The service opened by singing a hymn, "Constantly Abiding," and "Wonderful Words of Life." Led in prayer by Rev. S. S. Hulett.

At the close of the prayer and a few remarks by our District Superintendent praising God for the blessings and help throughout the past conference year, the conference stood and sang that glorious old hymn which lifts our hearts to the Heavenly realms, "Amazing Grace how sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me, I once was lost, but now I'm found, was blind, but now I see."

Sturk quoted the following scripture: "Husbands love your wives even as Christ, also, loved the church and gave himself for it, that he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water and by the word, that he might present it to himself a glorious church not having spot or wrinkle or any such thing, but that it should be holy and without blemish." Eph. 5-25-27. He spoke on the "Progress of the Church or Prohibition for Pilgrims," using the main points. (1) Material gains. He told how God had made it possible for the church to buy a printing press that we might print our own material. (2) He told of the purchase of a General Superintendent home in Indiana. (3) The unity of the General Leaders. (4) He stressed the point we should have a burden and compassion for souls.

We recessed for breakfast. Dismissed in prayer by Brother Drown.

At the 9:30 sitting, Brother Tromble led in singing a hymn, "Standing on the Promises."

Rev. L. W. Sturk continued his messages on the "Progress of the Church," stressing the great achievements in foreign and home work of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

He said there were hindrances which kept the church from going forward and are: (1) We should not please man, but God. (2) We must not fall into the idea of pointless or impractical preaching. (3) Have some standards of living.

In his closing remarks, he stressed four things we are to contend for: (1) We should contend for a spiritual church. (2) For a united church. (3) An unworldly church. (4) An aggressive soul saving church.

Roll call of delegates and minutes were read and some alternates seated in conference.

The standing rule of conference Bar was read and all members of the conference were seated within the Bar.

Time was set for meetings of conference. Moved and seconded we set the time 7:15-8:00 A. M. and 9:30-12:00 A. M. 1:30-4:00 P. M.

Superintendent's report read and accepted.

Assistant Superintendent's report read and accepted.

Reception Committee presented to the conference, Rev. and Mrs. Dewey Benedict, Rev. and Mrs. James Cunningham, Rev. Roy Hill, Rev. Lee A. Burgess, Rev. and Mrs. Carl Hall, Rev. R. W. Wolfe, Rev. and Mrs. J. A. Rook, Miss Elsie Roberts, Rev. Allison, Rev. DeBurger, Rev. and Mrs. William Gerbig, Rev. Mary Gursky, Mr. and Mrs. Joe

Kelley. Moved and seconded Rev. R. W. Wolfe be given a seat in the conference Bar. Carried.

Moved and seconded the conference accept the transfer of Rev. Carl Hall, Rev. Authur Scott, Ida Barber, Rev. William Gerbig, Rev. J. A. Rook, and Rev. James Cunningham.

The District Superintendent presented to the conference three new churches. Paris, Rev. R. L. Goodman, pastor, Newport, Rev. C. B. McCain, pastor, and Livermore, Rev. William Gerbig, pastor.

Moved and seconded the conference accept the new churches. Carried.

Moved and seconded we recess until 1:30 sitting.

At the 1:30 sitting Rev. F. M. McNurlin led in singing a hymn, "He Leadeth Me." Led in prayer by Brother Staggs.

Roll call of ministers and delegates were read.

Minutes for first sitting read and accepted.

Rev. P. E. Elliott, our General youth leader, was introduced to the conference by Brother Sturk. Brother Elliott gave his testimony and was seated on the platform.

Motion carried the conference accept the transfer of Dewey Benedict from West Virginia District. Carried.

Resolution Committee reported.

(1) Motion carried we change resolution Number 1 to read: Resolved that the District Superintendent make three trips instead of two over the District per year.

(2) Motion carried we delete Number 34 from minutes.

(3) Motion carried we add to resolution No. 19 in minutes to read: Resolved that we as pastors and church boards urge the calling of our evangelist for our revival from among our Pilgrim ministers and when other ministers are called we consult the District Superintendent.

(4) Motion carried we add the word, "delegate" to resolution Number 16.

(5) Moved and seconded the church entertaining the ministerial convention not be responsible for providing meals for those attending where there is a suitable restaurant available. (Lost).

(6) Moved and seconded we refer resolution, "Resolved that no person serve on more than one committee or board where competent persons are available," back to Resolutions Committee to be revised.

(7) Motion carried that the Sunday School Service at camp be under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.

