CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

The thirty-ninth annual conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in the tabernacle on the camp grounds at 8:00 A. M. Thursday morning, August 5, 1948, with our District Superintendent, Rev. L. S. Houston in charge.

At the close of the preceding prayer meeting which was crowned with the presence of the Lord, the conference began by singing a hymn, "Sweet Hour of Prayer." Promises from the Word of the Lord were given by several members of the conference.

Our General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk, was presented to the conference. After remarks of greetings he read from Exodus 14, and spoke from the subject, "Go Forward," stressing the following points: (1) Go forward by the old paths which the Master has set before us. He warned us to shun the paths of atheism, mild modernism and luke warm Laodiceanism, but to cling to the rugged way, trodden by the prophets and that is the highway of Holiness. (2) Go forward under divine direction. (3) Separate from the world. (4) Letting the Lord have His way. (5) Go forward in divine unity.

The hour of next sitting was set for 10:15. We adjourned for breakfast.

At the 10:15 sitting Brother Oden led in singing a hymn, "Leaning on the Everlasting Arm." Led in prayer by Brother Tromble. Roll call of the ministers and delegates was read and some alternates were seated.

The standing rule concerning the conference bar was read. It was moved and seconded we add two more seats across the tabernacle to the present bar making ten seats across the tabernacle including the platform. This to be a standing rule for the bar.

Moved and seconded we set our conference sittings from 8:00 A. M. to 9:00 A. M., 10:00 A. M. to 4:00 P. M.

Motion moved and seconded we adjourn until 10:00 A. M. Saturday.

Motion moved and seconded we refer the former action.

Moved and seconded we adjourn until 8:00 A. M. Saturday. Carried.

THIRD SITTING—SATURDAY MORNING, AUGUST 7, 1948

Motion moved and seconded we dispense with the roll call. Carried.

RECOMMENDATIONS

OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School of our District pay ten cents per week for a Portable Tabernacle Fund. We further recommend: that each Sunday School adopt the Birthday Offering Plan, said offering to go towards the Tabernacle and Home Missionary Fund.

14. We recommend: That the district budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense, 50 per cent; Sinking fund, 30 per cent; District parsonage, 10 per cent; Camp budget, 5 per cent; General Conference expense, 3 per cent; Bible School, 2 per cent.

15. We recommend: That each local church send to the District Treasurer the sum equivalent to 20c per member for the Camp Evangelist offering.

16. We recommend: That whereas a Camp Meeting Association has been formed for the purpose of the promotion of the Camp, that each member continue to pay at least \$1.00 per year. This to be a standing pledge.

17. We recommend: That all moneys be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills.

18. We recommend: That each Church take steps to raise their offerings for revivals at least 30 days before the revival begins.

19. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference, and 50 per cent for the two following years.

20. We recommend: That the Statistician be paid \$15.00 for her service.

21. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District. We further recommend: That the two Sunday School offerings taken during the camp be given to the Sunday School Committee.

22. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4 per cent of the Pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, Evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, and whereas this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter, We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church pay the equivalent of 40 per cent of the Evangelist's tithe who are members of said church, and 4 per cent of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2 per cent of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.

23. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and that 50 per cent of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the thirty-ninth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Kentucky District, now in session. Greetings in the name of the One who redeemed us with His own precious Blood.

As we meet today in the capacity of another district conference our attention is drawn to the fact that we are traveling at a terrific speed toward eternity. It seems as but yesterday since we were gathered as today, yet, another year is history.

The past year has brought about the removal of a number of our precious Pilgrims from this life to the one just beyond. Since last Conference Sister Alexander, one of our faithful licensed Deaconesses, of the Rush Church, passed to her reward. Brother V. C. Ferren, a local Minister, from the Elizabethtown church, also his wife met with a tragic death a few short weeks ago. But through all the sorrows, He has helped us through, and to occupy.

We will endeavor to report for the following churches. Ashland I has sheet rocked, painted and prepared the interior of their parsonage and increased salary of pastor. They have had an increase in Membership.

Ashland II painted, papered and refinished interior of parsonage and plans are being made to liquidate the balance of their indebtedness on their parsonage.

Aspen Grove installed opera seats, painted interior of church and received a lovely large picture of Christ.

Carlisle is making good progress for a young church. They are meeting their financial obligations on building and we see a great future for Carlisle.

Carrollton has moved forward under the leadership of their new pastors, Rev. Robert Weedman and wife. They have had a good increase in membership, papered interior of church and parsonage, along with other improvements.

Central City has almost completed their parsonage.

Cloverport has made a record. They have built a lovely parsonage to the church of four rooms and bath with only about \$400.00 indebtedness. They have had a good gain in membership.

Covington I recalled their pastor for the tenth year. They have liquidated their indebtedness on parsonage. This makes about \$10,000.00 debts paid during the pastor's stay on the field. He has had an increase in salary.

