After the Devotional period of the 1:30 sitting, the Sunday School Banner and Certificate was to be presented to the Sunday School making the largest per cent in gain for Conference Year. Carried.

Moved and seconded we adjourn for lunch.

Conference reconvened at 1:30 p. m. Session opened by singing, "Down At The Cross." Led in prayer by Rev. C. L. Oden.

Brillhart and Mrs. Jessie Adams to the Conference. Moved and seconded that Rev. and Mrs. Brillhart be given an honorary seat in Conference Bar and that Rev. Brillhart render a special song. Carried.

Resolution Committee. Moved and seconded we adopt the following resolutions:

1. Resolved that each zone have the election of their zone officers at the last zone meeting prior to camp, so the officers' names can be listed in the minutes. Carried.
2. Whereas there is a dissatisfaction in regards to workers for camp preparation. Be it resolved the camp meeting committee be enlarged to twelve to take care of this work and any others who come and eat in the dining room before Thursday that they be charged the regular price for each meal until Thursday noon, unless called by the District Superintendent. Furthermore, only these workers have priority to Dormitory rooms. Carried.

Ways and Means Committee reported the following:

Moved and seconded we adopt a substitute for No. 7 which reads, "we recommend that whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot, be asked to build a cabin on said lot within five years, and in case they fail to do so, the lot be put up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend that those who purchased lots prior to this date be asked to build within three years, from present date, or their lots shall be put up for resale. After discussion it was moved and seconded we refer the substitute back to the Committee. Carried.

Moved and seconded we adopt the substitute for No. 11. Carried.

Moved and seconded we adopt the substitute for Nos. 12, 13, and 23. Carried.

Moved and seconded we adopt the new resolution, which reads, "We recommend that the district buy the extra books to complete those needed for the ministerial course of study." Carried.

Reception Committee presented to the Conference, Rev. and Mrs. Mark Story of Evansville, Indiana.

Moved and seconded that Rev. and Mrs. Story be given an honorary seat in Conference Bar. Carried.

Rev. J. C. Brillhart sang, "Down Deep In The Sea."

Adjourn by expiration of time.

CONFERENCE TWO SITTING

Conference opened with prayer around the altar. After singing "Amazing Grace," Rev. L. W. Sturk continued his message on a revival.

His subject, "How to Bring About a Revival."

1. To have a revival we must realize the great objective of our church, which is winning souls and build up souls in Christ.
2. We must encourage our local church to employ Evangelists who carry a burden for souls.
3. We must encourage frequent revivals in our Sunday Schools.
4. Have our youth leaders to give altar calls to bring our youth to Christ at an early age.
5. We must emphasize in all our churches the Doctrine of entire Sanctification.
6. Encourage the need of family altars in every Pilgrim Home.

Dismissed for breakfast in prayer by Rev. L. S. Houston.

Conference reconvened at 9:30 a. m. with Bill Tromble leading in singing, "The Old Account Was Settled." Led in prayer by Rev. W. W. Hankes. Rev. L. W. Sturk read from 17th chapter of St. John and spoke on the Unity of the Saints. He spoke on four kinds of Unity: (1) Unity of Matrimony, (2) Unity of Opposition, (3) Unity of Purpose, and (4) Unity of Perfection.

Reception Committee presented Rev. Harold Penny, Mrs. Connor, Rev. and Mrs. Patton to the Conference.

Resolution Committee reported.

Moved and seconded we adopt the following resolution: Whereas there is need for stimulation of interest in the Home Missionary Work of the District, also reports on Sunday School Attendance would be a help and of interest to the District; therefore, be it resolved that we have a District Bulletin mimeographed each month or at least quarterly and distributed to our churches giving Sunday School attendance, also reports from our District Home Missionaries. Moved and seconded a Dean shall be appointed over each Dormitory. Carried.

Moved and seconded we offer a substitute for No. 56 reading, "Resolved: that whereas we have a large number of children on our camp ground during camp meeting. Be it resolved that a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for the supervised playground on said property, using the offering from the children's service to apply on the necessary equipment. Carried.

Moved and seconded the time be extended to take care of necessary business. Carried.

Moved and seconded the matter of rules and by-laws of the playground be left in hands of the council. Carried.

Dismissed for lunch.

Conference reconvened at 1:30 p. m.

