CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

The Thirty-seventh Annual Conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened on the Camp Grounds at 8:00 A. M. Thursday, August 1, 1946, in the Tabernacle, with the District Superintendent in charge.

At the close of a prayer meeting which preceded the opening of the Conference, Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, General Secretary, was presented to the Conference, who read from II Tim. 4:5 and gave a stirring and practical message to the preachers and delegates assembled, stressing the necessity of willingness to take the humble place, also that preachers' wives could run them into the ditch by nagging him to go into evangelistic work or to go into secular work to get more money.

The roll of ministers and delegates was read. Attention was called to the standing rule of the Conference bar being the first eight seats across the Tabernacle including the platform and visitors were instructed to not occupy the bar in the next setting.

The District Superintendent made the appointment of the Reception Committee, namely Bros. Mayle, Weedman and Goodman.

The hours of the settings were set as last year, 8:00 A. M. to 9:00 A. M. and 10:00 A. M. to 4:00 P. M. Motion was made and seconded that the order of the day tomorrow at 10:00 A. M. be the election of officers. Carried.

Motion prevailed to recess until 10:00 o'clock.

The Conference was called to order at 10:00 with Rev. S. M. Stikeleather in the chair. Rev. Roy Hill, of Ohio, led us in a season of prayer.

Attention was again called to the visitors to clear the Conference bar.

The District Superintendent read his report which was accepted.

It was moved and carried that we now have the District Treasurer's report and the auditors can O.K. it later. He gave a splendid report which was accepted upon the above condition.

Moved and carried that this Conference give Bro. Tromble a rising vote of thanks for his labor on this work. The Conference stood in token of their thanks.

Also a rising vote of thanks was given our District Superintendent for his untiring labors both on the District and on the Camp Grounds.

The transfer of Rev. Neal Horton from Tennessee was presented and was accepted by the Conference by standing. Bro. Horton then gave a testimony.

A new church was presented to the Conference, that of Pikeville. The pastor and his wife, Bro. and Sister C. C. Mayle, and the representatives from the church came forward and was presented to the Conference.

A partial report from the Resolutions Committee was read. A motion to adopt No. 1 was seconded. After discussion it was referred back to the committee for redrafting.

No. 2 to delete No. 31 in old minutes carried.

Resolution to amend number 26 in the minutes, to read, "Conduct one zone rally each month." An amendment was offered to this after discussion that it read "one rally each quarter" instead of one each month. The resolution was adopted as amended. A motion was offered that the zone presidents appoint a committee of three to plan the programs for these rallies. Carried.

A request was made that we hear a report from the District Sunday School Committee which was given by the secretary of this committee and was received by the Conference.

The statistician's report was read and received.

A partial report from the Ways and Means Committee was read. Recommendation No. 1 was read and after discussion a motion was made to refer the question of pro-rating the assessments of churches in the matter back to the committee for regrouping. Carried.

Recommendation to delete a portion of No. 10 carried.

Recommendation to delete No. 11 carried.

Recommendation to amend number 15 carried.

Recommendations to delete numbers 20, 24 and 25 carried.

Recommendation No. 8 was adopted.

Conference recessed until 2:00 o'clock.

Conference was again called to order at 2:00 o'clock by the chairman. We were led in singing the hymn, "When I See the Blood," by Bro. Kenneth Davis. Bro. Wayne Hill led us in prayer.

The Resolution Committee reported.

Resolution to delete No. 56 carried.

Resolution to amend No. 19 which was referred back to the committee for redrafting was again brought to the floor and adopted.

Resolution to adopt a penny-a-day plan for District Home Missions was presented, but since this is Ways and Means business it was withdrawn.

A letter from the Bolenders was read and received. Motion that the Secretary answer this letter and send greetings to them passed.

The Assistant District Superintendent read his report and it was accepted.

The District Superintendent reported the gift of a piano from the Clifford family at Elizabethtown and it was voted that the Secretary write them a letter of appreciation for this gift.

The Condolence Committee read their report which was accepted.

