The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted. The Camp Meeting Treasurer's report was read and accepted. Moved and seconded that we adjourn until the next sitting. Dismissed with prayer by Rev. Ralph Nibarger.

THIRD SITTING

Conference reconvened at 1:30 P. M. with Rev. C. L. Oden leading in singing "When I See the Blood." We were led in prayer by Mrs. Anna Evans.

The reception committee presented Rev. S. R. Potts, Rev. and Mrs. Emmette Meeks, and Rev. and Mrs. Curtis Cox to the conference. Rev. and Mrs. Cox were asked to sing.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was presented:

The committee read Recommendations Nos. 1, 2, and 5, requesting that the pastors give special attention to these.

The committee moved and seconded that we change the last paragraph under "Rules Governing Sale of Lots and Building Cottages" to read, as follows:

"The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium." Carried.

The resolution committee reported the following:

Moved and seconded that we amend Resolution No. 14 to read as follows:

Resolved: That each preacher and deaconess send a copy of their reports to the Statistician, not later than ten days after the Conference year closes, which is the 30th day of June; and that the Statistician disregard any and all reports received thereafter. Be it also resolved that the District Treasurer's books close at noon on the 10th day of July. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we amend Resolution No. 27 to read as follows:

Resolved: That we have a District Young People's Convention beginning on Thursday before Camp, at 7:30 P. M. continuing through the day services on Saturday. Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint a president in each zone who shall create interest among the Young People; conduct quarterly zone rallies; and work directly under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the Young People's Executive Secretary. And be it further resolved that the District Young People's Executive Secretary visit and conduct at least one Rally a year in each zone, and said Secretary make a report to the Conference and said report to be printed in the district minutes. Carried.

Rev. S. M. Stikeleather read to the conference Recommendation No. 24 which reads as follows:

We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and that 50 per cent of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions. Bro. Stikeleather requested that the pastors give this recommendation special emphasis before the local churches.

Moved and seconded that a mimeograph sheet be sent each pastor containing our financial obligations and to be done so as soon as possible. Carried.

Moved and seconded that Rev. L. W. Sturk sing. Carried. He sang "He'll Understand and Say 'Well Done.'" God blessed the song to our hearts.

Moved and seconded that we have the election of District Officers during this setting. The motion to rescind was lost. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the District Superintendent appoint the tellers. Carried. The following were appointed: J. W. James, H. C. Beavers, C. C. Mayle, S. R. Wiley, Clifford Richardson, C. W. Keyes, Jack Hysel, and L. P. Chapin.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent. Rev. L. S. Houston was overwhelmingly elected on first ballot.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. C. L. Oden was elected on the first ballot.

Moved and seconded that we recess until the next sitting. Carried. We were dismissed by a friendly hand shaking.

FOURTH SITTING

Conference reconvened at 7:15 A. M. with Rev. James DeBurger leading in singing "Ere the Sun Goeth Down." We were led in prayer by Rev. Albert Selbee. Rev. L. W. Sturk stressed the need of "Evangelism" in our churches. He stated that to succeed, we must: 1. Have spiritual leaders, and 2. Have a genuine burden for souls. He emphasized that God does two things for us: A. Fits us for Heaven and B. Fits us for service.

Recessed for breakfast.

FIFTH SITTING

Conference reconvened at 9:00 A. M. by singing "Amazing Grace." We were led in prayer by Rev. L. P. Chapin. Rev. L. W. Sturk addressed the Conference on the subject: "A Success in God's Work" using as his Scripture the ninth chapter of Ezekiel.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary. Rev. R. L. Goodman was elected on the first ballot.

Moved and seconded that we accept the following Licentiates into the Conference: Jesse Adams, Nelson Richardson, Roy Green, Rev. and Mrs. Emmette Meeks, Paul Ebright, and Duel D. Robertson. Carried.

Rev. Ralph Tromble was re-elected by Acclamation as District Treasurer.

Ballots were cast for three advisory members of the Council. Rev. F. M. Singleton, Rev. H. H. Barber, and Rev. R. E. Bell were elected.

The reception committee presented Rev. Dual D. Robertson to the Conference.