(8) Motion carried. Resolved that whereas the 1949 General Conference added the fourth year study course for ministers, also, change some of the books in the course; therefore, we recommend the conference take an offering to buy the extra books for the Education Department of the District to use.

Ways and Means Committee reported.

(1) Motion carried that we substitute for Number 1 in minutes a recommendation to read as follows: that each Sunday School of our District pay one dollar per month for a portable Tabernacle Fund. We further recommend that each Sunday School adopt the Birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the tabernacle and home missionary fund. Carried.

(2) Moved and seconded we adopt a substitute for Number 3, which reads: that each church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, and the same to be sent in by local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent traveling expense. Carried.

(3) Moved and seconded we delete Number 12. Carried.

(4) Moved and seconded we adopt a substitute for Number 20 to read: we recommend the Statistician be paid \$15.00 for services. Carried.

(5) Moved and seconded we adopt the following recommendations: We recommend: that a missionary loan fund be created for the promotion of home missions and church extension. We further recommend that our pastors urge their people to contribute to this fund by means of wills, legacies, gifts, etc., and that the district Council be given authority to supervise this fund and to determine the amount to be loaned and the amount of interest, and the Council be given authority to place all available funds in this department. Carried.

(6) Moved and seconded we adopt the recommendation whereas our district young people's department does not have a financial fund to promote its work. We recommend that each local young people's Society take a special offering each quarter to promote our district young people's treasurer. Motion carried.

Was moved and seconded that we have the election of officers at 10:00 a. m., Friday, August 5th. Motion carried.

Was moved and seconded that the conference adjourn until the 7:15 sitting of August 5th. The motion carried.

The conference was dismissed with prayer by Brother Houston.

SECOND SITTING

The conference opened on Friday morning at 7:15 with Brother Manning leading in the singing of the hymn, "When I see the Blood."

Brother Sturk spoke on the subject of "Misunderstandings"; he stressed the point that most of the heartaches of God's people come as the result of misunderstandings. He also made it clear that if we progress as we should spiritually that we must have confidence in each other and love each other.

The conference was dismissed for breakfast with prayer by Brother Drown.

At 9:30 the conference re-convened by singing the song, "Are You Washed in the Blood of the Lamb." The devotional period was continued as all members stood and a number of favorite passages of scriptures were quoted.

Brother Sturk sang, "I Won't Have to Cross Jordan Alone."

The motion was made and seconded that the order of the conference be changed so that the necessary reports could be presented before the election of the officers. The motion carried.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent; Rev. L. S. Houston was elected.

It was moved and seconded that the conference recess until after lunch.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary. J. A. Thomas was elected.

Moved and seconded we elect the District Treasurer by acclamation. Carried. Rev. Ralph Tromble was elected.

Moved and seconded Brother Carl Hall and Chester Bussa sing, "I'm on the Battlefield for my Lord." Carried.

Ballots were cast for advisory members of the Council. H. H. Barber, G. J. Tackett, and F. M. Singleton were elected.

Moved and seconded we elect the delegates to General Conference. Carried.

Ballots were cast for ministerial delegates to General Conference. Rev. C. C. Mayle, and F. M. Singleton were elected on first ballot.

Ballots were cast for lay delegates to General Conference. Mrs. E. E. Leadingham, Mary Cunningham, and Dorman Castle were elected. John Vance, Mrs. P. O. Carpenter, and Wallace Ratliff were elected as alternates.

Moved and seconded we use the plurality system for the other four ministerial delegates to General Conference, and the next four highest as alternates. Carried.

H. H. Barber, W. W. Hanks, F. W. May, and C. W. Keyes were elected as delegates; and P. O. Carpenter, R. L. Goodman, G. J. Tackett, and Robert Weedman were elected as alternates.

Moved and seconded we accept the recommendation of the council to ordain Rev. and Mrs. Merton Rundell, Carl Hall and Kenneth George. Carried.

ORDINATION SERVICE—FRIDAY, 6:00 P. M.

The Ordination Service Friday Evening at 6:00 P. M. with Rev. C. L. Oden leading in singing, "A Charge To Keep I Have."

Rev. L. W. Sturk called for the reading of the Scripture.

Rev. Ralph Tromble read from 1st Timothy 3:1-8.

Rev. F. W. May read from 2nd Timothy 4:1-8.

Rev. L. W. Sturk gave a splendid message from the Book of Ruth, using for the main points, (1) Parting of the way. One girl leaving the picture never to be heard of any more. (2) The other girl made the decision to take the way regardless of the trials and tests.

