CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

The forty-first annual conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in the tabernacle on August 3, 1950, at 7:15 A. M., with our District Superintendent, Rev. L. S. Houston in charge.

The service opened with an old fashion family alter prayer meeting. After being led in prayer by various members of the conference, many precious promises from God's word were quoted and testimonies of praise were given by God's people.

We recessed for breakfast. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. L. S. Houston.

The conference reconvened at 8:45 A. M. Rev. C. L. Oden led the congregation in singing that wonderful old hymn "The Haven of Rest." We were led in prayer by Rev. S. M. Stikeleather. Our General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk, was presented to the conference. Rev. Sturk requested prayer for all the general men and leaders in our church that God may keep them and help them in carrying on the great cause of God's Kingdom.

The scripture was read from Matthew 17:17-21.

Rev. Sturk brought out the following thoughts which were in the scripture: (1) The pitiful condition of the child. (2) The impotence of the Disciples. (3) The pertinent question of the Disciples. (4) The power of the infinite Christ. (5) The price of power.

Rev. Sturk used for his subject "The call to prayer." He stated that the General Conference thought the best way to have an old fashion revival was by fasting and prayer; therefore, the General Conference set the example by setting Friday of each week as a day of fasting and prayer. Our church, as a whole, has moved forward for God as a result of fasting and prayer. The call to prayer brings to our mind that: there must be a great need, a burden for souls, and that God will hear and answer our prayer.

After the message, the congregation sang "Revive Us Again."

Roll call of all ministers and delegates were read.

Since the General Conference passed that the licensed Deaconess have no vote in the conference, it was moved and seconded that the conference give the licensed Deaconess an honorary seat in conference. Carried.

Motion made that the standing rule concerning the conference bar be rescinded. Carried. Motion made that the first eight seats across the tabernacle, including the platform, be the conference bar. Carried.

All members were called within conference bar.

Moved and seconded the sittings of the conference would be set at 7:15-8:00 A. M., 9:30-12:00, and 1:30-4:00 P. M.

Moved and seconded the Superintendent appointed a camp conference reporter.

The District Superintendent appointed Mrs. C. F. Long as reporter.

Superintendent report read and accepted.

Assistant Superintendent report read and accepted.

The Superintendent appointed Miss Jenny V. Vincent to assist Mrs. F. M. Singleton on the auditing committee.

A new church of Barterville was presented to the conference.

Moved and seconded, we received the Barterville church in the conference.

The Reception committee presented to the conference Rev. and Mrs. R. E. Bell, Rev. and Mrs. F. W. Gibbs, Rev. and Mrs. Denver

Musser, Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Van Curler, Rev. and Mrs. Clifford Richardson, Mr and Mrs. James Stern, Jack Conn, James Priest, Romie Edgill, Rev. and Mrs. C. L. Locher, Mr. and Mrs. David Dehner, Sister Withrow, Mrs. Eversole, Leon Neal, Mrs. Dora E. Carver, and Mr. Rodney Turner.

Moved and seconded, Rev. and Mrs. Denver Musser be given an honorary seat in conference bar. Carried.

Moved and seconded, the conference accepted the transfer of Rev. Robert E. Bell from the Illinois District and he be given a seat in conference bar. Carried.

Rev. L. S. Houston, our District Superintendent, took the chair in the absence of our General Superintendent.

Resolution Committee Reported

Motion carried we delete resolutions No. 17, 29, 47, 56, and 58 from the minutes.

Moved and seconded, we adopt the following resolution, resolved, whereas it works such hardships on the church entertaining the ministerial convention. We move that those attending the ministerial convention go to the restaurants to buy their meals.

We recessed for dinner. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. L. S. Houston.

Conference reconvened at 1:30 P. M. Led in prayer by Rev. Walter Duncan.

A request was made that Rev. L. W. Sturk sing, "I Won't Have to Cross Jordan Alone."

The discussion on the resolution concerning the meals at the Ministerial convention continued. After various discussions, it was moved and seconded we refer this resolution back to the committee for redrafting. Carried.

Moved and seconded the following resolution be adopted. Be it resolved that a missionary committee be elected or appointed. The duty of this committee shall be to encourage the organization and development of local missionary societies, and help to direct their activities in the interest of Foreign, General, and District Home Missions.

Moved and seconded the following amendment be added: The work of this committee be under the general supervision of the District Council. Carried.

Moved and seconded we adopt the resolution as amended. Carried.