Moved and seconded we accept the following recommendation as a substitute for No. 7 to read, "We recommend that whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within five years, and in case they fail to do so the lots be put up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend that those who have purchased lots prior to this date be contacted by our District Superintendent, urging them to build a cabin within three years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot. Carried.

Moved and seconded to have the election of officers at this time. Carried.

Moved and seconded we accept the recommendation for all renewals and recommendation of all Licentiates. Carried.

Rev. L. S. Houston appointed Rev. L. P. Chapin, Thomas Shirk, Kenneth George, Robert Weedman, F. M. McNurlin, D. D. Fortner and J. W. James as tellers.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent. Rev. L. S. Houston was elected on first ballot.

Ballots were cast for Assistant Superintendent. Rev. C. L. Oden was elected on first ballot.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary. J. A. Thomas was elected on first ballot.

Rev. Ralph Tromble was elected by acclamation for District Treasurer.

Ballots were cast for three (3) advisory members of council. Rev. H. H. Barber and F. B. Singleton were elected on first ballot.

Moved and seconded we vote on the two highest for third advisory member of council. Carried.

Rev. R. E. Bell was elected for third member.

Ballots cast for member of examining board. Rev. M. F. Leadingham was elected.

Ballots cast for member of education board. Rev. James Cunningham was elected.

Moved and seconded we elect the same Board of Trustees by acclamation. Carried. L. S. Houston, F. M. Singleton, and Ralph Tromble. After the election the District presented a new two room cabin to Rev. and Mrs. L. S. Houston.

Condolence Committee's report read and accepted.

Moved and seconded the Conference recommend for Ordination to the Ministry, Rev. James De Burger, Rev. R. V. Gibbs, Rev. Claude Applegate, and Rev. William Daniels. Mrs. Martha Miller and Miss Lela Newkirk as ordained Deaconesses.

Moved and seconded we extend time to hear business of Ways and Means Committee.

Be it resolved that each pastor when behind with his budget, take a special offering each month to be applied to the budget. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we adopt the recommendation, whereas we have no specified prayer rooms on camp ground,

Therefore, be it resolved that we receive donations and build two cabins, one on the east side for women and one on the west side for men, these to be according to size of a double cottage, and to be constructed of cement or cinder blocks with cement floor. Carried.

Moved and seconded a note of appreciation of all workers for camp be placed in the minutes. Carried.

CONFERENCE THREE SITTING

Conference opened with testimonies from various members of the Conference. Led in prayer by Rev. Neal Horton.

Reception Committee presented to the conference Rev. and Mrs. William Finnefrock, Mrs. Huff and Mrs. Rogers.

Resolution Committee. Resolved that we give space in the book room for a table and someone to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Youth News, and our Missionary Bulletins. Carried.

Rev. Houston presented to the Conference the following evangelists and singers: Rev. S. S. Hulette, Mrs. Anna Walker, Jenny V. Vincent, Freda Elliott, Rev. and Mrs. W. W. Hanks, James De Burger, Dewey Bennedict, Rev. and Mrs. Roy Turner, Jackie Fisher, Rev. and Mrs. Commadore Manning, Leonard Bowling, C. E. Brown, William Tromble, L. P. Chapin, Herbert Smith, S. M. Stikeleather, John Welch, Walter Lowery, and Orvan Mann.

Invitations were given for the Ministerial Convention, Lexington, Newport, and Elizabethtown extending the invitation. Lexington was the Conference choice.

Moved and seconded the chair appoint a camp reporter. Mrs. H. H. Bolender was appointed.

Moved and seconded the money for the Owensboro Church that is in the hands of the District Treasurer be transferred to the District Loan Fund. Carried.

The Banner and Certificate were presented to the Falmouth Church for the highest per cent in gain in Sunday School attendance.

Moved and seconded all unfinished business be left in the hands of District Council. Carried.

Rev. Thomas Shirk brought the Conference to close by singing those beautiful old hymns, "The Stranger of Galilee" and "Fear Thou Not" which blessed the Saints and lifted them into higher heights of the things of God.

ORDINATION SERVICE—FRIDAY, 5:15 P. M.

The Ordination Service opened Friday evening at 5:15 P. M. with Rev. C. L. Oden leading the conference in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have." Rev. L. W. Sturk called for the reading of the scripture. Rev. F. M. Singleton read from Titus, Chapter two, verses 1-8. Rev. L. S. Houston led in prayer. Rev. Ralph Tromble read from First Timothy, verses 1-8. Rev. L. W. Sturk read from Second Kings, chapter two. Rev. Sturk spoke on the Minister's (1) Call, (2) Character, (3) Qualification.

