10:00 p. m.

c. A Dean shall be appointed over each dormitory when necessary.

d. No single young people shall be allowed off the grounds after 7:00 p. m.

e. No article shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge, and any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

f. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

g. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the camp grounds.

h. A supervisor shall be appointed for the kitchen and dining room workers, for the parking of cars, for the care of the tabernacle, and for the cleaning of the camp grounds; these to be appointed by the Camp Meeting Committee.

53. Resolved: That all preachers give three days labor or pay the equivalent, in developing our camp grounds, or in preparation for the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

54. Resolved: That the District furnish bedding for the camp evangelist and workers' cottages.

55. Whereas we have a large number of children on the camp grounds during camp meeting: Be it resolved that a fund be established to provide, with the thought of adding to, a supervised playground.

56. Whereas the number of meals served in the dining room is increasing yearly, and the present setup in the kitchen is inadequate to accommodate the increase: be it resolved that the Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to purchase a water heater, suitable quantity and size of cooking utensils, build a larger work table and "streamline" the work problem in general.

57. Resolved: That definite steps be taken to secure a policeman with full authority of the law to be on the camp grounds from 7:00 p. m. to 10:00 p. m. each night of the camp.

Minutes

58. Resolved: That we have 600 copies of the District Minutes printed to sell for 25 cents per copy.

59. Resolved: That this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to our General Superintendent, Rev. W. L. Surbrook; our Camp Evangelists, Rev. D. E. Snow and Rev. L. C. Philo; our Singer, Rev. Thomas Shirk; our Home Missionary Representative, Rev. R. D. Brown; our Foreign Missionary Representatives, Rev. P. W. Thomas and Rev. H. J. Olsen; our Frankfort Bible School Representative, Rev. O. G. Hamm; our District Su-

perintendent, Rev. L. S. Houston; our District Officials; our efficient cook and kitchen help; other labors donated; and all who assisted and served to make this Camp and Conference a blessing to all.

RECOMMENDATIONS

OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School of our District pay 10 cents per week for a tent fund. We further recommend that each Sunday School adopt the Birthday Offering Plan, said offerings to go toward the Tent and Home Missionary Fund.

2. We recommend: That each church pay not less than \$10.00 on the expenses of the pastor and delegate to the District Conference, this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the Annual Meeting. We further recommend that the amount raised be equally divided, providing the pastor and delegate do not go to the Conference together.

3. We recommend: That each church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, same to be sent in by the local Treasurer as District Budget.

4. Inasmuch as this State is included in the Frankfort Pilgrim School Zone, we, therefore, strongly recommend that our people patronize our own Bible School.

5. Whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, We recommend that each church owning a lot make strenuous efforts this year to raise funds and build a cabin. We further recommend that each individual owning a lot put forth special effort to build.

6. We recommend: That we adopt the system of raising Foreign Missionary money requested by the General Board, as follows: That each church have a weekly prayer service and that a Missionary Rally be held monthly on the Lord's day, and at this service an offering be taken for Foreign Missions, same to be forwarded to the District Treasurer.

7. We recommend: That all active pastors pay to the District three-fourths of their ministerial tithes and one-half of their tithes from secular labor, and that the evangelists pay one-half of their ministerial tithes and one-half of their tithes from secular labor to the District, when they are members of churches whose membership is under twenty-five. All other ordained and licensed ministers to be assessed \$12.00 per year, same to be paid monthly. Failure to do this will call for the action of the District Council.

8. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to each local church quarterly statements showing amounts due in each department. We further recommend: That quarterly statements be sent to each minister showing amounts due on assessment.

9. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid \$150.00 per year, and the District Secretary be paid \$75.00, same to be paid in equal monthly payments.

10. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be \$2,100.00 per year, and that he be granted two weeks vacation with pay; and that we pay \$30.00 per month of his rent; also that he be paid four cents per mile for traveling expenses.

11. We recommend: That the Assistant Superintendent be allowed 50 cents per meal for meals bought while working in District work.

12. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastors salaries at least equal to the average wage of the working people of the church, and this to be taken care of at the first visit of the Superintendent.

13. We recommend: That the District Superintendent appraise the valuation of each local church at the time of his first visit.