Moved and seconded we rescind the resolution. Carried.

Moved and seconded we drop the word appointed, and an amendment "elected by the conference be added." Amendment lost.

Moved and seconded an amendment be added. A committee of three be appointed by the District Council. Carried.

Moved and seconded we adopt the resolution with the amendments to read: Be it resolved that a missionary committee of three be appointed by the District Council. The duty of this committee shall be to encourage the organization and development of local missionary societies, and help to direct their activities in the interest of Foreign, General and District Home Missions, and this committee be under the General supervision of the District Council. Carried.

Moved and seconded, we adopt the resolution. Resolved that the District council be given power to rezone the churches when necessary. Carried.

Moved and seconded we adopt resolution. Be it resolved that a full time District Sunday School Supervisor be elected or appointed. The duties of this supervisor shall be to contact every Sunday School in the District conducting Sunday School revivals, Teachers Training

Courses, Daily Vacation Bible Schools, and organizing home visitation groups, also helping in Sunday School work wherever needed when it is possible. This Supervisor shall be amendable to the District Council. Motion lost.

Moved and seconded we change the date of our annual conference to the following Monday after camp. Motion lost.

Moved and seconded we adopt the resolution: Be it resolved that the pastors of this conference encourage their congregation to observe the Friday of fasting and prayer as recommended by our General Board and Conference. Carried.

Moved and seconded we adopt resolution. Be it resolved that all minutes be closed during the election of our District office. Motion tabled.

Adjourn by expiration of time. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. Denver Musser.

RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make three trips over the District during the year, and give more time to the smaller churches as needed.

2. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be consulted and present if possible, when drawing up all deeds in the District, and see that all deeds be abstracted.

3. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a Statistician for the next year.

4. Resolved: That the Assistant Superintendent be a member of our Zone Bible School Board.

Council

5. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan.

6. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Convention and said date to be recorded in the minutes.

7. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years of their existence, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.

8. Resolved: That we, as a Conference, delegate to the Council, power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, and the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; same to be printed in the minutes.

9. Resolved: That the District Council make provision for the planting of more shade trees on the Camp grounds.

10. Resolved: That a Missionary Committee of three be appointed by the District Council. The duty of this committee shall be to encourage the organization and development of local missionary societies, and help to direct their activities in the interest of Foreign, General, and District Home Missions.

11. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to re-zone the churches of the district when necessary.

Churches

12. Resolved: That each church supply the Camp with two each of the following: Cups, plates, glasses, large spoons, sheets, straw ticks, cereal dishes and one pitcher.

13. Resolved: That each church close its books on the last day of each month, and the reports be sent to the District Treasurer immediately.

14. Resolved: That each preacher and deaconess send a copy of their reports to the Statistician, not later than five days after the Conference year closes, which is the 30th day of June; and that the Statistician disregard any and all reports received thereafter. Be it also resolved: that the District Treasurer's books close at noon on the tenth day of July.

15. Resolved: That each church send ten quarts of food to the camp.

16. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors have not received sufficient financial support, be it resolved that each local church appoint one prayer-meeting night each month as "Donation Night," at which time food stuff and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: that an agitator be appointed for the coming year by the Superintendent at the Annual Business Meeting.

17. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the Pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, be it therefore resolved: that the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor, shall continue over the two Sundays he attends said Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

18. Resolved: That each church provide cottages on the camp ground for their pastor and delegate, and that other members of the district be urged to build for their personal use.

19. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of collecting tithes and offerings.

20. Resolved: That we, as pastors and church boards, urge the calling of our Evangelist, for our revivals, from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and when other ministers are called we consult the District Superintendent.

21. Resolved: That we immediately strive for at least four new churches in the Kentucky District this year.

Sunday School

22. Resolved: That each Sunday School correctly enroll each class, said enrollment to be revised quarterly.

23. Resolved: That each zone have a Sunday School Attendance Banner to be given quarterly to the Sunday School having the largest attendance; also an offering banner given to the Sunday School having the largest offerings.

24. Resolved: That we provide for a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Convention. We further recommend that the Superintendent or representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in Sunday School meetings in the local church.

25. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School other than their own this year.

26. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.

27. Resolved: That the Sunday School Service at camp be under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.

Young People

28. Resolved: That we have a District Young People's Convention beginning on Thursday before Camp, at 7:30 p. m. The day services of Friday and Saturday to be devoted to Young People's Work. Be it further resolved: that the District Council appoint a president in each zone who shall create interest among the Young People; conduct quarterly zone rallies; and work directly under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the Young People's Executive Secretary.