Ballots were cast for the members of the examining board. Rev. H. H. Barber was elected.

Ballots were cast for two members for the educational board. Rev. C. L. Oden and Rev. W. K. George were elected.

Moved and seconded that we retain the same trustees. Carried. Rev. L. S. Houston appointed the committees for the year.

Invitations were given for the Ministerial Convention. Ashland I, Elizabethtown, and Garvin Hill extended the invitations. The Conference voted to accept the invitation of Ashland I.

Rev. L. W. Sturk gave the Conference an enlightening address on the subject "The Pilgrim Dollar."

Recessed until the next sitting.

SIXTH SITTING

Conference reconvened at 3:10 P. M. with an exhortation concerning the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate given by Rev. P. W. Thomas.

The reception committee presented Mrs. P. W. Thomas to the Conference.

A rising vote of thanks was given Rev. L. W. Sturk, our beloved General Superintendent, for the splendid manner in which he presided over our Conference.

Moved and seconded that we have the reading of the minutes at

the end of the sitting. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we table a resolution to change registration fee from five to ten dollars for adults and from two-fifty to five for minors under 14 years. Carried.

Resolutions Nos. 1 and 2 as presented by the Resolution Com-

mittee were lost.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report was read and accepted. A Certificate was presented to Rev. H. C. Beavers for his church having the largest numerical gain of the year.

The report of the Condolence Committee was read and accepted. The report of the Educational Board was read and accepted. This being the silver wedding anniversary of Rev. and Mrs. L. S.

Houston, it was moved and seconded that we give a special love offering to them to purchase a set of silverware. Carried.

The evangelists were introduced to the Conference.

Moved and seconded that we revise Resolution No. 64 to apply to the present Camp. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Council approve the minutes and

take care of any unfinished business. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Council be given full authority to formulate a plan to help our District Superintendent to trade cars. Carried.
The Conference was adjourned.

We were dismissed by prayer.

ORDINATION SERVICE—FRIDAY, 1:30 P.M.

The Ordination Service was opened Friday afternoon at 1:30 with Rev. C. L. Oden leading the Conference in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have." Rev. L. W. Sturk called for the reading of the Scripture. Rev. H. H. Barber read from Titus 2:1-8. Rev. L. S. Houston led in prayer. Rev. Ralph Tromble read from First Timothy, 3:1-8. Rev. L. W. Sturk then instructed the candidates as to the seriousness and importance of their calling.

At the close of his message the Ordination Council met at the altar to ordain to the ministry, Rev. L. E. Fleming, Rev. Kirtley Sipple, and Rev. Roy Turner. Mrs. Catherine Acree was ordained

as a <u>d</u>eaconess.

The right hand of fellowship was given to the candidates by the Conference wishing God's blessings upon their ministry.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the Forty-Third Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Kentucky District, now in session. Greetings in the name of Him who loved us and gave himself for us:

Once again through the mercies of God we are permitted to gather together in the capacity of another Annual Conference for the purpose of doing business for the King. I feel I have been highly honored to be permitted to have a little part and place in His great harvest field.

Through the past year God has been very near and dear to me. His grace has meant more than any previous year in my Christian experience. It has been my desire and aim to keep close to Him and to do His sweet will. The year has certainly been crowded full.

New Fields

We have opened during the year missions in the following places: Junction City, Danville, Lexington, Maysville, Lewisport, and Flint Road, and at this time plans are made for a Court House revival in Morgantown.

Churches Organized

We have organized one church this year located at Junction City with nine members and the bright prospect of a few more very soon.

New Church Buildings

God has helped us in building three new churches at the following places: Wheelwright, Shelbyville, and Eastview. These are now being occupied. Another is now under construction near Waco. Pikeville is now rebuilding. You will recall we burned out there several years ago and for the past three years have worshipped in a basement. They now have it under roof.

A nice lot has been given to us at Confluence and we are starting to build there now. We have built a lovely parsonage of five rooms and bath at Livermore, purchased a five-room house at Olive Hill and exchanged our Kingswood parsonage for one much better. We have finished our lovely Memorial Sunday School Building at the Hitchins church. This is a memorial to the McNurlins. (20 x 40 ft. two stories high.)