14. We recommend: That we adhere to the ruling of the Manual,

Section 133, paragraph 12, in regard to General funds. "To set a yearly budget of expense of not more than \$3.00 per member for the General Church both at home and abroad; namely, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and Administrative Expense. The General Conference of 1942 instructed the General Board to make division of such General Church funds as follows: 63 1-3 per cent for Foreign Missions; 20 per cent for Home Missions; and 16 2-3 per cent for General Administrative Expense." The action of the General Board: "Be it resolved: That when a local church raises its General Budget allotments monthly, such church shall be granted the privilege of specifying surplus funds. In the event the local church treasurer does not allot General Budget funds according to the Manual, Section 133, paragraph 12, that the General Board authorize the District Treasurer to make proper allotment."

15. We recommend: That District Budget, Camp Budget, Bible School and General Conference Expense be combined under the head of District Budget. We further recommend: That 50 per cent of the District Budget go to the sinking fund which shall be a preferred claim; 35 per cent to Camp Budget, 10 per cent to General Conference Expense, and 5 per cent to Bible School.

16. We recommend: That each local church send in to the District Treasurer the sum equivalent to 20 cents per member for the Camp Evangelist offering.

17. We recommend: That each church be requested to raise for District Budget at least the amount equivalent to \$3.00 per member of voting age reported to the Conference. Also that a chart appear in the Minutes stating the amount that each church will be expected to raise by the month according to the amount assessed.

18. We recommend: That we form a Camp Meeting Association, the purpose of which shall be to promote the camp. That each member of the Association pay at least \$1.00 per year. (This is to be a standing pledge from year to year). The Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer shall notify each member at least thirty days before camp.

19. Be it resolved: That all monies be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all bills.

20. We recommend: That the District Council be empowered to purchase a parsonage for the District Superintendent. The same to be bought so the payments will not exceed \$40.00 per month.

21. We recommend: That each church take steps to raise their offerings for revivals at least 30 days in advance of the meeting.

22. We recommend: That when a Mission is organized into a church, it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference, and 50 per cent for the two following years.

23. We recommend: That the Statistician be paid \$15.00 for her services.

24. We recommend: That \$25.00 be taken from the Camp Fund to purchase supplies for "First Aid" for our camp.

25. We recommend: That inasmuch as we are so badly in need of sidewalks on the camp grounds, that the owner of each lot pay \$10.00 for the sidewalk in front of their lot. This is for the original plot.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Thirty-Sixth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church,
Kentucky District, now in session,
Greetings in Jesus' Name:

With the passing of another year we are brought face to face with another District Conference. We are glad to report the best victory through the blood of Jesus. In spite of the fact the war has brought perilous times upon us and many times our ship has been tossed to and fro, our great Captain was at the helm and brought us safely through. To Him be all the glory. Never in my Christian experience have I enjoyed more of His presence and felt any nearer Him than today.

We wish to say that we have enjoyed laboring with our District Council, our pastors, evangelists and the laity. Our fellowship together has been blessed. We appreciate the way our people have stood by the church in these dark days. His smile has been on the District, and while nation has been engaged against nation, through it all God has led us on to victory. Amen!

We have had some glorious revivals in the District this year. We have organized two churches: Pleasureville with 16 members, and Turkey Creek with 20 members. New works have been opened in the following places: Newport, Bellevue, Frankfort, Cynthiana, Carlisle, Henderson and Turkey Creek.

Ashland I has redecorated the parsonage and built a large Sunday School room in the basement.

Ashland II has sold their old parsonage and purchased a modern six-room one, with double garage, papered and painted the parsonage.

Aspen Grove has painted their church with other remodeling.

Our new work at Carlisle is being blessed of God with a banner attendance in Sunday School of 74.

Central City is launching a building program for a concrete block parsonage and four Sunday School rooms.

Cloverport has made splendid progress in membership and paid about one-third of the indebtedness this year.

Covington I has painted their parsonage and papered.

Elizabethtown has painted and papered a part of the parsonage.

Erlanger has built Sunday School room in basement and purchased a parsonage and built sidewalks.