29. Resolved: That we have a Young People's Official Directory posted in front of our minutes.

Zones

30. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in the minutes.

District Home Missions

31. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory Members to be chosen from the Ordained Ministers by the Council.

Credentials

32. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; and in that case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.

33. Resolved: That those pursuing the Study Course send for their home study course early in the year, forwarding with their request 25c to cover the cost of questions and postage for each subject.

Pastor

34. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible convenience.

35. Resolved: That each pastor of our District make a special effort to place a current manual in the home of each member of our church.

36. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each "Advocate Subscriber," with the date of expiration, said book to be transferred to the following pastor.

37. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals of his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church and the District Superintendent and that no pastor hold a revival away from his church within thirty days after a revival in his own church; then not more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

38. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Condolence Committee immediately following the funeral.

39. Resolved: That every active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

40. Resolved: That the telephone number be included with the address in the Directory of Pastoral Appointments.

Ministers

41. Resolved: That each Minister who has not been supporting financially that church of which he is a member, do so this year.

42. Resolved: That each Minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance, to the District Council.

43. Resolved: That whereas Ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and whereas there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: that the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.

44. Resolved: That an information blank be filled out by ministers that cannot attend the Conference, said blank to be furnished by the District.

Conference

45. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without its permission.

46. Resolved: That no church elect a Delegate to our District Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.

47. Resolved: That the Conference convene on Thursday morning, last week of the Camp.

48. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the church and district, also that we send someone other than the pastor's wife as delegate to conference when possible.

Camp

49. Resolved: That the date of our Camp be set for the last Thursday in July, this to be a permanent date.

50. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, same to be presented at the dining room door.

51. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, our registered nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: that the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

52. Resolved: That the lunch stand remain closed until twenty minutes after the close of the altar call.

53. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:

A. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who come to Camp shall abide by its every rule.

B. Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 10 p. m.

C. A Dean shall be appointed over each Dormitory when necessary.

D. No single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7 p. m.

E. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge, and any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

F. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

G. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the camp ground.

H. A Supervisor shall be appointed for the dining room and kitchen; parking of cars and care of the tabernacle; for the lunch and book room; for registration and cleaning of the grounds. These to be appointed by the Camp Meeting committee.

54. Resolved: That we have the registration for the Dormitory Rooms to begin at Thursday noon before Camp, using the "first come, first serve" method. Workers for camp preparation be given priority to rooms in Dormitory.

55. Resolved: That all preachers give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing the Camp grounds, or in preparation for the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

56. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on the Camp ground during Camp meeting. Be it resolved: that a fund be established to provide, with the thought of adding to, a supervised playground.

57. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mattresses for their cabin.

58. Resolved: That the Camp Meeting Committee meet at the Ministerial Convention and plan for the preparing of the Camp Ground for Camp and appoint capable persons to carry out the work of the Camp.

Miscellaneous

59. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

60. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

Minutes

61. Resolved: That we have 700 copies of the District Minutes printed to sell for 25c per copy.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School of our district pay one dollar per month for a portable tabernacle fund. We further recommend that each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the tabernacle and Home Missionary funds.

2. We recommend: That each Church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, and the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

3. We recommend: That the statistician be paid \$15.00 for services.

4. We recommend: That a missionary loan fund be created for the promotion of Home Missions and Church Extension. We further recommend that our pastors urge their people to contribute to this fund by means of wills, legacies, gifts, etc., and that the District Council be given authority to supervise this fund, and to determine the amount to be loaned, and the amount of interest, and the Council be given authority to place all available funds in this department.

5. We recommend: That each local Young People's Society take a special offering each quarter to promote our district Young People's work.

6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife; also the church delegate to the District Conference; this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual business meeting, and also an offering be taken for their traveling expense.

7. We Recommend: That whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, we recommend that each church or individual owning a lot, make strenuous efforts to raise funds and build a cabin this year.

8. We recommend: That each church have a missionary prayer service each month; and also a monthly missionary service on the Lord's Day, and an offering be taken at this service for Foreign Missions.

9. We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send 10 per cent of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, exception being made to the Building Fund, Evangelist, General Obligations, and Special Offerings.

10. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to each local church quarterly statements showing amounts due in each department.

11. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid \$150.00 per year, and the District Secretary be paid \$75.00, same to be paid in equal monthly payments.

12. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be \$2400.00 per year, that he be granted two weeks' vacation with pay; also that he be paid 4c per mile for traveling expenses.

13. We recommend: That Assistant Superintendent be allowed actual expense for meals bought while working in District work.

14. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and this to be taken care of at the first visit of the Superintendent.

15. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the General Conference, our General Budget be \$5.50 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions \$2.00, General Church Extension, \$1.00; General Administrative Expense, \$1.00; General Church Extension Loan Fund, \$.50; Senior Church School, \$.75; and the General Sunday School, \$.25.

16. We recommend: That the district budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense, 50 per cent; Sinking fund, 30 per cent; District parsonage, 10 per cent; Camp budget, 5 per cent; General Conference expense, 3 per cent; Bible School, 2 per cent.

17. We recommend: That each local church send to the District Treasurer the sum equivalent to 20c per member for the Camp Evangelist offering.

18. We recommend: That whereas a Camp Meeting Association has been formed for the purpose of the promotion of the Camp, that each member continue to pay at least \$1.00 per year. This is to be a standing pledge.

19. We recommend: That all moneys be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills.

20. We recommend: That each Church take steps to raise their offerings for revivals at least 30 days before the revival begins.

21. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference, and 50 per cent for the two following years.

22. We recommend: That the Statistician be paid \$15.00 for her service.

23. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District. We further recommend: That the two Sunday School offerings taken during the camp be given to the Sunday School Committee.

24. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4 per cent of the Pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, Evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, and whereas this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter, We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church pay the equivalent of 40 per cent of the Evangelist's tithe who are members of said church, and 4 per cent of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2 per cent of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.

25. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and that 50 per cent of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

SECOND SITTING

Conference opened at 7:15 A. M. Friday by singing "What A Friend We Have in Jesus." Led in prayer by Rev. C. C. Mayle.

Rev. L. W. Sturk urged the Kentucky Pilgrims to stay spiritual and to take their liberty and freedom in the Holy Ghost.

Auditing Committee report was read and accepted.

Recessed for breakfast. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. Sturk.

Conference reconvened at 9:30 A. M. Opened by singing "Amazing Grace." Led in prayer by C. B. McCain.

Rev. Sturk brought a message, "Three reasons why we must see the need of call to prayer or an old fashion revival: (1) Our survival in our church depends on this, (2) We must set a good example and (3) Because of the tragedy of this hour.

The means of bringing a mighty revival about: (1) Employing an evangelist who carries a burden for souls, (2) Encourage revival in our Sunday School, (3) Young people leader give altar call frequently, (4) Stress the need of the doctrine of entire sanctification in our church, (5) Encourage the continuance of family altars with our children, and (6) Encourage personal evangelism.

Statistician report read and accepted.

Reception Committee presented to conference: Mrs. Hazel Young, Mrs. Nettie Schmock, Rev. and Mrs. Roy Turner, Rev. and Mrs. A. L. Keyes, Mr. Tommy McClainhan, and Mr. Daniels.

Treasurer's report read and accepted with thanksgiving.

Camp meeting treasurer's report read and accepted.

Sunday School Committee's report read and accepted.

Condolence Committee report read and accepted.

The entire congregation stood in silent prayer in memory of our dear Bro. Walker, who has gone on to Heaven, and the congregation sang the old hymn, "I Will Meet You In The Morning."

RESOLUTION COMMITTEE

Moved and seconded the adoption of the following resolution: Be it resolved, whereas it works a hardship on the church entertaining the Ministerial Convention. We move that those attending the Ministerial Convention go to restaurants and buy their meals where facilities are possible.

Moved and seconded after the disposal of the above resolution, we receive the invitation to the ministerial convention. Carried.

Moved and seconded that an amendment be added at the time the invitation be given for the Ministerial Convention. The pastor states as to his choice of entertaining the convention. Carried.

Motion with its amendment was lost.

Reception Committee presented to the conference Dr. D. E. Wilson and Rev. Clayton Bowling.

Moved and seconded Dr. Wilson be given a seat in conference bar. Carried.

Invitations for Ministerial Convention were given.

Frankfort and Latonia extended invitations. Latonia was the conference choice.

Moved and seconded the Missionary Committee immediately strive for the quota of two new churches this year.

Moved and seconded we adopt the amendment: we change the word from two new churches to four new churches. Carried.