The question of whether or not adjourn and give the committees a chance to work or to recind the former action of the Conference regarding the election of officers was presented and it was voted to adjourn until 8:00 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Before adjourning the Reception Committee presented the visitors to the Conference and they were welcomed by a hearty Amen from the Conference. Also a request that Bro. and Sister Wade sing a song was made. They sang the song entitled "A Little Talk With Jesus" to the edification of all. Conference adjourned until 8:00 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The second setting opened at 8:00 o'clock Friday A. M. After singing "Near the Cross" the Conference went to prayer and after some time spent in prayer for the Lord to lead in the affairs of the day, Bro. Stike-leather read a Scripture lesson from Col. third chapter and spoke to the uplifting of all on some practical things.

The minutes of the first setting were read and approved. The roll of the ministers and delegates was read. Clyde Elmer Hanks was seated as delegate from Willard Church.

A report was given by the Ways and Means Committee.

The recommendation which was referred back to them was again presented. The recommendation was adopted as amended by the committee. Recessed until 10:00 o'clock.

The Conference was called to order by the chair. Rev. C. C. Mayle lead the Conference in prayer. The order of the day at this time being the election of officers, but because of some matters that needed attention first, by common consent it was agreed to set the order aside long enough to take care of these matters.

The Council presented the names of Bro. and Sister Whittinghill Ordained Ministers transferring from the Oklahoma-Texas District to this Conference. They were accepted.

The Educational and Examining Boards read a combined report. Those read were accepted by the Conference. The Conference then proceeded to the election of officers.

Rev. Castevens, our Camp Evangelist, was invited to sit on the platform. A motion carried that we grant him a voice in the Conference. The chairman called us to prayer that we might know the mind of the Lord for the electing of the officials of the District another year. The Superintendent appointed the tellers namely: Bros. Smack, Goodman, May, Barber, Mayle and Lowery.

Ballots were cast for the office of District Superintendent and when they were counted Rev. L. S. Houston was overwhelmingly re-elected. Ballots were then cast for his assistant. Our present Assistant Superintendent asked that he not be considered again for the office because of ill health, that he was not able to look after his church and do the work of the office.

The first ballot showed no election. Another ballot was taken and the three highest names on the list were voted on. Again there was no election. The third ballot cast and the count showed Rev. C. L. Oden elected.

Ballots were again cast this time for District Secretary. Count of the first ballot revealed no election. Motion carried to vote on the three highest. The second ballot failed to give an election. A motion prevailed that we vote again on the two highest. This ballot when counted still did not get an election. Ballots were cast again. Motion carried to recess for fifteen minutes while the votes were being counted.

Conference was again called to order after fifteen minutes by the chair by singing "He Leadeth Me." Bro. Kenneth Davis led in prayer.

The chair asked the secretary of the tellars to report the ballots just cast. The report showed Bro. Smack elected.

The District Council presented the names of Bros. Tromble and Goodman as nominees for District Treasurer. Ballots were cast and the count showed Bro. Tromble re-elected.

Ballots were cast for the three Advisory Council members. Count of ballots revealed two elections namely, Bros. Tackett and May. Motion made and carried that we vote on the two highest. These are Bros. Mayle and E. E. Leadingham. Ballots were cast and the count declared Bro. Mayle elected.

Motion to vote by acclamation for the District Trustees and to retain the three we now have. This was carried. The District Council presented the names of Bros. Singleton and Barber as nominees for the Examining Board. A motion carried that we also elect these committees by acclamation. The vote was taken and Bro. Singleton was chosen. A motion prevailed that we recind this and again vote by ballot, as it was not fair to those voted on. Ballots were taken and Bro. Barber was elected. Council presented the names of Bros. Oden and Petterson as nominees for the Educational Board. Ballots declared Bro. Oden elected.

The District Superintendent appointed the various committees as shown in the directory.

Motion prevailed that we have five members on the Resolution and Ways and Means committees.

The Resolutions Committee reported. Resolution No. 1 was adopted. Upon presentation of No. 2 resolution it was moved and seconded to adopt. After discussion an amendment was offered and seconded to read Ministerial Convention instead of Ministerial Conference. The amendment was adopted. Resolution passed as amended.