Frankfort has painted the interior of their church and parsonage and paid their indebtedness of near \$1,800.00 dollars. Plans are being made for burning the mortgage in October on Sunday School Rally Day.

Fullerton anticipates building a new church this year. They have paid for their lots and painted the interior of the old building.

Greenup is remodeling church and has paid a considerable sum on their indebtedness.

Hopewell is working toward building a parsonage.

Kingswood has purchased and paid for an extra lot, also done some remodeling.

Latonia has papered and painted the interior of the parsonage, painted exterior, laid hardwood floor in church, with other improvements, and paid a considerable sum of their indebtedness on the parsonage purchased last year.

Lexington has purchased a lot and plans to start building at once a church 32 x 52 with full size basement, six-room parsonage with bath, board room and pastor's study.

Louisville has painted the interior and exterior of their church.

Maysville has paid their indebtedness of \$1,200.00, painted interior of church and papered the parsonage with other improvements.

Owensboro has purchased two nice lots, also a tent in which they are getting ready to launch a building program.

Pikeville has bought a lot and is marching on toward a building with a good average attendance in Sunday School.

Pleasureville is at this time roofing their new 30 x 50-ft. cinder block church. They are expecting to dedicate it soon, clear of debt.

Rush is going forward with their remodeling after years of planning and waiting.

Soldier has sold their old parsonage and purchased a better one.

Salem has installed electricity in the parsonage, ceiled church with sheet rock and done some painting.

Toler has done some improving.

Tyrone has purchased a parsonage, has it clear of debt.

Willard has purchased a lot with store buildings and at this time they are tearing down part of the buildings to move the church down in town and convert the large store building into another parsonage. They have raised over \$1,000.00 on this program.

We are sorry to report the Liberty church burned down in the winter.

We have purchased an additional two and one-half acres of land adjoining our camp grounds which provides us seventy extra building lots which will make us one hundred and twenty-three cabins when all are built. Two cabins have been built this year. A cistern has been dug with a capacity of seven thousand gallons, with pump in the kitchen.

Many of the pastors have received an increase in salary.

We have conducted seventy-four quarterly meetings, forty-two annual meetings, attended one General Board meeting, three School Board meetings, presided over seventy-three board meetings and had one memorial service for a soldier who fell in France; have preached two hundred seventy-two times, with one hundred twenty-one souls seeking God; spent three weeks on camp grounds, dedicated six children, conducted three revivals, secured thirty-one subscriptions for the Advocate; participated in eighteen communion services; prayed with twenty-seven for healing; conducted two funerals; performed two weddings; traveled seventeen thousand seven hundred and forty-eight miles; received my salary in full; received from revivals one hundred eighty dollars, a love offering during camp last year of one hundred thirty dollars, tithe donations from pastors of approximately fifty dollars.

As we consider the progress made during the year in the various departments we feel like looking to God first with praise and secondly to our faithful pastors, evangelists, members and many friends of our various churches. We wish at this time to express our appreciation for the splendid co-operation we have had from the District Council to the local churches. Your prayers and your services have been deeply appreciated.

With fields ripe unto harvest, and much grain bending low, let us go forth to reap before the night cometh.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each.

Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for within six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in old plot shall be dimension 20 feet front and 30 feet in length. Inside lots 20 x 20. All lots in new plot are to be 20 x 30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10 x 12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either metal or asphalt roof. This made of dressed lumber either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of 9 feet may be built on cabin on outside lots (old plot), such additions to be same dimensions as cabin, with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on new plot may be either single or double.

The Camp Meeting Board has the right to paint or repair in any way necessary and the owner is to pay the expenses of the same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roofs.

The Camp Meeting Board is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fee, \$2.50, and work assigned.

Five dollars for the entire camp and no work.

Children under ten years old will be registered free; from ten to fourteen for half price.

Meal tickets—Sunday breakfast and supper, 15 cents.

All other meals 25 cents.

He had been a Pilgrim for many years, and though unable to be in active service for some time, kept a sweet spirit and radiated blessing to those who visited him in his affliction. He kept the faith.

MRS. WILLA MOUSER PERKINS, licensed deaconess, was born July 22, 1878, and departed this life May 26, 1945. Mrs. Perkins was converted at the age of thirteen and later sanctified.