Moved and seconded we adopt the resolution with the amendment. Carried.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Substitutes were offered for recommendations Nos. 6, 7, 8, and 15. Substitute for No. 6.—Moved and seconded we adopt: that each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife, also the church delegates to the District Conference, this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual business meeting, and also an offering be taken for their traveling expenses.

Substitute for No. 7.—Moved and seconded we adopt: that whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, we recom-

mend that each church or individual owning a lot, make strenuous efforts to raise funds and build a cabin this year.

Substitute for No. 8.—Moved and seconded we adopt: that each church have a missionary prayer service each month, and also a monthly missionary service on the Lord's Day, and an offering be taken at this service for Foreign Missions.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Fortieth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Kentucky District, now in session: Greetings in the name of Him who loved us and gave himself for us.

While we assemble today in the capacity of another District Conference. We see the war clouds gathering in their fury which causes us to feel we are facing times that are perilous; all this makes the outlook dark. But we praise God for the consciousness we have that the uplook is bright. It would seem the coming of the Lord draweth nigh.

We have never enjoyed working for the Lord and the Church more than we have this year, and while the burdens have been heavy and the problems numerous, God has given us victory. We have had the best of fellowship with the brethren, and have deeply appreciated working with our council. Our labor together has been without a cross.

We will endeavor at this time to give a report for the following churches.

Ashland I has remodeled Sunday School rooms, installed a hot water heater in the parsonage, and poured large retaining wall, with a substantial gain in membership.

Ashland II has painted and papered interior of parsonage, painted exterior, covered parsonage with white asbestos shingles, redecorated and waterproofed Sunday School rooms in basement, purchased new song books, and installed book holders on seats. Had a splendid gain in membership in Sunday School. The pastor received a raise in salary.

Barterville has roofed their church and built new chimney. They have organized there with seven members.

Carlisle has built pulpit stand, sanded floors, with other improvements. They have made splendid progress this year.

Carrollton has made some improvements in parsonage and church basement.

Clay has built parsonage on basement rooms built last year, making eight rooms and bath room, with only a small indebtedness.

Covington I has roofed parsonage. Also papered and redecorated parsonage and had a good gain in membership.

Cloverport painted interior of church and has almost liquidated their indebtedness.

Cynthiana has papered a part of parsonage. Also have done some painting. They have had a gain in membership and a splendid increase in Sunday School attendance.

Elizabethtown is now completing a lovely parsonage with seven rooms, bath, and a full basement. Some improvements have been made on the church, with an excellent gain in membership.

Erlanger has added two lovely rooms to parsonage and covered entire parsonage with white asbestos shingles. They have gained in membership.

Frankfort has built a beautiful 40 by 60 ft. church with nine Sunday School rooms in basement, with public rest rooms; also a water fountain and nursery. They are remodeling old church into six apartments. New church dedication set for August 20, 1950.

Falmouth has made some improvements on church by building two Sunday School rooms on rear. Has also improved parsonage. The church has made a gain in membership with a large gain in Sunday School. They have liquidated parsonage indebtedness.

Garvin Hill painted church and parsonage roofs, laid hardwood floors in new annex to church, with no debt, and made a good gain in membership.

Greenup has redecorated interior of church and Sunday School rooms.

Hitchins has painted interior of church, sanded floors, covered platforms with lovely carpets, installed new lights, and are now planning Sunday School building 20 x 40 ft. with a gain in membership and Sunday School.

Hopewell has made some improvements around the church with an excellent gain in membership.

Kingswood—installed sink and cabinet in parsonage and some papering with a gain in Sunday School.

Latonia—improved parsonage by papering. They have made a good gain in Sunday School, also membership, with a good increase in pastor's salary.

Lexington finished basement, installed electric pump, built new pews with upholstering, sanded floors, purchased lovely curtains with beautiful wine drapes, purchased two new chairs for the platform, 56% gain in Sunday School, with a good substantial gain in membership.

Louisville—painted interior of church, sanded floors and built Sunday School rooms in basement, and had excellent gain in membership.

Livermore—is marching on for a young church. We have some loyal Pilgrims there.

Maysville—painted interior of church and had a splendid gain in membership and in Sunday School, and papered part of parsonage.

McIntosh has built a new church 20 by 40 feet. Also have purchased new pews with less than seventy dollars indebtedness. It was our privilege to dedicate their lovely church July 23, 1950. They are making progress.

McAndrews has passed through financial darkness due to the coal situation, but have had some increase in membership.