(2) Gleaning in the Fields of Boaz. She was true to her trust. She gleaned with sorrow and tears, she gleaned under the watchful eye of Boaz.

We further recommend: that the sum be equally divided, provided the pastor and delegate does not go to Conference together.

7. We recommend: That whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, we recommend: that each church owning a lot, make strenuous efforts to raise the funds and build a cabin this year. We further recommend: that each individual owning a lot put forth a special effort to build.

8. We recommend: That we adopt the system of raising Foreign Missionary money requested by the General Board as follows: That each church have a weekly prayer service and that a Missionary Rally be held monthly on the Lord's Day, and at this service an offering be taken for Foreign Missions, same to be forwarded to the District Treasurer.

9. We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send 10 per cent of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, exception being made to the Building Fund, Evangelist, General Obligations, and Special Offerings.

10. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to each local church quarterly statements showing amounts due in each department.

11. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid \$150.00 per year, and the District Secretary be paid \$75.00, same to be paid in equal monthly payments.

12. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be \$2400.00 per year, that he be granted two weeks vacation with pay; also that he be paid 4c per mile for traveling expenses.

13. We recommend: That Assistant Superintendent be allowed actual expense for meals bought while working in District work.

14. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the

church, and this to be taken care of at the first visit of the Superintendent.

15. We recommend: That the following yearly budget for general funds of \$4.00 per member for the General Church Fund be divided as follows: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Home Missions, \$1.00; General Administration Expense, \$1.00. That when a local church raises its General Budget allotment monthly, such church shall be granted the privilege of specifying surplus funds. In the event the local church treasurer does not allot General Budget Funds, the district treasurer do so as authorized by the General Board.

16. We recommend: That the district budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense, 50 per cent; Sinking fund, 30 per cent; District parsonage, 10 per cent; Camp budget, 5 per cent; General Conference expense, 3 per cent; Bible School, 2 per cent.

17. We recommend: That each local church send to the District Treasurer the sum equivalent to 20c per member for the Camp Evangelist offering.

18. We recommend: That whereas a Camp Meeting Association has been formed for the purpose of the promotion of the Camp, that each member continue to pay at least \$1.00 per year. This is to be a standing pledge.

19. We recommend: That all moneys be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills.

20. We recommend: That each Church take steps to raise their offerings for revivals at least 30 days before the revival begins.

21. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference, and 50 per cent for the two following years.

22. We recommend: That the Statistician be paid \$15.00 for her service.

23. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District. We further recommend: That the two Sunday School offerings taken during the camp be given to the Sunday School Committee.

24. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4 per cent of the Pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, Evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, and whereas this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter, We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church pay the equivalent of 40 per cent of the Evangelist's tithe who are members of said church, and 4 per cent of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2 per cent of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.

25. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and that 50 per cent of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the fortieth annual conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Kentucky District, now in session:

Christian Greetings in the name of our ever-living Lord and Saviour with inexpressible thankfulness to God, we have gathered together today on God's eight acres in the capacity of another annual District Conference not only to do business for God but also to share his presence and blessing as well as the fellowship of those of kindred faith.

In our individual lives we have been kept by the power of God. We have had a very deep consciousness of his smile, his protection and his assistance as we have endeavored to carry on in the capacity in which it has fallen our lot.

The past year has brought many changes to our world and many of them have effected the church in some way or measure. Among the changes one has been the home going of one of our ministers, Rev. S. R. Maddox.

This has been a very strenuous year with many problems and burdens, yet, we have found Him faithful who said, "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee."

We have tried, by God's help, to deal fairly with every problem and to show the Spirit of Christ at all times and under all circumstances.

We will endeavor to report for the following churches:

Ashland I has installed gas floor furnace.

Ashland II built front concrete porch.

Aspen Grove installed coal furnace and small basement with other improvements.

Carlisle built Sunday School room, redecorated and paid \$1,000.-00 on indebtedness. They have had a splendid gain in their attendance.

Carrollton has built a lovely pulpit stand with other improvements.

Central City has made some progress under the leadership of their new pastor, Robert Kelley.

Clay has made splendid progress. They have stuccoed church, have had a good gain in Sunday School, added members to church and are now building a new parsonage with basement and Sunday School rooms.

Cloverport installed part of bath room.

Covington I painted interior of church and Sunday School rooms, painted front of church, improved parsonage with walks and retaining wall.