A number of pastors have received an increase in salary with a vacation.

Properties Dedicated

The churches at Wheelwright, Eastview, and Shelbyville have been dedicated this year.

Camp Improvements

We have built four new cabins on Camp ground with a number having been painted and improved. Also a lovely Portable Tabernacle which is to be moved and used in our Home Missionary work. A part of the Camp Tabernacle has been concreted with a 50% donation by our good friends at the Maysville Ready-Mix Co. God bless them. This should be finished before another Camp.

Properties Improved

A goodly number of our churches have made considerable improvements on their property, both on church and parsonage. Some have purchased a Sunday School bus, others added Sunday School facilities such as rooms and basements which should add to the progress of the School.

Personal Report

We have participated in 24 communion services, prayed with 41 for healing, held one week revival, conducted 78 quarterly meetings, 56 annual meetings, attended one General Board Meeting, one Superintendent's Conference, presided over one Ministerial Convention, spent 20 days on Camp ground, traveled 22.893 miles, made 247 calls, prayed in 244 homes, preached 137 times, dedicated 17 children, received my salary in full, with \$61.00 in tithe donations from pastors, a love offering from the District for one hundred and twenty-five dollars. Our two-room cabin, built by the District last year, as a gift, has been finished by ceiling and painting and rewiring by the Lexington church. Thanks to all who had part in this lovely gift.

Our Appreciation

We have appreciated working for the Lord with our District Council, our pastors, evangelists, laity and friends. We have tried to be faithful to the Lord and the church.

RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

- 1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make three trips over the District during the year, and give more time to the smaller churches as needed.
- 2. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be consulted and present if possible, when drawing up all deeds in the District, and see that all deeds be abstracted.
- 3. Resolved: That the Assistant Superintendent be a member of our Zone Bible School Board.

Council

- 5. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan.
- 6. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Convention and said date to be recorded in the minutes.
- 7. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years of their existence, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.
- 8. Resolved: That we, as a Conference, delegate to the Council, power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, and the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; same to be printed in the minutes.
- 9. Resolved. That the District Council make provision for the planting of more shade trees on the Camp grounds.
- 10. Resolved: That a Missionary Committee of three be appointed by the District Council. The duty of this committee shall be to encourage the organization and development of local missionary societies, and help to direct their activities in the interest of Foreign, General, and District Home Missions.
- 11. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to rezone the churches of the district when necessary.

Churches

- 12. Resolved: That each church supply the Camp with two each of the following: Cups, plates, glasses, large spoons, sheets, straw ticks, cereal dishes and one pitcher.
- 13. Resolved: That each church close its books on the last day of each month, and the reports be sent to the District Treasurer immediately.
- 14. Resolved: That each preacher and deaconess send a copy of their reports to the Statistician, not later than 10 days after the Conference year closes, which is the 30th day of June; and that the Statistician disregard any and all reports received thereafter. Be it also resolved: that the District Treasurer's books close at noon on the tenth day of July.
- 15. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors have not received sufficient financial support, be it resolved that each local church appoint one prayer-meeting night each month as "Donation Night," at which time food stuff and provisions shall be brought

together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: that an agitator be appointed for the coming year by the Superintendent at the Annual Business Meeting.

- 16. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the Pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, be it therefore resolved: that the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor, shall continue over the two Sundays he attends said Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.
- 17. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of collecting tithes and offerings.
- 19. Resolved: That we, as pastors and church boards, urge the calling of our Evangelist, for our revivals, from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and when other ministers are called we consult the District Superintendent.
- 20. Resolved: That we immediately strive for at least four new churches in the Kentucky District this year.

Sunday School

- 21. Resolved: That each Sunday School correctly enroll each class, said enrollment to be revised quarterly.
- 22. Resolved: That each zone have a Sunday School Attendance Banner to be given quarterly to the Sunday School having the largest attendance; also an offering banner given to the Sunday School having the largest offerings.
- 23. Resolved: That we provide for a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Convention. We further recommend that the Superintendent or representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in Sunday School meetings in the local church.
- 24. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School other than their own this year.
- 25. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.
- 26. Resolved: That the Sunday School Service at camp be under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.