Resolution No. 3 was adopted. Bro. Houston presented a matter at this time. He spoke of the faithful labors of Rev. Mrs. Martha Keaton and that she was retiring from the active ministry, and he asked that we as a Conference buy a basket of flowers and present them to her. A motion carried that this be done and also that we send her an expression of appreciation in writing along with the flowers.

The Ways and Means Committee presented a resolution which had been handed to them and they had not had time to consider it. It was referred to the committee to bring in later. Motion to recess to the call of the chair.

Conference was again called to order after supper by the chair. Bro. Mayle led the singing and Bro. H. C. Beavers led in prayer.

Business was again resumed. Invitations were entertained for the Ministerial Convention next April. The Ashland First Church extended an invitation which was accepted as first choice. The Pikeville Church also extended an invitation and was accepted as second choice.

The Ministerial Benefit Association was presented and explained several taking blanks to join the Association. The Advocate was also presented and several desired to subscribe. The District parsonage was mentioned. Several reported having money for it. After it was all reported the Treasurer gave a report of it.

Motion prevailed that all unfinished business be delegated to the Council.

The District Superintendent introduced all the evangelists as they came forward urging that we keep them busy in the field.

A motion to adjourn prevailed that we might proceed with the Ordination Service. The 1946 Kentucky Conference adjourned by singing the "Doxology." All feeling it had been a time of precious fellowship and blessing.

The Ordination Service followed immediately. Rev. C. L. Oden leading the congregation in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have." Rev. Frank

May led in prayer by offering an earnest prayer for God to set his seal on the ordaining of these men. Rev. L. S. Houston then read from the Scriptures on the subject from I Tim., chapter 3. Rev. C. L. Oden then read from II Tim. 4:1-8. Rev. Ralph Tromble then read Titus 3:1-11. Rev. Stikeleather gave a timely and stirring message and charge to the candidates from the text "Neglect not the gift that is given thee . . . by prophecy." I Tim. 4:14. After which two young men were duly ordained to the ministry by prayer and laying on of hands of the Ordaining Council.

RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make at least three trips over the District during the year.
2. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be consulted and present if possible when drawing up all deeds in the District.
3. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a Statistician for the next year.
4. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be a member of our Zone Bible School Board.

Council

5. Resolved: That the date of our Camp and Conference be left in the hands of the Council.
6. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plans.
7. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Convention and said date to be recorded in the minutes.
8. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years of their existence, or until said council shall decide to do otherwise.
9. Resolved: That we, as a Conference, delegate to the Council power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots and the building of cottages, and to govern the camp grounds; same to be printed in the minutes.
10. Resolved: That the District Council make provision for the planting of more shade trees on the camp grounds.

Church

11. Resolved: That each church supply the camp with two each of the following: cups, plates, glasses, large spoons, cereal dishes and one pitcher.
12. Resolved: That each church close its books on the last day of each month, and the reports be sent to the District Treasurer immediately.
13. Resolved: That each preacher and deaconess send a copy of their reports to the Statistician, not later than five days after the Conference year closes, which is the 30th day of June; and that the Statistician disregard any and all reports received thereafter. Be it also resolved that the District Treasurer's books close at noon on the 10th day of July.
14. Resolved: That each church send ten quarts of food to the Camp.
15. RESOLVED: That whereas many of our pastors have not received sufficient financial support, it is resolved that each local church

appoint one prayer-meeting night each month as "Donation Night," at which time food stuff and provision shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved that an aggitator be appointed for the coming year by the Superintendent at the Annual Business meeting.

16. RESOLVED: Since it is a matter of importance for the Pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, be it therefore resolved that the pastors support at the church where he is assigned as pastor, shall continue over the two Sundays he attends said Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

17. RESOLVED: That each church provide a cottage on the camp grounds for their pastor, and that other members of the District be urged to build for their personal needs.

