50. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, same to be presented at the dining room door.

51. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, our registered nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: that the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

52. Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table and some one to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Youth News, and our Missionary Bulletins.

That all who disregard the following rules be 53. Resolved: answerable to the District Council:

All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people Α. that all who come to Camp shall abide by its every rule.

Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 11 p. m. В.

C. A Dean shall be appointed over each Dormitory.

D. No single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7 p. m.

E. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge, and any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

F. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission. G. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the camp ground.

56. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our camp ground during camp meeting. Be it resolved that a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for the supervised playground on said camp ground, using the offering from the chil-dren's service to apply on the equipment. 57. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mat-

tresses for their cabin.

That the Camp Meeting Committee meet at the 58. Resolved: Ministerial Convention and plan for the preparing of the Camp Ground for Camp and appoint capable persons to carry out the work of the Camp.

59. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

60. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

61. Resolved: Whereas there is a dissatisfaction in regards to workers for Camp preparation; Be it resolved the camp meeting committee be enlarged to twelve to take care of this work and any others who come and eat in the dining room before Thursday that they be charged the regular price for each meal until Thursday noon, unless called by the District Superintendent. Furthermore, only these workers have priority to Dormitory rooms.

Resolved: That whereas there is a need for stimulation of interest in the Home Missionary work of the District, also reports on the Sunday School attendance would be a help and of interest to the District; therefore, be it resolved that we have a District Bulletin mimeographed each month and distributed to our churches giving Sunday School attendance, also reports from our District Home Missionaries.

We recommend: That whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within five years, and in case they fail to do so, the lot to be put up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend that those who purchased lots prior to this date, be contacted by our District Superintendent, urging them to build a cabin within three years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.

4. We recommend that whereas our district home missions and church extension loan fund is being supervised by our district council, and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the amount of interest be 2% on all loans.

We further recommend that our pastors urge their people to contribute to this fund by means of wills, legacies, gifts, etc.

5. We recommend: That each local Young People's Society take a special offering each quarter to promote our district Young People's work.

We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of 6. their pastor and wife; also the church delegate to the District Con-ference; this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual business meeting, and also an offering be taken for their traveling expense.

We recommend that the District Treasurer be paid one 7. hundred fifty (\$150.00) dollars per year, and the District Secretary be paid seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments, and that the statistician be paid twenty-five

(\$25.00) dollars per year. 8. We recommend: That each church have a missionary prayer service each month; and also a monthly missionary service on the Lord's Day, and an offering be taken at this service for Foreign Missions.

We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send 9 10 per cent of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, exception being made to the Building Fund, Evangelist, General Obliga-

tion being made is formand. tions, and Special Offerings. 10 We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to the showing amounts due in each department.

We recommend that the District buy the extra books to com-11. plete those needed for the ministerial course of study.

12. We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be twenty-four hundred (\$2400.00) dollars per year, and that the District pay his utility bills, and that he be granted two weeks' vacation with pay; also that he be paid four cents per mile for traveling expense.

13. We recommend that the Assistant Superintendent be allowed expense for meals bought while working in District work, and that he be given four cents per mile for traveling expenses.
14. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary

at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and this to be taken care of at the first visit of the Superintendent.

15. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the General Conference, our General Budget be \$5.50 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions \$2.00, General Church Extension, \$1.00; General Administrative Expense, \$1.00; General Church Extension Loan Fund, \$.50; Senior Church School, \$.75; and the General Sunday School, \$.25.
16. We recommend: That the district budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's 200 per cent: Sinking fund 30 per cent.

22. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District.

We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4 per cent of the Pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, Evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, and whereas salary, Evangenst's onerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, and whereas this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter, We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church pay the equivalent of 40 per cent of the Evangelist's tithe who are members of said church, and 4 per cent of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2 per cent of salary and offerings as reported to the conference. 24. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one

Sunday each month and that 50 per cent of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

According as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world that we should be holy and without blame before him in love.

Once again we are privileged to assemble for another annual conference to hear reports of the activities of the past year and to seek the guidance of our Heavenly Father with regard to the new year we are now entering.

I have a deep feeling that this conference will be one of the most important ever held on these sacred grounds. Decisions will be made which will have far-reaching effects in the salvation of souls for years to come, if Jesus should tarry. We must not miss the mind of the spirit regardless of the cost; he is the Lord of the Harvest and we must labor under His direction.