Young People

- 27. Resolved: That we have a District Young People's Convention beginning on Thursday before Camp, at 7:30 P. M. and continuing through the day services on Saturday. Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint a president in each zone who shall create interest among the young people, conduct quarterly zone rallies, and work directly under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the Young People's Executive Secretary. And be it further resolved that the Executive Secretary visit and conduct at least one Rally a year in each zone, and said Secretary make a report to the Conference and said report to be printed in the district minutes.
- 28. Resolved: That we have a Young People's Official Directory posted in front of our minutes.

Zones

- 29. Resolved that each zone have the election of their zone officers at the last zone meeting prior to Camp, so the officer's name can be listed in the minutes.
- 30. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in the minutes.

District Home Missions

31. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory Members to be chosen from the Ordained Ministers by the Council.

Credentials

- 32. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; and in that case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.
- 33. Resolved: That those pursuing the Study Course send for their home study course early in the year, forwarding with their request \$1.00 to cover the cost of questions and postage for each subject.

Pastor

- 34. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible convenience.
- 35. Resolved: That each pastor of our District make a special effort to place a current manual in the home of each member of our church.
- 36. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book name and address of each "Advocate Subscriber," with the date of expiration, said book to be transferred to the following pastor, and that he endeavor to keep a subscription list equal his membership.
- 37. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church and the District Superintendent and that no pastor hold a revival away from his church within thirty days after a revival in his own church; then not more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.
- 38. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Condolence Committee immediately following the funeral.
- 39. Resolved: That every active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.
- 40. Resolved: That the telephone number be included with the address in the Directory of Pastoral Appointments.

Ministers

- 41. Resolved: That each Minister who has not been supporting financially that church of which he is a member, do so this year.
- 42. Resolved: That each Minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance, to the District Council.

- 43. Resolved: That whereas Ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and whereas there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: that the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.
- 44. Resolved: That an information blank be filled out by ministers that cannot attend the Conference, said blank to be furnished by the District.

Conference

- 45. Resolved: That no one leaves the Conference without its permission.
- 46. Resolved: That no church elect a Delegate to our District Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.
- 47. Resolved: That the Conference convene on Thursday morning, last week of the Camp.
- 48. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the Church and District, also that we send someone other than the pastor's wife as delegate to Conference when possible.

Camp

- 49. Resolved: That the date of our Camp be set for the last Thursday in July, this to be a permanent date.
- 50. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, same to be presented at the dining room door.
- 51. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife and our registered nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: that the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.
- 52. Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table and some one to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Youth News, and our Missionary Bulletins.
- 53. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:
- A. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who come to Camp shall abide by its every rule.
 - B. Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 11 p. m.
 - C. A Dean shall be appointed over each Dormitory.
- D. No single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7 p. m.
- E. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge, and any article taken shall be returned in good condition.
 - F. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.
- $\ensuremath{G_{\mathrm{c}}}$. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the camp ground.

- H. A Supervisor shall be appointed for the dining room and kitchen; parking of cars and care of the tabernacle; for the lunch and book room; for registration and cleaning of the grounds. These to be appointed by the Camp Meeting committee.
- 54. Resolved: That we have the registration for the Dormitory Rooms to begin at Thursday noon before Camp, using the "first come, first serve" method. Workers for camp preparation be given priority to rooms in Dormitory.
- 55. Resolved: That all preachers give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing the Camp grounds, or in preparation for the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.
- 56. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our camp ground during camp meeting. Be it resolved that a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for the supervised playground on said camp ground, using the offering from the children's service to apply on the equipment.
- 57. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mattresses for their cabin.
- 58. Resolved: That the Camp Meeting Committee meet at the Ministerial Convention and plan for the preparing of the Camp Ground for Camp and appoint capable persons to carry out the work of the Camp.