1. The Call came to a busy man. To succeed in the ministry one must have a definite call from God. A lazy man has no need in the work of the Lord.

2. His Character must be spotless without blemish. He must burn every bridge behind him and give his life as a servant for the Lord.

3. He prayed for a double portion of Elijah's spirit fall upon him. A minister must have a double portion; he must be baptised with the Holy Ghost to fit him for the ministry.

At the close of the message the Ordination Council met at the altar to ordain to the ministry, Rev. R. V. Gibbs, Rev. William Daniels, Rev. Claude Applegate, Rev. James DeBurger, and Mrs. Martha Miller and Miss Lela Newkirk as Deaconesses.

The right hand of fellowship was given to the candidates by the Conference wishing God's blessings upon their ministry.

RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make three trips over the District during the year, and give more time to the smaller churches as needed.
2. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be consulted and present if possible, when drawing up all deeds in the District, and see that all deeds be abstracted.
3. Resolved: That the Assistant Superintendent be a member of our Zone Bible School Board.

Council

5. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan.
6. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Convention and said date to be recorded in the minutes.
7. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years of their existence, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.
8. Resolved: That we, as a Conference, delegate to the Council, power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, and the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; same to be printed in the minutes.
9. Resolved: That the District Council make provision for the planting of more shade trees on the Camp grounds.
10. Resolved: That a Missionary Committee of three be appointed by the District Council. The duty of this committee shall be to encourage the organization and development of local missionary societies, and help to direct their activities in the interest of Foreign, General, and District Home Missions.
11. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to re-zone the churches of the district when necessary.

Churches

12. Resolved: That each church supply the Camp with two each of the following: Cups, plates, glasses, large spoons, sheets, straw ticks, cereal dishes and one pitcher.
13. Resolved: That each church close its books on the last day of each month, and the reports be sent to the District Treasurer immediately.
14. Resolved: That each preacher and deaconess send a copy of their reports to the Statistician, not later than five days after the Conference year closes, which is the 30th day of June; and that the Statistician disregard any and all reports received thereafter. Be it also resolved: that the District Treasurer's books close at noon on the tenth day of July.
15. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors have not received sufficient financial support, be it resolved that each local church appoint one prayer-meeting night each month as "Donation Night," at which time food stuff and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: that an agitator be appointed for the coming year by the Superintendent at the Annual Business Meeting.
16. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the Pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, be it

therefore resolved: that the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor, shall continue over the two Sundays he attends said Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

17. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of collecting tithes and offerings.

19. Resolved: That we, as pastors and church boards, urge the calling of our Evangelist, for our revivals, from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and when other ministers are called we consult the District Superintendent.

20. Resolved: That we immediately strive for at least four new churches in the Kentucky District this year.

Sunday School

21. Resolved: That each Sunday School correctly enroll each class, said enrollment to be revised quarterly.

22. Resolved: That each zone have a Sunday School Attendance Banner to be given quarterly to the Sunday School having the largest attendance; also an offering banner given to the Sunday School having the largest offerings.

23. Resolved: That we provide for a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Convention. We further recommend that the Superintendent or representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in Sunday School meetings in the local church.

24. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School other than their own this year.

25. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.

26. Resolved: That the Sunday School Service at camp be under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.

Young People

27. Resolved: That we have a District Young People's Convention beginning on Thursday before Camp, at 7:30 p. m. The day services of Friday and Saturday to be devoted to Young People's Work. Be it further resolved: that the District Council appoint a president in each zone who shall create interest among the Young People; conduct quarterly zone rallies; and work directly under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the Young People's Executive Secretary.

28. Resolved: That we have a Young People's Official Directory posted in front of our minutes.

Zones

29. Resolved that each zone have the election of their zone officers at the last zone meeting prior to camp, so the officer's name can be listed in the minutes.

30. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in the minutes.

District Home Missions

31. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory Members to be chosen from the Ordained Ministers by the Council.

Credentials

32. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; and in that case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.

33. Resolved: That those pursuing the Study Course send for their home study course early in the year, forwarding with their request \$1.00 to cover the cost of questions and postage for each subject.

Pastor

34. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible convenience.

35. Resolved: That each pastor of our District make a special effort to place a current manual in the home of each member of our church.

36. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each "Advocate Subscriber," with the date of expiration, said book to be transferred to the following pastor, and that he endeavor to keep a subscription list equal his membership.

37. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals of his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church and the District Superintendent and that no pastor hold a revival away from his church within thirty days after a revival in his own church; then not more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

38. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Condolence Committee immediately following the funeral.

39. Resolved: That every active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

40. Resolved: That the telephone number be included with the address in the Directory of Pastoral Appointments.

Ministers

41. Resolved: That each Minister who has not been supporting financially that church of which he is a member, do so this year.

42. Resolved: That each Minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance, to the District Council.

43. Resolved: That whereas Ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and whereas there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: that the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.

44. Resolved: That an information blank be filled out by ministers that cannot attend the Conference, said blank to be furnished by the District.

Conference

45. Resolved: That no one leaves the Conference without its permission.

46. Resolved: That no church elect a Delegate to our District Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.

47. Resolved: That the Conference convene on Thursday morning, last week of the Camp.

48. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the church and district, also that we send someone other than the pastor's wife as delegate to conference when possible.

Camp

49. Resolved: That the date of our Camp be set for the last Thursday in July, this to be a permanent date.

50. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, same to be presented at the dining room door.

51. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, our registered nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: that the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

52. Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table and some one to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Youth News, and our Missionary Bulletins.

53. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:

A. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who come to Camp shall abide by its every rule.

B. Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 11 p. m.

C. A Dean shall be appointed over each Dormitory.

D. No single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7 p. m.

E. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge, and any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

F. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

G. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the camp ground.

H. A Supervisor shall be appointed for the dining room and kitchen; parking of cars and care of the tabernacle; for the lunch and book room; for registration and cleaning of the grounds. These to be appointed by the Camp Meeting committee.

54. Resolved: That we have the registration for the Dormitory Rooms to begin at Thursday noon before Camp, using the "first come, first serve" method. Workers for camp preparation be given priority to rooms in Dormitory.

55. Resolved: That all preachers give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing the Camp grounds, or in preparation for the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

56. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our camp ground during camp meeting. Be it resolved that a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for the supervised playground on said camp ground, using the offering from the children's service to apply on the equipment.

57. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mattresses for their cabin.

58. Resolved: That the Camp Meeting Committee meet at the Ministerial Convention and plan for the preparing of the Camp Ground for Camp and appoint capable persons to carry out the work of the Camp.

Miscellaneous

59. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

60. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

61. Resolved: Whereas there is a dissatisfaction in regards to workers for Camp preparation; Be it resolved the camp meeting committee be enlarged to twelve to take care of this work and any others who come and eat in the dining room before Thursday that they be charged the regular price for each meal until Thursday noon, unless called by the District Superintendent. Furthermore, only these workers have priority to Dormitory rooms.

62. Resolved: That whereas there is a need for stimulation of interest in the Home Missionary work of the District, also reports on the Sunday School attendance would be a help and of interest to the District; therefore, be it resolved that we have a District Bulletin mimeographed each month and distributed to our churches giving Sunday School attendance, also reports from our District Home Missionaries.

Minutes

63. Resolved: That we have 700 copies of the District Minutes printed to sell for 25c per copy.

Special

64. Resolved: That this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to our presiding officer, General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk; Our Camp Evangelist, Rev. P. W. Thomas; Our Singers and Children's workers, Rev. and Mrs. George Poole; Our Foreign Missionary Representatives, Mrs. Dean, Rev. R. G. Flexon, Rev. U. N. Freeman, and our Home Missionary Representative, Rev. M. T. Cockman; Frankfort Pilgrim College representatives, Rev. R. K. Story and The Ladies Trio; To our beloved District Superintendent and wife, Rev. and Mrs. L. S. Houston; To our District Officials; Our Young People's Executive Secretary, Rev. R. E. Bell; heads of each department; Dining Room, Rev. and Mrs. H. D. Wright; Registration Office, Rev. and Mrs. H. H. Barber; Lunch Stand, Rev. and Mrs. H. B. Mitchell; Book Room, Rev. R. E. Bell and Mr. and Mrs. Rouse; Camp Chairman, Rev. Neal Horton; Our Police, S. S. Hulette; Our Electrician, Rev. S. R. Wiley; Our Nurse, Miss Lela Newkirk; To Dr. C. F. Long; To our Cook, Mrs. Thelma Kirkland; all the kitchen help, and all other laborers who served untiringly to make the Camp a blessing to all.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School of our district pay one dollar per month for a portable tabernacle fund. We further recommend that each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the tabernacle and Home Missionary funds.