Newport—God has graciously blessed our new work. Membership and Sunday School have both had an increase. We are dealing at this time for a church building which we occupy at the present.

Olive Hill has made a substantial increase in membership and they are planning to build on rear of church several rooms, which may be used for either parsonage or Sunday School rooms. They have sold their parsonage by consent of District Council.

Owensboro has completed a lovely church 32 by 70 feet, stone coated, tile floor, and seven Sunday School rooms. For the past four years they have been going through a crisis. They need our prayers.

Preston—Sister Mary Gerskey and her co-workers, Sister Louise Hamilton who came to us from the Wesleyan Church last conference in June, deeded their lovely little church and three Sunday School rooms in rear to our District. They are making good progress.

Pikeville has completed their church basement, have installed lovely seats, furnaces, and purchased a piano. They have increased in membership.

Paris has built a beautiful brick veneer basement 40 by 60 feet. It has art glass windows. This building is under roof and is a credit to any District.

Pleasureville has built Sunday School rooms in basement, installed venetian shades in all the parsonage, built large cistern, and installed electric fan in church; also has screened the church.

Soldier has improved parsonage by painting and papering. It has some increase in membership; also has increase in Sunday School.

Tram is building a six room parsonage, but due to coal situation and working conditions have been unable to complete same. Pray for Tram.

Tyrone has made some improvements by painting and remodeling.

Willard has built a chimney to Church. It has made other improvements on parsonage. They have some increase in Sunday School and in membership.

We have opened a very promising work in Augusta, with a good Sunday School. We have a church building there with lovely seats, newly decorated and five rooms in basement for Sunday School. This work is under leadership of Rev. Millard Smart.

Under the leadership of Rev. Claude Sexton of Wheelwright, we have a work opened at Melvin, Ky. We are having around fifty in Sunday School.

In Trimble County near Milton we have opened a work which is being carried on in a cottage. We have one-half acre of land deeded to us for a new church. This work is under the leadership of Rev. Lucian Mahony and Rev. Brown.

At this time we have a lot purchased near Somerset clear of debt, with around \$100.00 on a new church building. Rev. and Mrs. H. B. Mitchell have cancelled their evangelistic slate to build a Pilgrim Holiness Church in Somerset. Pray for them.

Sr. Grace Bouman, who opened the McIntosh work, has now moved over the mountain near eight miles and is now opening another work. Plans are being discussed to build another church. She is teaching school, walking about three miles across the mountain to her school. Pray for her.

Some improvements have been made in District Parsonage.

We have built two cabins on the Camp Ground, added one room to nurses cabin for hospital purposes, roofed part of dormitory, remodeled rest rooms, and other improvements.

We have secured twenty subscriptions to the Advocate, participated in thirty-five communion services, prayed with thirty-six for the healing, traveled 22,426 miles, received salary in full, conducted two revivals, tithe donations from pastors \$65.00, made two hundred ninety-four calls, prayed in one hundred sixty-four homes or hospitals, dedicated four children, preached two hundred sixty-seven times, conducted sixty-six quarterly meetings, forty annual meetings, attended two general board meetings, presided over one ministerial convention, presided over two council meetings, one Sunday School Board meeting, attended one general conference, spent twenty-nine days on Camp Ground, and dedicated one church.

The Conference year was far spent when we were placed in this office of promotional Secretary of the Sunday Schools on the Dist., hence we were unable to accomplish much of what should have been done. However we as a committee tried to promote progress in the Sunday Schools, pressing the four-star schools.

We now have forty-five (45) schools on the District. Reports show a splendid gain in weekly attendance of 294—10%.

We have reports from all but one church. Eight churches reported having conducted a D. V. B. S. with an average attendance of 45. Two churches are conducting teacher training classes. With two others planning to open one this fall. Eleven have launched a Lay Visitation Campaign and three others plan to put one on later. Nine conducted a Sunday School Revival with a total of forty-two converts.

We trust each school will endeavor to build a bigger and better one on a solid foundation.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 foot front and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The Camp Meeting Board holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary and the owner is to pay the expenses of the same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on metal roofs. The Camp Meeting Board is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fee, \$5.00 and work assigned. \$10.00 and no work assigned. Children under ten years old will be registered free. Children ten to fourteen for half price. Sunday breakfast and supper twenty-five cents. All other meals fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

NOTE: Registration for the "Dormitory Rooms" to begin at Thursday noon, before camp, using the "first come, first served" method; workers for camp preparation to be given priority to rooms in dormitory.