It has been a glorious privilege to labor for Christ and the Church this year, with my splendid council and churches our fellowship has been blessed. As we bring the following report we desire that God shall have all the glory for the accomplishments.

#### New Fields

We have opened a new work at Shelbyville, a county seat, which came as the result of a Court House revival conducted by the Louisville and Frankfort pastors, Rev. H. H. Barber and J. A. Thomas. Rev. and Mrs. R. D. Christman are the pastors there; we are hoping to launch a building program soon. We have a field opened at Slemp, under the supervision of Miss Ometa Brown, who came to us from North Carolina; also Con..uence with Miss Grace Bowman as pastor. They are expecting to build a new church there. Also the New Haven Church opened and pastored by Rev. and

Also the New Haven Church opened and pastored by Rev. and Mrs. H. B. Mitchell. A work has been opened at Eastview, and a building program is soon starting.

#### Churches Organized

We have four new churches organized this year. They are the New Haven Church near Somerset with fourteen members, Preston Church with fourteen members, Augusta with eleven members, and Carlisle with fourteen members.

#### By Radio

We now have six churches broadcasting the glorious gospel by means of radio. They are as follows: Elizabethtown, Louisville, Augusta, Maysville, Pikeville, and Latonia. The results are very gratifying.

#### Properties Dedicated

We have dedicated the following properties this year: Our lovely church in Frankfort forty feet by sixty feet with full basement all in Sunday School rooms modernly equipped. Our basement church thirty-six feet by seventy-two feet, all seated; it is near Somerset and known as the New Haven Church. Our lovely modern seven room parsonage with two baths, sun parlor, and full basement at Elizabethtown. Our church and six room parsonage at Preston; our church at Newport; also our beautiful brick veneer basement church at Paris, Kentucky.

#### Special Gifts

During February, 1951, a lovely eight room home, with bath, two screened porches, full basement with large lot, all valued at ten thousand dollars, a low figure, was given us next door to our church in Carrollton for parsonage by Mrs. Hattie Webster, a great friend of our church and to our District.

#### Our Camp Ground

We have built a lovely lunch stand, three new cabins, two of them are two room, and it was presented to the District Superintendent and wife by the Kentucky District. We thank you for this lovely gift.

#### **Our Vision**

In the great state of Kentucky we see the need of many more the great state of Kentucky we see the need of many more churches, therefore, we are praying for twenty thousand dollars per year for Home Missions. This could be distributed equally to ten new fields a year; which would enable the purchasing of a lot, balance of the two thousand dollars to start a building fund. We are also praying for four portable tabernacles; we are in need of two of them at this time with these prayers answered we could add fifty churches to the Kentucky District within the next five years. Will you join us in prayer for this need? Such is possible with God and a united effort on our part, can bring such to pass.

#### **Properties Improved**

The following improvements have been made in our district:

Ashland I, reclaimed the parking lot next to church, lost a number of years ago, painted interior of church, refinished floors and woodwork, painted exterior of church, papered and painted inside of parsonage with other interior improvements, a new concrete porch, a lovely pulpit Bible was presented by Mother Simpson's family in her memory.

Ashland II, bought church lot, some outside painting and other minor improvements were made.

Aspen Grove, installed cistern pump.

Carlisle, painted interior of church, also parsonage, purchased Sunday School bus.

Carrollton, papered and painted three Sunday School rooms, pur-chased folding chairs for Sunday School rooms, laid new inlaid lino-

leum in new parsonage, redecorated parsonage. Central City, papered church, installed church bell, and papered part of parsonage.

Clay, has ceiled church, built two Sunday School rooms, installed two public rest rooms, and built garage.

Cloverport, liquidated parsonage debt. Covington I, painted exterior of church, installed gas burner, purchased a much better Sunday School bus, redecorated interior of parsonage, and painted exterior.

Lynthiana, built concrete walk and steps to church.

Dalesburg, installed electric and new fixtures, and purchased piano.

Elizabethtown, completed new parsonage, redecorated interior of church and installed large furnace.

Erlanger, sanded and refinished floors in parsonage, built concrete porch and street canopy, installed new kitchen sink and hot water tank, papered and painted part of parsonage, painted exterior of church, with other improvements.

Frankfort, redecorated part of parsonage, resanded part of floors, completed parking lot next to church, and purchased new piano, converted old church into six three-room apartments.