2. We recommend: That each Church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, and the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

3. We recommend: That whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within five years, and in case they fail to do so, the lot to be put up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend that those who purchased lots prior to this date, be contacted by our District Superintendent, urging them to build a cabin within three years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.

4. We recommend that whereas our district home missions and church extension loan fund is being supervised by our district council, and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the amount of interest be 2% on all loans.

We further recommend that our pastors urge their people to contribute to this fund by means of wills, legacies, gifts, etc.

5. We recommend: That each local Young People's Society take a special offering each quarter to promote our district Young People's work.

6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife; also the church delegate to the District Conference; this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual business meeting, and also an offering be taken for their traveling expense.

7. We recommend that the District Treasurer be paid one hundred fifty (\$150.00) dollars per year, and the District Secretary be paid seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments, and that the statistician be paid twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per year.

8. We recommend: That each church have a missionary prayer service each month; and also a monthly missionary service on the Lord's Day, and an offering be taken at this service for Foreign Missions.

9. We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send 10 per cent of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, exception being made to the Building Fund, Evangelist, General Obligation, and Special Offerings.

10. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to each local church quarterly statements showing amounts due in each department.

11. We recommend that the District buy the extra books to complete those needed for the ministerial course of study.

12. We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be twenty-four hundred (\$2400.00) dollars per year, and that the District pay his utility bills, and that he be granted two weeks' vacation with pay; also that he be paid four cents per mile for traveling expense.

13. We recommend that the Assistant Superintendent be allowed expense for meals bought while working in District work, and that he be given four cents per mile for traveling expenses.

14. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary

at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and this to be taken care of at the first visit of the Superintendent.

15. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the General Conference, our General Budget be \$5.50 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions \$2.00, General Church Extension, \$1.00; General Administrative Expense, \$1.00; General Church Extension Loan Fund, \$.50; Senior Church School, \$.75; and the General Sunday School, \$.25.

16. We recommend: That the district budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense, 50 per cent; Sinking fund, 30 per cent; District parsonage, 10 per cent; Camp budget, 5 per cent; General Conference expense, 3 per cent; Bible School, 2 per cent.

17. We recommend: That each local church send to the District Treasurer the sum equivalent to 20c per member for the Camp Evangelist offering.

18. We recommend: That whereas a Camp Meeting Association has been formed for the purpose of the promotion of the Camp, that each member continue to pay at least \$1.00 per year. This is to be a standing pledge.

19. We recommend: That all moneys be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills.

20. We recommend: That each Church take steps to raise their offerings for revivals at least 30 days before the revival begins.

21. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference, and 50 per cent for the two following years.

22. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District.

23. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4 per cent of the Pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, Evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, and whereas this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter, We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church pay the equivalent of 40 per cent of the Evangelist's tithe who are members of said church, and 4 per cent of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2 per cent of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.

24. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and that 50 per cent of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the Forty-Second Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Kentucky District, now in session. Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ. According as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world that we should be holy and without blame before him in love.

Once again we are privileged to assemble for another annual conference to hear reports of the activities of the past year and to

seek the guidance of our Heavenly Father with regard to the new year we are now entering.

I have a deep feeling that this conference will be one of the most important ever held on these sacred grounds. Decisions will be made which will have far-reaching effects in the salvation of souls for years to come, if Jesus should tarry. We must not miss the mind of the spirit regardless of the cost; he is the Lord of the Harvest and we must labor under His direction.

It has been a glorious privilege to labor for Christ and the Church this year, with my splendid council and churches our fellowship has been blessed. As we bring the following report we desire that God shall have all the glory for the accomplishments.

New Fields

We have opened a new work at Shelbyville, a county seat, which came as the result of a Court House revival conducted by the Louisville and Frankfort pastors, Rev. H. H. Barber and J. A. Thomas. Rev. and Mrs. R. D. Christman are the pastors there; we are hoping to launch a building program soon. We have a field opened at Slemp, under the supervision of Miss Omata Brown, who came to us from North Carolina; also Conuence with Miss Grace Bowman as pastor. They are expecting to build a new church there.

Also the New Haven Church opened and pastored by Rev. and Mrs. H. B. Mitchell. A work has been opened at Eastview, and a building program is soon starting.