18. Resolved: That whereas the times in which we live are perilous and the needs of the District, both financial and spiritual are so great, therefore be it resolved that we set aside the first day of each month for fasting and prayer.

19. Resolved: That the pastor and wife and delegate of the church having their District and General Budgets in full will be admitted to the Camp and Conference Free.

20. Resolved: That all active Evangelists and wives who have fully supported the District and local church in tithe and offerings, be admitted to the Camp and Conference free.

21. Resolved: That each church do something toward recognizing "The Boys" from their community that are in the armed forces of the United States for the Duration.

22. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelops system of securing tithes and offerings.

Sunday School

23. Resolved: That each of our Sunday Schools correctly enroll each class, said enrollment to be revised quarterly.

24. Resolved: That each zone have a Sunday School attendance banner to be given quarterly to the Sunday School having the largest attendance; also an offering banner to be given to the Sunday School having the largest offerings.

25. Resolved: That we provide a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Convention. We further recommend that the Superintendent or representative of each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in Sunday School meetings in the local church.

26. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School other than their own this year.

Young People

27. Resolved: That we have a District Young People's Convention beginning on Thursday before camp, at 7:30 p. m. The day services on Friday and Saturday to be devoted to Young People's Work. Be it further resolved: that the District Council appoint a president in each zone, who shall create interest among our Young People; conduct quarterly Zone Rallies, and work directly under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the Young People's Executive Secretary.

Zones

28. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in the Minutes.

29. Resolved: That we change the name "zone meeting" to quarterly conference.

30. Resolved: That whereas the zone known as the Louisville zone is considered by some as being too big, therefore be it resolved: that this Conference permit the District Council to divide the Zone and name the same.

31. Resolved: That each Zone hold at least one Rally a year, after the previous order of zone rallies; time to be arranged in conjunction with, and at the discretion of the District Superintendent.

District Home Missions

32. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory Members to be chosen from the ordained ministers by the council.

General

33. Whereas the need of a new headquarters building is pressing and steps have been taken toward the purchase of one in Indianapolis, Indiana. Be it resolved: that the Kentucky District go on record as supporting 100 per cent the financial drives and all other requests of the General Board pertaining thereto.

Credentials

34. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the examining board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; and in that case some member of the Conference certify to his or her character and location.

35. Resolved: That those pursuing the study course send for their home study course early in the year, forwarding with their request, 25 cents to cover the cost of the questions and postage for each subject.

Pastor

36. Resolved: That each Pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible convenience.

37. Resolved: That each Pastor of our District make a special effort to place a current Manual in the home of each member of our church.

38. Resolved: That each church board or pastor calling an Evangelist outside of the District, or from another church, consult the District Superintendent.

39. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each "Advocate" subscriber, with the date of expiration, said book to be transferred to the following pastor.

40. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church and the District Superintendent, and that no pastor hold a revival away from his church within thirty days after a revival in his own church; then not more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

41. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Condolence Committee immediately following the funeral.

42. Resolved: That every active pastor be given two weeks' vacation with pay.

43. Resolved: That the telephone number be included with the address in the Directory of Pastoral Appointments.

Ministers

44. Resolved: That each Minister who has not been supporting financially that church of which he is a member, do so this year.

45. Resolved: That each minister attend the Camp and Conference in full, or present a written explanation of non-attendance, to the District Council.

46. Whereas: Ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and whereas there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister: We therefore recommend that the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it further resolved that every pastor and his wife be urged to join this association. Be it also resolved that the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the auspices of the District Home Missionary Committee.

47. Resolved: That a blank be filled out by ministers that cannot attend the Conference, blank to be furnished by the District.

Conference

48. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without its permission.

49. Resolved: That no church elect a delegate to our District Conference who will not agree to stay through the entire Conference. (Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2).

50. Resolved: That the Conference convene on Thursday morning, the last week of camp.

CAMP

51. Resolved: That we register all who come to Camp, assigning work to each one, as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, which is to be presented at the dining room door.

52. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, our registered nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

53. Resolved: That the lunch stand remain closed until twenty minutes after the close of the altar call.

54. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:

A. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people all who shall come to camp shall abide by its rules.

B. Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 10:00 p. m.

C. A Dean shall be appointed over each dormitory when necessary.

D. No single young people shall be allowed off the grounds after 7 p. m.

E. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge, and any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

F. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

G. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the campground.

H. A Supervisor shall be appointed for the dining-room and kitchen; for the parking of cars; for the care of the tabernacle; and for the cleaning of the camp grounds; these two appointed by the Camp Meeting Committee.

55. Resolved: That all preachers give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing the camp grounds, or in preparation for the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

56. Resolved: That the district furnish bedding for the Evangelist and Workers Cottages.

57. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on the camp grounds during camp meeting: Be it resolved that a fund be established to provide, with the thought of adding to, a supervised playground.

58. Resolved: That definite steps be taken to secure a policeman with full authority of the law, to be on the camp grounds from 7:00 p. m. until 10:00 p. m. each night of the camp.

59. Resolved: That this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to our General Secretary, as presiding officer, Rev. S. M. Stikeleather; Rev. G. A. Castevens, as our Camp Evangelist; Rev. and Mrs. W. T. Stone, as Special Singers; Mrs. Opal Bailey, as Children's Worker; Our representative from Headquarters, Rev. Thomas Weir; Our Foreign Missionary Representatives, Rev. and Mrs. O. L. King; Rev. and Mrs. O. G. Hahn and the Boys Quartet, as representatives of Frankfort Bible College; Rev. R. S. Shelton, representing the General Home Missionary Department; District Superintendent, Rev. L. S. Houston; our District Officials; our efficient cooks and kitchen help; all donated labor, and all who in any way assisted and served to make this camp and Conference a blessing to all.

Minutes

60. Resolved: That we have 600 copies of the District Minutes printed to sell for 25 cents per copy.

RECOMMENDATIONS

OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School of our District pay ten cents per week for a tent fund. We further recommend that each Sunday School adopt the Birthday Offering Plan, said offering to go toward the Tent and Home Missionary Fund.

2. We recommend: That each church pay not less than \$10.00 on the expense of the pastor and delegate to the District Conference, this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the Annual Business Meeting. We further recommend that the amount be equally divided, provided the pastor and delegate does not go to the Conference together.

3. We recommend: That each church take a free-will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, same to be sent in by the local Treasurer as District Budget.

4. Inasmuch as this State is included in the Frankfort Pilgrim School Zone, we, therefore strongly recommend that our people patronize our own Bible School.

5. Whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people We recommend, that each church owning a lot, make strenuous efforts to raise the funds and build a cabin this year. We further recommend that each individual owning a lot put forth special effort to build.

6. We recommend: That we adopt the system of raising Foreign Missionary money requested by the General Board as follows: That each church have a weekly prayer service and that a Missionary Rally be held

monthly on the Lord's Day, and at this service an offering be taken for Foreign Missions, same to be forwarded to the District Treasurer.

7. We recommend: That all active pastors pay to the District three-fourths of their ministerial tithes and one-half of their tithes from secular labor, and that the Evangelists pay one-half of their ministerial tithes, and one-half of their tithes from secular labors to the District, when they are members of churches whose membership is under twenty-five. All other ordained and licensed ministers to be assessed \$12.00 per year, same to be paid monthly. Failure to do this will call for the action of the District Council.

8. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to each local church quarterly statements showing amounts due in each department. We further recommend: that quarterly statements be sent to each minister showing due on assessment.

9. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid \$150.00 per year, and the District Secretary be paid \$75.00, same to be paid in equal monthly payments.

10. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be \$2,100.00 per year, that he be granted two weeks vacation with pay; also that he be paid four cents per mile for traveling expenses.

11. We recommend: That the Asst. Dist. Supt. be allowed actual expense for meals bought while working in district work.

12. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastors' salaries at least equal to the average wage of the working people of the church, and this to be taken care of at the first visit of the Superintendent.

13. We recommend: That the District Superintendent appraise the valuation of each local church at the time of his first visit.