Cynthiana has laid new floor, painted and papered church, sanded floor and put in new platform.

Elizabethtown has redecorated interior of church, installed large neon sign with words "Jesus Saves," installed new pews.

Erlanger has installed lavatory in church basement, painted basement, built partitions and set out evergreens for parsonage.

Frankfort has installed two gas floor furnaces, a large exhaust fan in church, retaining wall behind parsonage, papered Sunday School rooms and redecorated parsonage.

Fullerton has beautified the church premises by grading with other improvements.

Falmouth has redecorated interior of church and painted exterior.

Garvin Hill has had a good increase in attendance in Sunday

School, has built large Sunday School room to church and redecorated interior of church.

Greenup redecorated parsonage.

Hitchins has improved parsonage and outbuildings and painted Sunday School bus.

Hopewell has redecorated interior and exterior of church and built lovely pulpit stand.

Kingswood has redecorated interior of parsonage, had the greatest revival in many years.

Latonia has installed new steel furnace and new rug for church platform.

Lexington has finished parsonage, also church auditorium and most of concrete floor in basement, with 100% gain in membership. Purchased Sunday School bus.

Louisville has liquidated their church indebtedness of \$2800.00 and are making plans now to redecorate interior of church.

Maysville has installed three gas floor furnaces, have done some plumbing and made a splendid gain in membership.

McAndrews has refinished and redecorated interior of church and installed new pews.

Olive Hill has papered parsonage, redecorated interior of church and installed new lights.

Owensboro has purchased seven room parsonage with extra lot, also church lot and at this time they are building church and eight Sunday School rooms.

Pikeville, in spite of their great loss on December 29, of their church and parsonage by fire are now rebuilding both a brick church and parsonage. God is helping them.

Pleasureville, under the leadership of their fine pastor, Brother Staggs, is making excellent progress. They have had almost a continual revival this year. Have had a large gain in Sunday School and membership. They have built a lovely \$7500.00 six room parsonage with bath which would be a credit to any church. They have built three large basement Sunday School rooms. Their debt is very small. They have purchased piano.

Rush purchased Sunday School bus. They are increasing in Sunday School attendance and things look encouraging.

Salem has covered church with white asbestos shingles, painted exterior of parsonage and built front concrete porch, also papered parsonage.

Soldier has papered parsonage with other improvements.

Toler purchased Sunday School bus which has added good numbers to their Sunday School.

Tram is building a lovely six room parsonage.

Trace is making progress.

Tyrone has redecorated interior of parsonage.

Wheelwright has purchased two lots and plan to build new church.

Willard has made some minor improvements.

We have added two church buildings to our number this year, Barterville and Livermore. Both buildings given to us and four parsonages have been or are being built. Same located at Pikeville, Pleasureville, Clay and Tram. We have opened two works, Newport and one in Leslie County near Hyden.

We have organized three churches, Livermore with eight members, Paris, eighteen members and Newport with twelve.

We have had a nice lot donated to us in Leslie County and hope to build yet this Fall. We are still hoping to get in at least a basement church in Paris this Fall.

We have made a substantial payment on our District parsonage, built four new cabins and office building on camp ground with some walks, set forty small trees on camp ground.

We have secured 25 subscriptions to Advocate, participated in 14 communion services, prayed with 42 for healing, traveled 34,694 miles, received salary in full, conducted 5 revivals, tithe donations from pastors \$54.26, made 264 calls, prayed in 186 homes, or hospitals, dedicated 16 children, had 4 weddings, 2 funerals, preached 254 times, conducted 44 quarterly meetings, conducted 40 annual meetings, attended 1 General Board meeting, 1 District Superintendent's Conference, presided over 1 Ministerial Convention, 1 District Council Meeting and spent 32 days on the camp ground.

In the midst of all my work I have tried to keep conscious of the fact that I was working for the King. I have deeply appreciated my district council, my ministerial brethren and all the laity. It has been through their co-operation that we have moved forward.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 foot front and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8 foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The Camp Meeting Board holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary and the owner is to pay the expenses of the same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on metal roofs. The Camp Meeting Board is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fee, \$5.00 and work assigned. \$10.00 and no work assigned. Children under ten years old will be registered free. Children ten to fourteen for half price. Sunday breakfast and supper twenty-five cents. All other meals fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

NOTE: Registration for the "Dormitory Rooms" to begin at Thursday noon, before camp, using the "first come, first served" method; workers for camp preparation to be given priority to rooms in dormitory.