Churches Organized

We have four new churches organized this year. They are the New Haven Church near Somerset with fourteen members, Preston Church with fourteen members, Augusta with eleven members, and Carlisle with fourteen members.

By Radio

We now have six churches broadcasting the glorious gospel by means of radio. They are as follows: Elizabethtown, Louisville, Augusta, Maysville, Pikeville, and Latonia. The results are very gratifying.

Properties Dedicated

We have dedicated the following properties this year: Our lovely church in Frankfort forty feet by sixty feet with full basement all in Sunday School rooms modernly equipped. Our basement church thirty-six feet by seventy-two feet, all seated; it is near Somerset and known as the New Haven Church. Our lovely modern seven room parsonage with two baths, sun parlor, and full basement at Elizabethtown. Our church and six room parsonage at Preston; our church at Newport; also our beautiful brick veneer basement church at Paris, Kentucky.

Special Gifts

During February, 1951, a lovely eight room home, with bath, two screened porches, full basement with large lot, all valued at ten thousand dollars, a low figure, was given us next door to our church in Carrollton for parsonage by Mrs. Hattie Webster, a great friend of our church and to our District.

Our Camp Ground

We have built a lovely lunch stand, three new cabins, two of them are two room, and it was presented to the District Superintendent and wife by the Kentucky District. We thank you for this lovely gift.

Our Vision

In the great state of Kentucky we see the need of many more churches, therefore, we are praying for twenty thousand dollars per year for Home Missions. This could be distributed equally to ten new fields a year; which would enable the purchasing of a lot, balance of the two thousand dollars to start a building fund. We are also praying for four portable tabernacles; we are in need of two of them at this time with these prayers answered we could add fifty churches to the Kentucky District within the next five years. Will you join us in prayer for this need? Such is possible with God and a united effort on our part, can bring such to pass.

Properties Improved

The following improvements have been made in our district:

Ashland I, reclaimed the parking lot next to church, lost a number of years ago, painted interior of church, refinished floors and woodwork, painted exterior of church, papered and painted inside of parsonage with other interior improvements, a new concrete porch, a lovely pulpit Bible was presented by Mother Simpson's family in her memory.

Ashland II, bought church lot, some outside painting and other minor improvements were made.

Aspen Grove, installed cistern pump.

Carlisle, painted interior of church, also parsonage, purchased Sunday School bus.

Carrollton, papered and painted three Sunday School rooms, purchased folding chairs for Sunday School rooms, laid new inlaid linoleum in new parsonage, redecorated parsonage.

Central City, papered church, installed church bell, and papered part of parsonage.

Clay, has ceiled church, built two Sunday School rooms, installed two public rest rooms, and built garage.

Cloverport, liquidated parsonage debt.

Covington I, painted exterior of church, installed gas burner, purchased a much better Sunday School bus, redecorated interior of parsonage, and painted exterior.

Cynthiana, built concrete walk and steps to church.

Dalesburg, installed electric and new fixtures, and purchased piano.

Elizabethtown, completed new parsonage, redecorated interior of church and installed large furnace.

Erlanger, sanded and refinished floors in parsonage, built concrete porch and street canopy, installed new kitchen sink and hot water tank, papered and painted part of parsonage, painted exterior of church, with other improvements.

Frankfort, redecorated part of parsonage, resanded part of floors, completed parking lot next to church, and purchased new piano, converted old church into six three-room apartments.

Fullerton, redecorated interior of church, purchased floor coverings, also piano for church, walks and steps have been purchased, and a lovely church sign.

Falmouth, papered parsonage, installed new bath room fixtures, painted and installed new water pipe in basement.

Garvin Hill, built twelve feet extension to rear of church, painted exterior of both church and parsonage, purchased eighteen hundred dollar Sunday School bus.

Greenup, sanded floor, and painted interior of parsonage.

Hitchins, papered part of parsonage, new roof on one half of the

parsonage, some electrical installation, new double doors in front of church, refinished floors in church, laid new runners, graded lawn, purchased new walks, and building a Sunday School building twenty feet by forty feet, two story. This is called the McNurlin Memorial Sunday School Building.

Kingswood, painted church, redecorated parsonage, graded lawn, installed shower bath with bottled gas, and purchased a hot water heater.

Latonia, purchased their own radio equipment amounting to two hundred dollars, window installed for visibility between broadcasters and engineer, purchased a beautiful tape recorder machine, have gotten lovely drapes across auditorium for broadcasting, a large fan in church, new linoleum for parsonage kitchen, private phone for extra heavy calls due to radio work and calls, and have purchased a fan for parsonage.