14. We recommend: That we adhere to the ruling of the Manual, Section 133, paragraph 12, in regards to general funds. "To set a yearly budget of expense of not more than \$3.00 per member for the General Church both at home and abroad; namely, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and Administrative expense. The General Conference of 1942 instructed the General Board to make division of such General Church funds as follows: 63 1-3 per cent for Foreign Missions; 20 per cent for Home Missions; and 16 2-3 per cent for General Administrative Expense." The action of the General Board: "Be it resolved: That when a local church raises its General Budgets allotments monthly, such church shall be granted the privilege of specifying surplus funds. In the event the local church treasurer does not allot General Budgets funds according to the Manual, Section 133, paragraph 12, that the General Board authorize the District Treasurer to make proper allotments."

15. We recommend: That District Budget, Camp Budget, Bible School and General Conference Expense be combined under the head of District Budget. We further recommend: That 50 per cent of the District Budget go to the Sinking Fund which shall be preferred claim; 20 per cent to the Parsonage Fund; 15 per cent to Camp Budget; 10 per cent to General Conference Expense; 5 per cent to Bible School.

16. We recommend: That each local church send into the District Treasurer the sum equivalent to 20 cents per member for the Camp Evangelist offering.

17. We recommend: That each church be requested to raise for District Budget at least the amount equivalent to \$3.00 per member of voting age reported to the Conference. Also that a chart appear in the Minutes stating the amount that each church will be expected to raise by the month according to the amount assessed.

18. We recommend: That we form a Camp Meeting Association, the purpose of which shall be to promote the Camp. That each member of the Association pay at least \$1.00 per year. (This to be a standing pledge from year to year). The Camp meeting Secretary and Treasurer shall notify each member at least thirty days before Camp.

19. Be it resolved: That all monies be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills

20. We recommend: That each Church take steps to raise their offerings for revivals at least 30 days in advance of the meeting.

21. We recommend: That when a Mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference, and 50 per cent for the two following years.

22. We recommend: That the Statistician be paid \$15.00 for her services.

23. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each Zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District.

24. Whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted a "pension plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute four per cent of the pastor's salary, lay workers salary, evangelist offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund. Therefore be it resolved: That we, the Kentucky District Conference, fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter. And since the District obligation to said Pension Fund amounts to \$2,000.00 for the Conference year of 1946, therefore we recommend: That each local church raise the following amount:

We further recommend that this amount be raised through the Sunday School. The local church treasurer shall forward the money to the district treasurer monthly. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2 per cent of salary and offerings as reported to the Conference.

To the thirty-seven annual conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Kentucky District, now in session. Greetings in the name of Him who loved us and gave himself for us:

It is only through the mercies of God that we are permitted today to assemble together in the capacity of another District conference. Since we last met a year ago many things have happened. Some have been very pleasant while others we would like to forget. Because of death some have fallen from our ranks, both from the ministerial and laity. A cabin has been erected on the camp ground in memory of Rev. Tony March, one of our ordained ministers. In the passing of these our loss has been their gain.

The problems for all of us have been many, hours have been dark, roads have been rough, hills have been steep, but as for me, I have been determined to keep prayed up and my eyes on Him, and be obedient as He spake saying, "Follow me." This has been the busiest year of my ministry with little time to be home for rest or recreation, yet it has been a pleasure to serve my king, and the church for which He gave himself, for, in spite of the strenuous times we have passed through and the

tempetuous seas the ship of church has been sailing through with the great Captain at the helm we have made progress.

God has honored some of our churches with some glorious revivals this year, giving souls as well as members for the church. We have had a good gain in Sunday School attendance, also membership.

We have organized one new church at Pikeville with fifteen members and opened a new work six miles from Central City, known as Drakes Chapel. This was done through our good pastor at Central City. This work is still under his supervision and is very promising with an average of near fifty-five in Sunday School.

As a District we now own our first district parsonage, a seven room, red wire cut brick, full bath on the second floor, two piece on first, breakfast nook, full basement, furnace, two car garage and lot 50x180 feet with front and side porch, also fruit. This parsonage is located in Lexington in the best part of the city.