Cynthiana has made some gains, they have paid some on their indebtedness.

Elizabethtown has ordered new pews for their church. They have had some glorious revivals and have had a good increase in membership. And have increased their pastor's salary.

Erlanger has built and installed bathroom, papered parsonage, and pastor has received increase in salary.

Frankfort has built a beautiful parsonage of nine rooms, two baths, two floor furnaces, basement with garage. This parsonage would be a credit to any district. They have increased salary of pastor. Papered Sunday School rooms and installed large fan for auditorium.

Fullerton has papered interior of church which was built recently.

Garvin Hill is going forward. They have had some gracious revivals. And a good increase in membership and increase in salary. Built new cistern.

Hitchins has moved forward under the leadership of Brother and

Sister McNurlin. They have had a good gain in membership, paid for bus, and received two good raises in salary. They are considering building a new church.

Hopewell is going forward with Brother Pulley as pastor.

Kingswood is going forward. They have papered interior of church and increased pastor's salary. Good gain in membership.

Latonia has papered their parsonage, installed gas and plumbing. Had good gain in membership.

Lexington has installed bath room and plans are being made to finish a good part of the church soon. They have had a gain in membership.

Louisville is going forward under the leadership of their new pastor Brother Barber. They have paid a good substantial payment on their indebtedness and have had a good gain in membership with some good revivals.

Maysville, with Brother and Sister Hanks at the helm, are going forward and have had a good gain in membership. Plans are being made to install three gas floor furnaces. They have completed their two Sunday School rooms.

McAndrews has new pews ordered for their church.

Our Newport work was lost to us during the spring flood. Pray for this needy field.

The two Covington churches are hoping to sponsor a Home Missionary project there in the near future.

Olive Hill has made progress. They have had gains this year.

Owensboro has made progress in spite of their crowded condition. They are hoping to enter a building program soon.

Paris, our Home Missionary work for this year, is now offering us encouragement. In spite of being denied a building permit they are still forging ahead. We are still hoping to be able to build in the future. Pray for Paris.

Pikeville is making great progress. They are now building a 15 room parsonage with four garages. They cleared their indebtedness of \$1600.00, and also paid for their S. S. Bus. They will convert their old parsonage of six rooms into Sunday School rooms when new parsonage is finished.

Pleasureville has liquidated the balance of indebtedness on their parsonage and they hope to build a new parsonage soon.

Rush is making good progress. They have gained several members.

Salem is sailing on.

Soldier has ceiled their church.

Toler is progressing. They have had a gain in membership.

Tram is hoping to build a parsonage in the near future.

Tyrone has moved up. They are gaining ground.

Wheelwright is hoping to build a church soon.

We have organized one new church at Clay, Kentucky with 10 members. This lovely church was also deeded to us. We have made another substantial payment on our district parsonage and painted the exterior and interior of same. We have built two more cabins on camp ground and laid about 100 yards of walk.

We have secured 32 subscriptions to the Advocate, participated in 28 communion services, prayed with 37 for healing, traveled 20,618 miles, received salary in full, received from two revivals \$175.00, tithe donations from pastors \$70.50, made 294 calls, prayed in 246 homes, dedicated 26 children, had 3 marriages, 3 funerals, have preached 268 times, conducted 74 quarterly business meetings, 39 annual meetings, attended 2 General

Board meetings, one Dist. Superintendent's Conference, 1 National Youth Convention, presided over 1 Ministerial Convention, visited 1 Zone Conference, 1 District Council meeting and spent 28 days on the camp ground and with a deep consciousness that I was working for God.

It has been a delight to do with my might what my hands have found to do. I feel deeply indebted to God for His protection over the many miles that I have traveled and through all kinds of weather. To Him we give the honor and praise for what has been accomplished and pledge ourselves anew to Him for the future, regardless of the capacity we are to serve Him.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING OF COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 foot front and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8 foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The Camp Meeting Board holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary and the owner is to pay the expenses of the same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on metal roofs. The Camp Meeting Board is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fee, \$5.00 and work assigned. \$10.00 and no work assigned. Children under ten years old will be registered free. Children ten to fourteen for half price. Sunday breakfast and supper twenty-five cents. All other meals fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

NOTE: Registration for the "Dormitory Rooms" to begin at Thursday noon, before camp, using the "first come, first served" method; workers for camp preparation to be given priority to rooms in dormitory.

IN MEMORIAM

Mrs. Susan Alexander of Rush, beloved wife of Rev. Thomas Alexander passed to her eternal reward October 3rd, 1947, at the age of 64 years. They sat side by side on the front pew at church and the Lord gave them the special privilege of going to heaven together in the chariot of fire. This camp, we miss their shouts of praise, but with the eye of faith, can see them shouting on the hillsides of glory by the river of life and hear them say, "Keep true, your battles, too, will soon be over."