Lexington, stonecoated church, purchased an electric organ, built vestibule to front of church, have purchased one hundred feet sidewalk, finished opening to front of parsonage with concrete steps, built two new Sunday School rooms, painted three rooms, built rear porch, refinished downstairs in parsonage, and purchased Sunday School bus.

Louisville, papered and painted parsonage, sanded floors of parsonage and laid versatile in kitchen.

Maysville, painted exterior of church and parsonage.

McIntosh, varnished floors and received from the Hopewell Church a beautiful pulpit stand.

Newport, laid walks and steps, installed large gas heater and fans for church with other minor improvements.

Olive Hill, has accumulated one thousand dollars toward a parsonage.

Owensboro, laid concrete floors in five Sunday School class rooms, plumbing complete for gas and heater installation, plumbing for water; also built sidewalks and graded lawn.

Paris, completed their lovely basement church which is modernly equipped with public rest rooms, nursery room and Sunday School rooms. The building has beautiful art glass windows.

Pikeville, plastered church basement, installed lighting system, covered floor with tile. They are now wishing toward going on with the church.

New Haven, installed large fan, and completed a lovely basement church. It is a credit to any district.

Pleasureville, sanded church floor and varnished same, also varnished seats, screened entire church, installed fans, painted exterior of parsonage, papered parsonage, installed kitchen pump, and liquidated all debt on parsonage.

Preston, bought parsonage, painted exterior of church and papered interior of church, painted exterior of parsonage, purchased piano, seats, installed public address system.

Rush, roofed church, laid new floor, papered and painted interior of church, built new platform and railings, all clear of debt.

Salem Ridge, papered and painted church, rebuilt pulpit and platform and papered parsonage.

Tram, has covered parsonage with asbestos siding and working toward finishing parsonage.

Tyrone, redecorated parsonage and some outside improvements.

Wheelwright, is now in the midst of building a church.

Willard, papered most of parsonage, purchased two rugs for parsonage, and also piano for church.

I'm glad to report that several pastors have received an increase in salary this year.

Personal Report

We have secured sixteen subscriptions to Advocate, participated in twenty-eight communion services, prayed with sixty-three for healing, traveled twenty-two thousand, nine hundred, fifty-six miles, received salary in full, conducted three and one half weeks in revivals, tithes, donations from pastor fifty-two dollars, made three hundred forty-two calls, prayed in two hundred six homes, or hospitals, dedicated nine children, preached two hundred eighty-four times, conducted eighty-four quarterly meetings, forty-four annual meetings, attended two general board meetings, forty-four annual meetings, attended two general board meetings, one District Superintendent's Convention, presided over one Ministerial Convention, spent nine days on camp ground, had the honor of preaching the Baccalaureate Message for our Frankfort Pilgrim College, have tried to be faithful to all departments of the Church, let God be first in all things.

REPORT OF S. S. PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the Forty-Second Annual Conference of the Kentucky District now in Session: Greetings in Jesus.

We present to you at this time the activities of the District Sunday School Committee for the year.

The committee again urged the Four-Star program which was extended another year by the General Office.

We now have fifty (50) Sunday Schools in the District, which is a gain of five over last year. The severe winter seems to have cut somewhat into the records. Of those reporting, 21 Schools show a loss, making a total loss of 69. We have no report from two of the new Schools, also three of the older Schools made no report. Three Schools held their own and 18 Schools report a gain.

Of those reporting, 7 Schools had a D. V. B. S. with two others planning one in August. The total average attendance was 206. Thirteen Schools reported a Sunday School Revival with a total of 49 children converted. One School is conducting a Teachers Training Class. Ten had launched a Lay Visitation Campaign.

We sincerely hope we can make a definite gain this year.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 foot front and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The Camp Meeting Board holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary and the owner is to pay the expenses of the same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on metal roofs. The Camp Meeting Board is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fee, \$5.00 and work assigned. \$10.00 and no work assigned. Children under ten years old will be registered free. Children ten to fourteen for half price. Sunday breakfast and supper twenty-five cents. All other meals fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

NOTE: Registration for the "Dormitory Rooms" to begin at Thursday noon, before camp, using the "first come, first served" method; workers for camp preparation to be given priority to rooms in dormitory.