As a district, we have been engaged in six building programs this year, namely, church and parsonage at Pikeville, now being occupied; Lexington church and parsonage, church auditorium now being occupied, although unfinished; Willard, a church; Central City, a parsonage; and Sunday school rooms; and Fullerton, a church auditorium; and Cynthiana, a church now occupied.

We have built several hundred yards of sidewalk on the camp ground, also two two-room cabins and one one-room cabin. We are happy also to report the balance on the camp indebtedness has been liquidated, some improvements in dining room and kitchen.

As to the local churches, Ashland I has purchased a Sunday School bus which has added much to their splendid attendance. This church has lead the district in Sunday School attendance with an average of one hundred eighty per week.

Ashland II has painted exterior, also interior of parsonage, also erected a lovely church sign and purchased a Sunday school bus.

Carlisle has made splendid progress in their attendance and have raised several hundred dollars toward our own property. Pray for Carlisle.

Carrolton has done some improving and built front porch.

Central City has put on new roof and covered church with brick siding, with other improvements.

Cloverport has papered and painted interior of church and paid a large sum on their indebtedness.

Covington has done some interior decorating and are making splendid progress toward clearing debt on parsonage.

Elizabethtown has painted interior of church, also redecorated parsonage.

Erlanger has purchased a parsonage and made some improvements on church.

Falmouth purchased a seven room parsonage with a lovely lot, papered and painted and only have a small debt.

Frankfort purchased a lot for parsonage, have painted interior of church and parsonage with some other improvements.

Garvin Hill has painted exterior of church and parsonage and built lovely concrete porch and steps to church, with other marked improvements.

Greenup has made some improvements, planted shrubbery and paid considerable on indebtedness.

Hitchins finished Sunday School rooms, painted church and installed lights.

Louisville painted and redecored interior of church.

McAndrews, painted interior also exterior of church with some improvements on parsonage.

Olive Hill installed opera seats which add to the beauty and comfort of auditorium, with other improvements.

Owensboro as a young work is making splendid progress.

Pleasureville has purchased parsonage, installed opera seats and paid rest of indebtedness on church.

Prestonburg painted interior of church, furnished their parsonage and purchased Sunday School bus.

Rush plastered, papered and painted church and paid indebtedness.

Salem Ridge papered part of parsonage with other improvements.

Soldier has liquidated their indebtedness on parsonage with other improvements such as painting interior of church.

Toler painted exterior and interior of church, also put on new roof.

Tyrone papered and painted parsonage within and have paint for exterior of parsonage.

Tram built large concrete steps to church and are now working toward building a parsonage.

Trace is making splendid progress spiritually, numerically and financially. They have installed electric lights, painted interior of church.

It is with regret we report the loss of Bowling Green and Henderson work.

We have secured twenty-four subscriptions to the Advocate, participated in twenty communion services, prayed with thirty-two for healing, traveled twenty thousand, seven hundred miles, received salary in full, received from revivals \$232.00, tithe donations from pastors approximately, \$75.00.

We have preached one hundred eighty-eight times, conducted fifty-four quarterly business meetings, thirty-six annual meetings, attended one general board meeting, one general conference, two school board meetings, one special home missionary board meeting, presided over one ministerial convention, conducted ten zone meetings, four council meetings, spent four weeks on camp ground.

We have enjoyed the good fellowship with the brethren. We have deeply appreciated our District Council who have worked so beautifully with us, also our ministry and laity. We can say today, bless be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian love.

May his blessings rest upon each of you is our earnest prayer.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDINGS OF COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each.

Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for within six months or contract is void.

All outside lots if the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 foot front and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8 foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The Camp Meeting Board holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary and the owner is to pay the expenses of the same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on metal roofs.

The Camp Meeting Board is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fee, \$2.50, and work assigned. \$5.00 for entire camp, and no work. Children under ten years old will be registered free. 10 to 14 for half price. Meal tickets—Sunday breakfast and supper 15c; all other meals 25c.