Fullerton, redecorated interior of church, purchased floor cover-ings, also piano for church, walks and steps have been purchased, and a lovely church sign.

Falmouth, papered parsonage, installed new bath room fixtures, painted and installed new water pipe in basement.

Garvin Hill, built twelve feet extension to rear of church, painted exterior of both church and parsonage, purchased eighteen hundred dollar Sunday School bus.

Greenup, sanded floor, and painted interior of parsonage. Hitchins, papered part of parsonage, new roof on one half of the

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parsonage, some electrical installation, new double doors in front of church, refinished floors in church, laid new runners, graded lawn, purchased new walks, and building a Sunday School building twenty feet by forty feet, two story. This is called the McNurlin Memorial Sunday School Building.

Kingswood, painted church, redecorated parsonage, graded lawn, installed shower bath with bottled gas, and purchased a hot water heater.

Latonia, purchased their own radio equipment amounting to two hundred dollars, window installed for visibility between broadcasters and engineer, purchased a beautiful tape recorder machine, have gotten lovely drapes across auditorium for broadcasting, a large fan in church, new linoleum for parsonage kitchen, private phone for extra heavy calls due to radio work and calls, and have purchased a fan for parsonage.

Lexington, stonecoated church, purchased an electric organ, built vestibule to front of church, have purchased one hundred feet sidewalk, finished opening to front of parsonage with concrete steps, built two new Sunday School rooms, painted three rooms, built rear porch, refinished downstairs in parsonage, and purchased Sunday School bus.

Louisville, papered and painted parsonage, sanded floors of par-sonage and laid versitile in kitchen.

Maysville, painted exterior of church and parsonage.

McIntosh, varnished floors and received from the Hopewell Church a beautiful pulpit stand.

Newport, laid walks and steps, installed large gas heater and fans for church with other minor improvements.

Olive Hill, has accumulated one thousand dollars toward a parsonage.

Owensboro, laid concrete floors in five Sunday School class rooms, plumbing complete for gas and heater installation, plumbing for water; also built sidewalks and graded lawn.

Paris, completed their lovely basement church which is modernly equipped with public rest rooms, nursery room and Sunday School rooms. The building has beautiful art glass windows.

Pikeville, plastered church basement, installed lighting system, covered floor with tile. They are now wishing toward going on with the church.

New Haven, installed large fan, and completed a lovely basement church. It is a credit to any district.

Pleasureville, sanded church floor and varnished same, also varnished seats, screened entire church, installed fans, painted exterior of parsonage, papered parsonage, installed kitchen pump, and liquidated all debt on parsonage.

Preston, bought parsonage, painted exterior of church and papered interior of church, painted exterior of parsonage, purchased piano, seats, installed public address system.

Rush, roofed church, laid new floor, papered and painted interior of church, built new platform and railings, all clear of debt.

Salem Ridge, papered and painted church, rebuilt pulpit and platform and papered parsonage. Tram, has covered parsonage with asbestos siding and working

toward finishing parsonage.

Tyrone, redecorated parsonage and some outside improvements.

Wheelwright, is now in the midst of building a church.

Willard, papered most of parsonage, purchased two rugs for parsonage, and also piano for church.

I'm glad to report that several pastors have received an increase in salary this year.

We present to you at this time the activities of the District Sunday School Committee for the year.

The committee again urged the Four-Star program which was extended another year by the General Office.

We now have fifty (50) Sunday Schools in the District, which We now have fifty (50) Sunday Schools in the District, which is a gain of five over last year. The severe winter seems to have cut somewhat into the records. Of those reporting, 21 Schools show a loss, making a total loss of 69. We have no report from two of the new Schools, also three of the older Schools made no report. Three Schools held their own and 18 Schools report a gain. Of those reporting, 7 Schools had a D. V. B. S. with two others planning one in August. The total average attendance was 206. Thir-teon Schools reported a Sunday School Revival with a total of 49

#### RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 foot front and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The Camp Meeting Board holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary and the owner is to pay the expenses of the same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on metal roofs. The Camp Meeting Board is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

#### RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fee, \$5.00 and work assigned. \$10.00 and no work assigned. Children under ten years old will be registered free. Children ten to fourteen for half price. Sunday breakfast and supper twenty-five cents. All other meals fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

Note: Registration for the "Dormitory Rooms" to begin at Thursday noon, before camp, using the "first come, first served" method; workers for camp preparation to be given priority to rooms in dormitory.