Miscellaneous

- 59. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.
- $60.\,$ Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.
- 61. Resolved: Whereas there is a dissatisfaction in regard to workers for Camp preparation; Be it resolved the camp meeting committee be enlarged to twelve to take care of this work and any others who come and eat in the dining room before Thursday that they be charged the regular price for each meal until Thursday noon, unless called by the District Superintendent. Furthermore, only these workers have priority to Dormitory rooms.
- 62. Resolved: That whereas there is a need for stimulation of interest in the Home Missionary work of the District, also reports on the Sunday School attendance would be a help and of interest to the District; therefore, be it resolved that we have a District Bulletin mimeographed each month and distributed to our churches giving Sunday School attendance, also reports from our District Home Missionaries.

63. Resolved: That we have 700 copies of the District Minutes printed to sell for 25c per copy.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

- 1. We recommend: That each Sunday School of our district pay one dollar per month for a portable tabernacle fund. We further recommend that each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the tabernacle and Home Missionary funds.
- 2. We recommend: That each Church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, and the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.
- 3. We recommend: That whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within five years, and in case they fail to do so, the lot to be put up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend that those who purchased lots prior to this date, be contacted by our District Superintendent, urging them to build a cabin within three years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.
- 4. We recommend that whereas our district home missions and church extension loan fund is being supervised by our district council, and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the amount of interest be 2% on all loans.

We further recommend that our pastors urge their people to con-

tribute to this fund by means of wills, legacies, gifts, etc.

- 5. We recommend: That each local Young People's Society take a special offering each quarter to promote our district Young People's work.
- 6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife; also the church delegate to the District Conference; this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual business meeting, and also an offering be taken for their traveling expense.
- 7. We recommend that the District Treasurer be paid one hundred fifty (\$150.00) dollars per year, and the District Secretary be paid seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments, and that the statistician be paid twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per year.
- 8. We recommend: That each church have a missionary prayer service each month; and also a monthly missionary service on the

Lord's Day, and an offering be taken at this service for Foreign Missions.

- 9. We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send 10 per cent of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer exception being made to the Building Fund, Evangelist, General Obligations, and Special Offerings.
- 10. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to each local church quarterly statements showing amounts due in each department.
- 11. We recommend that the District buy the extra books to complete those needed for the ministerial course of study.
- 12. We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be twenty-four hundred (\$2400.00) dollars per year, and that the District pay his utility bills, and that he be granted two weeks' vacation with pay; also that he be paid four cents per mile for traveling expenses.
- 13. We recommend that the Assistant Superintendent be allowed expense for meals bought while working in District work, and that he be given four cents per mile for traveling expenses.
- 14. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and this to be taken care of at the first visit of the Superintendent.
- 15. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the General Conference, our General Budget be \$5.50 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions \$2.00, General Church Extension, \$1.00; General Administrative Expense, \$1.00; General Church Extension Loan Fund, \$.50; Senior Church School, \$.75; and the General Sunday School, \$.25.
- 16. We recommend: That the district budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense, 50 per cent; Sinking fund, 30 per cent; District parsonage, 10 per cent; Camp budget, 5 per cent; General Conference expense, 3 per cent; Bible School, 2 per cent.
- 17. We recommend: That each local church send to the District Treasurer the sum equivalent to 20c per member for the Camp Evangelist offering.
- 18. We recommend: That whereas a Camp Meeting Association has been formed for the purpose of the promotion of the Camp, that each member continue to pay at least \$1.00 per year. This is to be a standing pledge.
- 19. We recommend: That all moneys be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills.
- 20. We recommend: That each Church take steps to raise their offerings for revivals at least 30 days before the revival begins.
- 21. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference, and 50 per cent for the two following years.
- 22. We recommend. That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District.
- 23. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4 per cent of the Pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, Evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, whereas this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of

Pensions in this matter, We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church pay the equivalent of 40 per cent of the Evangelist's tithe who are members of said church, and 4 per cent of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2 per cent of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.

That each Sunday School set aside one 24. We recommend: Sunday each month and that 50 per cent of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fee, \$5.00 and work assigned. \$10.00 and no work assigned. Children under ten years old will be registered free. Children ten to fourteen for half price. Sunday breakfast and supper twenty-five cents. All other meals fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

NOTE: Registration for the "Dormitory Rooms" to begin at Thursday noon, before camp, using the "first come, first served" method; workers for camp preparation to be given priority to rooms in dormitory.
